MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University's Board of Regents has extended President C. Nelson Grote's contract through June 30, 1992, at which time he announced it was his intention to retire.

Meeting Friday (April 27) on the campus, the board unanimously ratified the one-year extension beyond Dr. Grote's current contract which expires in 1991. The regents also set his salary for the coming year at \$95,000.

In approving a contract extension at their last meeting, the regents authorized William Seaton, the board chairman, to work out the details with Dr. Grote and report back at the April meeting.

The president expressed his appreciation for the confidence that the board's action implied. Noting that he had given his decision a great deal of thought and discussed it with his staff, Dr. Grote said that his timetable allowed him to fulfill the commitment he made at the time of his appointment that he would stay at least five years.

Dr. Grote became MSU's 11th president on July 1, 1987, returning to the campus where he began his higher education administration career nearly three decades earlier.

The former dean of the University's College of Applied Sciences and Technology left in 1971 to become president of Schoolcraft College, Livonia, Mich., and went on later to become chancellor of The Community Colleges of Spokane.

The president also outlined a number of goals he wanted to achieve before stepping down. They include:

- Breckinridge Hall renovations funded in the 1992-94 biennium budget;

- The strategic long-range planning process fully operational and linked with the budget process;

- The institutional assessment of effectiveness system in place;

- All SACS reports associated with reaccreditation completed;

- The study of the General Education (Core Curriculum) program completed to insure students are adequately prepared for the 1990s and beyond;

- Significant progress made in the internationalization of the University's curriculum to prepare students for the 21st Century;

The Lappin Hall project completed;

Mays Hall and Butler Hall renovations completed to begin to alleviate the campus housing situation;

The Greek Housing Project funded and under way;

Phase I of the Master Campus Plan funded and under way.

"If we all continue to work hard--and that's the important thing--these projects and others can be done by June 30, 1992," Dr. Grote said. "Don't plan my retirement party yet," he cautioned. "I have no intention of being a lame duck president. We have a lot of work ahead."

Regent Charles Wheeler of Ashland praised Dr. Grote and said that the president "has done a splendid job and is an excellent educator. I feel things are going well at Morehead State and the future is very bright," he added.

Also on the agenda was an overview of the preliminary 1990-91 operating budget which will be considered at the June 22 board meeting.

Dr. Grote told the regents that the proposed budget will include \$1.8 million in funds for increases in faculty salaries and \$847,000 for staff increases. This would equal a 14 percent pool for faculty raises and a 6 percent pool for staff salaries and wages.

In other business the board approved awarding of degrees to 1990 spring graduates, promotions for eight faculty members, eight sabbatical leaves, four educational leaves, and an extension of a leave of absence.

Personnel actions from Feb. 5 through April 6 and five personal services contracts were ratified, along with extending current contracts for legal counsel and banking services.

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MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University's Office of Information Technology will host the spring Kentucky Higher Education Computing and Communications (KHECC) conference on May 21-22.

"Information Technology--Making It All Fit" is the theme and sessions will focus on the following technological areas: Library; Computing Services; Media/Printing-Publishing, and Telecommunications Networking.

More than 300 participants are expected for the two-day meeting which begins with registration beginning at 10 a.m. on Monday, May 21, in the Adron Doran University Center.

Dr. Charles Lee, an MSU graduate and former member of the Department of Music faculty, will give the keynote address at the general session on Monday.

"Preparing Work Force 2000: One View from the Computer Industry" will be his topic. Dr. Lee is education marketing director for the Unisys Corporation.

The conference has been designed to provide those attending with information to use in academic institutions and with an opportunity to gain an awareness of how others have fit technology into their situations.

Presentations will cover such topics as "Technologies for Distance Learning," "Info Window," "Information Services to Business and Industry," "Care and Feeding of Micro Labs," "Paperless Campus--Is It Legal?," and "Micro Networking."

KHECC was formed in August 1985 to provide computing and telecommunications personnel at Kentucky colleges and universities with an opportunity to share experiences among themselves and others in the profession. Since the initial meeting, the conference's scope has increased to include technological advances in information dissemination areas such as printing and libraries.

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MOREHEAD, Ky.--Kevin Johns, a senior at Lawrence County High School, is the winner of Morehead State University's fourth annual U.S. Constitution Essay and Scholarship Competition.

The essay competition is part of a four-year observance of the United States Constitution's Bicentennial. High school seniors from a 40-county area were eligible to compete for the scholarship, according to Dr. William Green, associate professor of government and chair of the Constitutional Scholarship Committee.

Johns' essay was entitled "How Have the Conflicts Between the President and Congress Helped Define What the Constitution Means?" He will receive the MSU Constitutional Scholarship of \$1,500 for the 1990-91 academic year, renewable for three additional years with a total value of \$6,000.

The scholarship, U.S. Constitution Award Certificate and a copy of "Storm Center: The Supreme Court and American Politics" by David M. O'Brien, will be presented to him during LCHS' award ceremonies on May 24.

The son of Harold and Doris Johns of Louisa, Johns is a member of the Latin Club, Future Business Leaders of America and the varsity baseball team. He also works part-time at the Louisa Food Lion store.

When he enters college in the fall, Johns plans to major in business management. His career goal is to be a corporate lawyer.

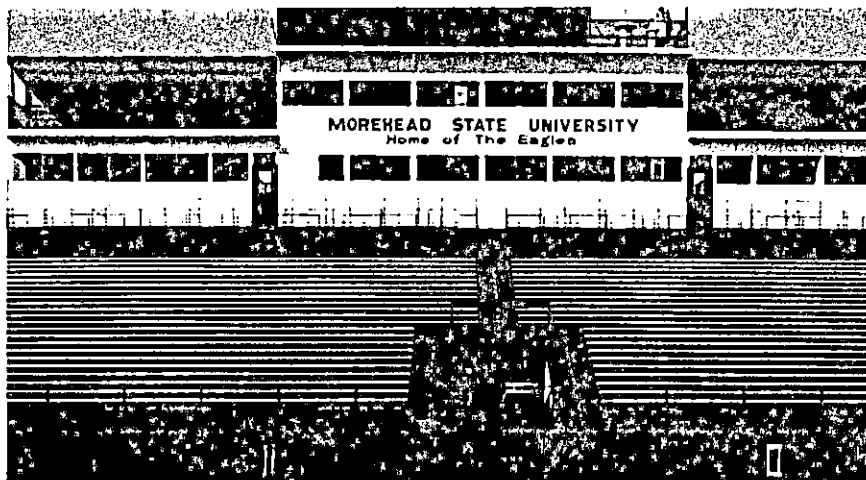

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MOREHEAD, Ky.--A 22-year veteran educator and a leading authority in the field of clinical mental health counseling have been selected by their colleagues as the 1989-90 recipients of Morehead State University's most prestigious awards.

Dr. James E. Gotsick, professor of psychology, received the Distinguished Teacher Award, which was established in 1964 by the MSU Alumni Association.

Dr. William J. Weikel, professor of education, was presented the Distinguished Researcher Award, sponsored by the MSU Research and Patent Committee and given annually since 1979.

The awards were announced at the University's sixth annual Academic Awards Convocation held Monday, April 30, in Button Auditorium. The event launched a weeklong campuswide tribute to scholastic achievement.

A member of the faculty since 1968, Dr. Gotsick also was recipient of the 1985-86 Distinguished Researcher Award and is only the second person to earn both honors.

Respected by students and faculty, Dr. Gotsick is known for the high standards he maintains in his classroom. While teaching a full range of graduate and undergraduate courses, he has made a point of including a section of introductory psychology on his schedule nearly every semester and has said that he believes he would "lose something important if I gave up teaching freshmen." He also has been known to hold afternoon tutoring sessions for those freshmen students.

Dr. Gotsick earned the B.S. and M.Ed. degrees from Pennsylvania State University and his doctoral degree from Syracuse University. He has been a research associate in psychology at Purdue University and in psychiatry at the A.B. Chandler Medical Center, University of Kentucky.

He is the author or co-author of numerous articles for professional journals; has presented papers at national, state and regional scientific meetings, and is the recipient of several research grants.

Dr. Weikel, a professor in the Department of Leadership and Secondary Education, joined the faculty in 1975 and is recognized nationwide as a leading authority in the area of clinical mental health counseling. He currently is specializing in multi-model therapy techniques.

A charter member of the American Mental Health Counselors Association (AMHCA) and the founding editor of its journal, Dr. Weikel also is a past president of the association and currently serves on the Governing Council of the 57,000-member American Association for Counseling and Development. He has held national and state offices in numerous other professional organizations.

Dr. Weikel is the author or co-author of more than two dozen articles for scientific journals and co-edited a definitive text on the growth of the mental health counseling field. He has served on the editorial boards of six professional periodicals; has made presentations at more than 70 national, regional and state meetings, and received several grants in support of his research. He has received eight professional service awards from the AMHCA and was its 1984-85 Counselor Educator of the Year.

A graduate of Temple University, he earned the M.A. degree from the University of Scranton and holds a Ph.D. degree from the University of Florida.

Also announced at the convocation was the winner of the third A. Frank Gallaher Memorial Music Performance Competition, Mary Ellen Creighton, a **Lexington** junior. A flute and piano student in the music education program, Creighton played the first two movements of Ravel's "Sonatine." Named for the late Ashland businessman, the Gallaher Competition award includes a \$1,000 cash prize in addition to the privilege of performing at the convocation.

The student speaker was Brenda N. Futrell, a Louisville senior and a candidate for May graduation at which time she will receive the B.S. degree with honors. An active member of the Academic Honors Program since her freshman year, she is majoring in biology and psychology.

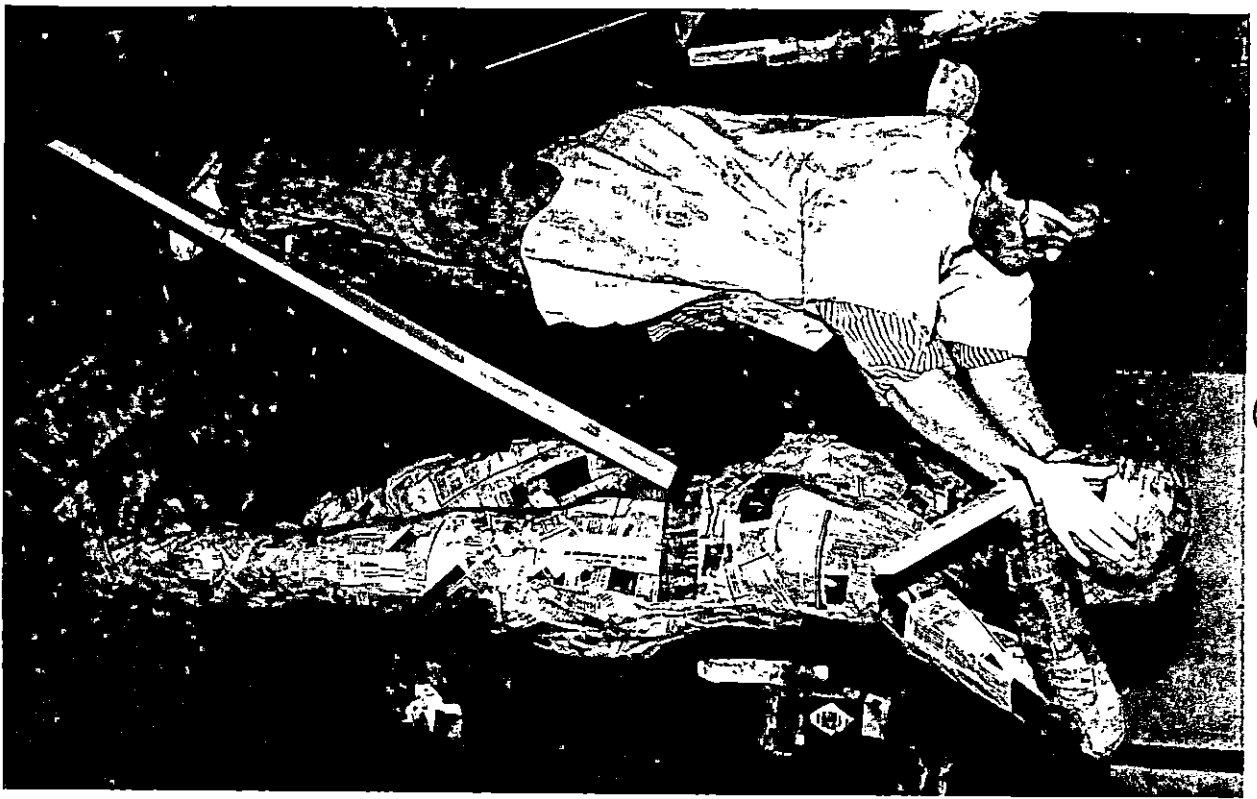

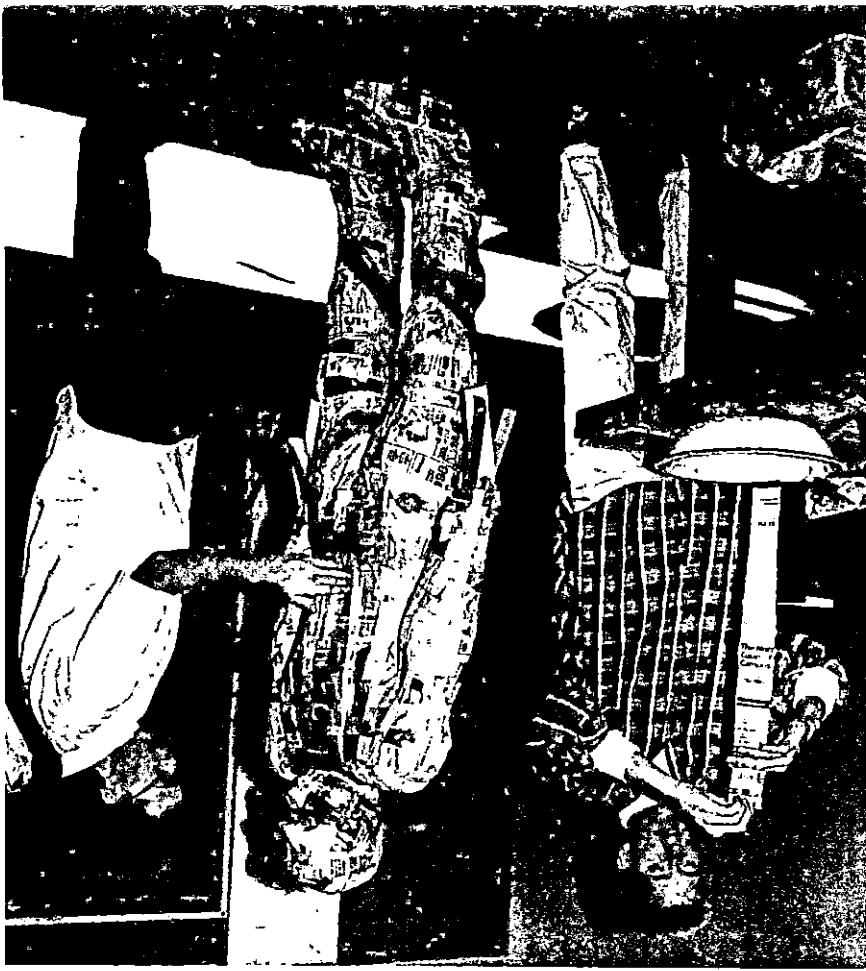

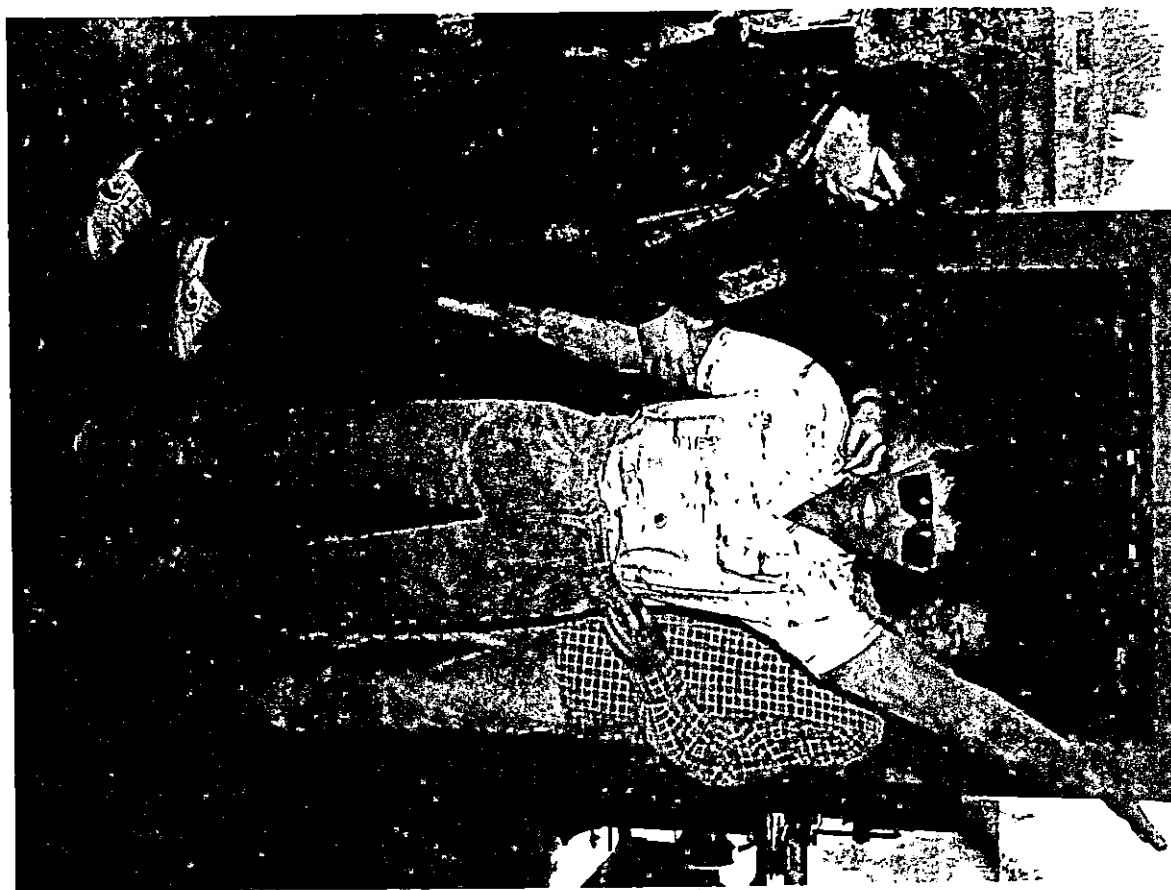

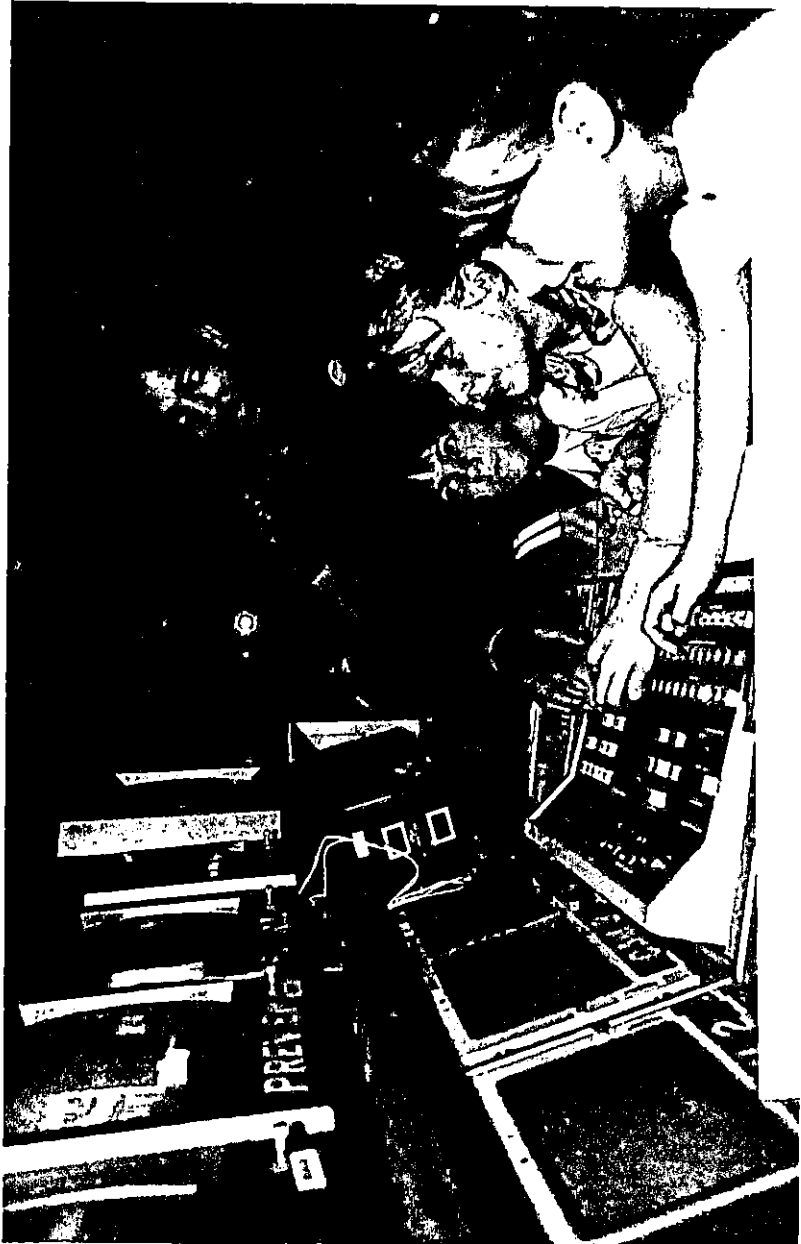

Both parties agreed the day was a wonderful experience and said that they had gained new respect for each other's responsibilities from this reversal of roles.

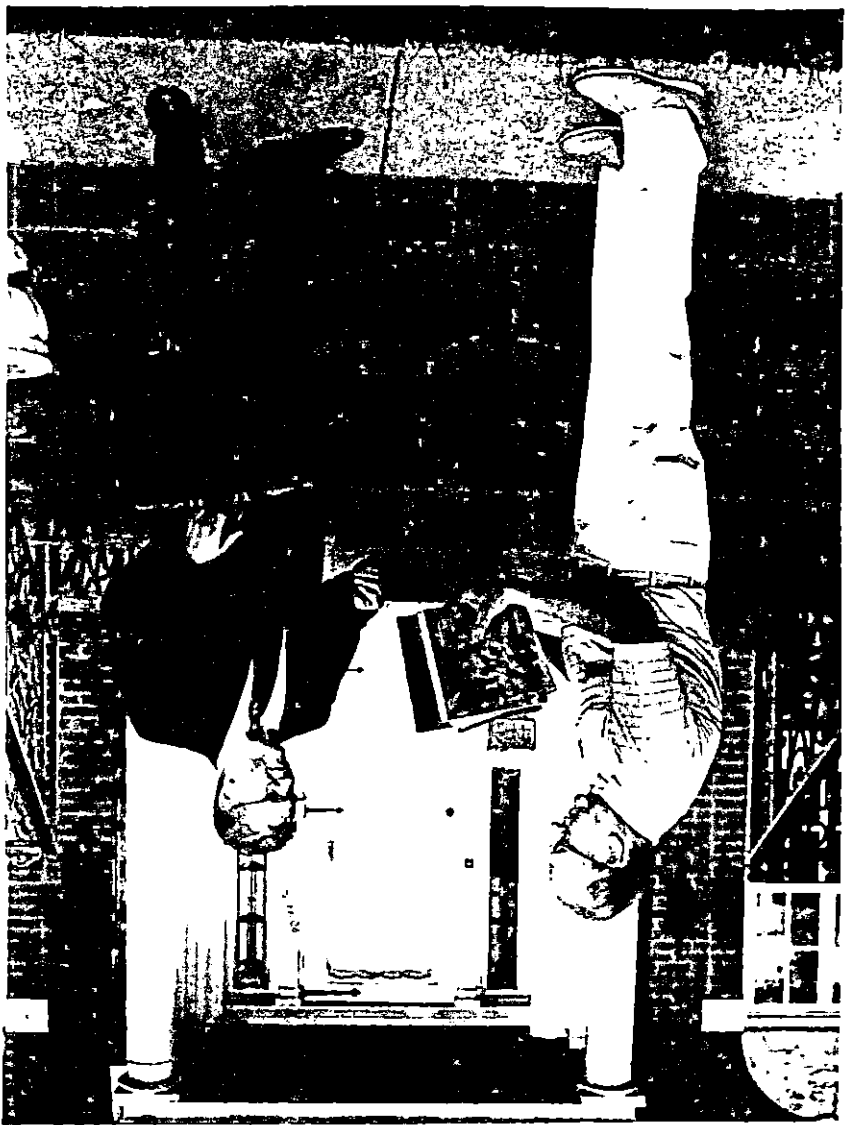
Cutlines:

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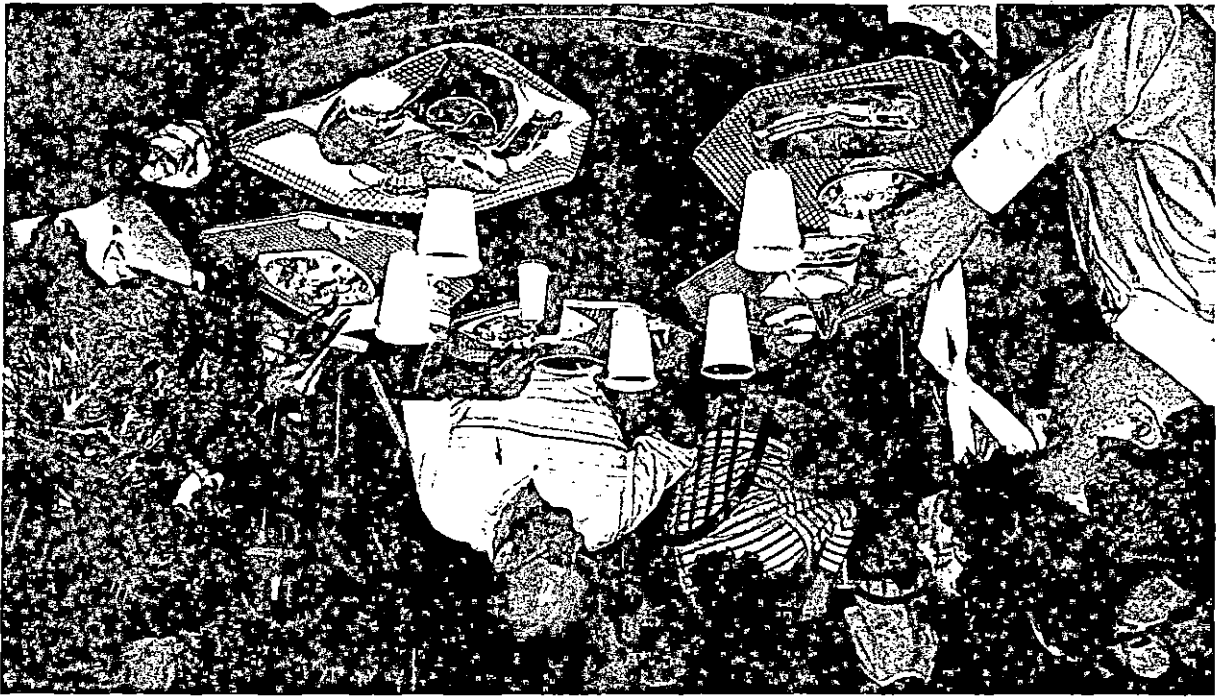

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Recognition of "uncommon achievement" was the focal point of Morehead State University's sixth annual Academic Awards Convocation, which launched a week dedicated to celebrating scholastic excellence.

"We are very aware of the academic environment on this campus," MSU President C. Nelson Grote told the students, their friends and families, faculty and staff members who gathered in Button Auditorium on Monday (April 30) for the convocation.

"You students whom we honor tonight are a reflection of our programs, a measurement of our quality," he said. "Your achievement is a result of a combination of resources; those that you personally possess--intelligence and a desire to learn--combined with the resources of this great University.

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MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University will hold its 1990 Spring Commencement at 1:30 p.m. Saturday, May 12, in the Academic-Athletic Center.

Approximately 550 undergraduate and graduate students are candidates for degrees which will be conferred by MSU President C. Nelson Grote. The spring class also includes the first five students from the four-year veterinary technology program who will receive the B.S. degree in veterinary technology.

The University also will award an honorary Doctor of Science degree upon Dr. Louise Gilman Hutchins of Berea, a pioneer in the field of rural medicine.

Dr. Hutchins was to have been honored at MSU's 1989 Winter Commencement, but was unable to participate due a snowfall that left hazardous road conditions.

Born in China in 1911 to Episcopal missionary parents, Dr. Hutchins has received numerous national and international awards for her lifelong efforts to combat infant mortality and protect the health of mothers in Kentucky. A two-time recipient of the Margaret Sanger Award, she holds honorary doctorates from Transylvania University and Berea College where she was student health doctor from 1941 to 1967.

A graduate of Wellesley College, Dr. Hutchins returned to China after earning her M.D. degree in 1936 from Yale University School of Medicine and practiced there until the onset of World War II.

She and her late husband, Dr. Francis Hutchins, relocated to Berea where he became president of Berea College and she reentered medical practice. For 25 years she volunteered her services in pediatrics at Berea College Hospital, while also promoting family planning throughout Eastern Kentucky.

The Hutchins spent 1967 to 1970 in Hong Kong, where she devoted her energies to maternal health programs, but did not visit mainland China again until 1978. Dr. Hutchins still maintains her medical practice in Berea and continues her family planning mission through the Mountain Maternal Health League in Eastern Kentucky.

"This extraordinary woman has dedicated much of her life to improving the quality of life for others in this region and it is most appropriate to recognize her for these efforts," said President Grote.

"She has distinguished herself as well as Kentucky through her professional prominence, her exemplary personal character and her commitment to education," he added.

Brenda N. Futrell of Louisville, a graduating senior in the College of Arts and Sciences, will be the student speaker. Graduating with honors, Futrell will receive a B.S. degree with majors in biology and psychology.

The daughter of Bob and Nell Futrell, she is a member of five national honor societies, including Cardinal Key. A member of the Student Activities Council since her freshman year, she served as its 1989-90 president and has held other offices in various campus organizations, including president of Sigma Sigma Sigma sorority. Active in the Academic Honors Program for four years, she also was selected to speak at the recent Academic Awards Convocation. Futrell plans to do graduate study in either environmental science or clinical psychology.

Once the degrees are awarded, the new alumni will be inducted into the MSU Alumni Association by its president, Lisa Browning.

Dr. James. E. Gotsick, professor of psychology and the 1989-90 Distinguished Teacher, will serve as grand marshal with Dr. Gerald DeMoss, chair of the Department of Biological and Environmental Sciences, and Alex Conyers, associate professor of finance, as faculty marshals.

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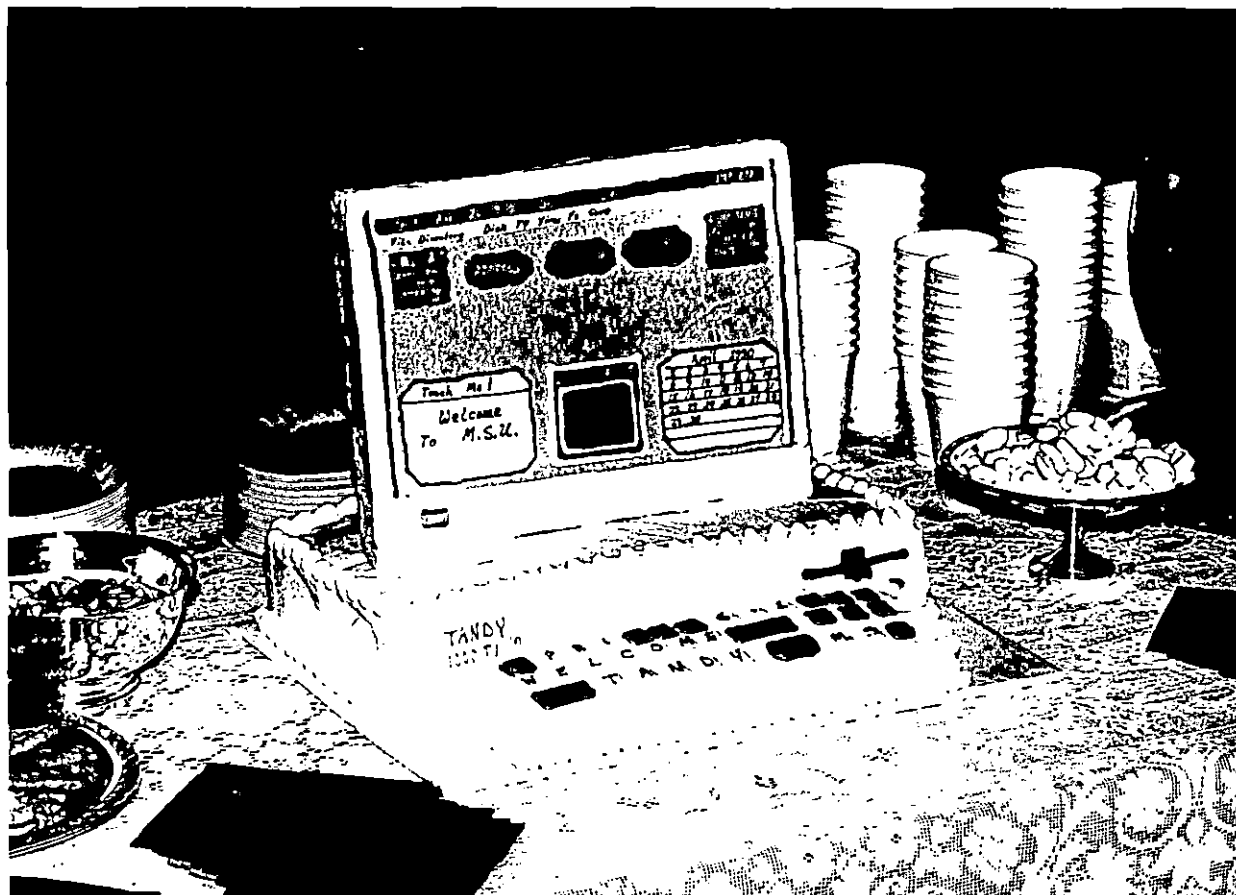

The four-year program offers students additional study in the areas of anesthesiology, advanced clinical pathology and hospital management.

Approved by the Council on Higher Education in 1987, MSU's College of Applied Sciences and Technology implemented the four-year degree program through the Department of Agriculture and Natural Resources in fall 1988.

PIKEVILLE, Ky.--"Educational Reform in Kentucky: Implementing House Bill 940" will be the focus for a 7th District Leadership Conference to be held here Tuesday, May 22, at the Landmark Inn.

More than 500 civic, education, political and business leaders and concerned parents have been invited to attend the sessions which begin at 8 a.m. with registration and continental breakfast.

The conference is sponsored by the 7th District Educational Development Committee with assistance from Morehead State University and the Kentucky Department of Education which is the funding agency.

Gov. Wallace Wilkinson has been invited to speak and another key figure in the reform movement, former Gov. Bert Combs, has indicated he will participate.

In addition to exploring the implications of HB 940 for local school districts, the conference is designed to assist those districts in planning for the implementation of the educational reform package in three areas: pre-school organization; site-based management, and student educational standards and assessment.

The conference is a follow-up to a roundtable held in November which provided a forum for informing residents of the 23 Eastern Kentucky counties comprising the congressional district about the proposed educational reform legislation and for receiving their input.

"The education reform package is now a reality and the task of implementation moves to the local communities," said Dr. Randall Wells, MSU coordinator of school relations. He and Dr. Richard Daniel, MSU professor of education, are serving as co-chairs of the planning group.

"The timetable for implementation has been set and planning must begin now," Dr. Wells added.

Mt. Sterling businessman Bill Joe Hall will serve as the moderator for the program which will include a panel discussion on "What Is House Bill 940," featuring state legislators. MOREHEAD, Ky.----"You will experience change at a rate unknown to mankind as we approach and move into the 21st Century," Morehead State University President C. Nelson Grote told MSU's spring graduates at commencement ceremonies Saturday, May 12.

Only a few months ago his emphasis would have been primarily on technological change, Dr. Grote said, for it would have been difficult to imagine the "social, political and economical change occurring in Europe or the potential changes in Southeast Asia, particularly in China."

More than 550 graduate and undergraduate degrees were conferred by President Grote. The spring class also included the first graduates of the University's four-year degree program in veterinary technology as well as the first from the Bachelor of Science in Nursing degree program's generic track.

The crowd of more than 3,500 present in the Academic-Athletic Center also heard honorary degree recipient Dr. Louise Gilman Hutchins of Berea urge the women graduates to follow in her footsteps and work in the mountains in whatever field they chose, but especially in pediatrics and family planning.

In conferring the honorary Doctor of Science degree on Dr. Hutchins, President Grote said that he was pleased to represent the University's Board of Regents in recognizing "her lifetime of service to others and particularly for her dedication to our beloved Eastern Kentucky."

A pioneer in the field of rural medicine, Dr. Hutchins has devoted her life to combating infant mortality, to protecting the health of mothers and to promoting family planning.

Student speaker Brenda N. Futrell of Louisville challenged her classmates to "figure out what you care about and live a life that shows it." She told them not to wait for someone else to blaze the trail, but to adopt the responsibility that if it is to be, it is up to them.

"It's an attitude that's contagious. Growth and change suddenly become inevitable, and the impossible, possible," she said.

Graduating with honors, Futrell received a Bachelor of Science degree with majors in biology and psychology. She will enter graduate school in the fall to study either environmental science or clinical psychology.

Following the conferring of degrees, the new graduates were welcomed into the MSU Alumni Association by Lisa Browning of Owingsville, association president.

Earlier in the day, MSU's Department of Military Science commissioned 13 ROTC students as second lieutenants. The speaker, Col. Arthur F. Kelley of Frankfort, told the students:

"You are in an enviable position on this planet earth here today. You are coming onto the world stage at a time when great events are occurring in the world--both political events and technological events."

Col. Kelley served as chair of MSU's Department of Military Science from 1970-73.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Morehead State University's Department of Elementary, Reading and Special Education will offer three special summer instructional programs for elementary and middle school children in reading, math, language arts and social studies.

Enrollment for the programs is under way now.

The sessions will be conducted by upperclassmen and graduate students enrolled in MSU's School of Education. Many of the graduate students are certified teachers.

"The instruction will focus on areas of difficulty for the public school students, but also will be helpful to students who are achieving at a high level and wish an opportunity for indepth study in a particular area," said Dr. Paul McGhee, department chair. 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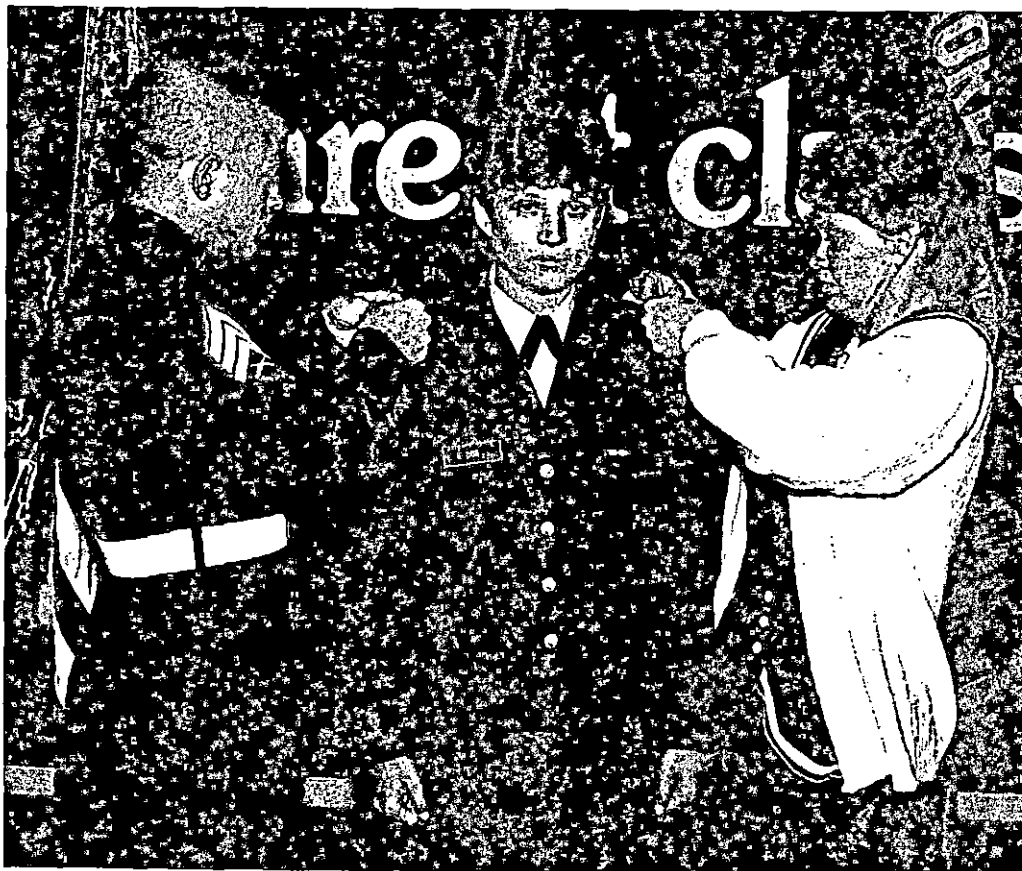

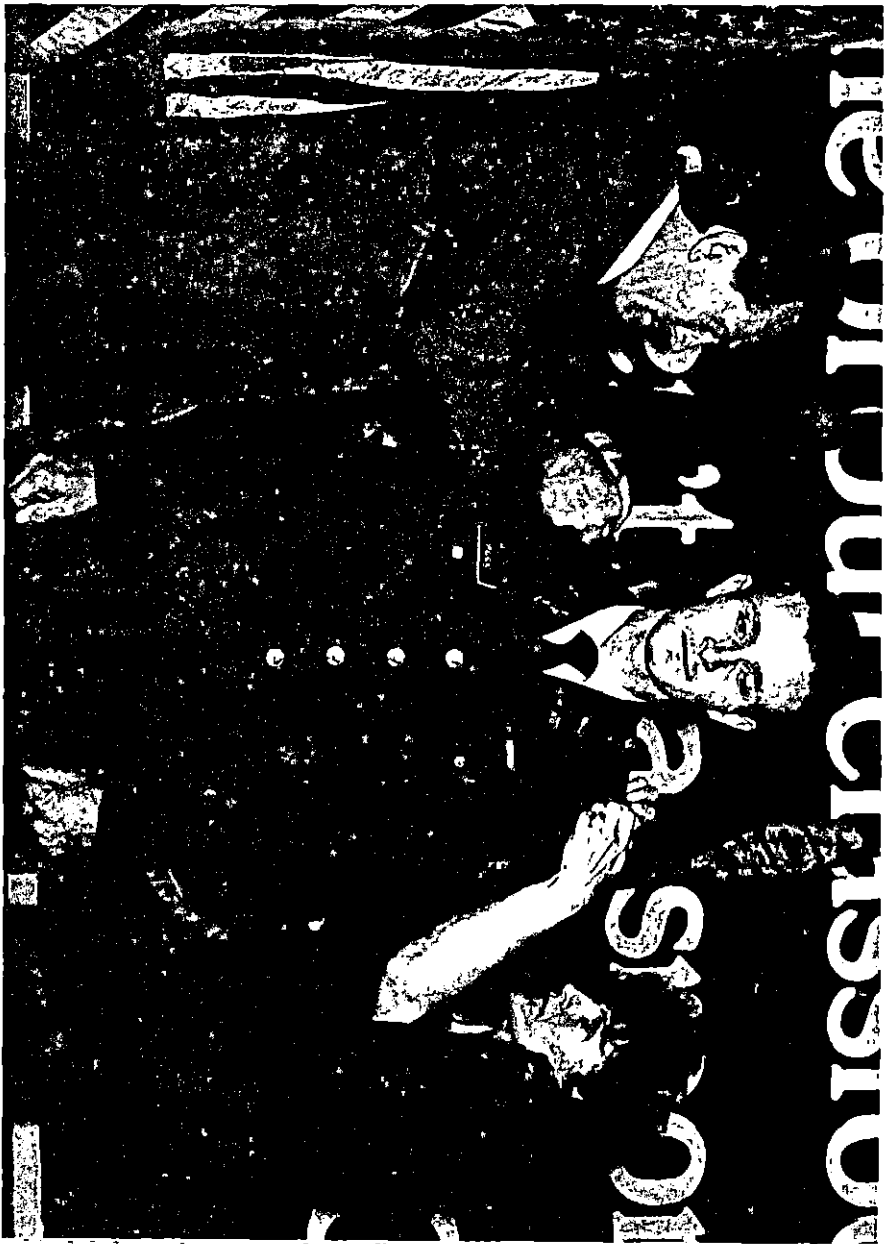

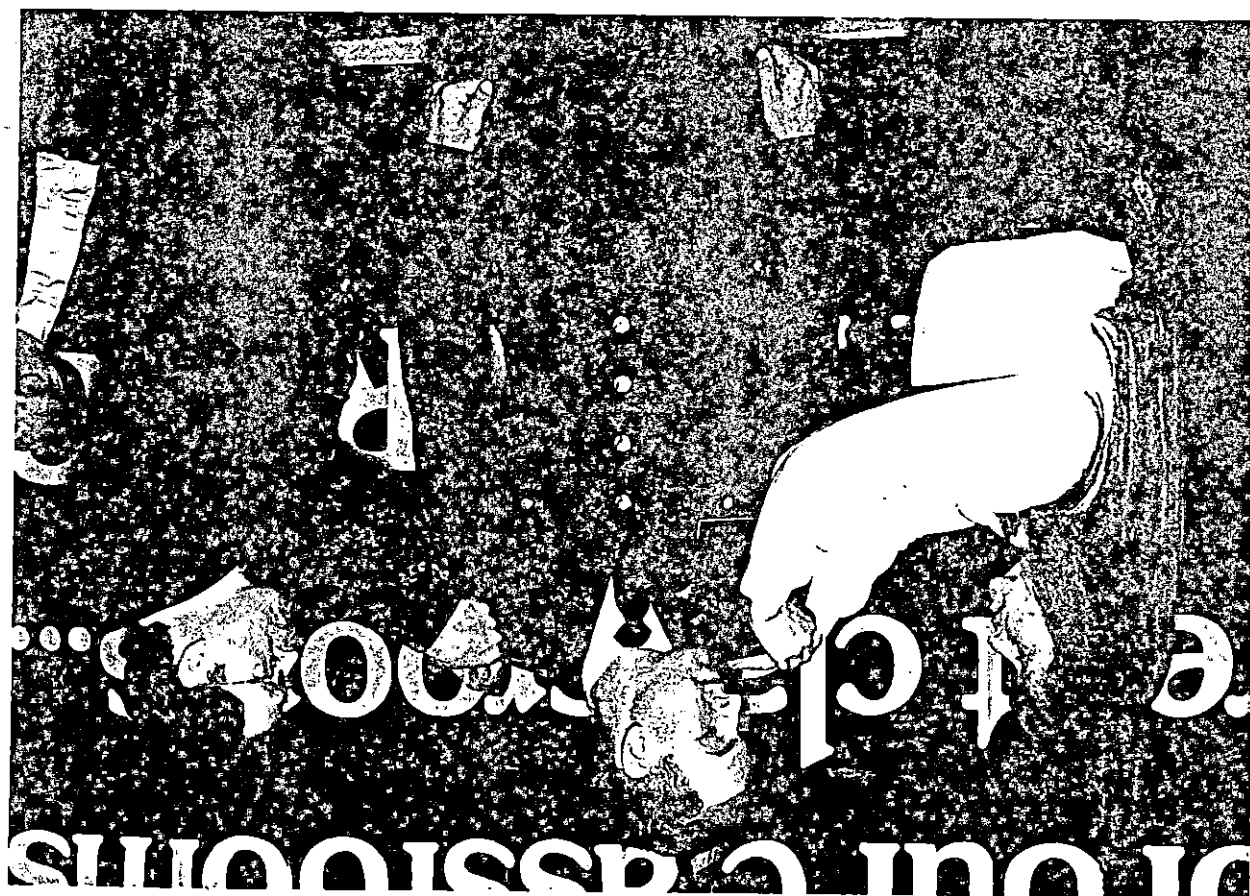

MOREHEAD, Ky.---A Morehead State University professor of history has launched the first phase of a project which will culminate in a history of the institution from its earliest days as a private school to a regional state university of the 1990s.

Dr. Donald F. Flatt has begun what he considers a "labor of love," to compile first an oral history of MSU and then adapt that information into a book chronicling the growth of school and its impact on the region.

According to Dr. Flatt, the work will be "a balanced history," although there are some eras for which there are more records than other periods.

"The final manuscript will encompass all aspects from administration to academics and athletics," Dr. Flatt said. His deadline for completing the oral history part is the end of 1992.

Dr. Flatt said that he expects to interview a number of people who have played prominent and "maybe not so prominent" roles in MSU's development. Among the people whose recollections will be recorded are former governors, former presidents of the University and family members of the presidents no longer living, alumni who have distinguished themselves, people who have served on the Board of Regents and residents of the region who've watched MSU prosper.

"I'm looking for additional resource people, as well, and would appreciate hearing from anyone who could help me with stories from the past or even memorabilia," Dr. Flatt said. "They may write me in care of the University or call me at the office or home."

A specialist in 20th Century American history, Dr. Flatt said that he had wanted to produce an MSU history ever since he had read one on Western Kentucky University written by a colleague there, Dr. Lowell Harrison.

In his research, Dr. Flatt said he planned to read newspaper accounts from past years which should help him follow specific issues on an ongoing basis.

"There are just so many points to explore," he said. "Treatment of the University by the media, development of the brick and mortar facilities, the effect of the community of Morehead's political, social and economic climate on the school and the development of the Faculty Senate and its role today are only just a few of the topics to be studied," Dr. Flatt noted.

The historian also said that he would be available to speak to civic, social or service organizations about the University's history at any time while working on the project.

A two-time graduate of MSU, he earned his doctorate from the University of Kentucky. A former Bath County High School teacher, he joined the University faculty in 1962 and is a former department chair.

In addition to his teaching and scholarly pursuits, Dr. Flatt also is well known as an evangelist. He is a member of the Church of Christ and has served as an elder and minister.

He and his wife, the former Carolyn Stephens of Vienna, W.Va., are the parents of a son and a daughter.

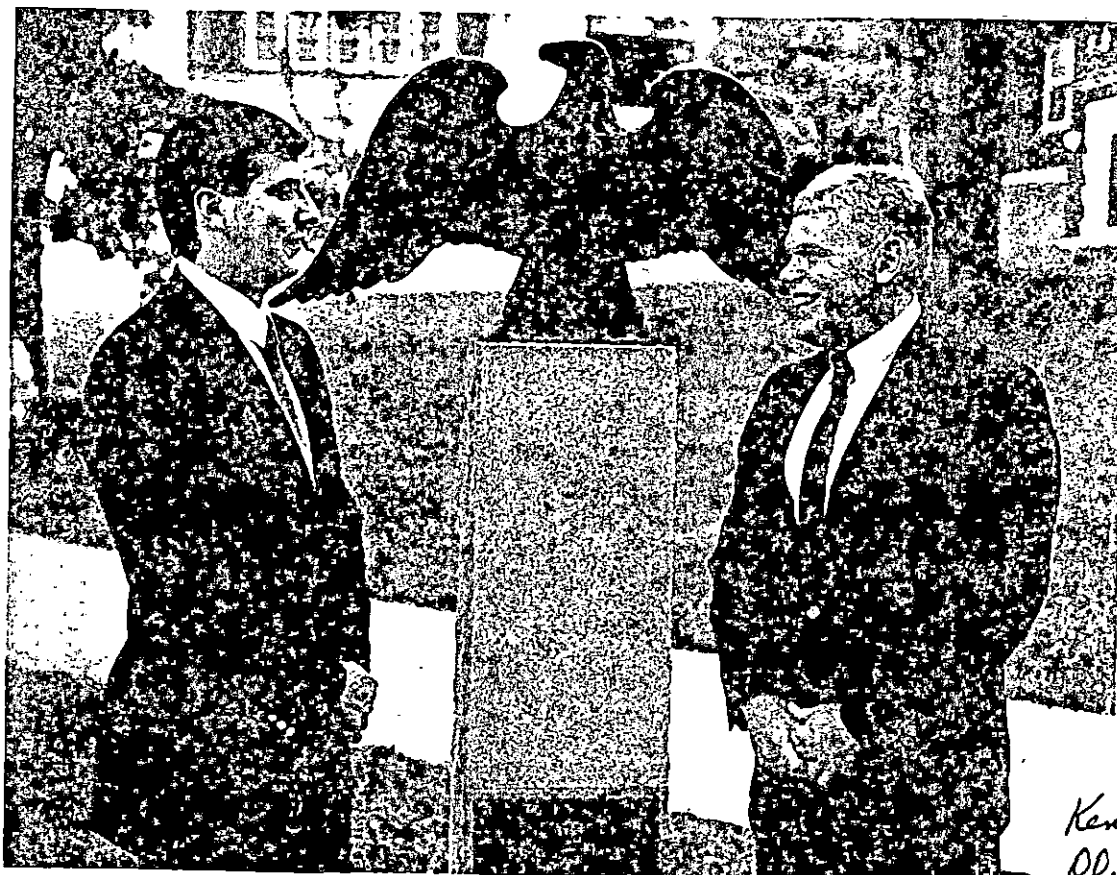
