

A social will begin at 6 p.m. with dinner being served at 7:30 p.m. Tickets are \$15 per person or \$25 per couple.





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
A PRESIDENTIAL INTRODUCTION

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MOREHEAD, Ky.--A Morehead State University sophomore was awarded the United States Department of the Army's Achievement Medal in ceremonies on MSU's campus recently.

Anthony Dotson was recognized for his service in the recovery and identification of remains following the aircraft mishap in Gander, Newfoundland, which claimed the lives of 248 members of the 101st Airborne Division and eight crew members on Dec. 12, 1985.

At that time, Dotson an Army sergeant, volunteered to go to Dover Air Force Base in Delaware to assist in the identification and administrative processing. A computer operator, he spent 30 days, working 12 to 14 hours each day, updating data bases as the information became available and generating reports as needed.

Lt. Col. Alan Baldwin, MSU's Department of Military Science chair, presented Dotson with the commendation from the Secretary of the Army in recognition of his "exceptional contributions to Task Force at Gander in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service, reflecting great credit on him and the Department of Defense."


The son of Ernie Glen Dotson of Cleveland, Va., he was released from active duty last August. During his four years in the military, he was stationed in South Carolina, Indiana, and his last assignment was Ft. Myers, Va., where he worked at the Pentagon.

Dotson, now attending MSU on an ROTC scholarship, first visited the campus on recommendation of an army friend, alumnus Rick Hudnall (76). Majoring in business administration with a data processing option, he hopes to receive an active duty commission upon graduation.

According to Dotson, the hardest part of military life is making and losing friends but the best part is you have friends all over the world.



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
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

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MOREHEAD, Ky.--"Knowledge is Kentucky's greatest resource."

According to Dr. Gary S. Cox, executive director of the Kentucky Council on Higher Education, Kentucky must achieve two goals to be successful in the future.

"If we are to be competitive in the national and international economy, we must have educated citizens and we must develop leaders," he said.

Dr. Cox spoke at the "Celebration of Academic Excellence" banquet of Phi Kappa Phi-Pi Gamma Mu on Morehead State University's campus recently.

A 1966 graduate of MSU, Dr. Cox was initiated into Phi Kappa Phi as a distinguished alumnus. Initiates included four faculty members and 72 students also.

To an audience of nearly 200 students, parents and faculty members, he cited reasons why today's young people should consider higher education in their future.

"High school education, and even postsecondary education is not an 'economic value' any more," he said. "It is a necessity for survival."

Citing statistics from a recent study for the Joint Economic Commission of Congress, Dr. Cox noted that the employment jobs created during the 1973-84 study period paid less than the median wage of 1973. While there were noteworthy changes in high tech and services, college graduates fared much better than the other categories.

According to Dr. Cox, these changes mean the economic gap is widening on the basis of educational levels. Low-paying jobs are replacing high paying ones even in sophisticated fields. "Without an education, a lot of young men and women today will have a much lower standard of living and far fewer opportunities for a meaningful life than their parents and older brothers and sisters have had," he said.

According to a study by Battelle Institute on Kentucky's economic future, predictions are that the state will need to create some 350,000 new jobs by the year 2000, with 80 percent of those jobs requiring workers with at least two years of postsecondary education. Dr. Gary Cox 2-2-2-2-2-2

"The time is upon us now," said Dr. Cox. "We don't have 15 years. We have to convince the people of Kentucky now, not that there will be no jobs in the future for those without a solid educational background, but that there are no opportunities now."

Dr. Cox called for a massive retraining effort for a large part of our present workforce to begin at once.

Challenging the students in the audience to be Kentucky's next generation of leaders, Dr. Cox emphasized the need to change and accept new responsibilities.

"Be willing to say: yes, we must support and pay for improvements in education. -We-must-graduate our-high-school students. We must get them into college. We must move Kentucky forward," he said.

Dr. Cox told the audience that the future lies in the hands of our youth. "You have two choices: prepare yourselves to lead this state to recognize the value of our greatest natural resource--an educated citizenry--or watch Kentucky decline further. There really is only one choice for a brighter future."

MOREHEAD, Ky.--A minor fire in a campus residence hall earlier this morning at Morehead State University was contained to one room and there were no injuries, according to University officials.




Collins will be accompanied on piano by Rebecca Hopper, MSU alumna from Morehead. Collins will perform works by Casterede, Handel and Chance.

Also presented during the awards ceremony following the competition was the NFL's National Award for Excellence which was earned by Fort Knox High School.





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



Dr. Joe Bendixen, professor of agriculture, said this year's show is one of the largest in Kentucky.


The complex is located on KY 377, six miles north of Morehead. Competition starts at 7 p.m. both nights.



MOREHEAD, Ky.--Dr. Baruch Samuel Blumberg, winner of the 1976 Nobel Prize in Medicine, will present a special seminar at Morehead State University on Monday, April 13.

Dr. Blumberg will discuss the "Biology of Liver Cancer" with MSU science students, faculty and members of the medical community at 10:20 a.m. in the Riggle Room, Adron Doran University Center.

His campus appearance was arranged by Dr. David Magrane, MSU professor of biology, with the cooperation of the McDowell Cancer Network.

Dr. Blumberg, a 61-year-old New York native, won the Nobel Prize for the work he and his colleagues did at Fox Chase Cancer Center in Philadelphia in identifying the hepatitis B virus. In the years that followed, additional research showed the causal connection of hepatitis B and liver cancer.

Dr. Blumberg's discoveries resulted from his work in exploring ethnic and geographic differences in blood proteins which could be used as clues to inherited differences in susceptible people.

Dr. Blumberg currently is the Ashland Oil Foundation Visiting Professor at the University of Kentucky. He earned his Doctor of Medicine degree from Columbia University's College of Physicians and Surgeons and holds a Ph.D. degree in biochemistry from Oxford University, England.

A senior member and associate director for clinical research at Fox Chase, Dr. Blumberg also holds faculty appointments in medicine and anthropology at the University of Pennsylvania.

In addition to the Nobel Prize, he has received numerous other awards for his work in medicine as well as 15 honorary degrees. He is a member of 16 professional societies, including the National Academy of Sciences. In 1984, he was named a fellow in the Royal College of Physicians.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--A sense that Morehead State University is on the threshold of an "era of real progress"--one that he wanted to be part of--prompted MSU's new faculty regent to seek the post.

Dr. Alban L. Wheeler, professor of sociology, defeated three candidates to become the fifth MSU faculty member to serve on the board since the General Assembly created the faculty representative position in 1968.

He succeeds Dr. John R. Duncan, professor of education, who served two consecutive terms and declined to seek a third one. The new regent will assume his seat for a three-year term at the board's next meeting.

"I sense that the faculty wants to play a very active role in the direction that this University takes over the next few years," said Dr. Wheeler, who came to MSU in 1972 and has served in various roles from faculty member to administrator.

"We have a strong and able president coming to assume the leadership of the University and an outstanding Board of Regents. I see this as an exciting challenge, working with people of that stature on behalf of the faculty--the key to this institution's future," Dr. Wheeler said.

Pledging accessibility to his colleagues, Dr. Wheeler said he viewed the faculty regent's role as "one of several voices from the faculty to the administration and board."

Noting that he intended to use his "knowledge, skills and energies" to represent the faculty interests, he urged faculty members to make their concerns known and said he would always be willing to listen. "One thing I learned in this campaign was that the faculty wants its regent to be accessible," he said.

"I sincerely believe Morehead State is entering an era of growth and increased faculty participation in University governance. I think this faculty will accept Dr. (C. Nelson) Grote's challenge when he said, 'Together we can.' In this kind of partnership we can move the University toward a much higher level of excellence and service to its region," Dr. Wheeler said.

His main objective at the moment, according to Dr. Wheeler, is to continue the "healing process" seen this past year under the leadership of MSU President A.D. Albright.

"John Duncan has left some very large shoes to fill. He served with honor, dignity and courage during a period of turmoil," he said in praise of his predecessor.

"All of us want the same thing," Dr. Wheeler continued. "We want MSU to be a great University. The challenge is to bring the various segments of the institution together in a mutual effort to do just that."

The new regent earned his bachelor's and master's degrees from Mississippi College and his Ph.D. degree from Mississippi State University. Prior to coming to MSU, he was a faculty member and acting dean of students at Wayland College, Plainview, Texas.

A former dean of social sciences at MSU, Dr. Wheeler currently is teaching and this past year headed up the University's new Office of Undergraduate Regional Programs. The author of several articles for various publications, he is a member of numerous professional organizations, including the Southern Sociological Society and the Kentucky Academy of Science. He also is president-elect of the MSU Chapter, Phi Kappa Phi national honor society.

He and his wife, the former Sharon Louise Pepper, are the parents of a son, Darrell L. Wheeler.


"MSU's music program has earned a national reputation as one of quality because of the talents and dedication of faculty members like Bob Pritchard," she added.



The classes will be taught by Fischer Harned, a Kentucky Artificial Breeders Association (KABA) field supervisor since 1969, and Dr. Andy Boston, MSU professor of agriculture. Sponsored by the University's Department of Agriculture and Natural Resources in cooperation with KABA, an affiliate of Select Sires, the AI shortcourse is open to any interested beef or dairy cattle producer as well as both college and high school students.

"Registration for the program is under way now and will continue through May 11," Dr. Boston said. A \$25 deposit fee is due by the close of registration and checks should be made payable to KABA. The remainder, \$50 for students and \$125 for producers, is due on May 18.

The three days of coursework and "hands-on" practice provides participants with a practical knowledge of AI techniques. Study topics include the estrus cycle and breeding time; effects of feeds, minerals and vitamins on breeding efficiency; principles of genetics and pedigrees; and sire selection, as well as practice in insemination.

"All students successfully completing the training course, including passing a final examination, will receive certification as AI Technicians," Dr. Boston said. MSU students also may earn one college credit hour by enrolling in AGR 399(001) as listed in the Summer I class schedule.



















RCHS students winning first place awards in the various French categories included:







MOREHEAD, Ky.--Morehead State University's Camden-Carroll Library has received a rare collection of Civil War, local history and genealogy materials valued at more than \$6,000.

The Pearl Bach--Hallie Day Blackburn Collection will be presented formally to the University on Tuesday, April 21, at 2 p.m., on the fifth floor of the library.

A reception, beginning at 1:30 p.m., will be held to honor the donor, Mrs. Hallie Day Blackburn of Dry Ridge, who served as senior extension librarian for the state Department of Libraries and Archives from 1954 to 1977.

Blackburn presented the collection to the library through the Morehead State University Foundation in memory of her mother, Mrs. Pearl Day Bach, a noted Eastern Kentucky genealogist.

The collection includes several Civil War period volumes, 32 file drawers of correspondence and other manuscripts on Eastern Kentucky genealogy and local history, and copies of a 19-volume diary kept from 1882 to 1930 by an Eastern Kentucky circuit preacher, the Rev. John J. Dicke.

MSU's library was chosen as the repository for this collection as a result of the efforts of former state librarian Charles F. Hinds who was aware of the extensive work in the genealogy of the region's families done by Dr. Stuart S. Sprague, MSU professor of history and noted Appalachian genealogist, according to Larry X. Besant, MSU libraries director. library 2-2-2-2-2

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

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

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Two noted Kentucky authors of children's works and a well-known storyteller will be featured at the Young Kentucky Authors Workshop on Friday, April 24, at Morehead State University.

They are: George Ella Lyon of Lexington, author of numerous books, poems and plays for children; Martha Bennett Stiles of Bourbon County, who has published eight children's books, and Micki Stevens-Kaestner of Louisville, who has appeared four times at the Corn Island Storytelling Festival.

Approximately 250 fifth graders from Rowan County are expected to participate in the workshop which is sponsored by the Kentucky Arts Council, Phi Delta Kappa honorary fraternity for educators, MSU and the Rowan County School system.

Slated to begin at 9 a.m. on Friday, sessions for the students will be held concurrently in Button Auditorium and Breckinridge Auditorium.

"The purpose of the workshop is to encourage children to write, illustrate and share their literary talents by exposing them to professionals in the craft," said Shirley Blair, MSU coordinator of clinical and field experiences and workshop director.

"Our young people live in one of the richest areas for storytelling and folklore--Appalachia--and these guests artists will help them to develop their own talents," Blair added.

With more than 100 poems appearing in various journals and anthologies, Lyon often draws on her Appalachian heritage for her works. She is the author of such books as "A Regular Rolling Noah" and "Father Time and the Day Boxes." Her play, "Braids," was produced at Transylvania University, selected for the Kentucky Foundation for Women's playwriting workshop and for a reader's theatre production during a University of Kentucky Summer institute in 1986.



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


The youngsters have also appeared on Nashville Now, a nightly entertainment show on the Nashville Network, and the nationally syndicated country music television program Hee Haw.



Moran, who has been at MSU since 1974, is director of the University's Academic Services Center. She previously served as special services coordinator and as a special service counselor.



He continued:



Dennis Karwatka, associate professor of industrial education, is the senior author of "Energy, Power, and Transportation" published by Harcourt Brace Jovanovich Publishers earlier this year.


Karwatka's first book, "Introductory Auto Mechanics," was published by EMC Publishers last September and explained how all parts of the automobile work.

The MSU students present cancer information programs to 16 high schools in 10 eastern Kentucky counties. Entitled "Cancer: The Disease, Diagnosis and Treatment, Causes and Prevention," the program is targeted at high school biology classes and includes information on immunology, viruses, heredity, smoking and smokeless tobacco, and local county data on cancer.

"These programs have proven to be a very effective means of disseminating cancer education," said Dr. Magrane. A pre-test and post-test is given to all high school students who participate and results have proven significant gains in cancer knowledge, he added.

"One of the greatest satisfactions I gain from this course is taking these students into a high school, especially to their former school, and watching them confidently give an informative presentation," Dr. Magrane noted.


Student selection for the course is based on excellent grades, career goals (professional and/or research interests) and ability to communicate, according Dr. Magrane. Of the 21 students enrolled in the course during the last three years, 13 are currently attending medical school and three are in doctoral programs.

Student preparation includes reading and discussion of research articles, attending seminars and visitations to labs at the Markey Cancer Center in Lexington and the James Graham Brown Cancer Center in Louisville. Professionals at these centers give insights into the "cutting edge" of cancer research, said Dr. Magrane.

The course is supported by the Gateway Cancer District Council. Geri Hall, regional coordinator of the McDowell Cancer Network, assists Dr. Magrane with the high school programs while actual presentations are done by MSU students.

Miller recently was cast in MSU's theatre production of Thieves Carnival. In his theatrical debut, he will portray the musician in the play which runs April 23-25.


He is a member of Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia music fraternity and the MSU Players. He has served as treasurer of the Collegiate Music Educators National Conference.


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MOREHEAD, Ky.--Morehead State University's Camden-Carroll Library has received a rare collection of Civil War, local history and genealogy material valued at more than \$6,000.

The Pearl Bach--Hallie Day Blackburn Collection was presented formally to the University recently by the donor, Mrs. Hallie Day Blackburn of Dry Ridge, who served as senior extension librarian for the state Department of Libraries and Archives from 1954 to 1977.

Blackburn presented the collection to the library through the Morehead State University Foundation in memory of her mother, Mrs. Pearl Day Bach, a noted Eastern Kentucky genealogist.

The collection includes several Civil War period volumes, 32 file drawers of correspondence and other manuscripts on Eastern Kentucky genealogy and local history, and copies of a 19-volume diary kept from 1882 to 1930 by an Eastern Kentucky circuit preacher, the Rev. John J. Dicke.

MSU's library was chosen as the repository for this collection as a result of the efforts of former state librarian Charles F. Hinds who was aware of the extensive work in the genealogy of the region's families done by Dr. Stuart S. Sprague, MSU professor of history and noted Appalachian genealogist, according to Larry X. Besant, MSU libraries director.

"We are excited to receive this unique collection which has such special importance to this region," Besant said. "It will be a valuable tool for historical and social research."


The intensive program calls for students to be in classes from 8 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. six days a week with rehearsals beginning at 6:30 p.m.


MSU STUDENT TO ATTEND CONSERVATORY

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



ORLANDO, Fla.--Nine Morehead State University students are participating in Walt Disney World's College Program, a cooperative education experience in leisure business management.

While the Magic Kingdom and Epcot Center attract millions of vacationing visitors each year, for the MSU students Walt Disney World is really a lesson in management and human relations as they earn and learn during their three-month stay here.

Launched six years ago with 200 college students from 40 U.S. schools, the program now attracts 1,200 students from 120 schools here and abroad, according to Rick Neely, assistant representative for college/international relations.

"It's an exciting program," Neely said. "The students gain on-the-job experience--hopefully in areas related to their majors--and learn how a major corporation works. They must attend a series of 10 three-hour seminars dealing with different aspects of WDW business, ranging from finance to marketing and merchandising," he explained.

The students earn \$4.25 an hour, working a minimum of 30 hours each week. The number of college credits earned is determined by the student's institution. WDW provides housing at \$40 a week and recreational activities to round out the program.

Four MSU students are working as fast foods hosts/hostesses: Stephen Meadows, Maysville junior; Lee Royse, Walton graduate student; Beverly Brickey, Morehead freshman, and David Carnes, Lexington senior.

Meadows, a food service administration major who wants to manage a hotel restaurant or work with a large restaurant food supply company, is getting ground level experience at Epcot's Stargate Restaurant.

"The seminars teach us about the corporation, but we're also learning how to get along with people," he said. "Thousands of people of different cultures and backgrounds come through here every day and we get asked a lot of questions," Meadows said. "My MSU classes have really been helpful to me in my work here, especially those dealing with sanitation," he noted. WDW College Program 2-2-2

A sociology major, Royse sees a definite link between his experiences at Epcot's Odyssey Restaurant, where he fills orders, works the cash register and even does kitchen duty. "Sociology deals with people and at Disney World you meet so many different people and are constantly relating to them," he said.

"There's nothing quite like working at Disney World. It's been everything I expected and more. There's a lot of work involved, but I'm having fun," said Royse, whose career plans include teaching or sales and marketing.

Switching from kitchen to counter to cash register relieves any monotony, according to Carnes, who is majoring in management and political science. "I've learned a lot about how a corporation works from the seminars," said Carnes, who also admitted to having "the best time I've had in my life."

The WDW College Program has meant a "realization of how hard you have to work at your job" for Brickey, who's eyeing a career in fashion merchandising or vocational home economics. "A lot of people don't find this out until they are seniors. It's made me realize that I have a lot to work for in preparing for a career," she said.

She also views her experience at the Magic Kingdom's Tomorrowland Terrace as a good way to get her foot in the door at other places. "Disney World is known as a good company to work for," she noted.

What's the best part of her experience? "I enjoy working with people and talking with them," she said, adding that her high school Spanish had been helpful. In her free time, Brickey said that she and her friends enjoy going around Disney World to find out just where specific attractions are located "so we can help guests with their questions."

Anchorage senior Jennifer Tagliarino, a culinary assistant at the Magic Kingdom's Town Square Cafe, prepares plates and garnishes them before they are served. Praising WDW's management style for the way it deals with people one-on-one, she said she also has learned how to bring together a full corporation --something important to her career goal of catering.

WDW's team approach also impresses her. "Places I've worked before have been unorganized, leading to chaos. Working as a team makes it work a lot easier and faster," she said. Tagliarino, who graduates in May, said she was much better prepared by her classes than some of her co-workers from other schools. Working attractions at Tomorrowland, Susan Thompson of Hillsboro, Ohio. operates rides and ushers Magic Kingdom guests into the Circlevision Theatre she also gives narrations about the attractions. The sophomore elementary education major considers the latter to be a form of teaching. "I'm also gaining confidence in doing large group presentations and learning how to handle people of all ages as well," Thompson noted.

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WDW College Program 3-3-3

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"It's absolutely marvelous. We get credit for this. We get paid for this. You couldn't ask for much more," exclaimed Hazard sophomore Dwight Turner, one of two MSU students assigned to the Magic Kingdom's popular attraction--the Jungle Cruise in Adventureland. Jerry Smith, Ashland sophomore and physical education major, also works there.

Garbed in khaki safari outfits, they help passengers on and off the boat, captain the boat while delivering a memorized narrative and control crowds.

Turner, a radio/television major, noted that from his experiences this spring he's more at ease at meeting new people and in just starting up a conversation. "As a radio/television person, you have to be able to talk and not be afraid," he said.

Turner also said his WDW experience has taught him about responsibility. "I know what it is like to go to work each day because you have responsibilities you have to take care of. I think school will be different for me now. It will be more serious," he said.


Smith, who is known by his co-workers as "Jungle Jerry," said he's gained an education in dealing with people. "You're constantly relating to people and their different moods," he said. "I'm gaining some invaluable experience which also will look good on my resume," he added. "It's a great work experience."

Urged to interview for a slot in the program by one of her teachers, Kristi Allen, Wilmington, Ohio, freshman, wouldn't trade her WDW experience for anything. A clothing textiles major, she's stocking shelves at Epcot's Future World Merchandise Centorium. "I'm not just getting experience in working with people, but also in merchandising, which ties into my major," she said. "Between the work and the seminars, you really get to see how a business is run."

Bridging the gap between the classroom and the world through their experience this spring, the MSU students agree it's been an education they wouldn't have missed for the world.

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


