What Price Power

At last we have attained that social or political or what have you prominence to which we have long aspired. We rate...

Three and one half columns in the sheet. (we use that term advisedly, since C. C. — short for Chamleon Coated—Crutcher was the first to apply it) may certainly be said to be attaining prominence with a vengeance.

Funny things happen. A trifle over a year ago, the worthy county Judge in whose defense the so-called editor of the sheet rises in wrath, called the said editor a "polecat."

But what's a term of opprobrium like "polecat" to people of that calibre

Enough of that. One half of said article, if it can be called an article was devoted to proving that the editor of the News is not even a peanut politician, but rather a "nut" politician.

Actually we have never posed as any kind of a politician. We have tried to be rather a citizen interested in the welfare of the county and state, than a politician of any kind. To be recognized as a politician of any size, is more than we had expected.

Two years ago the editor of the News told county Judge Charles E. Jennings that when his administration did anything worthy of praise the News would give him his just dues. When, on the other hand things which the editor of the News considered to be a detriment to the county occurred, the News would unhesitatingly call his hand and the attention of the citizens at large.

The News has pursued and expects to continue to pursue this policy. If the county judge deserves praise we shall be the first to bestow that praise. If he deserves censure, we shall be equally prompt in bestowing that censure.

It would be easy to refute the statement made in the recent article. Written in haste, it partakes of childishness. In the first place the editor of the News was not speaking as a Democrat, but as a citizen. Proof of the fact that the resentments, is in the number of endorsements that have been received from both Republicans and Democrats on the editorial published in the News.

It was said that trouble had been had at elections here in this county for an indefinite period. Strange as it may seem they had to go back thirty odd years to find record of an election disturbance. It would seem to any fair minded straight thinking citizen that it is using a great stretch of the imagination when a County Judge, to justify a act must reach back over the years into the past before he was born, to find a reason for placing guards over the polls.

It smacks too much of dictatorship of Hitlerism.

Speaking of peace officers, if the county Judge thought there might be trouble, although only his ear was attuned to discover its possibility, why did he not consult with the properly and duly elected peace officers of the county to get their view? Why did he not ask Sheriff Mort May whether he was competent and capable of preserving order? Why did he go over the head of the sheriff and fail to notify him that he considered the sheriff incompetent to perform his duty?

It is not our purpose to enter into a controversy over the merits or possible demerits of the County Judge. We have given him full credit for what he has accomplished. We intend to continue to do so when he accomplishes anything for the benefit of the people of Rowan county.

We intend with equal determination to lift the veil of silence in the defense of the rights of Rowan County's people, and to consider that in arbitrarily placing guards at the polls, without the least sign of need, without the least indication of violence, the County Judge has exceeded his authority.

It may not be Jack Wilson's business, the County Judge may not be required to explain his acts to Jack Wilson, and so on Jack Wilsoning—to the end of the chapter.

But the fact remains that the people pay taxes, that they help to pay the County Judge's salary, that the County Judge is only a servant of Jack Wilson and several thousand like him, and that in the final analysis County Judge Charles E. Jennings will be required to make explanations not only to Jack Wilson, a citizen of Rowan county, but to several other citizens. He must give an account of his stewardship.

So far as we are concerned that matter is closed. We have nothing but the warmest personal regard for County Judge Charles E. Jennings. We have been associated with him for many years and so far as personal friendship is concerned we feel that he is still our friend. We do not enter into personalities. Personalities are too small. What Judge Jennings might do in his personal private life is no concern to us. If we happen to consider that a public grievance deserves public discussion, that should not and so far as we are concerned does not interfere with our private personal feelings.

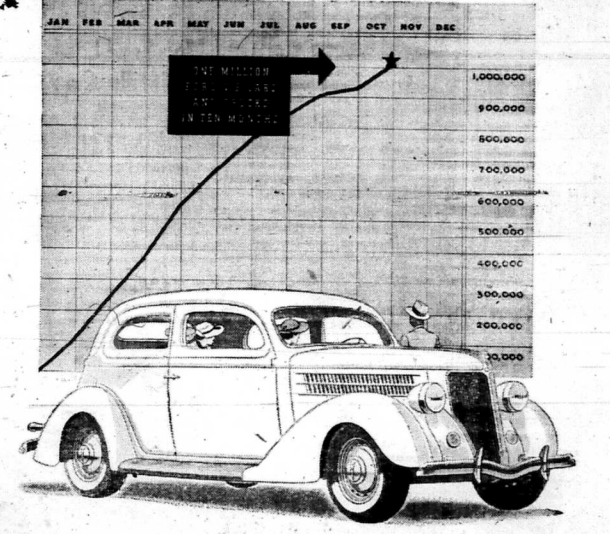

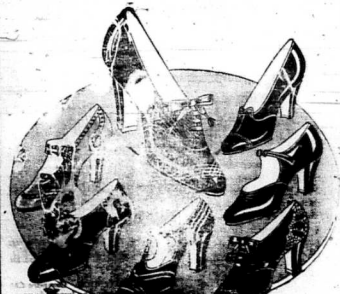

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

Written Each Week By Rev. B. H. Karas.

SUBJECT: The Message of Haggai and Zechariah. Hag. 1:2-8; 2:8; Zech. 4:6-10.

GOLDEN TEXT: I was glad when they said unto me, Let us go into the house of the LORD. (Psalm 122:1).

The progress of genuine religion goes on in spite of, or perhaps because of, opposition. Our lesson today is a striking example of this truth.

The Jews had returned from exile in Babylon in the year 536 B. C. and had found Jerusalem, homes, temple and all, in complete ruins. The siege of Nebuchadnezzar more than half a century previous had left nothing but desolation. The passing years had increased that despair. People began at once to rebuild their homes. Then they built the sacrificial altar. Within a year the foundation of the new Temple had been laid and success was evident.

Just then trouble began. It always does when God's people start a revival. The Samaritans, a mixed race who dwelt in the territory known as Samaria after the end of the Israelite Kingdom, did everything in their power to stop the enterprise. They caused the work to cease for fourteen years.

Haggai and Zechariah, sent of God, came on the scene with burning messages of encouragement to the people. As usual, exercise were offered. These prophets went directly to Zerubbabel the civil leader and to Joshua, the religious lead-

er. These leaders reasoned it was not time to start the work; the people were disheartened. "But they have comfortable homes of their own; shall they leave God's house in ruins?" replied the prophets. "You had best consider your ways," they continued. "Your harvests are poor; you are unsatisfied; you are thirsty; clothed but not warm; you earn wages but money slips away. You are to blame; you cannot hope to advance materially until you make greater spiritual progress. God won't allow it. You are concerned about your own houses but not about God's."

The result was that the work was renewed. The rebuilding of the Temple went forward and Haggai stood by to counsel and encourage with his burning message. So did Zechariah. After the work had been started these men began to preach the power and might of God. "Not by might nor by power, saith the Lord, but by my Spirit." Thus the preparation for the Messianic advent which was to be far beyond the expectation of even the prophets of God had been started. By God's help it would go on; and did go on to completion.

Twenty-five centuries later we find that we still need church houses. Organized forms of religion is necessary, but in itself is powerless and unaided. Just as the body without life is dead, so is a house of religion without the Spirit of God in the church, no matter how beautiful may

be its architecture.

Homeing Hints

VENETIAN BLINDS

Old-fashioned Venetian blinds are now appearing in increasing numbers in modern homes and apartments. These, however, are no longer in the standard green but are presented in a whole range of pastel colors. Many householders paint their Venetian blinds in dints which harmonize with the interior decoration of their rooms.

WATER PIPE-NOISE

If your water pipes hammer when you turn off a faucet, you had better do something about it as soon as possible or it will loosen joints somewhere along the line and then there will be a leak. You can correct this condition by providing air cushions to take up the extra pressure of the water when it is suddenly stopped by turning the faucet. Such air cushions can be a short length of pipe set above the top faucet in each line. There are also patented gadgets that can be installed.

If the water lines "chatter" when a faucet is partly closed something is loose. Put new washers. If that does not correct the trouble, something else in the faucet is loose. You may have to replace the entire faucet.

PAINTING CONCRETE

When painting concrete it is advisable to use only those paints which have been specially prepared for concrete.

Paints which are not particularly designed for concrete are liable to peel, scale, and discolor, as the moisture or the salts in the concrete react on the paint used. Some of the specially prepared paints can be applied while the concrete is wet.

LEAKS IN FLASHING

If a leak occurs around dormers or near the valleys of a roof or over the windows, the chances are there is a break somewhere in the flashing. Examine the suspected area carefully. Possibly there is a tiny hair crack due to the expansion and contraction of the metal. It may be deterioration of the metal itself or a break in a soldered joint. It may be a corrosion. Hair cracks can sometimes be patched and soldered.

FOR CLEAN WALLS

Lower wall surfaces in meat and vegetable markets must be kept scrupulously clean and attractive even in the face of staining splatters and discoloring drippings. This calls for frequent scrubbing, usually with an erosive bleaching powder, which in a short time ruins the finish.

Many such shops have found that a washcoating of a hard, highly polished composition material solves the problem of securing a long-wearing easily cleaned, good-looking wall surface. These materials are available in a variety of colors and in either "tile" or smooth designs.

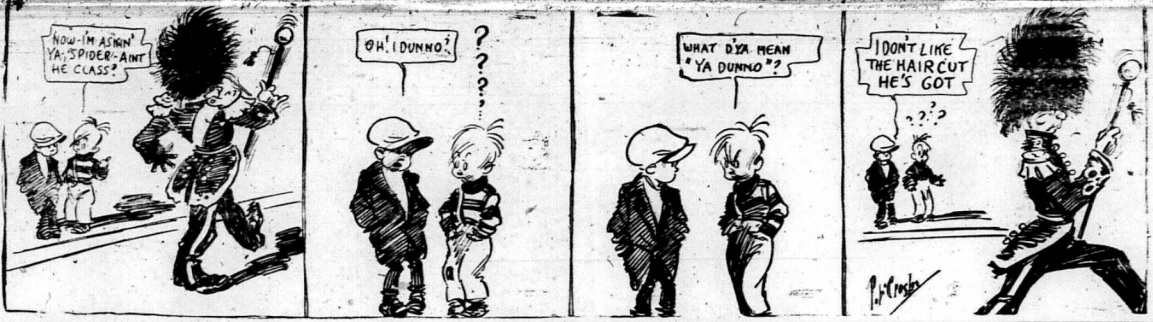

KENTUCKY FARM NEWS

A 905-pound Shorthorn steer won the championship for Mary E. Walton, a Mason county 4-H club member, at a baby beef show and sale at Mayville stockyards. The animal sold for 20 cents a pound, almost double market price. Miss Walton won an additional \$30 in premiums. Grayson county farmers will receive 9 cents a dozen above market prices for eggs if they cooperate with a local hatchery. Egg capacity of the hatchery will be increased from 8,000 to 30,000 this year. About 5,500 chickens were in flocks culled in the county last month.

The U. S. census for 1930 shows that 1,656 of the best potato growers in Bell county averaged 72 bushels an acre. Two years ago, 2,095 families growing KEBA gardens averaged 95 bushels an acre. Incomplete reports of the last crop that growers have moved up to 136 bushels an acre.

Milk and butter are better, cattle fatten quicker and land is well fertilized if lespedeza is grown, report Menifee county farmers. "I seeded \$5 worth of soybean seed and got five loads of hay, and 35 cents worth of lespedeza seed and got two loads," reports L. S. Rose of Stratton community.

Dock Ramey, a Pike county farmer, has five-month-old pullets in about 40 percent production. Community meetings are being held in the county, with the view of showing how to produce high quality eggs at low cost.

A revival of interest in small orchards has been evidenced in Oasey county, where the county farm agent has been busy laying out model orchards for many farmers. Good prices for fruit last year was the chief cause.

LESS CORN, MORE HOGS IN ADJUSTMENT PROGRAM Less corn but more hogs are features considered by the AAA for its new two-year adjustment program.

Corn reduction for next year may be between 19 and 30 percent below the base production. It is proposed to pay 35 cents a bushel for the estimated yield of the corn land withheld from production. Contract signers will be required to base at least 30 to 50 percent of their base acreage.

Farmers can produce as many hogs as they raised in 1932-33, and will be paid probably \$2.50 a head for raising 50 percent of their base.

The plan, it is announced from Washington, would increase pork production 30 percent over 1935. The objective of the proposed new two year corn-hog adjustment program will be to maintain a balance between the production and consumption of corn and hogs. It is considered important, by the farmers of the plan, to prevent excessive production in 1936 and 1937, which it is feared would follow if there were no adjustment program.

TOBACCO

Kentucky's total production of tobacco of all types, in 1935, is estimated at 280,570,000 pounds by the November crop report issued here by the Kentucky office of the U. S. Division of Crop and Livestock Estimates. This would be about 4 percent more than the 250,605,000 lbs. produced in Kentucky in 1934, and 29 percent less than this State's average annual production of 369,216,000 lbs. during 1929-1935 inclusive.

The average yield of corn per acre this year in Kentucky is 23.0 bus. compared to 24.0 bus. in 1934, and a 10-year average of 23.2 bus. Corn production in the United States is estimated at 2,211,359,000 bus. The crop of 1934 was 1,977,126,000 bush, and the 5-year average 1928-32 was 2,562,900 bus.

Maple sirup mixed with confectioner's sugar to which a little butter or cream is added makes a delicious frosting for cakes.

Keep a larger shaker containing six parts salt to one part pepper on the shelf of your kitchen range to use in seasoning foods.

Equal parts of ammonia and turpentine will remove indelible ink marks from white fabrics.

A good dry mash for hens is made up of equal parts of bran, shorts, corn meal, tankage and ground oats. Some poultry men use a part and a half each of brand and shorts to one part of corn meal and tankage each, while others double the portion of corn meal.

Ammonia water and a discarded tooth brush may be used for cleaning jewelry. Beads and other washable jewelry can be cleaned with luke warm suds and a brush. After cleaning, rinse and dry thoroughly.

Cook meat slowly, using a moderate temperature. Like the white of egg, meat is toughened by prolonged heating at high temperature. To make meat savory, brown to develop a rich flavor, but cook at a moderate temperature the rest of the time.

For children: milk, preferably a quart daily; butter at every meal; cereal, bread or potato at every meal; at least two vegetables daily; other than potatoes; egg or meat, or broth for older children; small amounts of sweets at end of meal.

Before using the smokehouse be sure it is cleaned of all scraps of meat and refuse from the previous season. Scrub the floor, using strong water. Fumigating with two pounds of sulfur for each 1,000 cubic feet of soapy, hot water. Rinse with boiling is a good policy.

Limestone and marl may be applied to the land just as well in winter as in any other season. The cool days of fall are ideal to lime and phosphate the land, and also to apply manure and other fertilizer.

Brussels sprouts may be kept for a long time if the plants are taken up root and all and set in a box of earth in the cellar.

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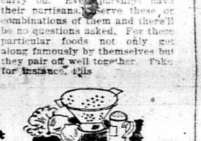
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Mind Your P's

Make Your Letter of Application Tell and Sell

A WELL-KNOWN advertising man once said, "Anything that can be sold at all can be sold by the written word." Certainly it is true that many men have been able to take the first, all-important step in selling themselves to an employer by a well-written letter. The point is to make your letter both tell and sell. Put yourself in the employer's place. "Who are you? What have you done? What can you do that leads you to believe the man you are writing to could use your services with profit to himself?" These are the things that interest the employer and that you must have clear in your own mind before you write your letter.

Remember that you are asking someone to buy your services. The mere fact that you want a job doesn't interest him. You must convince him that the deal will be advantageous from his point of view. Be sure that your letter is neatly written, that your appearance and other characteristics will be judged by it just as they would be by the manner in which you presented yourself for a personal interview.

After graduation from Corydon High School young Chandler determined to gain a higher education. tucky and completed his schooling the following year. During this time he coached a girls' basketball team at Versailles and also coached a team at the University. It must be remembered that "Happy" worked his way through the various schools, a sacrifice he made with a smile and a song; a disposition that won him the sobriquet of "GLADY"

Upon the completion of his schooling "Happy" married Mildred Watkins at Keyville, Va., Nov. 12, 1925. Despite the responsibilities devolving on the head of a family, "Happy" Chandler's love of athletics caused him to take over as coach the freshman football squad at Centre in 1927.
