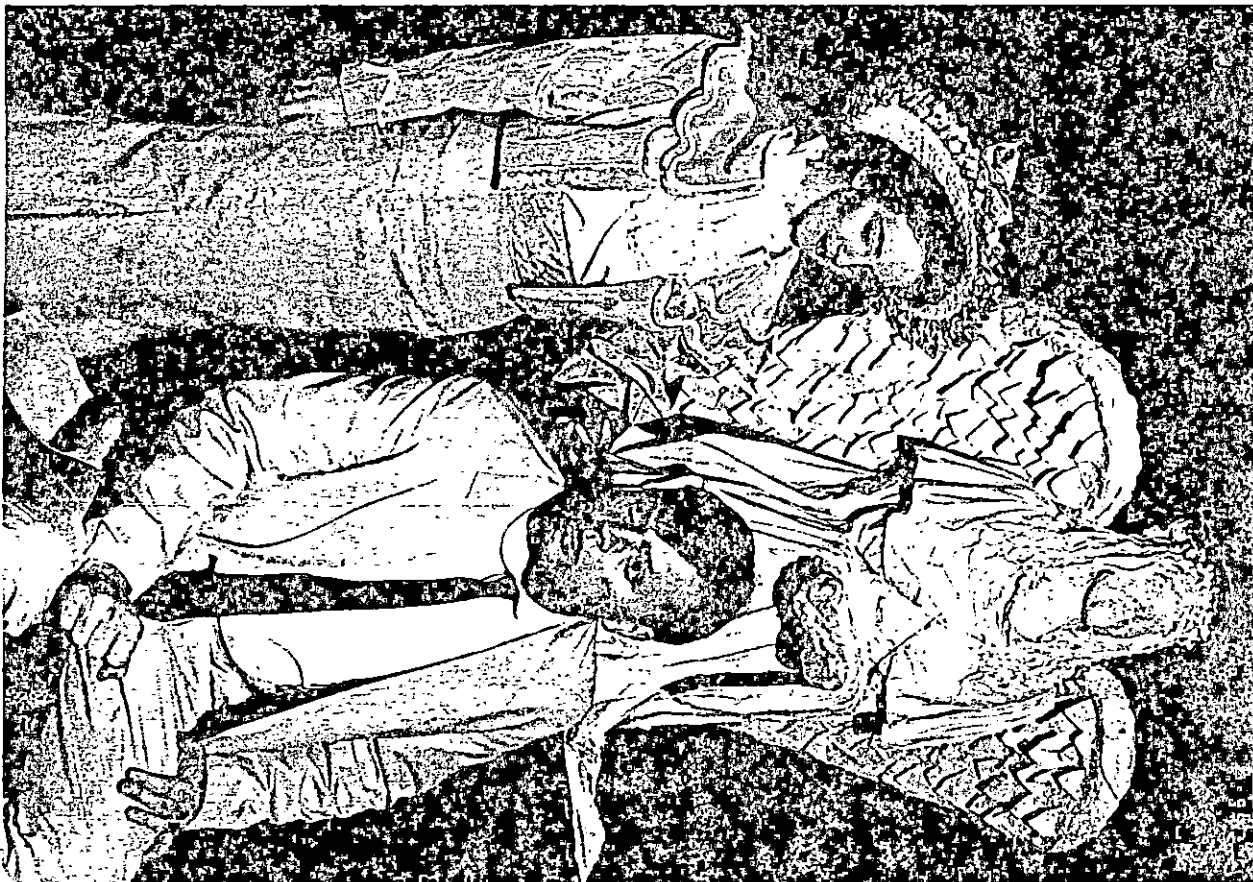

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Jacquelyn H. Scott has been named non-traditional students counselor in the Office of Student Development at Morehead State University.

Formerly coordinator of the Job Training Center in the Office of Regional Development Services, she assumed the position held by Anna Mae Riggle until her retirement last year.

"We are indeed fortunate to fill the position with someone with a background of working with adults and who is knowledgeable of the region," said Madonna Huffman, director of Student Development, in announcing the appointment. "Jackie's strengths are her people skills and her involvement in various community projects."

Scott's primary duty will be to provide counseling services to students currently enrolled at MSU who are 23 years or older. In addition, she will visit each of the University's off-campus centers, serving as a link between students and MSU administrators to allow a smoother transition for non-traditional students who wish to enter or return to school.

"My role with Job Training was a preparatory course for the work I am doing now," Scott said. "I am excited to be able to continue to help those who want to further their education."

Scott has compiled a list of programs which she hopes to incorporate into the MSU system. Among those are a single parent program, tutorial program, adult peer counselors and affiliation with "Pinnacle," an honorary society for non-traditional students.

Holding degrees from Freed-Hardeman College in Henderson, Tenn., and Abilene Christian University in Texas, she earned a Master of Arts in adult and continuing education degree from MSU. A frequent lecturer and program presenter, she also designed and taught the "Employee Effectiveness" curriculum for the Corrections Officer Training program at the MSU-Licking Valley Educational Services Center in West Liberty.

Listed among the Outstanding Young Women in America in 1978, she is a member of numerous professional organizations including Southeastern Employment and Training Association, Kentucky Council Against Child Abuse, and American Association for Adult and Continuing Education.

She is married to Tom Scott, MSU assistant professor of speech. They have 2 sons: Todd and Cliff.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--A retired educator/administrator and his wife have established a \$12,000 scholarship endowment fund at Morehead State University to assist students planning careers in teaching.

Pledging to continue supporting the scholarship endowment fund, Dr. and Mrs. Lawrence Stewart called their contribution to the MSU Foundation "the finest investment we have ever made" with the exception of their investment in their own education and choice of teaching as a career.

A former Ashland Independent Schools superintendent, Dr. Stewart spent two decades as a teacher, supervisor and administrator in the Ashland area school systems, before accepting an appointment in 1958 at MSU.

During the next 12 years, he held a variety of posts including student teacher director, overseer of Breckinridge Training School, professor of education and head of the Division of Professional Education. His wife, the former Stellarose Martin, taught third grade at Breckinridge for nine years.

The Dr. Lawrence and Stellarose Stewart Endowment Fund is expected to yield approximately \$1,000 annually for a student enrolled in the University's teacher education program.

"As dedicated educators Dr. and Mrs. Stewart have touched so many young lives," said MSU President C. Nelson Grote. "Now with the endowment of this scholarship fund, they will continue to enrich the lives of students for as long as this University stands. Their generosity is most appreciated," Dr. Grote added.

The Stewarts established the endowment in memory of their parents, James M. and Cynthia Bailey Stewart and Lennie F. Martin. A teacher, Dr. Stewart's father wanted all of his seven children to follow in his footsteps, but only his youngest son Lawrence did. Mrs. Stewart's mother went back to school later in her life and became a licensed practical nurse, retiring with reluctance at age 72. Both of Lennie Martin's daughters became teachers.

Dr. and Mrs. Stewart hold A.B. degrees from Morehead State, and he also received his high school diploma from the normal school. He later earned a master's degree from Marshall University and a second master's degree along with his doctorate from George Peabody College for Teachers, now a division of Vanderbilt University. Mrs. Stewart earned her master's degree from the University of Kentucky.

After retiring from MSU in 1970 and moving to Clearwater, Fla., Dr. Stewart returned to the classroom, teaching at the University of South Florida for another 10 years.

A Carter County native, Dr. Stewart began his career in education at age 18, teaching grades one through eight at the Glancy Fork one-room school at a monthly salary of \$63, moving on to Denton Graded School three years later. There he taught grades six through eight as well as "some high school subjects." As a teacher, attendance director and substitute principal in the Fairview Independent Schools, Dr. Stewart also added teaching physical education and coaching basketball to his roles after an auditorium/gymnasium was built under the WPA.

When World War II began, Dr. Stewart took night and Saturday classes in machine shop work at Crabbe School and later studied welding. Taking leave from his job, he began working in Chester, Pa., at the Sun Shipbuilding Center as an electric welder. With the opening of an Ashland shell plant by the Louisville firm of Clayton and Lambert, he came back to Boyd County to work as a tool setter until the war ended.

Resuming teaching and coaching, he taught at Hager Elementary and later became principal of Means Elementary School where he stayed for six years before beginning his doctorate at Peabody College. At the completion of his studies there, he was named superintendent of the Ashland Independent Schools.

During his two-year tenure in that post, he saw the school system's budget reach \$1 million, the start of integration and the admission of special education students into the public school system.

Dr. Stewart's next professional challenge was with the Boyd County Schools as supervisor of instruction, a new position mandated for all school systems in Kentucky by the legislature. In this role, he said, he was responsible for implementing a standardized testing program, for assisting the teachers with their professional development and meeting with parent organizations to explain what the school system was doing to improve the educational opportunities for their children.

The educator/administrator's work caught the attention of Dr. Adron Doran, the president of MSU, who urged him to join the faculty and after some deliberation, Dr. Stewart accepted. With many fond memories of their stay at Morehead State, the Stewarts said that they remain "proud of MSU and its continued progress" in serving Eastern Kentucky.

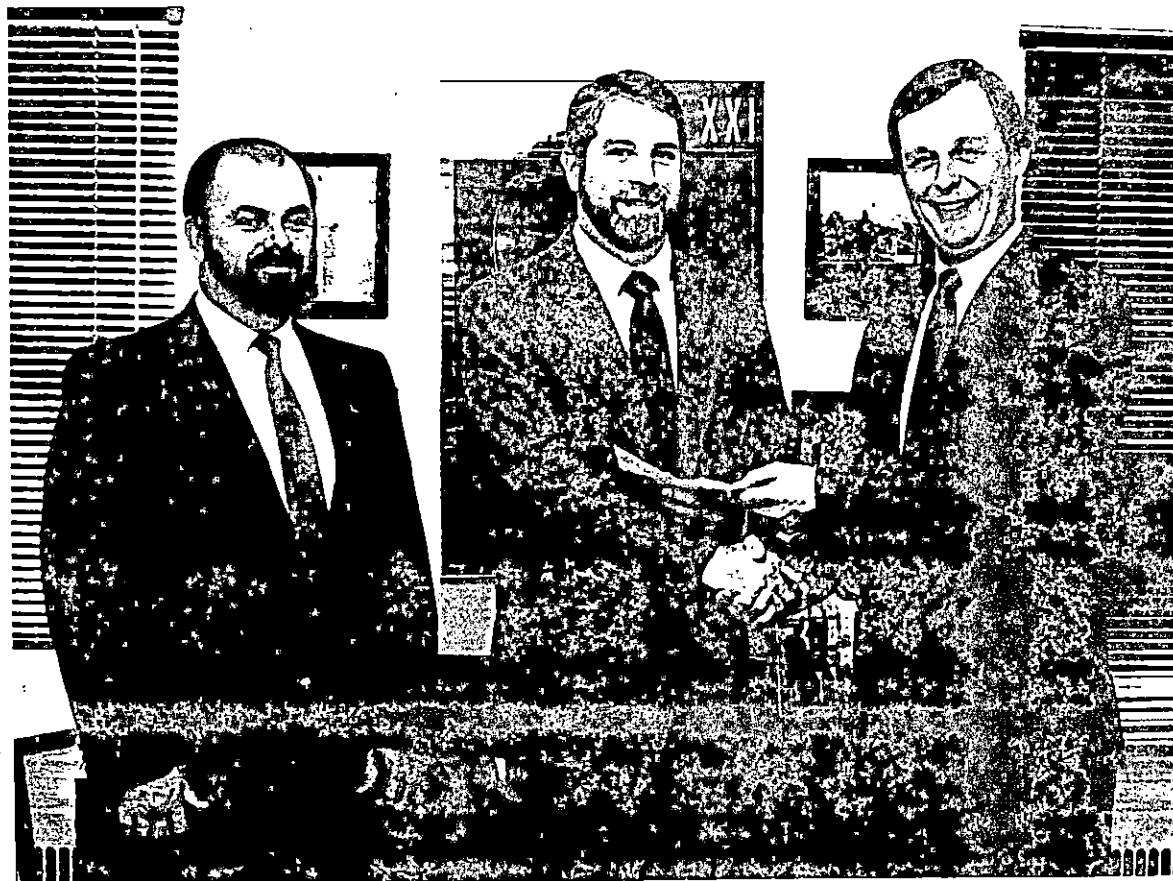

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Enrollment at Morehead State University continues to climb to new heights, according to preliminary figures for spring released by the University.

MSU's spring headcount enrollment is 8,087 as compared with 7,591 for spring 1990, representing a 6.6 percent increase.

In addition, the full-time student population is up 8.6 percent from last spring's total of 5,670. The number of students taking a full load of classes (12 or more credit hours) this spring is 6,155.

Describing the growth pattern as "phenomenal," MSU President C. Nelson Grote noted that the University's enrollment has been consistently increasing for the past five years.

Preliminary figures indicate enrollment gains in all undergraduate classes, with the largest increases at the junior and senior levels.

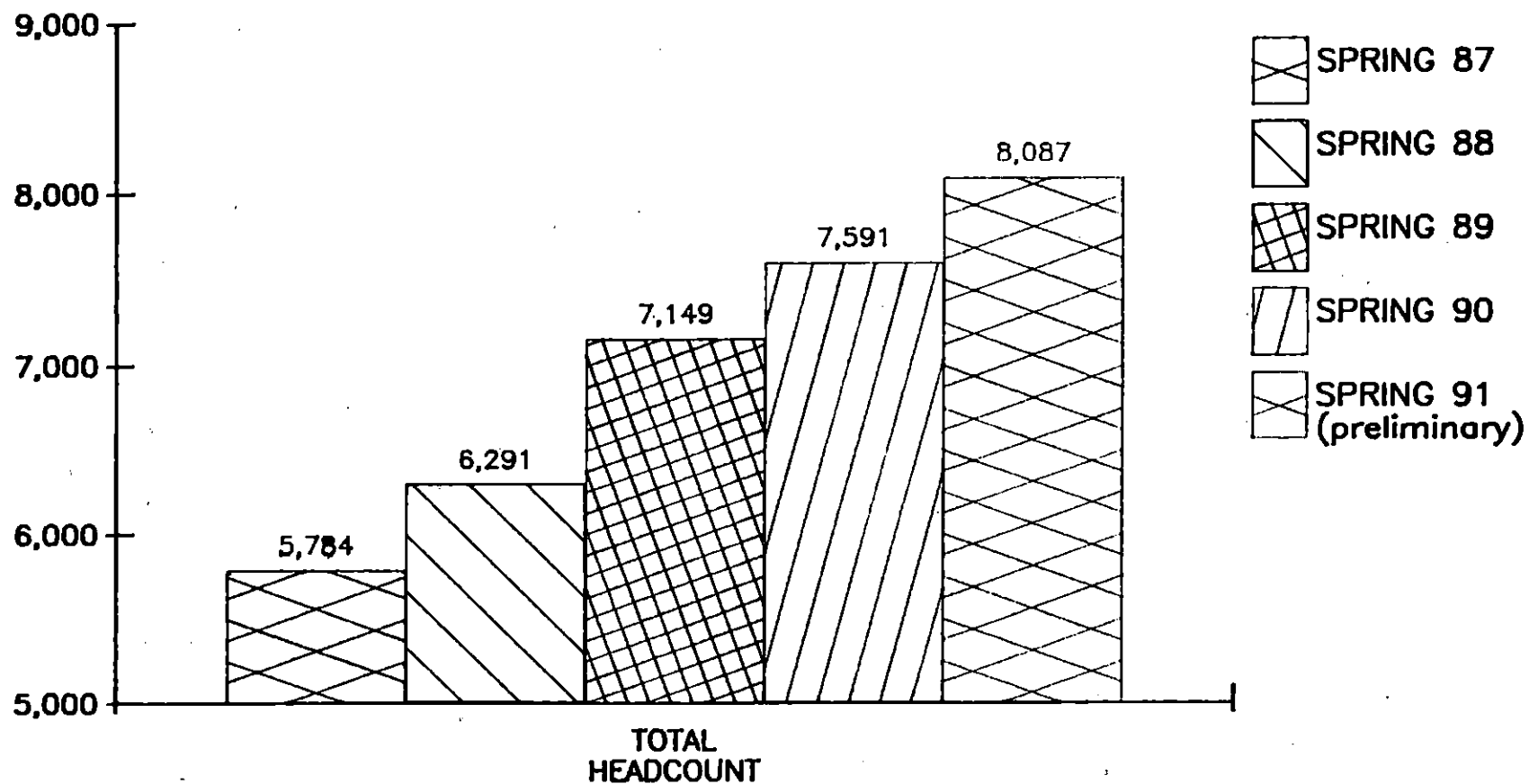

MOREHEAD, Ky.--A Morehead State University student whose information led to the apprehension of an individual for vandalism has become the first recipient in a reward program launched last fall to curb campus vandalism and false alarms.

The coed, who will not be identified, received a \$1,000 check for aiding in the arrest and conviction of a person who destroyed a residence hall smoke detector system, according to Richard Green, MSU's manager of public safety.

"In order for the program to be successful, there needs to be a certain amount of privacy for those who come forward with useful information," Green said.

The student was found guilty, sentenced to serve two days in jail with two years on probation, fined court costs and ordered to make restitution for the damages.

"We believe that the majority of our students are concerned about the lack of respect for public property demonstrated by others," Green said. "Their concern is being transformed into action as they refuse to look the other way in cases of vandalism and as they discourage the pulling of false fire alarms," the public safety manager added.

Green noted that students are becoming more aware that the cost of repairing vandalism ends up being passed on in the form of higher fees.

Last September, MSU mounted a campuswide "get tough" campaign against vandalism and false fire alarms. Posters were distributed offering rewards of up to \$1,000 for information leading to the arrest of individuals engaging in such acts. The University said it would prosecute to the fullest extent of the law the guilty parties.

Warning signs detailing the penalties for pulling false alarms were placed next to fire alarm pull stations as well. Under KRS 519.040, the penalty for falsely pulling a fire alarm or falsely reporting a fire is a fine of up to \$500 and/or a year in jail. Students found guilty also will be subject to immediate suspension from the University as indicated in the Student Conduct Code.

Those students found guilty of vandalism will be expected to pay for the damage and may face suspension as well.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University has established a new program to make payment of tuition and fees easier for students and their parents.

An installment payment plan is now available allowing payment of major college expenses for the coming year to be spread over 10 monthly installments.

"We're here to provide an education and we want to do what we can to help students in meeting the cost," said James Fluty, MSU controller.

The program consists of several basic plans which may include tuition, room, fees, and even an allowance for books, for both undergraduate and graduate students. Also, individual plans can be created to incorporate food plans and other assistance such as financial aid or scholarships.

Payments begin April 1 and end Jan. 1 to insure that there will be sufficient funds to cover both fall and spring semesters expenses.

There is a \$50 non-refundable fee to enroll in the plan, but if all payments are made according to the individual's plan, the student will receive a \$50 credit to be spent in the University Bookstore.

The program was begun during the 1990 spring semester and has proven to be quite successful this year, Fluty said. More than 100 students signed up for it and approximately 85 completed the 10-month plan, he said.

The sign-up deadline for the 1991-92 academic year is April 1 with the first payment, including the \$50 deposit, due at that time.

Other methods of payment MSU accepts are these credit cards: American Express, Visa, Discover and Master Charge.

MOREHEAD, Ky. --Cherokee Indian culture is the theme of a guest lecture to be presented at Morehead State University on Wednesday, March 6.

Hawk LittleJohn will speak on "Cherokee Culture, Past and Present" in Breckinridge Auditorium at 6 p.m. The program, which is free and open to the public, will conclude with a question and answer session.

Dr. John Kleber, MSU professor of history, will introduce the visiting speaker.

The lecture, sponsored by MSU's Department of Sociology, Social Work and Corrections and the Bethany House, is funded by a grant from the Kentucky Humanities Council.

LittleJohn lives at Prospect Hill, N.C., where he holds the title of elder traditional healer with the Cherokee Nation Eastern Band. In this position, which he has held for nearly 10 years, his main duty is to perform tribal ceremonies.

After being chosen by his tribe to be a healer, he received his training in established Indian fashion by living with seven teachers for 17 years. During this time, he learned to read and write in Cherokee formalistic style and two other dialects; the use of plants and herbs, both medicinal and utilitarian; conjuring (manipulating the physician within one's body); history and culture; the meaning of and how to perform ceremonies; diagnosis and treatment of disease, and how to make peace with the use of insight and thinking. This program of study was followed by three years in an internship relationship.

A faculty member at the University of North Carolina, he teaches a course on the Cherokee philosophy of healing at the medical school. He has been instructing a similar course for 12 years at other medical schools in the U.S., including Johns Hopkins University.

On his farm in North Carolina, LittleJohn experiments with integrating traditional Cherokee farming and innovative, ecologically-sound small farming techniques which exclude pesticides and chemicals. He also has a woodworking shop where he makes traditional Cherokee flutes for sale. One of his flutes is on display in the Smithsonian Institute.

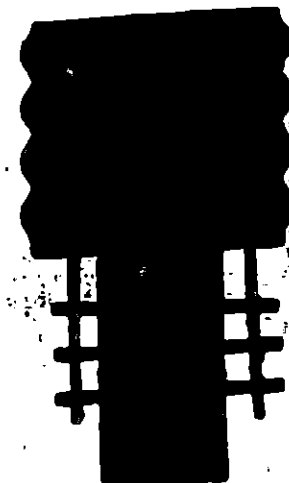
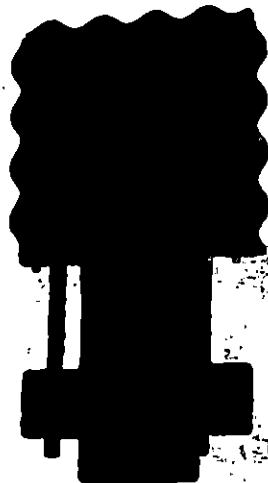

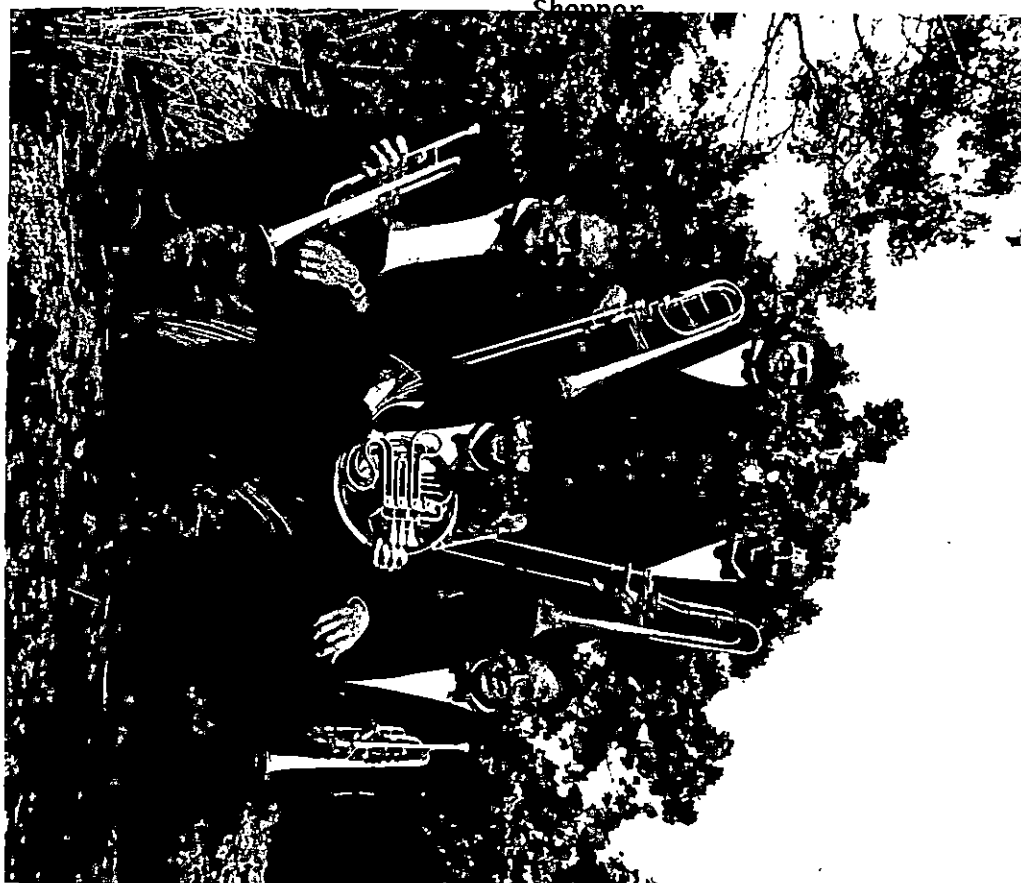

"Last year, MSU collected more than 16,000 pounds of recyclable paper during a pilot program involving four sites," said Deborah Clinger, recycling specialist with the Office of Occupational Health and Safety.

"The enthusiasm of participating employees demonstrated that there is widespread campus interest in recycling and concern for environmental problems," Clinger said.

Desk top containers for paper are being distributed to faculty and staff members and collection containers for paper and aluminum cans will be placed in 19 buildings. Letters also are going out to faculty and staff with details on the types of waste paper that can be recycled at this time and the locations of the building collection containers.

Still needed are volunteers to serve as building project leaders whose role will be to transfer recyclables from the buildings to nearby collection points outside where they will be picked up after 2 p.m. on the following schedule:

Paper--Tuesdays and Thursdays; Cans--Mondays through Fridays.

Anyone interested in being a building project leader should call Clinger at extension 2007.

Buildings targeted for the recycling effort include ADUC, Allie Young, Alumni Center, Baird, Breckinridge, Camden-Carroll Library, Cassity, Claypool-Young, Combs, Downing, Ginger, Howell-McDowell, Lappin, Laughlin, Mays, Palmer Development House, Rader, Reed and WMKY.

Most office paper--copier paper, bond and other--is recyclable as is all computer paper, according to Clinger.

"At the moment, there is no nearby market for newspapers, but the University is researching possible markets for them," she said.

"It is important that all of us become more concerned about the environment before it is too late. There are 78 state landfills and half of these face closure within the next two years as a result of new regulations," she explained.

Recycling paper slows the demands on our forest resources and up to 64 percent less energy is needed to produce paper from waste paper. Studies show that on the average an office worker throws away each day about a half pound of paper. At MSU that translates into 52 tons of waste paper over a one year period.

Every ton of recycled paper saves 17 trees and 7,000 gallons of water, according to statistics from the state Natural Resources and Environmental Cabinet's Division of Waste Management.
