

Piano students of Lou Stetler include Vicki Flippin and Mary Allen, both of Morehead.



The camps are scheduled for June 23-26, July 28-31 and Aug. 3-6.


UCA will provide instructors for the camps which are open to all high school, junior high school and middle school cheerleaders.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--A Morehead State University staff member has been honored by the Kentucky Forest Industries Association for his efforts in forestry.

Pete McNeill, special projects coordinator for MSU's Office of Regional Development Services, recently was named KFIA's 1986 Kentucky Tree Farmer of the Year.

The award is given in recognition of conservation, preservation and utilization of forest resources by registered tree farmers, according to a KFIA spokesman.

McNeill, who owns and operates more than 960 acres of forest land in Fleming County near Hillsboro, has planted more than 110,000 tree seedlings on burned-over forest land since 1959.

Among the species to be found on his land now are white, loblolly and Scotch pine along with walnut, ash and poplar. In addition to restocking the forest land, McNeill makes his registered tree farm available to various youth organizations and other groups for hiking and recreation.

Expressing his appreciation to the KFIA and the Kentucky Division of Forestry, McNeill also noted that he had long believed that tree farming was a valuable part of forest resources management from both a business and recreation aspect.

"If we don't work to renew our forests, then our country stands to lose one of its most important assets," he said.







MOREHEAD, Ky.--Nurses play a significant role in hospital and other health care arenas and Morehead State University plays an equally significant role in educating Eastern Kentucky's nursing professionals.

While MSU's Department of Nursing and Allied Health Sciences has offered a two-year degree in nursing since 1971, the department has launched a new four-year, Bachelor of Science degree and phased out its associate level degree in nursing.

"Nursing organizations strongly advocate a four-year degree for professional nurses," said Dr. Betty Porter, department chair at MSU. "The BSN, however, is not necessary at this time for licensure. The profession is encouraging its members to strengthen their education to meet the demand for new skills needed for today's health care technology," she added.

The BSN program has two components. The R.N. component, designed for registered nurses with diplomas or associate degrees, was implemented last fall. "Students in the R.N. track are admitted as juniors because they already have the basic educational background and nursing skills," Dr. Porter said.

Also this past year, MSU offered nursing theory classes in Maysville, Ashland and Prestonsburg to students in the R.N. track as part of the new undergraduate regional program thrust.

This fall, MSU will launch the second phase of the program: the generic component, which is designed for students who wish to become nurses. Students who have completed general requirements will be admitted at the sophomore level. That first generic class currently has 30 potential candidates, according to Dr. Porter.

All 10 members of the nursing teaching faculty hold master's degrees in a variety of clinic specialties and both the department chair and BSN program coordinator have doctorates.

The curriculum offers students seven areas from which to select an emphasis, according to Dr. June O'Connell, BSN program coordinator. These are: care of the adult, pediatric nursing, childbearing family care, mental health nursing, community health care, gerontology and critical care nursing.

"The curriculum, which is still in developmental stages, combines nursing theory classwork with clinical experiences and even includes a research focus," Dr. O'Connell said. "The four-year degree also offers nurses the foundation for graduate level study," she noted.

Clinical experiences begin in the sophomore student's spring semester and continue throughout the program. Students work in a variety of health care settings: hospitals, homes, health departments, ambulatory care centers, schools and geriatric agencies.

"We place the students with various health care agencies in Mt. Sterling, Morehead, Ashland and Maysville and MSU faculty members are there to provide direct supervision," Dr. Porter said.

When the last two-year degree nursing students graduate from MSU in December, they will join approximately 600 others who gained their nursing education at Morehead State. The associate degree program, accredited by the National League for Nursing since 1982, also saw all members of its past two graduating classes pass the national licensing examination for registered nurses.


MSU's four-year degree program has been approved by the Kentucky State Board of Nursing, but--like all new programs--it must graduate its first class before applying to the League for accreditation.

Not only does MSU offer nursing education for the undergraduate, but the Department of Nursing and Allied Health Sciences also has a continuing education program for registered nurses.

According to Pauline Ramey, who coordinates the continuing education program, next fall the University will offer 12 workshops at various locations throughout the region. Four of these, slated to be held on MSU's campus, will be targeted at nursing and allied health educators.

These will deal with health policy, ethical decision making, legal aspects in health care education and the use of computers in nursing. Also planned is an update session for emergency medical technicians.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--A musican/educator and a psychologist with extensive research credentials were honored by their colleagues as the 1986-87 recipients of Morehead State University's most prestigious faculty awards.

Dr. Earle L. Louder, professor of music, received MSU's Distinguished Faculty Award which was established in 1964 by the Alumni Association. Honored with the Distinguished Researcher Award, given annually since 1979 by MSU's Research and Patent Committee, was Dr. Bruce A. Mattingly, associate professor of psychology.

The awards were presented at MSU's third annual Academic Awards Convocation held in Button Auditorium, which launched a week-long tribute to the scholastic achievements of the University's faculty, staff and students.

MSU Alumni President William L. Phelps presented Dr. Louder with the Distinguished Faculty Award and Dr. Roberta Anderson, MSU's vice president for academic affairs, presented Dr. Mattingly with his medallion as Distinguished Researcher.

Dr. Louder has attained international stature as an euphonium soloist. The associate director of MSU's bands also is frequently called on to serve as a conductor, clinician and adjudicator by schools nationwide. Since 1976, he has been assistant conductor and featured euphonium soloist for the Detroit (Mich.) Concert Band.

Before joining MSU's faculty in 1968, Dr. Louder was principal euphonium soloist and head of the brass department of the U.S. Navy Band for 12 years and performed before four U.S. presidents.

He earned his doctorate in music from Florida State University and was the first person to earn the doctorate in euphonium performance.

Active in several professional organizations, Dr. Louder serves on the international boaed of directors for Tubists Universal Brotherhood Association (TUBA) and the board of directors of the Association of Concert Bands of America.

Dr. Mattingly earlier this year gained the added distinction of becoming MSU's first participant in the Experimental Program to Stimulate Competitive Research (EPSCoR) Visiting Scholars Program of the National Science Foundation. He received a \$10,002 grant for the study of drug-induced neurological changes in rats. His research into brain chemistry and behavior has received international attention.

A member of MSU's psychology faculty since 1980, Dr. Mattingly is noted for his involvement of students in research activities. He is the author or co-author of 18 articles published in various scientific journals and more then two dozen research papers presented at professional meetings.

He earned his undergraduate degree from MSU with honors and holds a master's degree and doctorate from the University of Kentucky where he also was a post-doctoral fellow at the Medical Center.

A member of several national and regional professional associations, Dr. Hattingly currently serves as chair of the Psychology Section, Kentucky Academy of Science.

In addition to the faculty awards, recognition was given to the outstanding graduate and undergraduate students in each department.




"The new post offers me a diversity of new challenges and I really look forward to working with the staff members in admissions," Cornett said.

"We are very proud of Janet's achievement," said John Johnston, MCHS principal. "She is an extremely dedicated student and a hard worker."



MOREHEAD, Ky.--A Morehead State University administrator has become the first Kentuckian to receive the Henry Stone Award from United States Judo, Inc., the national governing body for judo.

Bill Rosenberg, director of communication services, was honored by the USJI for his outstanding contributions to the sport of judo through efficient program administration at the opening ceremonies of the 1987 National Judo Championships last month in Pittsburgh.

As the nation's governing body for judo, USJI also is officially recognized by the U.S. Olympic Committee to develop programs and activities in the sport for the Olympics.

Rosenberg's love affair with judo began in the early 1960s when he saw a sign advertising classes in the sport at his hometown YMCA. He tried it and obviously liked it. Later when he entered the Air Force, he discovered judo was an integral part of his training as a military policeman. It's been an integral part of his life ever since.

Leaving the service in 1966, the Chester, Pa., native earned his bachelor's and master's degrees from MSU and established the campus Judo Club while an undergraduate. Today he still serves as the group's faculty adviser.

In 1984, Rosenberg was one of 10 individuals selected nationwide to serve on the judo technical staff for the Olympic Games in Los Angeles.

Now considered an Olympic sport, judo had its beginnings in the martial art of jujitsu, according to Rosenberg. "The sport involves throws and holds rather than the kicks and strikes found in the various forms of karate," he explained. "It's closer in form to collegiate wrestling," he added.

Rosenberg, who has been on MSU's staff since 1970, chairs the Services Subcommittee of USJI's Development Committee. The subcommittee provides the administrative leadership for the following subcommittees: National Managers, National Trainers, National Grassroots Development and National Scouting and Research.

He also is a member of the National Tournament Committee and has been head scorer and technical director for the last three U.S. International Open Judo Championships at the I.S. Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs.

An experienced international manager, Rosenberg managed U.S. judo teams for the Canada Cup, the Dutch Open, the West German Open and the Pre-Olympic Tour in 1984. He also managed the country's teams for the Pacific Rim and Pre-World Training Tour in 1985, the Moscow Women's International Invitational in 1986 and the 1986 Jigoro Kano Cup.


Head scorer for both the Olympic Festival and National Junior Olympic Championships in 1986, Rosenberg also was manager for the U.S. Olympic Festival in 1983 and 1985.

The job of a manager is to make certain the athletes are there and prepared to meet the competitors' schedule in the host nation, according to Rosenberg. "The manager arranges for transportation, housing, feeding and uniforms as well as making sure everyone has the necessary equipment," he explained.

The Henry Stone Award isn't the first time Rosenberg has garnered a first for the state with his judo activities. In 1982 he became Kentucky's first certified national judo referee.

Rosenberg and his wife, the former Alice Clark of Wheelwright, are the parents of a son, William T. Jr.



"Each year we usually have five or six people who are Caudill fellows," said Tim Rhodes, MSU director of University enrollment services. "We want to increase this number."




Describing his role as that of "the students' conscience" to the board, Ramey said he would be an advocate for the needs of handicapped students, married student housing and the commuter student.


He has been active in various professional organizations, including the American Historical Association, the Organization of American Historians and the Oral History Association.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--The ninth annual Jesse Stuart Symposium will be held at Morehead State University on Tuesday, June 23, as part of the week-long Appalachian Celebration.

An annual summer campus event, MSU's Appalachian Celebration features concerts, classes, exhibits and demonstrations emphasizing the rich heritage and culture of the region.

Focusing on Kentucky's renowned author who died two years ago, the Stuart Symposium is sponsored by MSU's Department of English, Foreign Languages and Philosophy.

"Jesse Stuart's Legacy," a talk by Joyce LeMaster, MSU associate professor of English and co-director of the Jesse Stuart Tape Project, will launch the day's events at a 12:15 p.m. luncheon in the Crager Room, Adron Doran University Center.

Reservations will be necessary for the luncheon, but not for the other activities of the day.

Following the luncheon, other guest speakers will discuss Stuart, his books and the Kentucky of his time. 









MOREHEAD, Ky.--Morehead State University's Office of Extended Campus Programs will accept applications for VISTA Volunteers for a special adult literacy program through June 5.

"We are looking for eight volunteers who will be assigned in pairs to assist with literacy efforts in Elliott, Morgan, Bath and Rowan counties," said Shirley Hamilton, extended campus programs training coordinator.

Volunteers need either a high school diploma or GED and strong people skills, plus a desire to help others, said Hamilton. The assignments are for one year and include a monthly living allowance, medical insurance and a year-end stipend.

Under the Region III Action Agency-funded program, each volunteer will train 20 reading tutors and each tutor then will work with three students who wish to improve their reading skills or prepare for GED testing.

Training for volunteers will be provided by Action and MSU under the direction of Bonnie Burrell, coordinator of MSU's Appalachian Adult Learning Center.

The program, according to Hamilton, is the first phase of a three-year plan designed to improve literacy skills in 12 eastern Kentucky counties. "We will work closely with literacy efforts already under way in our target counties," Hamilton said. "We have received excellent cooperation from the school superintendents and other officials. They have a real understanding of the importance of an educated work force to economic development of our region," she added.

During the program's first year, according to Hamilton, 480 potential new readers will be reached. The program will be monitored by an advisory board and \_ each county will have its own advisory council, she said.

Majoring in business administration, he hopes to follow in his father's footsteps and secure a position in sales somewhere in Florida after graduation.







MOREHEAD, Ky.--Private giving to Morehead State University this year has topped the \$1 million mark for the first time in history, MSU President A.D. Albright said today with the announcement of a major bequest.

"It has been a tremendously successful year thanks to the generosity of our friends," Dr. Albright said. Included in the \$1,180,853 in private gifts to date are MSU's largest corporate and individual gifts, as well as the bequest, he noted.

"We are very pleased to announce that the late Dr. Norman Tant, a former faculty member, has provided the University with a gift to help future students," Dr. Albright said.

Dr. Tant, who died last November, earmarked \$100,000 from his estate for the Norman and Deane Rust Tant Scholarship Endowment Fund, co-named for his wife who died in July 1986.

The scholarship program will aid students from the six-county area of Bath, Rowan, Menifee, Fleming, Carter and Elliott.

Dr. Tant, a survivor of the Bataan Death March, taught at MSU from 1952 to 1977 when he retired as professor of library science and instructional media. He also served as chair of the Department of Library Sciences and was director of audio-visual education.

For many years, the Tants operated Dean's Jewelry in Morehead. Mrs. Tant also was well known as a milliner.

In establishing the endowment before his death, Dr. Tant noted that residents of the six counties had supported his family businesses and that he and his wife wanted to help them in return.


In addition to the initial bequest, MSU also will receive a portion of Dr. Tant's residuary estate.

Morehead State's banner giving year also included \$150,000 as the first phase of Ashland Oil's \$500,000 commitment which is MSU's corporate gift and \$681,878 from Terry and Susan Jacobs, the largest individual gift, for artificial turf at Jayne Stadium.

In addition to significant one-time or capital gifts, the MSU Foundation's annual giving program showed an 11 percent increase from the previous year, representing more than 1,200 individual donors.

"While the large corporate and individual gifts are vitally important, we are just as appreciative of those individuals who give on a more modest scale each year," Dr. Albright said.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Morehead State University's Department of Education will offer special summer instructional programs for elementary and middle school children in reading, math, language arts and social studies.

The one-week sessions will be conducted by upperclassmen and graduate students enrolled in education courses at MSU and will include a number of certified teachers.

"The instructional program is not only designed for those students who need additional aid in their basic skills, but also for students interested in increasing their abilities in an area through indepth study," Dr. Paul McGhee, chair of MSU's Department of Education, said. "The instructional program can be adjusted to each student's needs," he explained.

During the week of June 22-26, instruction will be offered in math for students entering grades one through eight; in social studies for those entering grades one through nine, and in reading for those entering grades two through eight.

Language arts (spelling, handwriting, grammar and creative writing) for students entering grades two through six and reading for those entering grades two through eight will be the instructional areas offered during July 20-24.

Also, a special reading program will be available July 8-July 31 for those students who need extensive help with reading skills.

The instructional program carries a fee of \$5 per student in each program and special rates may be arranged for those participating in more than one program. Parents will be responsible for transporting their children to and from campus.
