St. Johns, N. B. Feb. 28. The express arrived last evening from Halifax, bringing the latest news per Europa, which had arrived at that port with Liverpool dates of the 10th instant.

The commercial news is again favorable, especially as regards cotton and American stocks.

The advices from Liverpool, under date of the 10th inst., the following synopsis of the market:

In Bradford the trade has been steady since the 1st, with an upward tendency. The market news is somewhat duller.

Indian and Canadian wheat. Wheat 75 3/4 to 76 per bushel.

There has been a great demand for Cotton the past fortnight.

Prices were scarcely changed. Brazil seems to be in demand.

Cured Provisions and other American produce have been in fair demand.

The accounts are decidedly encouraging from the manufacturing districts.

Debtors were Senator. The House bill extending the revenue laws of the territories was referred to the Committee on Commerce.

A joint resolution to establish a branch mint at California was referred to the Committee on Finance.

The general appropriation bill was then taken up.
