MOREHEAD, Ky.--When Morehead State University President C. Nelson Grote was inaugurated last year, former Gov. Edward Breathitt, vice chairman of the MSU Board of Regents predicted:

"The Morehead (State) eagle will soar like it has never soared before."

Today the University is looking at its largest student body since enrollment peaked at an all-time high of 7,676 in 1978. Based on preliminary figures, the fall 1988 headcount enrollment of 7,304 represents a 12.5 percent increase over the previous fall. When combined with last fall's growth of 10.1 percent, this represents a 22.6 percent enrollment increase in two years.

The number of full-time students--those taking 12 credit hours or more--is among the highest in the University's history. The full-time student enrollment this fall of 5,543 is up nearly 18 percent from last year.

Academic affairs administrators report the retention rate of first-time, full-time freshmen returning this year as sophomores has jumped to 67.7 percent as compared with a 62.5 percent retention rate the University has been averaging over a five year period.

With the increase in enrollment in the fall of 1987, MSU reopened three residence halls that had been placed in "moth balls" during a period of a declining student population. Residence hall population last year was about 3,000 students and this fall that figure reflects a 21.4 percent growth with more than 3,600 students living in 13 residence halls.

On the drawing board are plans not only to renovate one of the older halls currently in use, but also to renovate another which has not been in use as a residence hall since spring 1983. Both halls should be in first class condition by fall 1990.

More students also created a need for more classes and more faculty to teach those classes, so 25 new full-time faculty positions have been added to meet those demands.

MSU's growth has not been limited to enrollment but encompasses just about every sector, including fund raising where the 1987-88 total for private giving, \$614,288, represents the second best year in the University's history as annual giving increased 35 percent. The previous year set an all-time record for the University's private giving program with one capital gift of \$684,379 which pushed the total program over the million dollar mark. Also the number of active alumni almost doubled during the past year.

All of these are measures or elements of the synergy that results with growth and positive feelings about the University.

Not too long ago, the picture was very different. MSU was plagued by a steady erosion of enrollment and internal struggles which polarized the campus community and tarnished its image in the region.

Dr. Grote is quick to point out that the MSU eagle began "to soar" before his arrival and credits initiatives of Dr. A.D. Albright, his predecessor who served from July 1, 1986, until June 30, 1987.

Under Dr. Albright's tenure as the University's 10th president, a major recruitment marketing program was launched; efforts were made to mend broken relationships with civic and educational leaders throughout the region, and to rebuild campus morale and alumni pride.

"We've fine tuned many of these initiatives, continuing to build upon them," Dr. Grote said. Reflecting earlier this fall on his presidency's first year, he characterized it as the first in "a period of growth and transition.

"There are a lot of people whose efforts have made our growth possible," said Dr. Grote, who had been an MSU administrator from 1960 to 1971. "That list includes our own dedicated faculty and staff, the status of our Board of Regents so ably headed by Gov. (Louie B.) Nunn, our supportive alumni and all those many friends of MSU who believe in what this institution means to its service region," he added.

Recalling the slogan that he used during his first year as president, Dr. Grote said:

"One person can't do it all by himself, but 'Together We Can.' Together we can make the MSU eagle soar to even greater heights."

MOREHEAD, Ky.--A Morehead State University faculty member has been designated as a 1988 Al Smith Fellowship recipient by the Kentucky Arts Council.

Dr. Michelle Boisseau, associate professor of English and who has received other awards for her poetry, is one of 10 creative artists in the commonwealth who were selected from 150 applicants.

The fellowships, valued at \$5,000 each and named for the Council's former chairman, may be used by recipients to support their professional and creative development, according to Roger L. Paige, Council director.

The awards were made on the basis of excellence, creativity and individuality of the artists' current work and on the potential for the grant to enhance the recipient's professional development, Paige said.

A member of MSU's Department of English, Foreign Languages and Philosophy since 1987, Dr. Boisseau serves as adviser for Inscape, the University's student literary magazine.

Dr. Boisseau's writings--both fiction and poetry--have appeared in such literary journals as Poetry, The Georgia Review, The New England Review, The Missouri Review and others. She also was the 1988 recipient of the Cecil Hemley Award from the Poetry Society of America and took first place in the 1985 National Poetry Competition.

A former member of the humanities faculty at Virginia Intermont College, she holds the Ph.D. degree from the University of Houston, the M.A. and B.A. (summa cum laude) from Ohio University.

This is the sixth year the fellowships have been presented by the Council, a division of the Kentucky Department of the Arts, and the categories for the creative awards are alternated each year. This year applications were solicited from composers, poets, writers of fiction, playwrights and choreographers. In 1989, those in the fields of visual arts, film and video, performance art, conceptual art and other new genres may apply.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Business students at Morehead State University are eligible to take part in the first AT&T Collegiate Investment Challenge, a four-month competition which begins Nov. 1.

MSU's chapter of Phi Beta Lambda, a student business club, is promoting campus participation in the national project which is designed to create a better understanding of the world of business through an investment project.

The project works like this:

When the stock market opens for trading on Tuesday morning, Nov. 1, participating college students will take control of their own \$500,000 brokerage account and begin competing against thousands of students from across the country.

For the next four months, they will buy and sell real stocks in an effort to maximize the value of their portfolios. A full service brokerage firm has been set up to handle all trading activity and provide human assistance throughout the event.

When participants are ready to start investing they just pick up their phone and call their broker on a special toll-free 800 line. Their broker is positioned at a fully automated trading desk ready to execute trades based on up to the minute stock quotes beamed in via satellite from the Exchanges in New York.

At the end of each month, players will be mailed a personal three page account statement and newsletter. The statement will provide an account summary, a record of all their transactions, a complete listing of portfolio holdings, and a current valuation of their account. There will also be a rankings section showing how each participant fared against students in their class, at their college, and across the country.

Participants must register to compete by Oct. 21 and the competition is limited to the first 25,000 college and university students enrolling. There is an entry fee of \$49.95 per student and participants must be enrolled in two-year or four-year accredited colleges or universities.

At stake are cash awards ranging from \$25,000 for first place to \$1,000 for 10th place and several other awards ranging from a plaque and certificate for the top student at each college to athletic shoes and watches.

The top 10 players in the country will be flown with a guest to New York City and honored at an awards ceremony. These top 10 players and a guest will spend two nights at the Marriott Marquis in the heart of Manhattan. While there, they will be taken on a VIP tour of the New York Stock Exchange, attend a Broadway show and be interviewed on national television. Then it's off to the Bahamas for a full week of fun in the sun.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Dr. Judy R. Rogers, professor of English at Morehead State University, has been named dean of undergraduate programs at the University.

She assumed her new role earlier this month, according to Dr. Stephen S. Taylor, MSU vice president for academic affairs, who announced the appointment.

Dr. Rogers, who had been serving as an assistant to the vice president for academic affairs, also is co-director of the University's institutional self-study under way for the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS).

"Already respected as an educator by her faculty peers, Dr. Rogers also has consistently shown excellent administrative skills and leadership in her part-time association with us," Dr. Taylor said. "We believe she will be an effective link between the faculty and this office," he added.

As dean, Dr. Rogers will be responsible for overseeing, reviewing and assessing undergraduate curriculum programs, including the general education component; serve as chair of the University Undergraduate Curriculum Committee, and coordinate academic advising.

She also will be responsible for MSU's Testing Center, Correspondence Studies Program and the various programs within the Academic Services Center, including provisional studies and TRIO.

"In establishing this post, we were able to consolidate supervision and coordination of several academic and support service areas, while eliminating an executive level directorship," Dr. Taylor said. "The realignment of resources should provide for a more efficient academic structure," he added.

A former MSU Faculty Senate chair, Dr. Rogers joined the faculty in 1967, teaching until 1970 when she left to complete her doctorate at the University of North Carolina-Chapel Hill where she was a teaching assistant. She returned to MSU in 1973.

She earned her baccalaureate degree from Centre College and her master's degree from UNC-Chapel Hill. A two-time Woodrow Wilson Fellow, she also participated in a National Endowment for the Humanities Summer Seminar for College Teachers at Princeton University.

A frequent presenter at professional meetings, she is co-author with her husband, Dr. Glenn C. Rogers, also an MSU professor of English, of one textbook which is now in its second edition. The pair has another text scheduled to be published in 1989 by Wadsworth Printing Company.

Her professional memberships include the National and Kentucky Councils of Teachers of English, the Conference on College Composition and Communication and Phi Delta Kappa. She currently is a member of the advisory board for MSU's Academy of Arts and edits the state newsletter for Kentucky's Delta Kappa Gamma.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Mid-year faculty and staff pay increases and a one-time salary supplement for all full-time personnel were approved by Morehead State University's Board of Regents at its meeting Friday, Oct. 7.

All full-time faculty and staff members will receive a \$400 gross non-recurring supplement to their salary at the end of the fall semester at a total cost of \$437,100. Funding for the one-time supplement came from the University's fund balance (reserve).

The board allocated another \$168,750 to provide salary adjustments to faculty base salaries. Two percent of the funds will be added to faculty base salaries to adjust them in relationship to respective benchmarks, while one percent will be used to correct individual inequities.

A number of staff members will be affected by the \$60,000 added to the base salary pool to address individual salary inequities and continue funding the staff compensation schedule.

The faculty and staff base salary increments, effective Jan. 1, were funded out of the University's 1988-89 operating budget from increased revenues primarily in tuition and fees.

MSU President C. Nelson Grote told the board that enrollment growth in 1987-88 had accounted for the additional revenues in the fund balance while this year's 12.5 percent enrollment increase was reflected in the additions to the current operating budget. Efficient management of resources also contributed to a 30 percent increase in the fund balance at the close of Fiscal 1988.

In other business, the regents accepted the financial report for the first quarter and amended the FY 89 operating budget to reflect an increase in revenue of .07 percent. The board also accepted the 1987-88 audit report by Kelley, Galloway and Company. Upon a recommendation from the firm calling for a formalized internal audit program, the board authorized Dr. Grote and other appropriate University officials to initiate the process for such a function.

MSU also was given the go ahead to obtain the services of an architectural/engineering firm through the FAC to develop a Campus Master Plan. Such a plan will assist the University in making decisions regarding its actual physical development; provide an information base for its short range and long range capital planning needs and requests to the state, and compliment SACS reaccreditation efforts.

In addition to reports on the 1988 fall enrollment, the athletics study, NCATE and SACS, land acquisition and WMKY-FM projects, the board heard a report on the 1987-88 private giving year-the University's second best fund raising year with \$614,288 in gifts. The previous year's giving of \$1.1 million, an all-time high included a one-time capital gift of \$684,379. This year's total included a nearly 35 percent increase in annual giving over the past year.

Among other actions taken, the board approved or ratified the following: Personnel actions from July 18 to Sept. 16.

Moving the computer center from Reed Hall to Ginger Hall. This would result in increased space for academic use in Reed, consolidation of computing services personnel and resources in a centrally-located area, and in a more technologically secure area.

Upgrading the administrative and academic copmputer systems, both of which have reached a saturation point.

Development of a new state-of-the-art telecommunications and data network in conjunction with the final design for the renovation of the University's utilities.

Acquisition of a 0.2 acre tract currently leased for parking and appraisal of another parcel with structure, both pieces of property front on Second Street.







MOREHEAD, Ky.--Morehead State University has launched a Peer Advising Program this fall aimed at increasing the retention rate of those "undecided" freshmen who enroll without a major.

A joint effort of the Office of Academic Affairs and the Student Government
Association, the Peer Advising Program works on the buddy system with upperclassmen
providing social as well as academic mentoring.

The program is a pilot project, according to Dr. Judy Rogers, MSU's dean of undergraduate programs. "We will need to evaluate its success and see if it really serves as an aid to retention," she said.

"We hope to use this program to help those "undecided" students select a field of study, and also to provide assistance in making the transition to college from high school," she said. "They need to know about campus life and campus services as much as they need to know what courses to take."

According to Dr. Rogers, once students select their majors, they will be assigned to a faculty adviser in the appropriate department.

"Studies show that there is a direct correlation between an affiliation with a specific program and its faculty and retention of students," explained Dr. Rogers.

"All of us in the University need to make a concentrated effort to give students sufficient guidance to select a major field."

The program calls for 25 to 30 juniors or seniors in good academic standing to be selected and trained through MSU's Academic Services Center. Each adviser will be responsible for 12 advisees.

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Supervising the peer advisers will be retired faculty or staff members who have volunteered to help with the program.

In addition to learning about the project itself, the peer advisers will receive special training in helping their advisees cope with the stress of mid-term exams and resulting grades. Another session will prepare the peer adviser to assist their advisees in making out a schedule for the spring semester.

"I think it is important to stress that one of the primary functions of the peer advisers is to be there to provide support to their advisees. The program is not strictly geared to academic needs," Dr. Rogers said.

An advisory committee has been set up to coordinate the program with representatives from the student body, the Office of Residence Education, faculty members from each college and retired faculty.

"MSU's Student Government President Andy Parker and Student Regent Sheridan Martin have demonstrated what student leadership is all about as they have been in the forefront in supporting and developing this program," Dr. Rogers noted.

If the project is successful, MSU officials will seek funding from an educational foundation to assist in its continuation and expansion.

Supported with a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts, the residency is one of two scheduled by the University to bring writers whose themes are national in scope to the campus, according to Dr. Michelle Boisseau, associate professor of English and residency project director.



MOREHEAD, Ky.--Radio's most famous play, The War of the Worlds, was originally broadcast on Halloween Eve in 1938 by Orson Welles' Mercury Theatre.

This Halloween Eve, 50 years later, WMKY will present the Otherworld Media's 50th anniversary production of Howard Koch's famous science fiction radio thriller. The broadcast will air on 90.3 FM at 10 p.m. Halloween Eve, Sunday, Oct. 30, and again Halloween night at 9 p.m.

WMKY Program Director Daniel Picazo called The War of the Worlds original "the greatest Halloween prank ever. And, maybe, it was the first time that international society woke up and discovered that the new broadcast age had arrived," added Picazo. A new broadcast age has arrived once again with the 50th anniversary production.

The War of the Worlds 50th Anniversary Production stars Jason Robards as Professor Pierson, the main witness of a Martian invasion which starts in Grovers Mill, N.J., and threatens to destroy the world. The program is the first authorized new production of Koch's script since Welles brought it to the airwaves and made radio history 50 years ago. It is also the first radio drama ever to be recorded on location, like a movie, using a state-of-the-art portable digital recorder.

Otherworld Media's production of The War of the Worlds was produced by Judith Walcutt and directed by veteran radio dramatist Davis Ossman, a founding member of The Firesign Theatre. Sound design for the project was provided by Academy Award-winning designer Randy Thom whose credits include "Never Cry Wolf," "Apocalypse Now," "The Right Stuff," and "The Empire Strikes Back."

"This is one of the most ambitious radio productions ever done," said Thom.

"It is certainly the most ambitious I've ever worked on. Welles used sound in a very sophisticated way for his time and his listeners, and to be true to that, we have to be as sophisticated as our time and our listeners. I like to think Welles would have welcomed our 'cinematic' approach to a piece he realized so brilliantly."

Prior to recording the production, director Ossman worked with Koch to update the language of the original script. The names, places, and events have remained the same, but the military references, slang, news coverage style, etc. have been modernized so that the new production, while remaining true to the original, will sound current rather than like a nostalgia piece.

"The script is still a 'grabber' even after 50 years," said Ossman. "We want this new production to call people's attention to the power and magic that radio theatre still has, to the possibility of people once again turning to radio regularly for this kind of entertainment."

As Princeton astronomer Richard Pierson, Robards, an incomparable master of the stage and screen, will once again bring to the airwaves the role Welles made famous in 1938.

Comedian, actor, composer and talk-show host Steve Allen is featured as the New York network newsman who keeps broadcasting "to the last." The War of the Worlds also features legendary CBS radio newsman Douglas Edwards as a radio newscaster who provides informed commentary on the impending end of civilization.

Two of National Public Radio's foremost personalities, Scott Simon and Terry Gross, took a break from their regular network programs to join The War of the Worlds cast. Simon, anchor of NPR's Saturday "Weekend Edition" and himself a veteran "hot-spot" reporter, plays Carl Phillips, the newscaster who accompanies Professor Pierson to Grovers Mill, the sight of the first Martian landing. Gross, host of NPR's daily interview show "Fresh Air," plays a board operator.

The production was predominantly recorded on location at George Lucas' Skywalker Ranch in Marin County, Calif. Presented by WGBH Radio Boston, the program is made possible by grants from McGavren Guild Radio and the National Endowment for the Arts.


