Memorial biographical leaflets of our missionaries and workers who have finished their life work can be ordered as desired. Price of leaflets, 2 to 5 cents each. Notices in the Missionary Tidings and catalogue of supplies will give information of these and other helpful supplies

Many of our talented Circle girls can develop the story of "Raghuwar Dayal" into a most interesting and instructive program. A large chart or outline map of India should show the places and course of Raghuwar's pilgrimage in search of Truth. This outline can be furnished with the book if desired. A good reader should tell the story, using the chart, or a second person may stand ready to point out places as they are mentioned. Low, sweet music suited to each situation and mood of the story will be impressive. When Raghuwar accepts Christ, let the music be glorious and majestic in victorious strains.

Price of the book, in paper cover and map, 30 cents; in cloth, 50 cents.

It is suggested that in every Woman's Missionary Society and Mission Circle, a reader, at some regular or special meeting during the year, tell the story of "Sita, or Child Marriage Fetters." Sita's plea on the witness stand should be given in full. Price of the book, \$1. The Circle girls might give one of the above suggested programs for the Woman's Missionary Society at one meeting, and the other some time during the year for the entire Church.

Pictures of our missionaries, mission stations, and scenes in mission fields will be furnished in large sheets containing from fifty to one hundred pictures, at I cent per picture. These will be helpful for Children's Missionary Societies, Sunday School classes, and for the Woman's Missionary Societies and Mission Circles in mission study work. These pictures mounted will make a fine display in the Church parlors and in places where regular and special missionary meetings are held.
