Treasurer's Report.

We conclude to-day the special report of the Commissioners appointed to settle the accounts of the late Treasurer of Kentucky, omitting the tabular statements accompanying the same; and would invite our readers to a careful perusal of it.

Some time ago, when we alluded to this subject, and hinted that Col. Davidson was a defaulter to the State, the Herald, of this city, became furiously indignant, and scouted the idea. We have now the satisfaction of proving that our surmises were correct, and showing that the defalcation amounts no less than \$47,155.20—a considerable sum for the State to be minus through the efficacy of Whig legislation.

We believe that no whig paper in the State has yet published any part of this report, for obvious reasons, and we now call upon them to do so; or, at least, to let their readers know that the State has been swindled out of that sum, through the agency of Whig officers. Will they do this?

FRIEND PIERCE.—Political subjects are now absorbing the public mind, involving emancipation, convention and candidates for Congress. To afford the readers of your popular and well conducted journal a slight insight into the views of the people here, upon the momentous subject now agitated, I take great pleasure in announcing the position you hold meets the approbation of the popular voice, in this very important section. Notwithstanding Mr. Clay's letter supporting emancipation, has appeared coming from the source it has, bearing the seal of the leader of a great party, it has been denounced by whigs and democrats; yea, his warmest and most intimate friends have declared in my hearing, a protest to his views and threaten to defame him, should he run as a candidate for the convention. I can name these men, if it were necessary; but time and space forbid. Thos. F. Marshall, in his speech at Versailles, declared his opposition to emancipation, and opposed to agitating the subject. R. N. Wickliffe has appeared to-day in opposition to the Clay letter; in reality public sentiment openly approves the position advocated by the FLAG, and its able and numerous supporters.

The Address of Thomas Y. Payne Esq., was re-published in the papers in this city. The ground he occupies, and the sentiments there advanced, have been greeted with the warmest reception. Mr. Payne is well known through the State, and his election to the convention will meet with the sanction of the people abroad, as well as at home.

The candidates for Congress in the several districts, also share, with equal discussion, with other public interests.—Amongst other distinguished citizens I often hear spoken of in the 10th district, is Col. R. H. STANTON of Mason. In this district, I know of no public man deserving to occupy a more conspicuous position, or to act a more useful part in the legislative councils, than this distinguished gentleman from Mason. He enjoys, in an eminent degree, the confidence and respect of both parties, and is particularly regarded by the party to which he belongs. He is amongst the most reliable members, and peculiarly fitted by experience and sagacity for council.—During many years of public service, a part of it in eventful periods of our political history, he has not only maintained that high reputation, but has built up a name, which at a time like the present, attracts to him the confidence and reliance of the country. It has not been his ambition merely to excel in display, but he has devoted himself to the study of the science of government—a just appreciation of our constitution—in a word, to all those great questions and the acquisition of that important knowledge which mark us up the statesman, who is fit to guide the vessel of State. Among your candidates, none, in my estimation, rank higher for sagacity, elevated character, and for public integrity and also in his private life, his social qualities are a theme of universal commendation.

There are yet higher distinctions in reserve for one who, in the darkest hours of the democratic cause, against great odds, never faltered in duty in battling with his foe. To be brief, Col. Report of the Commissioners appointed to settle the Accounts of the Late Treasurer of Kentucky.

CONTINUED.

To his Excellency J. J. CAITTENDEN, Governor of Kentucky,

Before closing their labors, the undersigned endeavored to discover, in what year or years this large deficiency in the Treasury occurred. They selected for this investigation the 10th day of October in each year, because, being the day on which the fiscal year of the Commonwealth terminates, the books of the Treasury might be supposed to represent more nearly the true indebtedness of the Treasurer on this date, than on any other day in the year. The duty of making up his annual report, would necessarily call his attention to the settlement of any unliquidated claims he might have, and it being a time of the year in which the business is transacted at the Treasury there would exist no necessity for his keeping a large sum of money on hand out of Bank. It is manifest however, that in this respect, only an approximation to the truth could be arrived at, because the undersigned had no means of ascertaining, how much money the Treasurer may have had on hand not deposited in Bank, or what sums may have been due to him for advances for public purposes, on any given 10th day of October. With this explanation, the undersigned present the result of the investigation, in Statement No. 5, appended hereto. From this Statement, it will be seen, that there was an apparent excess, amounting to \$2,418 12, in the funds of the Treasurer on the 10th day of October, 1841, consequently no large errors exist prior in the Treasury accounts can exist prior to this date. This Statement also shows, that on the 10th day of October, in each of the following years, there was an apparent deficiency in the Treasury, as follows, viz:

warrant for \$3,908 13 was issued to him upon a requisition of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, under an act of 1846-7. The warrant for \$16,093 82 was issued to him upon a requisition from the office of the Board of Internal Improvement. The undersigned did not deem it their duty to investigate the claims, in settlement of which these two warrants were issued, deeming the allowance of said claims by the authorities abroad to be final.

In compliance with the requisitions of the Board of Internal Improvement, the undersigned were appointed Commissioners, they have delivered over to Gen. Peter Dudley, the books, papers and money which they received from the late Treasurer, and have taken said Dudley's receipts for the same; and they have deposited the books, containing the statement of their investigation and settlement of the accounts of James Davidson, late Treasurer of Kentucky, together with the receipts of said Dudley, in the office of the Auditor of Public Accounts.
