Republicans Capture Majority Of County Offices

Rowan Man Nabbed On Incest Charge; Wife To Prosecute

Farmers Citizens Accused Of Having Immoral Relations With Own Daughter

GIRL TELLS STORY TO COUNTY JUDGE

Clint Cassity Arrested At Ashland After Wife Appears Here

A warrant charging her husband with illicit relations with their 18-year-old daughter, Kathryn, was sworn out here today by Mrs. Clint Cassity.

The daughter appeared before County Judge Charles E. Jennings, with her mother, saying that she and her father have been having immoral relations since the past year.

Judge Jennings issued a warrant charging Cassity with incest. Cassity was arrested this morning by Ashland, Ky., officers and will be returned here tonight.

Mrs. Cassity has been living with her aunt at Ashland, where she is employed, while her husband and daughter have been living at their home in Rowan.

While at Farmers on a visit she said that she found her daughter and husband in bed together. After the incident, she and her husband left for Ashland.

Kathryn, an attractive girl, and her mother were on the verge of divorce when they appeared before Judge Jennings and procured the warrant.

Mrs. Cassity said she convicted her husband of incest, a penalty of from 2 to 20 years in the penitentiary.

Check Completed By Rowan Farmers

Farm supervisors for the Rowan County Agricultural Conservation Association have completed checking Rowan County farms with the exception of several farms that could not be supervised when they were first visited.

The check is completed at once. Supervisors will start the final check up at once to determine what approved practices have been followed since the farm was supervised.

These practices are mainly the use of agricultural lime, seedling perennial grasses and the use of phosphate that was used in September and October.

These practices carried out after October 31 will be considered in the 1938 program.

The county office will not be in position to take applications for payment under the 1937 program for about three weeks.

Tobacco Grading Demonstration Set

County Agent Chas. L. Goff will hold four tobacco grading demonstrations on November 30 and December 1. An expert tobacco grader will assist with the demonstrations.

These demonstrations would have been held earlier but it was impossible to get the assistance of the grader earlier.

The farms on which the demonstrations will be held have not been definitely determined at this time but will be selected as soon as possible. They will be held in the more important tobacco producing communities of the county.

Open House Held In Elliott County

Social Security "open house" was held last Friday morning in the lobby of the Sandy Hook post office during which Mrs. S. H. Ourbacker, Regional Area Supervisor for the Social Security Administration in Kentucky and Arthur B. Rainey, Deputy Tax Collector for the Social Security Division of the College of Interns, were present.

Numerous Social Security problems were explained by the visiting officials. Mr. Rainey explained that all workers who receive wages, salaries or commissions as employees of industrial concerns, construction, distributing or service companies are included under the Federal Old Age Insurance law. All such companies employing one or more persons either for intermittent, part of full time, are explained, are subject to the tax. It was explained that Social Security account numbers could be obtained by application on form SS-5 from the Ashland office.

Peoples Ticket Wins By Heavy Majorities

Carrying each of Morehead's precincts the Peoples Ticket scored an easy victory in the municipal election. They were opposed by John Cecil, candidate for Council on the Citizens Ticket.

The Citizens Ticket originally announced with an almost full slate but all candidates, except Mr. Cecil withdrew prior to the election.

The victory means that Warren C. Leppin, director of the Breckenridge Training School will be Mayor for the next 4 years. Others elected to hold office for 2 years were: Lee Stewart for police judge and the following council members: Bill Hudgins, N. E. Kennard, S. P. Caudill, Frank Riddle, E. D. Patton and Austin Riddle.

State Department Has Shown Rapid Growth This Year

More People Reached By Welfare Department Than Any Other Agency

Under the extensive program of State affairs, according to the latest report in the administration of Welfare has grown the largest in the department.

Commissioner Frederick A. Wallis, dealing with personal problems throughout the State, Commissioner Wallis said the department probably directly touches more people than does any other division of state government.

In addition, the department has direct supervision, subject to the approval of the Governor, over a building program that will approximate an outlay of ten or eleven million dollars in its completion.

The program of the department, calling for a rehabilitation of the State for the wards in line with the most modern methods of correctional custody, will reach a new standard by bringing vocational instruction of reformatory and penitentiary; manual training for the boys and girls at Greenup; the teaching of domestic science and the arts and crafts at the Women's County, the employment of the maximum number of prisoners at Edenville Penitentiary, and the cultivation of the State for Oldham, Mercer and Boyle counties.

Commissioner Wallis stated that the new buildings, splendid as they will be, will represent only the shell of the program for rehabilitation. It is the education, training and rebuilding of men and women physically, the instilling of new ideals of morality and citizenship and the recognition of the individual to society of many unfortunate that are the main objectives of the Department of Welfare.

Dr. C. N. Maxey, 55, Morehead Dentist, Dies In Hospital

Had Been In Failing Health For Year; Funeral Arrangements Not Made

Dr. C. N. Maxey, 55, Morehead dentist died today in the St. Joseph Hospital at Lexington. Funeral arrangements have not been made.

Dr. Maxey had been in failing health for the last year. Three weeks ago he was removed to the Lexington hospital. Death was due to a general break-down.

Dr. Maxey was a native of Rowan County. He had practiced his profession here and in Cleveland, Ohio.

Surviving are his father and mother, Mrs. J. M. Maxey, of Clearfield, and one brother, J. B. Maxey, also of Clearfield.

Morgan Constable Slain At Wrigley

Robert Whitt, Well Known In This County, Victim Of Bullets

Robert Whitt, 72-year-old constable of West Liberty, was shot to death and Elzie Perry, 30, was seriously wounded at Wrigley, Tuesday afternoon.

The bullet entered near the heart and he lived only a few seconds. He said Whitt returned Perry's fire before he died.

A bullet from Whitt's 28-caliber revolver struck Perry in the left side under the shoulder, the bullet entered through the armpit on the right side. He is a patient in the hospital here and is expected to make a recovery.

His brother, Eugene, 21, was arrested by the officers in connection with the Morgan and county jail at West Liberty.

Whitt's father, Jim Whitt, age 103, made his home with his son.

Farmers Pay Loans To U.S. Government

FSA Payments Are Being Met In Fifth Rehabilitation Region

Clarence W. Cobb, County Supervisor in charge of rural rehabilitation by the Farm Security Administration in Rowan, Carter and Logan counties, states that a total of \$3,380,622.45 has been repaid by farmers in this 5-state region since the start of the Rural Rehabilitation loans during the past two years, according to figures received from George S. Mitchell, Regional Director of FSA in Raleigh.

Of this amount, \$105,017.99 was repaid in one week ending October 31.

The rural rehabilitation program which Congress recently voted to continue in connection with the new farm tenancy program is now being administered as a major function of the Farm Security Administration. The Rural Rehabilitation program includes debt adjustment and supervised loans for

Old Board Registers Smashing Victory In Board Races

A sweeping victory for the "old" Board of Education candidates, which were supported by Supervisor Corrette, won at the polls Tuesday complete returns show.

J. B. Fraley, Hendrix Tolliver and J. L. Boggs were elected, defeating Billy Cornett, A. J. Williams and V. Flood.

Fraley led all candidates polling 2,553 votes; Tolliver had 2,423 and Boggs 2,377.

The new board candidates had the following vote: Cornett, 1,815; Williams, 1,553; Flood, 1,544.

The candidates supported by Superintendent Corrette carried 16 of the county's 20 precincts.

The trend was established in this race with the counting of Morehead precinct Number 1 and from there on out the "old" Board added to their lead.

The School Board race drew possibly more interest in the County than did the major races and in many precincts the fight was concentrated in the School election.

Most of the voting in the School Board races was according to the slates.

Eastern Loses To Strong Morehead Eagles By 26 To 0

Morehead Run Will To Defeat Light 3,500 Home-Comers

Two of Kentucky's undefeated and unbeaten football teams met in combat here Saturday afternoon and one of them had to fall from the plans of the Eastern team that succumbed as the Morehead Teachers scored a decisive 26-0 victory over their old rivals from Richmond as 3,500 persons looked on.

As a result of the victory the 5-foot high rifle that dates back to Revolutionary War days remained in the possession of Morehead for another year. Last year the Eagles defeated the rifle by defeating Eastern 19-7.

It was Custer Reynolds the 190-pound "bull of the Buckhorn" who was the star of the game. He was Saturday as one of Kentucky's greatest football players, that led the Morehead team to victory.

With a hard charge, he ran in front of him, Reynolds accounted for some of Morehead's touchdowns. He was called back because of a penalty of both teams gave Eastern a very bad afternoon. The kicking of both teams was extraordinary and both teams was in seldom seen in any kind of football. Morehead punned 14 times with Donald Fair and Clewton Stanley doing the kicking for an average of 49 yards.

Eastern's backs booted the ball 13 times for an average of 41 yards. Four times Morehead punted out of bounds within the five yard line and Eastern did the same trick three times.

It was a kick of 65 yards on the part of Stanley that led to the Eagles' first touchdown. The ball went out of bounds on the twelve yard line and Jenkins, Eastern's fullback, intercepted it.

The Eagles touched off the spark at this point and with Stanley and Reynolds alternating in carrying the ball went down on straight punt plays to the Maroune's 41-yard line and he ran it back for a touchdown without a hand being laid on him. Again Vinson's placement kick was close but declared no good.

In the third quarter Reynolds apparently had scored again from the 3 yard line following a Morehead march when their fullback but the play was called and Morehead penalized for off side. Eastern obtained possession of the pig skin on the next play on the 2 yard line and Jenkins punted to midfield. Reynolds smarting under that penalty took the ball two plays later and ran 62 yards for the third score. This time Vinson's kick was a good. The final touchdown came in the fourth quarter. Morehead which had been receiving the worst of the penalties finally received a break on the officials calling which placed them in scoring territory.

Marvin Anderson was the big boy in this assault and to him went the honor of lugging the ball over the pay stripe from the 5 yard line. Vin Wray, who has been injured, entered the game and

Democratic Strongholds Fall Into GOP Column; Factional Differences Held As Contributing Factor In Defeat Of Most Of Party Nominees

Republicans, overcoming a registration disadvantage, scored a smashing victory in the majority of Rowan County's political races, complete and official returns compiled Thursday afternoon, after the count was completed, show.

The winners in the major races were I. E. Pelfrey for County Judge; R. M. "Dick" Clay for County Attorney; Vernon Alfrey (incumbent) for County Court Clerk; B. F. McClellan for Sheriff; Alby Hardin for Jailer; John Lewis (incumbent) for Tax Commissioner; and Lester Caskey for Coroner.

Of the above only Hardin and Clay are Democrats and they both won by an eye-lash. Hardin's final majority was 27 while Clay won by 41 votes.

John W. Number 19 precinct, located in Morehead, which is nearly even on registration, they held a narrow lead of less than 25 votes while Hardin was trailing by 57. It was number 19 that resulted in victory for the two Democrats, Hardin carrying the precinct 121 votes and Clay by 40.

Vernon Alfrey led all candidates winning by a majority of 1,355 or almost 2 to 1.

B. F. McBrayer defeated Dan Parker for Sheriff by a 311 margin. The vote was: Parker 2,035; McBrayer, 2,346.

Lester Caskey's majority over Dave C. Caudill race was 473. The vote: Caudill, 1,970; Pelfrey, 2,443.

The County Attorney's race the contest was Clay 1,916; Powers, 1875.

Hardin's vote for Jailer was 2,128 as against 2,099 for Adkins.

Arthur Barber of Morehead defeated Jim Rigby, of Clearfield for Coroner by 777 votes. The totals were: Davis, 1,538; Caskey, 2,315.

Herbert Moore, Republican, of Farmers, won over his Democratic opponent, Ballard Foreman for Magistrate in the second district by a 101 majority. Foreman polled a heavy vote in his home precinct at Piery but could not offset the decided Republican trend throughout the county.

Henry Cox, Democrat, won the Magisterial race in district 3 by beating Tom Eldridge by 24. The totals: Cox, 675; Eldridge, 432.

In the closest race in the County E. E. Reed won over Bunk Evans for Magistrate in the Fourth District by 12 votes. Not until Number 20 precinct was counted was the Republican lead reversed 303 and Reed 315.

Every county in Kentucky opposed the two Constitutional amendments proposed for adoption, except on Amendment 20, 1,162 voted "No" in Rowan as against 1,009 "Yes" on Amendment 19, which was voted "Yes" by a ballot there were 1,489 "No" votes and 283 "Yes" votes.

Morehead's Democratic candidates show their new strength. This was in Wagner where the Democratic candidates all received more than 50 percent of the vote where the Democrats received more votes for most of their candidates than the registration shows. Elsewhere Republicans not only held an advantage on the straight ballots but picked up the vote on the cross-ballots.

The biggest surprise in the election was the complete reversal of form rowed in Morehead, where Number 1, generally classed as the staunchest Democratic stronghold. Here all Democratic candidates were beaten except Hardin and Parker.

Democratic leaders issued a statement today showing they supported them and congratulating the Republican winners. "The majority have spoken and we can only wish you the best and success," was the general statement made by the losing Democratic candidates.
