

More than 1,000 students from 35 Eastern Kentucky high schools are expected to participate in the sessions designed to develop responsible business leaders.





MOREHEAD, Ky.--Morehead State University's enrollment figures for Spring 1987 show a dramatic increase of 7.3 percent over Spring 1986, according to figures released today by the University.

The spring headcount enrollment is 5,740, compared with 5,351 at this time last year, and includes a 2.3 percent increase in full-time students, MSU President A.D. Albright announced.

"While the full-time student growth reverses the trend of recent years, there are other significant gains to be noted," he added.

"The spring enrollment picture includes a substantial increase, 19.2 percent, in part-time students over last spring, reflecting our increased outreach to graduate students and new undergraduate programs at our regional centers," Dr. Albright said. "The figures demonstrate that we are meeting a real need in our service region."

MSU also saw a 22.3 percent increase in freshmen/transfer students over the previous spring figure. "At the moment, our registration data base has not sorted newly-enrolled freshmen from students who transferred in, but this size increase does tell us that students are recognizing the opportunities MSU offers," Dr. Albright said.

Increases, ranging from 5.4 percent to 9.3 percent, were seen in all classes, except for the sophomore class.



MOREHEAD, Ky.--Morehead State University was recently recognized for its participation in the YMCA Black Achievers Program of Lexington.

"Through the program, MSU awards three minority grants to black students in the Lexington area," Jerry Gore, MSU director of minority student affairs, "The Black Achievers Program decides which students in the program are said. eligible for the grants, then the University selects the students who will receive them."

MSU uses the following guidelines in awarding the grants: applicant must be admitted as a freshman at MSU, be a Kentucky resident, have demonstrated academic and/or extracurricular achievement and submit a scholarship application to MSU.

The scholarship may be renewed for a total of four years. The applicant must maintain a 2.5 g.p.a. as a freshman and a 2.75 cumulative g.p.a. thereafter.

The Black Achievers Program is sponsored by the YMCA. The purpose of the program is to aid the social and educational development of black students in the Lexington area. It does this by pairing a student with a black professional from the region to act as a role model, according to Gore.

Competition was funded by Ford Motor Company. The Universal Cheerleaders Association (UCA) of Memphis, Tenn., hosted the event and staff members served as judges.


The MSU cheerleaders submitted a video tape prior to the competition. Each squad was scored on group participation, performance of a cheer, sideliner and fight song routine.

Black Scholars Academic Bowl - A competition for 80 junior high and high school students representing 16 teams.







MOREHEAD, Ky.--Dr. Harold Rose, Morehead State University professor of education, has received two grants to develop programs to aid adult education in Kentucky.

One, the Adult Education Partnership with Business and Industry Grant totalling \$55,142, was funded by the Kentucky Department of Education. This grant involves the General Education Development Foundation, mandated by Kentucky statute last year. The foundation was established to work with business and industry to identify and correct educational problems in the workforce.

"This grant will provide the funds to get the project off the ground," said Dr. Rose, project director. "After Sept. 1, the Foundation will be self-supporting."

The other grant, the Kentucky Adult Basic Education Evaluation Program Grant for \$66,402, is designed to develop an evaluation system for Kentucky's adult education programs. This is the first systematic evaluation program for the state is 20 years, according to Dr. Rose. The grant is funded by the Division of Adult Education, Kentucky Department of Education.

"This is the first year of the evaluation program," Dr. Rose explained. "Fifteen adult education programs will be evaluated this year to test the evaluation system. Next year the remaining programs in the state will be tested," he noted.

The criteria used for evaluation was developed by the United States Office of Education and revised by the Kentucky Department of Education and the evaluation The teams composed of three to seven people will conduct on-site reviews teams. of each program.


The artworks may be viewed Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. and on Saturday 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.





Area schools expected to compete in the regional event, sponsored by MSU's Department of English, Foreign Languages and Philosophy and the College of Arts and Sciences, include:



The gallery is open from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. weekdays and from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Saturdays.







MOREHEAD, Ky.--A Bachelor of Science in Veterinary Technology degree, one of the few programs of this type in the nation, will be offered at Morehead State University beginning with the Fall 1987 semester.

The Kentucky Council on Higher Education approved establishment of the two plus two academic program at its March meeting.

"In today's highly competitive world of new technologies, our students need every opportunity to obtain the skills to compete in addition to a sound basic education," said MSU President A.D. Albright. "This program offers them those additional skills demanded. Morehead State's two-year vet tech degree program has long been recognized for its excellence and we expect no less for the B.S. degree program," he added.

The four-year degree program will allow students more opportunities if different types of jobs, according to Dr. Charles Derrickson, College of Applied Science and Technology dean.

"With this additional training, graduates will be considered paraprofessionals and qualified to assume positions of more responsibility," said Dr. Derrickson. "Employers believe it adds prestige to hire someone with a bachelor's degree," he continued.

Objectives of the new program will be to provide competency in anesthesiology, pharmacology, radiography, and veterinary clinical pathology. Graduates will be qualified to assist veterinarians in all duties except diagnosing, prescribing of treatment and performance of surgical procedures.

"Offering a bachelor's degree will give students the opportunity to pursue additional fields in the area of their chosen careers," said Dr. Judy Willard, Department of Agriculture and Natural Resources chair. "They can now select electives in other related fields. We are delighted with this addition," she added. vet tech 2-2-2

MSU currently offers a two-year associate degree in vet tech with enrollment limited to 40 students because of availability of facilities and equipment. The program, begun in 1974, has been fully accredited by the American Veterinary Medical Assiciation since 1977.

With the four-year program, 20 additional students will be accepted. Participation in a two-year program is a prerequisite for admittance.

According to Dr. Donald Applegate, coordinator of the vet tech program, requests are now being accepted for the fall semester. "With 30 percent of the students who receive an associate degree returning for additional training, the demand for a bachelors degree has been evident for some time," he said.

"Now MSU can offer two levels of training, allowing the students to be more marketable upon graduation," he added. Employment opportunities are available with practicing veterinarians, industries, commercial establishments, and animal diagnostic laboratories and facilities.

The Kentucky Board of Veterinary Medical Examiners plans to propose a revision to the Veterinary Practice Act in recognition of the two levels, Dr. Applegate said. Graduates of the two-year program would be called veterinary technicians while participants in the four program would be veterinary technologists.

Plans are now under way to renovate present facilities to allow for implementation of the new program and one new faculty position is expected to be added by the fall semester.

MSU President Albright commended the Veterinary Technology Program staff members for their efforts in designing the successful proposal for a new four-year degree program. Those involved in developing it included: Dr. Scott Rundell, assistant professor; Barbara Krakoff and Vivian Smith, instructors; Paula Williams, clerk/typist, and Dr. Applegate.

FOUNDERS DAY 1987: A Picture Story

MOREHEAD, Ky.--"Together we can!"

That was the message that Dr. C. Nelson Grote, Morehead State University's president-elect, gave more than 500 MSU faculty, staff, students and friends attending the final event of Founders Day 1987--the Alumni Awards dinner.

That spirit of togetherness was present throughout the day as the University's friends--including many of the people who helped guide it through its 65 years as a state school--gathered together to remember and recognize those who contributed to the institution's growth.

"Yesterday, Today and Tomorrow" was the theme, but the program might have been hailed instead as "A Presidential Occasion" as four MSU presidents representing the past, present and future shared the speaking honors.

"The future is built on the dreams of yesterday," Dr. Morris Norfleet, who headed the institution from 1977 to 1984, told those attending the traditional Fellowship Breakfast which launched the day. "On this site in 1877 is where it all began," Dr. Norfleet said as he recounted the establishment of the Morehead Normal School by Disciples of Christ as "an educational oasis in this cultural desert of Kentucky."

At the Founders Day Convocation, former President Adron Doran gave his listeners a lesson in history and politics as he recalled events in early 1922 leading up to passage of Senate Bill 14 which resulted in establishment of Morehead State Normal School, the forerunner of MSU.

Dr. Doran, who led MSU from 1954 to 1976, invoked such names from the past as Gov. Edwin Morrow, Speaker of the House James H. Thompson and state Sen. Allie Young as he chronicled the institution's early struggles.

Founders Day 1987 2-2-2-2-2

Board of Regents Chairman Louie B. Nunn brought a standing ovation from the convocation crowd of nearly 800 people when he presented the University Service Award to the family of Dr. Rondal D. Hart, posthumously recognizing the former administrator's contributions to MSU.

Dr. Hart, a Corbin native, served MSU for 26 years in a variety of positions from assistant football coach to dean of admissions until his death in 1984. Accepting the award were Mrs. Joyce Hart and sons Brad and Ron.

Shifting from the past to today, Dr. A.D. Albright, MSU's current president, was the host for the next event, a luncheon at which nearly two dozen former and current Board of Regents members were recognized.

"Today will have an impact on tomorrow," Dr. Albright said as he prepared his audience for a status report on the University. "There are a number of things that have transpired over the past few months that you should take pride in."

Among these, he said, were the strengthening of the University's partnership with the public schools, the 3.5 percent fall enrollment increase, development of new academic programs to serve the region's needs including the four-year veterinary technology and nursing degrees, and new programs to help students develop stronger academic skills.

Awards were presented to the Ashland Oil Foundation as the MSU Foundation's Most Valuable Giver and to Dan Lacy, MSU alumnus and an Ashland Oil vice president, as the Foundation's Fund Raising Volunteer of the Year. Judy B. Thomas, president, accepted on behalf of the Ashland Oil Foundation, while Lacy's was accepted by his daughter Denise Lacy of Morgan County.

For Dr. Grote, who becomes MSU's 11th president on July 1, the Founders Day-Alumni Awards dinner marked his first formal campus address.

Stressing the need for partnerships between the University and the public schools as well as industry if Eastern Kentucky is to develop economically, Dr. Grote pledged the institution's resources to addressing the state's education problems.

He also called on alumni to become advocates for the University. "Alumni can be one of our many friends who help us to establish our strength through partnerships," he said, urging their involvement in student recruitment and fund raising activities.

Dr. Grote recognized the contributions of MSU's "caring and thoughtful faculty" and said the school was "blessed with exciting and talented students" who also could strengthen it.

His vision of the future, he said, was a University that "stretches itself as a contributing partner to improve the quality of life" in the region. "Each one of us in this room can make a difference. Let's link up hand to hand, arm to arm, shoulder to shoulder. For together we can! That's my slogan for the years ahead," he said.




