SEEK AND YOU SHALL FIND

The Porter family, living in a rented farm house under conditions of extreme poverty, wanted a home to call its own.

They got it through the kindness of Miss Hindle, who located an abandoned old shack in a wooded area, which he found he could buy with a little help.

The shack was a picture of complete dilapidation. The windows and doors were gone, the porch had rotted away, the roof sagged and leaked and honeysuckle had taken the yard. There was no sign of a fence on the premises. To such a place Jones proposed to move with a wife in poor health and a band of small children.

These circumstances were reported by the wife of a country doctor to Selma H. Hindle, home management supervisor for the rural resettlement division of the Resettlement Administration in Amelia County, Virginia.

When I visited the family," wrote Miss Hindle, "I found Porter looking at the desolate old house. As I stood there and heard him express his desire for a home that he could call his own and point out the possibilities in the shack if he could get a little help, I caught the feeling that here was a man worthy of rehabilitation.

After necessary arrangements had been made, the owner allowed Porter \$25 to repair the house. With this he bought windows and doors and put building paper on the walls. He arranged to heat the living room with a stove made from an oil barrel.

He worked for lumber with which to rebuild the porch and fix the roof. The entire family went to work clearing away the honeysuckle and beneath it they found some lily bulbs which were to add much to the appearance of the place later.

"The family has raised about 150 pullets for winter layers and has gone to the woods and made pickets for a chicken yard fence. Mrs. Jones' health is better than it has been for several years. The children are happy. Charles, who didn't do so well in school, asked to be allowed to go to a CCC camp so he could apply his earnings to buying the home. He was under weight so he had his father get him a tonic. Before long I had a card from him saying he weighed enough to get in the camp. He is now in camp and happy to be helping in this way.

"One day this fall I met Porter on the road and he said, 'I have a chance to sell my old car for \$50. I don't need the car and that \$50 will build my hen house.'

"This family will not be hungry this winter. There is plenty of canned food, stored Irish potatoes, beets, turnips, carrots and cabbage, corn and wheat in the bin and three fat hogs for the winter meat. Molasses will take the place of sugar to a great extent and two cows will supply them with plenty of milk and butter.

"A small acreage of tobacco well attended this year provided funds with which Porter was able to pay back his rehabilitation loan and enlarge his poultry flock. The family will be able to finance themselves through the winter and possibly next summer.

"In this case, we feel rehabilitation has helped a worthy family to again become self-sustaining."

BIG MOTORING WINTER

During the last summer, according to figures supplied by the American Automobile Association, 37 million people went motoring, and spent four billion dollars for gasoline, oil, food, shelter and other necessities.

In a recent address to company field representatives, John D. Collins, sales manager of the Tide Water Oil Company, called attention to the fact that last spring he predicted that we would have the biggest motoring summer in our history, and made the future prediction that the coming winter will be the biggest motoring winter on record.

Among the reasons given by Mr. Collins for this belief is that business is experiencing a real revival and people have more money to spend on new cars, or in upgrading into service old cars which have been laid up for economic reasons. But, he adds: "The chief reason, however, is the winter resisting ability of the new cars. Equipped with modern gasoline and a proper grade of winter oil, they start easily in the coldest weather. They are skillfully heated and air conditioned. Modern tires and treads provide better traction on slippery surfaces. Improved windshields and wipers give constant clear vision. A little care in having the car put in perfect shape for cold weather driving will carry the motorist through the next four months comfortably and economically. The result will be a great increase in winter driving this year."

HOW CHRISTMAS ORIGINATED

Two thousand years ago, Augustus Caesar issued a decree that all the world was to be taxed.

Midway on the plain they paused beside the road to draw from a well. Joseph and Mary were humble and they loved each other. They gazed happily across the well-irrigated terraced valleys, across the hills where shepherds guarded their flocks, noted the old stone walls where the farmers and shepherds could go to look far across the mountains.

They glimpsed the city of Bethlehem, a small and humble village, these rock walls, cobbled streets and stone buildings showed gray and uninviting. The man and woman wended their way through the throngs of tax-payers about the bazaars and found the inn where they sought lodging. The inn was overflowing. People were having to sleep by the wayside. Now Mary was with child and Joseph wanted to protect her and make her comfortable, but no room was to be had. So the couple sought shelter in the stable beside their tiny donkey. The stable was a cave or grotto in the rocks with crude wooden manger filled with hay. Here, in the year 4 B. C., the thirty-third year of the reign of Herod the Great, Jesus of Beth was born. Mary wrapped Him in swaddling clothes and laid Him in a manger. Here the shepherds, to whom angels had announced the coming of a birth came, knelt low beside the humble bed and lay their gifts before the Babe whom they adored.

Because this Babe was born the world rejoices and celebrates Christmas. Joy, peace, love, humility, all the great truths of Christianity came to the world with His birth. The basis of modern civilization lies in the little town of Bethlehem. Even as the Wise Men 200 years ago made their way to the shrine, so pilgrims, tourists, believers, and non-believers journey today across the sea-fame road, still the main artery of communication between Jerusalem and all the southern part of Israel. They see the Well of the shepherds' fields, and the old, old watch towers. The highway is now smoothly paved. The travelers all too often ride in luxurious motor cars. But they still pass caravans of camels and asses and see pedestrians dressed in costumes of many lands. For pilgrims come from far and near to the Holy Land, particularly to ancient Bethlehem, whose grayness


has increased with centuries of dust and erosion on its leaden-lined stones. But dull as is its outward appearance, few approach the city without a thrill of reverence and awe, about reverent acquaintance with the Holy Scriptures and gaining inspiration and faith. Today they cross the lively bazaars where "objects of piety" made of shell, mother-of-pearl and olive wood have wide space among the food-stuffs and spices.

They go to the Church of the Nativity, Bethlehem's greatest relic of antiquity. In 330 B. C. Constantine built this basilica above what is believed to be the grotto-stable in which Christ was born. The church is so small even a short person must stoop to enter. It was made thus hot, as some say, to cause thoughts of humility and reverence on entering so holy a place, but to prevent the ancient Saracens and Turks when they were in power from desecrating the place with cattle. Five different nationalities of Christians now guard this church and hold services here. The place is strikingly simple. The Greek Orthodox and the Armenian and Syrian churches occupy the main floor. Two circular stairways lead to the dark caves above. There is a chapel in the grotto. On the floor is a great silver star with silver nails over a hollow where Mary is said to have given birth to Jesus. Around the star is the inscription: "Hic de Virgine Maria Jesus Christus. Natus Est." Fifteen silver lamps unceasingly burn all night over this holy

place. Four belong to the Latins, six to the Greek Orthodox, and five to the Armenians and Syrians. Representatives from many Christian nations kneel in common before the little altar. Self-denial is the motto without worshippers. Whether or not they believe this to be the authentic spot of the Nativity, it carries the atmosphere of business and spirituality. The handsome, proud natives of Bethlehem seem always a happy people, but at Christmas time Bethlehem radiates joy.

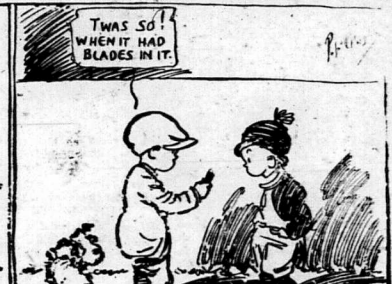

Driving a Sharp Bargain

Lamb and mint sauce have been served together for many, many years—so long, in fact, that sometimes there is a desire for something different. Ines S. Wilson, home economist, suggests for such occasions a variation of the usual mint sauce, a pineapple and mint mixture. It is excellent with a lamb roast.

Leg of lamb, salt and pepper, 1-2 cup pineapple syrup, 1 tablespoon vinegar, 1-4 cup chopped mint leaves or a few drops of mint flavoring.

Roast the leg of lamb as usual; that is season it with salt and pepper, place it cut side up on a rack in an open roasting pan, and allow it to bake at a temperature of 300 degrees F. until it is done. It requires thirty to thirty-five minutes per pound for roasting. An hour or more

before serving, combine the pineapple syrup, vinegar, mint leaves, and about 1-4 teaspoon salt. Allow this to stand in a warm place and serve as a sauce with the roast lamb.

Pat Pineapple

A FOOD can be called pat and should be crised and pat-tered when it comes at the proper time in a meal and bears the right relation to the other things you are eating. Courses including pineapple are frequently pat. Try these recipes.

Pineapple Pork Chop: Empty a No. 2 can crushed Hawaiian pineapple into a large fat buttered casserole. Peel three large sweet potatoes, slice over the top, and sprinkle with one-half cup brown sugar. Bake six thick loin pork chops, and lay on top. Cover and bake in hot-400 degree-oven until tender, from an hour to an hour and a quarter. Uncover for last fifteen minutes to brown chops. Serves six.

Pineapple Leaves

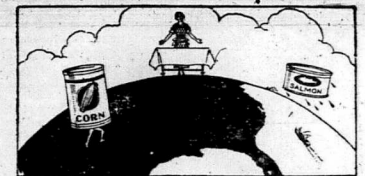
Stuffed Meat Loaf: Mix together three-quarters pound chopped beef, three-quarters pound chopped veal, one beaten egg, one-half cup milk, one teaspoon salt and a few grains of pepper, and line bottom and sides of a greased loaf pan with it. Fill cavity with stuffing, cover with rest of meat, lay strips of bacon on top and bake in a hot-400 degree-oven for about forty-five minutes. Serves eight.

Sifting: Add one-half teaspoon sage, one-half teaspoon thyme and salt to taste to one and a half cups dry crumbs, and add two tablespoons melted butter. Mix in one cup crushed Hawaiian pineapple.

Chicken Pineapple Loaf: Cut chicken from a 15-ounce can fine and add one cup drained crushed Hawaiian pineapple. Add one and a half cups dry bread crumbs, one teaspoon salt, a few grains paprika and three slightly-beaten eggs. Add enough pineapple syrup to moisten. Pack into a greased loaf pan and bake in a hot-400 degree-oven for about forty-five minutes. Serves eight.

A MODERN MIRACLE

THIS is a wonderful world. A modern housewife can reach with one hand right out into the middle of the ocean and with the other hand can reach into the contents of a tin can and get what she wants. Part of the miracle it lies and with the other into the contents of a tin can that tastes as wonderful as the feast she has just performed. Here's the recipe for:

Corn and Salmon Pudding: Mix the contents of a No. 2 can corn, one tablespoon melted butter, one-half teaspoon salt, one-eighth teaspoon pepper, the contents of one small can salmon, being careful not to break up the salmon too much, and one tablespoon heavy cream or evaporated milk. Bake in a buttered baking dish in a moderate-375 degree-oven for thirty minutes. Serves eight.

But that first feat is nothing to the one she can actually perform in making the following second dish. If dividing is done in halves she has to reach with one hand into whatever part of the ocean she wishes and with the other into the contents of a tin can to make:

Deviled Corn Sallips: Mix together two cups canned corn and the contents of a 2 1/2 ounce can deviled ham, and season to taste with salt and pepper. Pour half into a buttered baking dish, sprinkle with a few crumbs (you will need half a cup of them in all) and the rest of the corn mixture, and pour in one-third cup milk. Cover with the rest of the crumbs to which two tablespoons melted butter has been added. Bake in a moderate-375 degree-oven for thirty minutes. Serves four.

Finds Outlet for Love of Sea In Inland Pennsylvania City

Former Officer in Swedish and Argentine Navies Aids U. S. Navy League and Sea Scouts



Captain E. K. Roden

SERVICE in the navies of two nations, involuntary participation in a South American revolution, and eleven years as a navigating officer on merchant vessels, all contribute to provide a series of stirring chapters in the career of Captain E. K. Roden, organizer of the Admiral Darlgen Section of the U. S. Navy League at the inland city of Scranton, Pennsylvania, and of a Sea Scout Base on a nearby body of water.

Captain Roden began his career as a cadet in the Swedish Navy. While still a young man, with the consent of the Swedish Government, he accepted a commission in the Argentine Navy and for four years was engaged in the hydrographic surveying of the River Plata and adjacent waters. During this period, on the night of July 26, 1890, the United States, a revolutionary organization, called its members to arms to revolt against the corrupt administration of President Olman.

Barricades were thrown up in the streets of Buenos Aires. Two days of incessant street fighting followed, but the navy and a number of regiments of the regular army went over to the insurgents. President Olman discovered that his corrupt administration of affairs had alienated practically all public support. On July 21, he resigned his office and fled the city disguised as a fireman on a train bound for Cordova, having taken the precaution to deposit some two million dollars in his account in the Bank of France.

From Sweden and the Argentine to his present position as Director of the School of Navigation of the International Correspondence Schools at Scranton, Pennsylvania, in a long career, but Captain Roden's love of the sea has led him both to his work as a teacher of navigation and to his Navy League and Sea Scout activities. Textbooks on navigation prepared by him are being used in teaching nautical science to men and officers of the merchant marine, the enlisted personnel of the U. S. Coast Guard, and the enlisted personnel of the U. S. Marine Corps.

Kellogg Wage Scale Highest In Its History

Manufacturer Who Pioneered Six-Hour Day Finds It a Success

IN the six-hour day with wages raised to compensate for the shorter working period lies the solution of the unemployment problem, in the opinion of W. K. Kellogg, the Battle Creek cereal manufacturer.

Mr. Kellogg bases his conviction on the experience of the Kellogg Company which has been built through five of the severest years in American history and which has just announced an average wage increase of 13 1/2 per cent. With this increase Kellogg workers now receive more for six hours work than they did for eight hours in the year just prior to the depression. The minimum, which is guaranteed all male employees of the plant, is \$4.50 for a six-hour day—equivalent to \$6 for eight hours.

"We have found that with the shorter working day efficiency is so increased, accident and sickness rates are so improved, and the unit cost of production is so lowered that we can afford to pay as much for six hours as we formerly paid for eight," Mr. Kellogg said. "The company is more than satisfied with the results."

"When instituted the six-hour day we were able to increase employment 20 per cent. Of course, there are some plants in which the six-hour day would not be practicable."

"I'm convinced that if the plan were tried in those plants that could not do it, the country would increase their employment by at least 20 per cent."

BOOKCASE LIGHTS

Since it is often difficult to get proper light on a large wall bookcase from a lamp, the installation of small tubular lights at the side of each shelf or a cone light above prove to be a great convenience. These lights will be particularly useful on winter days when room lamps need not be turned on to light the bookcase.

SHELVES OVER SINK

When modernizing the kitchen add two or three shelves over the sink. These may be open or enclosed and will be a convenient location for sponges, scrubbing brushes, and other material needed near the sink. These shelves may be painted a bright color which contrasts with the main color in the room.

ATTRACTIVE CLOSETS

Make bedroom closets more attractive by painting the interiors a color which will contrast with the main color in the bedroom. With a bedroom in which blue-green predominates, use a warm rust tone. Paint the inside of the closet door the same color and it will add an interesting color change to the room. The closet door is usually painted the same color as the walls. This is a good opportunity to match the door with the walls. Use a color which is even more pleasing to the eye than the wall color. Use a color which is in and off the hands.

GIVE PINE'S A CHANCE

This of all years should be the year not to burn the woods and pastures. The reason is that a bumper pine seed crop, which occurs about every seven years, is maturing in the South. It is the best crop in 15 years. Billions of pine seedlings will result. The Forest Service of the United States Department of Agriculture is warning of the greater losses to pine tree seedlings if there is the customary burning of forest pastures in the Southern pine regions this year. Many of the great, even-aged stands of longleaf, slash, loblolly, and shortleaf pine can be traced back to a year of extraordinary seed production. If the forest is not protected, it may be 10 years before we have a good opportunity to restock these millions of acres of cut-over lands which are now being used for lumber, pulp, and other products.
