

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Morehead State University has received music scores and instruments valued in excess of \$66,000, contributed by Dover and Bernice Holland of Richmond.

The gift to the MSU Foundation for the University's Department of Music was a result of the warmth and vision of several music faculty members, according to Mrs. Holland.

A few years ago Mr. Holland, a materials manager with North American Phillips Lighting, was transferred to Richmond from Tuscaloosa, Ala., where the Hollands owned a music store and studio which she managed.

With that transfer, Mrs. Holland began commuting from Tuscaloosa and playing violin with the Lexington Philharmonic. She became friends with several MSU music faculty members there, including Suanne Blair, Ed Malterer, Bob Pritchard, Leo Blair and Milford Kuhn.

"They just seemed to go out of their way to be extra nice and welcome me as a newcomer," Mrs. Holland said.

Later she closed the store and moved to Richmond, bringing with her the remaining inventory and storing it in the garage.

In talking with Kuhn, she learned about the faculty members' needs and what they hoped to accomplish in encouraging future musicians and realized what that inventory could mean to student musicians.

"Milford and the others had vision and that impressed me because I believe vision is very important in all that we do. My husband and I thought giving the music and instruments to the University would benefit all of us. We could do more good by giving them to MSU than any other means of disposal," said Mrs. Holland, a registered representative with First Investors in Lexington.

"Mr. and Mrs. Holland are to be congratulated for their vision in seeing what these items could mean to Morehead State's music program," said MSU President C. Nelson Grote. "It is no secret that higher education budgets often are so limited that it is difficult to keep up with equipment needs. We appreciate the Hollands' generosity very much," he added.

"This represents a tremendous boost for our program," said Dr. Christopher

are indebted to Bernice and Dover Holland for this magnificent contribution.

"To my knowledge, this is the largest gift ever received by this department and undoubtably it ranks among the major individual gifts received by the University," Dr. Gallaher said. "It feels a little bit like Christmas," he added.

The Hollands' gift included 56 violins, 26 clarinets, two French horns, two tenor saxophones, two cellos, two trombones, one trumpet, two guitars and six instrument cases. All but the trumpet were new instruments.

The music scores--literally thousands--represent all types of music--piano, string, concert and marching band, vocal, choral and organ.

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

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Representatives of states which have implemented strategic economic development plans to market their forest resources will be among the speakers for the 1987 Governor's Conference on Forest Products Industry.

The conference, scheduled Oct. 14-15 at the Holiday Inn North in Lexington, is expected to draw nearly 250 participants representing the industry, state and federal agencies, civic and political leadership and concerned citizens, according to Dr. Charles M. Derrickson, conference chair.

Dr. Derrickson, dean of Morehead State University's College of Applied Sciences and Technology, also is chair of the task force established by the 1986 General Assembly to develop a comprehensive plan to expand Kentucky's forest products industry.

Setting the stage for the statewide conference will be Gerald Thiede and Robin Bertsch from Michigan's Department of Natural Resources. Michigan is one of the few states which have developed and implemented strategic marketing plans for their forest resources.

They are scheduled to address the group at 9:30 a.m. Wednesday, Oct. 14, following remarks by MSU President C. Nelson Grote and Dr. A. D. Albright, former president of MSU and Northern Kentucky University.

State Rep. Pete Worthington will introduce the chairpersons of the Technical Advisory Committees for the task force. They are: Jim Kennedy of the state Tourism Cabinet, tourism; Bob Fouts of the state Commerce Cabinet, economic climate, and Chauncey Lohr of the state Division of Forestry, forestry.

At 1:30 p.m., Chuck Stanley, representing Virginia's Division of Forestry, will address the conference, sharing experiences of his state in developing a strategic plan.

Afternoon workshops and panelists also will include:

Agencies represented on the task force include Morehead State, the Cabinet for Natural Resources and Environmental Protection, Energy Cabinet, Commerce Cabinet, Kentucky Forest Industries Association and the Kentucky Council of Forest Industries.

BLACKS IN EDUCATION SUPPLEMENT

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Morehead State University's fall 1987 enrollment showed a 9.5 percent increase over the previous fall, while the number of new Black students nearly doubled from the Fall of 1986, according to MSU's Office of Minority Student Affairs.

"At Morehead State our job is to provide a quality education for all students, but we also are sensitive to the special needs of the minority student," said MSU President C. Nelson Grote.

"We make every effort to provide the necessary supportive environment through programming, counseling and other services." Dr. Grote said. "Our recruitment efforts would be meaningless, if we didn't provide that backup of peer support," he stressed.

"Recruiting the student is only part of our commitment," said Jerry Gore, director of minority student affairs. "We offer special scholarships and grants, but more than that we attempt to provide a wide variety of programming to meet the students' cultural needs," Gore added.

Special speakers and programs last year included the Rev. Fred L. Shuttlesworth, one of the early civil rights leaders; Dr. Ni'Am Akbar, nationally prominent author/educator, and a performance by the Gambia National Dance Theatre.

Besides bringing nationally-recognized role models to campus, MSU's Office of Minority Affairs also brings successful alumni back to talk with the students about their experiences.

In addition to full-time director of Minority Student Affairs, MSU also has a full-time minority student recruiter, Peggy Overly.

One special program that Overly believes has been highly successful for minority students is a "Big Brother/Big Sister Peer Counseling Program," which offers students support from their classmates. Another, Minority Student Weekend, brings minority students and their parents to campus to learn first hand about the opportunities open to them.

MSU offers students involvement in campus activities through such groups as the Black Coalition, the Black Gospel Ensemble, several greek-affiliated associations and an organization known as "The Brotherhood," designed to foster understanding among all races.

Recruiting minority students is just part of the process, according to MSU's Affirmative Action Officer Norma Northern. The University also is striving to increase the number of minority personnel on the faculty and staff at all levels, from department chairs and directors to secretaries and security officers.

New to the campus this fall are Dr. Deborah E. Bembry, assistant professor of education, and John A. Holley, publications editor.

Dr. Bembry, who earned her Ph.D. degree in educational administration from the University of Iowa, previously served as an assistant to the vice president for academic affairs and assistant professor of education at Olivet Nazarene University, Kankakee, Ill., where she was active in the recruitment of minority students.

In addition to teaching at the university level, she also has taught first grade and at one time served as an administrative coordinator to the president of Tennessee Technological University in Cookeville, Tenn.

Holley brings 26 years of experience in institutional advancement to the campus, having served as director of university and corporate relations at Lincoln University of Missouri, director of public information or public relations at Albany State College, Mansfield University, Morgan State University and Shaw University.

MOREHEAD, Ky. --- Morehead State University Foundation President Terry S. Jacobs today reported that the annual audit of the Foundation's financial records has revealed apparent unauthorized disbursements of funds.

"All necessary and proper steps are being taken to determine the full extent of the problem and appropriate action is being initiated to reimburse the Foundation," Mr. Jacobs stated.

The Foundation's auditors are continuing to review the financial records of the non-profit corporation which was formed in 1979. Governed by a 21-member Board of Trustees, the MSU Foundation was established to receive and administer private gifts on behalf of Morehead State University but is a separate entity.

"Because of these apparent irregularities in the handling of Foundation funds, Executive Vice President Elmer D. Anderson has been dismissed from his position and David Bolt, a member of the Board of Trustees, has been named acting executive vice president," Mr. Jacobs added.

He also stated that the Foundation's legal counsel has been in contact with the Rowan County Commonwealth's Attorney's office.

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BACKGROUND: The Morehead State University Foundation, Inc., is a tax exempt organization under Section 501 (c) (3) of the U.S. Internal Revenue Code. It has been designated by the University as a "non-affiliated corporation."



LEXINGTON, Ky.--The Forest Product Industry can be a major factor in Kentucky's future economic growth.

That was the consensus from the 1987 Governor's Conference on Forest Products Industry which concluded with an optimistic look ahead.

According to Dr. Charles Derrickson, conference chair, the Forest Product Industry in Kentucky has tremendous potential. "We realize that we have the resources which need to be developed," he said. "Our growth and expansion in the forest industry will be through secondary industry, such as furniture."

The conference, a result of a task force established by the 1986 General Assembly, was attended by representatives from industry, state and federal agencies, civic and political leaders and concerned citizens. Dr. Derrickson, dean of Morehead State University's College of Applied Sciences and Technology also chairs the task force.

The speakers for the conference held in Lexington Oct. 14-15 included representatives from states which have successful forest product industry programs.

Donald Hamm, division of forestry director, believes the conference was excellent because it highlighted the forest industry business now going on in the state. "The Forest Industry has an annual sales of \$770 million a year and employs some 23,000 workers," he said. "We need to make sure our legislators know the importance of this industry."

John Wood of Westvaco, a pulp and paper mill in Ballard County, believes the state needs to make a commitment of manpower and money to manage and utilize the state's forest resources. "This conference has shown the need for long-range planning by the state to bridge changes in administration," he said. An important factor will be the continuity of the program selected. Westvaco has a gross income of \$85 million per year.

Other thrusts for expanding the forest industry included technical assistance to businesses, increased education and training for employees in the industry, and improving cooperation among the state agencies and various interest groups.

James Kennedy of the Tourism Cabinet emphasized the importance of the forest industry and tourism in Kentucky. "This conference has shown there is a positive relationship between the two," he said. "We need to be responsible for the resource management and cultivating the cooperative spirit." He also stated that the environment would not be damaged by any plan selected.

A wood residue utilization specialist for the USDA Forest Service, Alton Curtis, sees Kentucky as having a large amount of wood wastes that could be used for energy. "Utilization of saw dust and bark could be done on the site of the mills," he said. "Using this product would not put any sulphur in the air, so there would not be an increase in the acid rain." Curtis also said culling of trees in the forest could be done to eliminate competition there. Several states, including North Carolina, Alabama, Georgia, Michigan, and Virginia currently have successful forest programs in operation.

Dr. Walter Blevins, state representative from the 71st district, would like to see the industry provide jobs for his constituency. "While the natural resources are there, we are currently shipping the wood products to other states and overseas," he said. "We need to focus our attention on keeping the jobs and money in our state."

FOREST PRODUCTS INDUSTRY CONFERENCE

Participants at the 1987 Governor's Conference on Forest Products Industry discussed the economic impact of forest products in Kentucky. 

Once they see the handiwork, they will learn to appreciate the artists' talents," she added. Wylie started the Los Angeles gallery in 1965 and converted it into a craft and folk art museum in 1973. Currently it is the only one of its kind in the nation, according to Wylie.

The Associates' visit was a result of Gov. Martha Layne Collins economic expedition to California earlier this year where she promoted Kentucky arts and crafts. A tour for interested persons was then arranged by the Kentucky Department of the Arts.

"MSU will be a scheduled stop for future tours," said Nancy Atcher, crafts marketing specialist for the Department. "Seeing MSU's Folk Art Collection and talking to the artists was a highlight for the group." Atcher and co-worker Irwin Pickett, visual arts coordinator, accompanied the group to MSU.

MSU's Department of Art Chair Thomas Sternal is pleased that more people are learning about MSU having the only folk art public collection in the state. "This has been most exciting," Sternal said. "There were video tapes made, photos taken, and names and addresses exchanged. The people from California have made friends with the people here; there is no describing the interpersonal relationships made.

"We are glad to provide the area folk artists with a place to sell their wares," Sternal continued. "Since July 1, we have facilitated the sale of tens of thousands of dollars of art work for our local artists."

On hand to meet the Associates were nine area folk artists displaying their crafts. They included Clevie Childress of Cub Run; Calvin, Ronald and Jessie Cooper of Fleming County; Glenna Parker of Grayson; Linda Williams of Farmers; Garland and Minnie Adkins of Isonville, and Granny Toothman, MSU's artist-in-residence.

MSU's Folk Art Collection contains works of numerous area folk artists, according to Adrian Swain, folk art curator. "The collection proves exciting and interesting to everyone who visits it," Swain said. "We are continually adding to our collection and finding space to house the additions is our only concern," he added.

MSU's first lady, Mrs. Wilma Grote, was present to greet and visit with the participants. "It was a most enjoyable experience," Mrs. Grote said of the day. "It was really fun and exciting and I sincerely wish more people could have enjoyed this occasion."

After touring the collection and visiting the artists, the Associates were treated to an "Eastern Kentucky country dinner" provided by the Department of Art. The meal was prepared by Don Young, assistant professor of art; Brenda Whitt, department secretary, and MSU art students.

When the time to leave came, the Associates were still exchanging telephone numbers with the artists. "Words do not describe the pleasure I have had here today," said Ruth Levin of Los Angeles, Calif. "My husband and I have enjoyed it so much we're taking some of the crafts home with us."

MOREHEAD, Ky.--"Economic development and higher learning will draw closer and closer together in the future."

That was the theory set forth by author-educator Dr. George Keller, at Morehead State University's Higher Education Week Convocation on Tuesday, Oct. 27.

Speaking to a crowd of nearly 300 people in Button Auditorium, Keller said we must sell the world our most valuable export, brain power. "Colleges and universities, such as Morehead, will become increasingly more vital to the future of the U.S. economy," he said. "Sell the world management, the arts, science and technology, medicine, research--all areas that require a college education," he added.

Discussing the economic status of the nation and the recent crash of the stock market, Keller, a senior vice president of Barton Gillet Company in Baltimore, Md., indicated the future of higher education was in serious trouble.

"Since World War II, higher education has lived its own traditions and made its own plans," Keller said. "But external factors will force us to develop a plan according to what's happening in the American society."

Citing the demographic revolution, immigration movement and social revolution for some of the problems that colleges and universities are facing today, Keller encouraged MSU administrators to take a look at the curriculum now being offered. "Match your courses to the technology of the 1990's," he said. "Gear your curriculum to what best serves Eastern Kentucky."

According to Keller, the current division of the social classes of America's citizenry will cause institutions of higher learning an added problem. With an increasing number of two income, highly educated families on one side and an increasing number of people below the poverty level on the other, the middle is dropping out, Keller said. "This will cause colleges and universities to be torn in half," he added. "There will have to be more graduate programs and work with the gifted, and also more basic courses and work for the poor at the same time."

In the future, paying for education will become "more tricky," Keller said. "No state legislature is going to continue to pour money into a college or university that does not respond to the rapidly changing needs of the people of the state," he noted.

Keller emphasized the United States of today is different from that of the 1970's when it was considered the richest nation in the world. "We must keep America economically vigorous," said Keller. "The problem is we can't get Congress or the President to do anything about it, because it's an unpopular thing to do to add taxes or cut someone's benefits.

"For colleges and universities to sit back and do nothing would be a prescription for suicide," Keller stated. "In this time of rapid change, as the U.S. goes through an economic shift, it is critical that we design an education for the future.

"What's at stake is the future of the young people of this country," he added.

Higher Education Week activities will culminate on Friday, Oct. 30, with the inauguration of MSU's 11th president C. Nelson Grote. The ceremony will commence at 2 p.m. in Button Auditorium with Gov. Martha Layne Collins scheduled to participate.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Scholars of Appalachia recently gathered at Morehead State University to take part in a two-day symposium, "A Sense of Place in Appalachia," which featured more than 30 distinguished speakers from eight states and Canada. Sponsored by MSU's Department of Sociology, Social Work and Corrections, the program was coordinated by Dr. S. Mont Whitson, professor of sociology. The speakers, who represented various disciplines, helped participants explore the importance of a sense of place, that feeling of belonging, which appears to have been lost by today's mobile society. According to Dr. Whitson, Appalachians have a strong sense of their place which has provided them with a sense of security and serenity through time.


Among the presenters were Berea College President John Stephenson, Ruel Foster of West Virginia University, Clifford Swensen of Purdue University and William Talley of McGill University. The more than 300 people attending heard Ron Eller, director of the University of Kentucky's Appalachian Center say that "place" on the whole tended not to be a specific location, but rather ties that bind people to other people through shared experiences or what he called, "mountain consciousness."
