MOREHEAD, Ky.--A variety of activities are planned on the Morehead State University campus to celebrate Black History Month during February.

"This is a special time when we focus on our heritage and make a special effort to join together as one," said Jerry Gore, director of MSU's Office of Minority Student Affairs who is coordinating the activities. "The programs are informative, enlightening and educational for all races."

All activities are sponsored by the Office of Minority Student Affairs in conjunction with various student organizations. They are free and open to the public.

A Mock Kwanzaa, coordinated by the Black Student Coalition, will kick off the campus celebration, Feb. 4-10. "The week is designed for reaffirmation of goals, personal objectives and looking at one's self--taking special note of strengths and weaknesses," said Dionne Franklin, president of the Black Student Coalition who is coordinating the event. "More than one million people celebrate this traditional African holiday each year," she said.

While Kwanzaa is usually celebrated between Dec. 26-Jan. 1, Franklin said she is glad the custom is making its first appearance on the MSU campus. "Each day of the week stands for striving for something different," the Dayton, Ohio, junior noted. "First it's unity, then self-determination, and collective economics, followed by cooperative responsibility, creativity, purpose and faith," she said.

The agenda for the week includes:

On Feb. 4, Don C. Offutt, deputy commissioner with the Department of Community Services and Facilities in Frankfort, will speak at 7 p.m. in the Crager Room, Adron Doran University Center. His talk entitled "Umoja" (meaning unity) will center on the purpose of Kwanzaa and ways to observe the event.

A "Black History Quiz Bowl" will be held on Feb. 5 at the Cross Cultural House, beginning at 4:30 p.m. Franklin said that she hoped members of the University community will show their support on this day by wearing red, black or green--the colors of the coalition. At the conclusion of the Bowl, the participants and visitors will walk as a group to the Academic-Athletic Center to watch the basketball game between MSU's Eagles and Eastern Kentucky University's Colonels.

Sign-up day for the revitalization of a chapter of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) is set for Feb. 6. The organization has been inactive on the campus since the late 70s but Franklin believes the revitalized group will be planning activities by the fall semester. "This not only will add stability to the Black Student Coalition, but will put MSU in contact with a larger, better known organization," she said of the proposed chapter.

Events also include a "Lip-sinc" contest on Feb. 7 in Breckinridge Auditorium. Starting time is 7 p.m.

Phi Beta Sigma and the Black Student Coalition will sponsor the "African-American Poetry Spotlight" and a presentation by Frank Walker on Feb. 9 beginning at 7 p.m. in the Crager Room, ADUC. Director of the Martin Luther King Cultural Center at the University of Kentucky, Walker will discuss his African-American art which will be on display.

The week will culminate with a Black Worship Experience on Sunday, Feb. 11. Anthony Gaines, Cincinnati, Ohio, sophomore, will preside at the services which begin at 2:30 p.m. in Breckinridge Auditorium.

Additional highlights for the remainder of February include:

Dr. William Turner, associate professor of sociology at Winston-Salem State University in Winston Salem, N.C., and a former Berea College distinguished scholar, will lecture on "Blacks in Appalachia." The Harlan native will speak at 8 p.m. in Breckinridge Auditorium on Feb. 11.

"The Music of Scott Joplin" will be the topic of a lecture/recital by Dr. Addison Reed on Feb. 20. Dr. Reed, chair of the Department of Music at Northern Kentucky University, will talk at 8 p.m. in Duncan Recital Hall.

On Feb. 23, Tony West and the Imani Dancers from Columbus, Ohio, will perform at 7 p.m. in the Crager Room, ADUC. The following day, Feb. 24, the dancers will be in the Button Drill Room 10 a.m. to provide instruction in African dances to anyone wishing to learn.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Internationally acclaimed harpist Harvi Griffin will be heard in concert on Thursday, Feb. 15, at 8 p.m. in Duncan Recital Hall at Morehead State University.

The concert is part of the 1989-90 Arts in Morehead series, a joint effort of the University with the Morehead-Rowan County Arts Council.

Admission will be by AIM season ticket or by single event tickets which may be purchased at the door for \$5 by adults and \$2.50 by non-MSU students age 18 and younger. MSU students with valid I.D. cards will be admitted free.

One of the hottest performers on the concert circuit today, Griffin offers a diversified program with selections ranging from Bach and Brubeck to Continental and Calypso as well as from ageless to New Age.

The runner-up for the 1988 Campus Entertainer of the Year Award, Griffin began studying piano at age four and by the time he was 12 he also was playing various woodwind, string and other keyboard instruments.

His introduction to the harp came after acceptance into Cass Technical High School, Detroit, Mich., where he studied with Velma Froude. Griffin earned his degree in communicative arts and drama with an applied harp major from Michigan State University. He since has studied with Lucille Lawrence at Mannes College of Music in New York City and with Eileen Malone of the Eastman School of Music.

The artist's career has included numerous White House performances before several presidents as well as more than 600 concerts through the United States, Europe and the Far East. Griffin also has appeared at the Edinburgh Festival.

Reviewing a recent concert, one critic said: "When a musician can play anything from classical and calypso to pop and rock on an instrument it is definitely entertaining, but not that unusual of an event. But the music of Harvi Griffin is intriguing and beautiful as he brings the notes from the strings of a harp."

MOREHEAD, Ky.---George Mason University emerged as the first place winner at Morehead State University's 15th annual Eagle Championship Speech Tournament.

More than 250 college and university students from 22 institutions competed in the two-day event, according to Jan Caldwell, MSU assistant professor of speech and speech team coach.

Placing second and third respectively were Ball State University and Carson-Newman College. Other schools competing included Asbury College, Cedarville College, Georgetown College, Indiana University-Bloomington, Marshall University, Miami University of Ohio;

Murray State University, Northern Kentucky University, Notre Dame University, Ohio University, Ohio State University, Transylvania University, Trevecca Nazarene, University of Indianapolis, University of Kentucky, Wayne State University, Western Kentucky University and West Virginia University.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--"Blacks in Appalachia" will be the topic for a lecture by Dr. William Turner on Sunday, Feb. 11, at 8 p.m. in Breckinridge Auditorium.

His talk is sponsored by MSU's Office of Minority Student Affairs in conjunction with Black History Month.

Dr. Turner is an associate professor of sociology at Winston-Salem (N.C.) State University and special adviser to the president of Berea College, where he served as distinguished visiting professor of Black and Appalachian Studies in 1988-89.

His remarks will include information he collected while working on his doctorate for studies in sociology/anthropology at the University of Notre Dame and materials collected on the social history of African Americans in the Appalachian region.

A native of Harlan, he is a scholar/researcher, writer, lecturer, and consultant with specialities in the areas of race relations, social change, rural and developmental studies. He is president of his own consulting firm--Highlands Human Resources Association--where his clients include Black Mountain Improvement Association, the West Virginia Alliance for Black History and Culture of Marshall University, the National Science Foundation and the Kellogg Foundation.

Dr. Turner received postdoctorate fellowship appointments at the University of Pennsylvania, as well as George Washington and Duke universities. He also has taught at Southern, Fisk and Howard universities, and University of Kentucky, and was dean of the College at Kentucky State University.

A frequent lecturer on college campuses in the U.S., Italy, and South Africa, Dr. Turner holds membership in numerous civic and professional organizations. He has written four manuscripts including the only full-length anthology on blacks in the Appalachian region. Also, he wrote, directed and produced a production based on classical Negro Spirituals, "The Spirit Will Not Descend Without Songs."

MOREHEAD, Ky.-Morehead State University's Julia D. Webb Scholarship Fund now exceeds the minimum endowment level of \$10,000.

A Scholarship Benefit Auction, conducted Saturday (Feb. 3), netted more than \$4,300 to push the fund, named for the late MSU faculty member and debate team coach whose students brought state, regional and national honors to the University, over the endowment level.

The scholarship was established through the MSU Foundation by friends, former students and colleagues following her death in November 1988. Memorial contributions along with special benefit performances also helped the fund toward its goal.

Interest from the endowment's principal will yield approximately \$700 annually, depending on investment market conditions, according to Robert F. Howerton, MSU Foundation executive vice president.

The interest will be used to fund scholarship awards for members of the University's speech team, according to Dr. James E. Quisenberry, chair of the scholarship fund committee and professor of speech.

The auction, sponsored by MSU's Department of Communications and the Foundation, offered a wide variety of art works and handcrafted items.

"We really owe a great debt to those artists, local craftsmen and businesses who donated items for the auction," Howerton said. "The quality of the items made it possible for us to attract buyers, but it also took a lot of work on the part of many members of the communications faculty as well as students to make the auction successful."

Honored as the 1972 Distinguished Faculty Award recipient, Webb began teaching and coaching debate at University Breckinridge School and MSU in 1964. She later joined the MSU faculty full-time and retired to Florida in 1973.

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





Last spring MSU President and Mrs. C. Nelson Grote visited several universities on mainland China, including Zhengzhou, with the intent of establishing exchange programs for faculty and students through sister university relationships.

MSU's current international visiting scholar Zhang Ke Fu, a member of the English faculty at Zhengzhou, and Dr. Larry W. Jones, dean of the College of Professional Studies who have traveled extensively in China, also assisted in the arrangements for Dr. Holt's visit.

Dr. Holt said that one of his goals will be to further the relationship between MSU and the Chinese university. He also hopes not only to gain a better understanding of the Chinese culture, but to provide them with a better understanding of the American culture as well.





MSU'S 'OLD FAITHFUL' LOOK ALIKE

While this steam cloud billowing forth along the edge of Morehead State University's tennis courts may look like the scalding steam geyser "Old Faithful" in Yellowstone National Park, the resemblance is purely visual. According to Joe Planck, MSU's Physical Plant director, the steam clouds are a result of ground water running onto underground steam lines which carry heat to the campus buildings, not hot steam escaping from the pipes. The steam is not dangerous. It is a result of the deterioration of the insulation on the pipes, a condition which MSU expects to eliminate during Phase II of the tunnel renovation project.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University's Board of Regents voted unanimously Friday (Feb. 23) to extend President C. Nelson Grote's contract which expires June 30, 1991.

Moved by Regent Charles Wheeler and seconded by Student Regent Harrison B. Gilliam, the motion calls for Board Chairman William R. Seaton to negotiate the length of the extension and salary and report at the board's next meeting on April 27.

Wheeler noted that he had received a letter from a faculty member praising the board for the caliber of its leadership. "I feel that if we've exercised any leadership, it's been through the people we've worked with and I think it would be appropriate at this time that the board consider the extension of Dr. Grote's contract," Wheeler said.

Dr. Grote, who served as an MSU administrator from 1960 to 1971, returned to the campus as president on July 1, 1987. A former MSU dean, he was serving as chancellor of The Community Colleges of Spokane when he accepted the MSU presidency.

In other action, the board approved an academic restructuring to create a College of Business and reorganize the College of Professional Studies into the College of Education and Behavioral Sciences. The move will give appropriate status to the disciplines, improve communication lines and eliminate an administrative position. The Faculty Senate supported the recommendation.

Also approved was the 1990-91 fee schedule which included tuition increases established earlier by the Council on Higher Education; a \$30 per semester increase in room rates for 12 residence halls; set a \$600 per semester rate for newly-renovated Fields Hall, and increases in various registration-related fees.

A new policy on teaching workload responsibilities and overload was endorsed by the board with the faculty regent, Dr. Alban Wheeler, voting against it. As approved, the policy, according to President Grote, for the first time formally details the duties and responsibilities of a faculty member. "Those expectations often are more than a teaching load," he noted.

The policy also provides for developing an overload pay scale based on rank.

Dr. Grote said that although the faculty was generally in agreement with many aspects, there was concern over the teaching load which is set at 27 credit hours per year for instructors and at 24 credit hours per year for assistant, associate and full professors. For those faculty members teaching classes with a majority of graduate students enrolled, the courses will be prorated so that each credit hour is equivalent to four-thirds (4/3) of a credit hour in recognition of the additional preparation needed for graduate teaching.

The new policy brings MSU into line with state regional benchmark institutions and addresses recommendations from the current accreditation self-study.

The board reelected its four officers, including Seaton as chairman, Jerry F. Howell Sr. as vice chairman, Carol Johnson as secretary and W. Porter Dailey as treasurer.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Morehead State University's accounting students are getting some practical hands-on experience in preparing federal income tax returns.

Every Tuesday from 3 to 6 p.m. until the filing deadline, the students, supervised by John W. Osborne, MSU assistant professor of accounting, may be found in Combs 209 preparing short form tax returns for eligible clients. There will not be a Tuesday session, however, on March 13 which falls during the University's spring break.

The student tax preparers in MSU's Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) Program either have had or are currently enrolled in Accounting 387 and are majoring in accounting or business, according to Osborne.

"The students do a very professional job," he said. "In the first few weeks of the program, they've provided help to more than 125 clients. This year's VITA program is probably going to be the most successful we've had since its inception in 1980," said Osborne, who personally checks each return.

The VITA program is free to those persons who are students, who are age 65 and older, who are handicapped or who have an annual income of less than \$18,000


