MOREHEAD, Ky.--An innovative educator and a statistician whose research focuses on reliability theory have been selected by their colleagues as the 1988-89 recipients of the University's most prestigious awards.

Dr. Diane L. Ris, professor of education, received MSU's Distinguished Teacher Award, which was established in 1964 by the MSU Alumni Association and formerly known as the Distinguished Faculty Award.

Dr. Lloyd R. Jaisingh, assistant professor of mathematics, was presented MSU's Distinguished Researcher Award. Sponsored by the MSU Research and Patent Committee, the award has been given annually since 1979.

The awards were announced at the University's fifth annual Academic Awards Convocation held April 30 in Button Auditorium. The event launched a week-long, campuswide tribute to scholastic achievement.

Joining the MSU faculty in 1977, Dr. Ris has taught various elementary and secondary school reading courses and three years ago created a special course on discipline and classroom management which addressed a curriculum need defined by program graduates.

Not only has she taught that course to every elementary and special education graduate since then, but Dr. Ris also has taught it at every one of MSU's regional centers.

In her classroom, Dr. Ris uses a variety of approaches in combination with lectures, including films, videotapes and case studies. She is described by her colleagues as "an outstanding faculty member who quietly does an excellent job semester after semester."

A graduate of St. Mary-of-the-Woods College, she earned a master's degree in elementary education from Indiana University and her doctorate in elementary education from Ball State University.

A former elementary teacher in Indiana, Illinois and Maryland school systems, she was the founding director of an open school in Indianapolis and taught at Ball State University.

She is active in several professional organizations, including Phi Delta Kappa, the AAUP and the Kentucky Association of College Teacher Educators.

Dr. Jaisingh, who specializes in statistics, industrial engineering and mathematics, was notified earlier this month that he has been selected to participate in the Kentucky EPSCor Regional Universities Visiting Scholars Program.

He will receive up to \$9,350 in funds for his proposal, "Estimation of Parameters and Reliability for a Series System," a project he will undertake in collaboration with Dr. William S. Griffith at the University of Kentucky.

Dr. Jaisingh is author or co-author of several journal articles in his specialty area. Reliability theory is an area of statistics in which one studies the reliability of various mechanical systems and the likelihood of one failing. Recognized as a leading authority in reliability, Dr. Jaisingh was asked to be a referee for the IEEE Transactions on Reliability.

A former World Health Organization lecturer at the University of Guyana, where he earned his B.S. degree in mathematics, he received his M.S. degree from Tennessee Tech University and holds a doctorate from Texas Tech University.

Dr. Jaisingh joined the MSU faculty in 1985. He has taught at the secondary level in Guyana and was teacher and principal of an Evening Institute in the Turks and Caicos Islands, B.W.I.

Also announced at the convocation was the winner of the second A. Frank Gallaher Memorial Music Performance Competition, Christopher Reighley, **West Lawn, Pa.**, junior. A music performance major, Reighley performed a euphonium work written by Dr. Christopher Gallaher, MSU Department of Music chairman. Named for the late Ashland businessman, the award includes a \$1,000 cash prize and the privilege of performing at the Academic Awards Convocation.

The student speaker was Suzanne K. Smith of **Hebron**, an Honors Program student and a journalism major.

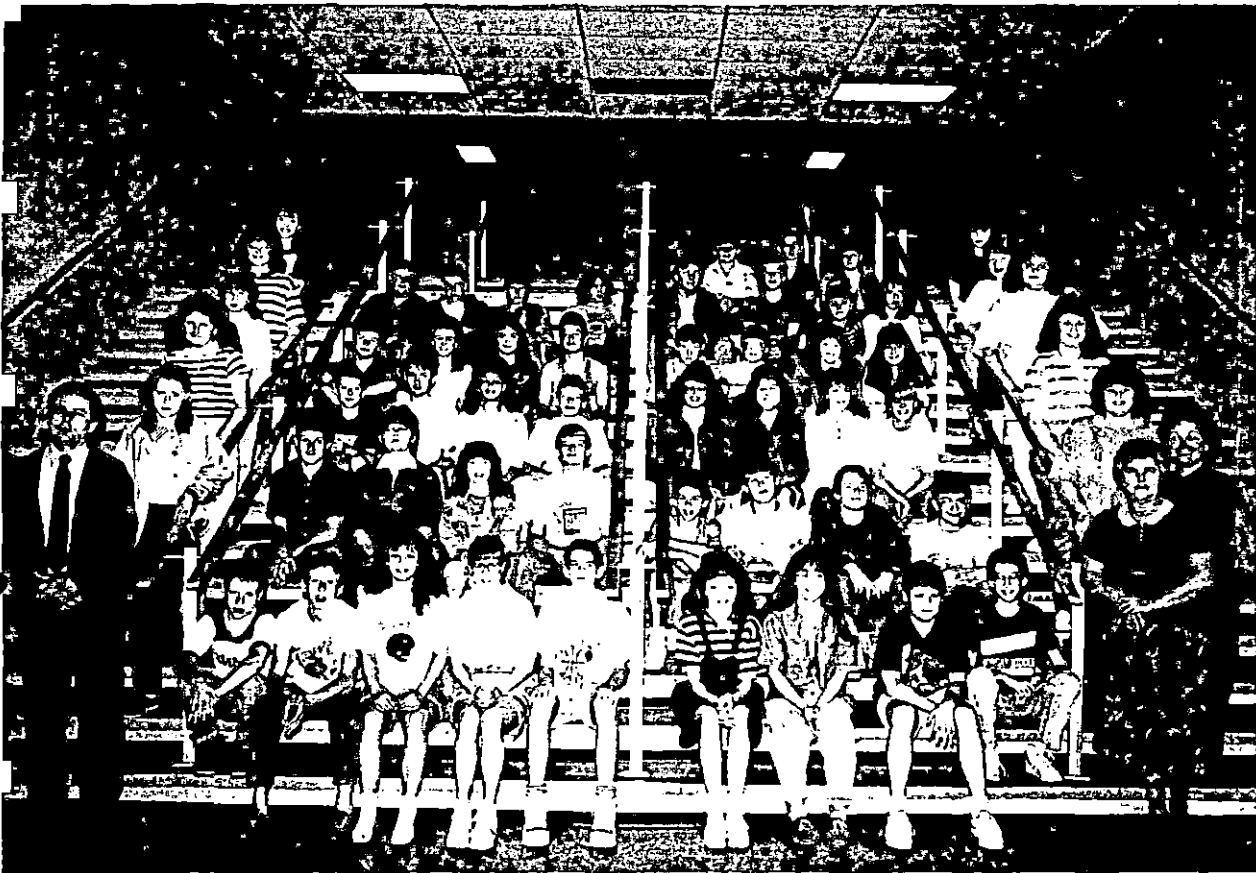

The University was notified of the status by the Committee on Animal Technician Activities and Training (CATAT) after the evaluation of its site visit in December.

"We are extremely proud of the faculty members who have worked so hard to maintain the high quality of this program," said MSU President C. Nelson Grote.

"For more than a decade, we have consistently met the rigorous standards set forth by the accreditation agency and that is an accomplishment to be envied."

The Vet Tech Program began at MSU as an associate degree offering in 1977 and has retained accreditation since that time. It was expanded to include a four-year degree in 1987.

"MSU is one of only 40 schools in the nation with full accreditation," said Dr. Donald Applegate, program coordinator. "This will greatly increase the credibility of our program."

The program is administered through the Department of Agriculture and Natural Resources in the College of Applied Sciences and Technology.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Morehead State University has become the first university in Kentucky to set a limit on the amount of state appropriated funds that may be used in its intercollegiate athletics program.

At its quarterly meeting on May 5, MSU's Board of Regents unanimously voted to set a 3.6 percent cap on the amount of educational and general revenues allocated to athletics.

The policy also requires athletics to raise at least a third of its budget from other sources by 1991-92 or adjust its annual budget so that the ratio of revenue to expenditure meets this guideline.

The policy, recommended by MSU President C. Nelson Grote and described as "a reasonable approach" to cost containment, rescinds one adopted in 1987 during President A.D. Albright's tenure which limited the subsidy to 50 percent of the total budget by 1990-91.

Board Chairman William Seaton called the Grote proposal a "good compromise" and a "step in the right direction." He added that adopting the policy did not mean further cost containment measures would not be considered.

Following the adoption of the policy, MSU Foundation President Terry S. Jacobs proposed an athletic scholarship endowment program and announced that he would endow the first scholarship.

He issued a challenge to the Foundation and Eagle Athletic Fund that for every three scholarships they endowed, he would match with two. Jacobs, head of Jacor Communications, said his ultimate goal was to see an endowment fund providing all of MSU's athletic scholarships.

Adoption of the new policy means that MSU will remain in the Ohio Valley Conference. In its report to the board, MSU's Athletics Committee noted that implementation of the 1987 policy would force MSU to drop from NCAA Division I to Division III, resulting in a loss of its OVC affiliation.

The Athletic Committee expressed concern that compliance with the 1987 policy would have drastic repercussions for the athletic program and the University.

Earlier in the week, the Student Government Association adopted a resolution endorsing Dr. Grote's recommendation.

The president told the regents that MSU had made "significant progress" in reducing the institutional subsidy from 4.36 percent in 1985-86 to 3.81 this year. He also noted that athletic-generated revenue had increased from 21.7 percent to nearly 28.6 percent in the same period.

Other actions taken by the board included:

Renewing a legal services contract with the firm of Bryan, Fogle and Chenoweth for 1989-90.

Ratification of personnel actions from March 6 through April 14.

Ratification of two personal services contracts.

Accepting the quarterly financial report and amending of the operating budget.

Approval of appraisal of three pieces of property and acquisition of four other parcels.

Approval of 1989 spring graduates.

Approval of faculty promotions.

Approval of 11 sabbatical leaves.

Approval of emeritus rank for five faculty members.

The regents also received status reports on land acquisitions currently under way, the food services contract proposals, and capital construction projects.

The next meeting was set for 10 a.m. June 23.

Payne, professor of chemistry; Meade S. Roberts, associate professor of industrial technology, and Carrie C. Back, special collections head, Camden-Carroll Library.

Dr. Bentley, who came to MSU in 1959, will retire July 31 with professor emeritus rank. A native of Alabama, he is a former MSU assistant football coach and served as athletic director and coach at Southern Union Junior College. A member of Phi Delta Kappa, he earned his B.S. degree from Troy State College, the M.S. degree from the University of Tennessee and an Ed.D. degree from University of Southern Mississippi. 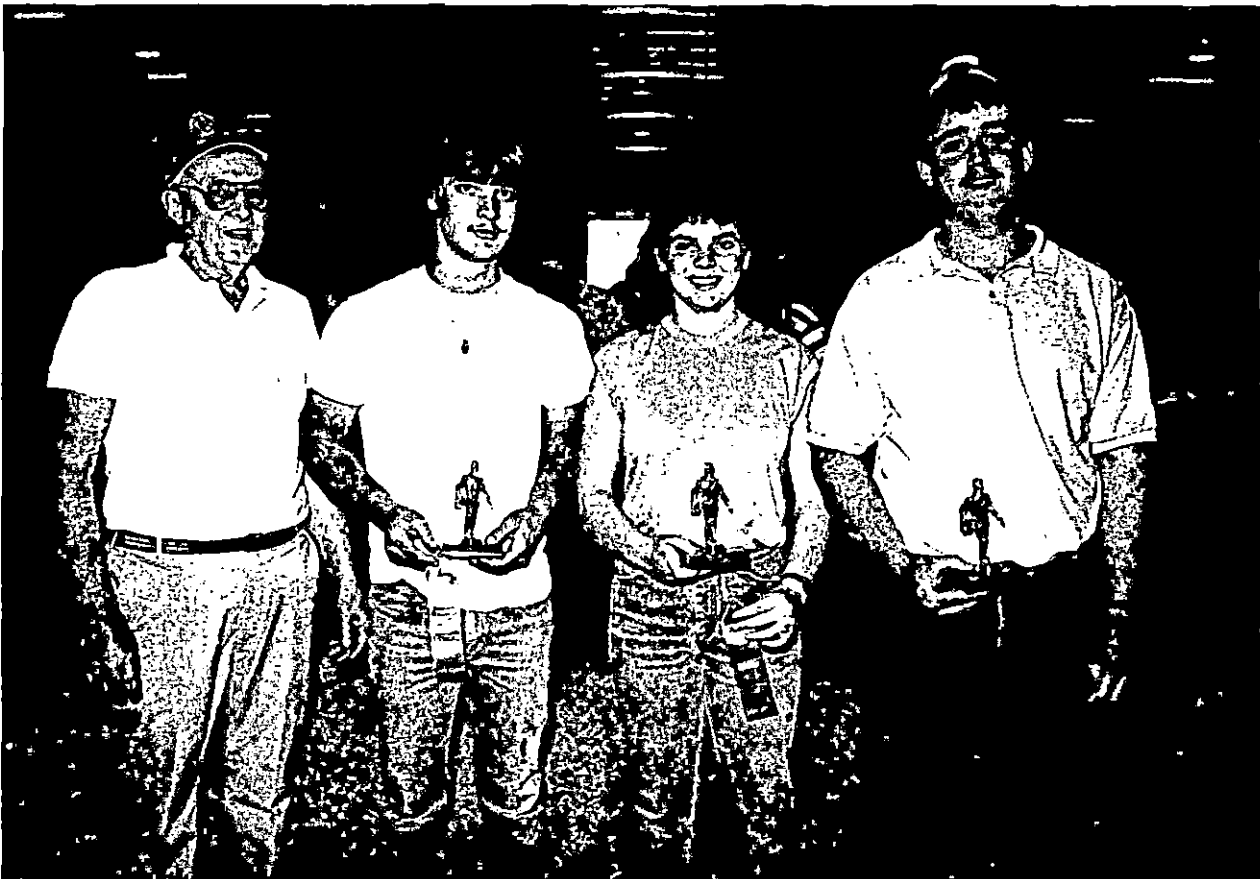

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Morehead State University's Department of Elementary, Reading and Special Education in the College of Professional Studies will offer three special summer instructional programs for elementary and middle school children in reading, math, language arts and social studies.

The sessions will be conducted by upperclassmen and graduate students enrolled in MSU's School of Education and will include a number of certified teachers. "The instruction will focus upon an area of difficulty for the public school student, but will also be helpful to students who are achieving at a high level and wish an opportunity for indepth study in a particular area," said Dr. Paul McGhee, department chairman. "The instruction program for each student will be adjusted to the student's level," he added.

During the week of June 19 to 23, instruction will be offered in math for students entering grades 1-8 and reading for students entering grades 1-8. The second session will be held July 24 to 28, and will offer instruction in reading for students entering grades K-8, language arts (spelling, handwriting, grammar and creative writing) for students entering grades 2-5, and social studies for students who have completed grades K-4.

A special three-week reading practicum will be offered July 12 to Aug. 3 for those students who need extensive help. Individual instruction will be provided by graduate students.

There will be a \$5 per student charge for instruction in each subject during the one-week sessions, but special rates may be arranged for those participating in more than one program. A separate charge is required for the reading practicum.
