MOREHEAD, Ky.-----The Morehead State University Board of Regents Friday (March 1) took the first step to identify a successor to the current president, Dr. C. Nelson Grote, with the appointment of a presidential search committee.

Dr. Grote, the University's 11th president, announced last spring that he would retire when his current contract expires next year on June 30, 1992.

Appointed to the committee by William R. Seaton, board chairman, were the following regents: Wayne Martin who will serve as temporary chairman, William Cofield, Charles Wheeler, Dr. Alban Wheeler and student regent Chris Hart or his successor. Also named were Mrs. Madge Baird of Pikeville and, by virtue of their offices, Ted Coakley, MSU Alumni Association president; Dr. Robert Lindahl, Faculty Senate chair, and Teresia Parker, Staff Congress chair.

Seaton told the committee it was free to organize and structure itself as it sees fit. He also asked that the committee conduct some of its meetings in representative cities, involving local alumni chapter presidents and others to allow for input from as many people as possible.

The committee will meet soon to develop search procedures and criteria for selecting Dr. Grote's successor as well as a timetable, Seaton said.

At the outset of the meeting, the board reelected its current officers: Seaton, chair; Jerry F. Howell Sr., vice chairman; Porter Dailey, treasurer, and Carol Johnson, secretary.

In other business during its regular quarterly meeting, the board approved the 1991-92 fee schedule which includes the tuition increases established earlier by the Council on Higher Education; a \$20 per semester increase in the student activity and services fee; increases ranging from \$60 to \$100 per semester in residence hall room rates, and increases in various registration-related fees.

President Grote advised the regents that preliminary design estimates by the architect/engineer for the Lappin Hall renovation project had exceeded the 1990 General Assembly's appropriation of \$5 million. As a result the University is looking at alternatives to the plan, including phased construction.

The regents also approved the granting of tenure, effective with the 1991-92 academic year, to six faculty members; four fall 1991 sabbatical leaves; one spring 1992 sabbatical leave, and one educational leave.

The board's next meeting is set for Friday, May 17.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--A foreign correspondent, a political psychologist and a Middle East expert from the U.S. Department of State will be the panelists for a Middle East symposium to be conducted at Morehead State University on Tuesday, March 12.

Speakers will include Robert Rosenthal, foreign editor of the Philadelphia Inquirer; Dr. William F. Stone, political psychologist, and Susan Keogh-Fisher, representing the U.S. Department of State.

Al Smith, producer and moderator of KET's "Comment on Kentucky," will moderate the free, public program, "Understanding the Middle East Crisis: A Symposium," set for 7 p.m. in Button Auditorium.

Rosenthal will set the stage by providing an overview of the Middle East crisis, while Dr. Stone and Keogh-Fisher will comment from their professional perspectives, followed by a question and answer period.

"While much of the current military conflict in the Persian Gulf may be resolved before March 12, the Middle East undoubtedly will continue to be a trouble spot in the future," said Abraham P. Immelman, MSU assistant professor of psychology and a member of the symposium steering committee. "The issues are many and varied and it is imperative that we gain an understanding of the political, cultural and sociological implications."

In his current post since 1986, Rosenthal covered the Israeli invasion of Lebanon in 1982 and later spent three months in Beirut as a foreign correspondent. As the Inquirer's Africa correspondent for four years, he received several awards for his coverage, including the National Sigma Delta Chi award for distinguished foreign correspondence, and was a Pulitzer Prize finalist in 1986 for international reporting.

A graduate of the University of Vermont, Rosenthal as foreign editor coordinates the work of the Inquirer's foreign correspondents and is responsible for all of the newspaper's international coverage.

Dr. Stone, a member of the University of Maine's psychology faculty, co-authored "The Psychology of Politics" which is in its second edition and was translated into Chinese. He also is co-author of another book to be published later this year, "Strength and Weakness: The Authoritarian Personality Today."

An internationally respected political psychologist, Dr. Stone has been a visiting scholar at Duke University as well as a Senior Fulbright Lecturer and visiting professor at the University of Oslo. He serves on the editorial board for the journal, Political Psychology, and is an assessing editor of the Journal of Mind and Behavior.

Smith, the current chairman of Leadership Kentucky, has hosted the "Comment on Kentucky," KET's program on politics and government since 1974. Earlier this year, he became the host of a statewide radio network talk show for older Kentuckians, "A-OK Prime Line." A former newspaper editor/publisher, he was chairman of the Kentucky Press Association when the open meeting law was enacted.

A former chairman of the Kentucky Arts Commission, Smith was instrumental in the creation of Leadership Kentucky, the Governor's Scholars Program and Forward in the Fifth. Chairman of the Shakertown Roundtable, he served on the Council on Higher Education for five years.

During the day, several of the guest speakers will meet informally with various classes and faculty members to share their insights on the Middle East.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---A musical set in the last months of the Civil War, "Banjo Reb and the Blue Ghost," will be presented Thursday, March 14, at 8 p.m. in Button Auditorium as part of the Arts in Morehead (AIM) 1990-91 season.

Admission will be by season ticket or individual tickets available at the door at \$6 for adults and \$3 for non-MSU students. MSU students with valid ID cards will be admitted free.

(AIM is a cooperative effort of the University and the Morehead/Rowan County Arts Council.)

The production stars David Holt, host of The Nashville Network series "Celebration Express," and William Mooney, who starred for many years as Paul Martin in the ABC daytime drama "All My Children," in the title roles. Written by Holt and Mooney, the show is directed by Clarke Gordon.

"Banjo Reb and the Blue Ghost" features traditional tunes as well as several original works. It takes place two months before the end of the Civil War, about 25 miles east of Appomattox. The title roles are based on historical characters and although they never met, the rest of the play is historically correct.

The story opens with both a southern cavalry officer and a Yankee vagabond taking shelter from the cold in a dilapidated shed. Out of this encounter comes a wealth of traditional songs, earthy humor and some gruesomely funny tales of the war as the two enemies find a neutral ground through their love of music.

Holt, who plays "Banjo Reb," is also known as host of TNN's "Fire on the Mountain" and the PBS "Folkways" series. He has appeared frequently on "Hee Haw," "Nashville Now" and the "Grand Ole Opry." He is a three-time winner of the FRETs magazine reader's poll for "Best Old-Time Banjoist."

Mooney, who appears as the "Blue Ghost," was nominated twice for an Emmy for his AMC role and has performed on and off-Broadway. His film credits include "Second Sight," "Network" and "C.A.T. Squad." He has toured throughout America and Europe with one-man shows and has appeared on the "Today Show" as well as the "Tonight Show."

"The exchange provides our students with a marvelous opportunity to experience a very different educational system," said Blair. "They also will be sharing some of things which we do in this country that could be adapted into the British system."

While student teaching, the coeds will be provided room and board through the polytechnic school. At the end of the 12-week practicum, they will have two weeks to tour the region, said Blair, who spent five weeks last summer visiting the potential teaching sites in preparation for the exchange program.

MSU is only the second of the state's regional universities to take advantage of the British Education Exchange Program, Blair said.

"MSU's participation in this international consortium is especially timely in view of the state's Education Reform Act," said Dr. Judy Rogers, dean of undergraduate programs.

"British schools already have a nongraded primary system, an integrated curriculum and a very different scale of evaluations. Currently British educators are moving toward a national curriculum and standardized testing, Dr. Rogers added.

"They already have in place many of the approaches that Kentucky is implementing," she said.

Located three hours north of London, Sunderland has several ties to the United States. It is the location of the ancestral home of George Washington's family and President Ulysses Grant was present when the public library's foundation stone was laid.

Sunderland Polytechnic is a comprehensive teaching and research institution with a student body of approximately 7,000. In addition to students from Morehead State and Murray State Universities, SP's enrollment includes students from Virginia Commonwealth University, Washington State University, Texas Lutheran University, Towson State University and several other American schools.

In the Universal Cheerleaders Association sponsored competition, MSU will face opposition from five other finalist groups: James Madison University, George Mason University, University of North Carolina-Wilmington, Wright State University, and the University of Alabama-Birmingham.

"The group has worked hard and we are certainly pleased to be invited to compete," said Myron Doan, assistant dean of students and squad adviser. "MSU qualified by submitting a videotape of a cheer, sideline, and fight song routine," he said.

Members of the 1990-91 squad are Karis Cooper, Morehead sophomore; Brad Ross, Morehead junior; Michele Fannin, Van Lear senior; Robert Eskridge, Phelps junior; Pam Franklin, Paris junior; Tony Rutledge, Robards junior; Kandi Johnson, Catlettsburg junior; Wayne Bowman, Hillsboro, Ohio, sophomore; Dan Gillenwater, Columbus, Ohio, junior; Candi Brown, Clearfield junior; Mike Cooper, Mt. Olivet freshman; Stacy Mercer, South Shore sophomore; Kris Holbrook, Morehead sophomore; Kelly Barcol, Covington sophomore, and Pare and Hignite.

The MSU squad won the Division I National Championship in 1988.

While the pressure will be on for the group competition, Pare believes when he and Hignite are performing will be equally as stressful. "The main thing is to keep thinking about the next move and make every effort not to lose your concentration," he said of the mental preparation he will do for the event. "But you can't think too far ahead," he added.

The invitation for the partner stunt rivalry came after the MSU duo submitted a tape of their routine. "The judges were looking for the most unique stunt," Pare said. He believes they were chosen because of the creativity and difficulty performed in the stunt sequence in one-minute, the act which they will repeat before the judges in San Antonio.

In addition to the regular practice with the squad--which is usually three times per week--the "two-some" have increased their practice sessions since January in preparation for this competition.

Pare, who was a newcomer to the squad last year, came to MSU to play football as a walk-on. When there was an opening to fill on the squad, fellow cheerleader Eskridge served as a mentor and encouraged him to try out. "From there, I was able to pick up the routines, and with Eskridge's help, I learned to do the stunts. Then, with the assistance of Kris (Holbrook), I practiced partner stunts and motions that would be necessary for the tryouts."

Hignite, a former Russell High School cheerleader, is "excited and anxious" that they have been selected. An MSU cheerleader for four years--one year with the women's team and three with the men's team--she has learned to perform under pressure.

Learning original routines is nothing new for Hignite, who has judged area tryouts, assisted cheerleaders at area high schools with choreography, and worked on the staff of UCA for four years. "After seeing the stunts performed at nationals last year, I knew I wanted to have the opportunity to give it a try," she said.

The partner's competition, now in its second year at the national level, will pit the MSU couple against students from Oklahoma State University, James Madison University, University of North Carolina at Wilmington, North Carolina State University, University of Texas and the University of Illinois.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Morehead State University's Folk Art collection received a major boost recently with the acquisition of another work by the late Edgar Tolson of Wolfe County.

The wood sculpture, entitled "Temptation," is from Tolson's Garden of Eden series, which he began in the late 1960s. The work was given to the MSU Foundation by a resident of Central Kentucky who wishes to remain anonymous.

"This is a major gift and certainly among the most important ones we have acquired," said Adrian Swain, MSU folk art curator. "By adding Tolson's works, we are increasing the credibility of our collection."

The piece has a market value of \$12,000, according to Swain.

Possibly the best known 20th century Kentucky folk artist, Tolson gave rise to what is known among folk art collectors as the Campton School, inspiring others to become folk sculptors.

With the addition of the latest sculpture, MSU's Folk Art collection now has two pieces by this internationally known artist. Last year, Dr. Paul Maddox of Campton gave Morehead State its first Tolson work.

Tolson's works are in numerous private and museum collections including the Museum of American Folk Art in New York, the Milwaukee Art Museum, and the National Museum of American Art in Washington, D.C.

"The year 1991 is a special window of opportunity for collectors of valuable art, rare books, historical documents and photographs, and scientific collections," said Bob Howerton, MSU's director of development. "For the first time in many years, and for 1991 only, owners of these valuable objects may make out-right gifts that qualify as charitable tax deductions at 100 percent of fair market value."

The chief executive officer and chairman of the board of Ashland Oil, Inc., will speak at the Founders Day Convocation and Awards Ceremony at 10:30 a.m. in Button Auditorium. Earlier this month, Hall was among several dignitaries who toured Kuwait City following the end of Operation Desert Storm.

Named president of Ashland Chemical Company in 1971, Hall was elected vice chairman of the board and chief operating officer in 1979. A former member of the board of directors of the Federal Reserve Bank of Cleveland, he currently serves on the board of directors of Reynolds Metals Company, the board of directors of Banc One Corporation, the board of curators of Transylvania University and the board of trust and Engineering School Committee of Visitors at Vanderbilt University.

Hall has received honorary degrees from Morehead State, Transylvania, Kentucky State, Northern Kentucky and Marshall Universities.

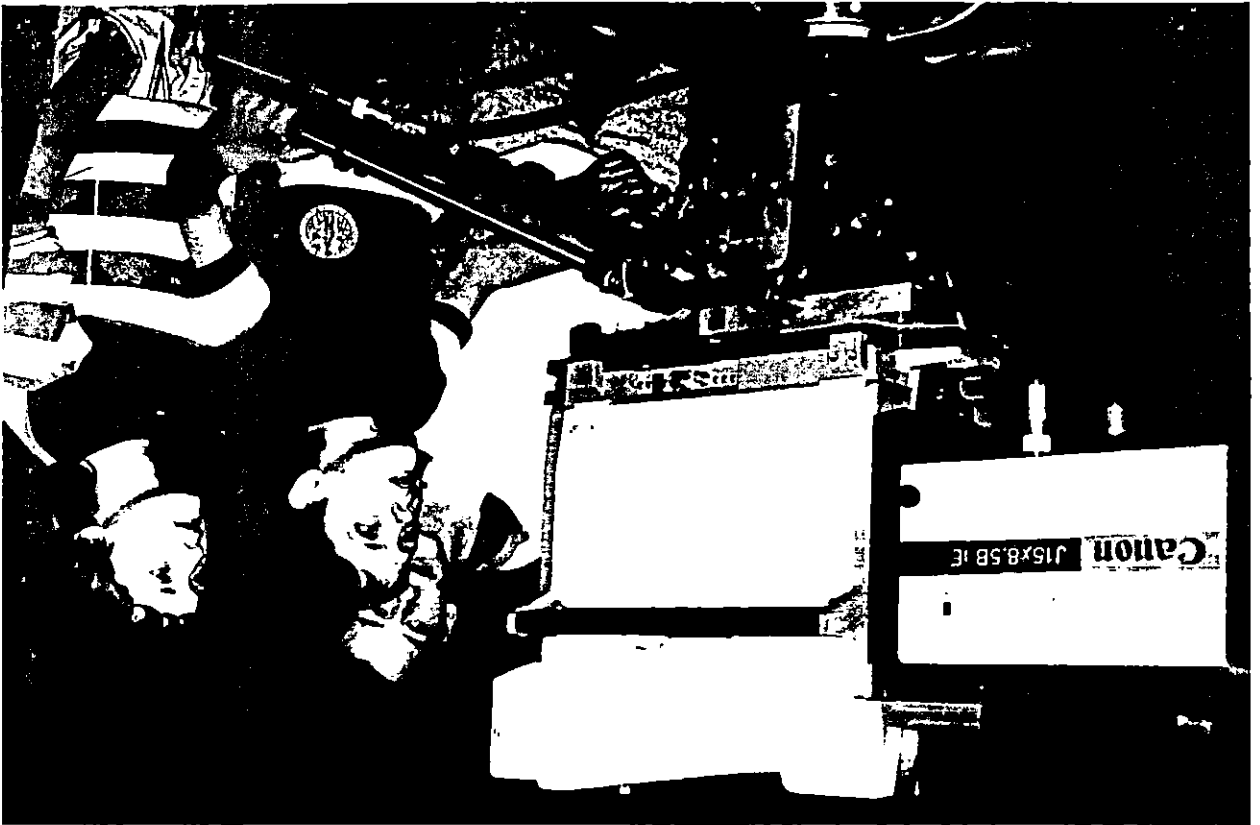
