3 GUILTY IN MORRO CASTLE SEA DISASTER

New York - The captain, chief engineer and operating executive of the liner Morro Castle convicted burned with a list of 134 lives in September, 1934, were found guilty of criminal negligence by a jury in Federal Court Saturday night.

The jury, which heard testimony for more than two months, deliberated nearly ten hours before returning convictions against these individuals.

CHILDREN MAROONED ALL NIGHT IN SCHOOL, RESCUED

Sixty school children, weary-eyed from loss of sleep and excitement after a snowbound night, passed in their schoolhouse at Carrs, Ky. on Monday, when they were returned to the warmth of Lewis county homes at noon Thursday via sleighs, the school bus and train.

Unable to dig his way into the door Denham summoned help. Neighbors found that as fast as they cleared a small space, the wind made new drifts. Persistence rewarded their efforts, but it was nearly nightfall before a narrow path was shoveled through.

When Miss Ann Call, principal of the school, and Miss Osa Thomas, another teacher, decided against the hazard of taking the children home in sub-zero weather.

The children thought the whole affair a great lark. More neighbors brought warm frock and milk and the teachers devised games to keep the youngsters amused.

When 115 children were absent from the Paintsville graded school during a recent week, an investigation showed illness was responsible for 36 per cent of the absences and lack of clothing particularly shoes for 40 per cent.

TOTAL OF 80 YEARS IN PRISON TERMS GIVEN BY JUDGE FORD

Lexington-In the United States District Court at Lexington Wednesday Judge H. Church Ford sentenced seven men to prison terms totaling eight years and five months totaling \$3,207. Those sentenced were in the recent court term found guilty or pleaded guilty to violating Federal laws, Howard Rigby, Lexington, drew the heaviest sentence-nine sentences of ten years each, to serve consecutively, for selling heroin.

SALLES TAX LOSS IS CALLED NO HANDICAP Harrodsburg, Ky. - The loss of Mercer County's portion of the recent sales tax increase, which makes the law was devoted to paying off road bonds, will not interfere to any great extent with the budget of Mercer, according to County Judge Charles T. Corn. The county has on hand an ample sinking fund and has never been embarrassed in meeting interest and bond payments as they become due, he said Saturday.

Mercer County's indebtedness for road and bridge bonds is \$112,000. The county now has on hand approximately \$21,000 in its sinking fund, about 4,000 of which is due the sales tax. LORD GOD OF HOSTS PLAYED AS KIPLING ASHES LAID TO REST London, England. - The majestic strains of Rudyard Kipling's "Recessional" struck the only note of pomp and epiphany when the ashes of the great poet were laid among Britain's immortal writers Thursday in the past's corner of Westminster Abbey.

A marble urn containing his ashes was lowered into a semi-circle beneath the graves of Charles Dickens and Thomas Hardy.

Kipling was the third person in this century to be buried in Post's corner. The others were Thomas Hardy and Sir Henry Irving.

Mrs. Kipling, native of New York was overcome with grief that her daughter had to assist her from the Abbey.

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SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON From the State Capital

Written Each Week By Rev. B. H. Kasse.

SUBJECT: Our Call To Serve Christ, Luke 5:1-11, 27, 28.

GOLDEN TEXT — They forsook all and followed him, Luke 5:11. After Jesus has declared the program of his ministry in the world he immediately sets about the business of selecting workers who will help him. It is not strange that he did not go to the "higher-ups" for these helpers, for what Jesus comes to do is a work in the hearts of men, not their business and social lives primarily. His work must be done in the heart. So he seeks men who will give their hearts.

On the little sea of Galilee (Genesee) he enters a ship to get out of the jam of the great crowd thronging upon him. The ship belonged to Simon, and Jesus to him to move off the shore a bit to give him a better view of the crowd. There he sat and taught the people. When he had finished he said to Simon, "Launch out into the deep and let down your net for a draught." "Master," said Simon, we have toiled all night and have taken nothing. Most of us would have stopped here. When God impresses us to do something we gladly raise our objections as seen from a worldly viewpoint, and that settles it. But Simon went a little further. "Nevertheless, at thy word I will let down the net." In other words, it doesn't look hopeful or logical that you could catch fish where we have worked all night, but I will try again. Where we in our own strength have toiled 'all night' at something, we have tried to sin. God likes to come along and show us what can be done in His strength.

ing, "Depart from me; for I am a sinful man, O Lord." They were all astonished. The difference was that they quit shore-line fishing and got out into the deep; and another difference was that they were fishing now in the power of Jesus' might. Most of us dabble around the shore in our own strength when we ought to launch out into the deep in His strength.

The Jews brought them the lesson. He desired to teach. "Follow me," He said, and I will make you catch men! He must have meant something that we can no longer catch men in our own strength but they could have caught this fish in their own strength.

To this end Peter, James and John responded, "They forsook all and followed him." This shows us the sacrifice involved in a faithful life of service men for Jesus. It was more forsake all that hinders us than to have a knowledge. A sacrifice is an offering to someone but the sacrifice he is seeing. All his orders come from the Father in heaven and orders from an other must be obeyed. A good soldier leaves all obligations for the one having all obligations for the one being a soldier. So to follow Him we must leave all other things behind. We must forsake all that hinders us from following His commandments and leave of his plans and purposes. Leave his spirit, and be great to step in the spirit of man. To be a soldier of men so must we be. It is not enough to renounce all, but we must follow. We can't get sin in one time; to do it is another. One is what I do not; the other is what I do. No life is effective that does not do both.

Frankfort, Ky., — Gov. A. B. Chandler's strength in the House of Representatives remains undiminished at the end of the third legislative week, featured by a skirmish over the Louisville patronage problem.

Widely heralded as a test Administration strength, the contest actually was nothing more than a skirmish. It may mean that no general fight is ahead. Who is in control having been determined, members will be inclined to turn to legislation they want to see enacted before the session ends February 15.

The next week, the general session, the rules committee takes charge one day next week, and the legislative process will go into high gear then. Members already have passed the end of the session, and some worked harder and longer hours than had been the rule in former sessions.

By the end of next week most of the Administration bill will be enacted, or will be dropped for the current session. This will give members time for their individual issues of legislation. By adjournment on February 15, the clock will be cleared for consideration of the Governor's reorganization bill.

Series Of Short Sessions Seen. The work that will come after the general session may be divided into a series of short sessions. Governor Chandler indicated this week that at least three, to separate consideration of reorganization, budget and revenue would be required. It is probable that further divisions of subject matter may be deemed expedient, with an increase in the number of sessions.

Meanwhile, work on the reorganization bill, which will be restricted closely to reorganization of the administrative functions of the State government, has gone forward rapidly. The bill will be ready when the Assembly, which Governor Chandler said could have a voice in fixing the time for the second session, is ready to begin work.

There is some talk that the members will want a week or ten days between the first and second sessions to arrange their affairs at home preparatory to the extended work which may not be completed before May. The Administration will work in agreement with the members in fixing the time for the second session.

There is a group of bills, some sponsored by the administration and some representing the individual views of members, which actually affected the organization of the government. Most of these will go over to the second session by common consent.

Governor Chandler this week indicated the need for agreement to postpone the isolated reorganization measures to the reorganization session. A bill to create a nine-man Highway Commission, with district lines following Congressional District lines, should go over to the second session, he said.

Back of this decision is the desire to give the members as much time as possible for consideration of their individual ideas for legislation, and the additional purpose to put reorganization work into one session, so that the executive department and the legislative body can look at it all as one structure, and properly assemble it.

The major and pressing legislation included in the Governor's message early in the month already has been made law, and the primary bill of the legislative course. First and foremost, the sales tax repeal has been made law, and the primary bill is ready for the Governor's signature.

The road revenue question likely will go into the later sessions. Already the members have given considerable time to the problem, with a show of many conflicting views as the net result. Whether, in the end, the reduction in taxes on automobile users will be affected by a lower charge for license plates or by reducing the tax on gasoline to 6 cents a gallon, is problematical.

In any event, like many other plans, the relief for the taxpayer also involves the problem of revenue for governmental purposes, and probably belongs in Governor Chandler's

special session plan. A bill to remove all of the tax in real estate for State purposes falls in the same classification, but may be put over at this session merely because it probably will not be controversial and can be accomplished speedily.

The work of the reorganization committee will go on through the series of special sessions, the audit and survey work will not be done hastily or in haphazard fashion. The passage of the reorganization committee, made through the survey and audit, will not be available until this fall, or early next winter.

At that time the frame work constructed at the sessions this winter will be filled out. Additional legislation, designed to complete the governmental house and put it in order for living, will be ready for assembly at that time.

Governor Chandler has an ambitious program for benefits to the State. He realizes the problem cannot be solved by a set of rules or laws hastily thrown together in two or three months. The accumulated problems of preceding Administrations are widely recognized by most of the citizens of the State. But there is no agreement on ways to solve the problems.

The confinement and care of institutional inmates, for instance, for the good of the State and the best help to those confined, is widely recognized as a problem. But immediately one starts considering how best to solve the problem a hundred widely different ideas, honestly proposed, are advanced.

Others less meritt. The expense of other States that have tackled the problem may be of real worth to Kentucky, saving the expenditure of thousands of dollars on some plan found in practice to be impractical. The broad program of development of natural resources, the question of the public and the utility companies, are not to be disposed of in a week's consideration.

To these governmental problems intense study must be given, so that the result of the study will be available to the lawmakers when they come to enact legislation. That type of work will go on under Governor Chandler during his four-year term.

TAKE YOUR CHOICE

There are three varieties of red salmon and two lighter-colored salmon. AUTOMATIC PHONE TIME ANNOUNCER IN USE IN BERLIN

Germany is experimenting with a new apparatus which announces the time automatically to all telephone subscribers, says a report to the Louisville District Office of the Commerce Department. The experimental apparatus is constructed so that 200 local calls can be received simultaneously on the time recording apparatus without the caller receiving a busy signal. A woman's voice immediately responds from the "mechanism" giving the exact time, re-echoed over and over until the subscriber hangs up. This machine the report states, is more practical for use in Germany than in the United States because the "Continental" time system is used instead of the "west meridian" and anti meridian system. That is to say, 6 p. m. is announced as 16 o'clock. Berlin is the only city in Germany equipped with the new apparatus. It is estimated that from its 800,000 telephone subscribers there are 50,000 calls each day receiving the exact time. Since each telephone call in Germany costs about 4 cents, it is estimated that this apparatus will save an income of about \$2,000 a day.

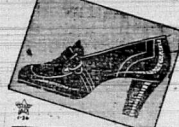

NATURAL FORCES AID BUSINESS RECOVERY

By R. S. HECHT
President American Bankers Association

ALTHOUGH, as official studies of business conditions show, business is still far from having struck its full stride, nevertheless, I believe that it is undoubtedly true that the natural economical processes which have always brought the nation out of a slump are now and have been for some time steadily at work laying the foundations for more active and normal business conditions. I believe that there is growing a broader public perception that the people of this country must make their own prosperity and not wait for the Government at Washington to make it for them. In other words, normal economic vigor and vitality of the United States is slowly but inevitably bringing a return of natural business recovery.

The Fundamental Cure
Like a doctor, the administration can help nature. But the fundamental healing process will come from natural causes and not from political remedies. Despite the slackening of business now apparent, despite expressions of disappointment we hear from various quarters, nevertheless, I am confident that these fundamental healing processes, if not spectacular, are none the less surely at work.

Gradually our business leaders are showing greater confidence in the future and are assuming a more forward looking position. I firmly believe that it will make up our minds to overcome fear psychology with confidence psychology the results will fully justify such a new attitude.

BANKERS' ASSOCIATION STIMULATES ADVERTISING

The American Bankers Association's Advertising Department reports rapid progress of the use by banks of the informative bank newspaper advertising prepared by it for members to assist them in rebuilding public confidence and good will in their communities. The central theme of this advertising service deals with the "essential line of economic and social service that all sound banking inherently renders the depositor and the public." The report says, showing that "it is not banking laws which make banking useful and safe, but that fundamentally it is honesty and skill in management under private initiative."

The Advertising Department is supplying about a thousand members of the association with newspaper and other advertising material. The newspaper material totals about 56,000 advertisements annually. The growth of the work of the department is shown by the following figures: On September 1, 1934, the number of banks being served regularly each month was 623. The total number on April 1, 1935, was 634, an increase of 301 regular subscribers, or 49 per cent in a period of seven months.

WAR ON BANK ROBBERS

National Bankers Association Pressing Active Steps to Protect Members—Losses Cut

Imprisonment or death of many desperate bank criminals the past year has brought no appreciable reduction in attacks on banks. James E. Baum, in charge of the American Bankers Association Protective Department, has reported to his organization. In the six months ended February 27, 1935, he says, banks were targets for 159 daylight holdups and 40 night burglaries. He added that although banks that are not members number only about half those enrolled in the association, they suffered a far greater rate of attack, namely, 25 per cent of all the bank robberies committed during the period.

Losses Show Decrease
During the period under report, bank burglars and holdups exacted tribute amounting to \$24,154 compared with losses totaling \$1,257,969 a year ago, he said. This reduction in losses is attributed to the tightening of restrictions and other limitations in the exposure of surplus cash imposed last year by shareholders and several bank supervisory authorities. The sharp reduction in the monetary loss of money and securities resulting from bank robbery that was only overshadowed by the killing of 2 bank employees, one bystander and 3 arresting officers, and since last August bank robbery also cut the lives of 31 criminals and caused physical injuries to 10 bank employees, 12 bystanders, 9 arresting officers and 3 holdups, a total of 52 casualties. Investigations by the association's agents resulted in the arrest of 26 forgers, 42 holdups and one burglar, or 75 of the 141 bank criminals reported as being apprehended during the period.

Farm and Agricultural News

POULTRY REDUCE COST

Last year calves were born in February and March. They received shielded care for 75 days before they were marketed, although most of their grain was made on good rich pasture. In December, Mr. Bush sold 15 calves from the Anderson stock yard in Ames, Iowa, for a total of \$916. The calves averaged 300 pounds in weight.

Mr. Bush's success with beef calves is unusual, yet it illustrates some of the possibilities in beef-cattle raising in Ames, Iowa, and the surrounding country.

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BREAKING EGGS FOR BREAKFAST

But of course, you're quite a different thing "breakfast" and "fast" — you have to break eggs to make both. Here's the method.

Method for Making French Omelet: Beat four eggs slightly just enough to mix the yolk and white. Add one-half teaspoon salt, a few grains pepper and four tablespoons milk, water or cream. Put a small amount of butter in a hot skillet and shake around till the mixture is well heated. Pour in the mixture and cook very slowly until creamy, constantly stirring the cooked portion at the sides with a knife or spatula to allow the uncooked mixture to run out and cook. When creamy all through, coat egg with a half-teaspoon of butter and serve at once.

Another Way: And here's the way to make a perfect omelet with exactly the same ingredients. Beat four eggs, yolks until thick and lemon colored. Add one-half teaspoon salt, a few grains pepper and four tablespoons milk, water or cream. Beat egg whites until stiff and fold into the yolks. Put a small amount of butter in a hot skillet and shake around till it is well greased on bottom and sides. Pour in egg mixture, reduce heat

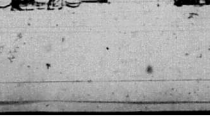
