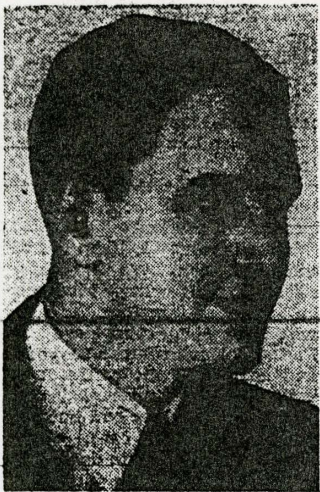


# Curt Hutchinson Is Candidate For County Judge

# County Democrats To Assemble Here Saturday At 2 p. m.

**Will Name 14 Delegates and  
Alternates To State Con-  
vention In Louisville**

**ROOSEVELT EXPECTED  
TO GET ENDORSEMENT**

**Party Officers Not Up For  
Election; Chairman E.  
Hogge To Preside**

Democrats of Rowan county will assemble at the courthouse here Saturday afternoon for the purpose of selecting delegates and alternates to the state convention to be held in Louisville Tuesday.

Democratic leaders concede that it is a foregone conclusion that Rowan's delegation will be instructed for President Roosevelt, and Saturday's meeting will be, more or less, a formality.

The county chairman and other county officers are not selected at this meeting. County Chairman E. Hogge will preside at the meeting.

Mr. Hogge said this morning that Rowan county was entitled to 14 votes at the state convention, which means that 14 delegates and as many alternates will be selected Saturday.

President Roosevelt is expected to get the Kentucky vote at the national convention, along with that of every state in the union. No other candidate is making an active fight against Mr. Roosevelt, for the nomination at this time, and it is generally conceded that the President will receive every instructed delegation at the state convention.

The Scorchers has all along advised moderation in handling the road situation—referring to the proposed road from Flemingsburg, via Morehead to Sandy Hook. It has said that "tearing your shirt and pulling your hair" would not get you anywhere, and we still say that attempted bulldozing of the Governor and Highway Commission, coming from one whose only interest in Rowan County is the "loaves and fishes" (that freely fall for flattery) is bound to injure our chances of securing an early survey and letting of this important road.

Suppose Carter county did vote bonds for a road from Olive Hill to the Elliott County line,—that's none of our business and it nowhere appears that Governor Fields of the Highway Department, wants to substitute it for the Christy Creek route of the Fleming-Elliott road.

Governor Fields was well and favorably known throughout Kentucky, long before Editor Wilson left Nebraska and the Highway Commission is composed of men, whom the people believe are fully as honest and conscientious about Kentucky's welfare as he; and we should at least accord to them the respect due every Kentucky gentleman, and not accuse them of using dark-lantern methods in their official acts, when there is nothing to warrant such accusation.

Let's be patient—don't put the taxpayers of the counties to the expense of sending large delegations to Frankfort to harrass the Department. It will do no good. We will simply have to await our turn in the order of business. We feel sure the Commission will act just as soon as it can in the matter of the Fleming-Elliott road.

# DUDLEY CAUDILL PICKED BY G.O.P.

## Peoples Bank Cashier To Manage Republican Campaign In This County

# Fiscal Court Creates 2 New Voting Precincts In County

## of Morehead and Part of County Is Redistricted By Magistrates Seeking Remedy For Congestion at Polls

During that voting in many parts in Rowan county was tedious and there are insufficient voting places in Morehead for the heavy vote here, the Fiscal Court Monday morning selected a portion of the county and placed two new precincts in city.

In addition of the two voting precincts in Morehead, which gives five precincts, necessitated changing the boundary lines in immunity.

For the greatest convenience of voters in Haldeman and Farmers precincts, the Fiscal Court decided that hereafter precinct No. 18 (Hayes) "include all persons residing in the territory beginning at Ford Branch and including thence with the C. & O. right-of-way running an easterly course to Hayes Crossing." A change was made in McKenney precinct 13 and Farmers 11, so that "all persons residing on the west side of Ford Branch from its mouth to its head and to the top of the hill shall hereafter be in Farmers.

With the establishment of two new Morehead precincts, the boundary lines of the three existing precincts were changed so that, hereafter in Morehead No. 7, the boundary shall be: beginning at the intersection of lane or street leading to the old Spoke Factory; thence with U. S. Highway No. 60 east to the boundary line of Farmers precinct No. 2; thence with boundary line of Farmers No. 2 to Piercy No. 3; thence with Piercy line to Dry Creek No. 14 to the old line of Morehead precinct No. 7 to top of hill southeast of plant of Kentucky Power and Light Co.; thence a northwesterly course (straight line) to the beginning at U. S. Highway No. 60.

The boundary lines of the new precinct No. 18 were described as follows: beginning at the Morehead State Teachers College boulevard on east side of Morehead city limits at intersection of said boulevard with U. S. Highway No. 60, following boulevard to road leading up Evans Branch

## BERT CORNETTE IS NOSED OUT

With the voting in Jefferson County complete, final unofficial figures show that Thos. S. Rhea, candidate for the Democratic nomination for Governor, held a plurality of 13,573, over his nearest opponent A. B. "Happy" Chandler. Others seeking the nomination were far behind, Wallis polling 38,187; Huddleston, 15,223; and Wootton, 3,856.

Rhea and Chandler will run it off for the nomination on September 1. The large block of Wallis votes which both candidates are seeking may go either way. Wallis said this week he would support the nominee, and did not declare any preference between Rhea and Chandler.

Every Democratic race except that of Commissioner of Agriculture, which Garth K. Ferguson, slated by Rhea, won, will require a run-off, since none of the others gained a majority of all votes cast.

# Rowan Drivers Are Praised By Clerk



**Clerk Herb Bradley

Rowan Circuit Court Clerk Herb Bradley had a lot of praise for Rowan County motorists this week . . . about the first good word said about local drivers in a long time because of the unusually high accident rate in and around Morehead.

Clerk Bradley was speaking about the promptness of Rowan automobile and truck operators in securing their drivers licenses this year, and the records bear him out.

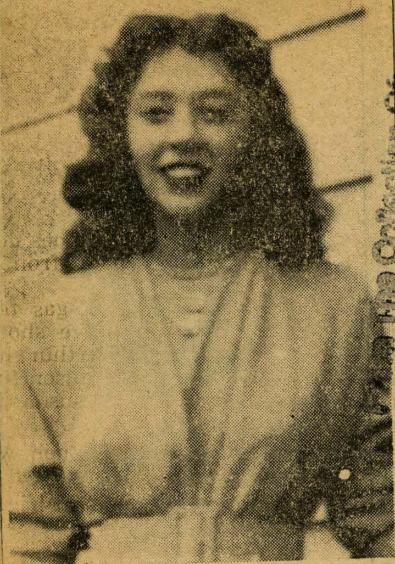
Before the deadline on August 1, a total of 1,875 two-year licenses (A through K) had been issued by Bradley, along with 1,400 one year (Y through Z) permits.

Only 160 motorists have been delinquent and required to pay the \$1 penalty . . . and Bradley says this percentage is remarkably good.

Bradley was also happy that nobody had to wait in line during the last two or three days of July. The Clerk conducted a publicity campaign notifying all drivers through the Rowan County News while the newspaper carried several articles asking people to purchase their drivers licenses early. Bradley had made arrangements to keep his office open after hours during the last week of the month to accommodate the public.

There shouldn't be any congestion after this year, Bradley said; because only half as many will buy hereafter since Kentucky's new law specifies the drivers licenses be sold for two years. Next year only drivers whose last name begins with 'L' through 'Z' will be forced to renew their license and they will obtain them for two years.

## Drumbeating For Morehead

When C. B. (Burr Head) Cornett was elected mayor of Morehead two years ago, members of his constituency warned newsmen to be on the lookout for a colorful administration of office. Some of the quotes gleaned from the mayor's extemporaneous talks have borne out the validity of that warning.

As an outspoken critic of rustic development at Cave Run Lake, he asserted this summer: "The forest service wants things just like they are. They want Euell Gibbons out there with a hickory nut in his mouth. Well, you don't make any money off of people with packs on their backs and hair down over their shoulders . . ."

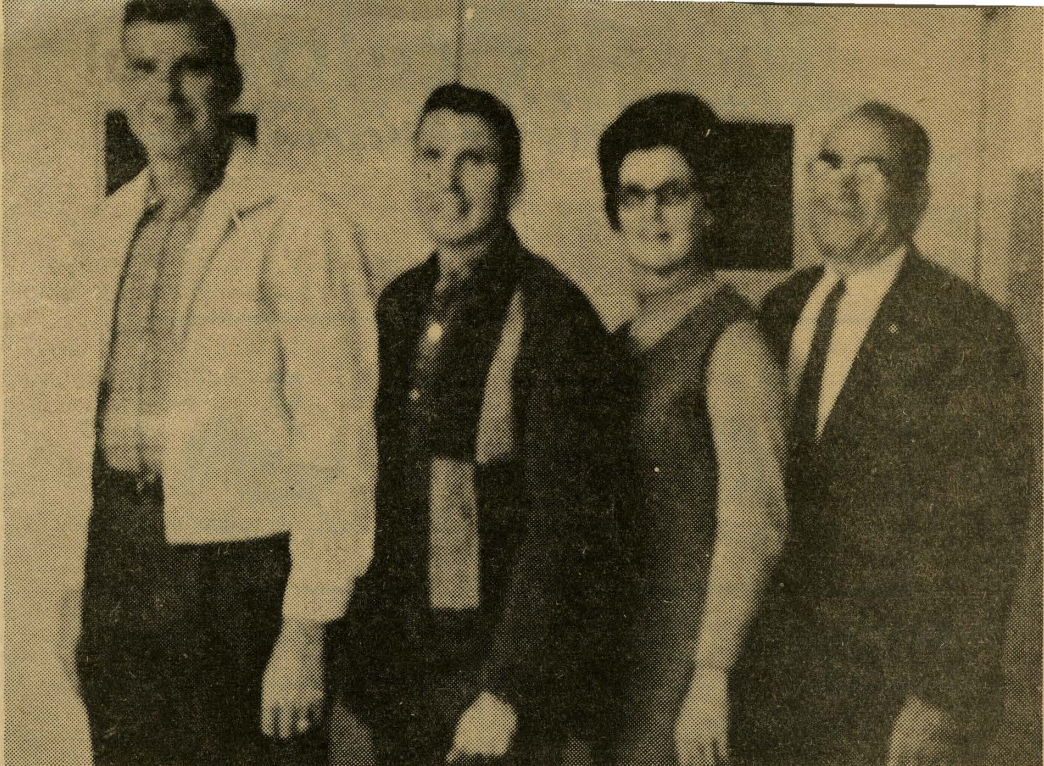
And this past fall, talking about dissension over youth baseball administration, he said: "The most important thing is these young men, yours, ours, South Shore's. We have to stop all this argument and get down to the spirit of the thing. We have to stop the namecalling. They will be the fighters in the next war against Russia and China and they will have to carry the ball for us."

There is something familiar in the way the words fit the situation, perhaps a sort of overkill. We compare with his fellow mayor and conservative, Richard Daley of Chicago, who, when asked about the severe dissension between youth and reactionaries during the 1968 Democratic convention in his city, replied: "We've gotten over things like this before in this country. This is no worse than the Civil War."

Like Daley, Cornett has proven popular with the majority element in his community, and under his administration the town is growing both in ground and population. Predictions have been offered that Morehead will reach 20,000 population by 1985. If it comes, you can bet part of it will be by the influence of a mayor who makes his mark.

Cornett isn't the only mayor in Eastern Kentucky whose personality runs out in front as a drummer for his town. There's Bruce Porter at Grayson and T. L. Groves at Flatwoods. John Chandler, who stepped down earlier this summer, is finding it hard to keep from representing Paintsville wherever he goes.

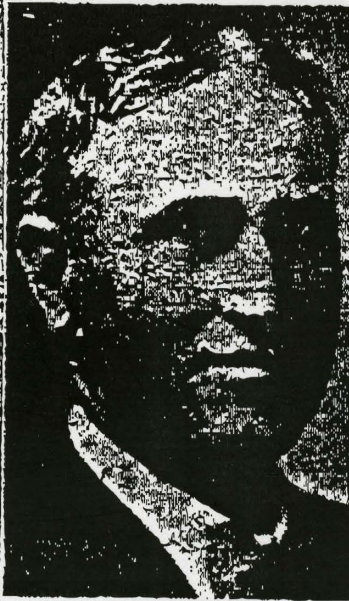

### Morehead Banker Nominated In Primary to Succeed Judge Prewitt

For fifty years Circuit Judges in the Twenty-first District, Rowan-Bath-Menifee-Montgomery, have been political affiliates of the family of Senator Ailie W. Young. This continuity was broken in Saturday's primaries when D. B. Caudill, an anti-Young candidate, was named by the voters.

Senator Young's father, Taylor Young, served as Circuit Judge for many years, then Senator Young was elected, and after him his brother, Bill Young. When Bill Young was killed in an automobile accident fourteen years ago, Judge Henry R. Prewitt, Senator Young's choice, was named.

Judge Prewitt served out the unexpired term and twice was re-elected. Six years ago Mr. Caudill, who lives in Senator Young's county, Rowan, ran against Judge Prewitt, but was defeated by 1,700 votes.

#### Filed On Last Day

Judge Prewitt was without opposition for renomination this year until the last day for filing. Mr. Caudill had told Judge Prewitt he would not run. He was at Frenchburg, in Menifee County, that day. He had a dispute with one of Judge Prewitt's adherents, who knocked him down.

Infuriated, Mr. Caudill returned to Morehead, prepared papers to run for both the Democratic and Republican nominations, telephoned Judge Prewitt that he was filing, and sent his papers to Frankfort. His messenger reached the Capitol during the last hour for filing. No one but Mr. Caudill filed for the Republican nomination, and he was given the certificate.

Saturday, in the Democratic primary, Mr. Caudill carried Senator Young's home county, Rowan, led Judge Prewitt by thirty-three votes in Menifee, and had enough votes in the two counties to offset Judge Prewitt's majority at home, Montgomery County. The issue was settled in Bath, which Mr. Caudill carried enough to make his district majority 155 votes.

#### Caudill Is Banker

Mr. Caudill, 53 years old, served as City Attorney of Morehead for twelve years and four years as County Attorney of Rowan. He is connected with the Peoples Bank at Morehead, which he served for years as president, and the Peoples Bank of Sandy Hook.

Judge Prewitt, in his capacity as Special Judge, has served more days as Circuit Judge in courts outside his district than any other judge, but one, in the State. In addition he presided two years ago at the trial of the Harlan County murder cases that grew out of the bitter labor disputes in the coal field.

He was sent to Manchester last year by the Court of Appeals to try a number of murder indictments that grew out of renewal of feud warfare in Clay County. He served as special judge in various counties of Eastern Kentucky, including Bell, Harlan, Mazonia, Floyd and Clay, and numerous Bluegrass counties.

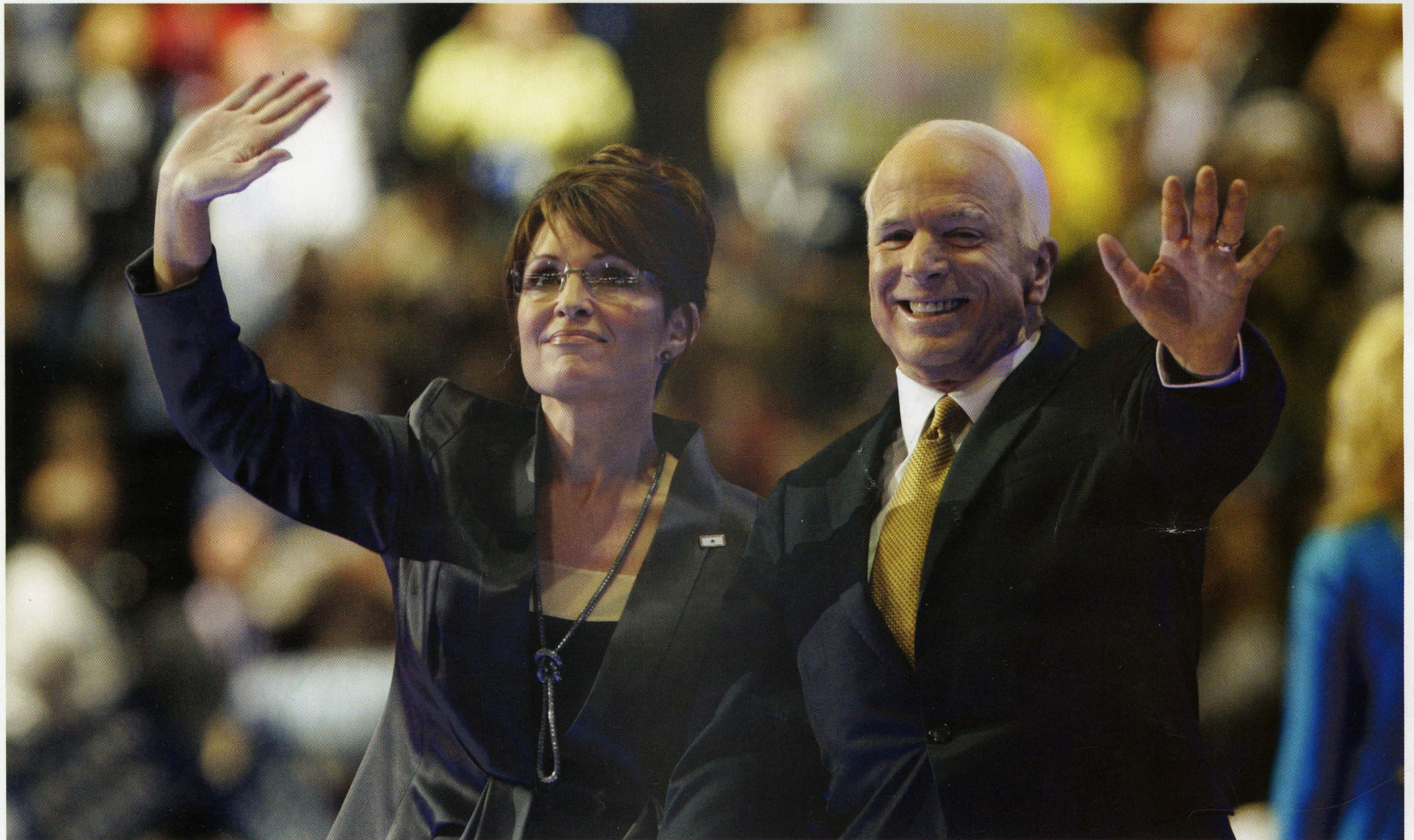

# McBrayer Kicks Off Rowan Campaign

Saying that it was "high time that Kentucky has a governor from our end of the state," Terry McBrayer, Demo-

cratic candidate for governor, officially kicked off his Rowan County campaign by introducing his local committee during a rally Thursday night at Rowan County High School.

Jack Ellis, director of libraries at

Morehead State University and one of McBrayer's county co-chairpersons, introduced the other four co-chairpeople and the county treasurer for the campaign. The other members include: Sam Litton, Homer Amburgy, Dr.

Louise Caudill, Dolly Forman and treasurer, Roy Caudill.

Also present with McBrayer at the rally were Mike Templeton, a Morehead native who is a co-chairman of McBrayer's statewide campaign, and Dick Robertson of the Kentucky Department of Commerce.

McBrayer, who spoke to the huge gathering for about 45 minutes, was very critical of the special legislative session now in progress as well as Lt. Gov. Thelma Stovall's recommendations for coming up with the revenue to offset her proposed tax cuts.

One of the Lieutenant Governor's proposals is to put \$26 million in "surplus" funds from the Kentucky road fund back into the general fund. McBrayer said that he was disappointed with that proposal. He added, "I was knee-deep in mud in Letcher County, Ky. this morning when someone told me (about it). And I was talking with some parents of some children this very morning whose children could not get to school because the road was impassable.

"Yesterday, I was in Harlan County and saw 150 homes that were isolated and (whose residents) had to travel 15 miles down a railroad track to reach a major highway because the bridge washed out in the flood two years ago and hasn't been replaced."

Saying that you can't explain taking \$26 million out of the road fund to these people, McBrayer called Stovall's proposal "absurd and ridiculous."

McBrayer was even more critical of the special session itself. He said that

the family filed in while the organist played, "Lead Kindly Light."

After a reading of the 23d Psalm, the minister spoke of Vinson in comparison with Moses:

"Moses my servant is dead."

"He is missed in the nation" the minister said; "he is missed in the community. He is missed in our lives, and we have given up a great leader."

An estimated crowd of 3,000 people stood outside the church listening to the services over a loud-speaker, and many followed the casket car to the cemetery.

All business houses in Louisa were closed during the services and all Chesapeake & Ohio Railroad trains passing through here today ran at half speed as a mark of respect.

Other famous men were here for the funeral in Louisa Methodist Church. His Supreme Court associates were here as honorary pallbearers, one of them another distinguished Kentuckian, Justice Stanley Reed, Maysville; both United States senators from Kentucky, Earl Clements and John Sherman Cooper were here, as was Governor Wetherby.

**Barkley Is Present**

Others included Federal Judge Mac Swinford, former Vice-President Alben W. Barkley, former Governor Simeon Willis, former Senator Tom Underwood, Sam Rayburn, minority leader of the House of Representatives; Steven Mitchell, national Democratic chairman; Justices Brady Stewart and Bert Combs and Commissioner Osso W. Stanley of the Kentucky Court of Appeals; and circuit judges and lawyers of this area.

And humble people who claimed Fred Vinson as their friend were here—people who had grown up with him here in a little town where the Tug and the Levisa merge to form the Big Sandy River. To the Chief Justice they were just as important as the two presidents who were his bridge-playing companions.

From Washington, where a state funeral was held yesterday, the body was brought here today on a funeral train bearing Justices Black, Douglas, Burton, Clark, and Reed, and Lippert, Marshal of the court, and the clerk, Willey. Representing the Chesapeake & Ohio Railroad was its chief engineer, L. T. Nuckols. Justice Minton came by automobile. Justice Frankfurter was unable to come.

### Friends File By Bier

From the train, the body of the Chief Justice was taken to Curtwright Funeral Home, where friends and neighbors filed by his bier all morning and until the body was taken to the church.

## Friends, Neighbors Pay Final Tribute As Fred Vinson Is Buried at Louisa

### U. S. Leaders Are at Funeral

Louisa, Ky., Sept. 11.—The distinguished jurist who never forgot his humble origin, the friends of his youth, or his home town returned to his birthplace today for the last time.

It was the final home-coming for Fred M. Vinson, Chief Justice of the United States, who was buried this afternoon in Pine Hill Cemetery, on a hillside overlooking the quiet, shady County-seat town of Louisa.

Far different from the gala home-coming of the nation's Chief Justice two years ago was the solemn occasion here today.

Then flags were flying on high to greet big, jovial Fred Vinson, who had returned for the dedication of a granite monolith mark-

ing the place of his birth—a white brick building once housing Lawrence County Jail.

### His Father Was Jailer

There was much friendly, jocular reference that day by Vinson and his boyhood friends and his neighbors to the fact that he had been born in jail on January 22, 1890, and so he had, for his father, James Vinson, was County jailer.

From a flag-draped platform erected on a street flanking the Courthouse yard, speakers on that occasion told intimate stories of the town's most distinguished citizen. They told about him as a barefoot boy running to the railroad station to watch the trains come in.

They recalled that his mother took in boarders to raise funds to send him off to college. They boasted of his greatness as a shortstop on a semipro baseball team. And they were proud to trace his career in public office

through four decades—Commonwealth's attorney, congressman and Secretary of the Treasury.

### Community Is Saddened

Seated under a blistering sun that day, his beloved sister, Miss Lou Vinson, shed a few tears of joy when he referred to her as "my second mother, and a darling one at that."

But the flags were at half-staff today in a saddened community. The powerful voice of Fred M. Vinson was stilled in death, and the hears of Miss Lou were shed in sorrow as were those of Fred Vinson's widow, his sons, and his neighbors who had come to pay him their final tribute.

But Miss Lou, who is 74, wasn't able to attend the services. She did her silent grieving at home.

A modest array of floral tributes flanked the casket, which was covered with her roses.

# Harlan Blair, Morehead Civic Leader, 3-Time Mayor, Claimed

## Funeral Held Yesterday At Main St. Home

The man who probably contributed more than anyone else in fostering Morehead's progress from a cross-roads county seat, and actively engaged in civic, local governmental enterprises during the past 30 years passed away early Monday morning.

Death came shortly before dawn to Harlan Blair, 70, three times Mayor, referred to last year in a newspaper article "as the one man who numbered as his friend everyone with whom he came in contact."

The end was not unexpected as Mr. Blair had been in ill health for three years. His condition was termed serious a year ago, although he continued, between spells of illness, to visit up and down the streets of the town he helped build.

A heart condition and complications terminated the life of the man who was probably better known and more widely loved than any citizen of the community.

In 1926, or shortly after the establishment of Morehead State College, Mr. Blair was named Business Agent of the institution and he remained in that office until retiring in 1951 due to poor health. During this period he became personally acquainted with practically every student that ever attended Morehead. Alumni rarely returned without paying a visit to Mr. Blair's office.

During depression years, when so many Eastern Kentucky teachers and students were having a difficult time financing their way through college, Harlan Blair became more than a business agent at Morehead. He was the financial counsellor to the student body and possessed the fine trait of taking their problems to his own heart.

Once during that era the Board of Regents took cognizance of the fact "that many checks are being held by the business office for student cafeteria meal

tickets and enrollment fees." Mr. Blair explained "these boys and girls are honest and if we can't extend them some credit they'll have to drop out of school and maybe never get a college education." The institution suffered few losses, but permitted a lot of boys and girls to get teachers certificates or complete their education, the president later noted in his report.

Because Harlan Blair was a pillar of the community so long, most people connect he was a native of Morehead. Actually, he was born in Morgan County, but came to Morehead as a small boy with his parents, the late Pierce Blair and Mary Elizabeth Blair. His father and mother were also leaders in community life, particularly around and after the turn of the century.

Mr. Blair served three terms as Mayor, generally winning without opposition. During his first term as Chief Executive of what was then a village, Morehead's first waterworks was installed and many of its streets paved. Additional paving was done and other improvements achieved during his later terms, including extension of the city

limits under a mutually agreeable annexation plan. He also worked for additional street lighting.

Mr. Blair did not confine his civic activities to city hall duties and served on practically every committee created to foster Morehead's progress. He worked with the group successful in having the State of Kentucky locate a college at Morehead.

He was active in Masonic affairs, being a member of the Masonic Blue Lodge of Morehead, Knights Templar Lodge of Mt. Sterling and Shriner's Oleika Temple of Lexington.

Funeral services were conducted at the home on Main Street yesterday (Wednesday) afternoon with interment in Lee cemetery. Rev. Miller Dungan and Rev. Gabriel C. Banks officiated.

A sister, Mrs. Maude Swift, died last month. His wife passed away more than a score of years ago.

He is survived by five children: Franklin Blair, Charlie Blair and Mildred Blair, of Morehead; Mrs. Harry C. Tenny, Louisville, and Mrs. John T. Petro, Mt. Sterling. He also leaves five grandchildren: Franklin Blair III, Larry Blair, Betty Bruce Petro, Charles Edward Blair, Jr., and Ellen Blair Tenny.

Active casket bearers were: Dr. E. D. Blair, Allie Young, Claude Brown, Robert Bishop, Powell Williams, Hubert Allen, Jack Lewis and Alpha Hutchinson.

The honorary bearers included: C. E. Clemons, Hartley Batson, Sam Allen, Lee Stewart, Leo Oppenheimer, John Petro, C. P. Duley, Chester Kiser, Stephen T. Davis, Harlan Powers, Dr. Warren C. Lappin, Matt Cassity, Dave C. Caudill, Vernon Alfrey and John Calvert.

Mr. Blair's closest friend, Clark B. Lane, owner-manager of the Lane Funeral Home, cared for the arrangements. Mr. Blair and Mr. Lane were associates in the business office of Morehead College for more than 20 years, before Mr. Lane resigned to enter private business.

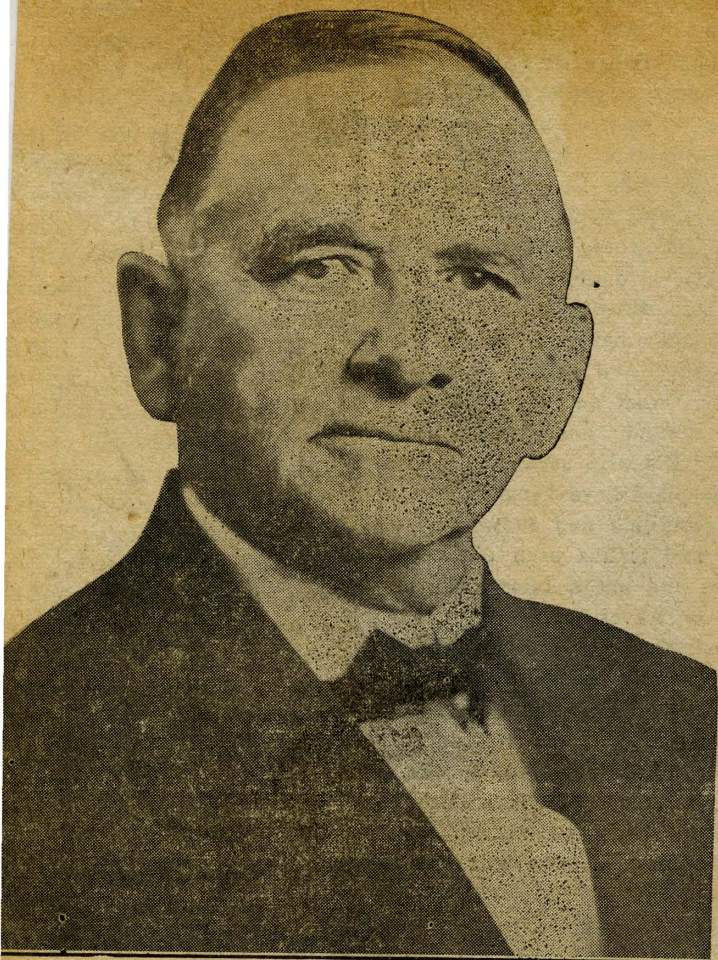

## Death Takes Judge Henry R. Prewitt

WAS FORMER CIRCUIT JUDGE  
OF THIS DISTRICT AND ONE  
OF THE MOST PROMINENT  
LAWYERS IN KENTUCKY.

### Funeral Today, 2 P. M.

Announcement of the death of Judge Henry R. Prewitt, which occurred at his late home early yesterday morning, came as a shock to his many friends and relatives throughout the state.

Judge Prewitt suffered a stroke Monday and gradually grew worse until the end came. He had not been in the best of health for the past two years but had attended to his extensive law practice until last week when he was kept from his office for a few days with a cold.

Judge Prewitt had been connected with Kentucky politics for many years. He served as State Insurance Commissioner for one term and served as a delegate to the National convention on two or three occasions. He served as chairman of the State Central and Executive Committee for four years. He served as president of the Exchange Bank of Kentucky for 22 years.

Judge Prewitt was a Democrat of the old school and was always interested in the success of his party and always gave much of his time and means for the success of the candidates of his party.

Judge Prewitt practiced law in this district since a young man with the exception of a few years he spent in Kansas when he first entered the practice of law. He possessed a brilliant legal mind and was considered an expert on questions of law.

Judge Prewitt was appointed to fill out the unexpired term of the late Judge William A. Young as Circuit Judge of the 21st Judicial District in 1919, and was elected and re-elected for two full terms, serving a total of fourteen years.

Judge Prewitt's record as Circuit Judge stood at the top in the state. He was seldom reversed by the higher courts. He was an able and conscientious judge and lawyer and his honesty of purpose in rendering his decisions was never questioned and he was always especially careful in giving to all exact justice according to his construction of the law and evidence. He presided with that dignity, poise and attentiveness characteristic of the old-time judges. He was always looked upon by those who knew him as a firm, courageous and efficient friend.

His judicial acts will stand the strictest scrutiny, his decisions having been rendered after the most careful thought and consideration with an honest intention to do justice to all litigants.

He was a big-brained, big-hearted and noble man. He will be badly missed in the church, in his home and in civic and political affairs of his community. A more generous

man has never lived than Judge Prewitt. No man loved his family and his friends more than did this man. Judge Prewitt's life was a beautiful example of loving fidelity and sacrificial devotion to his family.

He goes away with his goodness and kindness imperishably recorded in the hearts of those who knew him best.

Judge Prewitt was born in this county on June 2, 1868, the son of the late Allen and Mrs. Mary Vance Reid Prewitt and was the eldest of a large family and is the first one of the family to pass away.

He had been a member of the Christian church since young manhood.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Katherine Grubbs Prewitt; three sons, Thomas G. Prewitt, of North Middletown; Allen Prewitt, of Frankfort, and Reid Prewitt, of this county, and eight grandchildren, Mrs. J. W. Montjoy, of this city; Patsy, Henry and Tommy Prewitt, North Middletown; Alice and Allen Prewitt, Frankfort; Kathryn and Buddy Prewitt, Mt. Sterling. He is also survived by four sisters, Mrs. Frank H. Jackson and Mrs. J. L. McCord, of Winchester; Mrs. Charlton Evans, of Lexington, and Mrs. Tandy Chenault, of this county; two brothers, Mark A. and Richard Prewitt, of this county.

Funeral services will be held at the Christian church this afternoon at 2 o'clock, conducted by the Rev. Howard S. Stephenson, this city, and Rev. A. C. Brooks, of Frankfort. The body will be taken to the church at 11 o'clock and lie in state until the time for the funeral. The active pall-bearers are: W. K. Prewitt, D. J. Prewitt, Prewitt Young, Allen G. on all key inauguration figures  
—even 'grandson' Harry Truman**

**T**HE only thing that kept the recent inauguration ceremonies in Washington from being almost completely a Kentucky affair was the fact that President Truman is a Missourian. But Kentuckians were quick to point out that Truman's grandparents came from the Bluegrass State. That and the fact that Vice-President Alben W. Barkley is Kentucky's No. 1 Son weren't the only factors lending a Kentucky flavor to the inauguration. Truman took his oath of office from Chief Justice Fred Vinson, a Kentuckian from Louisa; and Barkley took his oath from Associate Justice Stanley Reed, also a Kentuckian, from Mason County. And to add still more to the Kentucky flavor of the inauguration ceremonies, hundreds from the Bluegrass State poured into Washington to witness the festivities or take part in ceremonies honoring Truman and Barkley. The Governor's Special carried about 250 Kentuckians to the inauguration. Louisville's Mose Green Club, which didn't quite get a chance to take part in the parade, was represented in full force—with green hats and green canes. # Flare As Rowan Judge And His Fiscal Court Over Hiring Foreman

## Magistrate Told To Move Offices From Courthouse

Rowan County Judge W. T. (Bill) McClain and the Fiscal Court were 'stalemated' today as some bitterness and not-so-nice talk developed over the employment of a county road foreman.

Climax of the controversy came at a regular meeting of the court Tuesday morning when Judge McClain ordered 1st District Magistrate Jesse McDaniel to move his office out of the courthouse.

The difference is nothing new since it has been a delicate matter at every meeting of the present Fiscal Court, which entered office in January. Tuesday was the first time the matter flared into the open.

Judge McClain has insisted the Fiscal Court employ a foreman at an annual salary of \$2,000. He recommended Jim Evans, who lives in the North Fork of Triplett section, for the job.

### Repeats Recommendation

A group of Upper Licking residents were present at Tuesday's meeting, seeking to obtain some road work, and had a ring-side seat as tempers flared.

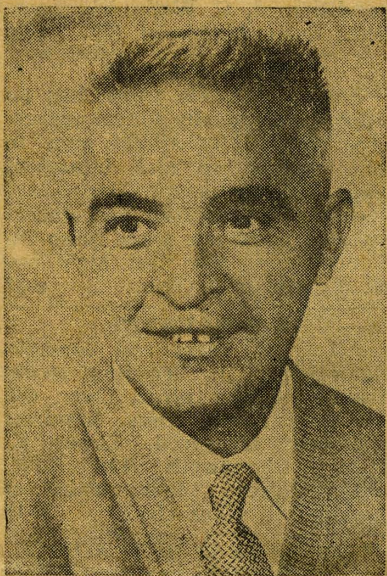
McClain again recommended a foreman be employed, but as ex officio chairman of the meeting he could not make a formal motion. Magistrate John A. Hamm moved the foreman be hired, but his motion died for want of a second.

Turning to the Upper Licking delegation McClain said: "There's your Fiscal Court . . . they're the ones that ought to do something."

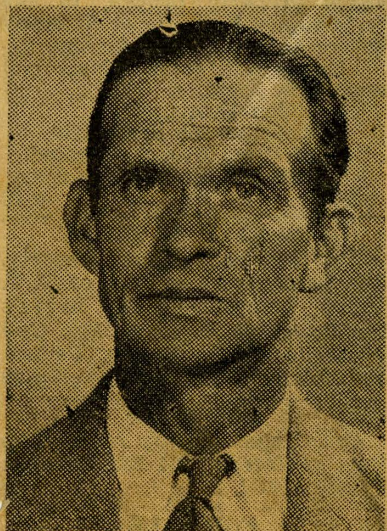
### Kinder Takes Stand

Magistrate Elmer Kinder (only holdover from the old court) said he wanted his position made plain. Kinder said he was in favor of hiring a foreman at \$200 a month, but not at \$2,000 a year. Kinder said the job lasted only 8 1/2 months at the most.

Kinder said the county had only \$14,000 to \$15,000 in this fund and

"all the work is done in three or four months."

McClain indicated he thought Magistrate McDaniel should have seconded Hamm's motion and told McDaniel bluntly: "Get your office out of the courthouse."

McDaniel, the first District Magistrate, has an office across from the Judge's office, as did his predecessor. The first district represents over half of the county population, but holding of Magistrate's Court was an issue on the past election.

#### **Can Hold Court Anyplace**

McDaniel said he would get out tomorrow and "I can hold my court on the courthouse yard, or anyplace else, if I want to." He said later he was going to move if the Judge held the power to make him vacate.

Kinder, McDaniel and Magistrate George McDaniel of the second district, are sticking together with Magistrate Hamm and McClain on the other side. The Judge votes only in case of a tie.

The controversy has these two sides:

Judge McClain contends a full time foreman would take care of the equipment and would more than make for the county the \$2,000 salary;

The three opposing Court members say it's too much to spend \$2,000 out of \$14,000 for a foreman; that it has been tried before and didn't work out; and the job would really pay the foreman more than \$500 a month because the county roads are worked only in the fall, except in emergency.

#### **Act Or Else**

McClain made it plain he intended to have a foreman, or else, when he told Court members that he didn't need them and apparently adjourned the Fiscal Court until October.

Under law the court is in regular session only twice a year, May and October. However, it has been the custom for many years for the magistrates to meet each month to pay claims and

transact other business.

Kinder said he believed that three members could meet anytime they wanted to and transact business because "we represent a quorum, it would be legal if the judge and the other magistrate were in Europe."

The county road fund, over which the difference developed, is the smallest the court oversees. The primary system and the secondary (rural roads) are administered by the state. The county system maintains the feeder roads, many of them dirt, leading into the rural roads.

McClain insisted the road work is a year-around job because many emergencies arise, such as bridge wash-outs.

Tuesday's heated session brings this legal point: Can the court meet (except at regular meetings in May and October) unless called in session by the judge? Can three members meet and legally transact business? What will happen to unpaid bills and other measures that need to be acted upon?

"Sure hope they get this thing straightened out," said Jailer Rube Thomas. "I don't have the money to feed the prisoners and have to wait six months on my pay."

Another matter coming up soon is approval by the Fiscal Court

for rural work to be done by the State Department of Rural Highways. This may also be controversial since the three same magistrates are insisting that white rock (limestone) be put on the rural roads this year instead of the creek gravel which Frankfort has been recommending in the past. They contend the creek gravel is not much good and limestone rock can be procured at local quarries for just a little more.



# Barkley Will Remain Active; May Run For Office In Future

Vice President Alben W. Barkley doesn't plan to retire to his farm in Kentucky Jan. 20.

The 75-year-old Barkley's eyes shine brightly when he declares he expects to lead a busy life after he quits the vice presidency.

"My plans are indefinite," he says. "I have a lot of things in mind, but none of them has jelled yet."

"But I expect to be busy. I don't expect to die on the vine. I'm just as strong now as I have ever been, and I hope and believe that my mind is just as alert."

Barkley expects to do some writing, perhaps about his 40 years in the national capital, some lecturing and a lot of traveling.

One of the world's most traveled men, he's hopped back and forth across the nation many times, has visited Europe often and only a few months ago toured the Korean battlefield and evacuation hospitals.

The man who made the term "Veep" world-famous said he is in "no rush" to plan his future.

"I've been approached about making radio and television appearances, perhaps weekly," he said in an interview, "but I haven't decided on anything definite."

Although he plans to spend a good deal of time at his farm home, "The Angles," near Paducah, he's not going to desert the Washington scene and will keep his apartment for a time.

Barkley said he has no political plans but would not shut

the door on the possibility of his running again for the Senate or for the Kentucky governorship—the only political post he ever sought and failed to get.

"I'm not interested now in any appointive job," he said. "I'm not seeking one and don't expect to be offered any."

Whatever activities Barkley finally decides upon, one thing is certain.

The Senate will lose one of its most colorful, beloved and feared figures when he surrenders the gavel to young Richard M. Nixon of California.

In the House and Senate for four decades his eloquence and party steadfastness endeared him to friends and his rapier wit made opponents fear him in debate.

A close friend of Presidents Woodrow Wilson, Franklin D. Roosevelt and Harry S. Truman, Barkley has been one of the leading voices of the Democratic party since he first went to Congress in 1913.

His political career reached a climax in Chicago last July when he stepped to the National Convention platform to touch off a violent 24-minute ovation.

Barkley a short time before had withdrawn from the race for the Democratic presidential nomination after a group of what he called "self-anointed" labor leaders said he was too old.

There was no trace of bitterness in his voice as he told the crowded hall he sought no office "which this convention can bestow," and there was none when he went out over the nation to urge the election of Adlai Stevenson.

There is still no bitterness when he discusses those hectic days in Chicago's July heat wave. He says he feels it was perhaps unfair to oppose him only because of his age, but he adds that "you've got to expect such things in politics."

He jokes that he can join William Jennings Bryan in saying he "ended up getting fewer votes and more applause than anybody."

The genial gentleman from Kentucky already was a powerful figure on Capitol Hill in 1944 as majority leader of the Senate when a dramatic incident enhanced his stature greatly.

Barkley, angered and hurt by Roosevelt's tax bill veto message, stood up in the Senate and denounced it in biting words.

"I do not propose," he said, "to take this unjustifiable assault lying down."

Roosevelt promptly sent a "dear Alben" telegram urging Barkley to reconsider his announced plan to resign as majority leader.

But Barkley held to his purpose, and his fellow Democrats accepted his resignation—then quickly and unanimously re-elected him. His prestige skyrocketed.

The breach with Roosevelt healed quickly. It was Barkley who led the movement a few months later to renominate President Roosevelt for a fourth term.

Today Barkley recalls the split with Roosevelt as the most unpleasant event in his long career, "but that disagreement," he will tell you, "was never again mentioned between Roosevelt and me . . ."

It is the pleasant things which Barkley prefers to recall.

"I cannot recall," he said, "the most pleasant incident. A lot of very pleasant things happened during my 40 years here."

"As a period, not as a single instance, I think my association with Woodrow Wilson ranked as perhaps the most pleasant experience. I had just been elected to Congress as a young man when Wilson took a liking to me. He helped me in many ways. I saw him frequently, even after he left office."

"I found him far from austere and reserved. He advised me as he might have a young student at Princeton. I found him always friendly and easy to approach . . ."

Barkley looks back on friendships with both Democrats and Republicans.

"Some of my warmest personal friends have been opponents,"

he said. He mentioned particularly Sen. Charles McNary of Oregon and Sen. Arthur Vandenberg of Michigan.

Barkley once made a speech in Grand Rapids, Mich., in behalf of Vandenberg's Democratic opponent.

"But," said Barkley, "I paid my personal regards to Vandenberg. The Democratic chairman asked me who I was talking for—our candidate or Vandenberg."

Seemingly untiring, Barkley spoke vigorously for Democratic candidates any time he was called upon from the day he was first elected prosecuting attorney of McCracken County back in 1905. He has been known to make more than 10 speeches a day and still be going strong when newsmen were almost collapsing at their typewriters.

Barkley served seven terms in the House before he was elected to the Senate in 1927.

Perhaps because he grew up on a Kentucky farm, Barkley's formula for health and vitality is "plenty of hard work." In recent years he has adopted a diet practice which took many pounds from his stocky figure.

This is simple but requires a strong will. It is to eat the things he doesn't like and pass up the things he does like.

It may be that Barkley's second marriage, to young Mrs. Carleton S. Hadley of St. Louis, three years ago has something to do with his youthfulness too, but perhaps the basic secret of his political success and his vitality at 75 is found in his statement:

"I like people. I like to be with them."

Mrs. Kissinger, wife of Newt Kissinger, widely known Morehead citizen, died Tuesday at the St. Joseph Hospital, Lexington, where she was taken when her condition became critical.

Born May 7, 1865 at Elliottville, daughter of the late James and Nannie White, she was 87 years of age. She lived her entire life in Morehead and Rowan County.

When 14 years of age she became a member of the Christian Church and later in life attended the East End Church of God.

On March 18, 1885 she married James Newton Kissinger. To this union there was born three children.

Served On Faculty Of Morehead State College Since 1935

One of Eastern Kentucky's most prominent educators, Ward B. Jackson, who spent his entire life in the field of teaching, died at his home in Morehead Christmas Eve. 1952

Mr. Jackson, native of Owen County, had been in failing health for the past year and the end was not unexpected.

He was the son of the late Walter and Willie Ann Jackson.

Mr. Jackson, a member of the faculty at Morehead State College, until illness forced him to retire, received his Bachelor of Arts and Master's degrees at the University of Kentucky. He later took post graduate work at the University of Chicago.

From 1909 until 1915 he taught in the Mayslick schools and from 1915 to 1935 at Ashland where he became Principal of the Ashland system. He came to the Morehead faculty in 1935 and was an Associate Professor in the Department of Science.

He was one of the most widely known educators in Northeastern Kentucky and messages of condolence started pouring to Morehead when news of his death was flashed by newspapers, radio and television.

While at Ashland, he founded and coached the famed Ashland Kittens, recognized for many years.

### Rowan County Government Part II

Look out a man discreet and wise and set him over the land. (Gen. 41:33)

When Rowan was formed in 1856 there was only one voting precinct in the county. That made it difficult to vote because of poor roads and difficulty in getting to the county seat to vote.

Gradually as the county grew in population, more precincts were added. By 1937, there were 20 voting precincts in Rowan County.

That year the three election commissioners of Rowan County were Bill Layne, Morehead Mayor; Jack Wilson, Editor of the Rowan County News; and Sheriff Mort May. They met on Aug. 5, 1937 and appointed the following election officers in those 20 precincts for the Aug. 7 primary:

Morehead, No. 1 - E.W. McKinney, clerk; Everett Fraley, sheriff; J.L. Nickell and Dr. G.H. Fern, judges.

Farmers, No. 2 - William McClain, clerk; Ernie Shay, sheriff; Joe Messer and Harlan Ellington, judges.

Piercy, No. 3 - Howard Hall,

clerk; Otis Hargis, sheriff; and W.R. Utterback, judge (other judge not named).

### Political races competitive

During the 1920s, the political races in Rowan County became very competitive, organized and heated.

Although the county had many more democrats registered than republicans, rarely was there a democrat sweep of county offices. When the 19th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution passed in 1922 allowing women to vote, it seemed to make the country about equally divided politically.

In the county election of 1924 there were 1,092 democrat votes cast and 1,035 republican votes cast. Perhaps

influenced by the women's vote, Rowan countains were voting for the man and not the party.

Also the 1920s saw the democratic and republican parties become more organized and competitive. The republican party began to attract more voters in the national election, but more democrats were elected to county offices.

In the 1928 national election, the county went republican by a margin of 1,857 republican votes to 1,170 democrats. However, as the next decade arrived, the democrats won the 1932 general election by a majority of 2,844 to 1,662, yet the republicans managed to win the major offices in the county. Rowan voters seemed to reject the national republican party because of the depressed economy, yet locally seemed to vote for the man instead of the party.

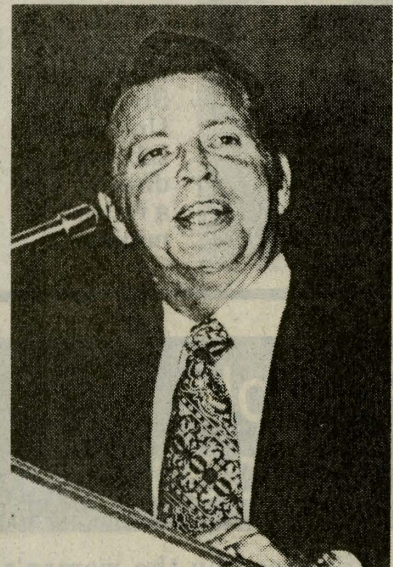
### Newspaper editorials political

Led by outspoken fiery political editors of the two Morehead newspapers, the 1930s could be called the golden age of politics in Rowan County. Led by Jack Wilson, editor of the Rowan County News, and Bill Sample, editor of the Morehead Independent,

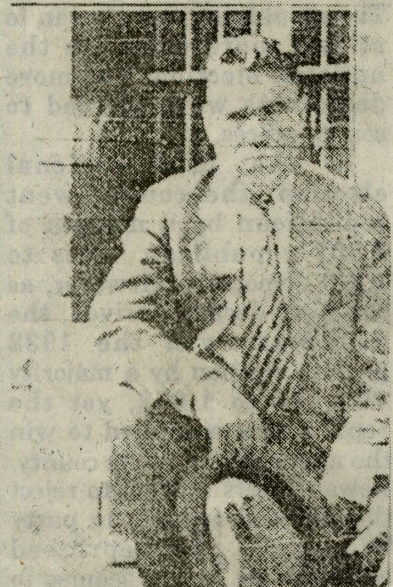

politics became a public relations battle. For the first time there was an emphasis upon the record, reputation and political promises of the candidates. Whomever the papers supported usually was elected. There was political power in the press.

The county general elections in the 1930s were always hotly contested. Local newspaper editors pulled no punches in criticizing and expressing their views on the candidates and their policies.

In an editorial following the November 1935 election, Jack Wilson, editor of the Rowan County News, criticized County Judge Charles E. Jennings for assigning county patrolmen to certain voting precincts. The purpose was "supposedly" to keep order. Mr. Wilson claimed they were electioneering for certain candidates.

## County judge responds to criticism

County Judge Charles E. Jennings responded with a stinging letter to the rival newspaper, The Morehead Independent.

His letters said: "In a cowardly editorial in the Rowan County News, Jack Wilson did not mention my name but since I am in charge of the county patrolman, I presume he was referring to me. However, a large number of good citizens of this county without regard to party have commended my actions in insuring a quiet orderly election. Although I do not feel it necessary to explain my actions to Jack Wilson, I feel I had to respond to his criticism and let the people draw their own conclusions."

Charles E. Jennings was one of the powerful political leaders in Rowan County during the 1925-1950 era. Mr. Jennings was born in Rowan County and attended the Morehead Normal School. He was a school teacher in Rowan County for several years and was married to Miss Wynona Atchison. He was a staunch republican and served as Circuit Court Clerk 1928-32 before being elected County Judge from 1932-1936. Mr. W.E. Proctor served as the elected County Attorney during those years.

Vernon Alfrey, a strong republican, was elected for three terms as Rowan County Court Clerk. Vernon was born at Cogswell in 1897. He attended the Alfrey rural school and the Morehead Normal School. He later taught school for several years before going to work as a railroad clerk on the C&O

Railroad between Morehead, Olive Hill, Hitchens and Louisa. Vernon married Miss Chloe Amburgy, and five children were born to that union: Opal, Virginia, Nell, Phyllis and Austin.

Mr. Alfrey and his wife Chloe ran a very efficient county office. It was during their term in office in 1937 that for the first time in Rowan County history, more than 1,000 automobiles were registered (1,092). That was a 10 percent increase over the 900 that were registered in 1936. Better roads and economic conditions were credited with the increased auto registration. (Traffic was increasing).

## Republican and democrat "machines" organized

Rowan County maintained a powerful organized republican machine during the 1930s. Such politically astute men as Vernon Alfrey, Roy Cornette, Bob Bishop, Joe McKinney and Charles Jennings were successful in electing men to major offices even though the county was registered heavily democratic.

In 1937, H.A. Spurlock, former druggist and adjutant

of the Corbie Ellington Post 126 of the American Legion was appointed chairman of the County Democratic Party. Dudley Caudill, cashier at the Peoples Bank was selected as campaign chairman for the Republican party. Judge Charles E. Jennings was elected treasurer of the Republican party. Mrs. Howard Hall and Mrs. Bethel Hall were co-chairmen of the young Republican Women, Miss Lottie Powers was treasurer, and Mrs. Belle Fannin was publicity chairman.

The republican party also had a young mens group that year. Clarence Allen was elected president; Ted Crosthwaite, secretary; and Charles Adams and William

Sheriff Ben McBrayer and County Attorney Richard Clay to produce the mule in court for the jury to examine.

Instead of taking the jury outside the courtroom to examine the mule, the sheriff and county attorney brought the "star" witness (a red mule) up the courthouse steps and up the stairs to the second floor courtroom.

Jailer Albie Hardin strongly objected to them bringing the mule into the courthouse because he was responsible for cleaning up the courtroom. But they brought the big red mule into the courtroom over the jailer's objections.

Although the mule was not sworn in, the judge and jury examined the mule for themselves.

Caudill were publicity chairmen. During the 1920s and 1930s, the republican party seemed not only better organized but better financed.

## The case of the "Whopper Jawed" mule

It was during the administration of County Judge I.E. Pelphrey that one of the most bizarre court cases in Rowan County was tried. It was known as the case of the "Whopper Jawed Mule," and required the wisdom of a "Solomon" to adjudicate.

It was during the fall of 1939 when Clint Cassity sold his big skinny red mule to Creed Norman. Before buying the mule, Mr. Norman looked carefully into the mule's mouth and his teeth looked solid, but he didn't notice the jaws, so he bought it.

After taking it home he discovered that the mule was so "whopper jawed" it could not eat corn off the cob. The corn had to be shelled and fed to the mule by hand. Mr. Norman told Mr. Cassity that he was too busy to shell corn and spoon feed that mule, and he wanted his money back.

Mr. Cassity said you looked in the mule's mouth and then you bought it. He refused to return the money and Mr. Norman sued him in county court.

After twice refusing to hear the case, a weary Judge I.E. Pelphrey set the case for trial. After the trial began, he ordered

They did determine the mule's jaws were back alignment and they rendered verdict in favor of Mr. Creed Norman. Mr. Creed Norman required to return Cassity's money. (Mr. Cassity strongly objected because the mule was never placed in a bath.)

## Political pendulum to democrat

Politics in Rowan County did not seem very interesting during the World War (1941-1945). In 1942, 2,000 votes were cast in Rowan County out of 6,000 registered voters.

There seemed to be no interest shown in politics away from home the battlefield. Dr. Elijah Monroe Hogge, a graduate of Morehead State and one of the young men ever to graduate from prestigious Washington Law School in Virginia, elected Rowan County Attorney in 1942.

A few months after the election, he entered the county as a first Lieutenant. During his tour of duty during the war, his father, Lester Hogge, was appointed acting county attorney by the governor to serve until Elijah returned home. When Elijah returned from military service, he returned with a bride, Miss Norma. They had two children, Leslie and E.M. "Roe" Hogge. Tragically both children died during childhood.

Elijah M. Hogge was Rowan County Attorney long and distinguished in politics, government, the judicial arena. Those positions he held Commonwealth Attorney, State Secretary, Transportation and the Kentucky Court of Appeals. But he was a Democrat leader in politics for many years, succeeding in helping return many counties back to the democrats.

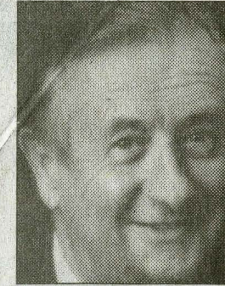

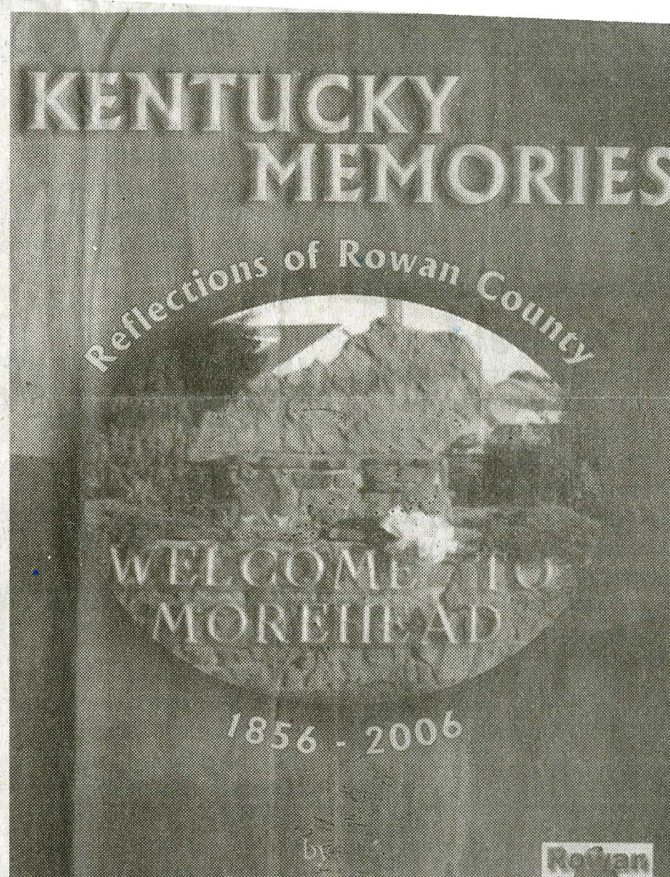
### Moratorium called for on candidate speeches

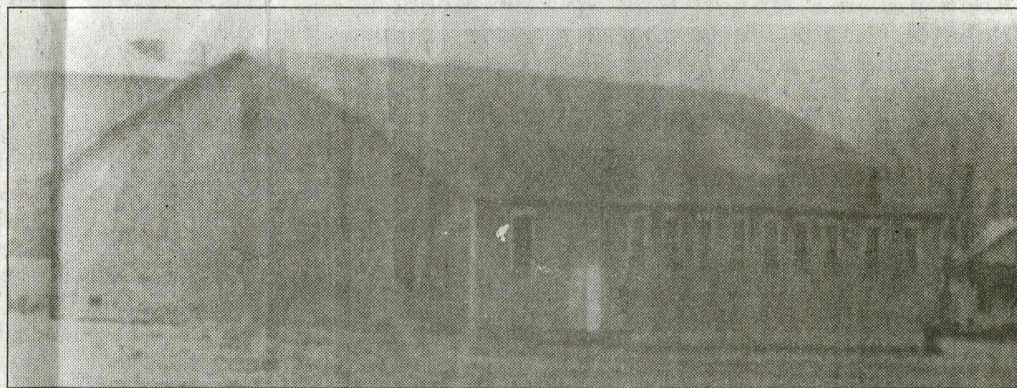

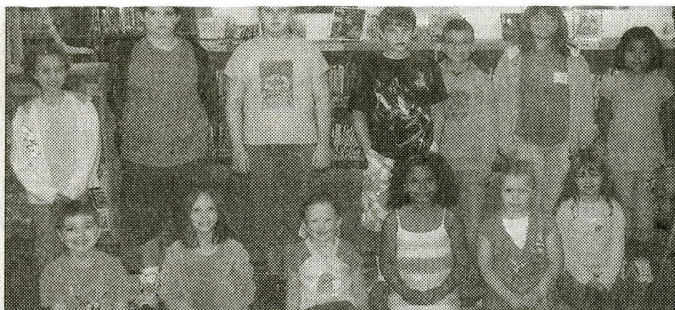
**Now:** Parking lot at the Warren H. Proudfoot School Administration Building at the corner of 2nd Street and Tippet Avenue.



**Then:** The site of Morehead High School's basketball arena, 1925-1960.

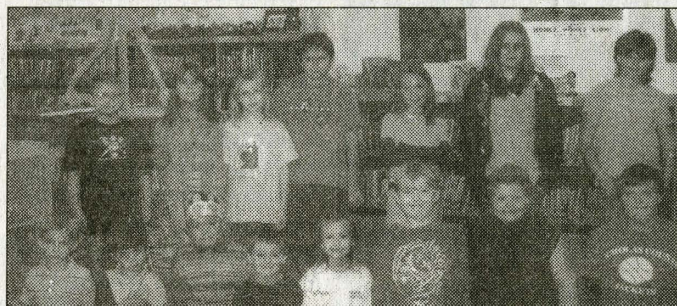

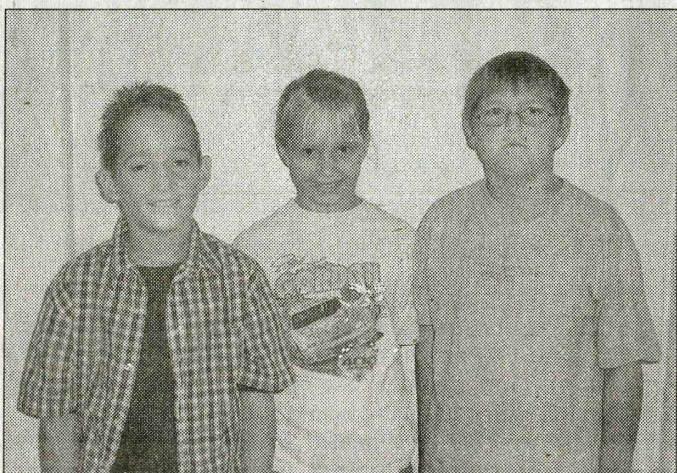

## Entire state eligible for FSA Emergency Loans

Farmers in all 120 Kentucky counties are eligible for federal disaster assistance, including low interest emergency (EM) loans from USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) provided eligibility requirements are met.

On Oct. 1, Acting Secre-

tary Chuck Conner declared the entire state of Kentucky a disaster area due to drought conditions and higher than normal temperatures that occurred on Feb. 1, and continuing.

All 120 Kentucky counties were named as pri-

mary counties where eligible family farmers may qualify for FSA EM loan assistance pursuant to Section 321(a) of the Consolidated Farm and Rural Development Act.

EM loan applications for physical and production losses will be received

through June 2, 2008, and applications pending on that date may be processed and completed.

Farmers interested in applying for assistance should contact their local FSA county office.

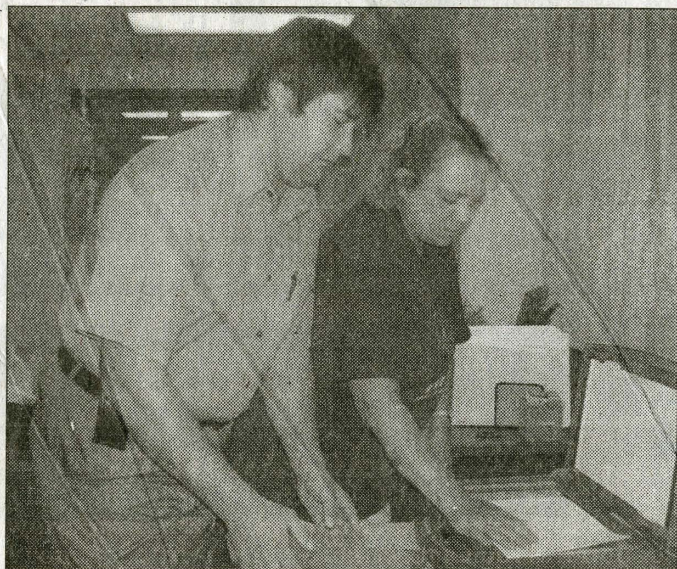

## Rowan County Government Part III

"All who have meditated upon the art of governing mankind have been convinced that the fate of the empire depends upon the education of youth." (Aristotle 338 B.C.)

During the late 1940s people in Rowan County and Kentucky, seemed to lose interest in politics and government. However, during the decade of the 1950s there was a move to re-kindle an interest in voting. In 1950 the Kentucky Farm Bureau had goals of renewing the public's interest in county government and voting.

The Rowan County Farm Bureau was a member of the Kentucky Farm Bureau. That county farm organization had a membership of 400 active members. It was the only farm organization in the county, and was organized March 23, 1946.

Although their goal was to promote the interests of agriculture in the county, they were also interested in promoting civic and community activity. One way they hoped to accomplish that task was by use of a "votemobile."

### "Votemobile" emphasized importance of voting

Perhaps because of the success of the Kentucky Bookmobile project in renewing an interest in reading, the Farm Bureau believed a "votemobile" would renew interest in voting. The "votemobile" was a little red, white and blue van.

Its purpose was to tour Kentucky heralding the theme of democracy and the importance of voting in preserving that democracy. It

carried such slogans as, "Your vote is your voice — let it be heard," and "Vote in the August 5 primary," and "Free to all over 21." (18-year-olds could not vote.)

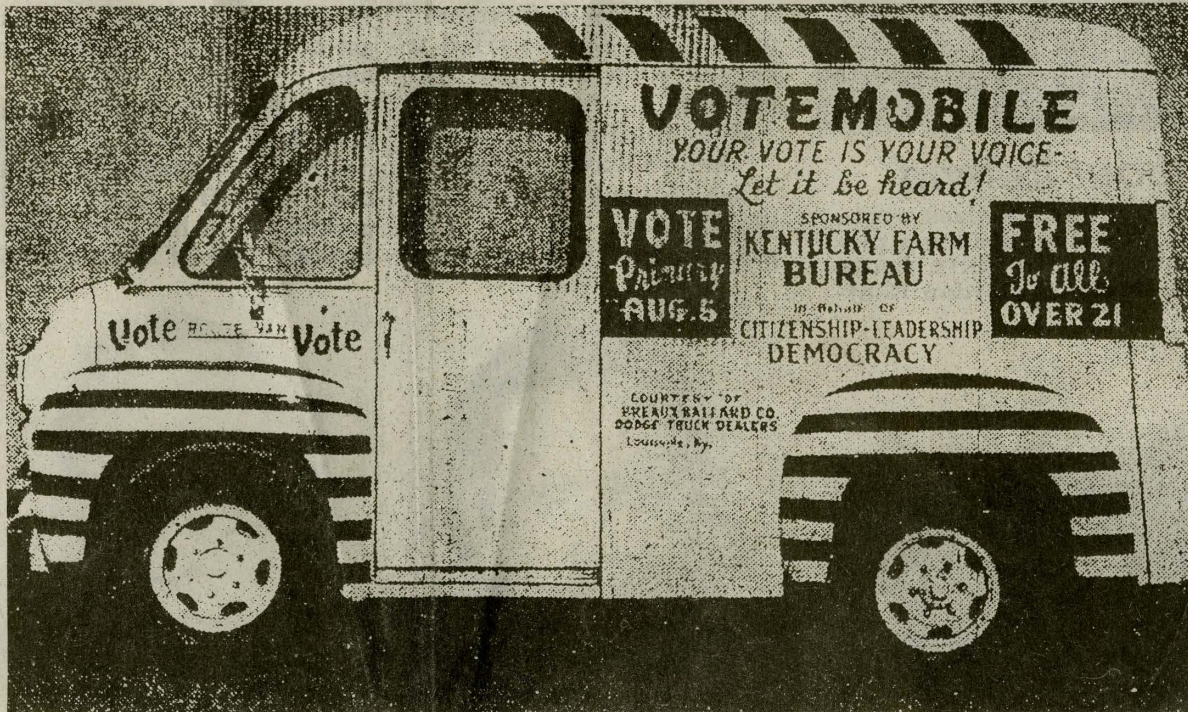
The "votemobile" appeared at Sharkey on Aug. 2, 1950 at a Rowan Farmers Field Day. It was a non-partisan, non-political attempt to get out the vote. It was successful in Rowan County because it seemed to generate a renewed interest in local government.

### 1950s brought heated elections

Many voters flocked to the polls in the 1953 election. Also the local elections were hotly contested. That was especially true in the Nov. 3, 1953 county election. In that election, W. T. McClain (Democrat) won over I.E. Pelphrey (Republican) by 311 votes, Austin Alfrey (R) won against James E. Clay (D) by only 11 votes. Kenneth Lewis (R) appeared to have won the race for sheriff until the absentee votes were counted. Those absentee votes gave Carl Jones the majority by 19 votes.

In the 1953 race for County Court Clerk, Ottist Elam (D) led the ticket by defeating Ray Moore (R) by 660 votes. Also, that year Mrs. Juanita Wilson was elected as Tax Commissioner. Therefore, she and Mrs. Elam were tied for the third female to be elected to a major office in Rowan County. (The two other women were County School Superintendents Cora Wilson Stewart and Lyda Messer Caudill.)

The county election in 1953 saw Rube Thomas (D) win over Elmer Planck (R) for Jailer, and Clark Lane (D) won over Meredith Stucky (R)

for Coroner. In the race for magistrate, Jesse McDaniel (D) won over Isaac Caudill (R), George Ellington (R) won over Warren Flannery (D), J. A. Hamm (D) won over C. W. Johnson (R), and Elmer Kinder (R) won over T. D. White (D).

In 1953 the Republicans captured the County Attorney's office and two of the four magistrates with the Democrats sweeping the other offices.

In 1953 Austin Alfrey with his friendly, outgoing personality and deep resonant voice was elected County Attorney for the first time by a margin of 11 votes. However, he succeeded in being re-elected three more terms until he was defeated by James E. Clay in 1966. Mr. Clay was County Attorney until 1974 when he was elected District Judge.

Herbert Bradley, one of Rowan County's most successful political office holders, was a former school teacher who entered politics. His first elected office was School Board member. Following that race, he was elected Circuit Court Clerk in 1952.

Mr. Bradley, a staunch Republican, held that office until his death in 1966. His daughter Corinne Castle served out his unexpired term until Wathan Armstrong (Democrat) took over that office.

### Local man ran for "Tick Commissioner"

Woodie Hinton, local humorist, philosopher, political analyst, and "a poor man's" Will Rogers, used to have a heyday in his column in the *Rowan County News* at election time. During one

election Woodie announced he was a candidate for "Tick Commissioner."

The reason he was running was because he had contracted tick paralysis as a result of a bite by the tick "Demacense Venuslus Andersonie." His platform was complete elimination of ticks. Although he recovered from tick fever, he was unsuccessful in his campaign. Woody said he lost the election because he failed to get the endorsement of Bob Taft, Albin Barkley, John Sherman Cooper, and the residents of "Podunk Holler."

Woodie said, "I understand that I must file an expense account of my campaign spending within 10 days of the election." His campaign

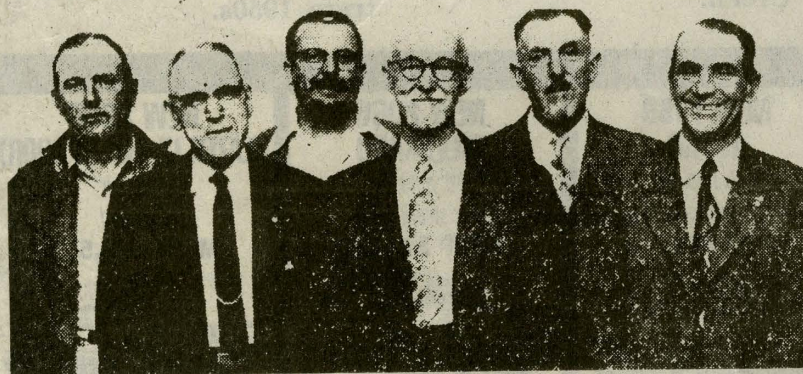

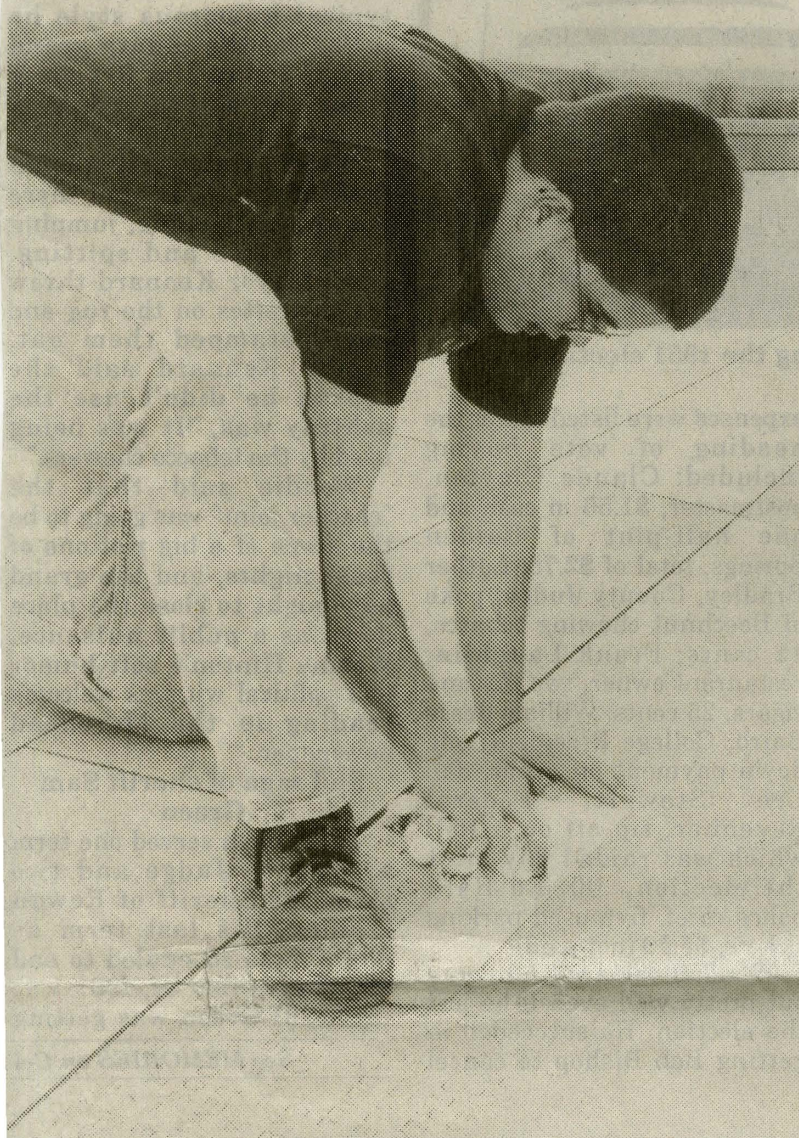

ready to eat New Year's Eve dinner when city patrolman Carl Johnson called his house and said he had a warrant for the arrest of Orville Perry for spouse abuse and asked Sam to help him serve the warrant. Sam told his wife to keep his supper hot, he would be back in a few minutes.

The local police knew the reputation of Orville Perry. He was a convicted felon who had served time in two federal prisons, but Sheriff Green had been on friendly terms with Orville and anticipated no problems. Sam was known as a fearless law enforcement officer who always tried to reason with those he was arresting.

#### Sheriff killed six hours before leaving office

Johnson and Green met on West Main Street and proceeded to the Perry home

on Lexington Street in West Morehead. The house was dark and quiet, as the two men cautiously approached. The Sheriff went to the rear of the house and knocked on the back door and identified himself and said they had a warrant for Orville Perry's arrest.

Before he was through speaking, he was shot point blank with a 20 gauge shotgun through the door killing him instantly. Carl Johnson ran around the house and was met with a blast that struck his gun which saved his life. Wounded, Patrolman Johnson got to his car and radioed for help.

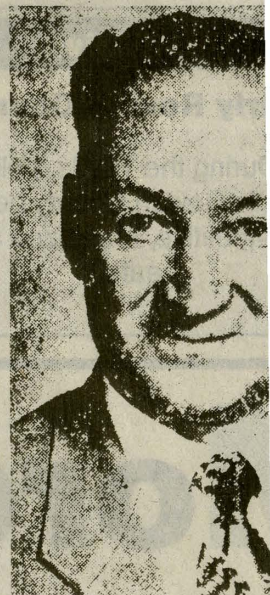
Mr. Perry was arrested a few hours later in the neighbor's woodshed. He had the Sheriff's gun and pocketbook in his possession. But the body of Sheriff Sam

Green was found in the rear doorway of the house, becoming the second county law enforcement official to be killed in office in Rowan County.

The first was Deputy Sheriff Baumgardener who was killed during the Rowan County feud in 1885.

Sheriff Sam Green did not have to respond to that request by Carl Johnson. He could have just said, my term as Sheriff has ended, but he did not, and was tragically killed just six hours before his term as Sheriff expired. His killer who never showed any remorse, was sentenced to life imprisonment.

But the saga of Sheriff Sam Green was a sad day in Rowan history. It could be said that he was one county office holder who gave his life for his county.



Sam Green elected judge and sheriff while serving a six hours before office as sheriff.



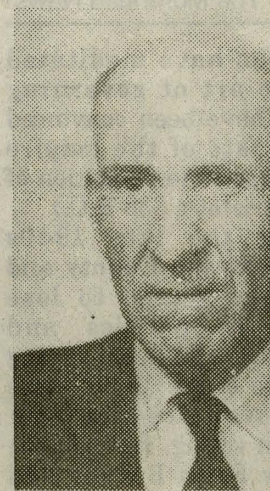

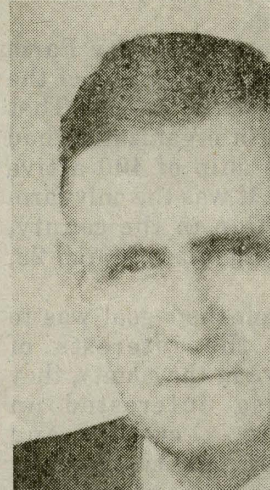

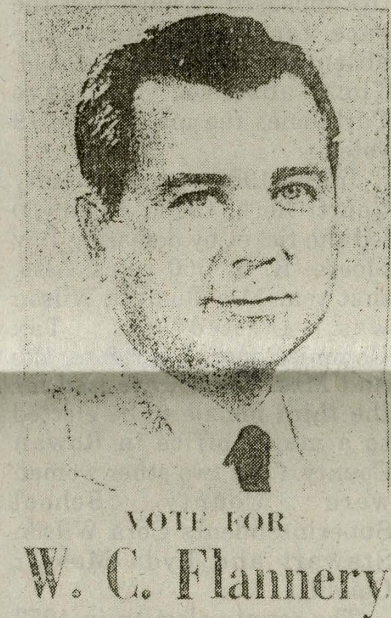

## Politics and courts in Rowan County

*"Justice standeth afar off; for truth is fallen in the street." (Is. 59:14)*

Thanks to Margaret Sue Morris and her family for giving this writer all of the family scrapbooks from which much of this information was taken. (Also this writer has been a part of this same family for many years and is familiar with many of these stories.)

A poem written by Cotton Noe, one time Poet Laureate of Kentucky, said, "Politics are the damndest" in Kentucky. Mr. Noe, who often spoke at Morehead State College, must have been referring to Morehead and Rowan County because that has certainly been the case in the history of our community. Also, the fact that Dr. Thomas D. Clark, former History Laureate of Kentucky, was riding through Morehead on a train with a politician who was asked to come out and speak to the crowd as the train stopped in the station. When Dr. Clark got up to go outside with him, the candidate said, "No, young man, you had better stay in the train because Morehead is a wild place."

#### Senator Sample grossly overpaid

November is the season of the year that also happens to be during the Thanksgiving season, and a time when families get together and stuff themselves with turkey and all the trimmings. After the feast, the usual entertain-

ment was to sit around the table and tell stories. Since Thanksgiving is near election time, many of these stories revolved around politics. (That was before television.) With full stomachs the family would tell legendary tales of people and politics in Rowan County, e.g. William Samples, local lumber dealer, editor of the Morehead Independent newspaper, one time state senator, and this writer's boss when I worked at his lumber company one summer, was always involved in politics. After being elected as a state senator the members of the Kentucky legislature voted for themselves a handsome raise. It was a figure that seemed quite generous in the era of the 1940s.

One afternoon Senator Sample and his friends were sitting in the Eagle's Nest drinking coffee, and Bill was talking about his job in Frankfort. The waitress overheard the conversation and said to Senator Sample, "Just what does a state senator do?" Bill said, "I don't do anything but go around on Friday and get my check." The waitress said, "Isn't that quite a bit of money for doing nothing?" Bill replied, "Yes dear, but you've got to realize that I am grossly overpaid."

#### New sheriff arrests old deputy county clerk

It was 1918 and Albert Caudill had worked for 20 years in the courthouse for his brother William Caudill, who was a Rowan County Clerk for many years. Norman Wells had just been elected to serve as sheriff. Albert was

known to be a heavy drinker and would often go to Mt. Sterling to buy his "booze." On Saturday night, Norman was on First Street near the Railroad Depot when Albert got off the train. He was drunk and was staggering across the street toward Royce's Boarding House and met the newly elected sheriff. The happy go-lucky drunk invited Norman to come into the boarding house where he lived and have a drink with him. Norman said, "No, I have to take you to jail." Albert then sobered up enough to say: "Take me to jail? Norman, you're just learning this job."

#### Dirty trick used mistaken identity

In 1948 Hubert Pennington, (father of now retired Rowan County attorney Harvey Pennington) was in a hotly contested race for county judge against Sam Green. There was another man in Morehead who closely resembled Hubert Pennington. On Monday before the election, the opposing political camp allegedly bought the look-alike a new suit of clothes, got him drunk, put him in a taxi and hauled him around all over Rowan County. They paraded the inebriated look-alike around in every precinct in the county so people could see the so-called next county judge. He was so drunk he couldn't even drive his own car. (Harvey Pennington verified this story and recalled as a four-year-old he passed out campaign literature for his father.) Needless to say Hubert Pennington lost that election.

#### Twice fined for same drunk

Young Tom Barker was known to get arrested almost every two weeks for public intoxication. He was usually released on Monday morning after being fined. On one occasion he was picked up again on Thursday. Judge Sammy Caudill said, "Tom, haven't you learned by now that it is expensive to get fined twice in one week?" Tom replied, "Judge, you can't fine me because this is the same drunk you fined me for Monday. That's double jeopardy!" Many of Tom's friends would tell him that he needed a lawyer. But Tom said, "Can't afford a lawyer but I can afford two or three witnesses."

#### Extra cost for furnishing witnesses

One of Rowan's elderly citizens who claimed to be a lawyer often would visit the jail on Monday morning to see who had been arrested that weekend. He would then announce to those who hired him that he had a special fee for a misdemeanor. Ten dollars for a straight case or twenty dollars if he furnished witnesses.

#### Caudillac case

Dan Caudill was running for Circuit Judge in the 1930s. He allegedly gave one of his campaign workers a large sum of money to buy votes. Instead, the campaign worker purchased himself a Cadillac. The story around Morehead became known as the "Caudillac Case."

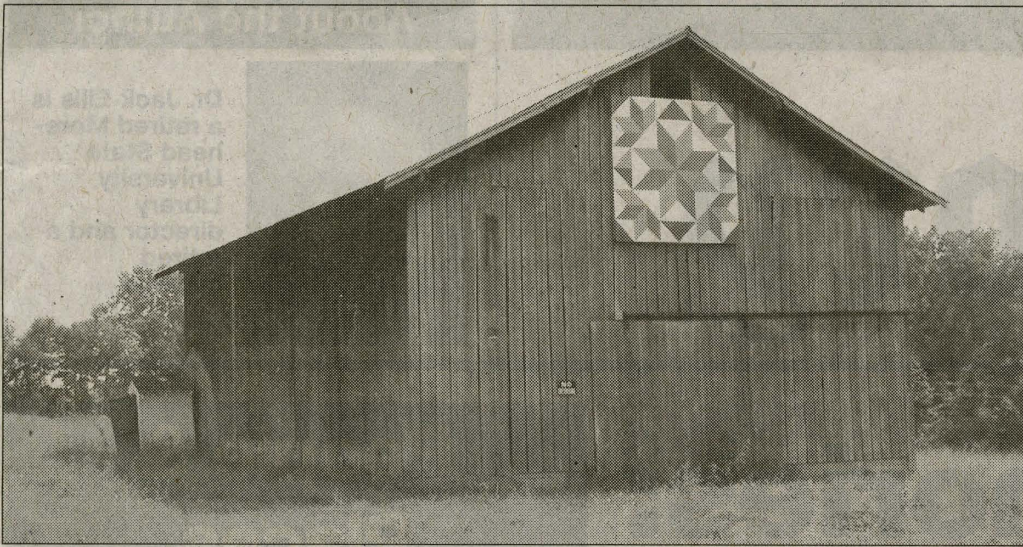

The lawyer and the accused then went into a separate room to discuss the case. After being in there for an unusually long period of time the judge sent Sheriff Bill Carter in to check on them. When he went in the room he found the young attorney all alone. The sheriff said, "Where's your client?" Robert said, "The last time I saw him he was headed for that pine thicket up on the

hill." The sheriff said, "What do you mean, did you help him escape?" "No, he didn't need much help, but I obeyed the judge's directive to give him the best advice I could."

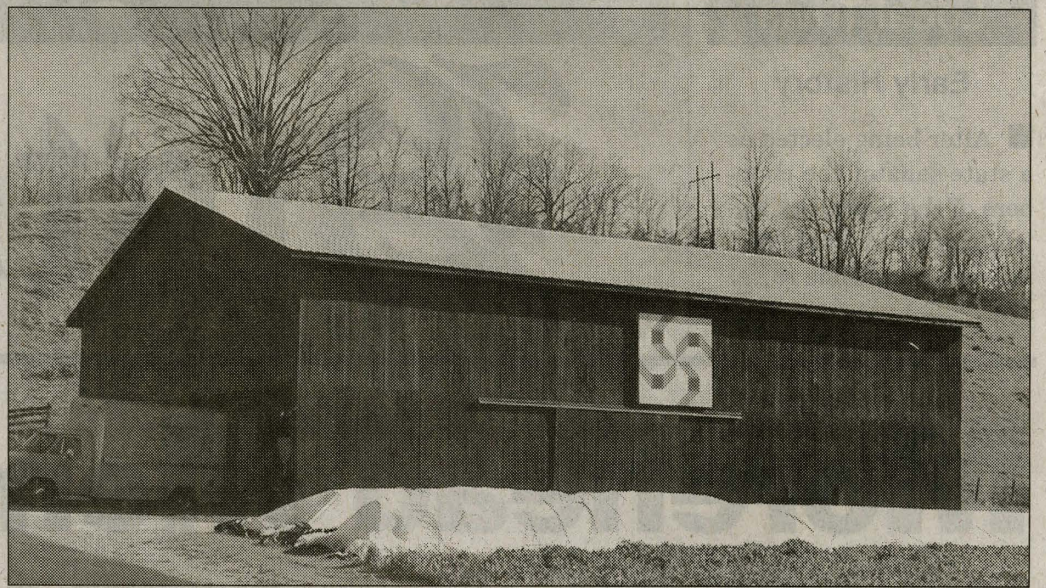
The sheriff said, "What did you tell him?" said, "After I heard his side of the story, I thought it was a lost case and I couldn't do much for him. Therefore, according to the judge's instructions, I gave him the best advice I could, which was head for the hills and don't stop!" When the judge heard the story he said, "Well, he should be fined for contempt," and then he broken down laughing.

These cases are just a few examples of the raw politics and court cases in Rowan County over the years.

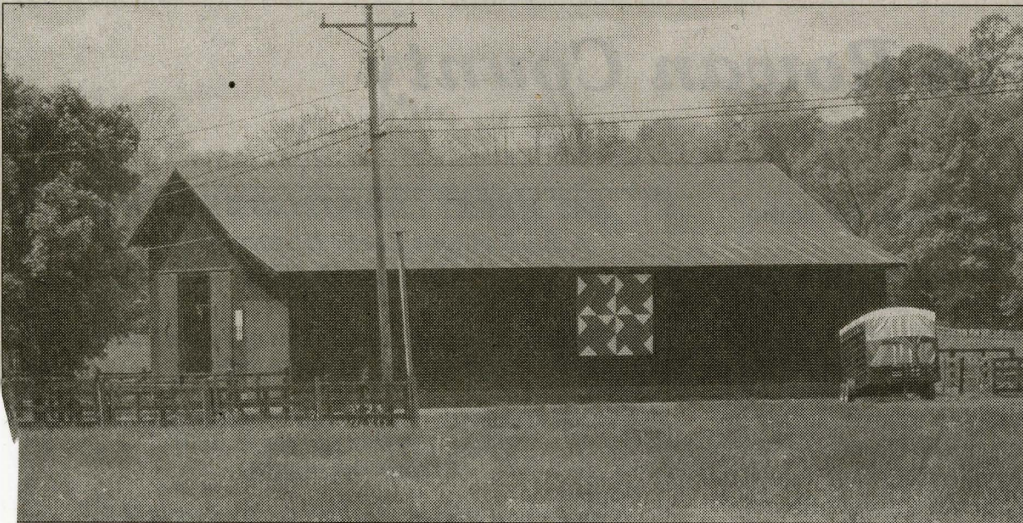

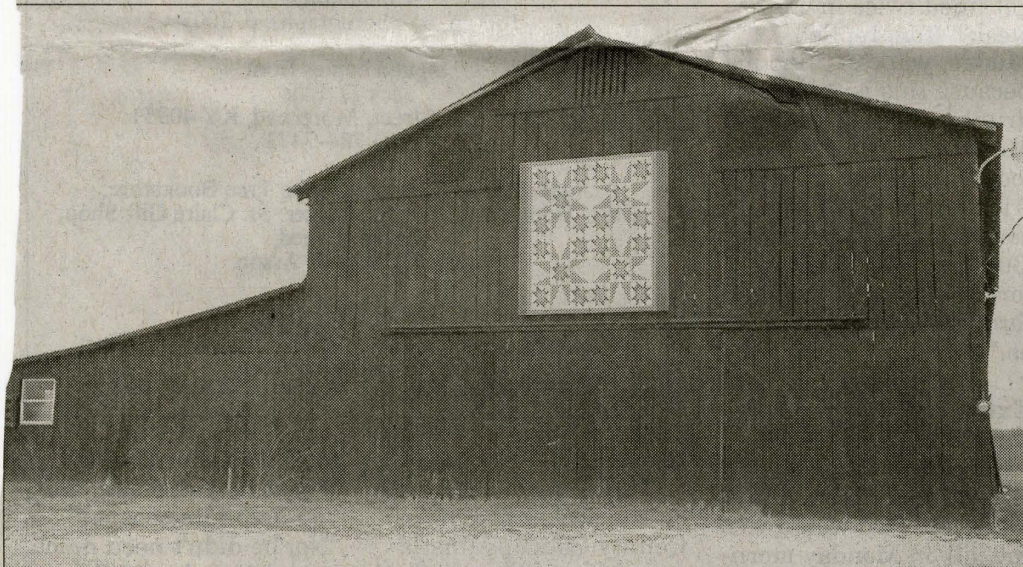

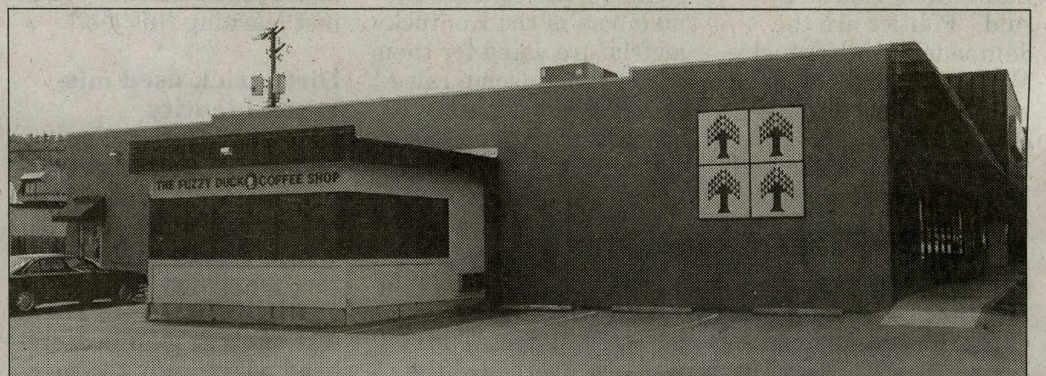

## KY receives \$500,000 to make college more adult-friendly

The Council on Postsecondary Education will receive \$500,000 from Lumina Foundation for Education for a statewide effort to increase the number of working-age adults with college degrees. The Kentucky Adult Learner Initiative will include a statewide review of policies that affect adult students and will grant each public four-year institution \$50,000 for plans to create or enhance adult-friendly policies and services.

cent to 4.5 percent for Kentucky to meet its goal to double the number of college graduates in the state by 2020.

"To meet our 2020 goals, we must meet the unique needs of nontraditional students who are trying to achieve their educational goals while balancing work and family responsibilities," said Brad Cowgill, interim president of the Council on Postsecondary Education.

The multi-year effort

ter the summit, a workgroup consisting of representatives from the Council, the General Assembly, postsecondary institutions, state government agencies, and the business community will begin to construct policy recommendations to make postsecondary education in the state more adult-friendly.

The workgroup will explore state and institutional level policies such as financial aid for non-traditional students, data systems to track adult

issues related to transfer. Based on the group's recommendations, the Council will work with postsecondary institutions to help implement institutional best practices. The Council will also present state-level policy recommendations to the 2010 General Assembly.

An advisory board with representation from public and private sectors will guide the Kentucky Adult Learners Initiative. The group held its first meeting in Frankfort.

### A bitter political pill

This article first appeared in February in The Morehead News.

"...That the purpose of God, according to election might stand." (Romans 9:11)

In its 150-year history, Rowan has always taken its politics seriously, many times to the point of violence. In the election of 1887, the Rowan County Feud began that resulted in more than 20 people being killed. However, one reelection in 1935 almost ended in violence again. It was a bitterly fought contest that could have ended in tragedy when A.B. "Happy" Chandler was elected Governor of Kentucky (1935-39). It was following Chandler's term as Lt. Governor under Governor Ruby Lafoon (1931-35). He was not Lafoon's choice to run for Governor, so while he was Lt. Governor, and Governor Lafoon was out of the state, he called a special session of the Legislature and changed the sys-

tem of primary elections and succeeded in beating Lafoon's choice in the primary, and also beating King Swope in the final election. The late Dr. Thomas D. Clark in his book "The Peoples House," called the years of Chandler's administration a time of great turmoil in Kentucky politics.

#### Rowan: in political turmoil

Although Democrat Chandler soundly defeated Republican Judge King Swope in the general election, he lost Rowan County by a considerable margin. Chandler attributed losing Rowan County to the long time republican leader in Rowan County, Judge Charles Jennings, whose father J.T. Jennings was elected as Rowan's representative to the Kentucky House of Representatives in the same election. That would come back to haunt Rowan County, Morehead State College, and politics in general.

Republican J. Troy Jennings, father of Rowan County Judge Charles Jennings, defeated Democrat J.J. Thomas of Bath Coun-

ty in the race for Kentucky's 96th District Representative. Republican Jennings won by a majority of 81 votes in a district of more than a 800 democratic majority. He ran on the popular platform that would "free old rover" (eliminate the dog tax in Kentucky), old age pensions and other reform planks. It was a hotly contested contest. The race was not decided until the last Owingsville precinct was counted, which further fueled the fire of political warfare in Rowan and Kentucky. (This writer used to live across the street from J. Troy Jennings and I remember him as an old man who lived out his life bitter and disillusioned and I never knew why until I wrote this article.)

#### Kentucky General Assembly rejected Rowan representative

When the general assembly met in January of 1936, the heavily Democratic Kentucky House of Representatives refused to seat J. Troy Jennings by a vote of 64-32. A special committee of 7 Democrats (no Republicans) recommended

that Republican Jennings be disqualified to hold his seat representing Rowan and Bath County. They further recommended that Democrat J.J. Thomas, who lost to Jennings, be seated as the representative of the 96th district.

Their reasoning as to why he was not allowed to serve was that his son Charles Jennings, Rowan County Judge, had formed a County Patrol of 25-75 men who were used extensively to quiet strikes and labor disputes at factories in Clearfield and Halde-man. During the Nov. 5, 1935 election, Judge Charles Jennings said he had used the county patrol to "keep order" at various polling places. (Surely Rowan County never needed guards at polling places on election day?) Since Rowan had always been a hotbed of political turmoil during elections, many who were voters said they felt much safer as a result of the patrol being there. (This writer can remember growing up, that there was usually a gun fight or fist fight every election day.)

Charged election not free

and open

The charges brought by the 7-member Democrat committee were: "After careful consideration the committee found evidence that the election in Rowan County on Nov. 5, 1935 was not a free and open election due to the fact that Judge Jennings secured a detail of Kentucky National Guard Troops and his own armed Rowan County Patrolmen who were present at Rowan Precincts 1, 2, 8, 10, and 16 and kept large numbers of legally qualified voters from casting their vote."

J. Troy Jennings who charged he was framed and tricked out of serving in the office to which he was lawfully elected, said, "My only regret is I am getting old and might die before I can run again. I would be elected in a landslide."

#### Regents resign; college loses accreditations

In January of 1936, soon after Governor Chandler took office, the entire Board of Regents of Morehead State College resigned at the request of the Governor. With a new Board appointed by Chan-

dler, Morehead College President John Howard Payne was soon out of office and Harvey A. Babb was inaugurated MSC President May 1, 1936. In a very short time President Babb announced there would be several changes at the College, particularly in the Athletic Department. Babb lasted only until Keen Johnson was elected the next Governor and he was soon out, and new President William H. Vaughn was appointed. It was President Vaughn who said if he was fired because of politics he would "take the college with him". He was and he did! At the time Bill Vaughn was severely criticized for eventually getting the College dropped from the Southern Association of Colleges list of accredited schools. (This writer was a student at that time.) Although President Doran was about as active in the political arena as anyone could be, when he was criticized for it, he would remind everyone of what happened to the College as a result of politics.

### History From D-1

This writer was at Vanderbilt's Peabody University Graduate School in the 1950s while Bill Vaughn was Dean of that great institution. When he learned a student from Morehead was there, he called me into his office and asked me many questions about who and what was happening in Morehead. We spent several spring afternoons talking about Morehead. Dr. Vaughn really had a soft spot in his heart for Morehead and Eastern Kentucky. He sincerely believed the institution would be made stronger because of what he did. He was right!

Shortly after Chandler took office all of the state road workers in Rowan County were fired or re-

signed. At that time the State District Office of Transportation was in Morehead but in a very few years the entire office was moved to Flemingsburg.

In today's political arena in Kentucky one would think that the very idea of any new Governor of Kentucky ever firing anyone or asking any state workers to resign was unheard of. It has always happened in our Commonwealth and probably always will. But in today's system it is much less frequent and less obtrusive.

### Politics and County Government

"The government shall be upon his shoulder" (Is. 9:6).

Early county government

The first officials elected political offices in Rowan County in 1856 were neither of the Democratic or American Union parties which were the dominant political parties of that time.

They were not of any particular political persuasion or creed.

Although it might be said that William Black, Rowan's first county judge could have been a subject for campaign finance reform because he was married to Neil Howard's daughter.

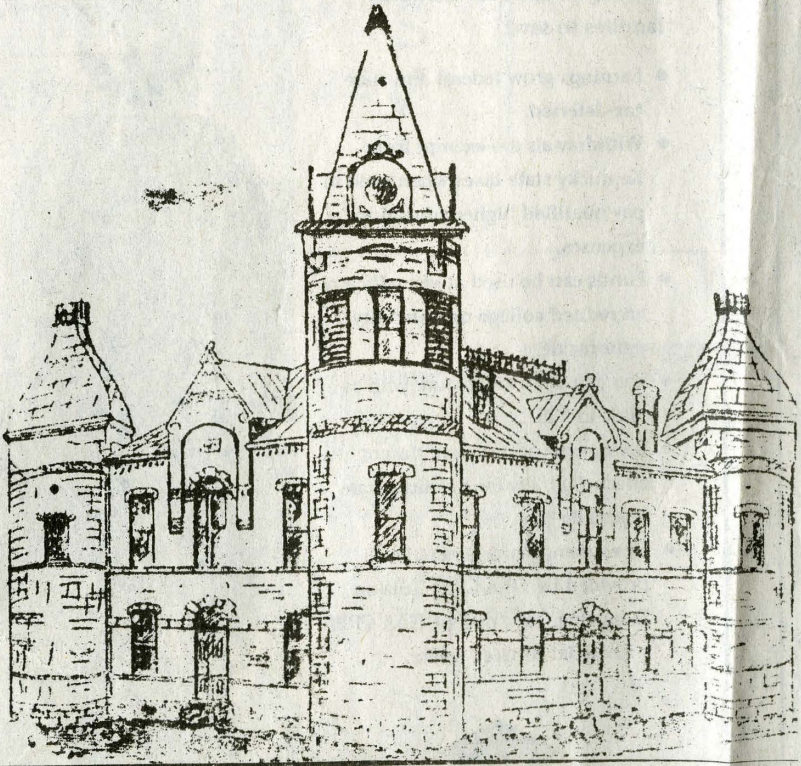
Howard was said to be the wealthiest man in Rowan County at that time, and some believed Black may have bought that election.

Black was later defeated by James E. Clarke when he moved here from Montgomery County and was elected county judge.

Howard Logan was Rowan's first county court clerk, and Isaac Johnson was the first sheriff. Both were popular, pioneer residents of Rowan and they were easily elected to office by the 442 who voted that year.

The first jailer was James Black and the county had to use the Fleming County jail until a jail was built here. It was while the Civil War was raging that E.H. Logan was elected as county clerk.

One of his duties was to register men for the local militia. The militia could be called upon to defend people and property

Twenty-two men were killed before the violence ended on June 22, 1887, with a gun battle in Morehead. During that time, Rowan almost ceased to be a county, but gradually overcame its reputation as a lawless county.

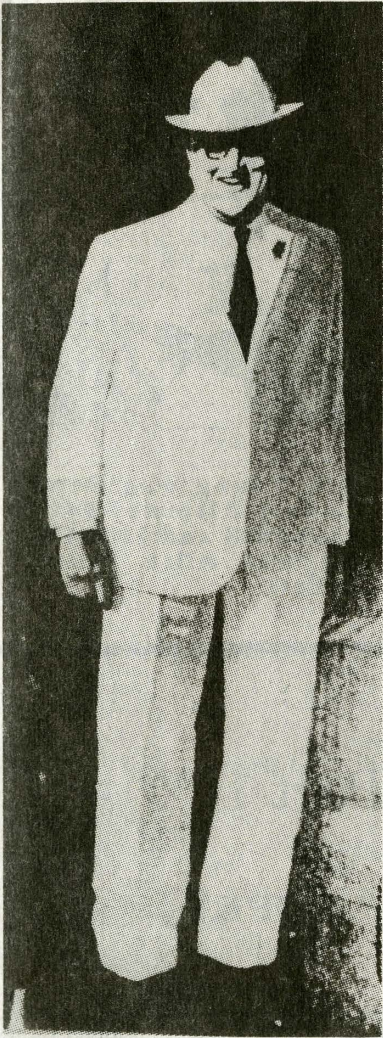
New Kentucky constitution

In 1894, Kentucky had adopted a new constitution that provided for the elected county

1899.

The two Harrison sisters left Hillsboro before daylight in a "hack" which was a wagon with a canvas top but no sides. They rode a ferry across Licking River into Bath County at Wyoming, Kentucky.

There they boarded another "hack" which brought them to Preston where they boarded one of three daily trains to Morehead, arriving after dark

against night riders and guerrillas that were prevalent during the Civil War.

They were the local equivalent of today's National Guard and Logan registered 307 able-bodied men for the local militia. (I wonder where that militia was when Morehead was held hostage for three days and on May 21, 1864, the courthouse was burned to the ground by guerrillas).

For 20 years after the Civil War, Rowan County politics began to peacefully polarize between the democrats and republicans. (The republicans by that time had replaced the American Union Party).

Although running for county office following the Civil War was sometimes heated, there was never any violence. But that changed on election day Aug. 4, 1884, when politics turned deadly.

#### **Election day brought violence**

In 1884, Cook Humphrey, a republican, was elected by a majority of one vote, and the democrats claimed the election had been stolen from them.

After the polls closed, shots were fired and one man was killed and one wounded.

The violence escalated for the next three years, when Rowan County's elected officials were either killed or left the county.

County Attorney Z.T. Young, father of Judge Allie W. Young, was one official who fled for his life, along with Cook Humphrey. Rowan was a violent place at that time and was described as a county without schools, courts or churches.

political office of circuit clerk, county clerk, county judge, sheriff, school superintendent and county attorney.

Later, other officials such as commissioners, jailer, road supervisor, surveyor, tax assessor, justice of the peace, and coroner were elected.

After extensive research this writer has collected in one place a list of those original six county constitutional officials elected in Rowan County from 1894-2000.

Locating that information required examining over 50 biannual publications of Kentucky county elected officials in the Kentucky Department for Libraries and Archives in Frankfort.

The population of Rowan County in 1860 was 2,282. However, by 1900, the population had increased almost 400 percent to 8,277.

People were migrating into Rowan County from far and near. By 1881, Morehead began to really grow with the coming of the railroad and the expansion of the timber and stone industry. Also the founding of the Morehead Normal School in 1887 contributed significantly to that growth.

#### **Families move to Morehead**

One of many families moving to Rowan County during the late 1800s was the Harrison family that moved from Hillsboro in Fleming County to Morehead in 1899. Harrison sent his two oldest daughters to Morehead to enroll in the Morehead Normal School.

Janie, who later became Mrs. Harlan Powers, prepared a typed statement describing the family move to Morehead in

(The present freight station was the passenger depot at that time). The two girls stayed at the Raine Hotel until the rest of the family arrived.

Mr. Anderson Miller, the father of Dorothy Holbrook, was the ticket agent, and John Anglin, father of Mrs. Warren Lappin, was the railroad freight agent.

There was a mail "hack" that met the train and hauled mail and passengers to West Liberty. Jack Cole was the driver and he left Morehead one day, stayed overnight in West Liberty and returned the next day.

Mrs. Janie Powers wrote: "The next day the rest of the Harrison family including six brothers, mother and father arrived by wagon with all their furniture and personal belongings.

They came on the regular road from Hillsboro that followed Fox Valley and came up the hill at what is now Sharkey.

From there, they came to Morehead across what they called "The Divide." The divide was what old-time residents called Divide Hill. That is the hill between what is now the older part of Morehead and I-64. (That's where the water tank is now located).

Harrison was a marble cutter by trade and he set up what was called the marble shop on Main Street where the Citizens Bank is now located.

He specialized in elaborately carved designs, names and dates on tombstones and soon established a flourishing business.

As families such as the Harrisons moved into Morehead,

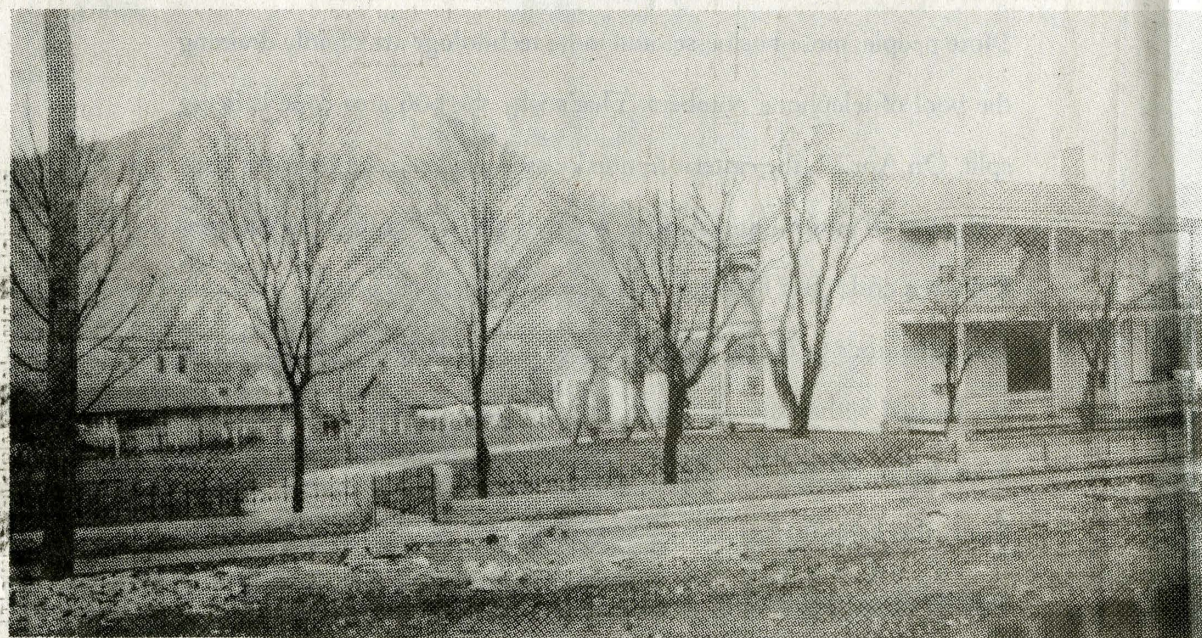

and, as the economy grew in Rowan County there was a demand for more county government and services.

Following the adoption of Kentucky's new constitution in 1894, the first elected officials in Rowan County were: D.G. Hamm, circuit court clerk; A. Crosthwaite, county judge; M.F. Fouch, sheriff; Hiram Bradley, school superintendent and J.W. Riley, county attorney.

J.W. Riley was one of Kentucky's most prominent attorneys. He was the first Rowan County attorney elected under the new constitution and served from 1894-1902.

He was later elected county judge from 1910-1918 and from 1922-1926. He later was elected circuit judge for many years. Other early county attorneys were T.W. Rose, Z.T. Young and Elijah Hogge.

Z.T. Young was the father of judge Allie Young and had been county attorney during the Rowan County Feud. However, he was re-elected as county attorney from 1902-1906.

**Hogge and Caudill early attorneys**

Elijah "Mighty E" Hogge was the colorful Rowan County Attorney from 1910-1914. He married Maggie Allen and they had five children: Irene, Elsie Lee, Walter and twins Robert and Mary.

They lived on North Wilson Avenue in a large white house with a screened side porch and an open front porch. "Mighty E" was a name given to Hogge to distinguish him from others with the same name.

Although it was a nickname, it appeared on some of the deeds and court documents of that day. Hogge attended Morehead Normal School, then "read law" under the guidance of Judge Allie W. Young.

Later, he and Young were law partners and shared an office together until Young was elected to the state legislature. Their office was in what is now the oldest building in Morehead.

It is owned by Morehead State University and is located on University Boulevard near the old courthouse. (The Rowan County Historical Society is trying desperately to preserve and restore that building. Hopefully they can be successful in preserving this very historic building).

Another local leader who was prominent in county government was D.B. Caudill. He was elected Rowan County Attorney from 1918-1922.

He was perhaps the best qualified to hold that office up to that time. Caudill attended Morehead Normal School and studies banking and law at Valparaiso Normal School in Indiana.

He was admitted to the Kentucky Bar Association in 1906. In 1908, he married Elta Proctor in a ceremony conducted by the Reverend F. C. Button. The five children born to this family were: Lucille, Milton, Boone, Patty and Claire Louise. (This distinguished family has been written about extensively in other articles).

Attorney D.B. Caudill lived on Wilson Avenue in a large two-story white house. He was considered comfortable in the court room. In 1933, he was elected circuit judge.

Caudill had a long and distinguished career as an attorney, judge, banker and was one of Eastern Kentucky's greatest political and business leaders.

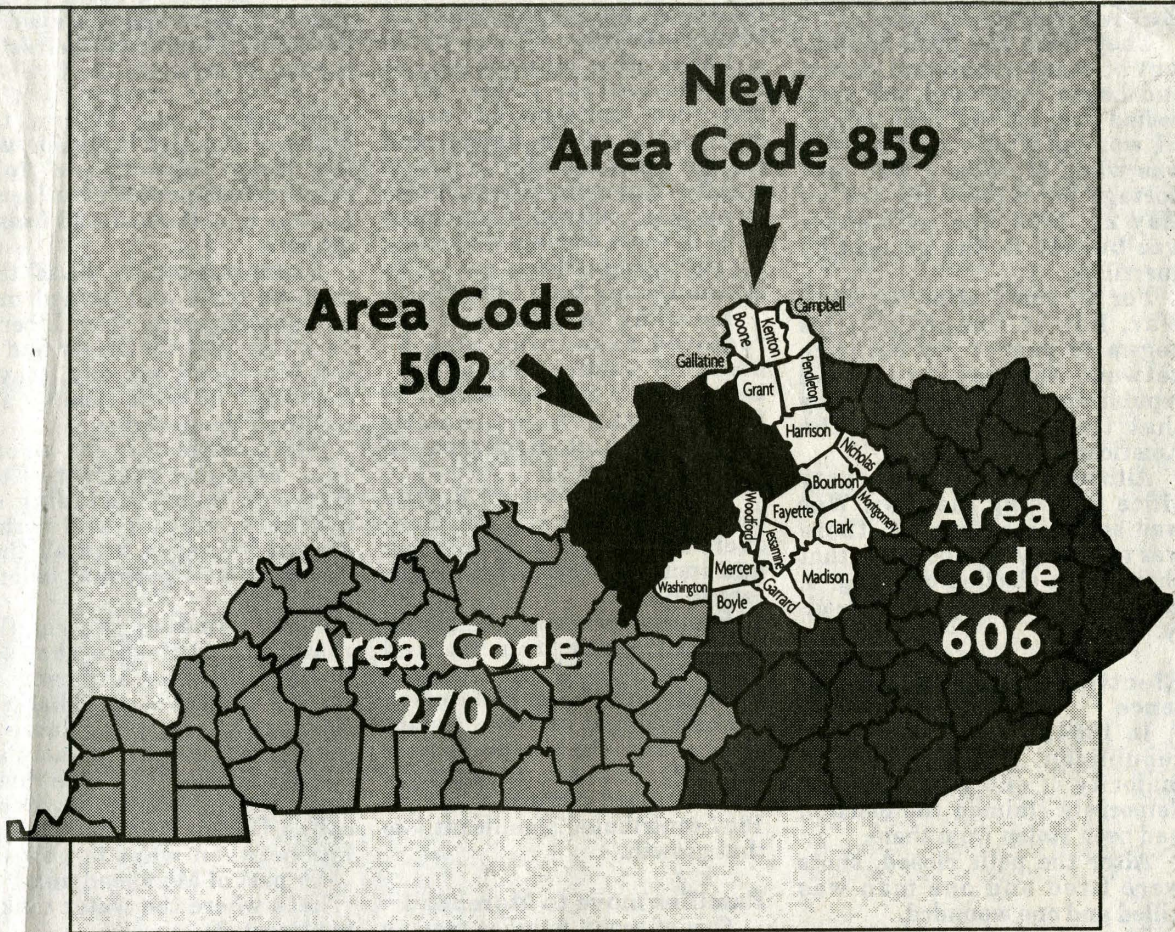

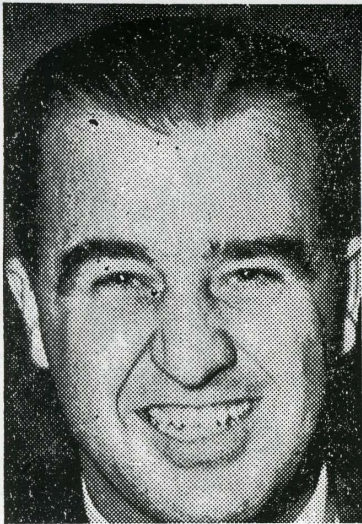

to Rowan County.

From 1900 to 1912, Farmers, with four lumber mills and the stone quarry and saw mill, in which Dr. VanAntwerp was engaged, was the largest producer of carload freight on the entire C&O Railway system.

"Dr. Van" was 68 at the time of his death.

The stone business was closed out a year after his death and the orchard sold in 1943.

## One Hundred Years Ago Only 343 Votes Were Cast In Rowan County For President

Only five times since its organization in 1856, has Rowan County failed to give the winning presidential candidate a majority of its votes.

This fact was disclosed in a search of state records in Frankfort, which are available for the entire period from Rowan's inception, 100 years ago.

Only in 1880, 1884, 1892, 1916 and in 1952, did the national winner fail to get a majority of votes cast in Rowan County. This has led to the county's being widely regarded as a "bellwether" county in national races, and the results here are widely studied for trends, long before the national picture is completed.

First returns from Rowan County elections were available in the year the county was established. With only 343 persons voting, the Democratic party (which held principles that are similar to the Republican party today) received 237 votes, to 106 for the "American" party, which was the Democrat party of its day.

Four years later, in 1860, the Democratic party polled 189 votes, to 1 for the American party, 23 for the Independent Democratic party and 121 for the Union party (forerunner of the present-day Republican party).

In 1864, with the War Between the States at its height, voting dropped off, according to Frankfort records, with only 73 persons casting ballots. The results: Democratic party 23, Union party, 49.

The Republican party, which evolved from the Civil War-born Union party, apparently took root in Rowan County and

Woodrow Wilson, but Wilson won the election.

Not until 1952, when President Eisenhower won over Adlai Stevenson, did the county again run contrary to the national trend. Stevenson's majority was 235.

Although Rowan County has long been regarded as "close" politically, most informed observers say that the Democrat party now holds an edge of approximately 750 votes in straight-party voting.

## Democrats Win Most Rowan Offices In November General Election; Republicans Get County Attorney And Two Magistrates

### Alfrey Victor By 11; Jones Has Close Call

The Democrats salvaged most of the big plums but Republicans shook the tree for one major and two minor offices in Rowan County's general election Tuesday's vote entrenched the Democrats more strongly in the courthouse than at any time since Rowan became a county 97 years ago.

Democrats will hold all the principal county offices for the next four years with exception of County Attorney. In that race Austin Alfrey nosed out James

E. Clay by 11 votes. The decision was in doubt until the count was complete as Alfrey entered number 21 (west Morehead), last ward to be tabulated, with a lead of only one vote. He carried number 21 by 10 ballots to give him the victory edge.

Second closest call for any candidate was in the Sheriff's race as Carl Jones, Democrat, edged Kenneth Veneill, Republican, by only 19 votes. The last precinct also decided this nip and tuck battle. Veneill held a 34 vote majority going into number 21 but Jones carried the precinct by 23 votes.

The second (or short ballot) amendment also narrowly carried in Rowan by 108 majority. The totals on amendment 2: Yes 664, No 556.

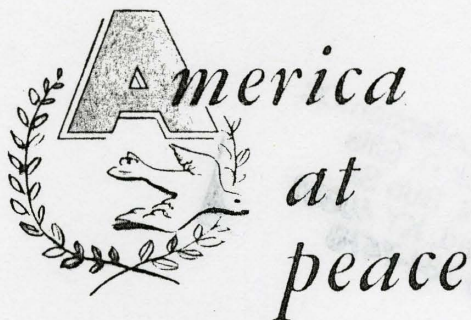
State-wide amendment number one carried by almost three to one, but the second amendment was voted down.

Rowan's vote was the heaviest in history as approximately 5,000 went to the polls, eclipsing the previous record set in last year's presidential election by almost 500. A check of records reveals that 95 per cent of the people voted in Tuesday's election.

Mrs. Juanita Helen Wilson, Democrat, was elected Tax Commissioner, without opposition. She succeeds Riley Cline, Democrat, who did not seek reelection.

### Swope Wins County 208; McKinney Piles Up 1299; Hinton Is Given 826

The Republican broom worked perfectly here Tuesday and literally swept the Democratic ticket into defeat by majorities ranging from 43 to 1299. 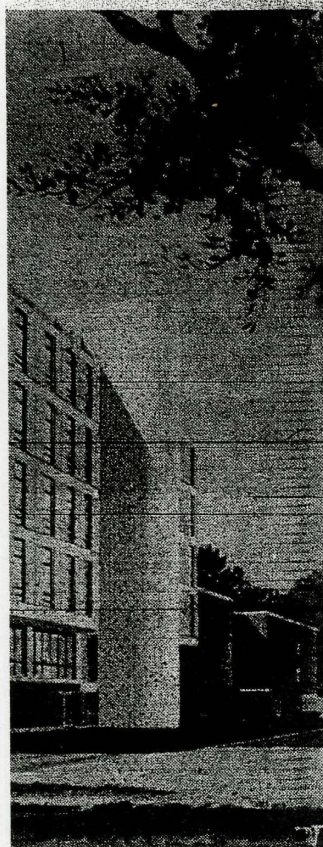

## Average Burley Support Price Set At \$65.80

Grade-by-grade support prices for the 1969 crop of burley tobacco were announced today in Lexington by the Burley Tobacco Growers Cooperative Association, which administers the price support program for burley in Kentucky, Ohio, Indiana, West Virginia and Missouri. The rates represent an average support price level of \$65.80 a hundred pounds, about 3.6 percent above the \$63.50 average level of supports for the 1968 crop. Supports by grades this year will range from a high of \$78 a hundred pounds for top quality flyings and lugs, to a low of \$34 a hundred for nondescript.

Republicans Tuesday broke the monopoly that democrats have held in the Rowan County courthouse for the past four years, by capturing three offices and a magisterial post. Republican Ottis Caldwell, Farmers, defeated democrat Clyde Litton for County Judge. Democrats have held the Judgeship for almost 25 years. Democrat incumbent Circuit Court Clerk Wathan Armstrong was unseated by republican Ralph Early for a six year term. Republicans also captured the Coroner's job as Calvin Ray Lytle trounced democrat Jesse McDaniel. Carl Jones, democrat, won for Sheriff; and incumbent democrat Jailer Jessie Anderson was re-elected. The race that attracted the most interest was the Judgeship. Caldwell's majority was 395 as he won 10 of the 13 precincts. Litton carried three precincts and the absentees. However, the election board may change Caldwell's majority to 187. 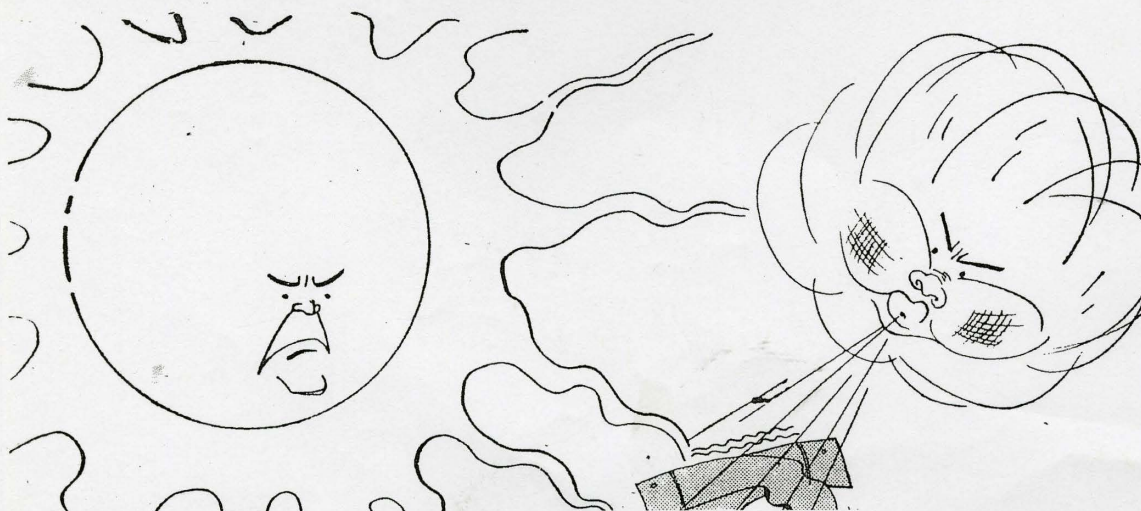

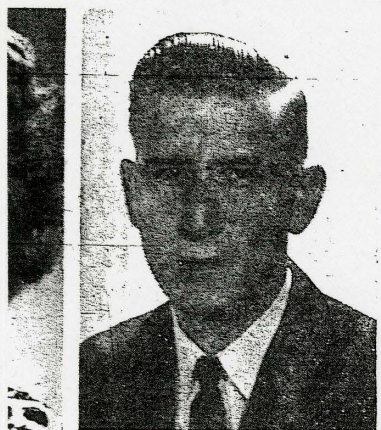

With nine precincts and the absentee ballots counted the Tuesday election picture in Rowan County looks like this:

Charles Hart has been elected State Representative on the strength of over 1,100 majority in Bath County. He and Mayor William H. Layne are staging a close race in Rowan County.

W. C. Flannery, Democrat, has been elected County Judge. He is leading by 665 with 40 per cent of the vote tabulated and should win by more than 1,200.

Austin N. Alfrey, Republican, apparently has been reelected for a four year term over George I. Cline. Alfrey leads by 256 but the trend from here on in is in his favor.

C. E. Lewis, Elliottville, Republican, has probably unseated Carl Jones at the courthouse. Lewis had a 93 vote advantage, and also the advantage of a trend. It would take a change in the count to elect Jones.

Ottist W. Elam will win reelection as County Clerk by over 1,500. She is ahead by 737.

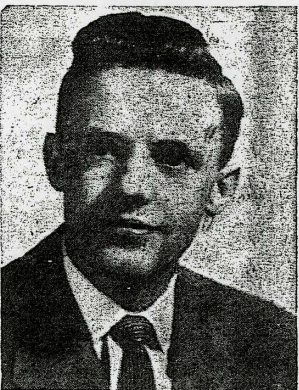

Somehow, somewhere, I lost the card telling of the titles of Sides 1 and 2. As I recall they were entitled "A. Lincoln in Illinois," and "Lincoln's First Inaugural Address." The excerpts found on Side 1, were taken from The Prairie Years and those found on Sides 2, 3, and 4 were taken from The War Years.

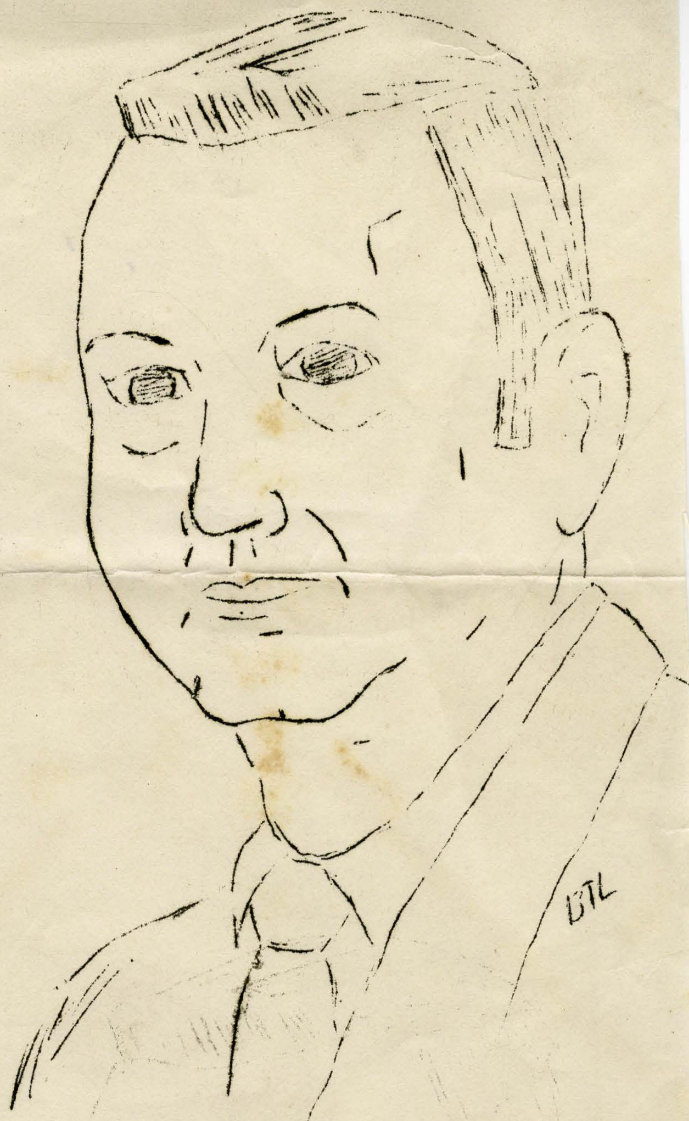

## POLITICS

It is said the "politics in Kentucky is the damnedest" and Rowan County is no exception. Many of the most exciting and well-known people in Rowan County have been involved in politics.



Judge Allie Young, who was running for state senator, had given his son, Taylor, one hundred dollars. Mrs. Young, who was very frugal, got wise to it and ran from her home on Main Street to Taylor's home on Wilson Avenue.

She jumped up on Taylor's porch and jerked open his door and lit in on her husband, the judge. She started beating him over the head with a paper and he ran out of the house and was running down the street holding his pants up. He was yelling, "Come on you poor people and help your senator!"

Taylor was way behind him yelling, "I'm with you old hoss!"

This "parade" went on until midnight with people lined up on the street watching them.

The fighting among the Young family went on almost every night. People would often close their stores to watch the fight.

When Cora Wilson Stewart, who started the Moonlight Schools, came to town, everyone knew it because she was considered high society. She had been married three or four times and her father always told her, "Cora, you're a smart woman, but you don't know a damn thing about men!"

Judge J. W. Riley, one of Eastern Kentucky's most active political figures was 80 years old Monday--April Fools' day in 1946. On his 80th birthday, Judge Riley, the man whom the old timers say "came into Rowan County with a candidate card in his hand", locked his office, retired from 50 years of law practice, and resigned his position as United States Commissioner.



Some 40 years before, Judge Riley vowed that when and if he became 80 years of age, he would retire--and he did.

Receiving his license to practice in 1892, Judge Riley immediately entered the race for the Democratic nomination for judge of Rowan County. He was nominated and elected in one of the bitterest fights the county had ever had. In 1909, he ran and was elected to the county attorneyship. He was re-elected in 1914. From then until 1921, he served as mayor and on the city council of Morehead and again won the county judgeship.

When John Young Brown was running for governor against Happy Chandler, Mr. Brown was being introduced by Judge Riley. In his introduction of Mr. Brown, he made reference to a former introduction of Happy Chandler by Warren Lappin. He had said Mr. Chandler was a man on campus who had just changed his politics a week before from Republican to Democrat. "You know the man I have reference to. He looks like he's been weaned on a pickle!"

\*\*\*\*\*

Bill Sample was, at one time, a Kentucky State Senator and always involved in politics. The Rowan County News once reported the salaries of state senators and, for the time, it was a rather large sum.

Mr. Sample was in the Eagles' Nest one day when one of the waitresses asked him what he did as a senator. He replied, "I don't do anything but go around on Friday afternoon and pick up my check."

She said, "Well, isn't that quite a bit of money to pay you for not doing anything?"

He said, "Yes honey, it is. But you'll have to realize that I'm grossly overpaid."

## MOREHEAD MEMORIES: PEOPLE & PLACES

### A BITTER POLITICAL PILL

"... That the purpose of God, according to election might stand" (ROMANS 9:11)

In its 150 year history, Rowan has always taken its politics seriously, many times to the point of violence. In the election of 1887, the Rowan County Feud began that resulted in more than 20 people being killed. <sup>However, one</sup> The election in 1935 <sup>almost ended in violence</sup> did not end in violence. <sup>again, it</sup> But it was a bitter fought contest that could have ended in tragedy when A.B. "Happy" Chandler was elected Governor of Kentucky (1935-1939). <sup>It was Chandler's</sup> following a term as Lt. Governor under Governor Ruby Lafoon (1931-1935). He was not Lafoon's choice to run for Governor, so while he was Lt. Governor, and Governor Lafoon was out of the state, he called a special session of the Legislature and changed the system of primary elections and succeeded in beating Lafoon <sup>as</sup> choice in the primary, and also beating <sup>King Swope</sup> Schafe in the final election. The late Dr. Thomas D. Clark in his book "*The Peoples House*," called the years of Chandler's administration a time of great turmoil in Kentucky politics.

### ROWAN: IN POLITICAL TURMOIL <sup>King</sup>

Although Democrat Chandler soundly defeated Republican Judge <sup>Ken Swope</sup> in the ~~state-wide~~ in the general election, he lost Rowan County by a considerable margin.

Chandler attributed losing Rowan County to the long time republican leader in Rowan County, Judge Charles Jennings, who's father J.T. Jennings was elected <sup>as Rowan's Representative</sup> to the Kentucky House of Representatives in the same election. That would come back to haunt Rowan



County, Morehead State College, and politics in general.

Republican J. Troy Jennings, father of Rowan County Judge Charles Jennings, defeated Democrat J.J. Thomas of Bath County in the race for Kentucky's 96<sup>th</sup> District Representative. <sup>Republican</sup> Jennings won by a majority of 81 votes in a district of more than a 800 democratic majority . He ran on the popular platform that would "free old rover" (eliminate the dog tax in Kentucky), old age pensions and ~~more of the~~ <sup>other</sup> reform planks. It was ~~a hotly~~ <sup>hotly</sup> contested contest. The race was not decided until the last Owingsville precinct was counted, ~~oil of which~~ <sup>further</sup> fueled the fire of political warfare in Rowan and Kentucky. (This writer used to live across the street from J. Troy Jennings and I remember him as an old man who lived out his life bitter and disillusioned and I never knew why until I wrote this article.)

### KENTUCKY GENERAL ASSEMBLY REJECTED ROWAN REPRESENTATIVE

When the general assembly met in January of 1936, the heavily Democratic Kentucky House of Representatives refused to seat J. Troy Jennings by a vote of 64-32. A special committee of 7 democrats <sup>no</sup> ~~not~~ republicans recommended that Republican Jennings be disqualified to hold his seat representing Rowan and Bath County. They further recommended that Democrat J.J. Thomas, who lost to Jennings, be seated as the representative of the 96<sup>th</sup> district.

Their reasoning as to why he was <sup>not</sup> ~~no~~ allowed to serve was that his son Charles Jennings, Rowan County Judge, had formed a County Patrol of 25-75 men who were used extensively to quiet strikes and labor disputes at factories in Clearfield and



Haldeman. During the November 5<sup>th</sup>, 1935 election, Judge Charles Jennings said he had used the county patrol to "keep order" at various polling places. (Surely Rowan County never needed guards at polling places on election day?) Since Rowan had always been a hot bed of political turmoil during elections, many who were voters said they felt much safer as a result of the patrol being there. (This writer can remember growing up, that there was usually a gun fight or fist fight every election day.)

J. Troy Jennings who charged he was framed and tricked out of serving in the office to which he was lawfully elected, said, "My only regret is I am getting old and might die before I can run again. I would be elected in a landslide."

REGENTS RESIGN - COLLEGE LOSES ACCREDITATION  
In January of 1936, soon after Governor Chandler took office, the entire Board of Regents of Morehead State College resigned at the request of the Governor. With a new Board appointed by Chandler, Morehead College President John Howard Payne was soon out of office and Harvey A. Babb was inaugurated MSC President May 1, 1936. In a very <sup>short</sup> ~~short~~ time President Babb announced there would be several changes at the College



particularly in the Athletic Department. Babb lasted only until <sup>Ken</sup> ~~Ken~~ Johnson was elected the next Governor and he was soon out, and new President William H. Vaughn was appointed. It was President Vaughn who said if he was fired because of politics he would "take the college with him." He was and he did! At the time Bill Vaughn was severely criticized for eventually getting the College dropped from the Southern Association of Colleges list of accredited schools. (This writer was a student <sup>here</sup> at that time.) Although President Doran was about as active in the political arena as anyone could be, when he was criticized for it, he would remind everyone of what happened to the College as a result of politics.

<sup>later when this</sup> This writer was at Vanderbilt ~~Peabody~~ University Graduate School in the 1950s while Bill Vaughn was Dean of that great institution. When he learned a student from Morehead was there, he called me into his office and ~~he would~~ <sup>ask</sup> ask many questions about who and what was happening in Morehead. We spent several spring afternoons talking about Morehead. Dr. Vaughn really had a soft spot in his heart for Morehead and Eastern Kentucky. He sincerely believed the institution would be made stronger because of what he did. He was right!

Shortly after Chandler took office all of the state road workers in Rowan County were fired or resigned. At that time the State District Office of Transportation was in Morehead but in a very few years the entire office was moved to Flemingsburg.

In today's political arena in Kentucky one would think that the very idea of any <sup>new</sup> Governor of Kentucky ever firing anyone <sup>crossing any state workers</sup> to resign was unheard of. It has always happened in our Commonwealth and probably always will. <sup>But in today's</sup> system it is much less frequent and less obtrusive.

## Rowan Voters Have Been Right In Most Elections For Governor Of Kentucky

Rowan County has been 'right' politically, about two-thirds of the time in gubernatorial elections since 1891.

Whether the county's record prior to 1891 was as good is unknown, since figures for the years prior to that time are not available.

But a compilation of voting figures since 1891, the year Democrat John Brown was elected chief executive of the state, shows that in two elections out of three, Rowan County voters have favored the winner.

And strangely enough, A. B. Chandler, who won an overwhelming victory over Edwin R. Denney in Rowan County last fall, was repudiated by the voters here in his first general election race 21 years ago. Rowan County gave King Swope a 371-vote bulge over Chandler at that time.

Governors who have received majorities in Rowan County since 1891 are: Brown, William O. Bradley, William S. Taylor (elected on face of returns, but disqualified when William Goebel contested), Augustus E. Wilson, Edwin P. Morrow, W. J. Fields, Flem D. Sampson, Ruby Laf-

foon, Simeon S. Willis, Earle C. Clements, Lawrence W. Wetherby, and A. B. Chandler.

Only five of Kentucky's last 18 governors have been Republicans, but Rowan County's majorities have gone to 12 Republicans in the last 18 races for governor.

Rowan County voters generally have favored Eastern Kentucky candidates, when they cast their ballots in gubernatorial races. Simeon Willis, of Ashland, Flem Sampson of Barbourville, William J. Fields of Olive Hill, are all Eastern Kentuckians who have found favor with Rowan County voters.
