MOREHEAD, Ky.--From Shakespeare to a Broadway musical and Brahms to Gershwin, Arts in Morehead (AIM) will offer a broad spectrum of programs this year.

Season subscriptions are available now for the 1988-89 series which opens Sept. 26 with a performance by the Chestnut Brass at 8 p.m. in Duncan Recital Hall.

AIM is a cooperative effort of Morehead State University and the Morehead-Rowan County Arts Council. Corporate supporters include Ashland Oil, Inc., Morehead National Bank and Peoples First Bank.

Other highlights of the season include:

Oct. 28, North Carolina Shakespeare Festival returns this year with a production of Shakespeare's tragedy "MacBeth," 8 p.m. in Button Auditorium. The company presented a modernized version of "A Midsummer Night's Dream" to a near capacity crowd in Button last year.

Nov. 29, Atlanta Chamber Players, a critically-acclaimed five person group performing traditional and contemporary classics, 8 p.m., First Baptist Church, Morehead.

Feb. 6, Joffrey II, one of America's foremost ballet companies whose repertoire includes works by some of today's brightest choreographers and classics by 19th Century masters, 8 p.m., Button Auditorium.

Feb. 8, Jomandi productions with DeJongh's "Do Lord Remember Me," a rich and warm drama, 8 p.m., Button Auditorium. The performance, co-sponsored by MSU's Minority Affairs Office, is a highlight of Black History Month and is partially funded by grants from Alternate ROOTS and the NEA Theatre Program.

March 27, Broadway musical, "42nd Street," a sparkling evening of jazz, dancing and singing, 8 p.m., Button Auditorium.

July 14, concert featuring the Morehead Celebration Chamber Orchestra and a guest conductor, 8 p.m., Duncan Recital Hall.

"The season line-up is really sensational this year," said Dr. Ron Fiel, AIM program chairman. "The talent that we are bringing to this region is of the same quality you would expect to find in a much more metropolitan area and at a much higher ticket cost," he added.

"We are proud to say that AIM has been able to hold season subscription prices at the same level as last year," Dr. Fiel noted.

Season tickets for all events are available at \$25 for an individual subscription or \$40 for a family. Also available for non-MSU students age 18 and younger is a season ticket for \$10.

For those people who want to encourage future programming of similar quality and other community arts programs, there are supporting membership categories in which a portion of the contribution is tax deductible. These are: Contributor, \$50; Patron, \$75 and Benefactor, \$125.

Season tickets will be sold from the AIM booth at Trademore Shopping Center during the upcoming Harvest and Hardwood Festival Sept. 16-18.

ASHLAND, Ky.--Morehead State University's Continuing Education Program for nursing and allied health professionals will sponsor a respiratory nursing workshop on Wednesday, Sept. 14, at the Quality Inn in Ashland.

The workshop is designed to provide information for registered and licensed practical nurses in Eastern Kentucky hospitals and health care agencies on ways to promote a higher level of health for coal miners suffering from occupational lung diseases.

The one-day session will start with registration at 8:30 a.m., classes will begin at 9 a.m. All participants will receive continuing education units from MSU and nurses will receive seven contact hours as approved by the Kentucky Board of Nursing. The cost is \$20.

The faculty for the workshop will be Micki McAndrew Harman, clinical specialist at Our Lady of Bellefonte Hospital in Ashland, and Janet J. Gross, associate professor of nursing at MSU.

Additional respiratory workshops are scheduled throughout MSU's service region during the coming year. Funding is being made possible by a grant from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services for this special education program.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Dr. Ralph E. Hillman, noted communication/marketing specialist, will present a one-day seminar on effective voice production and projection at Morehead State University on Thursday, Sept. 22.

The two 90-minute sessions scheduled for 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. in Duncan Recital Hall will deal with such aspects as breathing and breath support, voice qualities and the accompanying personality stereotypes as well as rate, pitch and volume.

"Not only does Dr. Hillman specialize in the technical training aspects of voice, but also in motivational behavior as well," said Vasile Venettozzi, MSU associate professor of music and coordinator for Dr. Hillman's campus visit.

"His presentation, which is free and open to the public, will be of great interest to students and teachers of music, theatre and speech from public schools as well as the University," she said.

The author of "Communication Strategies" and "Work for Your Voice," Dr. Hillman currently is a professor of speech and theatre at Middle Tennessee State University. A graduate of the University of Iowa, he earned the Ph.D. degree from Pennsylvania State University and took additional work at the University of Hawaii. MOREHEAD, Ky.--"Remember, if someone had not paid back a student loan, you might not have received yours."

That's the message that F.D. Donaldson, Morehead State University's student loan collector, gives students who finance their education with a National Direct Student Loan (NDSL).

"NDSL is a loan program and students who fund their education with it are expected to repay it," Donaldson said. Repayment is to begin six months after the student leaves school or graduates.

One of several federal student aid programs, the NDSL--also known as the Perkins Loan--has come under fire nationally in recent years because of a high rate of default. Participating institutions are facing a federal mandate to be more aggressive in collecting these loans.

By closely adhering to newly-established federal guidelines for collecting student loans, MSU has experienced a sharp drop in loan losses, according to Donaldson.

"In one year, MSU reduced its NDSL default rate by nearly four percent," Donaldson said.

On June 30, 1987, MSU has a default rate of 12.35 percent, while the national and state averages were 8.2 percent and 8.71 percent respectively.

As of June 30, 1988, the MSU rate had dropped to 8.57 percent and at the end of July it had fallen to 8.1 percent, according to Donaldson.

Although current national and state averages were not available for comparison, Donaldson noted that the federal guidelines established 7.5 percent as an "acceptable" default rate.

"The loan program is a revolving fund and when a student neglects to pay back a loan, it may deprive another student of badly needed funds for school," Donaldson said.

In the Fall of 1987, MSU had 824 students who were financing their college education under the NDSL program. "That translates into \$280,270 in loans. As the federal funds put into the program diminish, it becomes more and more important that we regain funds loaned," she explained.

"Actually the government has given institutions very specific guidelines to be followed and, where in the past many institutions were reluctant to sue for defaults, now we must sue," she said. "Of course this is only used as a last resort.

"Loan holders receive a variety of warnings before this step is taken and we don't let them get too far behind in payments before initiating steps to collect," she explained.

After a certain period, the debt is turned over to a private collection agency and if that agency is unsuccessful, it goes to a second private agency.

"A lot of this can be avoided if a loan holder will come to us and talk to us. Often we can temporarily restructure the repayment plans," she added.

"I think it's important to realize that not only is the University held accountable by the government, but also that we have to keep the collection rate up in order to respond to needs of new students," she said.

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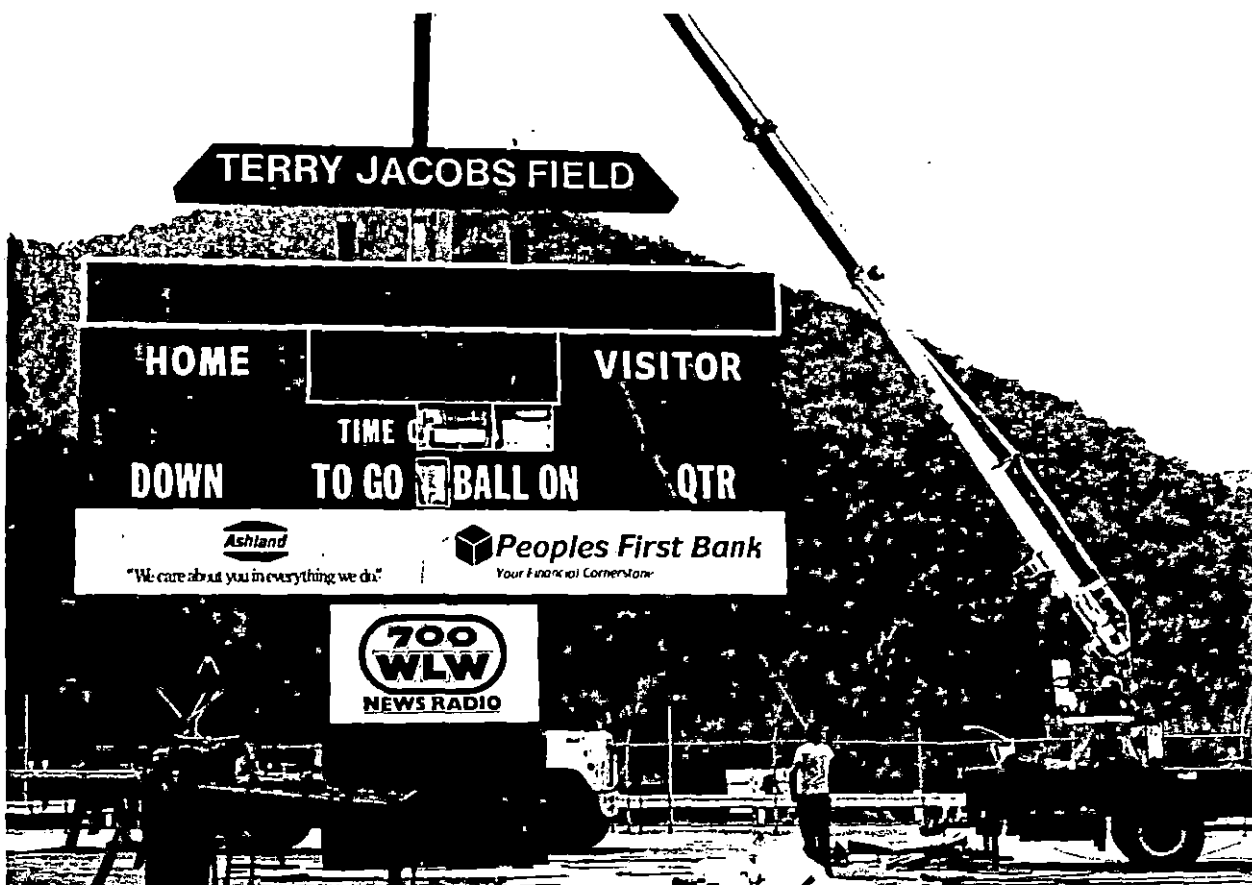
GOING UP

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Residents of three West Virginia counties bordering Kentucky will be able to attend Morehead State University under a reduced tuition rate next fall.

MSU's Board of Regents recently approved extending the MSU Award program to include Cabell, Wayne and Mingo counties in West Virginia.

Effective with the Fall 1989 semester, eligible students in those counties will receive a reduction in non-resident tuition and fees in the amount of \$1,200 a year. Out-of-state undergraduate tuition is \$1,600 per semester.

Incoming freshmen and transfer students may apply for the award which is renewable for an additional three years with acceptable grades.

"Ten years ago Morehead State led efforts to improve access to public higher education for students living in seven Southern Ohio counties along Kentucky's northern border by establishing the MSU Award," MSU President C. Nelson Grote said.

"Since then Tri-State educators, encouraged by civic and community leaders, have been exploring and implementing other ways to make higher education more accessible to students regardless of where they live," he added.

"We believe extending this award program into these specific West Virginia border counties is in keeping with the spirit of interstate cooperation existing today within the Tri-State's higher education community," Dr. Grote said.

The president noted that two years ago, MSU began offering instate tuition rates to nonresident students taking classes at the University's regional campuses. "As Tri-State residents crisscross statelines daily for work and services, it becomes more and more difficult to apply the narrow definitions of resident and non-resident status from the past," he added.

"Our primary goal as educators is to make education accessible to those who want the opportunity to prepare themselves for better lives. We hope that by extending the MSU Award into these West Virginia counties, the door to that opportunity has been opened a little wider," the president said.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Morehead State University's 1988 fall enrollment is up 12.5 percent over the fall of 1987, according to preliminary figures.

MSU's fall headcount enrollment shows 7,304 students as compared with the 6,490 students reported last fall, MSU President C. Nelson Grote announced today.

It is the University's largest student body since enrollment peaked at an all-time high of 7,676 in 1978, according to University records.

In addition, the full-time student enrollment of 5,543, which is up nearly 18 percent from last fall, set a new school record as the largest number of students taking a full load of classes. The previous high was 4,748 in 1977.

Approximately 3,600 of those full-time students are living in residence halls this fall as compared with about 3,000 in the fall of 1987.

"We are excited about the growth," Dr. Grote noted. "Three years ago our enrollment was less than 5,700 and now we have our second highest figure in 10 years," he said.

"The most gratifying aspect of this dramatic enrollment increase is that it indicates the growing awareness in our service region of the importance today of higher education and education at all levels," Dr. Grote said.

"Many people here and in our region have worked hard to promote Morehead State and also to foster an appreciation of the value of post secondary education in today's society. The University and the people we serve are beginning to reap the benefits of these efforts," Dr. Grote said.

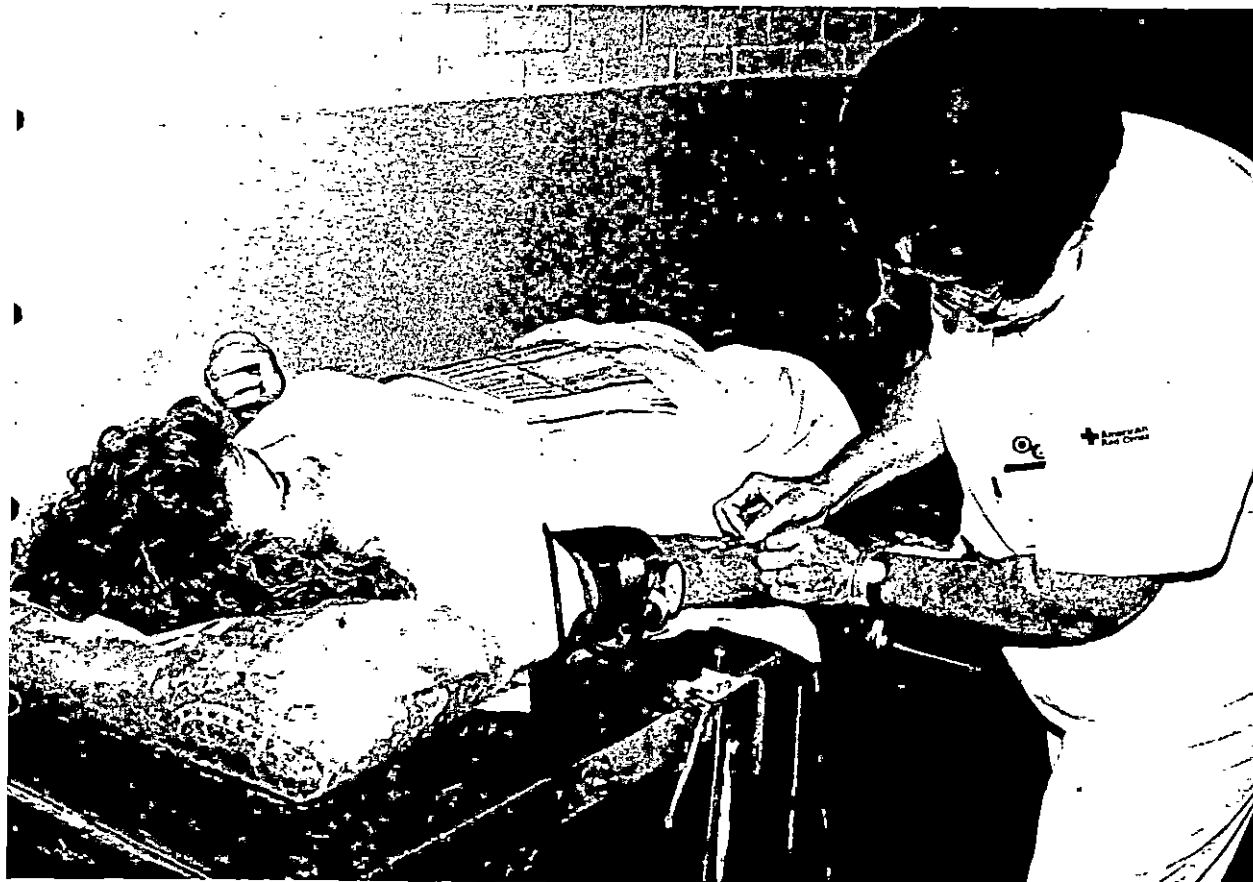

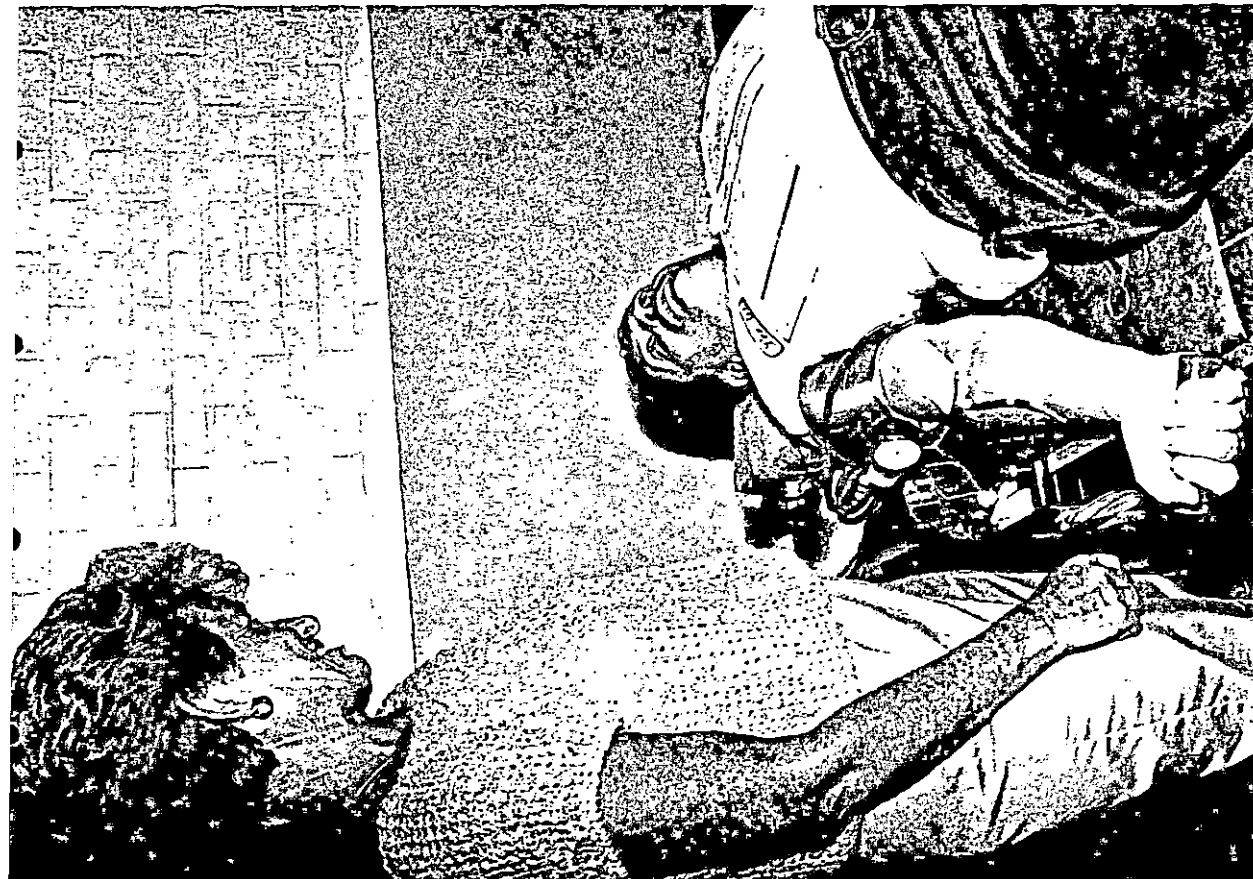

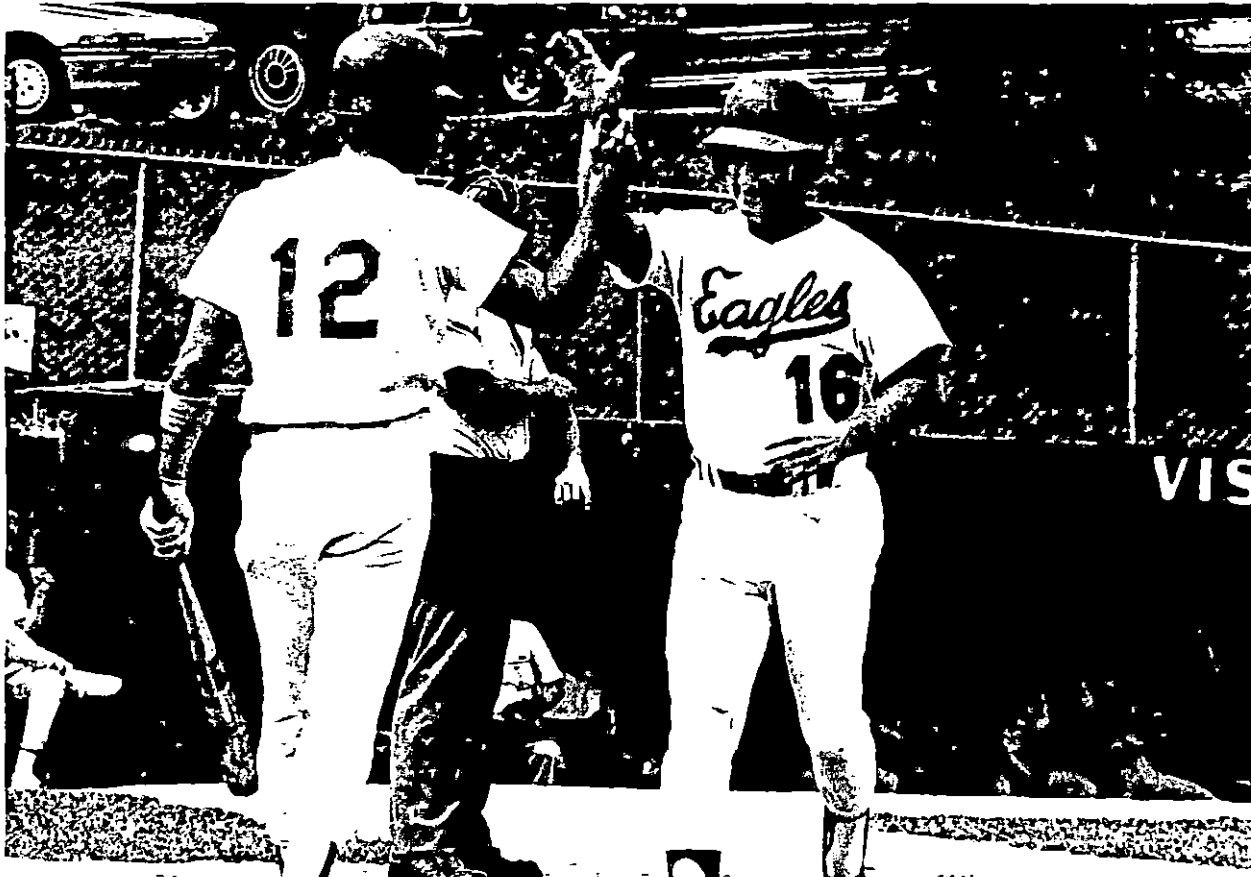

The show, which runs from Oct. 4 to Nov. 5 in the Strider Gallery, Claypool-Young Art Building, will include sculpture, paintings and photographs. Gallery hours are 8 a.m.-4 p.m., weekdays.

An opening reception, which is free and open to the public, is scheduled on Thursday, Oct. 6, from 7 to 9 p.m. in conjunction with the 1988 Homecoming activities which take place that weekend (Oct. 6-9) on MSU's campus.

"In his work, Don is dealing with humor and his own humorous interpretation of common sayings of today," said Tom Sternal, MSU's Department of Art chair. "His work comes from his background of working with puppets and marionettes and the idea that each piece can stand alone and make a statement."

Young, who doesn't admit to liking one media better than another, uses whatever method most suitable to express the idea that he wants to convey. "I have always believed that we live in the most beautiful area in the world, so my paintings and photographs depict my impressions of the surroundings," he said.

"My sculpture not only communicates concepts, but displays the beauty of the wood itself," he continued. The sculpture pieces for this show will feature abstract concepts based on television show titles which Young calls "TV and 3-D" and are made from woods common to the region.

An optimistic person, Young takes his work seriously. While he enjoys life to the fullest, he wants those who view his works to see the beauty and humor that life has to offer.

"We shouldn't dwell on doom and disaster--and neither does my work," Young commented. "I want those who attend the show to leave feeling better than they did when they arrived."

A native of Rowan County, Young grew up in an art environment. His father, Thomas Young for whom MSU's art building gets part of its name, was an artist, musician and collector of many things. "Being exposed to this field from an early age, there was never any doubt what direction I wanted to go with a career," he noted.

Young took an absence from art from 1972 to 1987 to serve as director of alumni relations. "I put my work on hold because I love MSU and I thought I could convey this feeling to other graduates by working directly with them," he explained. "But when it comes down to it, I guess I love art more than anything else in the world and having the opportunity to once again teach and produce art works of my own is becoming the high point of my career."

A two-time graduate of MSU, he taught art on the island of Guam and in Ohio--Xenia and Portsmouth--before joining MSU's faculty in 1967.

"I guess I have had all this creative urge building up during my absence from art," Young said. "Now that I have returned to my real love, it has almost become a compulsion to produce my works."

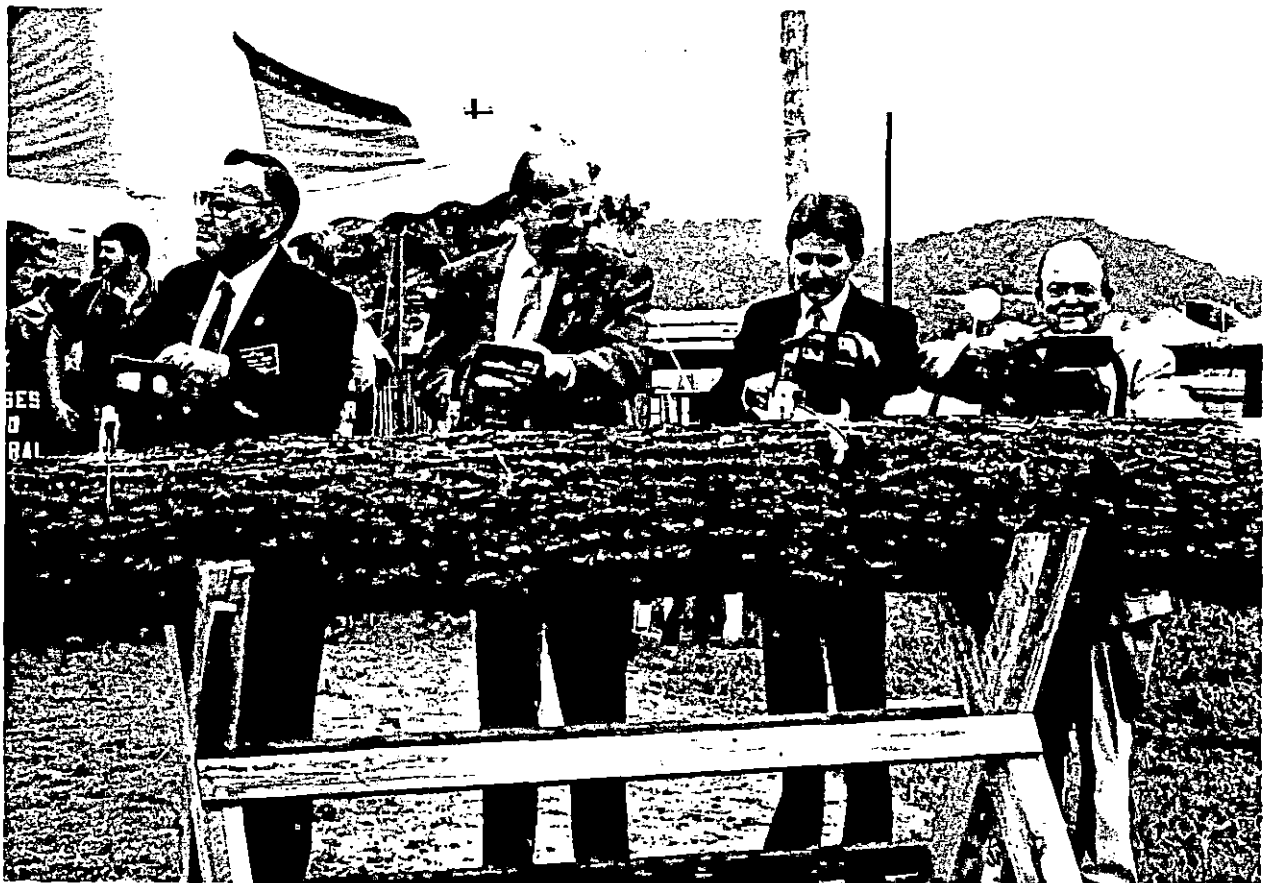

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Homecoming '88 at Morehead State University will be a bittersweet event for John E. Collis, director of the University Store. It will be his last one as a full-time member of the MSU family, because he plans to retire at the end of October.

MSU homecomings have been a part of his life since he came to the University on a football scholarship in 1946, recruited by the athletic officer at Pre-Flight School at Iowa University, named Ellis T. Johnson.

After graduating from MSU with honors in 1949, Collis became manager of the bookstore. He has missed only one homecoming--it conflicted with his son's wedding. In fact he's only missed five home football games in his 42 years at MSU.

Collis has seen "tremendous" growth over his career which has spanned four plus decades and seven presidents. He's watched the bookstore grow from a little cubby hole in the downstairs west end of Rader Hall where he and a student workshop served about 600 students to a more than 10,000-square-foot full-service University Store with eight full-time staff members and 10 to 12 workshops during the academic year.

In the late 1940s, the bookstore grossed about \$17,000 a year. Today that's an average for one of the six cash registers going full-tilt on a registration day, according to Collis.

One of his first moves as manager was to knock out the wall of his "cubby hole" to expand the bookstore into a classroom area where he began to stock other merchandise--sweatshirt, t-shirts and jackets, much the same as offered today.

In those early days, he not only was responsible for the bookstore operation, but also the University Post Office and the concessions. Over the years, he took time to be a chartering sponsor of the social fraternity known as the Aquila Club (the forerunner of Pi Kappa Alpha) and was active in the "M" Club.

In 1958, the University Store trebled its original space with a move into the "Student House," which was located on the site where Adron Doran University Center now stands.

Then came the construction of ADUC, which was built "around us and we could feel the building vibrate from the jack hammers tearing up the sidewalk and the pile drivers pounding in supports," Collis recalled.

"It really played havoc with our book operation, but it just happened there was a dean of the then-College of Applied Sciences, named Nelson Grote, who offered us space in the Cassity Building, so we were able to buy back books that spring term in relative calm," Collis continued. The summer of 1969 was hectic for Collis and his staff as they took inventory, moved and opened a new store in July which again tripled their space.

University Store merchandise over the years hasn't changed that much, according to Collis. What's hot goes in cycles with jackets being the top seller one year and sweatshirts being even bigger the next. "Sweatshirt styles change though and it's fun trying to stay ahead of fashion," he said. "We have to know just when the 'California look' is going to be popular with the midwest student."

Sweatshirts have been the most enduring sales item throughout the years, while graduates still want a University ring. "There's a strong desire to remain visibly a part of the University," Collis said. Another popular item with returning alumni is children's merchandise with an MSU motif.

Besides the growth of his own operation, Collis has witnessed MSU's facilities grow over the years as the University's programs grew. In 1949, according to Collis, the building were mainly contained in the center of campus, but since then he's watched the campus expand from Reed Hall to the Academic-Athletic Center.

Collis also has seen changes in the student body the University serves, not just in numbers, but in its urbanization. The geographic barriers have been broken down because of better transportation and communication which has also affected the region's public schools. "Communication has improved so tremendously that students in the upper reaches of Letcher County now know as much about what is going on in the world as a student from Cincinnati," he said.

"Our students from the mountains and 'hollers' have always been fine youngsters, but with the progress in the public school educational programs today, they don't have to take a back seat to anyone. And with the breaking down of geographic barriers, we are attracting more urban area students as well," Collis said.

Working with the students, Collis maintains, has kept him young, but he admits to being startled when one of his own classmates Joe Lustig, who was coaching over at Maysville, showed up on campus one day with a young man and said, "I've brought my son over to go to college." Then, in what seemed only a few years later, Lustig turned up again with another young man and told Collis, "Well, I've brought my grandson over to enroll."

Collis said he believes the highest compliment MSU can have is when alumni send their children to MSU. "We're seeing more and more of this right now. Their children are the most important thing in their lives and when they bring them here that indicates a confidence in our University and its people," Collis said. In fact, Collis's own son--now an attorney--is an MSU product and just this fall a granddaughter enrolled in the nursing program.

One of the first questions for Collis from returning alumni is: "Are you still here?", followed by queries regarding the progress of the University. "They come back out of loyalty, not just because they hope to see someone they may have known for four years. There's a pride in their institution," said Collis, a past president and former executive secretary of the Alumni Association.

Collis knows a little about that institutional pride himself. After all, he chose to remain here despite other offers. What was so magic about Morehead? "Friendships, the cultural environment of a small town, a good place to rear our son and loyalties because it was my University. I wanted to feel that I could be a part of it, plus there was a little self-pride in what we were accomplishing. You can't develop something from a hole in the wall to what we now have without feeling some pride," he said.

"I've always been fortunate to feel an integral part of MSU, supported by the administration, faculty and staff. The presidents I've served under and all the other administrators have made it possible for me as a manager to do what has been done."

There's another person that Collis said he owes a debt of gratitude to and that is his wife Dot, whom he says has supported his decision to remain here. "Never once did she complain or indicate that she wished we'd done something else. I just hope our love will be strong enough to support me in retirement as well," he quipped.

Not only has Collis been involved in the University, but he is no stranger to church and civic commitments having been a lay leader and trustee in the United Methodist Church; active in the Boy Scouts of America program for 47 years and a recipient of the Silver Beaver Award, the highest scouting award given to a nonprofessional; Optimist Club charter member; Quarterback Club member, and past president of the Morehead Men's club. Collis also has given more than 14 gallons of blood to the Red Cross Blood program.

Come Nov. 1, Collis said he might just sleep a little later. He and his wife plan to do a little traveling, but Morehead and MSU will remain home to them--and he'll probably be cheering from the bleachers come Homecoming '89.

SPECIAL TO THE LOUISIVILLE DEFENDER BLACKS IN EDUCATION SUPPLEMENT

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Preliminary figures show that Morehead State University's 1988 fall enrollment increased by 12.5 percent, but the gains reported in the Black student population are even greater.

The 1988 freshman class reflects a 33½ percent increase from 1987, while the total Black student body went from 177 students in 1987 to 237 students this fall for a 34 percent increase, according to MSU's Office of Minority Affairs.

"Our recruitment efforts obviously have paid a dividend in bringing us new minority students," said Jerry Gore, minority student affairs director. "A lot of that credit goes to Peggy Overly, minority student recruiter, and our own students who have worked diligently in getting the word out that MSU cares about the Black student," Gore said.

"But our job doesn't end when they enroll; in fact it has just begun. Morehead State is committed to providing an environment to meet the cultural and academic needs of these students," Gore added.

"We have created a buddy system to help them adjust to college life and we bring in successful Blacks, including our own alumni, who can talk to them about their own experiences and serve as role models," Gore said.

"There are even special scholarships and grants earmarked for Black students. In fact we've been recognized by the Greater Lexington YMCA through its Black Achievers Program for our efforts," he added.

Gore and his staff members believe student involvement is important and urge Black students to participate in all aspects of campus life, including activities specifically for Blacks. "These help to promote a sense of family," Gore said.

Special programs last year included the campus serving as a host site for a satellite videoconference on "Racism on Campus: Toward an Agenda for Action." Among the nationally-known Black leaders who spoke during the year were Attallah Shabazz, film producer and daughter of Malcolm X; television producer Gil Nobel, and Dwight Ellis of the National Association of Broadcasters.

"For Morehead State equal access for minority students to academic programs is not just a mandate, it is a matter of conscience and commitment," said MSU President C. Nelson Grote. "We are extremely proud of a new program--a partnership with the public schools--implemented this fall, which may become a national model."

The program, known as the Minority Teacher Education Recruitment Project, is designed to encourage young blacks to become teachers. Fayette and Jefferson counties are formal participants in the partnership and Maysville area school officials are exploring participation.

"Kentucky and the nation as a whole are facing a critical shortage of black teachers on one hand, while the number of black students is increasing," Dr. Grote said.

MSU's program is funded with assistance from the Council on Higher Education and the state Department of Education. This fall 20 students enrolled at MSU as part of the program. Their progress will be monitored and academic support programs will be available. These students also will take part in recruiting the next class.

The program calls for identification of high school juniors and seniors, who then receive an orientation to MSU and its services while spending a week on campus which also includes three hours of classes dealing with basic and personal development skills. Follow-up visits to the high schools are made during the year.

The identification of other potential students will begin in the spring of 1989 with seventh graders whose interest in teaching will be nurtured throughout high school. Targeted students will be brought back to the campus each spring for a weekend to support and maintain their interest.

Working closely with the School of Education project are two new minority staff members: Linda Lucas, who previously was an elementary school counselor in the Montgomery County (Md.) schools and holds the M.A. degree from Virginia State University, project director, and Roscoe Linton, former co-pastor of Caldwell Memorial AME Zion Church in Jeffersonville, Ind., who earned the B.A. degree in sociology from MSU, co-director.

MSU's commitment isn't limited solely to student recruitment, but extends to faculty and staff too. This year the University added two additional black faculty members, holders of doctorates.

They are: Dr. Jonathon Theodore Latimer, assistant professor of social work, and Dr. Joyce Meggerson-Moore, associate professor of education.

A native of Arkansas, Dr. Latimer earned his A.B. degree from Lincoln University, the M.S.W. degree from Fordham University and the Ph.D. degree from Atlanta University. He is a former director of the Goweta (Ga.) County Mental Health Center, Youth Opportunities Unlimited in New York and served as executive director for the Drug Addiction Rehabilitation Enterprise in New York. His professional memberships include the National Association of Social Workers, the Association of Black Social Workers and the Council on Social Work Education.

Formerly director of Chartiers Mental Retardation Services, a community-based program in Pittsburgh, Pa., Dr. Meggerson-Moore holds the Ph.D. degree from St. Louis University, an M.S. degree from the University of Central Arkansas and her B.A. degree from Hendrix College. She served on the Governor's Task Force for Juvenile Justice in Arkansas. She also has been a director of day treatment programs in mental health and mental retardation in St. Louis, Mo. She has written several proposals for funding from private industry to develop community partnerships.

Also new to the campus is Donna Yvette Goins, MSU's first black female residence hall director. Goins, a native of New Tazewell, Tenn., who earned the Master of Education degree from Lincoln Memorial University, is the director of Butler Hall.
