SEED CORN

In order that we may not have a failure in the corn crop in Johnson county this year, the gentlemen whose names appear below started the move to secure seed corn for the farmers of this county.

There are 400 bushels of Boone County White, Johnson County White and Hickory King seed for sale. This corn was bought from the farmers of Western Kentucky, who, together with the Extension workers of Department of Agriculture of Kentucky, have tested this corn and it will germinate from 90 to 100 per cent.

The price of this corn will be \$5.25 per bushel plus the freight and 10 per cent for handling, which will make it cost about \$6.00 to the farmers.

The price of seed corn is high this year, owing to its great scarcity; but it is better to pay the price, for if you get only two bushels more to the acre by using tested and guaranteed seed corn, you have made up more than the difference in price.

However, the yield from guaranteed tested seed corn will be many times two bushels to the acre more than an inferior, untested crop. The price of this corn is not as high as it would have been had the Extension Department of Agriculture not taken the situation in charge.

The following article was drawn up in a meeting of the business men of Paintsville to make those who will handle the seed corn safe and to relieve the seriousness of the situation in order that we may have a big crop this year.

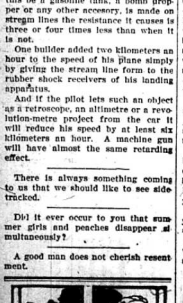
