Cultivation of tobacco is again being considered by the government of Egypt but it is believed locally that, as in the past, the decision will not be favorable to such an undertaking since favorable action would result in the loss of tobacco import taxes, according to a report to the Louisville district office of the department of commerce.

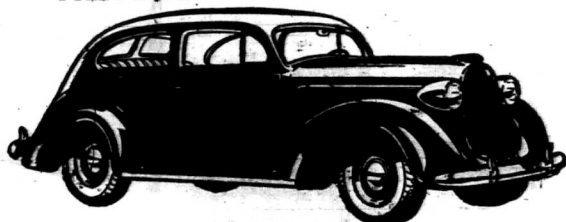

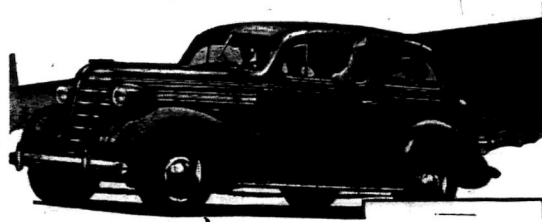
