MOREHEAD, Ky.--Morehead State University has received the green light to increase the number of students in its Radiologic Technology Program with the approval of two new clinical education sites.

The Joint Review Committee on Education in Radiologic Technology has approved the addition of Pattie A. Clay Hospital in Richmond and Danville's Ephraim McDowell Medical Center as clinical centers, according to Bill May, the committee chairman.

MSU has been authorized to place six students at Clay and seven at the McDowell Center.

Currently the enrollment in the RT Program is limited to 62 students, divided equally between first and second year classes. The additional clinical centers will increase the enrollment capacity to 88 students, according to Rae P. Smith, coordinator of MSU's RT Program. "This means that next fall we will be able to accept 13 additional students into the program," Smith said.

The new clinical facilities join nine other Kentucky hospitals that serve as training sites:

Harlan Appalachian Regional Hospital, Hazard Appalachian Regional Hospital, Prestonsburg's Highlands Regional Medical Center, Humana Hospital Lake Cumberland in Somerset, Mt. Sterling's Mary Chiles Hospital, Humana Hospital--Louisa, Maysville's Meadowview Regional Hospital, Morgan County Appalachian Regional Hospital at West Liberty and Morehead's St. Claire Medical Center.

Students in MSU's RT Program spend 50 percent of their time in the classroom and the other 50 percent gaining "hands-on" clinical experience in three different hospitals affiliated with the program. The program is 24 months long with alternating semesters in the classroom and clinical education centers.

"We try to assign them to hospitals in the general vicinity of their homes," Smith explained. The MSU program's clinical coordinator Barbara Barker supervises the students' performance at the hospital. The RT faculty also includes Jackie Darling, instructor.

Now in its 16th year, MSU's associate degree program is among the top 25 in size nationally, according to Smith. "The average class size nationwide is between eight and 15 students," Smith explained.

"There is a shortage of qualified radiologic technologists across the country, so graduates are in great demand," Smith said. Beginning technologists earn salaries ranging from \$8.50 to \$10 an hour, with increments following their certification.

"The demand is expected to remain constant for the next decade and we expect salaries to be even higher. We don't even meet the needs for RT personnel in Eastern Kentucky and we receive inquiries about graduates from all over the country," she said.

Since 1973, MSU has been placing graduates of its program in 27 hospitals in Eastern Kentucky, Ohio and West Virginia, as well as in clinics, physicians offices and other health care facilities.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Morehead State University has received a \$1,000 grant which will allow the Fleming County and Letcher County Public Libraries to offer patrons two courses by means of video cassettes.

The telecourses are available to students seeking credit and to library patrons on a non-credit basis, according to Dr. Judy Rogers, dean of Undergraduate Programs at MSU, who is coordinating the project. "Students and patrons will be asked to complete information forms when using the materials," she said.

The collected data will help to research and to establish partnerships between higher education institutions, public libraries, and KET that will provide video learning opportunities for Kentuckians, Dr. Rogers noted.

The two telecourses which utilize video cassettes, textbook, and study guides, are:

"For All Practical Purposes," an introductory course which brings contemporary mathematics to liberal arts, business, computer science and education students. It is divided into five topic areas, with a concluding program: management, science, statistics, social choice, size and shape, and computer science.

"The New Literacy," which includes an overview of computer functions, data processing, hardware/software systems, and applications.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--An alliance of Kentucky science and math teachers is being established and Morehead State University will serve as the administering agent for one district.

The network will consist of teachers who have formed communication links to help each other and to identify and access resources, according to Dr. John C. Philley, College of Arts and Sciences dean, who is the district coordinator for the project.

"The primary goal is to provide a mechanism by which teachers can effectively communicate with one another to enrich their instruction and enhance student learning in the science and math fields," Dr. Philley said.

The alliance was funded by a \$10,000 grant from the Council on Higher Education which divided the state into six districts. MSU will serve as the fiscal agent for District 6 which includes 24 Eastern Kentucky counties.

Members will be selected from the science and math teachers to serve on advisory boards and assist in carrying out the goals of the alliance.

"The nice thing about this plan is the potential for up-and-down flow of information," Dr. Philley noted. "For instance, that information could be the identification of resources and the distribution of this information down to the teacher who needs to know about these resources."

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Gov. Wallace Wilkinson has appointed two Morehead State University alumni to the school's Board of Regents and reappointed three regents whose terms had expired.

Former regent Jerry F. Howell of Jackson and G. Duane Hart of Corbin, MSU alumni, are the new appointees.

Howell, who served on the board from 1968 to 1984 and was chairman in his final year, was appointed to a term ending April 1, 1991, replacing Barbara Curry of Lexington.

A real estate developer, hardware dealer and former teacher, Howell also served four terms as a Kentucky legislator--three in the House and one in the Senate.

Hart, the division manager for human resources with American Greetings Corporation, is a former high school teacher and guidance counselor and has been a personnel executive with American Greetings since 1969.

Hart replaces former Gov. Louie B. Nunn, who resigned, and will serve the remainder of that term which ends March 31, 1990.

Reappointed to terms ending in 1992 were William R. Seaton of Ashland, the current board chairman and retired Ashland Oil, Inc., executive; Walter Carr, Morehead businessman and an MSU alumnus, and Charles Wheeler, Ashland businessman and former state representative.

MSU President C. Nelson Grote commended Gov. Wilkinson for providing a "continuity of leadership" on the board with the reappointments, noting that the three men had shown "keen insight into affairs of higher education during their tenure."

Describing the new appointees as "respected citizens of the Commonwealth," Dr. Grote said the University "looks forward to their personal involvement in the governance of the institution as we continue to grow quantitatively and qualitatively in service to the people of Eastern Kentucky and throughout the Commonwealth."

Dr. Grote also expressed his pleasure that three alumni had been given the opportunity to play an important role in their alma mater's future.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Morehead State University's Spring 1989 enrollment has reached an all-time high, according to preliminary figures released today by the University.

Up nearly 12 percent, the spring headcount enrollment is 7,041 as compared with 6,291 for Spring 1988. It is the largest enrollment for spring since 1976 when 7,021 students enrolled.

"Not only is Morehead State's headcount enrollment showing dramatic increases, but also the number of students taking a full load of classes continues to grow," MSU President C. Nelson Grote said. "We have seen a 14 percent jump in our full-time student body from last spring.

"Much of the growth can be attributed to a heightened awareness of the importance of higher education among the people of our region," Dr. Grote said.

"But there is another significant factor to be considered and that is the University's efforts at improving retention. We are losing fewer students in those critical first few semesters.

"We have established a number of programs campuswide to help incoming students succeed scholastically, including the new peer advising program," Dr. Grote continued.

"And students who enter with academic deficiencies are tracked so that at the first sign of problems help is made available," he said.

Enrollment growth was seen at all class levels, except in the junior class. University officials said that enrollment often dips at the junior level due to students graduating from two-year degree programs.

Morehead State's enrollment has been increasing steadily since the 1986 Summer I session.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--A former member of the state Forestry Division is Morehead State University's man-in-the-field, promoting Eastern Kentucky wood and forest products.

Bob Bauer will be helping expand the state's \$770 million a year wood industry to create an economic boom in Eastern Kentucky, where unemployment rate is in double digits.

Under a \$94,600 technology transfer grant from the Appalachian Regional Commission, MSU is working in partnership with the Bluegrass State Skills Corporation in 47 of Eastern Kentucky's 49 ARC counties. Project director for this Wood Technology Program is Dr. Charles Derrickson, dean of MSU's College of Applied Sciences and Technology.

"Some of the United States' best hardwood species may be found in Eastern Kentucky's forests," Dr. Derrickson said. "A renewable resource, the forest industry--especially the secondary industries such as furniture-making and wood fixtures--offers an opportunity for more jobs for Kentuckians," he added.

Approximately 80 percent of the lumber produced in Appalachia is shipped out of the region as rough lumber and the real value is in a finished product.

"We need to assist our mill operators in diversifying their operations to increase Kentucky's role in the forest products industry market," he added.

Bauer, a Portsmouth, Ohio, native who grew up in Ashland, is familiar with the situation. He was a Forestry Division field representative in Pineville for two years and spent more than seven years in forest management with Morehead area timber growers.

When he became the MSU wood technologist in January, Bauer's first task was to form an eight-member wood technology committee to assist in implementing the project. The primary goal set was to increase hardwood production for furniture manufacturing.

According to Bauer, among the ARC counties Casey County leads in rough lumber production with 45 mills. Pulaski has 40 mills; Wayne 26; Adair 25; Lewis 22; Rowan 17; Perry 16; Laurel 15; Monroe 15; Fleming 13 and Carter 12. Martin County has one sawmill, while Jackson and Russell have none.

One side issue to be resolved is the problem of sawdust disposal. Typical of the larger mills is the J.C. Wells mill's production rate of 10 tractor trailer loads of sawdust a week.

Much of that is hauled to Meade Paper Company in Chillicothe, Ohio, and other paper-making plants in Western Kentucky and West Virginia. Some sawmills use the sawdust to produce energy to operate their facility, according to Bauer.

The EPA has called a halt to destroying sawdust by burning and sawdust disposal is undergoing much the same scrutiny as landfills, Bauer said.

Converting sawdust to energy is one solution. Rowan County High School already uses about 40 truckloads annually to heat with. Kilns and furniture factories could operate with this energy source, which is readily available at a low cost, Bauer said. Another alternative is a mix of sawdust and coal to operate power plants.

Bauer wants to meet with sawmill owners and timber landowners in his 47 counties. "We need to determine if timber landowners are interested in marketing their timber. We need their interest and cooperation to make the project go," he said, noting that there are many acres of unproductive timber land in Eastern Kentucky which could mean additional income to property owners.

Many sawmills have already begun installing the drying kilns needed to prepare lumber for finished products, according to Bauer.

There is also potential for developing dimensional stock operations--the manufacturing of furniture parts such as legs for tables and chairs. "There are some of these in Kentucky already," he said. With the great abundance of lumber waste, developing paper plants is also a possibility.

Another encouraging factor is the availability of good roads for transporting products to the metropolitan markets.

"There's a domino theory in attracting industry," Bauer said. "There must be an assurance of an efficient, long-lasting source of supply at a cost that makes production profitable. Competition requires this," he said.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--A Morehead State University scientist will chair the Maxey Flats Management Commission, established earlier this year by Gov. Wallace G. Wilkinson.

Dr. David M. Brumagen, professor of biology, was elected at a recent organizational meeting of the commission, which was held in Frankfort.

The commission, which supersedes the former Maxey Flats Advisory Task Force, is responsible for stabilization, maintenance and cleanup of the nuclear waste site in Fleming County.

According to Dr. Brumagen, the commission will be working with a \$1 million budget and will employ a full-time executive director.

A member of the former advisory task force as well as its predecessor, the Maxey Flats Nuclear Disposal Site Decommissioning Plan Advisory Board, Dr. Brumagen began conducting research at the Maxey Flats site in the late 1970s. That research led to a visiting professorship at the University of California at Berkeley, where he also studied radio-chemical analysis.

"The task ahead of the commission offers some interesting challenges," Dr. Brumagen said, adding that he was excited about the opportunity. "The commission's main goal is to see that the site is completely decommissioned--which includes total cleanup--and made as safe as possible for residents at a reasonable cost to the state."

An MSU faculty member since 1965, Dr. Brumagen earned the Ph.D. degree in biological science from the University of Kentucky. He also is an EPA-certified asbestos inspector and asbestos management planner.

A former chair of MSU's Department of Biology, Dr. Brumagen is active in several scientific organizations, including Sigma Xi and the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

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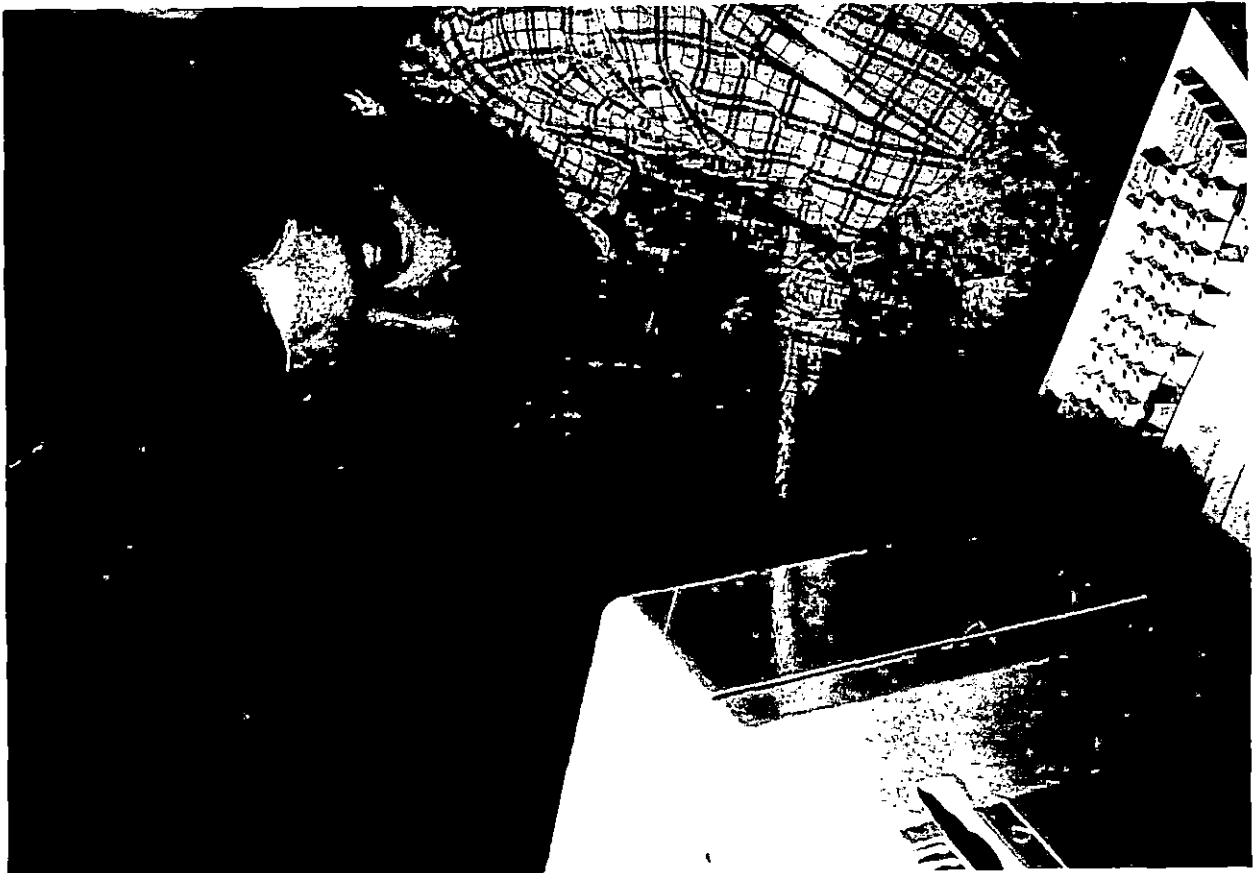

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Poet and native Eastern Kentuckian Mark Jarman will be featured during a week long "Poet-in-Residence" program at Morehead State University, Feb. 27-March 3.

Supported with a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts, the residency is the second of two scheduled by the University to bring young writers of the national writing scene to the region, according to Dr. Michelle Boisseau, associate professor of English and residency project director.

During his residency, Jarman will present three poetry readings and hold roundtable discussions with students, writers, educators and residents of the region. The topics for discussion will be "The Line and the Story: Narrative in Contemporary Poetry" and "Narrative Poetics: Writing Narrative Poems."

Mark Jarman was born in Mt. Sterling in 1952 while his father was serving a church in Sharpsburg. However his childhood was spent primarily in Southern California except for three years the family spent in Scotland. Jarman has published three books with Carnegie Mellon University Press: "North Sea," "The Rote Walker," and "Far and Away." A fourth book "The Black Riviera" is due out from Wesleyan in the Spring of 1990. In 1978 and again in 1984 he was awarded grants from the National Endowment for the Arts. He is the co-editor of The Reaper, a literary journal which advocates narrative poetry, and is advisory editor of the Story Line Press.

A graduate of the University of Iowa Writers Workshop, Jarman has taught at the University of Southern Indiana, University of California, Irvine and Murray State University. Currently he is associate professor of English at Vanderbilt University.

On Tuesday, Feb. 28, at 3 p.m. Jarman will conduct a roundtable discussion of "The Line and the Story: Narrative in Contemporary Poetry" in East Room A, Adron Doran University Center. Designed particularly for librarians and teachers, the discussion will look at how the narrative impulse (which is central to much Appalachian literature) appears in the work of poets of national reputations.

Wednesday's schedule includes a discussion session entitled "Narrative Poetics: Writing Narrative Poems," an examination of how poets in the region can apply the narrative techniques that national poets use so that their poems might gain a wider audience without losing the originality and intensity typical of narratives based on the region. This session will be geared particularly for writers and writing teachers.

The activities on campus will be video taped and made available to area teachers through MSU's Learning Resources Center in Camden-Carroll Library.

On Thursday, March 2, the program will move to Vanceburg where Jarman will present one reading at Lewis County High School at 1 p.m. and another at Vanceburg Public Library at 2:30. Both readings will be followed by a question and answer session and sales and signing of Jarman's books. Service is expected to be completely restored by GTE on or shortly before the end of MSU's spring break, March 13-17, according to Dewayne Cable, director of information technology.

Buildings affected are Baird Music Hall, Laughlin Health Building, Mays Hall, Carter Hall, Waterfield Hall, Cooper Hall and Butler Hall.

Emergency lines for on-campus calls have been provided to Butler, Mays and Cooper Halls.

In case of an emergency, parents may contact their sons or daughters living in the affected residence halls by calling the University's Office of Public Safety at any time day or night. The number is (606) 783-2035.

On weekdays from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. calls may also be placed to the University Switchboard (606) 783-2221 or Office of Student Housing (606) 783-2060.

Calls to MSU's Office of Regional Development Services are being automatically forwarded to the Office of Research, Grants and Contracts.

Also a line is being installed to Baird Music Hall. Callers may reach MSU's Department of Music by dialing (606) 783-2483.

The telephone lines are located in the University's utility/steam tunnel and in order to repair them, the heating system must be shut down and electrical power turned off.

"At this time of year it isn't feasible to shut these systems down, but with campus facilities closed for spring break we can take them down and go into the tunnel," Cable said. "In the meantime GTE engineers and our staff are exploring other ways to temporarily provide additional service," he added.

Complicating the loss of service was the flooding of the tunnel system from the recent rains after excessive humidity had disrupted service on Feb. 14 in that section of the 11,000-foot tunnel system.

MSU's utility tunnel houses steam pipes, electrical lines and communication cables and connects the central heating plant and electric substation to campus buildings.

A multi-phased renovation of the tunnel system, sections of which date back to 1935, is scheduled and is estimated to cost approximately \$7.5 million when completed. 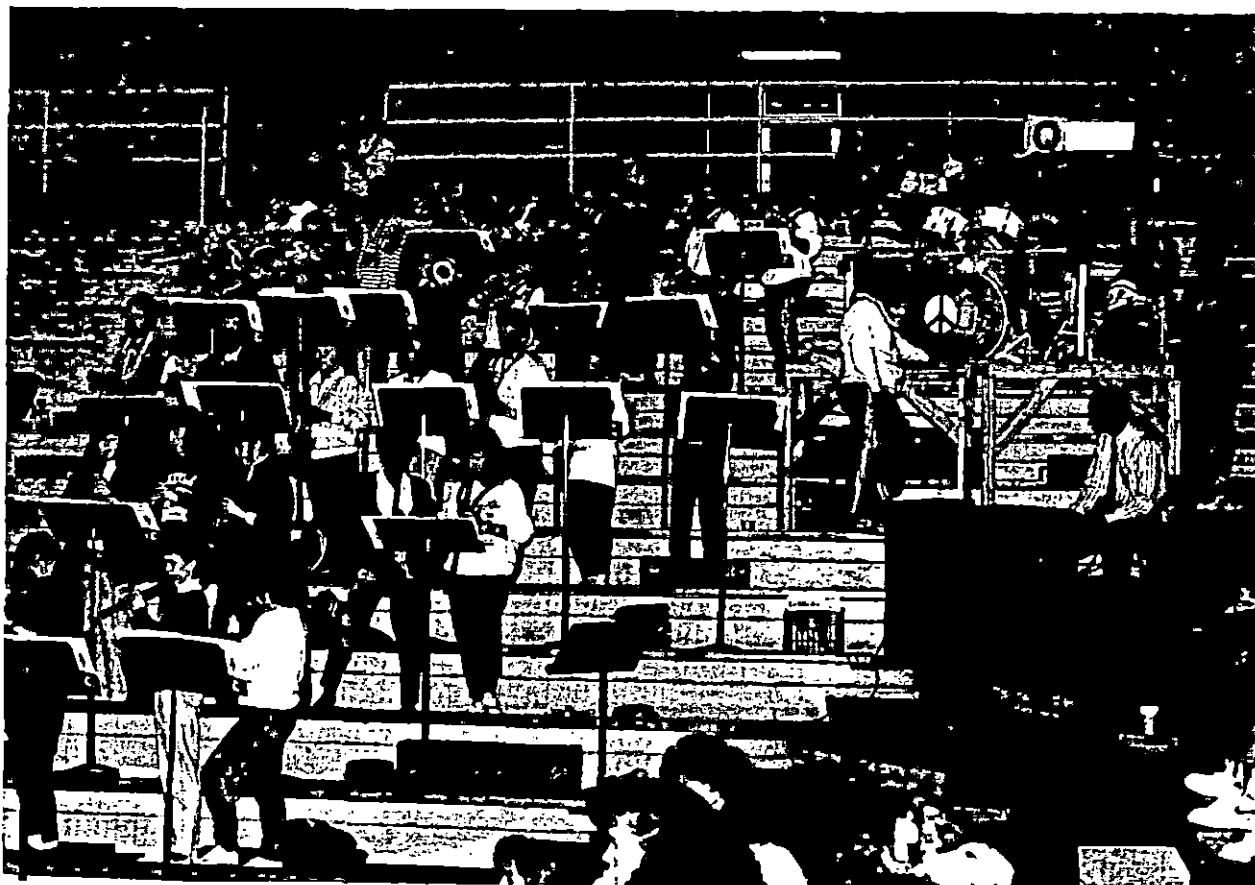

Attending the meeting was State Rep. Walter Blevins, who welcomed officials from the Kentucky Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Cabinet, Transportation Cabinet and several area community representatives.

Rep. Blevins expressed his interest in a statewide mandatory garbage collection, stating, "Kentucky is like a diamond in the rough that needs to be cleaned up."

Marketia Lynn, state coordinator of "Keep America Beautiful," in the Division of Waste Management, introduced plans for community involvement. "We need to begin changing people's attitudes," she told the group. "Littering is a behavior problem that has been tolerated for years."

A number of programs are in the early planning stages. One such program is the "Adopt A Spot Program," in which an organization or group agrees to clean up and maintain a particular area, according to Carl Wells of the Division of Maintenance, State Transportation Cabinet. Each year several million dollars is allocated to clean up state road ways.

"Litter is a major problem in Kentucky," said Tom Calvert, executive director, Morehead-Rowan County Chamber of Commerce. "A good place to start would be in our schools with our young people, emphasizing to them over and over the importance of keeping their surroundings litter free."

Committees are being formed statewide to organize clean-up campaigns in all Kentucky counties.

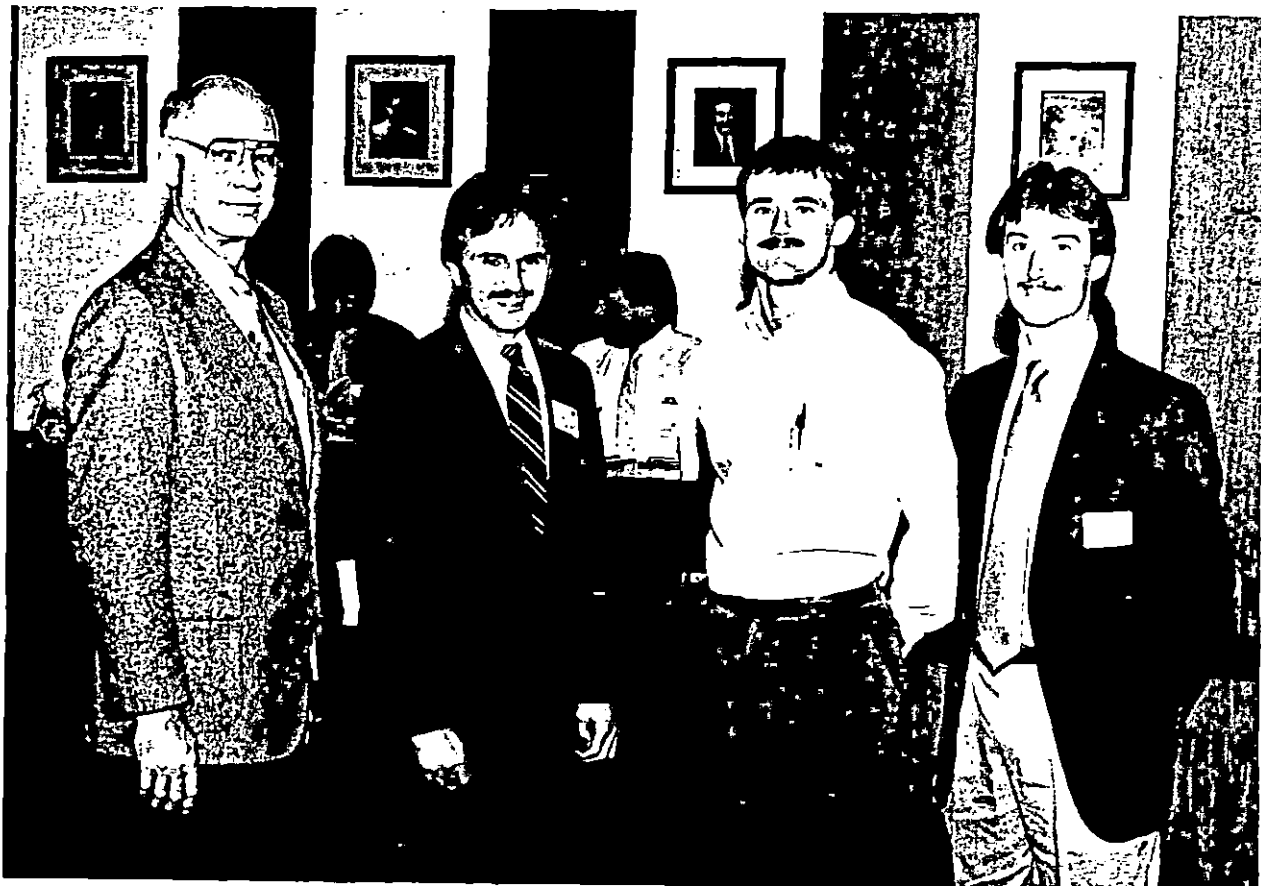

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Full telephone service was restored on Morehead State University's campus by GTE earlier this week.

Excessive steam and humidity in the University's utility/steam tunnel housing the telephone lines caused disruption of service to seven campus buildings on Feb. 14.

Emergency service was provided, but GTE projected that full service would not be available until MSU's spring break, March 13-17, when the heating system and electrical power could be shut down to allow a repair crew to enter the tunnel.

GTE was able to restore service by setting poles and stringing above ground lines to the affected buildings. Telephone service to that part of the campus is expected to remain on above ground lines until a new conduit system is installed, according to GTE.

A multi-phased renovation of MSU's 11,000-foot utility/steam tunnel system, sections of which date back to 1935, is scheduled and is estimated to cost approximately \$7.5 million when completed. Phase I includes the installation of a separate campus-wide underground system to house communication and electrical lines.

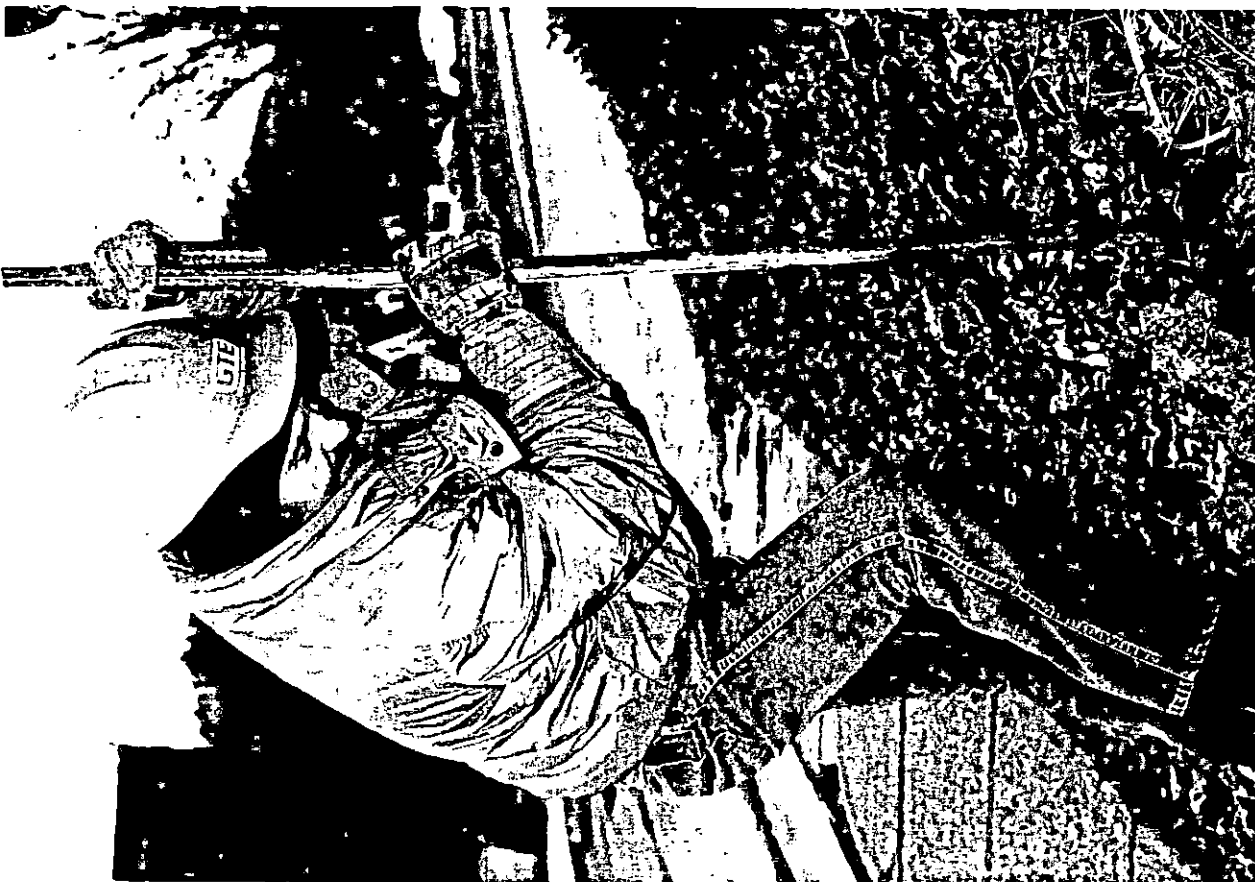

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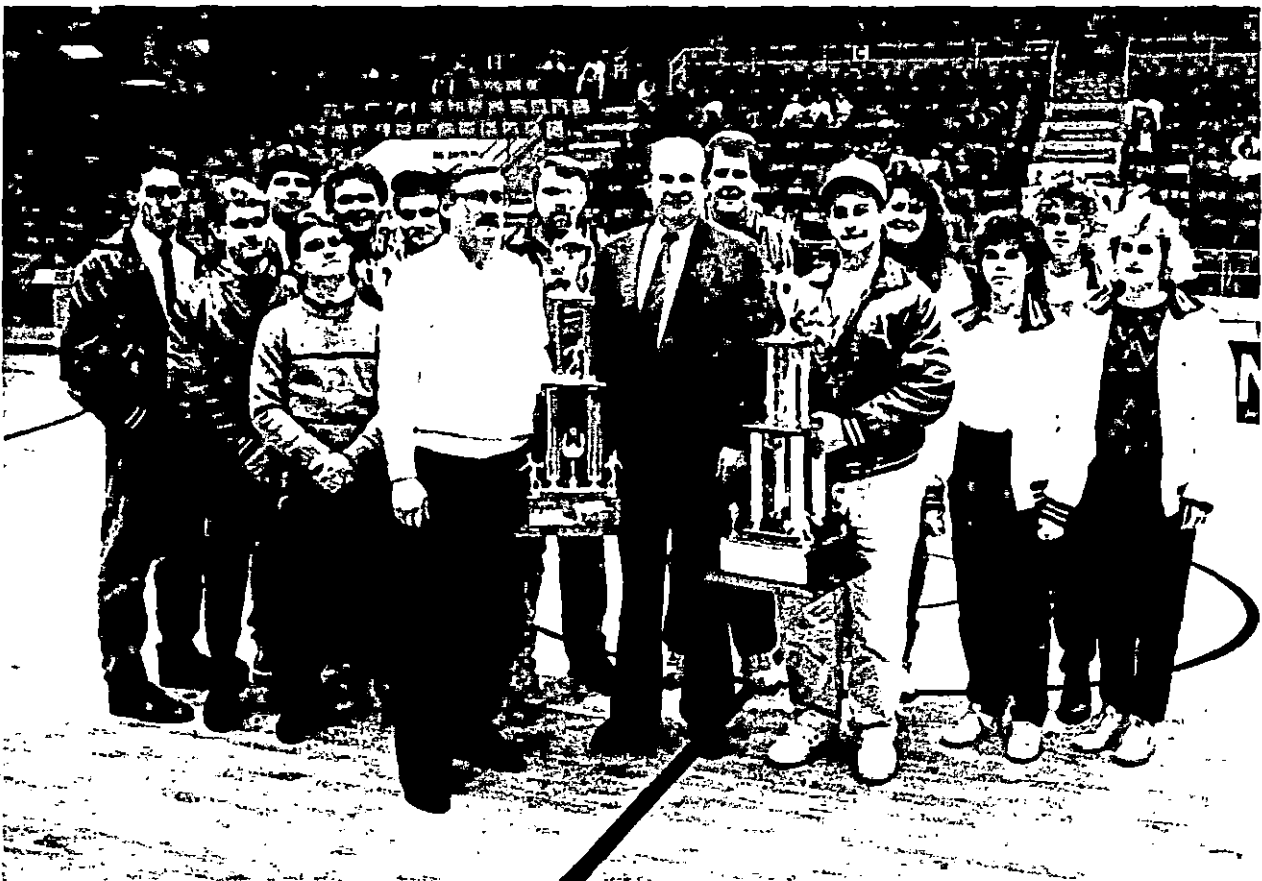

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Morehead State University's Board of Regents, in a meeting Feb. 24, adopted a resolution calling for the issuance of \$3.5 million in revenue bonds to finance renovations to Fields Hall.

The 1988 General Assembly authorized MSU to issue Housing and Dining System Revenue Bonds, Series K, for the project.

Abandoned as a residence hall in the early 1980s, Fields Hall was constructed in 1927. A survey team from the state Department of Facilities Management in 1983 reported that both Fields and Thompson Halls were structurally sound and worthy of renovation.

(Thompson Hall, also constructed in 1927 and currently in use, is scheduled for similar renovations when the Fields project is completed.)

The Finance and Administration Cabinet expects to award a construction contract this month on the Fields project, with completion expected in spring 1990. The renovated residence hall will accommodate approximately 157 students in "modern, comfortable surroundings," according to University officials.

A subcommittee composed of Walter Carr, Dr. Alban Wheeler and Sheridan Martin was appointed to assist the administration in reviewing and acceptance of bids, with board ratification to follow.

Other actions taken by the regents included giving MSU administrators the go ahead to contract externally for the school's food service operation and awarded new basic education opportunities to staff members with less than a high school education.

The meeting was the first for two new appointees to the board, Jackson businessman Jerry F. Howell Sr. and American Greetings Corporation executive Duane Hart of Corbin. They were sworn in along with William Seaton, Walter Carr and Charles Wheeler, who were reappointed earlier this year by Gov. Wallace Wilkinson.

Seaton and Howell were elected to serve as chairman and vice chairman, respectively.

The new Staff Basic Educational Opportunities Policy (PG-45) provides employees with less than a high school education an opportunity to take three hours of work time a week to attend adult basic education classes. The policy also calls for MSU to pay the employee's GED test fee.

The policy is similar to one enabling qualified employees to enroll in college courses during work hours and which pays for up to four hours of tuition per semester.

MSU President C. Nelson Grote also informed board members that the University has implemented a new employment practice of no longer hiring full-time employees who lack a high school diploma or GED equivalency.

Dr. Grote told the board that the University's decision to recommend a contracted food service operation had not come easily. He said that there had been several concerns raised: student welfare as to quality and cost of food; welfare of current food service workers, many of whom had served the University for several years, and the quality and fiscal soundness of the food service program.

After careful investigation, Dr. Grote said, it appeared that the students would be served as well or better by a contract food service program and that those employees vested in the KERS could be protected by writing provisions into the contract.

"The University also will be better served under contract management as we will have the potential of making rather than losing money," the president said.

Martin, the student regent, told the board that he and other student leaders had visited other campuses and had found that quality control and pricing "were equal if not better" on those served by contract operations.

Carr, who cast the only dissenting vote, noted that he hated that "we can't solve them (food service problems) ourselves" and added that in the past MSU had been known statewide for its excellent food service.

He, along with Martin and Dr. Wheeler, were appointed to a subcommittee to assist in reviewing and evaluating the contract proposals.

Earlier in the meeting, Dr. Grote presented for the board's acceptance copies of the "President's Annual Report for 1987-88," as mandated by law. He called their attention to data which showed that Morehead State had touched more than 30,000 lives that year through its varied programs.

"Too often we only think of those people who are enrolled in courses carrying regular academic credit, but MSU also touches lives through other noncredit programs such as professional development seminars, community education classes, adult basic education courses, the Academy of Arts offerings, camps and conferences," he said. Nearly 7,400 Continuing Education Units (CEUs) were awarded in 1987-88 by MSU.

The next board meeting was set for 2 p.m. March 31.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--At a recent meeting, Morehead (Ky.) State University's Board of Regents approved a new personnel policy extending basic educational opportunities to staff members with less than a high school education.

The new policy provides those employees with three hours of work time each week to attend adult basic education classes and authorizes MSU to pay their GED test fee.

For many years, a similar policy has been in effect enabling qualified employees to take three credit hours during work time with the University paying for up to four hours of tuition/fees each semester.

MSU President C. Nelson Grote also told the board that the University no longer was hiring any full-time personnel who lacked a high school diploma or the GED equivalency.

"For some time, we have been encouraging students not to drop out of school, but to obtain that high school diploma," Dr. Grote said. "This is consistent with what we've been saying."

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
