BLACKS IN EDUCATION SUPPLEMENT

MOREHEAD, Ky.--"WE ARE FAMILY." That statement is more than a slogan for Morehead State University's Office of Minority Student Affairs, it is a philosophy.

"Family--that's what it's all about," said Jerry Gore, MSU's Minority Student Affairs director. "In all our activities--from recruitment to campus life--we try to emphasize the family concept," he said. "At Morehead State we are very proud that we've maintained that family atmosphere."

It is an attitude that must be considered successful as the University has seen consistent growth in the number of black students enrolled at the campus. In 1987, the black student population was only 177, but records for Fall 1989 show 266 black students.

Gore and Peggy Overly, minority student recruiter, have developed a team of students who go with them into the high schools and inner-city areas on recruitment trips. Approximately 25 students are involved as volunteers this year.

"Students recruit students," Gore said. "They can tell their peers what experiences await on a college campus. They can tell those high school students what a college education is going to mean, because they are here themselves."

"Peer recruitment is very important, because the majority of black students at MSU and her sister institutions are first generation college students," Gore said.

The University recognizes this and offers additional incentives with special minority scholarship awards beyond the other institutional scholarship packages," he added.

"We stress involvement in all campus activities and offer the young black student every opportunity to participate in the family," he continued.

The 51-member Black Gospel Ensemble which performs around the state not only serves as an extracurricular outlet for the students, but also as another recruitment tool. "They are our good will ambassadors," Gore said, noting that the ensemble's appearances are not limited to black audiences.

The first issue of a special newsletter, "Minority Affairs Perspective," is due to be published soon. A quarterly student-written publication, it will be distributed to prospective students, alumni, current students, MSU administrators and members of the Board of Regents.

"Although we haven't used it for a few years, it is another way of keeping the family informed on what we are doing at MSU," Gore said.

Now in its fifth year is MSU's Big Brother Big Sister program which is currently coordinated by Renee Warfield, Louisville graduate student.

Thirty Big Brothers and Sisters this year are working as peer counselors with 38 Little Brothers and Sisters, who for the most part are freshmen needing a little help in making the transition to college, according to Warfield.

"They provide academic and social support throughout the year," she explained. The big brothers/big sisters are required to have a minimum of a 2.3 grade point average.

Activities during the year include an opening of school reception dance where big brothers and sisters pinned "We Are Family" buttons on their little siblings; movie nights; a Thanksgiving can dance with nonperishable food items donated to community foodbasket efforts; field trips including one to the Dr. Martin Luther King Cultural Center in Lexington; a pre-finals study session and an academic awards program honoring the Big and Little Brother and Sister teams with the highest combined grade point averages.

The Minority Student Affairs Office itself is gathering point for the family, according to Gore, who estimated that on an average day 30 to 40 students stop by just to talk. "It is a real hub of activity," he said. "We keep a video tape library there and a number of books ranging from career information to motivational publications."

One activity that Gore believes to be unique to MSU is the University's Cross Cultural Center, a house on campus which serves as a meeting place for both international and black students. "Many campuses have international houses and separate minority centers, but our Cross Cultural Center merges the two, offering the students exposure to other cultures," he said.

MSU also is in the second year of its model program, the Minority Teacher Education Program, designed to encourage young blacks to become teachers. Funded by the Council on Higher Education and the state Department of Education, it is conducted as a partnership between the public schools, primarily with Jefferson and Fayette county schools.

During the 1988-89 academic year 20 minority students from Louisville and Lexington enrolled in the program as freshmen and another 20 were to be admitted this fall.

Morehead State is seeking additional funding for the program in its 1990-92 Operating Appropriation Request to expand the enrollment.

While Gore and his associates emphasize the need for black students to be involved in all aspects of campus life, including student government, there are activities offered specifically for the black student. Again, Gore said, they help promote a sense of family. MSU has two traditionally black Greek sororities, three fraternities and a fourth in the process of colonizing, as well as a co-ed social organization, The Brotherhood, and a group for Women, LaDies.

In addition, the University brings outstanding blacks to the campus as speakers to help promote a sense of family heritage and maintains a Black Scholar in Residence program which brought Dr. Henry Ponder, the president of Fisk University, to campus. "But we don't only bring leaders of Dr. Ponder's stature to meet with the student, but also our own alumni who have achieved distinction in their chosen field," Gore noted.

Morehead State has a number of distinguished black alumni, including the Peabody Award-winning Atlanta television newsman Vic Carter, U.S. Navy Cmdr. Langston Smith, and Dr. Betty Dickerson, research analyst with Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc.

"While it's important to bring the Yolanda Kings, the Attallah Shabazs or the Dr. Na'im Akbars to campus, it is equally important to bring back former students like Joseph Hatim Hamer, now associated with the minority recruitment program of the National Association of Broadcasters," Gore explained.

"They are our own family members, who help Morehead State make the black experience here a family experience," he said.

"Morehead State University has a commitment to providing a quality education to all its students," said MSU President C. Nelson Grote. "But we believe it is also important to be sensitive to the special needs of our minority students. We want their lives to be enriched as much as possible as they pursue a course of study at Morehead State," he continued.

LEXINGTON, Ky.--Issues facing all levels of education in Kentucky will be the focus of a live broadcast on Kentucky Educational Television network stations and on many Kentucky Network radio stations at 9 p.m. Wednesday, Oct. 18.

MOREHEAD, Ky.-Based on the current time table for the steam tunnel renovations, Morehead State University's campus buildings will have heat between Oct. 19 and 26.

- The insulation work on the pipes is scheduled for completion between Oct. 15 and 22, according to Jim Wells, physical facilities coordinator.

"Once the insulation work is finished, we can fire up the boilers and begin producing steam," Wells said. "However, the steam must travel through sections of unrepaired lines at a slower rate than in the new section. That means it will take roughly two to four days to move the steam up through the campus," he explained.

Wells noted that the original completion date was Oct. 1, but delays in the asbestos abatement were incurred by the contractor. "The state did assess the contractor a \$2,400 penalty," Wells said.

Working on the section of the steam tunnel from the Power Plant to the campus Switchgear House A, Blau Mechanical of Covington has completed the pipe installation and is in the process of completing insulation, electrical wiring, the addition of sump pumps to eliminate ground water and new man-hole covers.

In other construction-related matters, asbestos abatement work has been completed on five campus facilities and rescheduled for another. Final inspection is scheduled Oct. 12 for the abatement work at the Power Plant, Breckinridge Hall, Jayne Stadium, Wetherby Gym and Baird Music Hall.

Delays incurred by the contractor, Romac, Inc., of Louisville, resulted in holding off the Alumni Tower project until the end of spring semester, according to Wells. Work there has been rescheduled for May 14-June 2, when the residence hall will be vacant.

"Our other alternative would have been to shut down the cafeteria and the building's air conditioning during the first three weeks of school," Wells said. "We did not think that would be workable."

Also the schedule for power outages while PCB-contaminated electrical transformers are replaced has been updated. The work will be done by General Electric of Cincinnati as follows:

Oct. 16-17, Power Plant; Nov. 24-25, Breckinridge Hall and Wetherby Gym; Dec. 17, Wilson and Regents Halls; Dec. 18, Cooper Hall; Dec. 19, Normal and Cartmell Halls; Dec. 22 Lappin Hall; Dec. 27, Nunn Hall and Laughlin Health Building; Dec. 28, West Mignon and Mignon Halls; Dec. 29, Reed Hall, Lloyd Cassity Building and Combs Building, and Jan. 2, East Mignon and Mignon Tower.

"The outages have been planned during the holidays to avoid as much disruption to the campus as possible," Wells said. He urged anyone with a concern about the scheduled outages to contact him at extension 2066.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---One of the world's top chamber ensembles, the Bach Ensemble with director Joshua Rifkin, will appear in concert at Morehead State University on Friday, Oct. 27, at 8 p.m. in Duncan Recital Hall as part of the 1989-90 Arts in Morehead (AIM) series.

Admission will be by season ticket or by single event tickets which may be purchased at the door for \$5 for adults and \$2.50 for non-MSU students age 18 and younger. MSU students with valid I.D. cards will be admitted free.

Acclaimed by music critics in the United States and Europe, the ensemble performs works by its namesake and other Baroque masters on historically accurate instruments--strings in the 18th Century disposition with period bows and winds copied from museum originals.

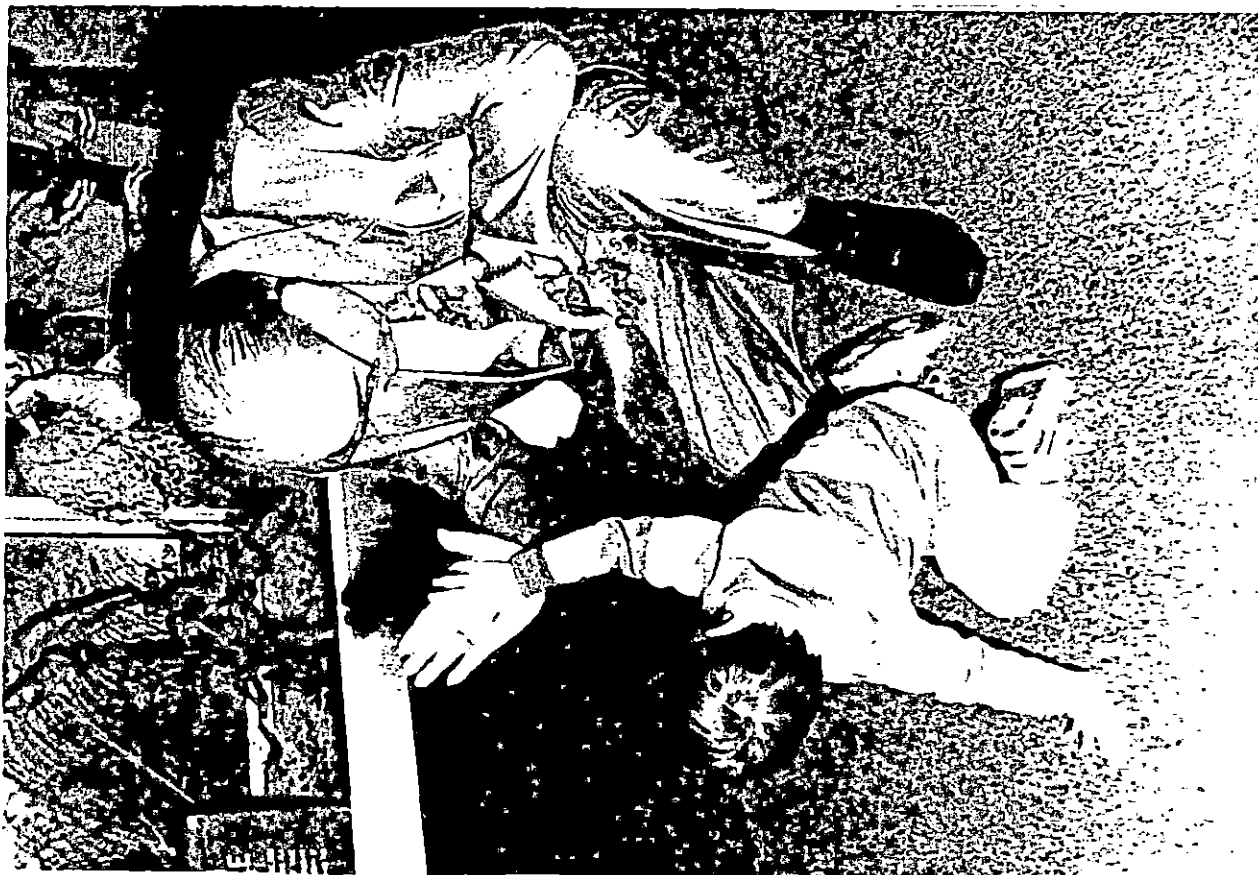

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Morehead State University will start the new year with a new degree program to help the people in Eastern Kentucky.

The Council on Higher Education has approved an Associate of Applied Science in Respiratory Therapy Degree program which will be implemented in January when MSU begins its spring semester.

The program, the only one of its kind in Eastern Kentucky, will be administered through MSU's Department of Nursing and Allied Health Sciences in the College of Applied Sciences and Technology in cooperation with the Rowan State Vocational/Technical School's Respiratory Therapy Technician Program.

MSU will provide general education and advanced respiratory therapy courses, while RSVTS will offer the respiratory therapy courses in its current technician program.

The people in the region have shown the need for this type of program, said Dr. Charles M. Derrickson, dean of the college. "Utilizing many of the resources already available through the vocational/technical school, we are able to offer this degree program to enhance the region's health care delivery system. We are most appreciative of the support given by the school, and especially the help of Clifford Wells, the director of Region 9."

According to statistical information obtained from the Department of Labor and the Social Security Administration, the 1980 U.S. Census recorded the incidence of respiratory disease in Eastern Kentucky is 35 times greater than the national average, and four times greater than the Kentucky average.

"Most of the practicing therapists in the area have received their training on the job," Dr. Derrickson said. "Only 10 percent of these are certified or registered by the National Board of Respiratory Care."

Results of a 1988 survey of MSU's 22-county service region, indicated that 13 positions were filled with registered therapists while 81 were filled by non-registered therapists and seven positions were vacant.

Ten students will be accepted into the program at its inception according to the dean. "In this area, there is a demand for trained personnel in the respiratory therapy field," he said. "All the students who graduate will be looking at numerous job opportunities."

MSU joins four other colleges in the state who have this type of program. An associate degree is available at Jefferson Community College in Louisville, Lexington Community College, and Madisonville Community College. The University of Louisville has a two-year and a four-year degree program. During 1987-88, a combined total of 20 students graduated from the four schools.

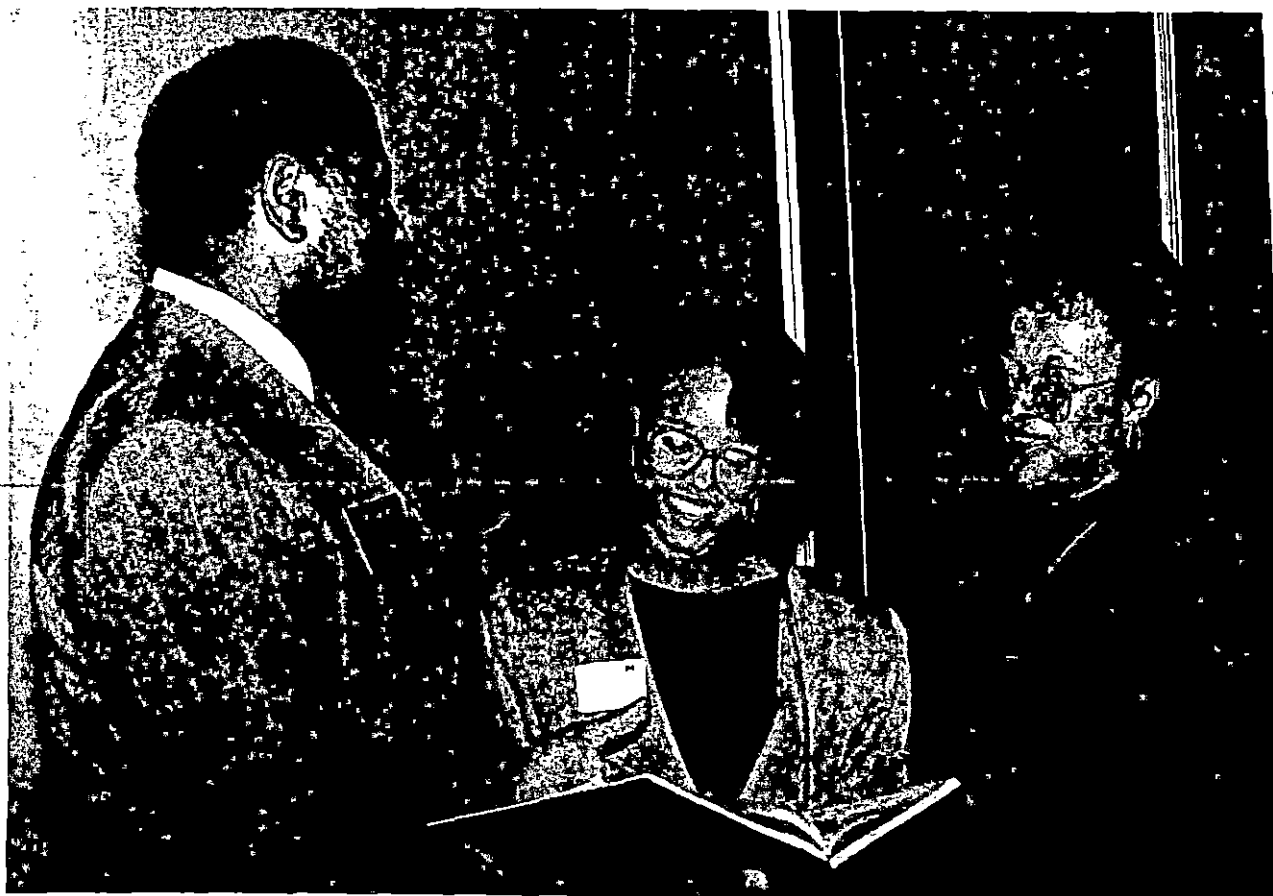

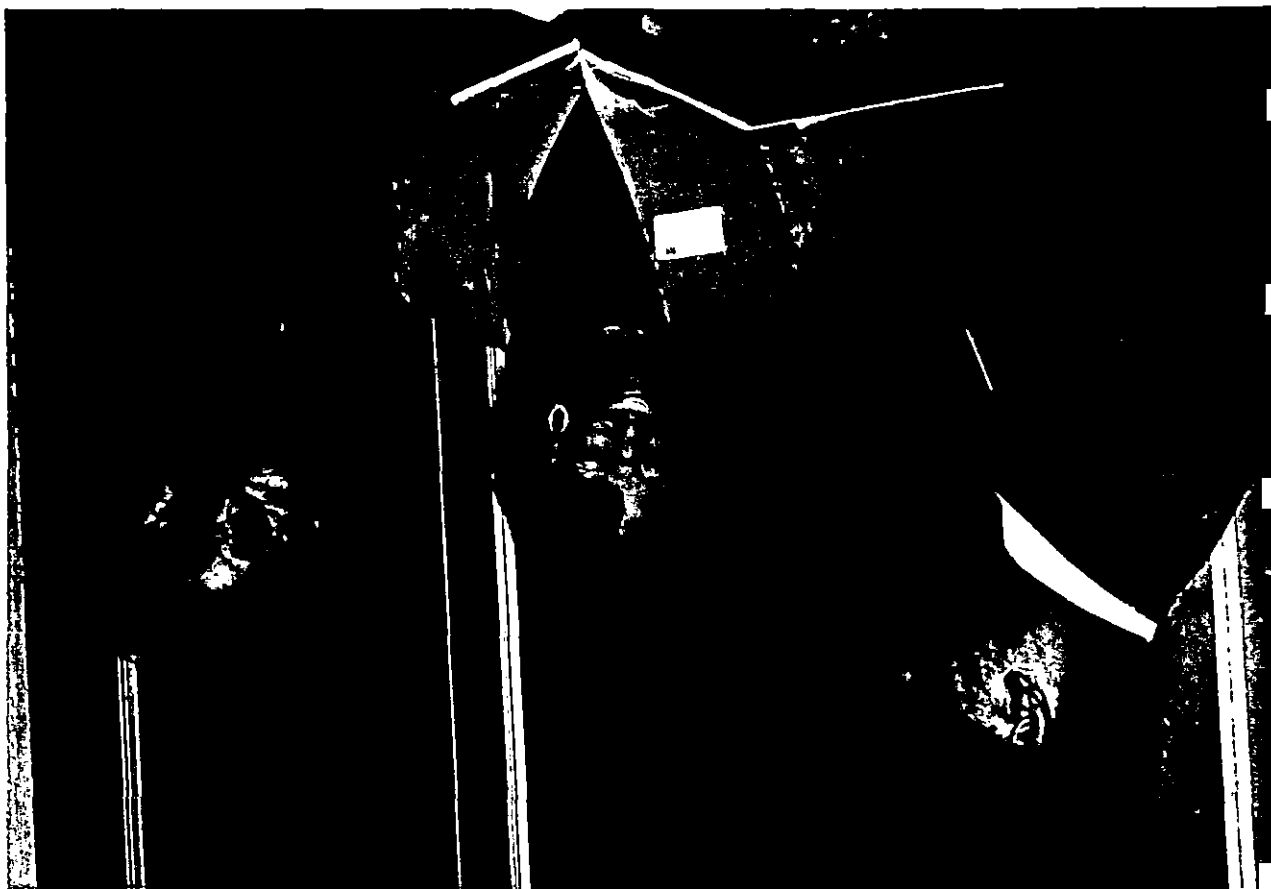

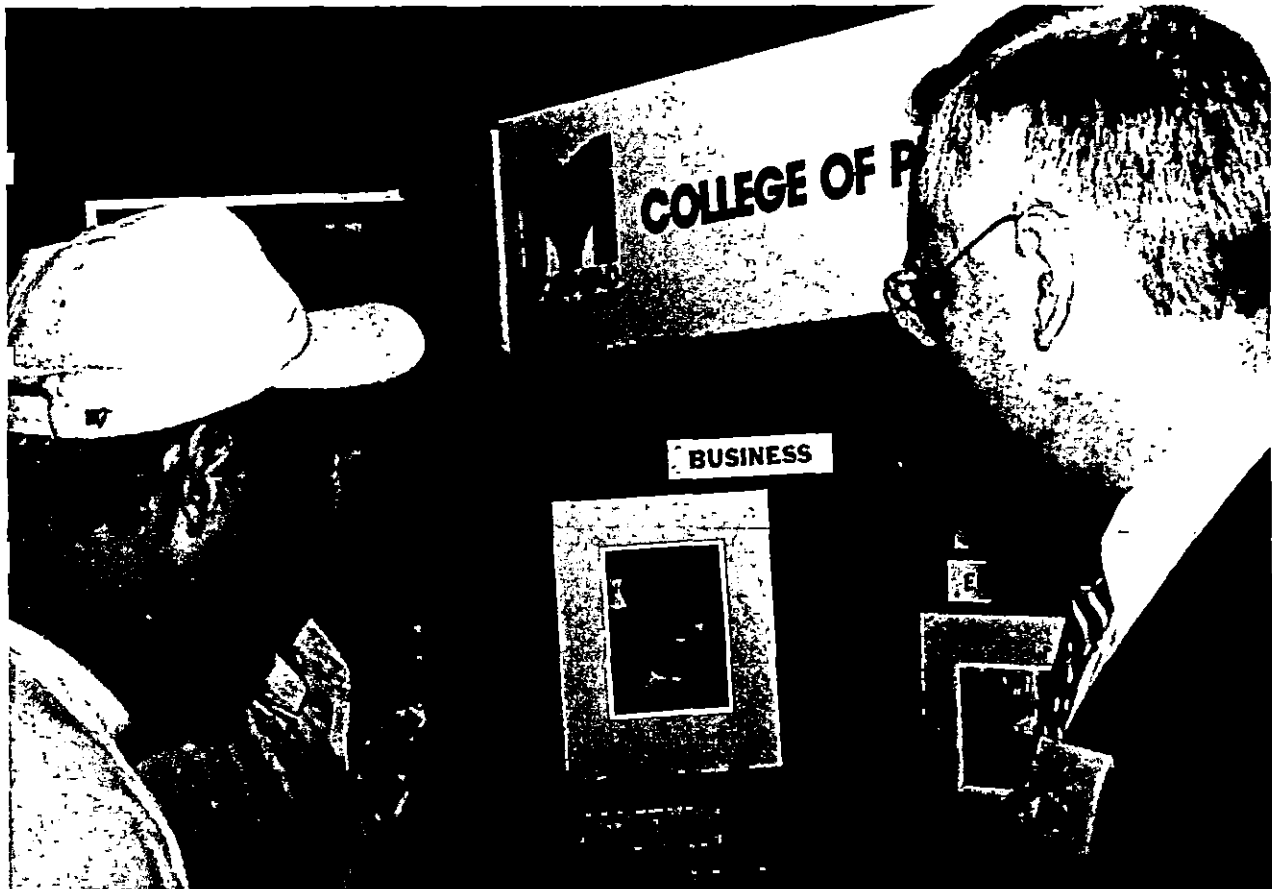

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Professional storyteller Jon Spelman brings his art to Morehead State University's Button Auditorium at 8 p.m. Thursday, Nov. 9, as part of the Arts in Morehead (AIM) series.

In a program entitled "War Stories: Nam," Spelman weaves tales of the war in Vietnam as seen through the eyes of participants--oral histories of American soldiers and nurses who served in Southeast Asia.

Admission will be by season ticket to the AIM series or single event tickets which may be purchased at the door for \$5 for adults and \$2.50 for non-MSU students age 18 and younger. MSU students with valid I.D. cards will be admitted free.

A non-vet, Spelman frames his evening's work with how he got out of going to war, but tells the stories of those who did as though he too had been there.

A Los Angeles Times critic described him as a "world class" storyteller and suggested his style was reminiscent of that of Garrison Keillor and Robin Williams.

A two-time Emmy Award-winner for his weekly television program, "Three Stories Tall," which aired over WRC/NBC, Spelman also is heard regularly over National Public Radio. He has appeared in festivals and theatres throughout Europe and the United States, including Louisville's Corn Island Storytelling Festival.

"By all standards, the evening promises to be one not to be forgotten for sometime," said Yvonne Baldwin, AIM program chairman. "Mr. Spelman brings a program that is both entertaining and provocative; however, the subject matter is tailored for an adult audience."
