MOREHEAD, Ky.--Registration for Morehead State University's first summer term will be conducted Monday, June 12, from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. in the Crager Room, Adron Doran University Center.

Schedule adjustments for students who pre-registered for Summer I will be processed at this time as well.

Students planning to register will need to meet with their advisers to prepare a trial schedule before entering the registration area. Academic advisers will be in ADUC during registration. Admission into the registration area will be by an alphabetical system based on last names.

All fees should be paid at time of registration.

Summer I classes begin at 8 a.m. Tuesday, June 13, and continue through Friday, July 7. Summer II will run from July 10 to Aug. 4, with registration on Monday, July 10.

Summer session tuition is \$47 per credit hour for undergraduates and \$68 for graduate students who are Kentucky residents. The tuition rate for out-of-state students is \$134 per undergraduate credit hour and \$195 per graduate credit hour.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--The Louisville Youth Orchestra will present a free public concert at 8 p.m. Thursday, June 15, in Duncan Recital Hall, Baird Music Building, with a reception to follow.

Highlighting the program will be an original composition, "Song of Kentucky," which incorporates Appalachian folk melodies collected by Josephine McGill in Knott County in 1915.

Guest soloists for the work, which was commissioned by a grant from the Mary and Barry Bingham Sr. Fund, include folk singer Jean Ritchie and tenor Darrell Adams. Narrator and harpist will be former LYO member Carol McClure Hahn, who composed the piece.

The composition also calls for orchestra members to play dulcimers and other traditional Appalachian instruments.

Making its first tour of Eastern Kentucky, the LYO will perform in Berea, Hindman, Hazard, Buckhorn and Harrodsburg as well as Morehead through a \$10,000 grant from The Greater Louisville Fund for the Arts.

The LYO's MSU concert is sponsored by the College of Arts and Sciences, the Department of Music, the Academy of Arts and the Office of Regional Development Services.

"While we have had previous tours, the LYO has never visited Eastern Kentucky," said Daniel Spurlock, LYO conductor and music director. "Our 60 young musicians are eager to visit the actual places where these captivating songs were once a part of daily life," he added.

The LYO is comprised of youths, ranging in age from 13 to 18, from Louisville and counties nearby.

"Morehead State is delighted to be a host site for this special Appalachian concert which will be a prelude to the upcoming weeklong Appalachian Celebration," said Dr. Christopher Gallaher, MSU Department of Music chair.

MSU's 13th annual Appalachian Celebration opens Sunday, June 18, and continues through Saturday, June 24.

## SPECIAL TO KENTUCKY LIVING

The advent of a state prison near West Liberty not only heralded an economic rebirth for the region, but it also meant a new dawn in educational opportunity to the residents of Morgan and surrounding counties.

Shortly after construction began on the Eastern Kentucky Correctional Complex, Morehead State University opened the doors to a regional center designed specifically to prepare the region's undereducated populace for employment at the prison and the resulting spinoff opportunities.

The MSU-Morgan Center, located just outside West Liberty on KY 7, began offering adult education services and college courses in September 1987.

Helping support the Center's initial efforts were grants from the Kentucky Literacy Commission, the Department of Education and the Eastern Kentucky Concentrated Employment Program (EKCEP). "These agencies have continued to support us," said Jonell Tobin, Center coordinator.

The adult learning center has served more than 500 people since it opened, according to Tobin. That figure not only reflects those people preparing for the GED test, but many others who are brushing up on their basic skills. Seventy-five people have earned GED certificates through the Center over the past two years.

The first semester the Center opened, five college level courses were offered and this fall the schedule includes 12. The college component has drawn approximately 160 students a semester in the past, Tobin said. This fall more than 230 students are expected to enroll.

In January, the Center offered the first of what Tobin hopes will be many JTPA programs, a Correctional Officer Pre-Employment/Work Maturity Training Program to prepare participants to be competitive for employment at the correctional facility.

The Center also includes a literacy component, offering help to residents of the region who lack reading skills.

"We think the MSU-Morgan Center has been very successful in terms of meeting needs," Tobin said, noting that the Center had processed nearly 2,000 calls for information from August 1988 through May 1989.

Statistics don't tell the whole story, for the MSU-Morgan Center is really a success story of people; people just like your next door neighbor. Here are just a few examples of how the Center has changed lives.

Today 45-year-old Roberta Brown is a sophomore honor student at Morehead State University. For the last 17 years though, she worked as a cashier in a grocery store.

Dropping out of high school in the ninth grade, she married and began a family only later to find herself a single parent with four children to raise.

After seeing the Center's ad in the local paper, she decided to begin work on her GED which she earned in the Spring of 1988. She enrolled in summer school at MSU and then began taking courses both at the main campus and at the Morgan Center. A dean's list student, she was invited to join MSU's Honors Program.

This spring she was one of 82 students statewide to receive a Robert C. Byrd Honors Scholarship, valued at \$1,500. Not only was she not a high school senior like the other award winners, but she was the only one whose academic credentials included a GED certificate.

Majoring in social work, Brown said, "I've been through rugged times myself and I hope that I can make a difference for someone else."

Obtaining the GED was something she always wanted to do. "Without the Center being here, I would not have done it," she said. "The GED for me was the beginning. Just completing that step gives you the courage to go on."

Accessibility--having the Center right in their backyard--has been a motivating factor in many cases.

For Liz Smith it means "I can work all day and still take college courses. It's so convenient for me because I can stop by the Center on my way home."

The Morgan County native graduated from high school, enrolled in college but missed her friends and returned home. Currently an associate with Lawson Real Estate, she wanted to be better prepared for the business world, but did not want to stop working. "I wanted to learn things that would help me in business," Smith said.

Now she's taking classes at night with the goal of earning an associate degree in business. "The MSU-Morgan Center is our community's best asset," she said. "It makes it possible for you to make a dream come true."

Wanda Cantrell had an eighth grade education, but had always wanted that high school diploma. Encouraged by her husband, their children and stepchildren, she earned her GED certificate through the Morgan Center. Joining her for that accomplishment was her sister Carolyn Hager. "We buddied each other through the program," Cantrell said.

She is so proud of her achievement that she bought a GED class ring to wear. She hopes to continue her quest for knowledge this fall by taking college courses at the Center.

"I love learning," she said, adding that she'd like to be a librarian because she loves books. An insatiable reader, she reads dictionaries and medical encyclopedias for fun. Besides her family's encouragement, Cantrell also found special support from the night teacher in the adult education program who was also her eighth grade teacher.

Furthering her education, according to Cantrell, is also an insurance policy because her husband is in poor health. "My stepchildren encouraged me to complete my education so I would be able to work," she explained.

But Cantrell has another more personal reason for encouraging others to obtain as much education as they can. Until she was 14, she had gone by the name Vonda only to learn that her grandfather had misspelled her name on the birth certificate. Twenty-two years later it still hurts her to think about it. "I hate my name. You don't want to spell your kids name wrong," she tells others.

Twenty-one-year-old Anthony Johns had to leave his home to find employment. But factory jobs were sparse for the Morgan County High School graduate and not only was it difficult to make ends meet, but he missed the hills of Eastern Kentucky.

For Johns and others like him, the correctional complex offers a future close to home. "It means jobs and a renewal of our community," he said. "Once we had about 32 operating coal mines in the county and now maybe there is one," he said.

After completing a 14-week Correctional Officer Pre-Employment/Work Maturity Skills Program offered at the Center, he was hired as a corrections officer at the Kentucky State Reformatory at LaGrange, a medium security prison. Once he has completed his six months as a probationary employee, he hopes to be transferred back home to the Eastern Kentucky Correctional Complex.

His father, Billy Joe Johns, also took part in the program and last May was scheduled to be interviewed for jobs at Eddyville, LaGrange and Danville prisons.

State corrections officials have pledged to give Morgan County area residents first consideration for jobs at the new complex, but until it opens those hired will need to do the six month work probationary period at other facilities.

The training program, according to young Johns, "was a real boost. It helped me learn that I had talents I didn't know I had. It's given me a sense of 'I can do it, I can make it happen.'"

Enthusiastic about the possibility of a corrections career, Johns said, "I want to make a difference in someone's life. I believe that prisoners are people also."

All four of the Center students had extremely high praise for the encouragement received from Tobin, Barbara Motley, the adult education teacher; her assistant Deborah Maloney, and Brenda Brown, the secretary. Added to the staff last spring was a part-time literacy coordinator, Sandra McKenzie.

According to Tobin, the cooperation received from the local business community has been most helpful in spreading the word about the Center's services. Inserts in the Licking Valley edition of the RECC's Kentucky Living magazine reach about 13,000 residents, while flyers in Mountain Rural Telephone Company bills go to 10,000 homes.

The Licking Valley RECC was one of the first businesses to offer financial support and its general manager Bill Duncan is one of the Morgan Center's most enthusiastic champions.

"The MSU-Morgan Center is very important to this community and the surrounding region," Duncan said. "By its presence here it keeps the importance of education in everyone's mind, but more than that it makes educational opportunities available right here.

"We as business people can use it as a tool to help us by encouraging employees to further their education," Duncan said. The RECC expects potential employees to have either a high school diploma or GED certificate, but that's just the minimum requirement, Duncan said.

Earlier this summer the Center launched a fund raising campaign locally to purchase computers and other equipment as well as to furnish a student lounge.

Located in the old West Liberty bowling alley, the Center was remodeled to provide nearly 5,000 square feet of space for classrooms, a testing center, a computer room, reception area and office for the coordinator and a student lounge.

According to Tobin, once the correctional complex is open and staffed, the Center hopes to provide professional development training for the staff. Currently discussions are under way with corrections personnel to see if it would be feasible for the Center to conduct training programs as the staff is hired. And further down the road there is the possibility of providing educational opportunities for the prison inmates.

Morehead State officials are extremely pleased with the success of the Center. "Obviously we knew the need was there," said MSU President C. Nelson Grote. "We viewed it as a tremendous opportunity for the University to provide a service to Eastern Kentucky. But when you see and hear about what the Center has actually meant to individuals, it is incredibly satisfying," he said.

The scholarship, valued at \$1,800 per year, is renewable for a total of four years if the student maintains a minimum cumulative 3.00 g.p.a. during the freshman year and a minimum cumulative 3.25 g.p.a. thereafter.

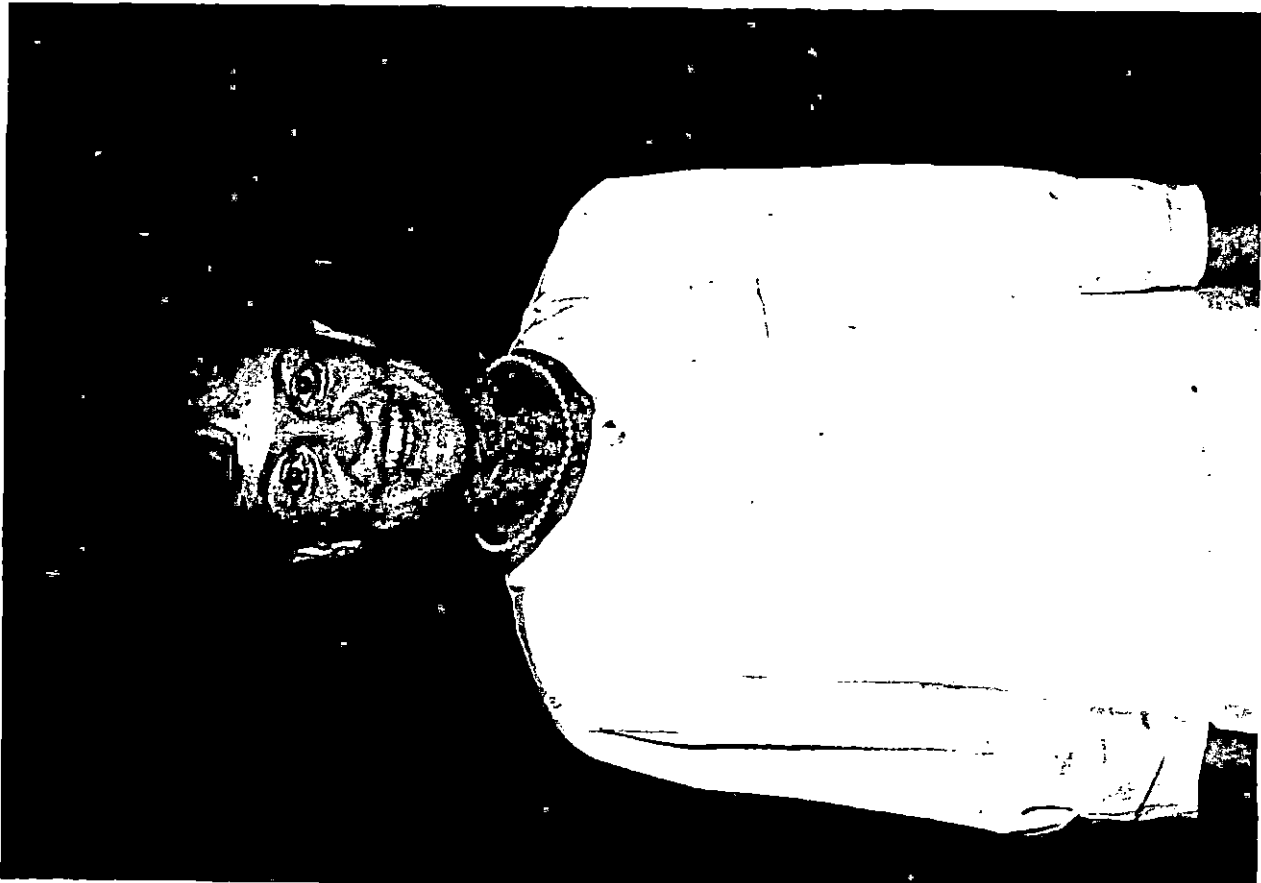

MOREHEAD, Ky.--"You'll never again live in a world where the United States is Number One," Kentucky's deputy adjutant general told more than 320 delegates attending Kentucky Boys' State this week at Morehead State University.

"Change is going on around us constantly," Brig. Gen. James R. Daniel told the young men Sunday, speaking at the first general meeting of the 50th session of the Kentucky American Legion-sponsored program, which offers practical lessons in state and local government.

"The world right now is on the verge of a great awakening, a renaissance, and 15 years from now you won't recognize it," he said.

While the U.S. may no longer be Number One, it will be one of tomorrow's four or five great nations, he said.

Urging the youth to become visionary leaders, he told them that they will be entering a high tech world where "if you don't prepare for it, you will be an also ran, not one of those running it."

Although some define vision as an acute sense of the possible, Daniel said his definition of vision is "a hunch in your gut, your heart and your mind. If you really see it, it captures your heart and soul."

Warning that it takes "radical commitment" to follow a vision and make it a reality, he also said that "you never get captured by a vision unless you have the power inside you, in your genes, to achieve it."

In addition to his duties as deputy adjutant general, Daniel has commanded the National Guard Professional Education Center, where all full-time national guard personnel are trained. He also has served on the faculty of the U.S. Army War College.

A graduate of Clemson University, Daniel earned two master's degrees, one in education and the other in theology, from Southern Seminary and a doctorate in theology from the Louisville Seminary.

Earlier in the day, MSU President C. Nelson Grote welcomed the group to campus. Just recently back from a two-week visit to mainland China where he saw the student-led political protests in the cause of democracy, Dr. Grote said that his experience had reminded him of how blessed the United States was despite imperfections within the democratic system.

During his briefing to the delegates, Boys' State Dean of Counselors Jack Lancaster told the young men that politics should not be considered a "dirty word," but that politics "is the science of government."

During the upcoming days, the delegates will participate in mock government sessions, learning about the two-party system and electing their own state and local officials. A General Assembly will be convened with delegates introducing, debating and acting on legislation.

Among the political officials expected to address the delegates is Lt. Gov. Brereton Jones, who is scheduled to speak at 1 p.m. Tuesday. On Thursday, the elected state officials will go to Frankfort to meet with their real-life counterparts.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--"There is no limit to what you can accomplish if you decide you're going to do it."

This was the message given today by Kentucky Lt. Gov. Brereton Jones to the more than 300 delegates attending the Kentucky Boys' State convention being held on the Morehead State University campus this week.

Urging the young men to see themselves as doctors, lawyers, politicians, or in other career fields, Jones said these were all possible accomplishments because "you have that opportunity. You can do it if you are willing to roll up your sleeves and dedicate yourself to that."

Praising the youth for the academic accomplishments which brought them to Boys' State, he encouraged them to continue their formal education.

"Education never stops. It doesn't make any difference if you drop out of school tomorrow. Heaven forbid that you should--don't even think about it--your education would only take on a different form. Instead of the education of the classroom, it becomes the education of the workplace. If anyone stops being concerned about education, stops reading and stops learning, then one stops accomplishing anything."

Jones told the group that the true test of success was to look in the mirror and if the one looking back was someone you liked that was the single most important thing. He said that the energetic person they would see today would be replaced in the future by a 20-year-old face, then a 30-year-old face. Eventually, the physical characteristics would not be the same, but that didn't make a difference if the person who looked back was a good person, an honest person.

"Be yourself at all times and have the courage to stand up for what you believe in," the lieutenant governor urged. "You have to have the courage to say what you feel. Don't be afraid of change, it is not a sign of weakness."

Describing the pitfalls that come with success, Jones warned that there would be those who would criticize along the way, but encouraged the group to follow the traditional values.

"Be concerned with honesty, truthfulness, and integrity, and really concerned with virtue of courage to stand up for what you believe in. If your heart tells you it's wrong, the price is too high," Jones said.

Cautioning that education alone would not solve all problems, he related the story of one street person who had a college education, a \$50,000 a year job, wife and two children and lost it all because "he didn't have the courage to say no to drugs."

Saying that communication could not be accomplished if he was the only one talking, he fielded questions from the delegates and received two bursts of applause for his remarks on the overcrowding of the state's prison system:

"The pendulum has swung too far," Jones said. "We are treating those who have committed a crime better than our own law abiding citizens," he said. Jones' recommendation to eliminate the situation would be two persons sharing a cell, but alternate times. One might be working, while the other would be confined to the cell.

Stating that the future of the state was dependent upon the leadership in Frankfort, Jones told the group, "Money won't solve problems, but good investments would allow us to get more for our money."

A long range plan needs to be developed for education, the lieutenant governor said. "The average Kentuckian is a whole lot smarter than the average politician thinks," he said. "The citizens are willing to pay their fair share to see these plans carried out. Education provides better jobs; better jobs provide better opportunities for all of us.

"We can accomplish all the things we need to accomplish to make us competitive in Kentucky and the rest of the world if we will only work together," Jones said.

During the remainder of the week, Boys' State delegates will participate in mock government sessions and elect state and local government officials.

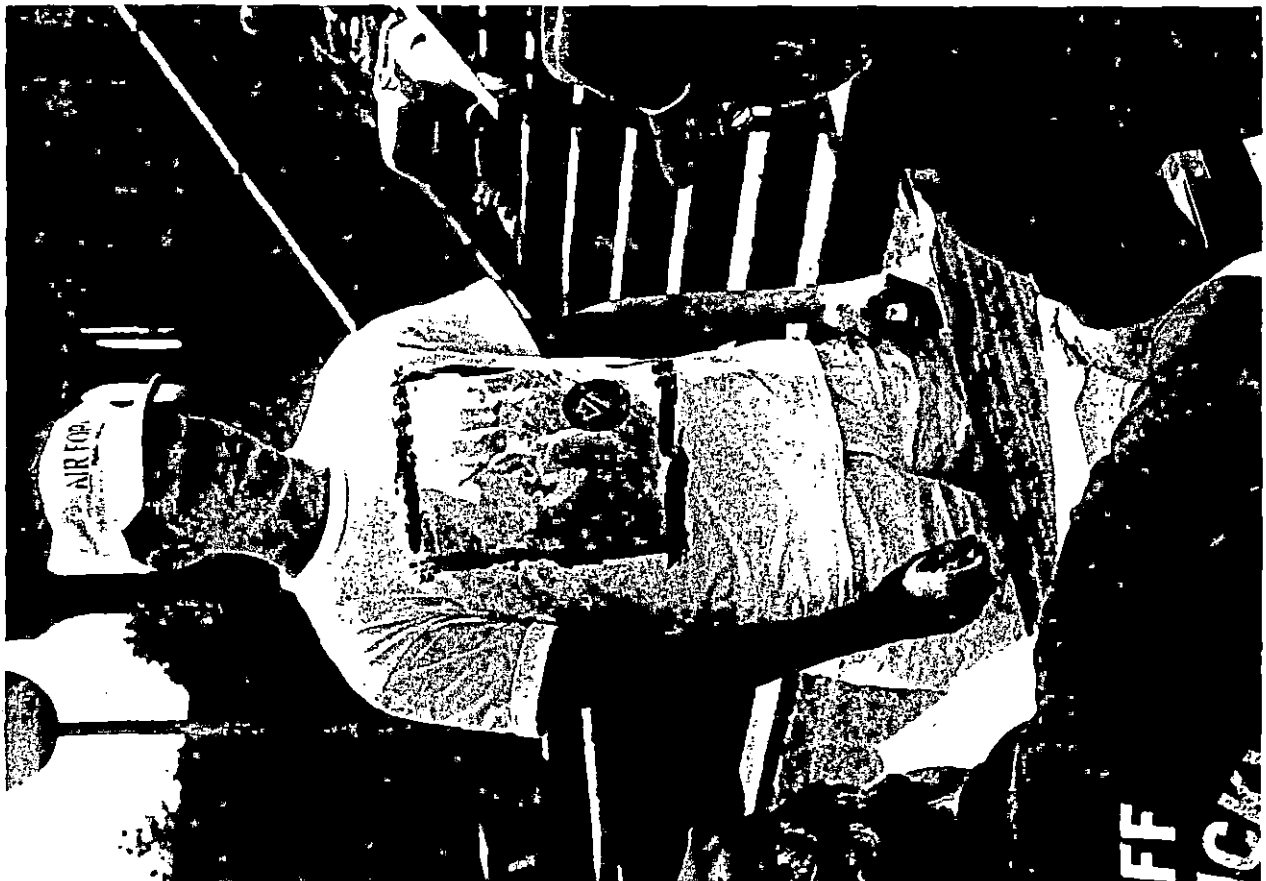

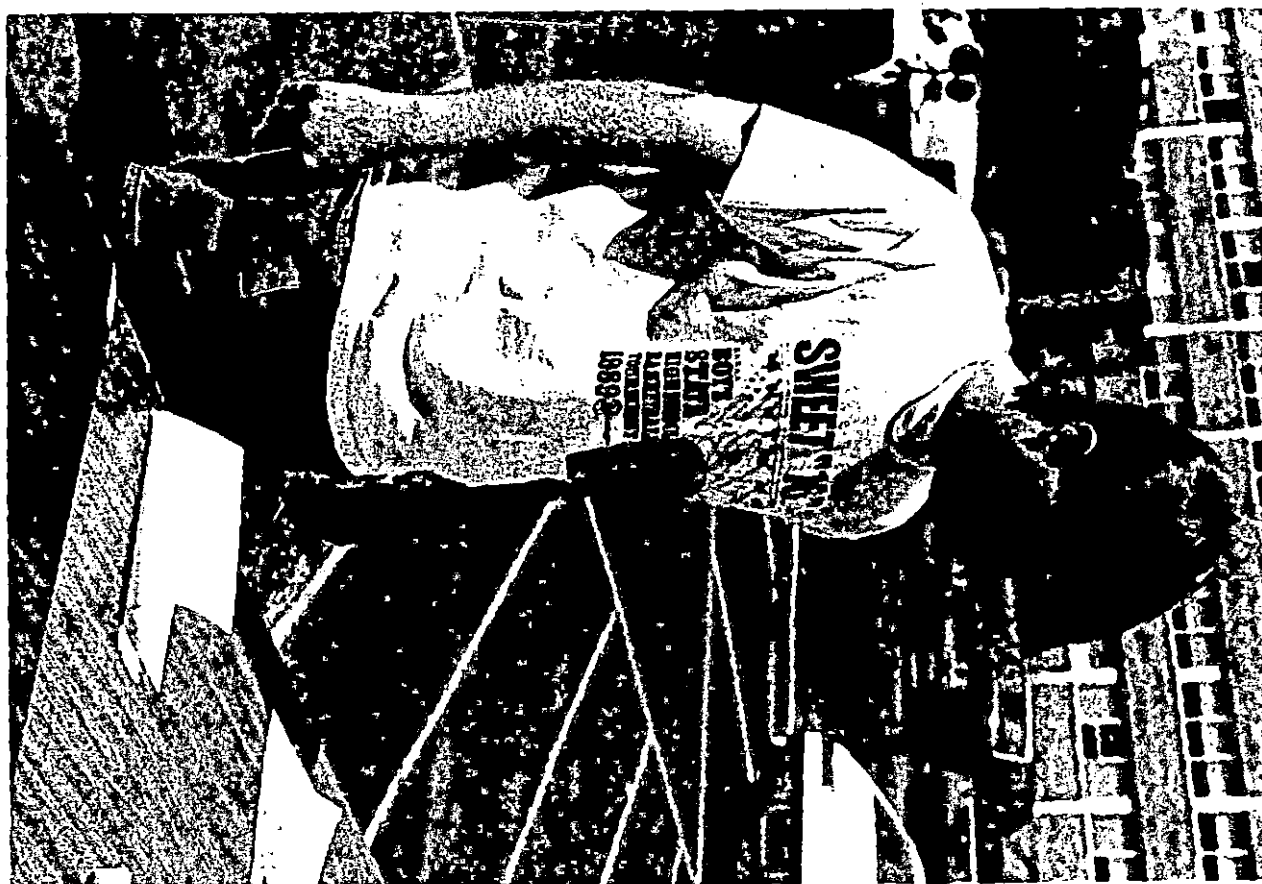

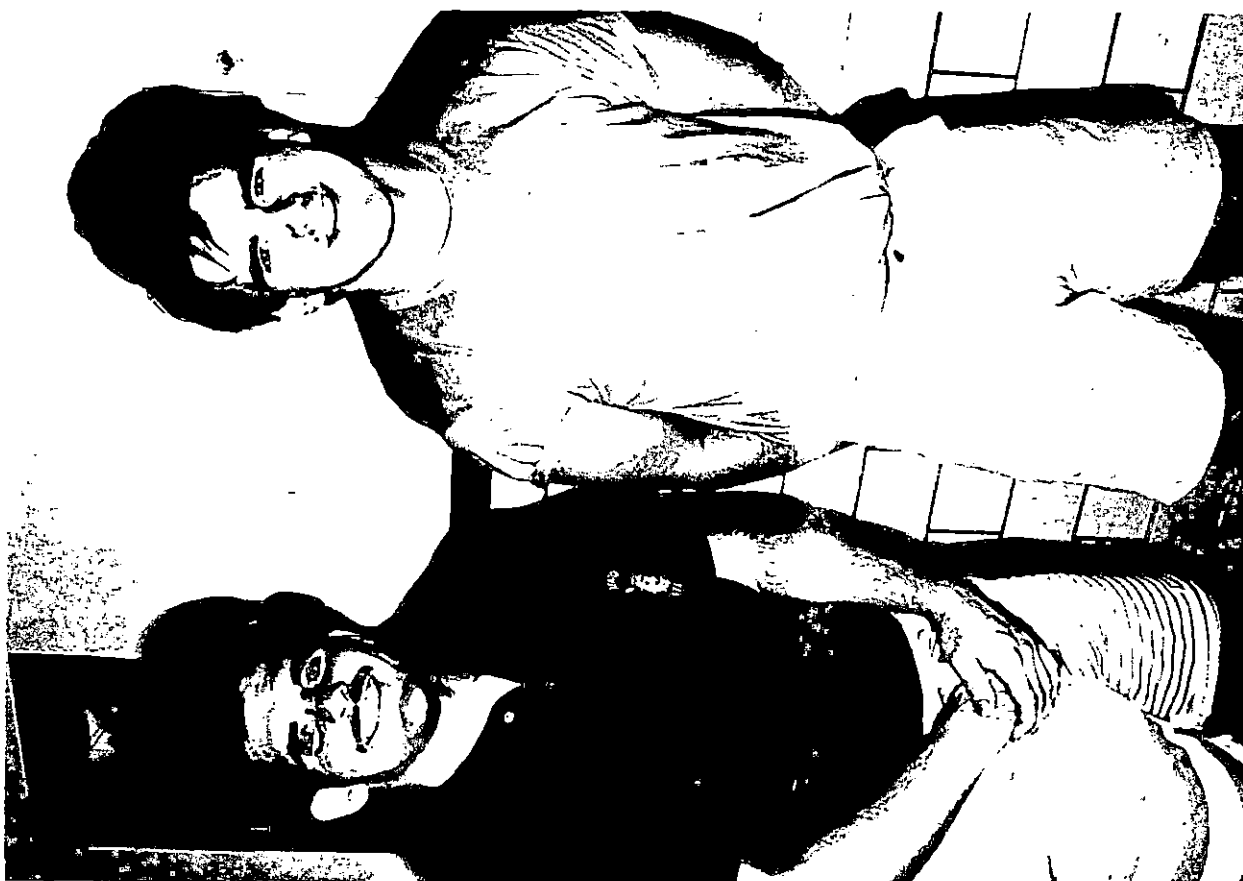

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Singer, songwriter, novelist, Jean Ritchie will receive Morehead State University's second Appalachian Treasure Award at the opening reception of the 13th annual Appalachian Celebration.

The reception will be held in the gallery of the Claypool-Young Art Building on campus on June 18 from 6:30-8:30 p.m.

The purpose of the Appalachian Treasure Award is to recognize an individual of unusual talent who is dedicated to promoting and preserving Appalachian culture.

Ritchie has been a major figure in American folk music for more than 30 years. She has become a legend by writing and singing the songs of Appalachia.

A native of Viper, Ritchie is keeping the tradition of folk music of the mountains alive. In her concerts, she usually accompanies herself on the hammered dulcimer, and is regarded as one of the country's finest authentic folk artists.

Ritchie graduated from Viper High School, from Cumberland College, then from the University of Kentucky with highest honors and a Phi Beta Kappa Key, receiving a bachelor's degree in social work. Her first social work position was with Henry Street Settlement on New York's Lower East side where she taught Kentucky songs and games to the children. Friends and Settlement visitors soon began inviting her to bring her mountain dulcimer to parties and schoolrooms, then Alan Lomax recorded her songs for the Library of Congress Folksongs Archives, and introduced her at Oxford Press.

Ritchie has many albums to her credit, and her recent recording, "One but One," received the Rolling Stones Critics' Award as Best Folk Album. She is also the author of numerous books.

Her first book, "Singing Family of the Cumberlands," published in 1955, was widely reviewed as an American classic, and is still in print today. Other books followed, concerts, festival appearances, television and radio shows, and recording contracts have been natural outgrowths of those early beginnings, and have taken her around the world.

Ritchie has enjoyed a multi-faceted career. In addition to her performing and writing, she has been a visiting professor at many major universities, and is currently president of Geordie Music Publishing Company, vice president of Greenhays Recordings, and a partner in Folklife Productions in New York.

The Appalachian Treasure Award will be presented by MSU President C. Nelson Grote as part of the Appalachian Celebration, a week-long summer festival which features traditional music, dance, storytelling, poetry, arts and crafts highlighting the cultural heritage of Appalachia.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--"There is no limit to what you can accomplish if you decide you're going to do it."

This was the message given by Kentucky Lt. Gov. Brereton Jones to the more than 300 delegates attending the Kentucky Boys' State convention on the Morehead State University campus June 4-9.

Urging the young men to see themselves as doctors, lawyers, politicians, or in other career fields, Jones said these were all possible accomplishments because "you have that opportunity. You can do it if you are willing to roll up your sleeves and dedicate yourself to that."

Praising the youth for the academic accomplishments which brought them to Boys' State, he encouraged them to continue their formal education.

"Education never stops. It doesn't make any difference if you drop out of school tomorrow. Heaven forbid that you should--don't even think about it--your education would only take on a different form. Instead of the education of the classroom, it becomes the education of the workplace. If anyone stops being concerned about education, stops reading and stops learning, then one stops accomplishing anything."

Jones told the group that the true test of success was to look in the mirror and if the one looking back was someone you liked that was the single most important thing. He said that the energetic person they would see today would be replaced in the future by a 20-year-old face, then a 30-year-old face. Eventually, the physical characteristics would not be the same, but that didn't make a difference if the person who looked back was a good person, an honest person.

"Be yourself at all times and have the courage to stand up for what you believe in," the lieutenant governor urged. "You have to have the courage to say what you feel. Don't be afraid of change, it is not a sign of weakness."

Describing the pitfalls that come with success, Jones warned that there would be those who would criticize along the way, but encouraged the group to follow the traditional values.

"Be concerned with honesty, truthfulness, and integrity, and really concerned with virtue of courage to stand up for what you believe in. If your heart tells you it's wrong, the price is too high," Jones said.

Cautioning that education alone would not solve all problems, he related the story of one street person who had a college education, a \$50,000 a year job, wife and two children and lost it all because "he didn't have the courage to say no to drugs."

Saying that communication could not be accomplished if he was the only one talking, he fielded questions from the delegates and received two bursts of applause for his remarks on the overcrowding of the state's prison system.

"The pendulum has swung too far," Jones said. "We are treating those who have committed a crime better than our own law abiding citizens," he said. Jones' recommendation to eliminate the situation would be two persons sharing a cell, but alternate times. One might be working, while the other would be confined to the cell.

Stating that the future of the state was dependent upon the leadership in Frankfort, Jones told the group, "Money won't solve problems, but good investments would allow us to get more for our money."

A long range plan needs to be developed for education, the lieutenant governor said. "The average Kentuckian is a whole lot smarter than the average politician thinks," he said. "The citizens are willing to pay their fair share to see these plans carried out. Education provides better jobs; better jobs provide better opportunities for all of us."

"We can accomplish all the things we need to accomplish to make us competitive in Kentucky and the rest of the world if we will only work together," Jones said.

During the remainder of the week, Boys' State delegates will participate in mock government sessions and elect state and local government officials.

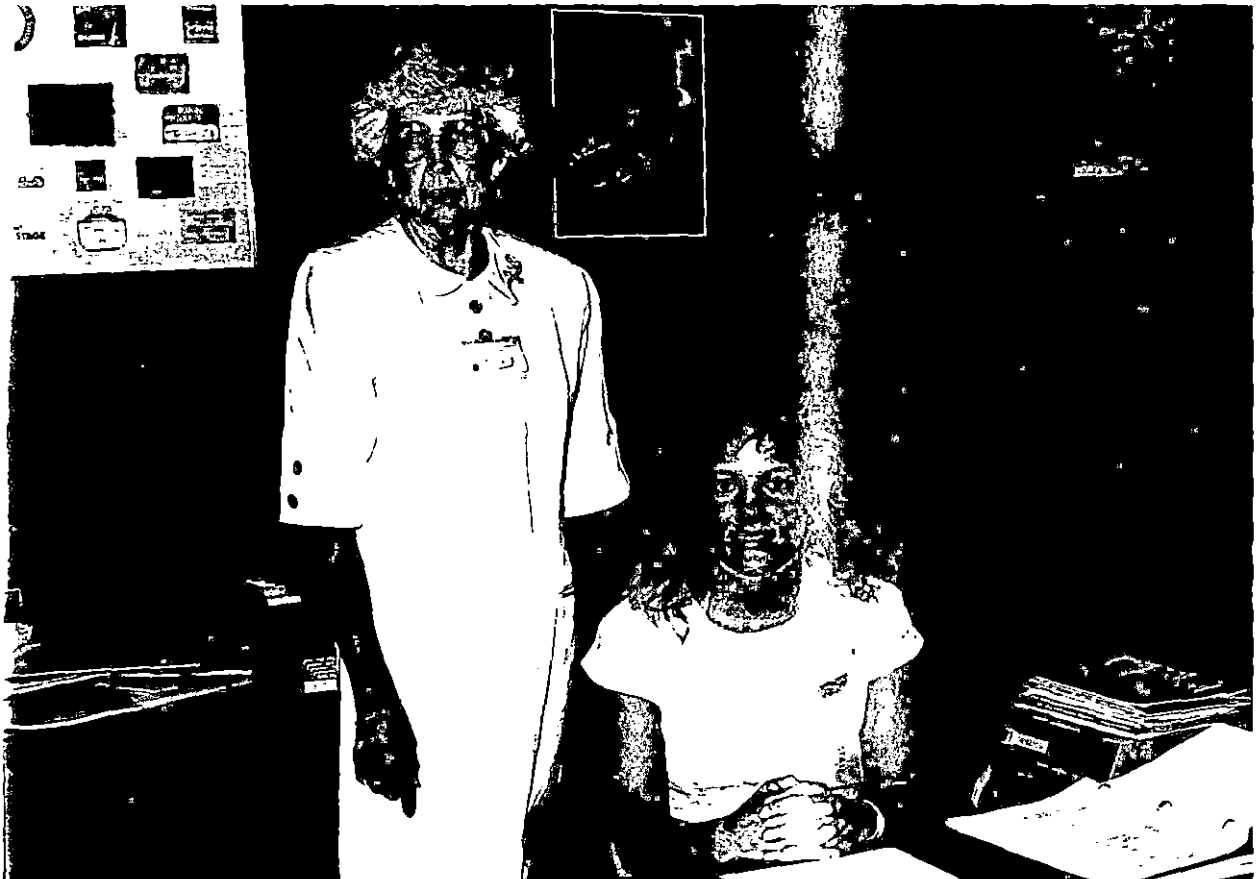

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Contracts for Phase I of the renovation to Morehead State University's utility/steam tunnel have been awarded and construction is under way, according to Joe Planck, MSU's director of Physical Plant.

Phase I, which will cost nearly \$5 million, includes two stages. The first stage calls for installation of a new underground duct bank system, installation of new electrical cables and replacement of approximately 30 PCB-contaminated transformers.

The second stage--renovations to the tunnel--is two-fold: removal of asbestos and replacement/repair of steam lines in approximately 1,100 feet of the 11,000-foot tunnel.

Contracts were awarded by the state as follows:

Henderson Electric of Lexington, \$2.7 million, to put in a new campuswide electrical/telecommunications conduit and install the electrical cables.

General Electric of Cincinnati, \$746,000, to remove and replace the PCB-contaminated transformers.

U.S. Abatement, Inc., of Hamilton, Ohio, \$194,692, asbestos removal from the tunnel.

Blau Mechanical, Inc., of Covington, \$582,000, the steam line work.

Henderson Electric last week began excavating along University Boulevard for the new conduit system.

Plans call for the conduit system to be installed in sections. The trenches will be filled and each area returned to a usable condition within a week to 10 days following the excavation, Planck said.

Henderson estimates the excavation portion of its contract will be completed by early October. The full project which includes installing the electrical lines is expected to take 460 days.

"Basically the messy part--streets torn up, parking spaces gone--will be over within a relatively short time," Planck noted.

"There may not be parking along the north side of University Boulevard during the first weeks of summer school, but those spaces will be back and then somewhere else on campus the status quo will be altered," Planck said.

Planck noted that one campus parking lot on Nickell Street, which holds 20 cars, will be lost until early October while it is used as a construction staging area. "But when it is re-opened we will have nearly 30 additional spots with the acquisition of an adjoining lot," he said.

"We've worked closely with the project designers looking for ways to minimize disruption to the campus. We believe the planning that has gone into this entire project will make those disruptions short term," he said.

"We think Henderson and GE will be able to coordinate their work, so that the transformers can go in place at the same time the electricity is taken down to make the switch from the old to the new cables," Planck added.

MSU officials expect to schedule the power outages on weekends and holidays from October through January.

"Again we want to do this when it will be the least disruptive. There's never a convenient time, but some options are better," Planck said.

Coordination also is a key factor in the second stage of Phase I. As the asbestos is removed from one section of the tunnel and that portion is sealed, work crews can begin repairing/replacing the steam lines.

Planck noted that asbestos removal and steam line work is being done on the original section of the tunnel which dates back to 1935. "It's the section where we've had many of our problems of late," he said.

Construction of MSU's utility/steam tunnel system began in 1935 and as the campus expanded, the system was expanded, with the final section completed in 1979. According to a consultant's report, more than 9,000 feet of the tunnel is badly deteriorated.

Funds to complete Phase I of the project have been allocated through a state bond issue. Phase II of the project, renovation of the remaining tunnel section, will need to be funded by the 1990 General Assembly. MSU officials believe it will take about \$5 million more to complete the project.

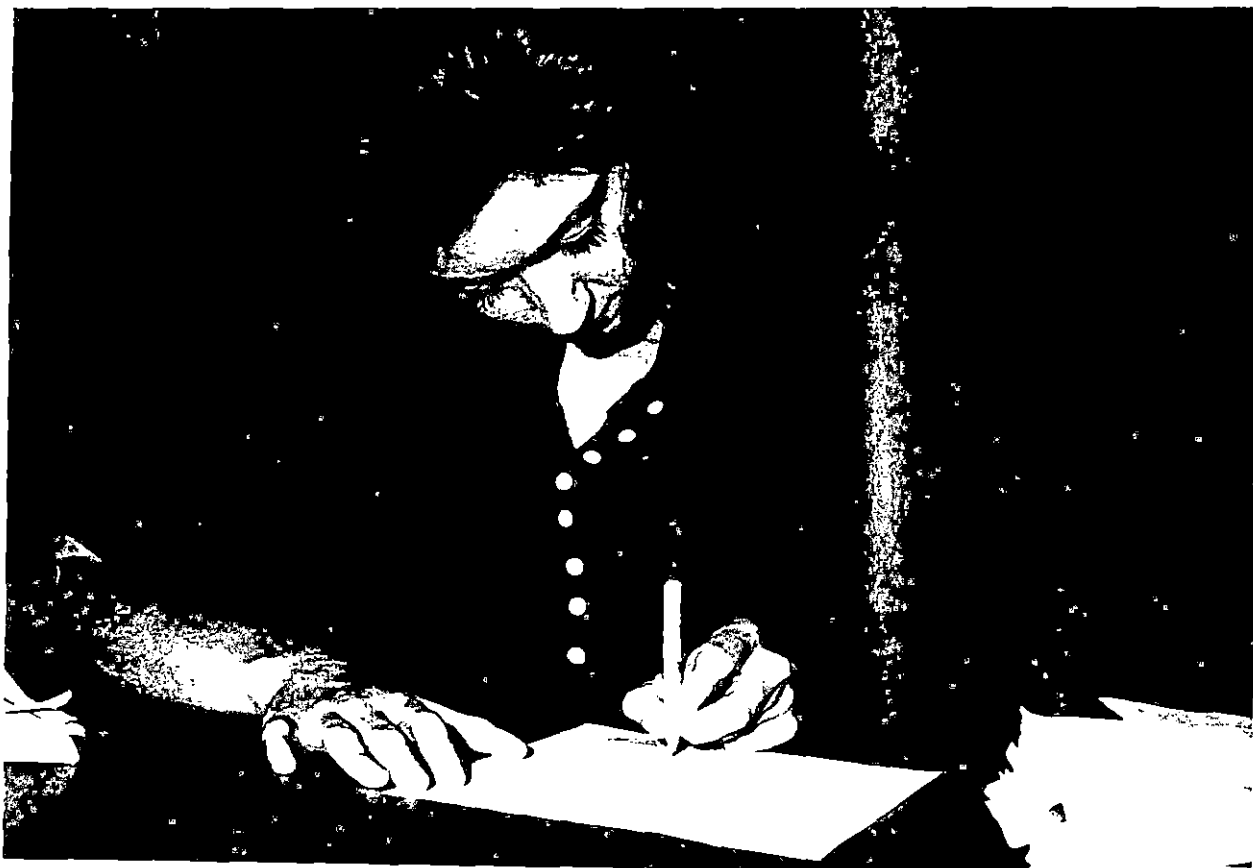

She is appreciative of the experiences she has had which taught her about the governmental process.

"Everyone should know how the government works," Robie said. "The average citizen needs to know the process and that they can submit a bill and get it passed in state legislature."

Describing herself as someone who likes to do a job well, she plans to spend the remainder of the week providing the best leadership possible for those who have put their faith in her.

In the campaign process, she spoke on the "HER" of Sara Beth Robie, H for honesty, E for enthusiasm, and R for responsibility. When she addressed the Girls' State delegation as their governor, Robie encouraged the group to be "optimistic. Because with optimism, anything can be accomplished."

Having completed her junior year at Berea Community High School while taking classes at Berea College, Robie is a member of the National Honor Society, Student Council and Beta Club. MOREHEAD, Ky.--A positive attitude can have a positive impact, Kentucky's first lady told more than 300 Kentucky Girls' State delegates Thursday night.

Speaking at the inaugural banquet for the 43rd annual session of Girls' State, Martha Wilkinson urged the young women to join her campaign against illiteracy and persuade other young people to complete their education.

Held at Morehead State University under the sponsorship of the American Legion Auxiliary, Girls' State is a weeklong practical experience in state and local governmental processes.

Mrs. Wilkinson told the delegates that they were unlike many of the student groups she addresses. "You all here tonight have a talent; you are in control of your life and know where you are going," she said.

"When we like ourselves and are happy and content in our own lives with what we are doing every day, there is a pride of accomplishment," she said.

The governor's wife noted that many of her audiences were potential dropouts who had lost that sense of pride. "They are making excuses because it's the easiest way out. They've lost sight of what they are and what they want to do and are headed in the path of destruction."

She discussed a new program called "Destination Graduation" under way in the 5th and 7th congressional districts whereby potential dropouts are linked with college students who become their tutors. "They look up to those college students; they respect them and realize that they too want to be like them," she said.

Mrs. Wilkinson told the high school seniors that they too were examples who needed to keep all those values that got them where they are today.

"When you like what you are, you like what you think and you carry out the values that you have based your life on so that at any point in your life you are always proud to say I know who I am, I like who I am, then you will always be considered an example. You will always be able to lead others," she said.

"Every day you can have an effect on friends and family," she told the delegates as she urged them to say no to drugs and other destructive forces.

"Always look around you and think that every day you have been responsible for touching one person's life and many days it will be many," she said.

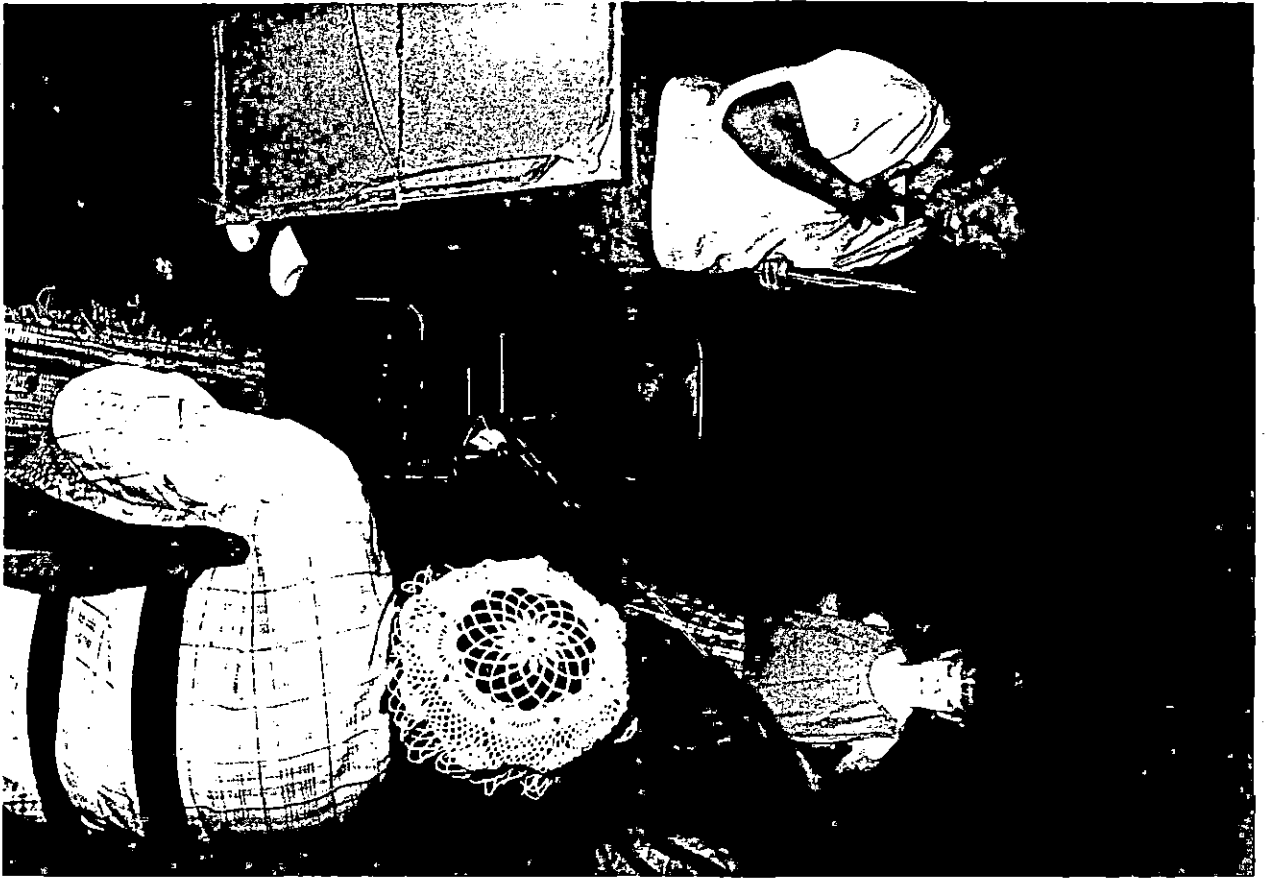

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Morehead State University's School of Education has earned continuing accreditation through Dec. 31, 1994, from the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education.

MSU's teacher education program met all of the accrediting body's standards at the basic and advanced levels, NCATE Executive Director Richard C. Kunkel noted in his letter of notification.

According to a report in the June 1 issue of Teacher Education Reports, only six of the 23 teacher education programs reviewed in April by NCATE's Unit Accreditation Board met all standards.

"Morehead State historically has been known for its teacher education program," MSU President C. Nelson Grote said. "This latest achievement is a tribute to our faculty who have worked hard not merely to maintain a quality program, but to reach an even greater level of excellence," Dr. Grote said.

"Providing an exceptional education for tomorrow's classroom teachers and enhancing the professional skills of those already in the classroom is an important commitment of MSU," he said. "The news from NCATE is proof that we are meeting that commitment."

MSU received high marks from the on-site review team chairman, according to Dr. Larry W. Jones, dean of MSU's College of Professional Studies. "Dr. (Norene) Daly called it one of the 'best organized visits' she had participated in," the dean said.

"We are particularly pleased with the NCATE results as MSU was one of the first institutions to have its teacher education program reviewed under the new standards adopted by NCATE in 1987," he explained.

NCATE's standards address five categories: knowledge bases for professional education; relationship to the world of practice; students; faculty, and governance and resources.

MSU's Minority Teacher Education Recruitment Project was one of several areas of strength cited by NCATE. The dean praised the efforts of the School of Education personnel.

"They did an excellent job in responding to requests for documentation and in seeing overall that the unit met the standards," he said.

The report noted a few concerns about the 5th Year program, faculty development opportunities, off-campus advising and delivery of instruction.

"I don't know of any teacher education program in the nation that would not have some areas that could be improved," Dr. Jones said.

Under NCATE's new guidelines for continuing accreditation, MSU will be responsible for submitting an annual report on its teacher education program to NCATE.

Dr. Katharine D. Herzog, MSU associate professor of education, has been asked to serve as coordinator for the NCATE report as well as for those required by the American Association of Colleges of Teacher Education and the Kentucky Department of Education.

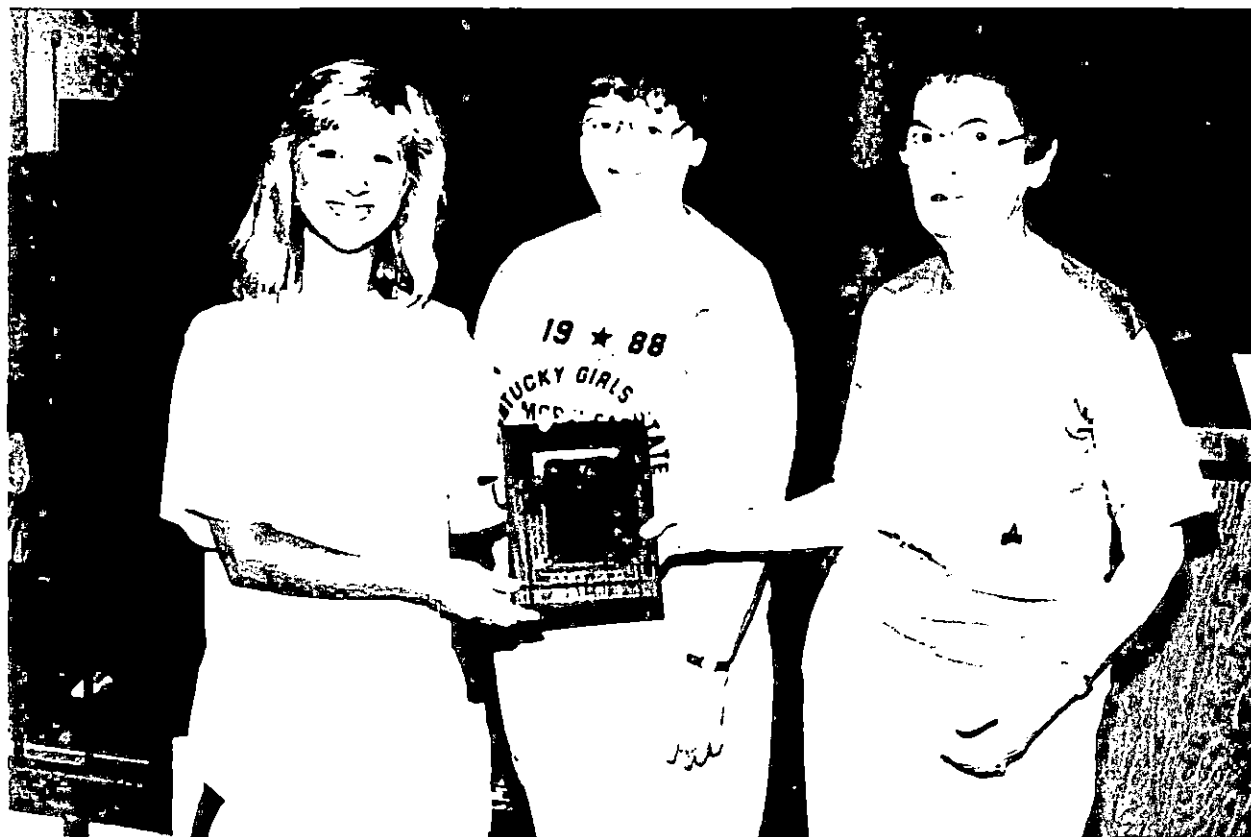

MOREHEAD, Ky.--A celebration of chamber music comes to the mountains of Eastern Kentucky with the 6th annual Morehead Chamber Music Celebration (MCMC) scheduled July 10-14 at Morehead State University.

The MCMC offers participants--professional, talented amateur and student musicians--the opportunity to rehearse, study and perform, while residents of the region have the opportunity to enjoy evening concerts by guest ensemble artists, MSU faculty members and Celebration participants.

The weeklong music festival is sponsored by Morehead State University's College of Arts and Sciences and its Academy of Arts. MCMC's managing director is Yvonne Baldwin. Coordinators are Suanne Blair and John Viton, MSU assistant professors of music.

An added attraction this year is a series of afternoon lecture/recitals which have been funded with a Kentucky Humanities Council mini-grant. Scheduled Monday through Thursday at 3:30 p.m. in Baird Music Hall 121, the free lectures will cover such topics as "James Joyce: The Sound is the Sense," "Music and History in America," and "The Letters of W.A. Mozart: Insight into his Life and Music."

Serving as the festival's guest conductor will be Victoria Bond, one of the few women music directors of a professional orchestra, the Roanoke (Va.) Symphony Orchestra. Her credentials include a number of firsts:

The first woman appointed to EXXON/Arts Endowment Conductor with a major orchestra (Pittsburgh Symphony); the first woman to graduate from the Juilliard School with a doctorate in orchestral conducting, and the first woman to receive a conducting grant from the National Institute for Music Theatre to work at the New York City Opera and Artpark.

Acclaimed as one of today's most talented musicians, Bond has been profiled in Musical America, the Wall Street Journal and Southern Magazine.

Professional ensembles-in-residence will include the Renaissance City Winds, returning for its fifth season, and the Meridian String Quartet, also in a repeat performance.

Named after Pittsburgh's nickname, the Renaissance City Winds is comprised of five musicians on flute, oboe, clarinet, horn and bassoon. Founded in 1975, the group has toured extensively through the Midwest and East, including two Carnegie Hall performances and a Kennedy Center appearance.

The winner of four National Endowment for the Arts Awards and two Chamber Music of America Residency Awards, the Winds performs music of all periods since the Renaissance, but specializes in American music. Its concert program includes a work by the Celebration's guest conductor and a suite of early 19th century clarinet duets found in the archives of the Harmony Society.

The Winds will launch the MCMC concert series on Monday, July 10, at 7:30 p.m. in Duncan Recital Hall.

A young ensemble, the Meridian String Quartet has performed at Lincoln Center and presented a concert series in Carnegie Hall's Weill Recital Hall. The group has worked extensively with the Juilliard and Tokyo Quartets and is frequently heard on WQXR radio's "The Listening Room" and "Young Artists Showcase."

The quartet's MCMC program will include works by Haydn, Shostakovich and Beethoven to be performed Wednesday, July 12, at 7:30 p.m. in Duncan Recital Hall. A reception, hosted by the Academy's advisory board, will follow in the gallery of Claypool-Young Art Building.

On Tuesday, July 11, Morehead State's own music faculty will be showcased in a concert at 7:30 p.m. in Duncan Recital Hall. Scheduled to appear are Michael Acord, Leo Blair, Suanne Blair, Jon Burgess, Jay Flippin, Milford Kuhn, Edward Malterer, Lucretia Stetler and John Viton.

The Celebration's traditional "Participants Recital" is set for 7:30 p.m. Thursday, July 13, in Duncan Recital Hall.

Closing the series at 7:30 p.m. Friday, July 14, in Duncan Recital Hall will be a concert by the Celebration Chamber Orchestra with Bond conducting. The orchestra is composed of professional musicians participating in the MCMC and faculty members.

There will be a \$2 admission charge for the concerts and tickets may be purchased at the door. A ticket for all five concerts may be purchased for \$8.

Friday's final concert is part of the 1988-89 Arts in Morehead (AIM) series and season subscribers will be admitted free. AIM subscribers also may purchase tickets to the full MCMC series at \$6 per person.

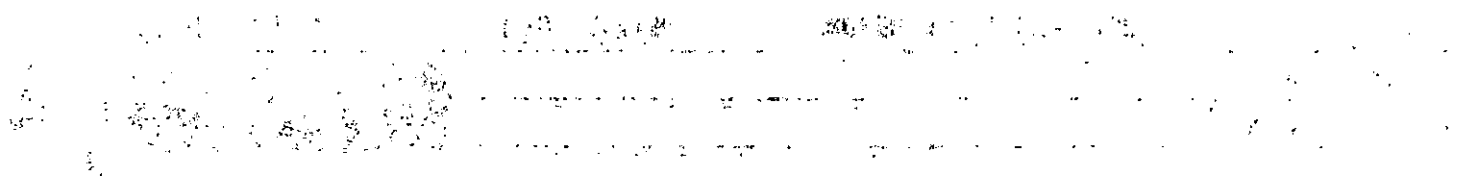

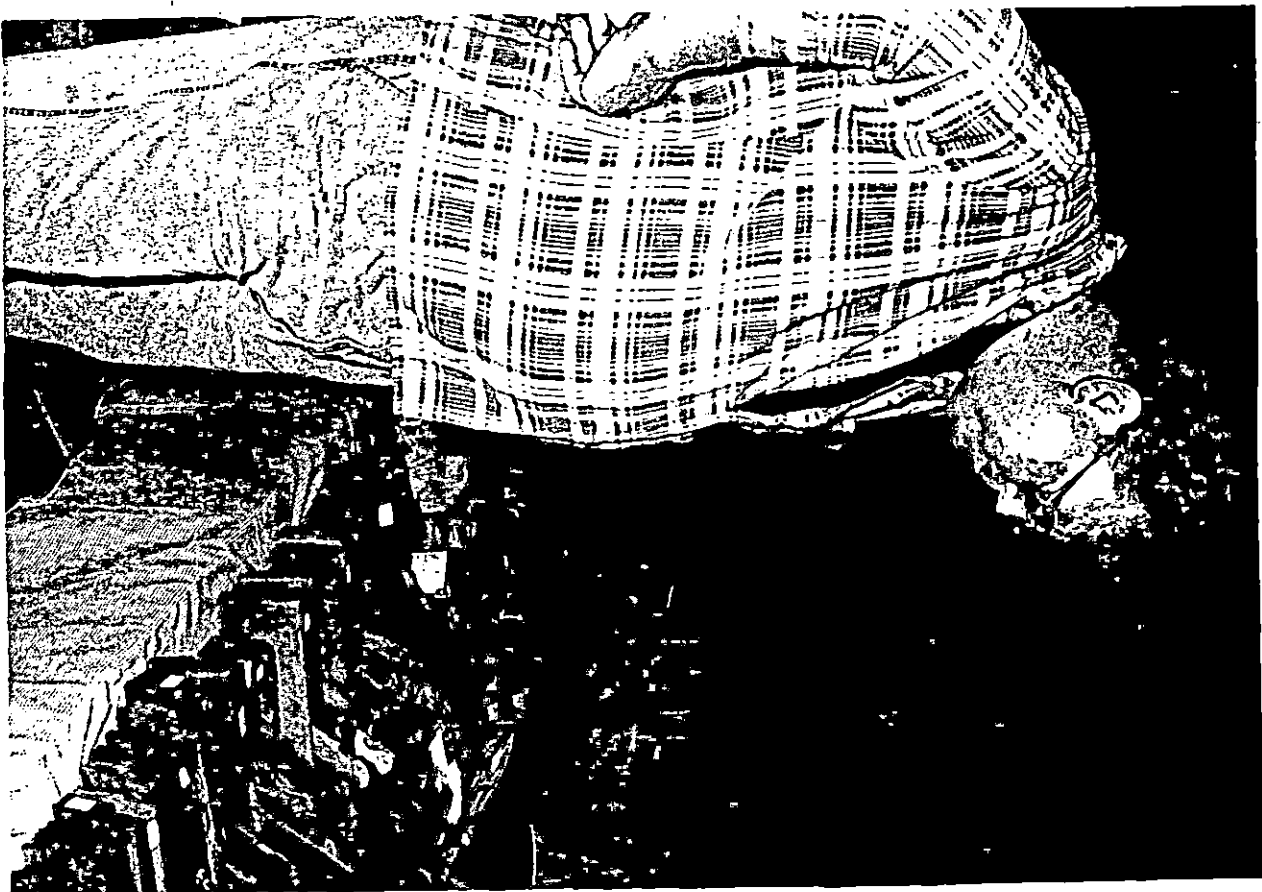

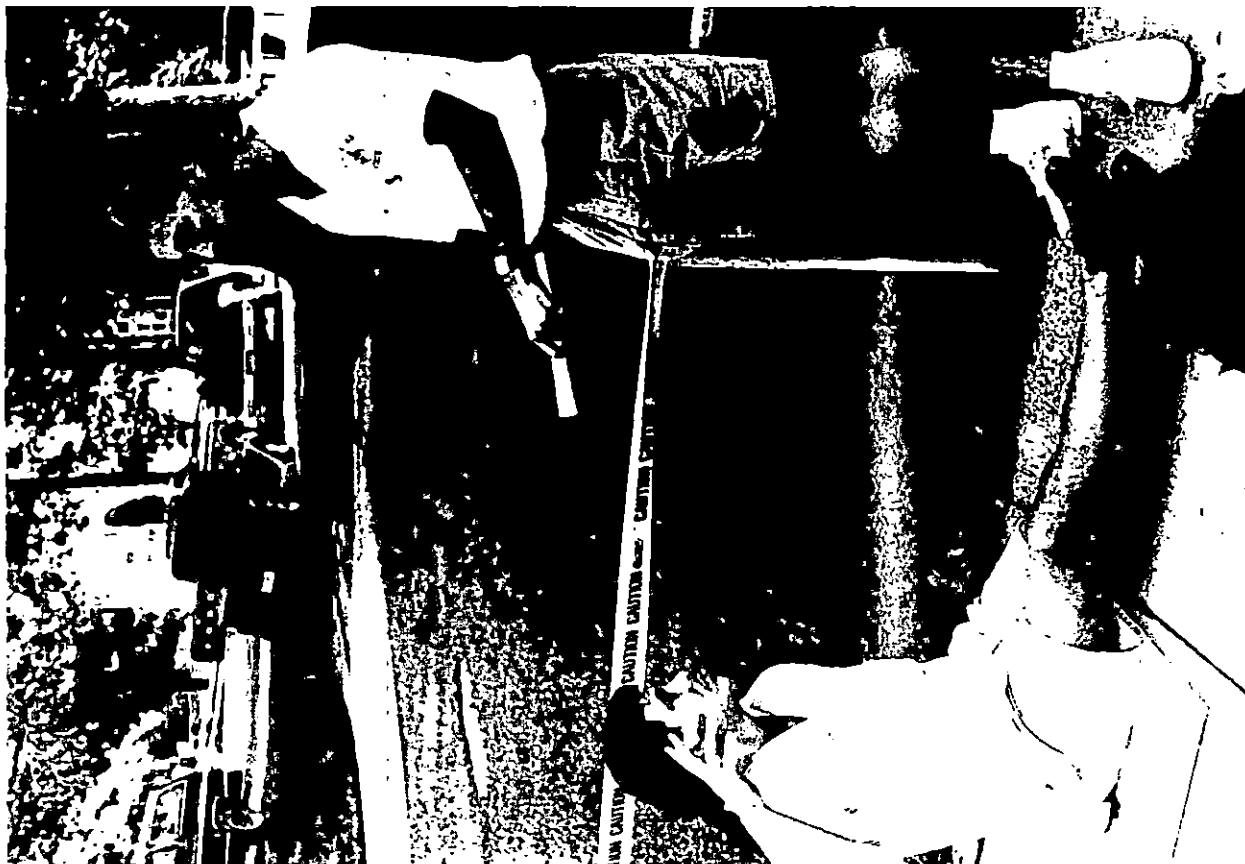

MOREHEAD, Ky.—A Morehead State University administrator will be part of a special delegation of women managers from the United States visiting the Soviet Union this summer.

Dr. Judy R. Rogers, dean of Undergraduate Programs, is one of 60 business and professional women nationwide selected to participate in a People to People Citizen Ambassador Program to study the social status and professional roles of women in Russia.

Departing July 6 and returning July 19, the group will meet with Soviet women in government, business and education who have leadership roles in Soviet Russia.

The itinerary includes stops in Moscow, Stavropol and Kiev. "We will visit sites and companies or institutions where women have major management positions," said Dr. Rogers, adding that she would be meeting with her colleagues at Kiev University.

Arrangements call for large group sessions where papers will be presented and small group discussions with Soviet women in similar professions.

The dean said she had prepared papers dealing with the multiple roles faced by women in management, the major trends in American education, and the prospects of women in academic administration.

"They (her Soviet counterparts) will decide which paper they are most interested in hearing," she said.

"It's an exciting opportunity," said Dr. Rogers. "I'm especially interested in developing an ongoing relationship with women educators who would like to visit Morehead State as speakers or as exchange teachers."

Dr. Rogers, who became dean last fall, first joined the MSU faculty in 1967 and holds a doctorate from the University of North Carolina—Chapel Hill. A professor of English, she is a two-time Woodrow Wilson Fellow and also participated in a National Endowment for the Humanities Summer Seminar for College Teachers at Princeton University.

A frequent presenter at professional meetings, she is co-author with her husband of one textbook which is in its second edition and the pair has another book scheduled to be published later this year by Wadsworth Printing Company.

The Citizen Ambassador Program of People to People International, which is based in Spokane, Wash., was established in 1956 by former President Dwight D. Eisenhower under the U.S. Department of State. Today the program continues under a private endowment fund.
