

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Twenty Morehead State University faculty members, including a two-person creative duo and two research teams, will share more than \$52,800 in institutional research grants with the awards ranging from \$5,000 to \$1,000.

The awards were granted on the basis of proposals for research and creative productions submitted for fall semester funding, according to Dr. John C. Philley, MSU interim vice president for academic affairs and dean of faculties.

The total funding is the largest awarded since the University began supporting its faculty's research effort in 1968-69 with an initial budget allocation of \$12,000, Dr. Philley said.

Each semester proposals for research and creative productions are solicited as well as for summer research projects. "The quality of the proposals submitted this fall was outstanding," the vice president added.

The awards are designed to both recognize and encourage faculty research. In selecting proposals for funding, the emphasis is on those which not only broaden the individual researcher's horizon, but also on what the study will add to the current pool of knowledge.



MOREHEAD, Ky.----Morehead State University and the EPA have agreed, pending Board of Regents approval, on a \$45,000 settlement of civil penalties resulting from violations of the Toxic Substances Control Act (TSCA).

The settlement represents a 74 percent reduction from the original assessment of \$169,500, according to Porter Dailey, MSU vice president for administration and fiscal services.

At the Dec. 14 board meeting, MSU President C. Nelson Grote will request authorization to execute the consent agreement.

In April, MSU was notified by the EPA Region IV office in Atlanta, Ga., that it had been cited for 31 violations related to PCB-type transformers which already had been removed and replaced in compliance with TSCA at a cost of \$746,000.

University officials announced that they would contest the amount of the proposed penalty and obtained the legal services of Greenebaum Doll and McDonald, a Kentucky law firm.

The Kentucky Division of Waste Management conducted a site visit of MSU on behalf of the EPA on Sept. 13, 1989, and noted several deficiencies. "The violations were primarily record keeping oversights which were immediately corrected," Dailey said.

The violations included 24 counts of incomplete records, six instances of combustible material stored in the vicinity of the transformers, and one count involving the lack of a warning label on a door to a mechanical room.

According to MSU's records, removal and replacement of the PCB-type transformers began on Oct. 16, 1989, and was completed the following April 6.

The University initiated planning for removal and replacement of the transformers in 1986 as part of the first phase of its utility tunnel renovation project.

This project had the highest priority on MSU's 1988-90 Capital Construction Request and later received the same ranking in the state. The 1988 General Assembly approved \$4.9 million to finance the first phase. The state awarded a contract for removal and replacement to General Electric of Cincinnati in early June 1989.

The \$45,000 settlement is an overall reduction of the total fine. The payment will be made from the University's unallocated 1989-90 fiscal year end fund balance, Dailey said.

One factor in the reduction was the University's willingness to conduct a PCB educational outreach program. The program was conducted this September in Berea at the meeting of the Kentucky Association of Physical Plant Administrators.



MOREHEAD, Ky.---A Morehead State University junior has "written" a visual letter addressed to the troops in Saudi Arabia.

"It's everyday people just saying things; that's what makes it different," said Karen Coburn, describing the videotape which has occupied her time and thoughts for several weeks.

Unlike some other tapes she has seen, Coburn's messages aren't exclusively from relatives of military personnel. "There's only 10 or 12 people talking," she explained. "It's babies and kids and dogs and nature—the trees changing color."

The daughter of Arnold and Wilburn Coburn of Grayson, the MSU coed said that the tape was a suggestion for a class project that she didn't like at first.

"I started thinking if I were in that position, what I would want to see," she said. It occurred to her that just seeing pictures of Kentucky should make her feel closer to home from anywhere. "Once I started thinking in that vein, it was easier," she added.

Coburn anticipates a wide variety of reactions from the viewers--including homesickness. "I specifically included a few funny parts, so it wouldn't make them so homesick. It certainly was not my intention to make them depressed."

The 20-year-old wants the troops to know that they are over there for a reason. "It was touching to learn that even though some (people) don't support the involvement, they do support the troops," she said.

It wasn't always easy getting people to talk, because some would "hem and haw" in the presence of the camera. Others didn't want to go on the camera because their "hair wasn't right," the MSU radio-television major said.

Another problem encountered in producing her letter was with people who wanted to make rude or mean comments about Saddam Hussein. She chose to leave those statements off in the editing process. "It wouldn't do any good. It's not a message to Saddam anyway. It's a message for the troops," she explained.

Despite her initial disinterest in the project, Coburn found more empathy herself for the troops and their families somewhere along the line. In fact, she may do another tape next semester--focusing on winter or spring scenes.

"I was hoping for snow in this one, but we didn't really have any and it was more important to get the tape completed and over to our troops," she said.

What started out as a 15-minute project for a video class has grown into a 35-minute video letter that Coburn doesn't want to take much credit for.

"I just put it together. I wanted it to be a community--or at least campus--effort. It's just America, or a part of it."

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University's Department of Psychology was well represented at two recent scientific meetings with presentations involving 10 students currently enrolled, three alumni and seven faculty members.

In addition, one student earned second place in the Psychology Section of the 76th annual meeting of the Kentucky Academy of Science for his presentation of a paper he co-authored with a classmate and an MSU professor.

Andy Edie, a Washington, Ill., graduate student, received \$75 for presenting "Factors Effecting Student Evaluation of an Introductory Psychology Course," which he wrote with Yong Mao, a graduate student from the Peoples Republic of China, and Dr. Frank Osborne.

Receiving honorable mention for his presentation at the same meeting was Greg Lovell, an **Atlanta**, **Ga.**, graduate student. The paper, "Sulpuride Blocks the Expression, But Not the Development, of Behavioral Sensitization to Apomorphine," was co-authored with Dr. Bruce Mattingly, MSU professor.

Other presentations made at the meeting of the Kentucky Academy of Science which was held at Highland Heights included:

"Concrete Versus Abstract Reasoning as a Function of Piagetian Development Level in College Students," by Dr. Osborne, Katrina Lewis of **Prestonsburg** and Alan W. Hounshell of **VanCleve**, both graduate students.

"SCH-23390, A Selective Dopamine D1 Receptor Antagonist Blocks the Development of Behavioral Sensitization to Apomorphine," by Shannon Fauver of Louisville, a sophomore, and Dr. Mattingly.

"Interaction of Development of Learned Helplessness Behavior and Alcohol Consumption in Rates," by Dr. William Batsel, associate professor; Dr. Osborne, Steve Remillard of Edensburg, Pa., a 1989 graduate of MSU's master's program in psychology, and Kim Shriefer of Lexington, a graduate students.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Morehead State University's Job Training Center is now accepting applications for its spring semester.

Three training programs will be offered beginning in January: clinical laboratory assistant, pharmacy technician and unit secretary/telemetry aide.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Dramatic enrollment growth, major upgrading of faculty salaries, \$2 million in funds for instructional equipment, capital construction projects and the adoption of a campus master plan are just a few of the events dominating Morehead State University's entry into the decade of the 90s.

Toppling all previous records, MSU's fall 1990 enrollment hit 8,622 students, an 8.3 percent increase from fall 1989. The headcount figure represented a more than 51 percent growth in the student body since 1985, when enrollment dipped to 5,695. The number of full-time students (those taking a class load of 12 hours or more) also reached a new high of 6,588. With nearly 1,500 students taking classes at MSU's regional locations this fall, another record was set.

The record number of full-time students also meant an increase in students living in campus housing. The fall housing tally was reported at 4,032, an increase of nearly 200 students in the residence halls over last year.

Fall 1990 also brought the re-opening of Fields Hall, following approximately \$3 million in renovations to make it one of the most modern residence halls in the state. Originally opened in 1927, it now offers contemporary living space with many amenities. Workers are now renovating Thompson Hall to offer the same "pod" or cluster living atmosphere for another 150 to 170 students. The project, which also carries a \$3 million price tag, is expected to be completed by late May. MSU is continuing its efforts to meet the growing demand for campus housing. Architects have been appointed by the state to design specifications for renovating Mays and Butler Halls. University officials will be meeting with them to provide input on building needs.

With Board of Regents approval of a \$55.8 million operating budget for 1990-91, faculty salaries received a major boost bringing them up to the average of the state's regional universities. The average salary increase of 14 percent was called a "giant step" toward addressing a problem that had plagued MSU for several years--low faculty salaries.

That same budget also reflected a significant increase in the percentage of the Educational and General Budget allocated to instruction—the largest percentage in more than a decade—45.8 percent.

Earlier Kentucky's 1990 General Assembly approved \$2 million in state bond funds for instructional equipment for the 1990-92 biennium, making MSU the only university to receive bond funds for instructional equipment. In addition, the University received new dollar support from the state general fund appropriation for the MSU-Ashland Extended Campus Center and the MSU-Big Sandy Extended Campus Center in Prestonsburg. The state capital construction budget also included \$5 million for renovating Lappin Hall.

More good news on the financial side was the excess of \$1 million in gifts and other income during 1989-90 reported by the MSU Foundation. Private giving reached \$885,140, a 13 percent jump over the previous year. Alumni donors increased by 27 percent, while total contributors grew by 11 percent.

And the Office of Grants, Research and Contracts projects that external funding for 1989-90 will exceed \$4.5 million. That figure includes a \$150,000 grant from IBM to train new and practicing teachers in the expanded use of technology in the classroom.

Unveiled in September was a campus master plan designed to guide MSU's physical development well into the 21st century, addressing such areas as pedestrian and vehicular traffic patterns, parking, potential building sites for classroom and office structures, student housing and other land uses.

The plan, approved by the regents, allows for "planned development" rather than "piecemeal growth." President Grote stressed that it was a long-range plan which would be revised and updated as necessary, but that its implementation would take well into the 21st century to effect.

The year 1990 was full of good news for MSU and its supporters, including the first graduating class of veterinary technologists from the four-year degree program; the premiere of "Miss Cora, the Moonlight Lady," an original interpretive production by the University's performing artist-in-residence Laura Lee Duncan and based on the life of Cora Wilson Stewart, the founder of the nation's adult literacy movement; the accreditation of the Department of Music through the year 2000; a 10th in the nation ranking for the Individual Events (IE) team, and a 100 percent passage rate for the first graduates of the generic B.S.N. degree program on their licensing exam--to mention only a few.

It was also the year that brought several guest speakers, from the distinguished newsman/author Edwin Newman to one of the key figures in the Watergate scandal G. Gordon Liddy, to campus. The University honored several of its own, including Dr. Wilhelm Exelbirt, professor emeritus of history, with the Founders Day Award for University Service; Dr. James Gotsick, professor of psychology, with the Distinguished Teacher Award, and Dr. William J. Weikel, professor of education, with the Distinguished Researcher Award.







MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University has received reaffirmation of its accreditation from the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, Dr. C. Nelson Grote, MSU president, announced to the Board of Regents today.

"I can think of no finer holiday gift for this fine University and for all those who worked so tirelessly for the past three years on our institutional self-study and through the entire process," the president said.

"When I accepted the presidency of Morehead State in November 1986, I was aware that reaccreditation by SACS as well as meeting a new set of standards for the accreditation by the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education (NCATE) would be two major challenges of my administration," Dr. Grote said.

"I am proud to note that Morehead State has successfully met both challenges," he added.

Dr. Grote learned of the Commission on Colleges' decision while attending the College Delegate Assembly during the 95th annual meeting of SACS held in Atlanta, Ga., Dec. 9-12.

The action followed the commission's review of MSU's self-study, the visiting committee's recommendations and the University's responses to those recommendations.

The visiting team included 18 distinguished scholars, representing 15 different institutions. The University received high marks for the thoroughness of its review process and for the initiative taken in making improvements at all levels of the institution.

Among the recommendations from the committee, which visited MSU in April, were changes in admissions and scholastic progress policies, assessment of student academic achievement, changes in the policy for determining graduate faculty status, a faculty evaluation process, and adoption of a campus master (facilities) plan.

"Many of the committee's recommendations already have been addressed and we are in the process of working on implementation plans for others," Dr. Grote said.

"In fact, a number of these recommendations also came out of our own institutional self-study and were being addressed prior to the SACS committee's visit," he added.

Dr. John C. Philley, interim vice president for academic affairs and dean of faculties, served as chair of the SACS steering committee, while Dr. Judy Rogers, dean of undergraduate programs, and Dr. Marc Glasser, professor of English, were co-directors of the self-study which involved the efforts of more than 140 faculty, staff and students.

"One of the major benefits of such a thorough self-evaluation as MSU has just undergone is that we have in place processes which will enable us to continue to evaluate ourselves; thus keeping us not only prepared for future accreditation visits, but also helping us ensure the quality of our instructional programs through the '90s," Dr. Grote said.

Founded in 1895 and headquartered in Atlanta, SACS is one of six regional accrediting bodies in the United States and includes members in 11 southern states from Virginia through Texas, as well as American schools in Latin America. Membership in the agency is voluntary and the governance of member schools is left in the hands of the local governing board.

SACS accreditation is institution-wide and affects all undergraduate and graduate programs offered by MSU. Other educational agencies, such as NCATE, provide specialized accreditation for specific programs.

Since 1987, MSU has earned reaffirmation of accreditation or approval for its programs from the National Association of Schools of Music, the Council on Social Work Education—Baccalaureate Level, the American Veterinary Medical Association, the Joint Review Committee on Education in Radiologic Technology and the American Dietetics Association.

Both MSU's baccalaureate degree and associate degree nursing programs are approved by the Kentucky Board of Nursing and the B.S.N. degree program is a candidate for accreditation by National League for Nursing. The associate degree program in respiratory therapy also is a candidate for accreditation by the Joint Review Committee for Respiratory Therapy Education.

In addition, the University's Pharmacy Technician training program is one of 20 nationwide with accreditation by the American Society of Hospital Pharmacists.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Kentucky's Educational Reform Act of 1990 not only affects public schools, but also challenges the state's universities to provide assistance.

In an effort to meet that challenge, a broad-based Task Force on Educational Reform has been appointed by Morehead State University President C. Nelson Grote.

The 40-member task force, named recently, is responsible for recommending how MSU can help schools in its service region with their needs. The members will offer recommendations on changes needed in the teacher education program to ensure the success of MSU graduates in what will be a new educational workplace.

"While recommendatory in nature, this task force will play a tremendous role in determining how MSU can best serve the region's public schools in their efforts to implement this extraordinary legislation," Dr. Grote said.

"All of us in higher education have an obligation to use every resource we have in effecting the educational changes that will impact the state's most valuable resource, our young people," the president said.

Serving as task force chair is Dr. Randall L. Wells, school relations coordinator for MSU with Dr. John R. Duncan, professor of education who represents the University on the House Joint Resolution 54 study committee, as vice chair. Dr. Wells also is MSU's liaison with the Kentucky Educational Development Corporation (KEDC).

In addition to MSU faculty and administrators, the task force includes representation from the public schools--administrators and teachers--and parents.

The task force has been divided into six subcommittees, each of which addresses a specific area of the educational reform movement, and the chairs of these subcommittees along with Dr. Wells and Dr. Duncan constitute the executive committee.

"As we look at how educational reform will impact our teaching training methods, we also will be looking at specific ways that MSU can reach out to aid schools in Eastern Kentucky to meet the challenges of educational reform," said Dr. Wells.

"The subcommittees also will be reaching back into the campus community to tap others with special expertise for additional assistance," he added.

"We are looking at what can be done right now and at what we can do over the next five years. Resource people are being identified and time lines are being developed," Dr. Wells said.

"Under HJR 54, the eight universities are required to submit a plan for assisting with implementation of this historic legislation by Jan. 1, 1991," he added.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Addressing what he called the largest crowd he could remember having ever seen at a Winter Commencement, Morehead State University President C. Nelson Grote praised the graduates for having achieved this milestone in their lives.

A Dean's List student, she is a member of Phi Kappa Phi honor society and graduated summa cum laude with a 4.0 cumulative grade point average.

After degrees were conferred by President Grote, the graduates were inducted into the MSU Alumni Association by Ted Coakley of Harrison, Ohio, the association president.

Following commencement, Dr. and Mrs. Grote hosted a reception honoring the new graduates and their families and sponsored by the Alumni Association.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---One of the fastest growing career fields today is the paralegal profession, according to U.S. Bureau of Labor statistics.

Enrollment in Morehead State University's four-year degree program in paralegal studies also is paralleling the national trend, according to James P. Dahlberg, assistant professor of government and program coordinator.

Currently there are 135 students majoring in the program on campus and Dahlberg estimates that another 20 are taking courses at the University's extended campus centers in Ashland and Prestonsburg.

This spring MSU will offer two courses at its Ashland Extended Campus Center and three at the Big Sandy Extended Campus Center in Prestonsburg. "Contract and Tort Law" is on the schedule at both locations, while "Estate and Family Law" will be taught at Ashland and "Legal Research and Writing" as well as "The American Constitution" will be offered at Prestonsburg.

Also Prestonsburg Community College and Ashland Community College will be offering courses that meet the MSU paralegal program requirements. PCC's schedule includes "Real Estate Law" (RE 230), while ACC has scheduled RE 230 and "Introduction to the Law Profession" (BE 110) to be taught this spring.

"There appears to be a great deal of interest in paralegal studies out in the region," Dahlberg said.

Dahlberg and Dr. John C. Philley, MSU's interim vice president for academic affairs, in concert with officials at ACC and PCC, have and are continuing to explore the feasibility of developing a two plus two program in those communities.

Someday it may be possible for students to complete their general education core curriculum and some lower division electives at the community college.

Sufficient upper-division credit for a major in paralegal studies and for a minor then would be earned at the extended campus centers. Many paralegal majors select business-related minors and often those classes are offered either by the centers or community colleges.

"Obviously, this isn't going to become a reality overnight as we are still trying to gauge how much interest there is for such a program in the region," Dr. Philley said. "It's an approach we've been looking at for several years and at the same time we've taught paralegal courses at these off-campus sites. We don't have a set timetable, but are really still developing the concept."

MSU's A.B. degree in paralegal studies provides students a liberal arts background combined with professional training. The curriculum was developed under the American Bar Association's guidelines, Dahlberg said.

After an overview of the study of law and an intensive course in legal research and writing, students take work in specific legal areas such as family law, wills and estates, property, contracts, personal injury and criminal law as well as in the fundamentals of litigation.

In addition, majors must complete a six hour internship working in a law office for 20 hours per week for a semester or 40 hours a week during two summer terms. "The internship is really the capstone of the program, as it provides the student an opportunity to apply what has been learned in the classroom," Dahlberg said.

The role played by a paralegal varies depending on the location of the firm. Among the tasks normally delegated to a paralegal assistant practicing in a rural setting would be filling out legal forms, conducting indepth interviews with clients involved in estate planning, counseling clients in family law settings and handling title searches, deed preparations and abstracts in real estate transactions.

In a more metropolitan area, legal assistants might be called upon to do legal research and writing, manage a law library, coordinate computer research efforts and conduct research for litigation purposes.

Except in California and southern Florida, paralegals are generally restricted to offering their services solely through attorneys, Dahlberg said. "California allows paralegals to offer their services in whatever form they are qualified, independent of lawyers and legal firms, and may actually represent individuals in noncourt forums," he said.

The Social Security Administration already has changed its rules so that paralegals may represent clients in social security proceedings whether or not they are associated with an attorney.

"Other administrative avenues are opening up," said Dahlberg, who holds the J.D. degree from the University of Minnesota. He predicted that in the near future paralegals would be representing individuals in such areas as DUI license revocations, tax audits, preparation of wills and estate planning and domestic disputes.

Beginning salaries range from the low \$20s in a metropolitan region to the mid-teens in a less urban area, according to Dahlberg.

"Many large corporations and financial institutions are hiring paralegals to assist their legal counsel," Dahlberg said. "The growth in the paralegal field has resulted in part from the rising costs of legal services in many areas. Utilizing the services of a paralegal to handle certain matters is much less costly for clients as well as law firms," he noted.
