DISCOURAGING RACKETEERS

Just two hours after a little girl had been hit by a truck in Brooklyn, two men were arrested in a trap laid for them at her father's home...

This is another victory for the Brooklyn Rackets Bureau's investigation of ambulance chasing and has brought the number of arrests to 17.

Ambulance chasing, claim frauds and faked claim constitute a group of common crimes which affect every citizen, and strike at the pocketbooks of every insurance policyholder.

Now that the Nazi breaks have gotten to regulating by decree the breakfast habits of the Federal land, it would appear that the German national breakfast will soon become, "two fried apples, sunny side up!"

The food ministry, finding that eggs have gone the way of butter and become a luxury product, suggested recently that Hans and Fritz learn to do without such good Aryan products of German soil—turkeys, apples and cork cheese.

Professor Hans Reiter, president of the Federal Health Board, recently designated potatoes, fish and ham as the principle items of diet on the Nazi menu for the coming year.

Even bread will be scarce this year, the Professor says. Potatoes will grow in German soil—the best substitute. The German patriot will now order a "ham on turnip" for his luncheon feast, and turn over the "rye" as his contribution toward a bigger and better army.

Roadways and surfaces are improved, thus offering a new temptation to excessive speed.

This doesn't mean that the automobile accident toll cannot be reduced. It can, if we take action, not words. The individual responsibility of each motorist when he slides behind the wheel of a projectile weighing a ton or two and capable of doing eighty miles an hour, must be driven home.

When anyone tells you America consumes half the world's coffee or three-fourths of the world's silk, remind him he's only telling you one-half the story.

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The real push in progress comes when the world is told where it can get the best shirts, or pair of shoes, for the price, the best fifty-cent dinner or the best new or used car that will fit the budget.

CONVERTING MISFORTUNE

Ocean City—Maryland's only sea resort—has shown how a seeming misfortune may be converted into a favorable situation. Several years ago a fierce storm swept in from the Atlantic to pound Ocean City.

**"The Southern Senators are helping me. Several, including Harry F. Byrd, of Virginia, have called on me today and I expect to see others informally tomorrow."**

**The Logan statement referred to by Barkley was issued early in the day. It said: "Under existing circumstances, I would decline any appointment. I wish it to be thoroughly understood that I definitely do not intend to resign my seat in the Senate for at least another year. In the event that an important judicial post or other appointment is offered to me."**

**This elimination from consideration of Logan for the vacancy on the Circuit Court of Appeals at Cincinnati caused by the death of Judge Charles H. Moorman was regarded as favorable for Judge Elwood Hamilton, reputed choice of Barkley, Shackelford Miller, Jr., has been mentioned as a possibility for Hamilton's seat, in event of the latter's advancement.**

**Senator Logan's early statement was followed later in the day with this one:**

**"All I've got in the world is my self-respect and the respect of my friends, and my appointment relating to the Federal Judiciary which would be under the faintest suspicion of bargain-making would destroy their respect for me. And I've got to live with myself the rest of my life. I'm sorry Senator Barkley must have opposition but we would not take the course proposed to keep him from having opposition."**

**Opening scenes in the day's play were in the office of Representative Fred M. Vinson, soon to take the place of C. Collins in the Circuit Court judgeship, where Chandler met with Kentucky's Representatives. Participants said it was pleasant enough, that threats were made openly, and that it ended without commitments. They reported that the meeting was charged with the underlying anxiety of politicians who did not want to have opposition in their races back home if they could help it.**

**Chandler then went to the White House in company of State Senator Drake Nave and State Police Capt. Joe Burman, his former bodyguard, unaware that Senator Logan had issued a statement. At the White House, Chandler met Secretary Marvin McIntyre, with whom he refused to talk on the telephone scene. The two smiled formally and shook hands.**

**After spending about fifteen minutes with the President Chandler hurried out to catch a taxi.**

**Questioned by reporters as he emerged from the White House, Chandler said he would reserve until he got back home any announcement concerning his Senate candidacy. He said he hadn't told Mr. Roosevelt he would run against Barkley. The Governor said the conversation had been about the "Kentucky political situation."**

**He was asked whether the talk with the President had changed his attitude in any way. He said: "No, but you fellows don't know my attitude."**

**In answer to a question whether he could help the state, he said: "If you see me in the race you'll know I can beat Barkley. I wouldn't get in if I thought I couldn't beat him."**

**Chandler remarked that a bill now in the hands of a Kentucky State Senate Committee is provided for advancing the primary election from August to June "might do some good. The boys in the Legislature see for it, aren't they?"**

**Chandler said his White House visit resulted from a suggestion by a friend of the Administration that he call James Roosevelt.**

**"Asked if he were satisfied with the results of his visit, Chandler replied: "I have nothing to be satisfied**

**about. I didn't come asking for aid."**

**The Governor said he would remain here tomorrow, leaving the capital about 9 p. m. He asserted the remainder of his visit would be "of a social nature. He was accompanied to the White House by J. Dan Talbot, Kentucky Finance Commissioner."**

**Treasury Moves To Dispose Of Gold**

**of wheat.**

**Except for a few days, the foreign markets have offered little more than \$34 an ounce for gold during the past four years. It was that high most of the time only because sellers always could get \$35 in the United States if they paid the 24-cent-an-ounce cost of shipping the metal.**

**Gold's principal use is to back up paper money. People generally don't want to go to the trouble of handling gold money, which is heavy, but they like to know that their paper money is based on something tangible and valuable like gold. Prior to 1934, they could actually get gold for bills. Now they can only take the Government's word for the fact that the gold is in the Treasury.**

**About four-fifths of the Nation's paper money is backed directly by gold. Most of the remainder is backed by silver, and a fraction is covered by Government bonds.**

**Other Governments also try to**

**maintain gold reserves behind their currencies, but because the value of their money in terms of gold varies so much the United States will not sell its gold for anything but American dollars. Any Government that wants our gold must acquire dollar credits in this country and pay our Treasury.**

**and never hold another office so long as I should live.**

**"I value my own self-respect and the respect of the people of Kentucky above any consideration of political or official titles. Neither Senator Logan nor will I drag a Federal judgeship in Kentucky as low as to permit us to bargain away a high station in return for a free field in my race for election. Neither of us is willing to bring about the appointment of a Federal judge at the point of a pistol or any other reason that would be regarded as unworthy and beneath the dignity of the position itself.**

**"For these reasons, I am proud to say to the people of Kentucky that I join Senator Logan in his lofty attitude in regard to this matter and I wish to say that if anybody in the State desires to run against me because I have not been willing to stoop to the despicable expediency involved in all these threats, I welcome such opposition."**

**Chandler, when told of Barkley's statement, observed sarcastically that Senator Barkley's love for Senator Logan has been demonstrated in the 1936 election. He said Barkley was in Europe at the time of the election, after having promised Logan his support.**

**"I don't care if he makes any deal," Chandler said. "He issued a statement bragging about his integrity. I am so well known I don't have to issue any statement**
