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

SPECIAL PROJECT IN ELEMENTARY SCIENCE EDUCATION

A special project sponsored by The National Science Foundation to train forty elementary teachers in the methods and procedures of teaching The Process Approach to science teaching in the elementary schools in a county system in Eastern Kentucky.

Participants have been previously selected and the schools that will be the demonstration centers have been designated. Dr. Crayton Jackson of the School of Sciences and Mathematics will direct the project that continues as an In-service program during the 1967-1968 school year. Teachers for the project have been selected on the advice and recommendations of The American Association for the Advancement of Science.

NOTE CHANGE IN COURSE NUMBERING

Graduate and undergraduate courses are listed in separate sections of this bulletin.

Courses previously designated with a "G" now appear in the undergraduate schedule with the designation of "U" to indicate upperdivision credit only. The same course is listed in the graduate schedule followed by the letter "G" to indicate graduate credit only. Only those students who qualify for graduate credit may enroll in the "G" courses.

1. Student goes to his Adviser's Office between May 20 and May 29 or June 12 and 13 for:

- (a) Schedule cards
- (b) Trial Schedule card
- (c) Class Schedule

Fill in the information requested on all of the cards except the class schedule on the White Registrar's Card and Student Affairs Card which will be completed when you register. All blanks should be completed in ink except the Trial Schedule. The Trial Schedule card is to be signed by your adviser before entering the Auditorium for registration.

2. Student goes to Adviser: (If you do not know your adviser, please go to the Dean of your School who will assign you a temporary adviser.)

- (a) student and his adviser decide on courses needed by the student (check all courses for possible pre-requisite requirements)
- (b) student and adviser prepare a realistic schedule -- changes of schedule by drop-add will be limited in most cases to correction of scheduling errors
- (c) adviser signs Trial Schedule
- (d) adviser retains one copy of advisee's schedule for his records

Special permission must be secured to carry a student load of 10 hours at the undergraduate level. Six hours of course work is considered a full-time load for Undergraduates. Eight hours of credit is a full-load for Graduate Students.

Courses numbered in the 300's and 400's carrying the letter "G" may be taken for graduate credit by qualified students. Graduate students enrolling for any of these courses should check with their adviser to be certain of prerequisite qualifications (see Graduate Section). All graduates must see an adviser before enrolling.

4. Pick up the remainder of your Registration packet at the front of the Auditorium.

Complete the information requested on the new cards you have received. Wait in the Auditorium until you are told to go to the Gymnasium. Graduate Students who do not have a number six (6) in the block marked "class" on the Pink Master Card should report to the Dean of the Graduate Programs. Graduate students who have not completed all three sections of the Graduate Record Exam are to report to the G.R.E. table in Button Auditorium.
5. After admission to the Gymnasium, go to the department concerned to pick up your Class Cards. Give the individual distributing the cards you desire your Trial Schedule Card, Pink Master Card, and in some cases your fee card will be requested.

As you sign your Class Card the instructor concerned will initial your Trial Schedule Card thereby confirming the class assignment. If a change in your schedule becomes necessary because of conflict, closing of a section, etc., be certain that any Class Cards you have already received but will not be able to use, are returned to the instructor who issued them. If you have any trouble with your schedule that cannot be resolved by those handing out cards and advising, please go to the Dean of your School.
6. After you have received Class Cards for all the courses you are to take, go to the tables set up in the bleachers on the north and south sides of the Gymnasium and enter your approved schedule in ink on the reverse side of the Registrar's Card (White), and the Dean of Students Card (Yellow).
7. Go to the "Final Check" Station for final approval of your schedule of classes. (Students on probation report directly to the Dean of Undergraduate Programs.) It will be necessary at this time to present for checking in this order:

LATE ENTRANCE

Students entering after the regular enrollment date will be placed on a reduced schedule. 




