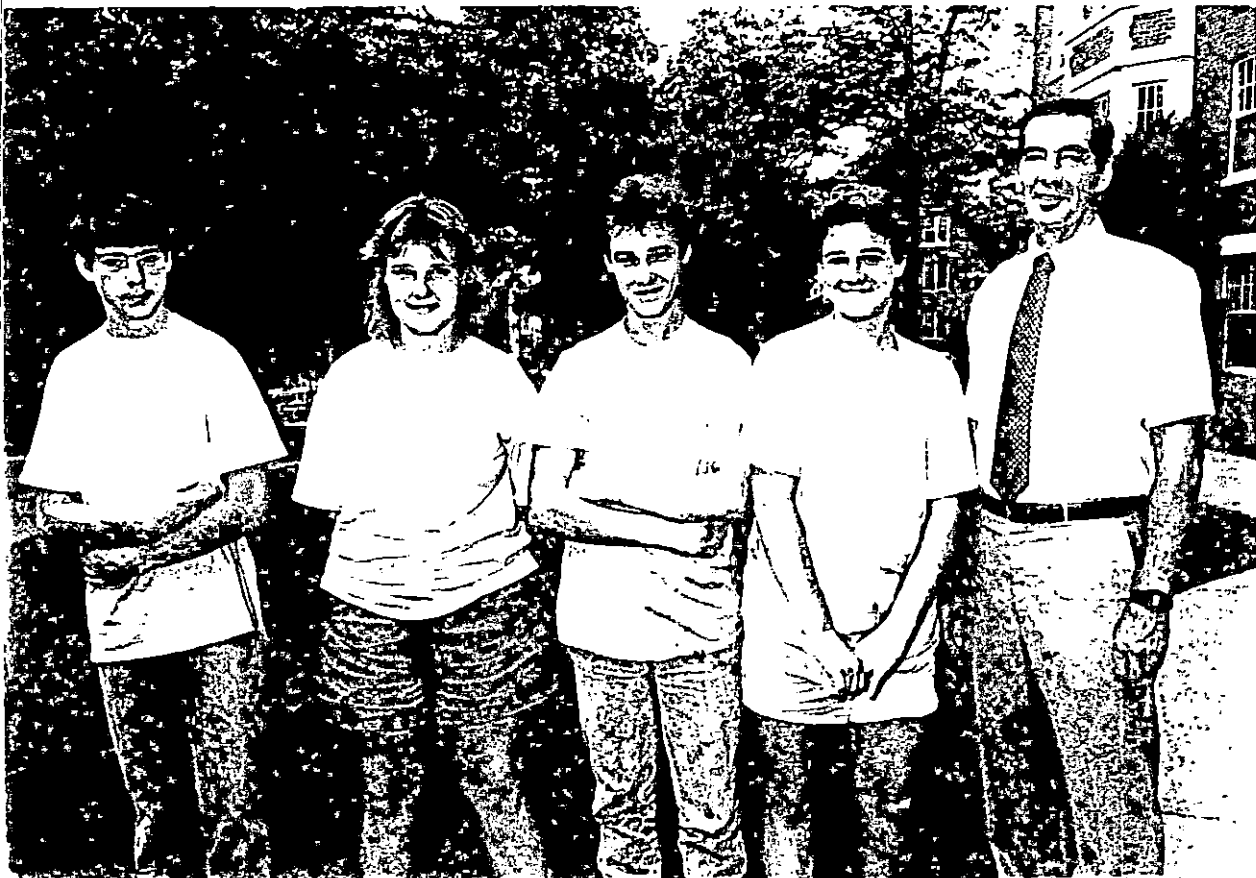

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Dr. Robert W. Grueninger, an administrator at Eastern Montana College, has been named chair of Morehead State University's Department of Health, Physical Education and Recreation, effective Aug. 1.

The former chairperson of EMC's Division of Health, Physical Education and Recreation, Dr. Grueninger succeeds Dr. Earl Bentley in the post. Dr. Bentley, who came to MSU in 1959, retired this year.

"Dr. Grueninger has built an enviable list of credentials in his field and is highly respected by his colleagues, nationally and internationally," said Dr. Larry W. Jones, dean of MSU's College of Professional Studies, who announced the appointment.

Dr. Grueninger, who just completed a summer project in Asia for the U.S. Sports Academy, was a project director for the Academy in Bahrain from 1976 to 1979 and in 1963-65 was assigned by the U.S. Department of State to the Kingdom of Laos as an American specialist in sports and youth.

A member of EMC's faculty since 1979, Dr. Grueninger also taught and headed the Human Performance laboratories at the University of Wisconsin--Parkside and Oberlin College. He also was on the faculty of Frostburg State University.

He earned the B.S. degree from Springfield (Mass.) College, the M.S. degree from the University of Illinois, Champaign-Urbana, and his doctorate from the University of Oregon.

The 1987 EMC Distinguished Professor, he is active in several professional organizations, including the American College of Sports Medicine, and the American Alliance for Health, Physical Education, Recreation and Dance (AAHPERD).

In 1985, he chaired an AAHPERD Task Force to develop a national soccer skills test and currently serves as a member of the AAHPERD Project on Aging at both the state and national level.

He has had numerous articles published in professional periodicals.

Fannin, daughter of Norman and Sharon Fannin, is a graduate of Johnson Central High School. A WYMT-TV Student Achiever, she was a member of Student Council and Champions Against Drugs, received the JCHS Academic Band Award and is listed in "Who's Who Among American High School Students."

To be eligible for a Regional Honors I Scholarship, the applicant must be admitted to MSU as an incoming freshman or transfer student; be a graduate within MSU's service region or have completed at least one year at a community college within MSU's service region; be recommended by high school or community college; be the highest ranking achiever coming to MSU from that high school or community college; have at least a 3.50 high school g.p.a. (on a 4.00 scale) based on seven semesters of work, and submit a completed scholarship application to MSU.

The scholarship, valued at \$2,000 per year, is renewable for four years if the student maintains a minimum cumulative 3.00 g.p.a. during the freshman year and a minimum 3.25 g.p.a. thereafter.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Morehead State University President C. Nelson Grote, speaking at the 1989 Summer Commencement, Saturday, Aug. 5, challenged the graduates to make education a top priority in their lives.

"America will soon become the nation of illiteracy," Dr. Grote said. "Other nations realize that in world economy, the only way to compete is with an educated citizenry." He then urged the degree candidates, when they had families of their own, to demand the quality of education their children deserve.

"Education, not wealth, will become important in leading countries of the world," he continued. "We must stop talking about the cost of education but rather talk about education as an investment."

Calling commencements at MSU a "family affair," the president praised the graduates' families for their "commitment which helped these students achieve this goal in their lives." He stated that he was especially pleased that the commitment carried overseas and recognized a family who had traveled from Bombay, India, for the graduation of their son.

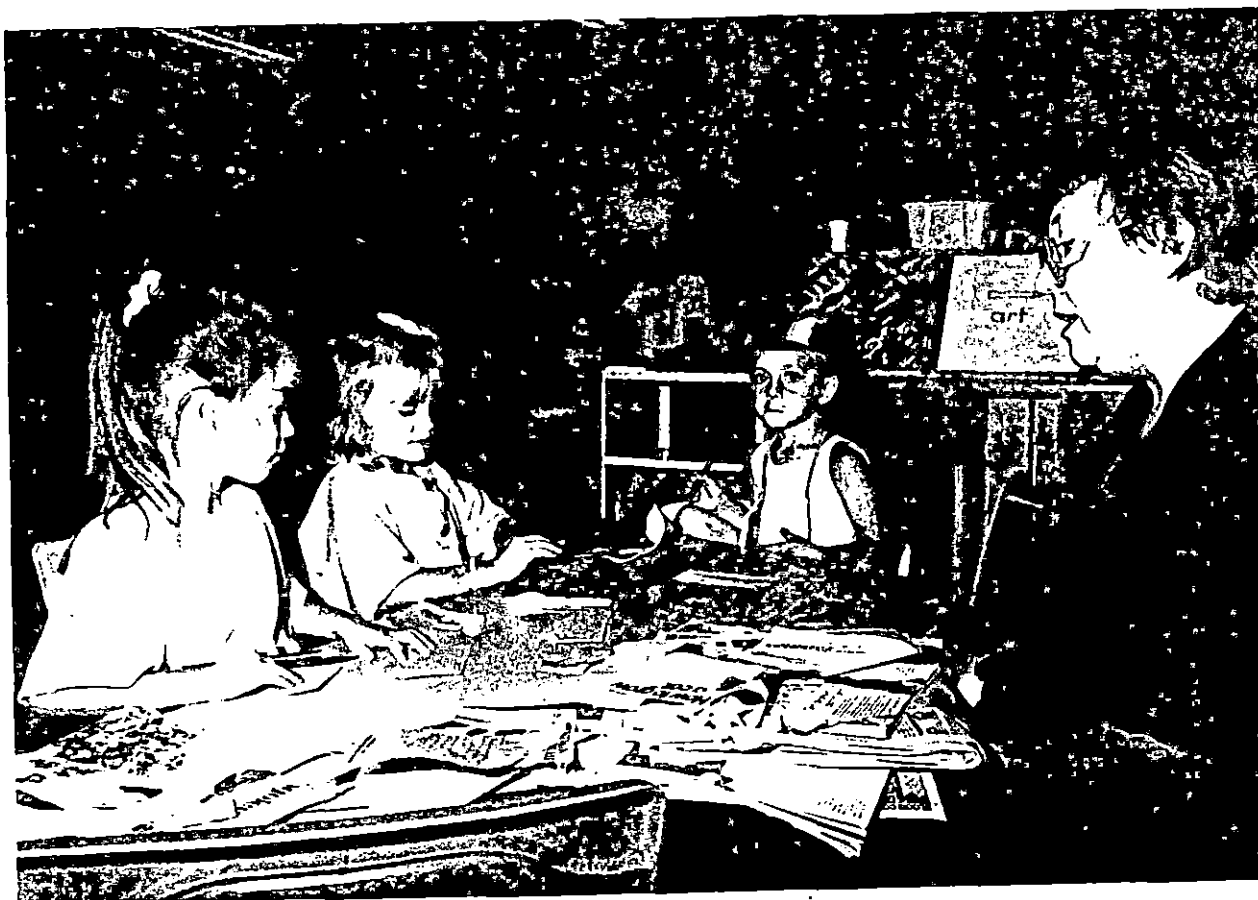

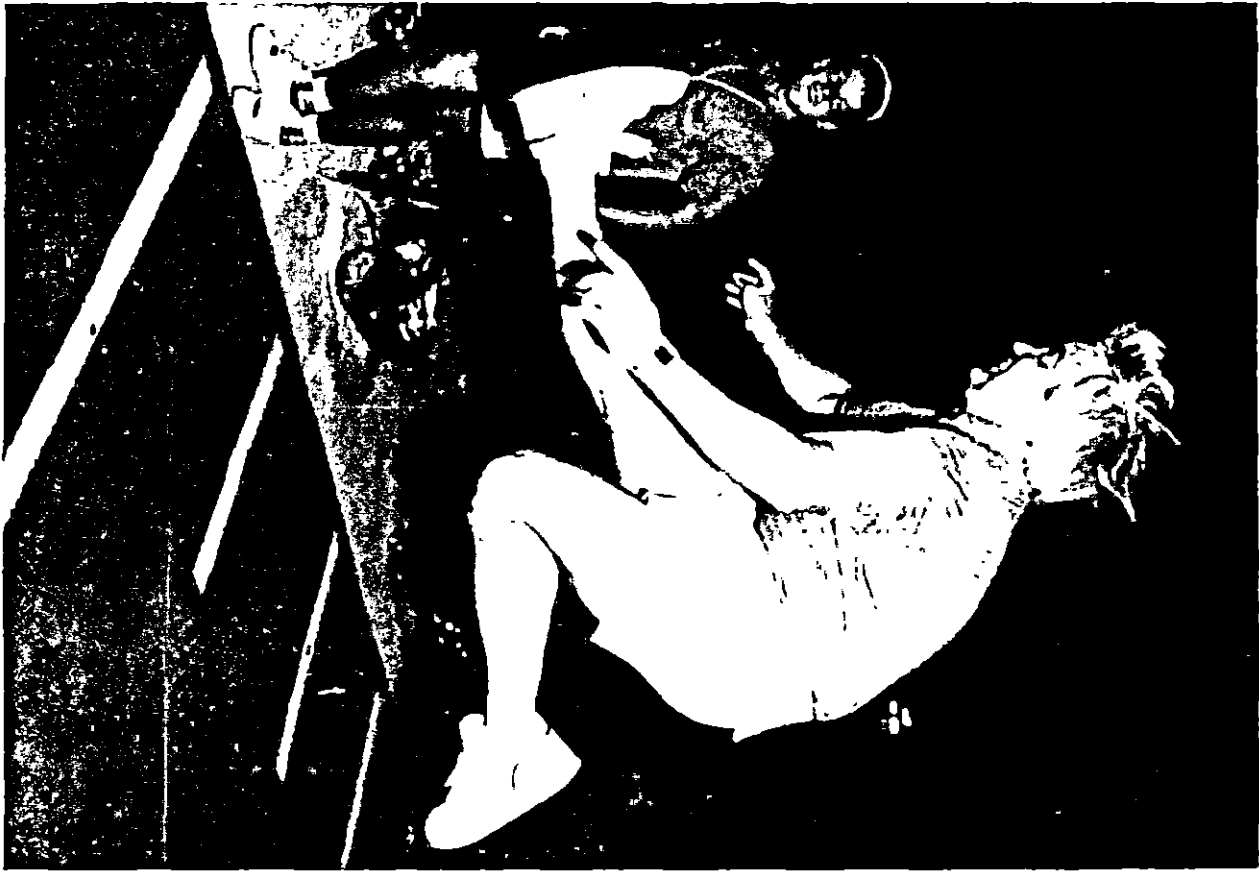

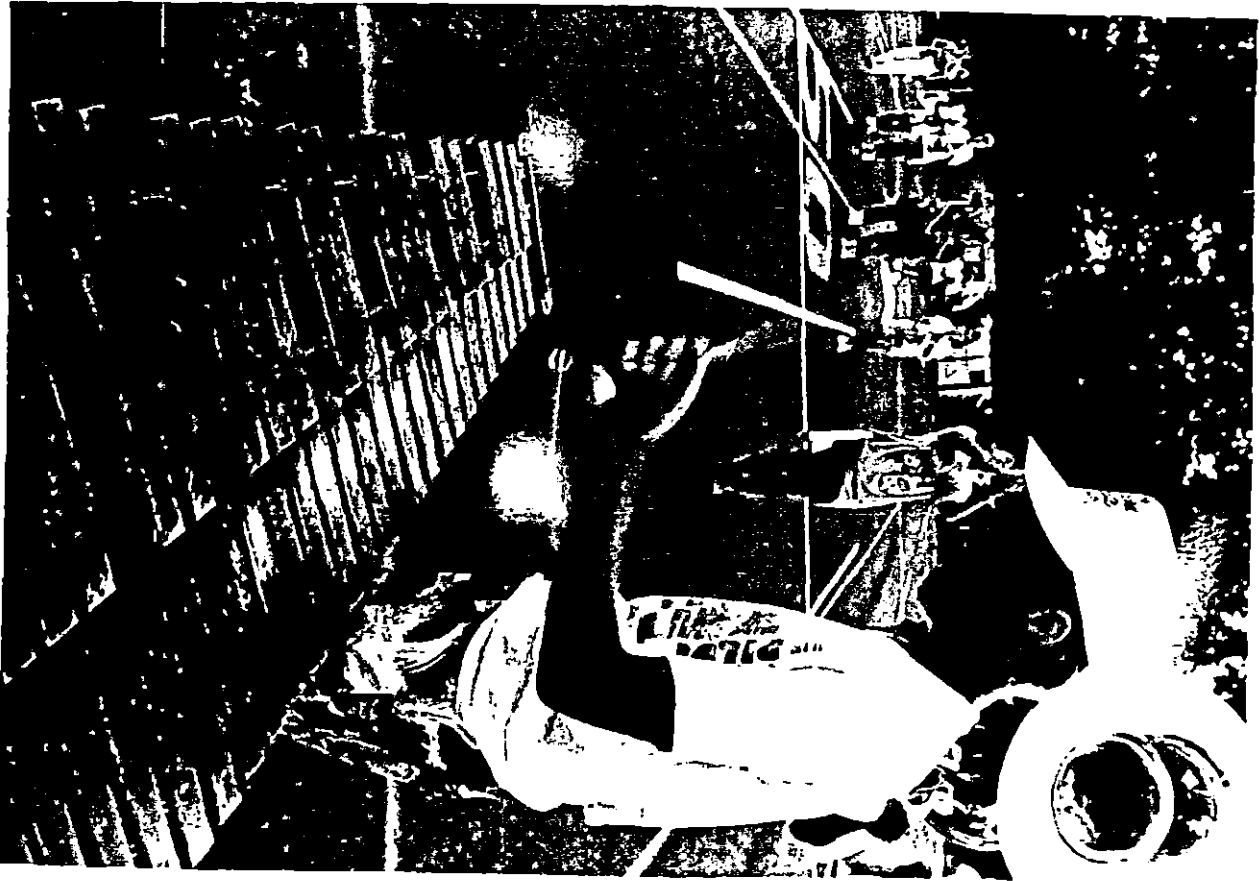

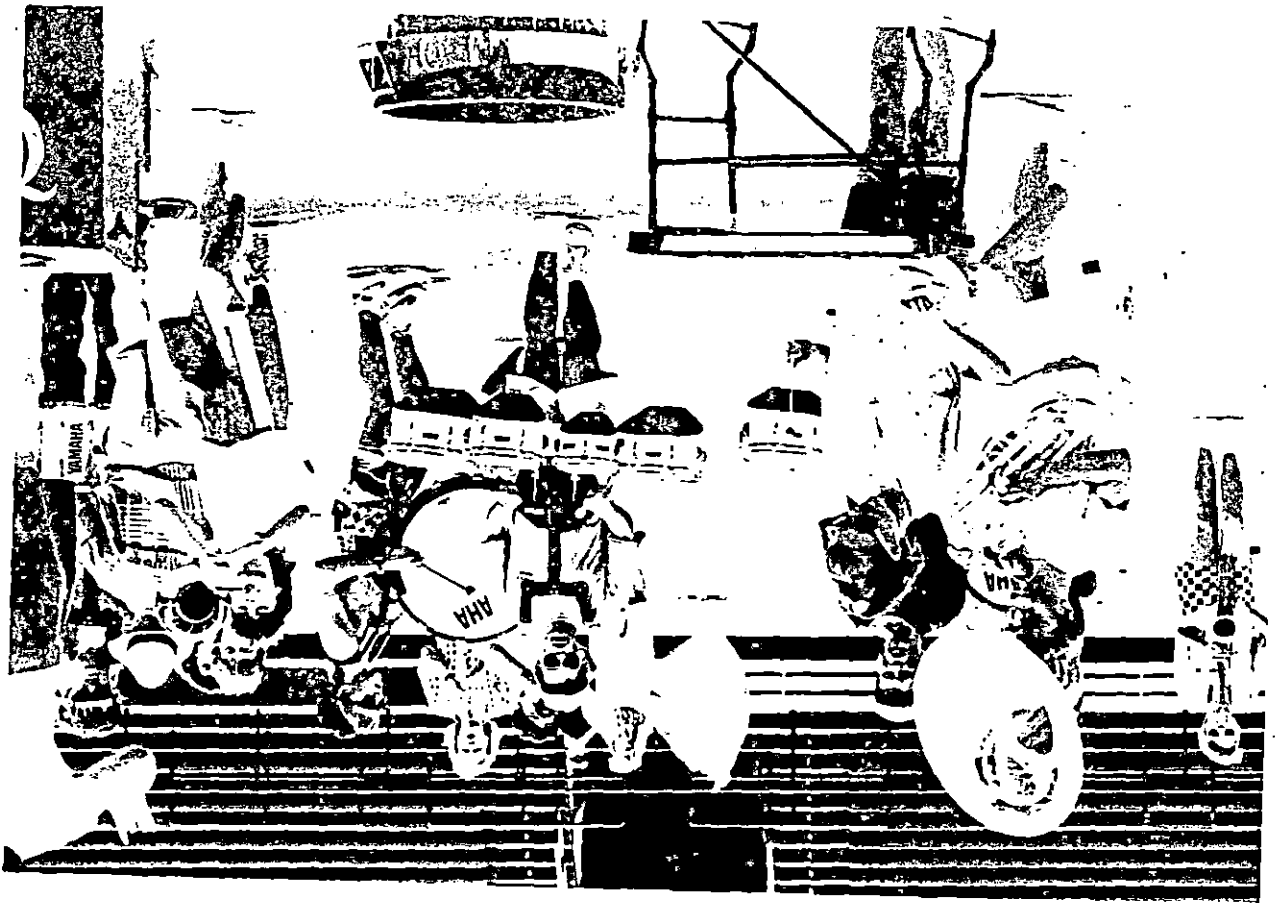

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Enrollment is now open for Morehead State University's Adult Wellness Program, which resumes this fall.

The individually-tailored fitness program will be offered at 4:30 p.m. and 5:30 p.m. on Monday, Wednesday and Thursday, beginning Wednesday, Sept. 6, at the Academic-Athletic Center.

Anyone interested in participating may register by calling Dr. Brown beginning Monday, Sept. 21, at 783-2120. Dr. Brown also will assist in making appointments for medical and physical evaluations.

WEST LIBERTY, Ky.--The MSU-Morgan Center in West Liberty is accepting applications for its Correctional Officer Pre-Employment/Work Maturity Training Program now through Sept. 15.

There are 30 positions available and the screening process is scheduled to begin on Sept. 25, according to Jonell Tobin, coordinator of the Center.

"It is our hope to prepare trainees to be competitive for correctional officers within the state and especially at the Eastern Kentucky Correctional Complex in Morgan County," Tobin said.

The program is free to qualified residents of Breathitt, Elliott, Johnson, Lawrence, Magoffin, Menifee, Morgan, and Wolfe Counties who are undereducated and unemployed, according to Tobin. 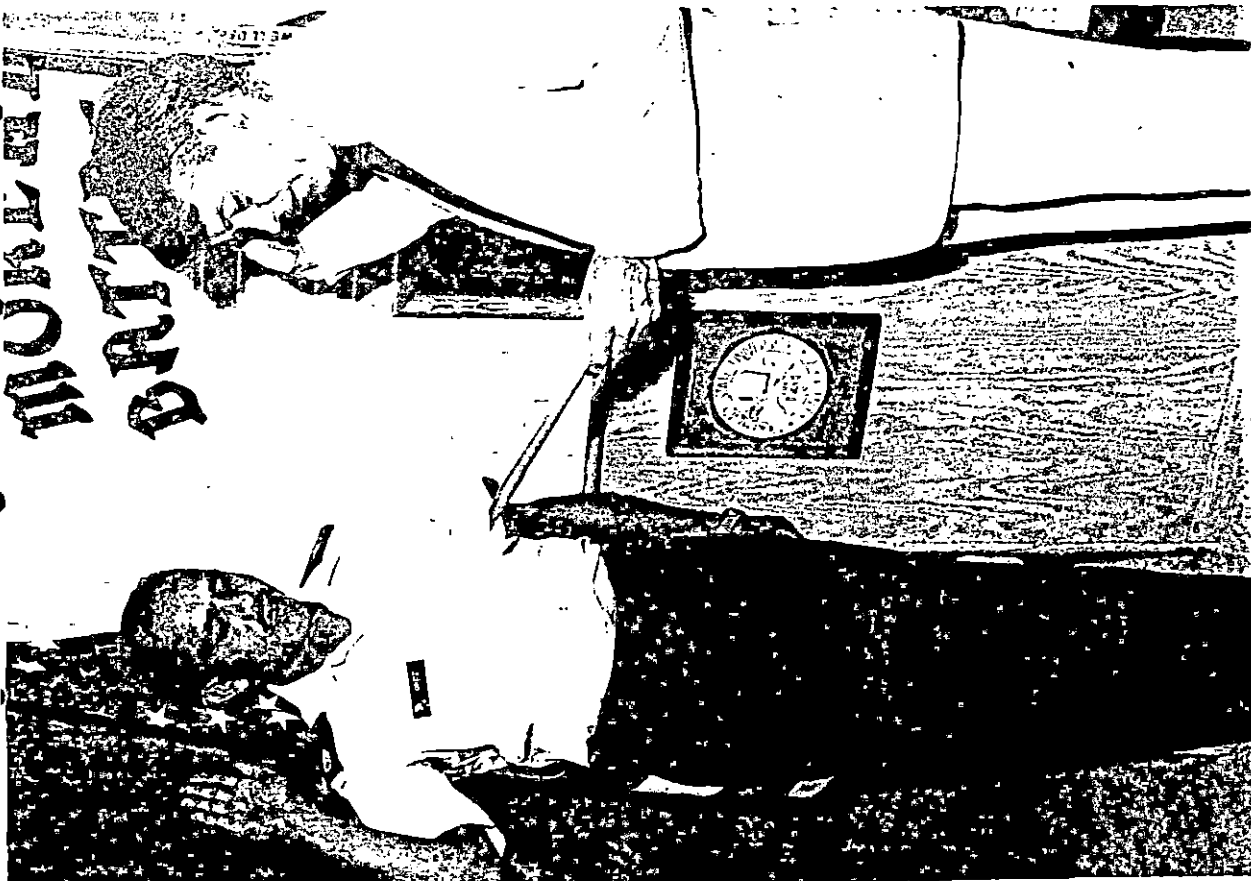

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FIELDS HALL

Opening in 1927, Fields Hall served as a residence hall, housing 144 women. It was closed as a residence hall in 1983, but housed the Office of Technical Services on the ground floor.

The \$3 million renovation project includes the removal of asbestos-containing materials (completed earlier this summer by ARC, Inc.); refurbishing of exterior design; redesign and refurbishment of interior; replacement of HVAC, electrical and plumbing systems, and upgrading to meet safety and handicap access code requirements.

Design plans and specifications were developed by WMB Engineers, Inc., of Lexington. The interior has been redesigned to offer modern cluster living areas. Each living area will include a common bathroom area, laundry facilities, kitchen and lounge area. In addition to living areas on the first floor, there will be a lobby, a study room and recreational areas. When completed the residence hall will have the capability of housing from 170 to 200 students.

Contractor for the project is Eubank & Steele of Lexington.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--When Alex Dunlap Conyers earned his Master of Business Administration degree from the University of Kentucky in 1958, his plans did not include a teaching career.

In July, after more than three decades in the classroom at Morehead State University, the once-reluctant educator retired from full-time teaching without regrets for getting sidetracked into teaching.

"It was a good choice," Conyers said as he reflected on those early days.

Conyers actually was more interested in the employment opportunities in securities, insurance or with the state's finance offices, but his M.B.A. program director, Dr. Ralph Pickett, had a former neighbor with a problem.

Dr. Pickett's friend was president of a small school in Eastern Kentucky, Morehead State College, and he had a vacancy in what was then the Commerce Department.

Urged by his mentor to at least visit the campus, Conyers found himself impressed by Dr. Adron Doran, and his secretary, the late Anna Carter, as well as by the the friendliness of the community.

"I just sort of felt it would be a good place to come and live," the associate professor of finance said. Dr. Doran, even today, according to Conyers, still reminds him of his initial reluctance to enter the teaching profession and kids him about having stayed so long while making up his mind.

While the campus has faced tremendous enrollment growth in the last half of the 1980's, Conyers experienced the tremendous growth surge of the 1960's, watching enrollment climb from 1,824 in 1958 to 6,262 students 10 years later and peaking in 1978 at 7,676.

"While we have sudden growth now, back then it was steady," Conyers noted. "We just added a couple of chairs to the classroom each year, although we had a desperate need for housing on campus and in the community even then," he said as the University prepares for a record-shattering enrollment this fall.

MSU's senior faculty member at the time of his retirement, Conyers was one of 60 full-time faculty members campuswide when he came here and now the School of Business and Economics alone has 30 faculty members.

In those early days, he recalled, faculty meetings were held twice a month and attendance was taken. Students didn't have the luxury of adding machines and pocket calculators on which to work their problems. "We all did it by hand back then and today's students think they are overworked," said Conyers, who will teach part-time during the 1989-90 school year.

Conyers didn't limit his student contact to the classroom, but also was adviser for the campus Commerce Club, helping it receive a national charter as Phi Beta Lambda. He and his wife sponsored the Disciple Student Fellowship, having a meal for the students on Sunday evenings. Over the years, Conyers served on just about every University standing committee, except perhaps Student Life.

Conyers not only has observed the growth of MSU's campus from a handful of buildings centrally-located to more than 50 major structures across a 500-acre main campus, but the growth of Morehead and the surrounding area as well.

"We are truly blessed as Morehead today serves as a regional center for health care; it's becoming a regional shopping center and is the focal point for educational opportunities," Conyers said. "With the beauty of nature all around, it has all the ingredients of a great community."

And he should know, because his willingness to be involved with the community was instrumental in that growth. While focusing much of his energies on being as well prepared as possible to prepare his students for roles in the world of business, including the international marketplace, Conyers also has given much of his life to community service, helping to shape the region's quality of life.

"That's the kind of person Alex Conyers is," said MSU President C. Nelson Grote, who during his previous tenure at MSU was dean of the College of Applied Sciences and Technology where the business courses were housed.

"He not only dedicates himself to being the best teacher he can be, but he has always channeled his remaining time and energy into making the community a better place for all of us," the president said. "His coming to MSU was not only a plus for the campus, but for the region as well."

Currently president of the Morehead-Rowan County Chamber of Commerce, Conyers was an organizer of the Morehead National Bank and still serves on its board of directors. Active in the Kiwanis Club, he is a former president and treasurer.

Concern for the quality of the region's health care led to his involvement with the first fund drive held by St. Claire Medical Center to build its facilities in the early 1960s. "I've been involved with every drive since then to expand those original facilities," Conyers said. He also is an active volunteer with the medical center as well as serving in its pastoral care department while wearing one other hat, that of a lay minister with the Christian Church.

While Conyers misses the intimacy of the small rural college community where he and his bride, the former Edith Prewitt of Winchester, began their life together, he finds it challenging to teach in today's "education explosion." He has kept abreast of the latest in his field by constant reading.

A native of Grant County, Conyers learned his work ethic growing up on the family farm in Williamstown. At age 13, he went to work at a retail store, selling furniture and clothing and at age 16 began working at a restaurant, where he worked every break and for eight summers. "My work experiences enriched my teaching," he noted.

Earning his high school diploma from Kentucky Military Institute in Lyndon, he received his bachelor's degree from UK and served in the Army for two years, obtaining the rank of sergeant, before entering graduate school.

"I've worked all my life; it's engrained in me," said Conyers. In fact after teaching for 31 years, Conyers is shopping around for "a career change" and is thinking about starting his own business.

He has a few dreams for MSU and for Rowan County. "I'd like to see the University become nationally recognized for being outstanding in some specific field--for something we can do better than anyone else," he said.

Continued economic growth for the Morehead area, further development of recreational opportunities and realization of the potential of Kentucky's hardwood industry are his hopes for the region's future. "I'd like to see Morehead and Rowan County double in population," he said.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Morehead State University has received approval to add Methodist Hospital of Kentucky in Pikeville to the clinical education sites for its Radiologic Technology Program, bringing the total number of clinical centers to 11.

Recognition of the Methodist Hospital as a teaching affiliate by the Joint Review Committee on Education in Radiologic Technology, will enable the University to accept 16 additional students into the program.

"Until now we were limited to 96 students, equally divided between the first and second year classes," explained Rae P. Smith, RT Program coordinator.

"With a shortage of qualified radiologic technologists not only in our region but nationwide as well, approval of a new clinical center and the resulting enrollment increase is very welcome news," Smith said.

Students in the 24-month long program spend half their time in the classroom and the remainder gaining "hands-on" experience at three different hospital affiliates.

Other clinical education centers affiliated with MSU's associate degree program include: Hazard Appalachian Regional Hospital; Pattie A. Clay Hospital, Richmond; Ephraim McDowell Medical Center, Danville; Highlands Regional Hospital, Prestonsburg; Humana Hospital-Lake Cumberland, Somerset; Mary Chiles Hospital, Mt. MOREHEAD, Ky.--Faculty members returning to Morehead State University's campus for a new academic year received some very welcome news on Friday.

Speaking to faculty and staff members at the traditional opening assembly, MSU President C. Nelson Grote announced that he had created a three quarter million dollar fund specifically for instructional equipment purchases in 1989-90.

MSU has a \$3.5 million request for instructional equipment in its 1990-92 capital expenditures proposal which Dr. Grote said he is optimistic will be funded. "But we can't wait until July 1990," he told his listeners. "Our immediate need is too great."

Some of the new money is already budgeted within the academic departments, but more than \$500,000 will be transferred from the University fund balance and from new student growth revenues. The \$300,000 from the fund balance will be nonrecurring money, but the growth revenue will be recurring funds which will be applied next year to improve faculty salaries, the president explained.

Dr. Grote said his decision to make this commitment now resulted from a combination of meetings with deans, faculty and staff and visits to classrooms and laboratories. "It is apparent that we have urgent equipment needs in our academic programs," he said.

Among the areas targeted for equipment infusions are allied health and nursing, veterinary technology, home economics, and the new engineering technology degree program. Also scheduled to be purchased are new microprocessors for the Department of Psychology, Department of Sociology, Social Work and Corrections and the School of Business and Economics.

Equipment problems in radio-television and journalism will be addressed, including the purchase of desktop publishing equipment for a new journalism laboratory. The Department of Music's growing marching band program will receive assistance. In addition, Dr. Grote gave his assurance that the IBM computer laboratory currently on loan in Lappin Hall would become permanent.

"There is much more to accomplish," the president said. "With additional state general revenue fund support for equipment in 1990-92 we will be able to make major strides in equipping MSU for the future."

The president also announced that improvement of faculty and staff salaries would have top priority in preparing the 1990-92 biennium budget request.

"Ideally most of the money would come from increased state appropriations, but what is not available from the state will be reallocated internally," he said.

"To do this," he warned, "there are some tough choices to make. The old adage--'You can't have your cake and eat it, too'--certainly applies here." To reallocate resources to make funds available to improve faculty and staff salaries, "there is little doubt that we will have to reduce support in several areas," he said.

Systems to emphasize accountability and effectiveness will be examined. "We need to work together to develop an equitable and fair program of evaluation that rewards productivity and achievement. Our goal is to have in place a system of performance-based compensation by 1990-91," Dr. Grote said.

Highlighting achievements during the past year, President Grote cited increases in the number of honor students and Governor Scholars enrolling at MSU; increases in private giving, growth in active alumni and increases in funding for faculty/staff development and special money for faculty research. He noted that the Office of Research, Grants and Contracts had just reported that last year's external funding had reached an all-time high. The figure was in excess of \$3.5 million.

In his closing remarks, the president told the faculty and staff members that they should "feel good that there are many new and exciting things happening at Morehead State University. We have more students, but better prepared students. Tom Meredith (Western Kentucky University's president) isn't getting all of the best students from Eastern Kentucky," he said, referring to Meredith's claim statement that Western was getting the state's best students.

"What we have is an intellectual climate which will academically challenge our students and each of us," he said, adding that he looked forward to working with them to advance those challenges and move with MSU into the 21st Century.

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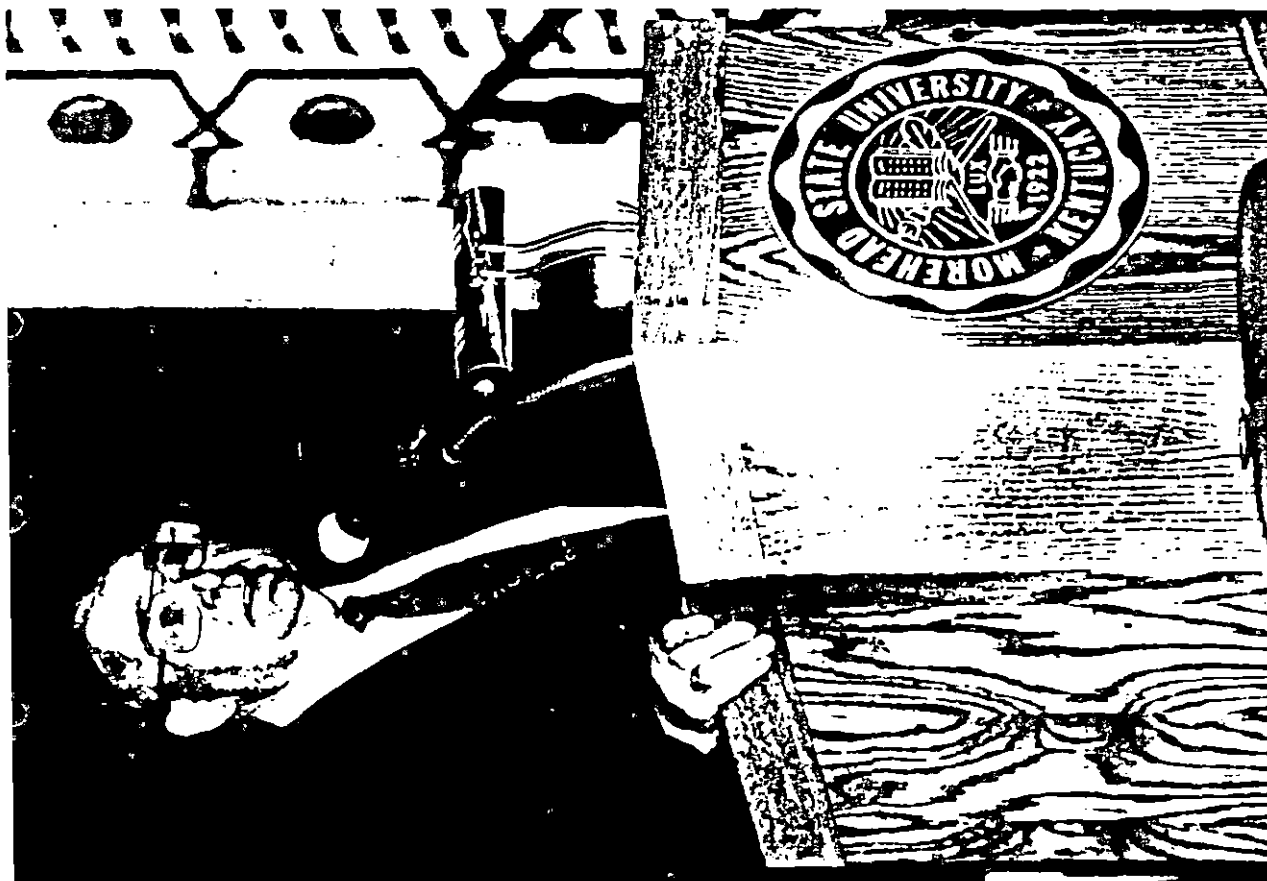

MOREHEAD, Ky.--For many, old pieces of bronze or steel are items to be discarded, but this is not the case for Stephanie and Christopher McDavid of Ashland.

From those "found objects," they have produced the works which make up the sculpture exhibit on display now through Sept. 23 in the main gallery, Claypool-Young Art Building on the Morehead State University campus.

Tom Sternal, Department of Art chair, described this exhibit as one of the best the University has sponsored in the last five years. "We have received a strong, positive reaction from the students, faculty and the townspeople who have visited the gallery," he said. "With their use of metal, the McDavids have created a different approach not possible with other materials."

The works are described as "showing motion", according to Stephanie. While the movement may be implied or real--such as the motorized pieces--the sculptors have produced intricate detail from steel, bronze, aluminum and plexiglass.

In discussing the working mechanisms, Christopher described that it is sometimes necessary to sacrifice the form of a sculpture to make the motors work properly.

The couple met while attending the University of Kentucky where they received undergraduate degrees. Their educational quest continued to Florida State University where they graduated with MFA's earlier this year. Both currently are lecturers in art at MSU.

The MSU exhibit features the remaining works from their thesis show at FSU and the concept of each work is an original idea which is then personally carried through to completion.
