Sunday School Lesson

LESSON FOR FEB. 27 MEASURING A MAN'S WORTH

LESSON TEXT—Mark 5:17. GOLDEN TEXT—How much more is a man of more value than a sheep!—Matthew 12:12. PRIMARY TOPIC—A Man Who Went Home Well. JUNIOR TOPIC—What Is a Man Worth. INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC—What Am I Worth? YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC—Putting People Before Profit.

Awful is the scene that meets us as we go with our Lord across the sea of Galilee and draw up the shore of the country of the Gadarenes. Distressed beyond words is the plight of the man who is under the power of legions of the demons of Satan; inspiring is the assurance of Christ that he is victor over the devil and his hosts; soul searching is the disappointing picture of Christ as he evaluates their brother's spiritual need.

The same mighty conflict, between the two great spiritual kingdoms, of good and evil, God and Satan, goes on in our day. That is the reason for the "I John 4:4. Equally true is it that we must each one of us choose what is to be our attitude toward the conflict, and especially toward Christ.

Power of Satan—vv.15-15. Foolish men sometimes speak boldly about Satan as though he were only a weakling, or perhaps but a creature of legend. The devil, who is but one being, operates through many evil spirits, or demons. They are everywhere active, and it appears from Scripture that they seek a physical body through which they may function. Demon-possession, which was so common in our Lord's day, still exists, especially on the margins of life. There are some who believe that the almost unbelievable cunning and brazen wickedness of the devil and his hosts is an expression of demonic control.

Spiritism is another activity which is to be the special field of demons. It is evidently not altogether a fraud, but rather the stimulation of the dead by evil spirits of mediums. Christian people surely will have nothing to do with such dangerous and ungodly practices, and others imperil themselves by every such contact.

The text graphically portrays what becomes of a poor soul who has gotten into the clutches of the devil. It is a dark and terrifying picture, known to us even in this year of 1938. But thank God, there is a way of deliverance.

The History of Christ—v. 6-13. The command of Jesus—8. Evidently preceded the cry of the demons—v. 7. Notice that the demons who hated our Lord had no doubts about His being the Son of God. They knew Him. How strange it is that the many voices that deny His deity come from the pulpit, the professor's chair, or over the radio, in the name of Christianity.

The demons knew his power, also, for though they adored Him, not to torment them, they realized that they must obey His command to "come out of the man." They asked permission to enter the swine. The keepers of the swine fled to tell the owners. They and others came to see what had happened. They saw the demoniac seated, clothed and in his right mind, "and they greatly rejoiced and magnified the name of the Lord." Did they? No, indeed! "They were afraid"—v. 15—and they began to pray him to depart.

Why were they afraid? Two reasons are suggested. In the first place they wanted no spiritual activity that would interfere with their business. Swine were of more value in their sight than the liberation of demon-possessed men. They have their successors in our day. Such are the men who rent their buildings for taverns and dance halls because they want money. Akin to them are those who counsel against the expenditure of money to keep the church open, and for the sending of missionaries into fields white unto harvest.

A tract that is entitled "Suppose" asks the pertinent and searching question, "Suppose I were offered \$100,000 for every soul I led to Christ, would that impel me to do more than I now do because of the constraining love of Christ?"

Another reason for their fear was that they did not want to be disturbed in their state of spiritual somnolence. Someone has said that the reason the church of our day does not have a revival is because it doesn't want it. If revival fires began to burn crooked things would have to be made straight, wrongs would have to be put away, the pursuit of money would have to be set aside, and men would have to be set straight.

Our quiet, comfortable "churchianity" would be ruined. Well, is it true? If so, may God forgive us, clearly and begin the revival in us. Yes, let it begin. Lament, in me.

of the factions out into the open. Louisville's Mickey Brennan, organizer, which received favor from the State Administration, went with Barkley. Whether this will be a severe blow to Chandler, remains to be seen. This break was noted with interest and it may be a deciding factor in this primary race. The Louisville group received a jolt when the Legislature took Louisville's model Registration Law and offset it with a new registration and purgation bill. The politicians from the Metropolis screamed loudly murder at the action, declaring that the model registration law was one thing that was fine in that community and that the junking of that law would ruin the city. It was declared by Mayor Schultz that the law was made after much study and at a cost of \$70,000. It was declared an exceptionally good model law. However, if the result of the new plan is as expected and some 10,000 names are purged from the list, names of folk who are defunct or who have never existed, it appears to this column that there is nothing model about this law except that it gives the man who has the list of names, an unusual power to dominate the political situation in the city. Mayor Schultz spoke against the bill over radio. Joe Lawton, Louisville Republican, spoke against the purgation measure over radio. Each forecast disaster at its passage, however. Governor Chandler held the disposal in the palm of his hand. Assistant Attorney General E. Rank spoke in defense of the measure. He wrote it. He declared that the measure would not permit voters to change party affiliations between general elections and take part in a primary election of a party not their own. He said that it was not that a challenged voter had no appeal from the ruling of the state of the Kentucky Statutes, which has not been repealed and is not included in the bill. It is summarized to this that the State Administration is of the belief that there are many thousands

of names on the registration books that do not belong there and that the majority of these names are in Louisville, and if they are on the books and are names of non-existent people, they should come off. If there are, as is alleged, 10,000 names on the registration books, names of people who are not, and these names are controlled by one man, this gives one man the absolute control of 20,000 votes and that is enough votes to do most anything politically in a city the size of Louisville.

While the Senate race waxes hot, the Legislature is taking a back seat, so far as the news is concerned. The Representatives and Senators are doing a daily stint, mostly routine, listening to bills and trying to get them out before they adjourn sine die on March 1. The liquor control bill is still a mystery and the original bill, drafted by the Legislative council weeks before the opening of the legislature and at that time hailed as a "Whizbang of a masterpiece," was junked for another bill. This bill was drafted and all of the amendments proposed for the original, were included and many new features added. The measure was more than 100 pages in length and appeared to be just the thing it was shot to pieces before it came to the floor and it was passed into the limbo and "not wanted" along with several other measures and now the original bill is being talked of by the General Assembly. Action is due this week.

Circuit Judge King Swope of the Lexington District, the last Republican nominee for Governor, opposed to the impeachment proceeding when Sheriff Plumbe of Scott County asked that he be unseated. A House committee charged that he had abused the seven charges against Swope. H. B. Kinsolving, Shelbyville Commonwealth's Attorney in the twelfth district was hauled on impeachment proceedings but this likewise was dropped. Approximately 2,000 young Democrats, called in a body Saturday, on Governor Chandler and asked him to make the case for Senator. Senator Barkley was in Louisville last week conferring with his campaign manager, Shuck Miller, and Mrs. Lennie McLaughlin, the main spring in the Brennan organization. Barkley was in the Kentucky Hotel at the same time Governor Chandler was speaking there at a Highway Contractor's convention.

each section devoted to a single state, in which the names of the state, the state bird, and the state flower, with reproductions of the bird and flower in natural colors, are embroidered. Mrs. Geisler said that two or three years were required to assemble and draw the art work alone, the remaining two years being devoted to the embroidery work. She encountered many difficulties, she stated, in obtaining likenesses of some birds. The plan for instance, necessitated a trip to a zoo, where from a stuffed

It appearing to the Court that by the judgment herein the lands herein described have been condemned and the United States has paid into the Registry of the Court the amount awarded as compensation therefor and said funds now remain in the Registry; and it further appearing to the Court that the remaining questions to be determined are of an equitable nature, it is therefore ordered and adjudged that this action be and it is hereby transferred to the Equity docket.  
Therefore, in order that the claims of all parties to share in said funds may be properly established and determined, it is ordered by the Court that any party claiming the whole or any part of the land described and condemned herein, or of the above funds, who has not heretofore filed in this cause an appropriate pleading setting forth specifically the nature and extent of his claim, shall file the same within ninety (90) days from the date of the entry of this order, and in default thereof will be precluded from the benefit of this proceeding and from participating in the distribution of said fund.  
After the expiration of said ninety (90) days, all issues arising between adverse claimants shall be referred to the Court for its determination, and as to the rights of such claimants to share in said funds, shall stand for trial before the Court at such time as may be fixed by the Court; and if any such claimant shall fail to appear and prosecute his claim at the time so fixed, his claim to share in such fund may thereupon be dismissed by the Court for want of prosecution.  
Under the heading "Notice to File Claims," the Clerk shall cause a copy of the foregoing portion of this order to be published in one issue of the following newspapers, to-wit: Morehead Independent, Morehead, Ky., Licking Valley Courier, West Liberty, Ky.  
The cost of such publication shall be paid out of the funds held in the Registry of the Court in this action.
