MOREHEAD, Ky.--One of Menifee County's best kept secrets may no longer be a secret thanks to Morehead State University's East Kentucky Small Business Development Center.

Barton Foods, Inc., now situated on US 460 at Denniston, was literally a "mom and pop" jelly factory operated out of the home of its founder, Delano Roe.

Established in 1962 as a molasses packer and distributor, the company began producing jelly and other specialty foods in 1980. Demand for these products soon outpaced the production capability of Roe, his wife Charlotte and their few employees.

As business grew so did the need for larger facilities and equipment. Roe was faced with a problem that many businessmen with limited capital are confronted with--how to finance an expansion.

And that's where MSU's East Kentucky Small Business Development Center and Ernest Begley, general management consultant for the EKSBD, came into the picture.

Utilizing the counseling services and other management planning services offered through the University's Small Business Development Center, Roe's corporation was successful in obtaining a direct loan funded entirely by the Small Business Administration.

Since April 1987, Begley has helped small businesses in a 10-county area achieve nearly \$4 million in loans, ranging from a half million dollars to \$5,000.

Roe's loan enabled him to construct a new spacious building, obtain modern equipment including a fork lift and quality control instruments necessary for an efficient operation.

Roe handled his molasses operation from his home for the first 10 years and then branched out by adding five different kinds of relish which he produced in a converted garage. By 1985, his jelly operation began growing to the 35 different kinds produced today.

Roe, who has been serving some of his clients for more than 25 years, travels more than 100,000 miles a year delivering to about 500 stores in Kentucky, Ohio and West Virginia.

Roe noted that the company buys as many products from the region as possible. Last year, the company purchased a tractor-trailer load of Bourbon County blackberries which resulted in 12,000 pints of jelly.

Mrs. Roe personally supervises the preparation of all products, including the cherry chocolate bourbon sauce, a chocolate ice cream topping, mustard, pancake syrup and steak sauce. She literally hovers over gauges and the other equipment to maintain quality control.

Always looking for new items to market, Roe currently is exploring a hot dog sauce. Using moonshine produced with state approval, Roe will be making moonshine jelly for the Menifee County Mountain Festival this year. The moonshine and bourbon jellies have an alcohol content of two percent or less.

Capacity of the plant is 500 pint cases a day and all products are hand-packed into containers. Many products are marketed under other brand names such as Wind Stone Farm or under the Kentucky Heritage label in state parks, where special UK and U of L jellies are sold. The state parks bought approximately 10,000 cases of the Barton Foods' jellies last year through a marketing broker. Roe expects those sales to double in 1989.

In early March, the firm will begin producing pancake syrup under its own label, The Old Mill, for the Piggly-Wiggly food chain.

"It's a real success story," MSU's Begley said of the Menifee County jelly factory. "One of the major factors in obtaining the direct loan from SBA was the business' location in an economically-depressed area and while the number of employees is relatively small, it means income to those people. Plus, it also serves as an example of what hard work, sound ideas and planning can result in," Begley added.

"Mr. and Mrs. Roe took full advantage of the various services provided by the East Kentucky Small Business Development Center. We offer the same services to other small businessmen already operating in the region or someone who has an idea for a new business," Begley said.

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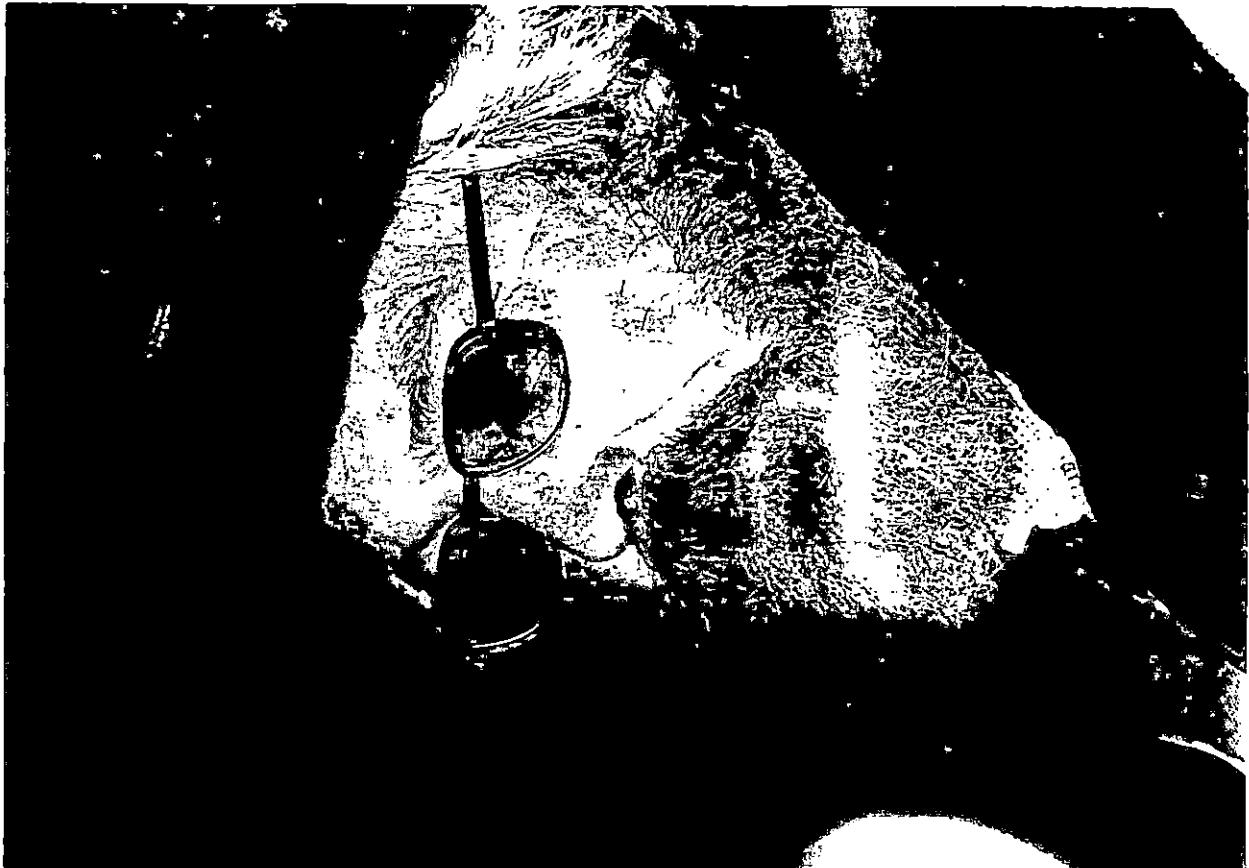

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Morehead State University will mark 67 years as a state institution of higher education with a series of public events on Founders Day, scheduled Friday, March 31.

Setting the stage for the day will be the annual Founders Day Convocation and Awards Ceremony at 10:25 a.m. in Button Auditorium.

The convocation speaker will be David Adkisson, the Kentucky Advocates for Higher Education chair and mayor of Owensboro.

The advocates organization was formed in 1985 by business and civic leaders committed to mobilizing support for higher education statewide.

Adkisson, a co-founder of the statewide Leadership Kentucky program, is a graduate of Georgetown College and Harvard University, where he also studied at the John F. Kennedy Institute of Politics.

A former executive vice president of the Owensboro Chamber of Commerce, he also served as U.S. Sen. Wendell Ford's representative to local officials across the state.

Adkisson, who took office Jan. 1, 1988 as the youngest mayor in Owensboro's history, is executive director of the Owensboro Citizens Committee on Education and is chairman of the Kentucky Urban Affairs Council.

MSU's 1989 Founders Day Award for University Service also will be presented at the convocation by MSU Board of Regents Chairman William Seaton, according to Buford Crager, Founders Day committee chairman.

"Since 1978, the convocation also has provided the University with an opportunity to pay tribute each year to an individual who over the years has served the school in a superior fashion," Crager said. "In fact, Founders Day itself offers us the opportunity to recognize special friends of MSU."

The convocation will be followed by a noon luncheon in the Crager Room, Adron Doran University Center, at which time the Office of Development and MSU Foundation will honor major donors and volunteers. Tickets for the \$5 per plate luncheon must be purchased and picked up in advance.

Rounding out Founders Day activities will be the Alumni Hall of Fame induction ceremony during the Alumni Awards Dinner scheduled for 6:30 p.m. in the Crager Room. Dinner tickets will be \$12 and must be purchased and picked up in advance, according to Anna Mae Riggle, ticket chairman.

Tickets for both functions will be on sale through 4:30 p.m. Wednesday, March 29. "Tickets will not be sold at the door," Riggle said.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Karate instructor and newspaper publisher Bob Scott is going to the Soviet Union as a member of the first U.S. karate team to compete with that country.

Scott, a Morehead State University alumnus, is the only Kentuckian in approximately 20 fighters who will participate in the competition March 8-16 in Leningrad.

"Excited" and "elated" are words Scott used to describe his first trip out of the United States. "There are so many good martial artists in this country," he said. "It is indeed an honor to be selected as a member of this team."

The competition was organized by the Waterbury (Conn.)-Leningrad Intersport Trade Commission, a non-profit organization which helps amateur athletes train and compete in the U.S. and Soviet Union. Eric Breuer, a Connecticut state trooper and member of the Commission, suggested Scott attend the competition after watching him work out at a karate camp some two years ago.

The schedule includes four to five days of getting acquainted and exchanging ideas, followed by two days of actual competition with the Russian team, Scott noted. "The experience of seeing another culture only adds to the thrill of this competition," he said. "In the Soviet Union, karate is illegal and can only be used by members of the military or police force."

A black belt instructor in Tae Kwon Do/Tang Soo Do Korean Karate, Scott teaches four evenings a week at the High Street Greater Lexington YMCA. Since he became involved in the martial arts, he has given private lessons on numerous occasions because he just "enjoys working with the kids."

Scott began his karate training in Ashland in 1975, under the supervision of Danny Lane, a coach for the U.S. karate team and the highest ranking black belt in the Chuck Norris organization. During the past 14 years, he has competed in numerous tournaments and last year conducted a karate seminar in Columbus, Ohio, with Bill "Superfoot" Wallace.

While he was born in Wheeling, W.Va., he has lived most of his life in Kentucky. He attended Russell High School for two years before transferring to Tates Creek in Lexington to complete his high school days. While a student at Morehead State University, he majored in communications and received a bachelor's degree in 1982.

Upon graduation, Scott worked for a year as the assistant general manager of WTSF-TV (Channel 61) in Ashland, sold life insurance for some time, and was in advertising sales with the Daily Independent newspaper. He currently is the publisher of the Georgetown News and Times, a position he assumed in late February.

Life is very busy for Scott as he prepares for his Russian venture, underwritten by the University of Kentucky Sports Medicine, part of the UK Chandler Medical Center. He said that he is thankful "to be a part of Gorbachev's glasnost and promote world peace through sports."

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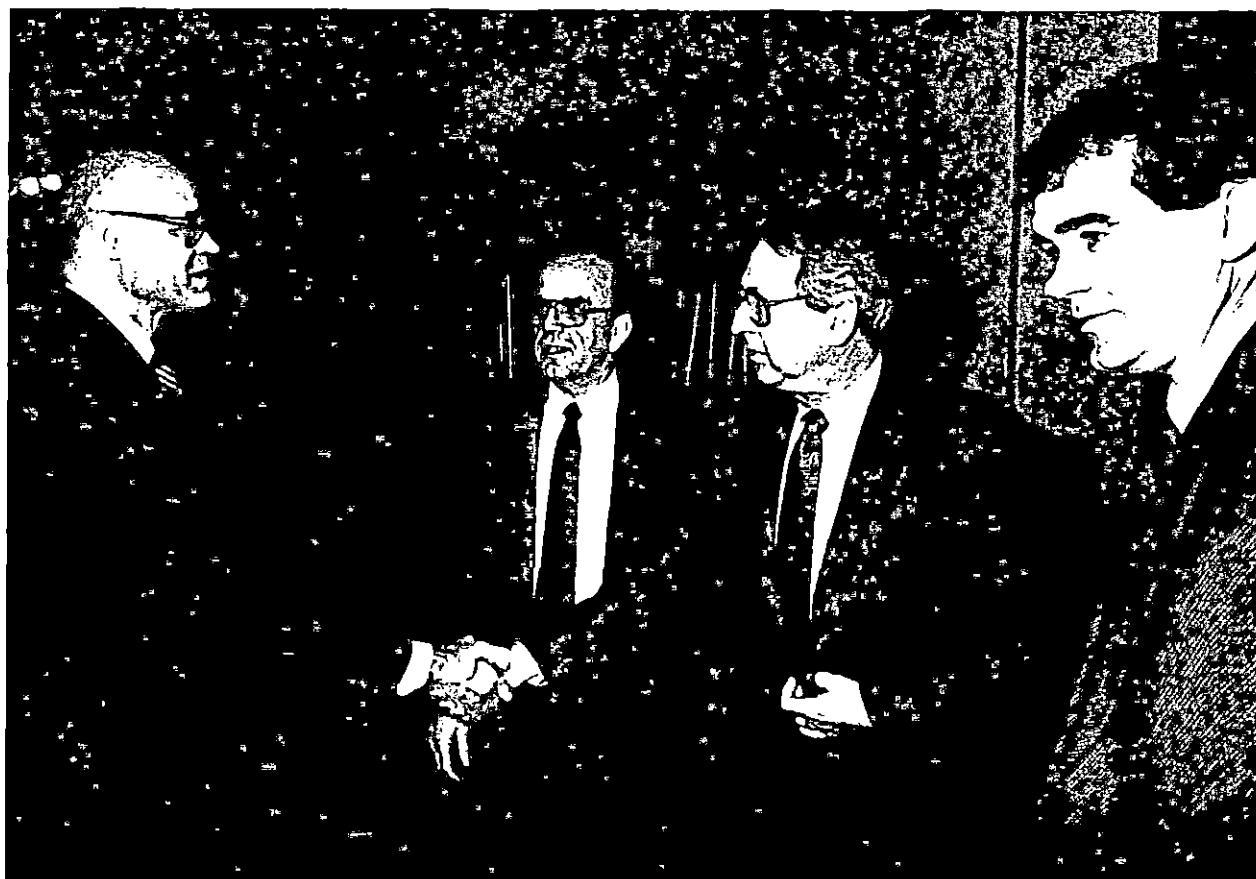
VISITING SCHOLAR

MOREHEAD, Ky.--If your summer plans are still up in the air, Morehead State University's overseas study programs may be just the ticket for you.

Study/tour programs will be available in Austria, France, Spain, Italy and Germany from May 31 to July 25. Students participating will be able to earn college credit while traveling and living in one of the countries.

Fields of study will vary somewhat depending on the country selected. Among the proposed academic offerings are courses in the language and culture of the country, history, business, botany, speech/theatre, radio/television, and art, with special print making and jewelry making courses available in Italy.

The cost of the study/tours will range from \$1,860 to \$2,790 depending on the country selected. Accommodations vary with each location, but all packages include tuition, air fare, lodging and most meals.

"International study and travel expands the horizons of our students in a way that nothing else can," said Dr. Roger Jones, MSU International Studies Program director. "The course work is important, but the opportunity to see and experience first hand a different culture is an education in itself."

Students selecting to study and tour in Spain will live in the Colegio Mayor Marques de la Ensenada on the campus of the University of Madrid, while those going to Germany will live with host families in the suburbs of Munich, Dr. Jones noted.

Eligible students may receive financial aid to defray expenses of overseas study, he added. the programs are available to parents or other non students who may not desire college credit, but who simply wish to register to audit the course.

Study/tour programs
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During the five weeks of the academic programs, students attend classes for four days each week. Group tours and weekend excursions complete the week's activities. Participants will have the option of independent travel when the program ends.

The overseas study programs are sponsored by the Kentucky Institute for European Studies (KIES) and Cooperative Center for Study in Britain (CCSB), consortiums formed by Murray State University, Eastern Kentucky University, Western Kentucky University, Northern Kentucky University, University of Kentucky, Berea College and MSU.

"Each year the professors from these institutions come together and plan the summer schedule," Dr. Jones said. "The programs are continually being revised to reflect the needs of the students and to allow participants to take the full advantage of special events in Europe."

MOREHEAD, Ky.--The Northeast Kentucky Beef Improvement Federation will hold its annual performance tested bull sale on Friday, March 24.

Scheduled to be held in Richardson Arena at Morehead State University's Derrickson Agriculture Complex, three miles north of Morehead on KY 377, the sale will begin at 6 p.m.

Included in this year's sale are some top replacement heifers representing four breeds. This will enable buyers to select females to go into their herds. Furthermore 20 bulls are to be sold from five breeds. The bulls averaged over 3.7 lbs. of gain for the entire test, and average frame score of 6.5.

The sale has traditionally been a very reasonable sale where beef producers could buy excellent quality, young sires for a fair price. The addition of heifers to the sale will let producers choose from some of the top replacement females in Northeast Kentucky.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Nine Morehead State University faculty members, including a three-man research team, have received nearly \$24,000 in institutional research grants.

The awards, made on the basis of proposals for research and creative productions submitted for spring funding, were announced by Dr. Stephen S. Taylor, MSU vice president for academic affairs.

The six research grants and one creative grant bring the total of institutionally-funded awards to 21 for the current academic year, according to Dr. Taylor.

The grants, which have been awarded since 1968-69, are designed to encourage and support research and creativity among the faculty.

"The committee was pleased with the quality of the proposals submitted this year and wished it were possible to fund all of them," said the vice president. "Those selected, however, will undoubtedly add to the current pool of information available," he added.

MSU President C. Nelson Grote, noting that applied research was part of the University's mission, said: "Our commitment to applied research benefits those faculty members engaged in it, their students and society as a whole," he said. "MSU can be very proud of the research efforts of its faculty over the years."

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Three members of Morehead State University's Department of Industrial Education and Technology have achieved another level in their professional development.

Earning certification as professional engineers were Dr. Massoud Rabiee, an assistant professor who teaches electives in electricity, and Charles Patrick, an assistant professor who teaches mining technology.

Abdollah Ardeshir, an assistant professor who teaches construction technology, passed the engineering in training (EIT) fundamentals examination, a first step toward certification.

"We are extremely proud of their accomplishments and future students at MSU will reap the rewards of their hard work," said Dr. Robert E. Newton, department chair. "Achieving professional engineer status is parallel to becoming a licensed architect, doctor or lawyer."

For Dr. Rabiee, the new certification means being a recognized professional in doing research, among other things. "While you may already have the right qualifications for a particular assignment, this distinction is one that is recognized across the United States marking you an authority in your area of expertise," Dr. Rabiee said.

A three-time graduate of the University of Kentucky, Dr. Rabiee received his doctorate in 1987. He joined the MSU faculty in 1988.

"PE's have the authority to validate engineering documents," Patrick noted. "Normally when a consulting firm is called in to complete a job, a licensed engineer is hired to verify the maps, building designs, or other area of the task," he said.

Certified by the state Board of Professional Registration, PE's verify the validity of important documents with their signature and stamp of their position. In Kentucky, they are advised by the Accrediting Board of Engineers and Engineering Technology (ABET).

An MSU faculty member since 1985, Patrick holds master's degrees from the University of Pittsburgh, where he was a research associate, and West Virginia University. He also worked for Island Creek Coal Company as a surveyor.

"Achieving professional engineering status gives one the distinction of being called an "expert witness" in court cases," Ardeshir said. "This is one example of a situation where a Ph.D. has no bearing, it's the PE title they want," he added.

Currently a doctoral student at the University of Kentucky, Ardeshir plans to take the PE exam in civil engineering in the fall. He joined the faculty in 1987 and is coordinator of the construction technology program.

Applicants for the EIT test must have earned a bachelor's degree from a school with an accredited engineering program. The test covers such topics as physics, statics, thermodynamics, math and computer programming. After passing the EIT and prior to taking the PE exam, four years of engineering experience is required.

Applicants for the PE exam are carefully screened before being accepted as potential candidates. The exam, requiring eight hours to complete, contains eight problems tailored to the candidate's area of expertise.
