MOREHEAD, Ky.---For the fourth consecutive year, Nicholas County High School students took top honors in the 28th Northeast Kentucky Regional Science Fair held Saturday, March 30, at Morehead State University.

NCHS seniors Robyn Anne Brookshire and Kimberly Denise Hardwick won first and second place respectively in the overall competition.

Brookshire's project "Induced Systemic Resistance of Cucumbers with Oxalate and Phosphate Solutions," earned her and NCHS science teacher, Kathy Green, an all-expense paid trip to the International Science and Engineering Fair in Orlando, Fla., May 5-11.

An exhibit on "Dietary Calcium and High Blood Pressure in the Spontaneously Hypertensive Rat" gave Hardwick second place in the competition.

Taking third place overall was Henry Roark III, a Fleming County High School senior, with "Mutation Rate of E. Coli in a 60 HZ Electromagnetic Field.

Fourth place went to Dawn Lam, a senior at Notre Dame Academy in Kenton County, for "Influence of Focus of Attention on the Perception of Letters in the Briefly Presented Words."

"Outstanding Teacher Awards" went to Rita Curtis of Fleming County High School, at the senior high level; Randy Sale of Southside Middle School in Bourbon County, at the junior high level, and Roger Cook of Tates Creek Elementary School in Lexington, at the elementary level.

Nearly 500 secondary and elementary students from approximately 150 schools in a 44-county area entered original science projects and exhibits in the competition, according to Ted Pack, MSU instructor of mathematics and coordinator for the fair.

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Brookshire's project "Induced Systemic Resistance of Cucumbers with Oxalate and Phosphate Solutions," earned her and NCHS science teacher, Kathy Green, an all-expense paid trip to the International Science and Engineering Fair in Orlando, Fla., May 5-11.

In addition, Brookshire placed first in senior high botany, earned the Best Biology Project Plaque, an honors certificate from the National Association of Biology Teachers and a U.S. Army Medallion.

Hardwick's "Dietary Calcium and High Blood Pressure in the Spontaneously Hypertensive Rat" earned her not only second place overall, but also first place in senior high zoology, an MSU Scholarship and a U.S. Navy Distinguished Achievement Certificate.

Other winners from Nicholas County High School were: **Andrea Starr Hall**, a senior, whose exhibit "Dietary Intervention Using Omega 3-Polyunsaturated Acids on Serum Cholesterol Levels, earned first place in senior high biochemistry;

Amy Lynn Simons, a senior, whose exhibit "A Comparative Study Dietary Restriction and Vitamin C Supplementation on Tumor," won first place in senior high medicine and health, and **April C. Herrington**, a junior, whose project "Purifying Formaldehyde Polluted Air By Use of Philadendron Oxycardium," placed third in senior high environmental sciences.

Nearly 500 secondary and elementary students from approximately 150 schools in a 44-county area entered original science projects and exhibits in the competition, according to Ted Pack, MSU instructor of mathematics and coordinator for the fair.

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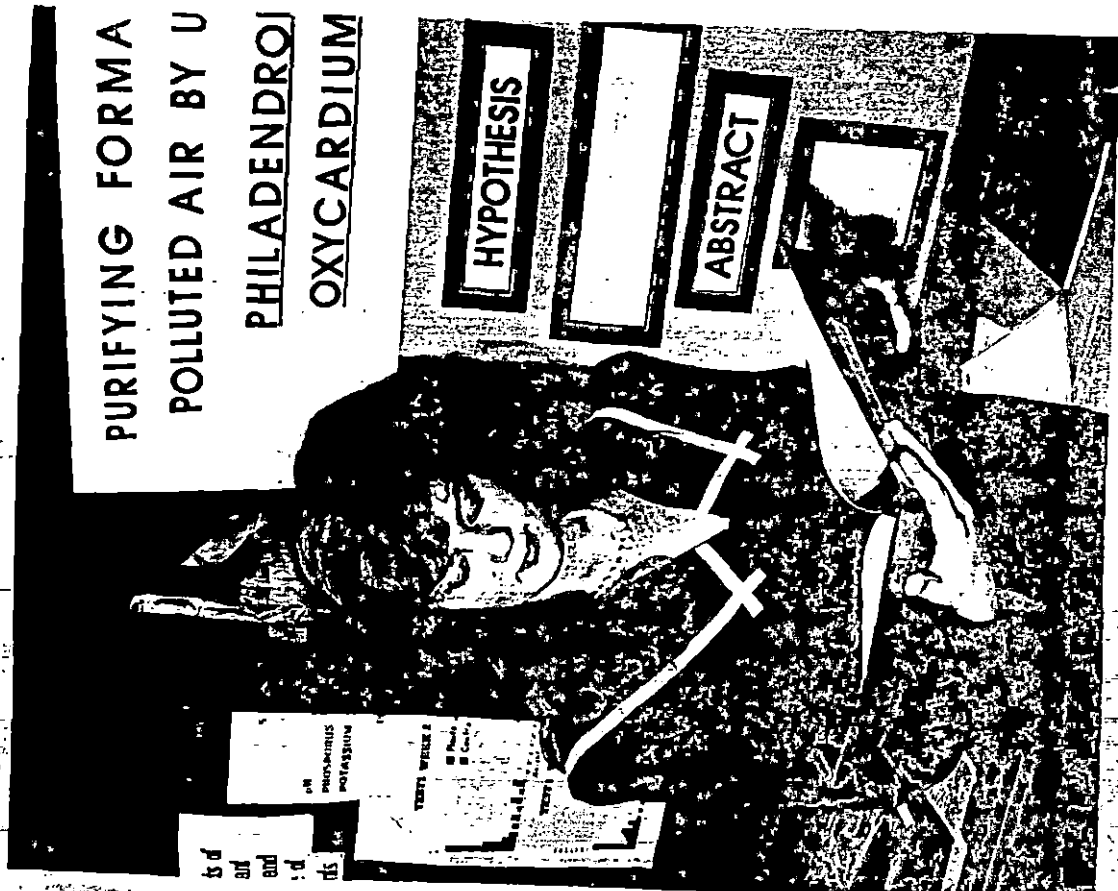

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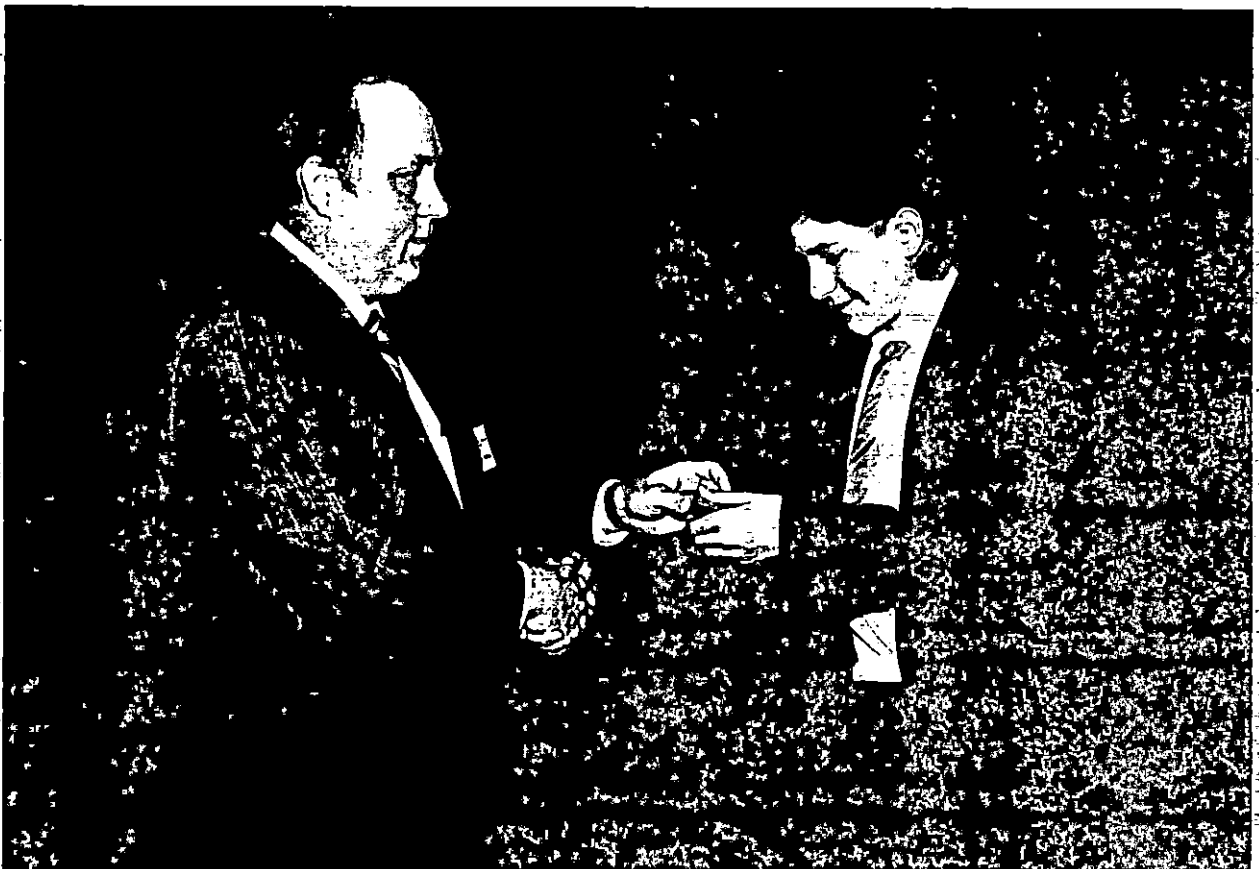

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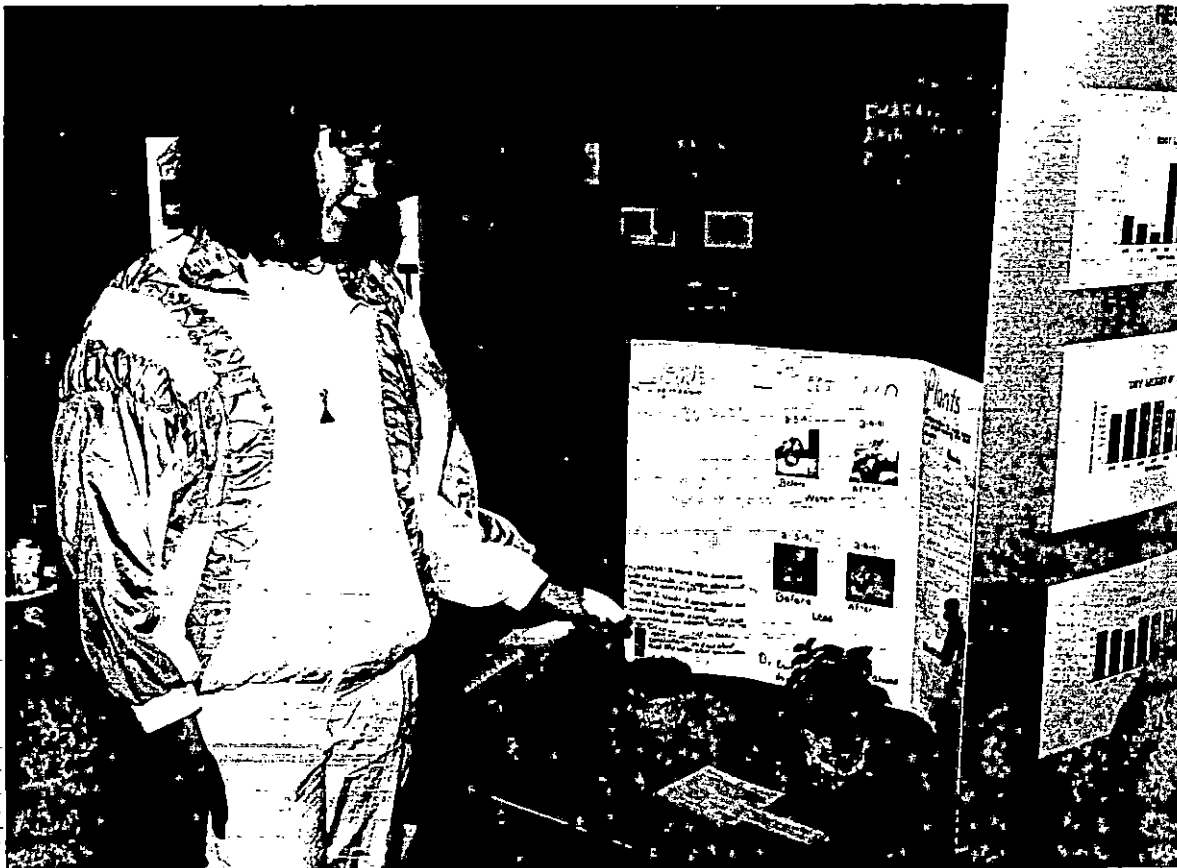

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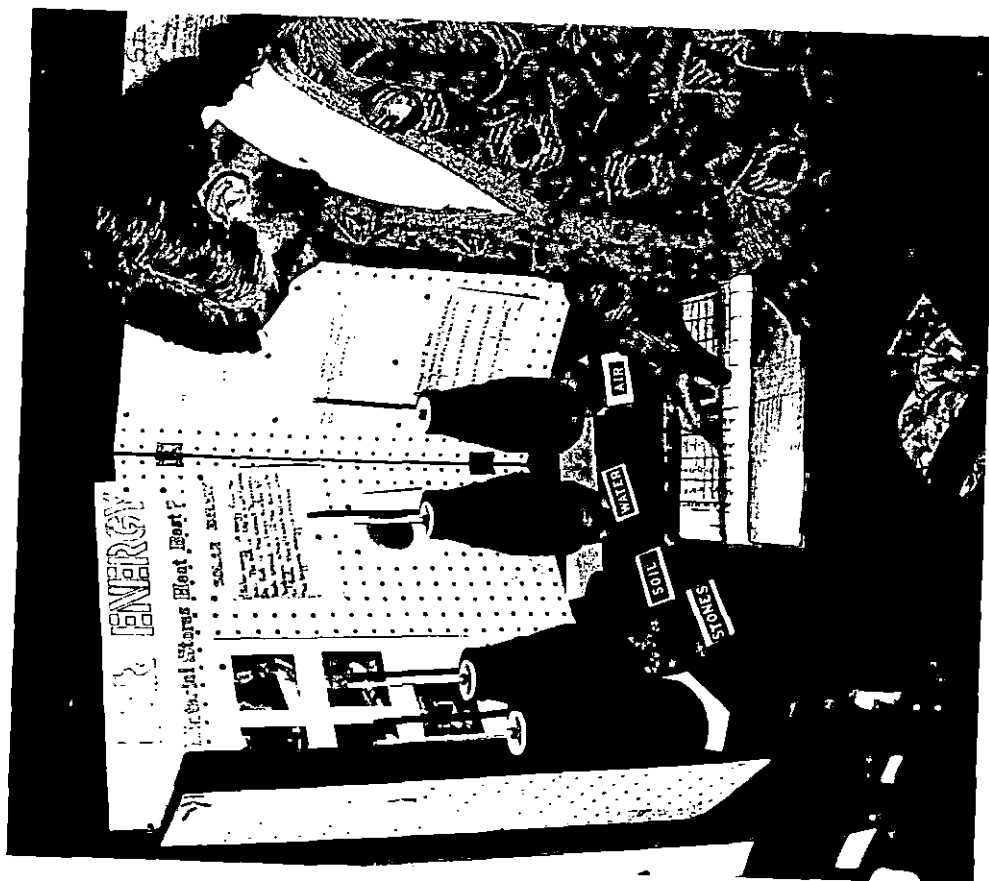

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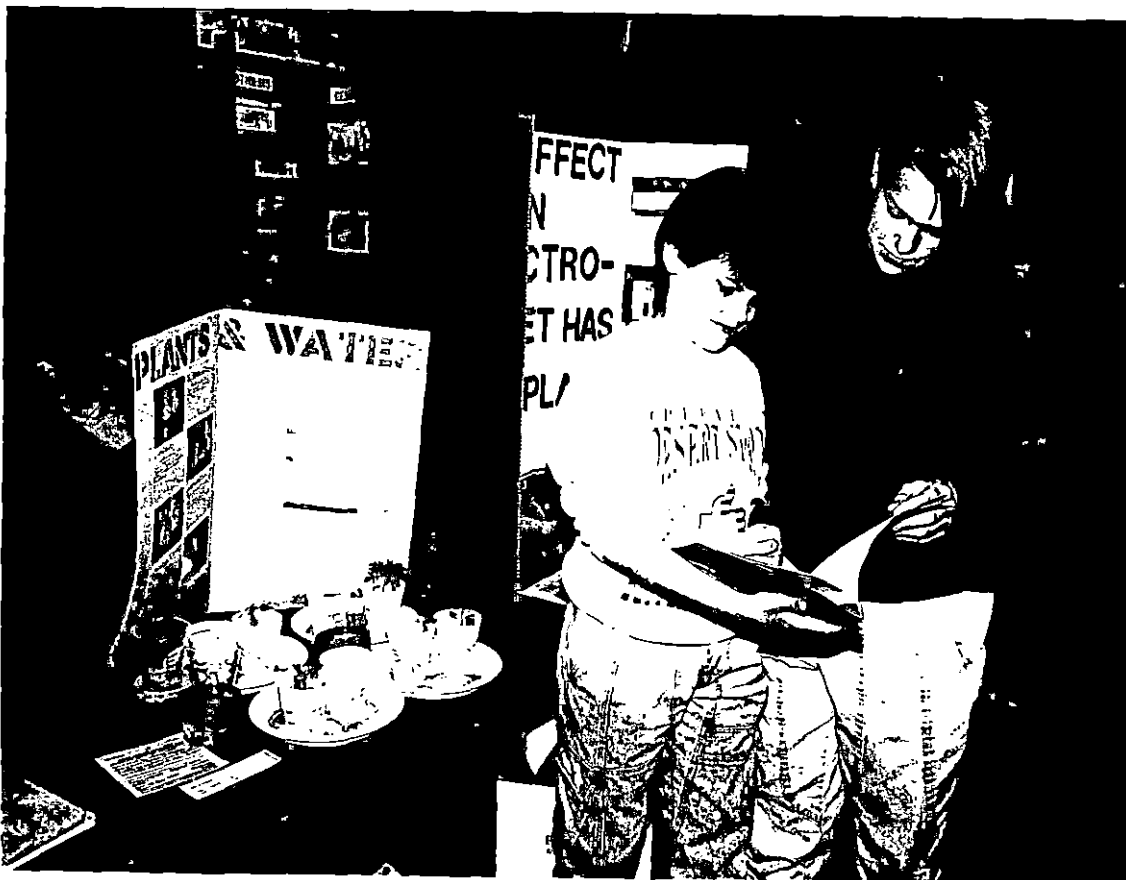

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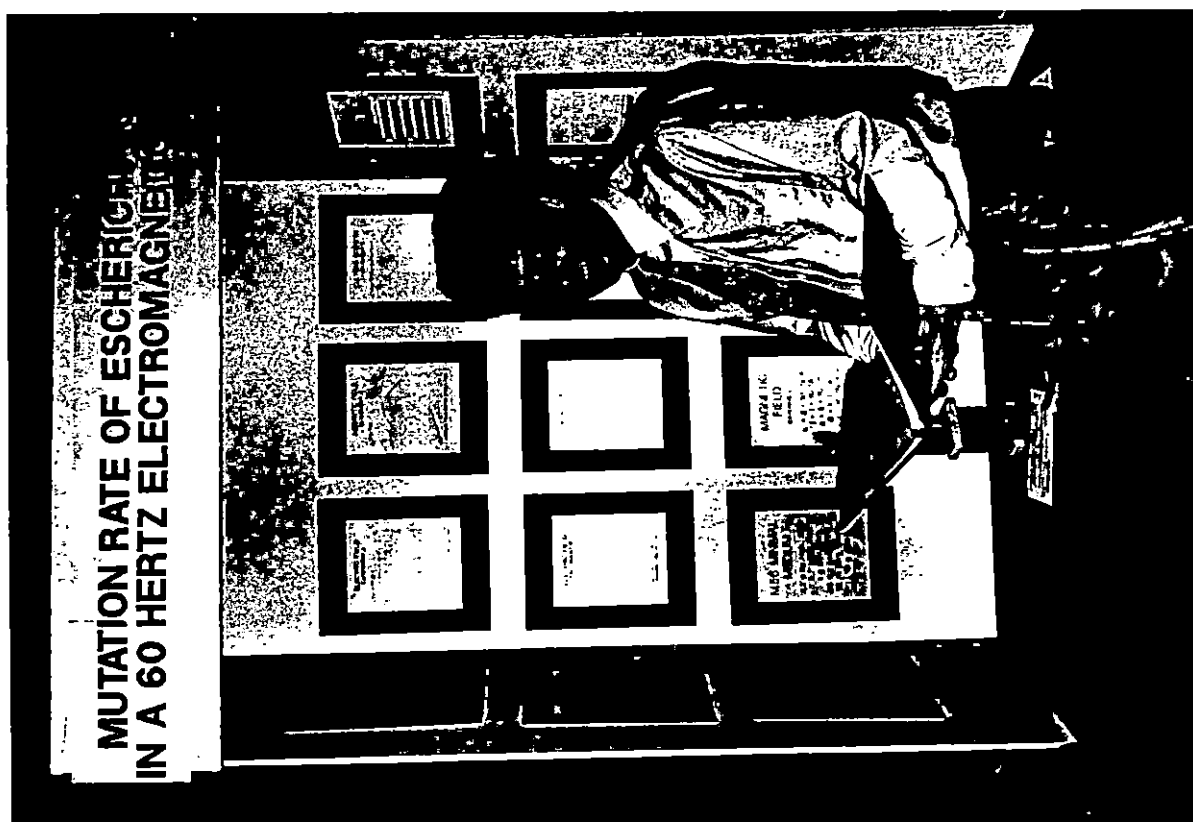

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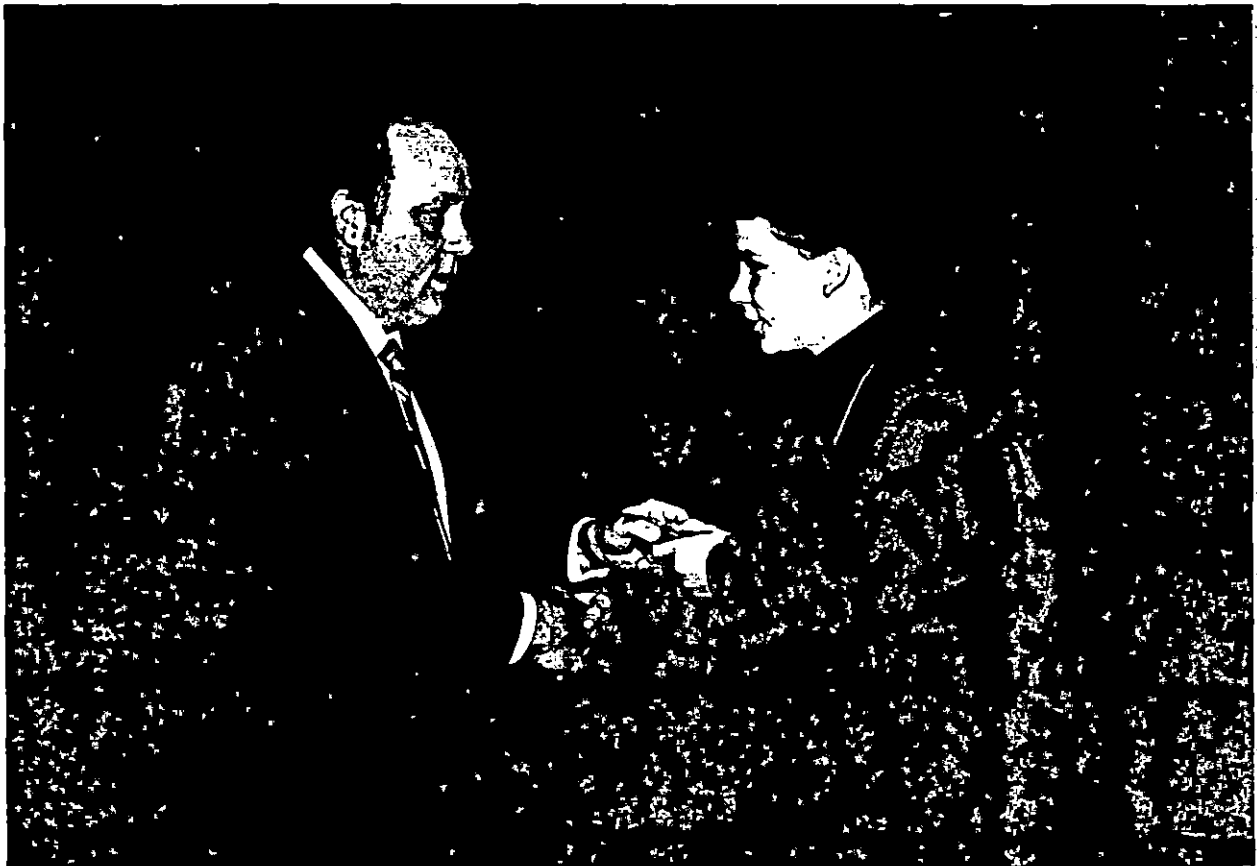

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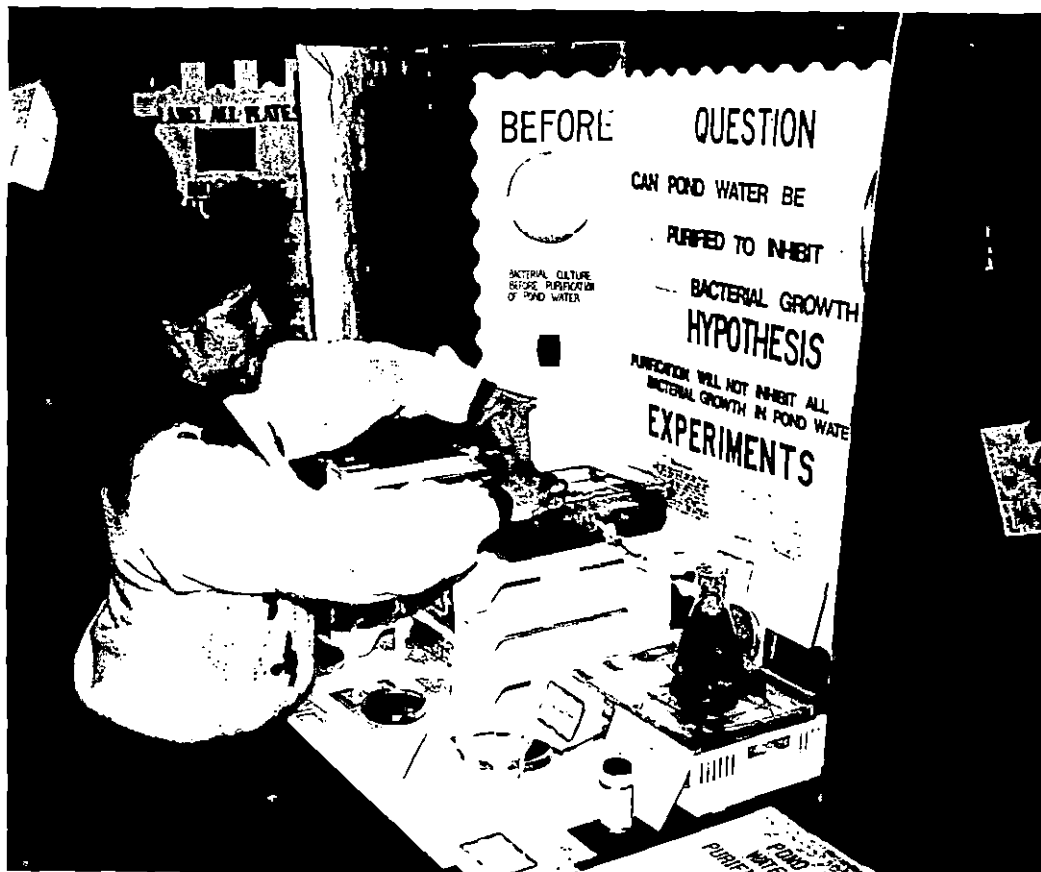

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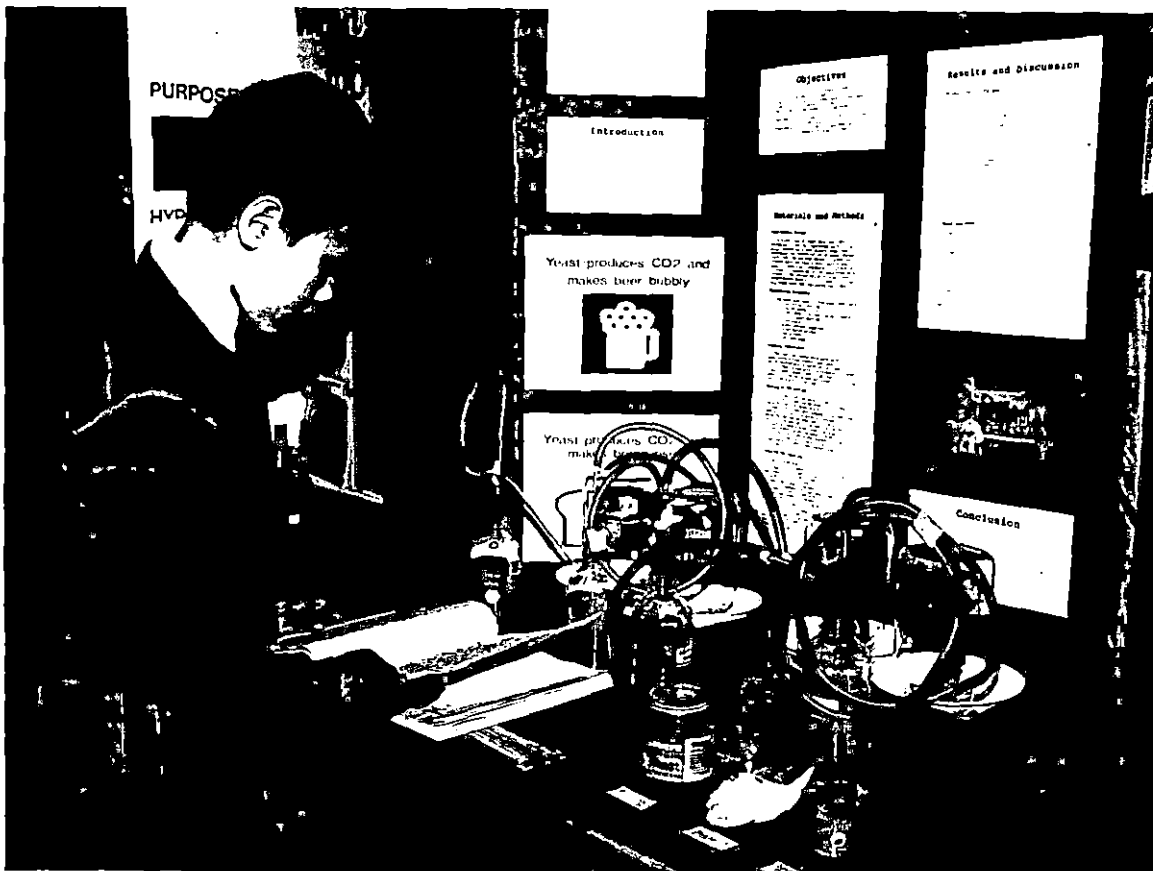

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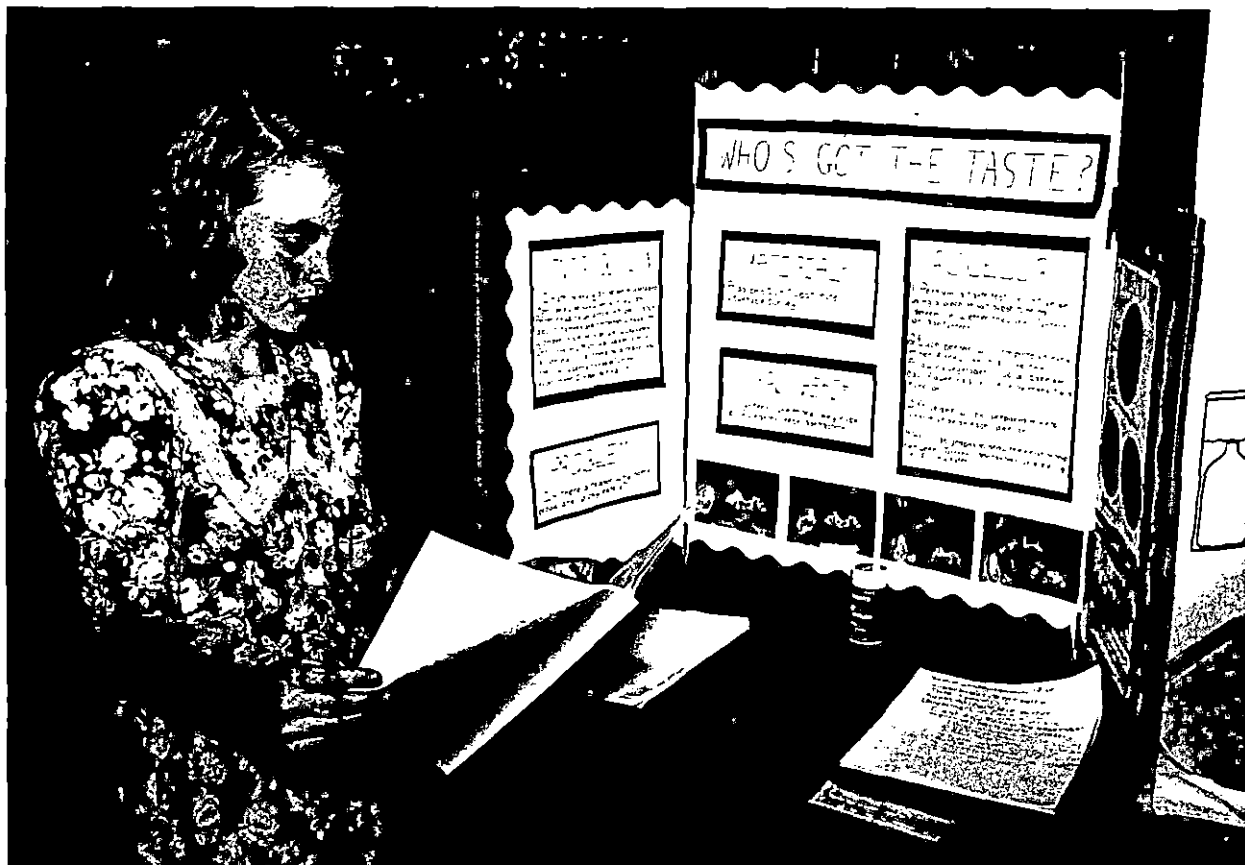

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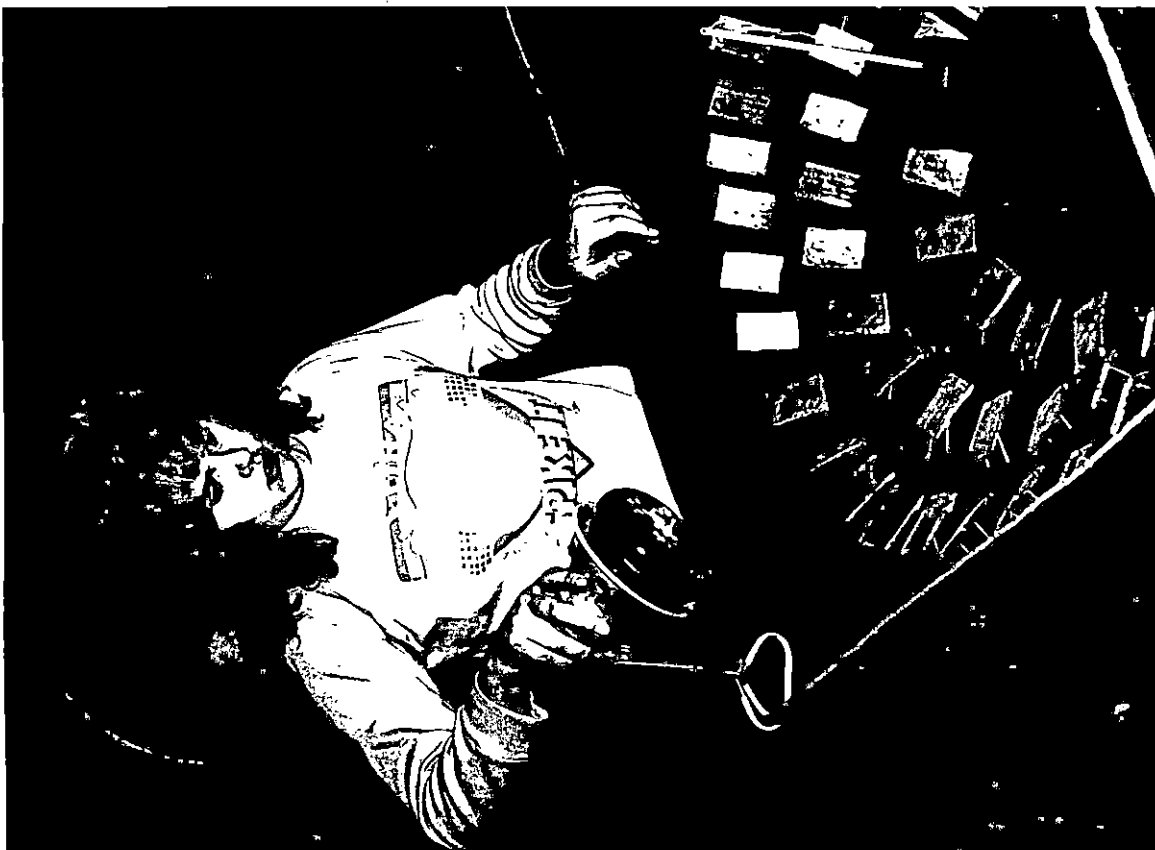

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Morehead State University's Presidential Search Committee will conduct a series of public meetings in the region and hire an executive search firm to help with the search process.

Dr. C. Nelson Grote, MSU's 11th president, announced last spring that he would retire when his contract expires on June 30, 1992.

Identifying "the best qualified president for this institution at this time" will be the number one priority of the committee, Wayne Martin, the committee chairman, told those attending a recent organizational meeting.

The scheduling of open forums in Eastern Kentucky communities to obtain public opinion on the qualities needed in the next president was proposed by Dr. Alban Wheeler, MSU's faculty regent and vice chairman of the search committee.

Areas tentatively targeted for such meetings between now and early June include Ashland, Maysville, Morehead, Mt. Sterling, Pikeville/Prestonsburg and Whitesburg/Hazard.

The committee also agreed to solicit requests for proposals from professional executive search firms and select one to guide it through the search process as soon as possible.

While the committee "will lead the search," Martin said that using consultants would help the committee expand its pool of potential candidates, help to assure confidentiality and assist in the preliminary screening of applicants.

The timetable for the search process, approved by the committee, sets an Oct. 4 deadline for applications and nominations. The committee expects to narrow the list of candidates to 20 by Nov. 1 and submit the names of six candidates to the Board of Regents by mid-December.

Dr. Grote's successor is expected to be named by the board by March 2 and will begin work July 1, 1992.

In addition to Martin and Dr. Wheeler, the committee members include William Cofield and Charles D. Wheeler, regents. Also on the committee by virtue of their positions are student regent Chris Hart or his successor; Ted Coakley, MSU Alumni Association president; Dr. Robert Lindahl, Faculty Senate chair, and Teresia Parker, Staff Congress chair. Mrs. Madge Walters Baird of Pikeville serves as a citizen-at-large.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University marked its 69th birthday as a state institution of higher education with the announcement of the largest single corporate gift in its history---\$750,000 from the Ashland Oil Foundation over a five-year period.

MSU President C. Nelson Grote announced the commitment from Ashland Oil at the 1991 Founders Day Convocation and Awards Ceremony on Friday, April 5, which featured Ashland Oil's chairman and chief executive officer, John R. Hall, as speaker.

Half of the gift will come as a challenge grant to be matched by MSU and that, Dr. Grote said, could raise the gift's total value to more than \$1 million.

Each year for the next five years, MSU will receive \$75,000 in unrestricted funds and will qualify for an additional \$75,000 by raising that same amount through new and increased gifts.

The first \$75,000 check from the unrestricted portion was presented to Dr. Grote by Dan Lacy, AOI's vice president for corporate communications at a luncheon following the convocation.

The money will be used for faculty/staff development, equipment, scholarships and faculty research. A portion of the gift will be used for MSU's efforts to advance educational reform in the region, which was the only stipulation placed on the gift.

The president also told those at the convocation that the University was launching a special fund raising campaign on campus to raise the first \$75,000 match with gifts from faculty, staff and retirees. Dr. John R. Duncan, professor of education, will head the campaign.

While his speech dealt primarily with the future of the Middle East and U.S. energy strategy for the 1990s and beyond, Hall began with words of praise for MSU.

He noted that Eastern Kentucky's people, business and school systems had depended upon Morehead State and its predecessors for more than a century to educate their children, provide businesses with talented people and train school teachers.

"And you have not let them down," said Hall. "Ashland Oil is proud to count more than 200 Morehead State graduates among our employees," he added.

The CEO of Kentucky's largest corporation shared some of his experiences during a recent visit to Kuwait in the aftermath of Operation Desert Storm which he made with a small group of government officials and business executives.

"There is no doubt in my mind that our government acted correctly in going to war to free Kuwait," he said.

Hall also said that the burning oil fields had left a lasting impression on him. Putting it into perspective, he said, "there are about six million barrels of oil going up in smoke every day in Kuwait. That's the equivalent of all of the oil produced in the continental United States every day."

Another ecological disaster wreaked by Saddam Hussein, the oil slick in the Persian Gulf, is four times larger than the Valdez slick was in Alaska, he said, adding that no one is quite sure how to handle this problem.

Hall outlined President Bush's national energy strategy which is designed to reduce dependence on foreign oil by increasing domestic oil production, encouraging conservation and increasing the use of alternative fuels.

Noting that coal is "America's energy ace in the hole," Hall said it had not played the role in the national energy picture because of environmental concerns.

"We believe the government should emphasize the need for more research and development into coal for both energy and industrial uses," Hall said.

As part of the celebration, MSU's Student Alumni Ambassadors delivered an 8-foot by 4-foot birthday card, carrying the signatures of hundreds of MSU students which were collected earlier in the week. The ambassadors handed blue and gold ribbons to the convocation-goers as they entered Button Auditorium and birthday cake as they left.

Founders Day also provided MSU the opportunity to recognize special contributions of others. Dr. Roscoe H. Playforth, retired dean of MSU's former School of Social Sciences, received the 1991 Founders Day Award for University Service from Board of Regents Chairman William R. Seaton during the convocation.

Honored at the noon luncheon as Outstanding Faculty/Staff Fund Raiser Award recipients were: Dr. Charles M. Derrickson, dean of the College of Applied Sciences and Technology; Dr. Richard L. Hunt, associate professor of chemistry, and Dr. Frank J. Spaniol, head baseball coach.

Also recognized were the newest members of the University's major giving program, the MSU Fellows, whose ranks now total 137 .

At the Alumni Awards Dinner, Wayne M. Martin, Lexington television executive, and M. Ray Allen of Clifton Forge, Va., were inducted into the Alumni Hall of Fame as distinguished graduates.

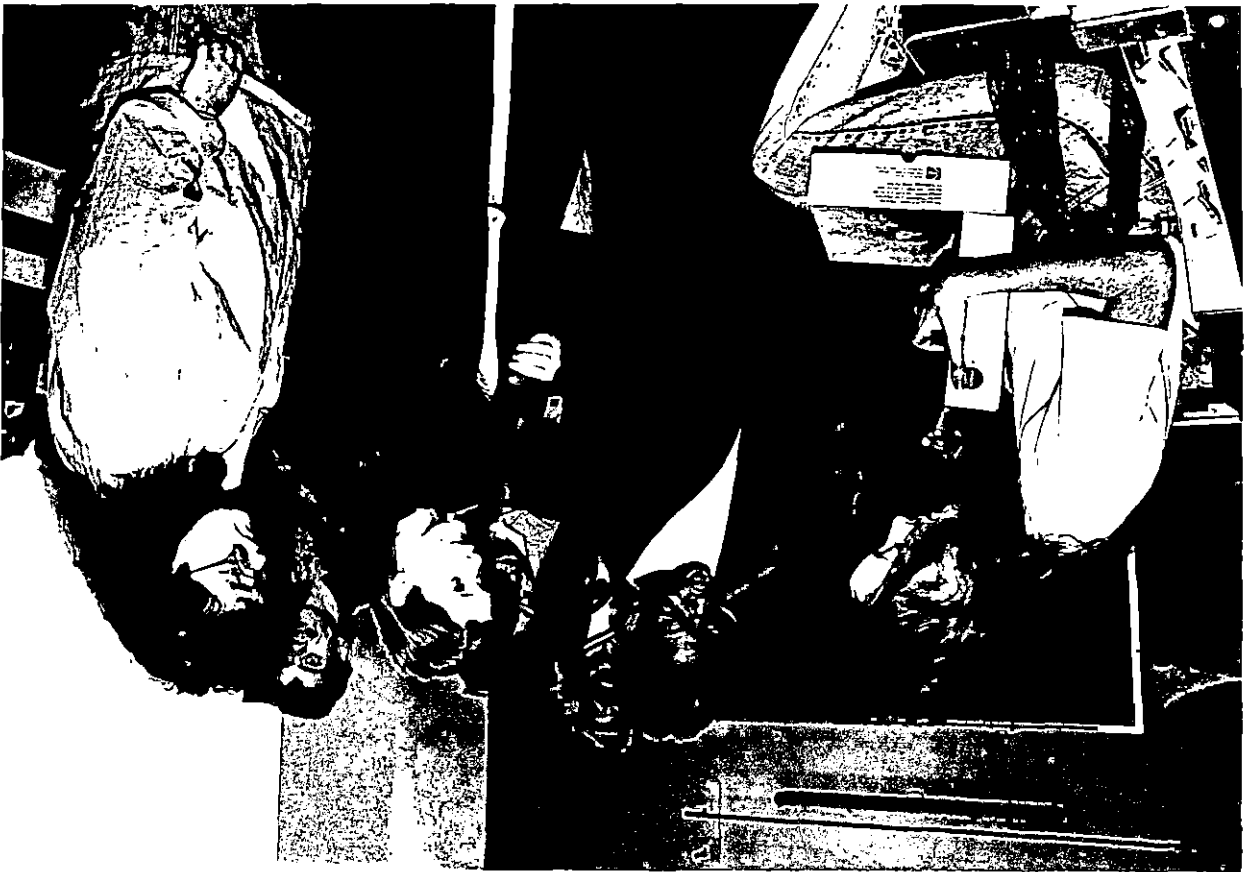

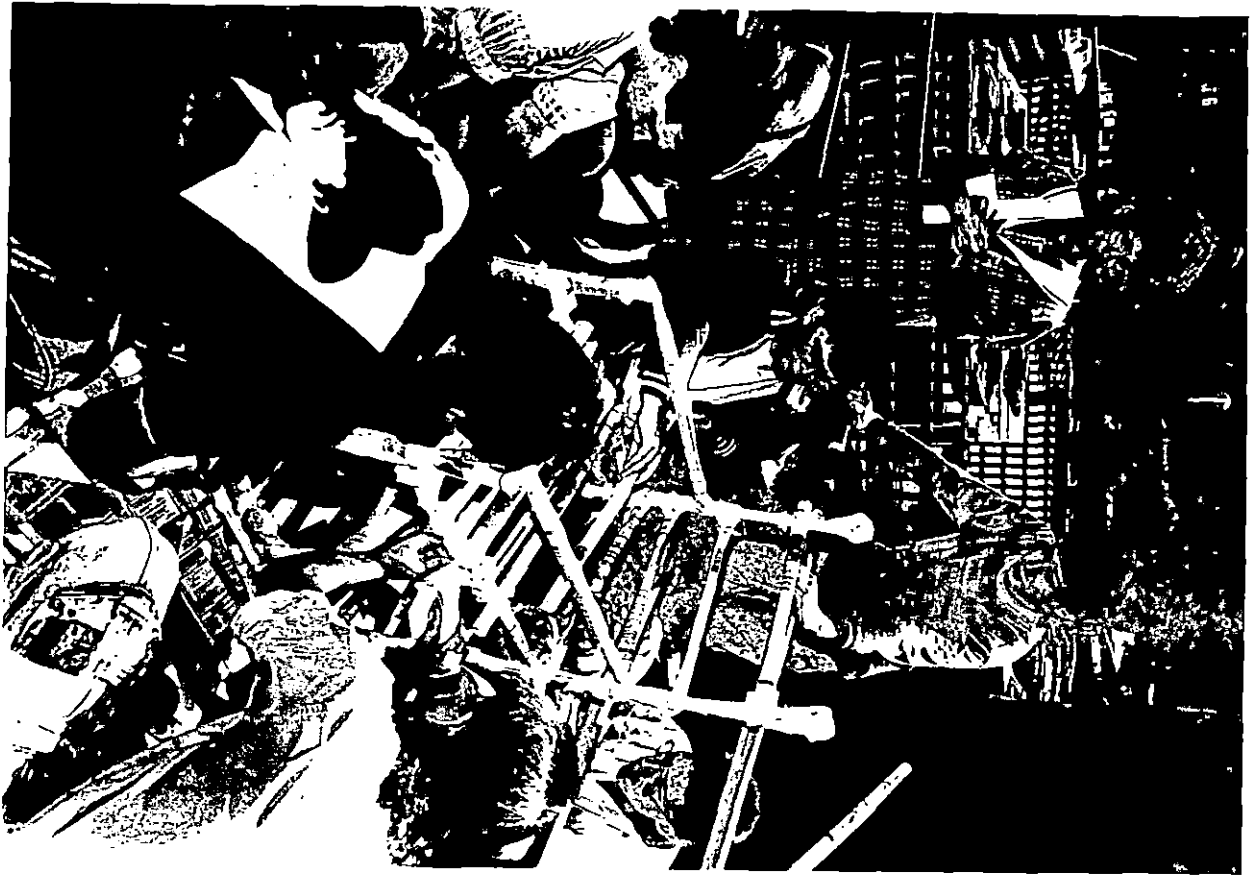

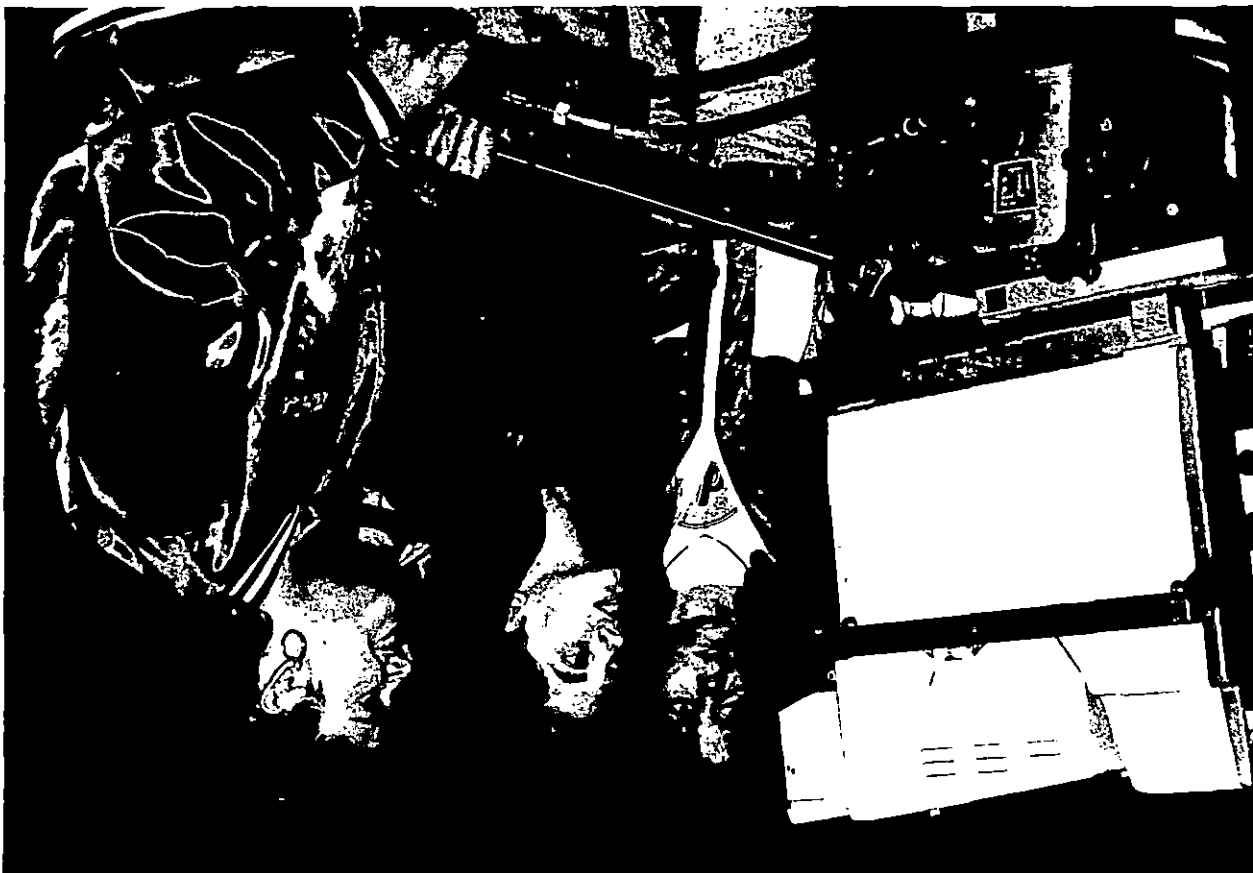

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Getting into medical school sometimes can be a long and difficult process, but apparently not for Morehead State University senior Wes Dunaway of Olive Hill.

Dunaway was accepted at both the University of Louisville School of Medicine and the University of Kentucky College of Medicine. A Dean's List student and former Governor's Scholar, Dunaway plans to enter U of L's school, where he has been awarded a \$3,000 per year, four-year scholarship.

U of L's School of Medicine received more than 1,300 applications for the fall 1991 class and accepted approximately 120 students, according to Dr. David J. Saxon, MSU professor of biology and adviser for the pre-med program.

"Wes was one of three students to receive this particular scholarship," Dr. Saxon said. "The young man is an outstanding student who does well in classes across the curriculum, not just in the sciences," he added.

In 1989, Dunaway completed a research project at UK, dealing with ion-selective electrodes. He not only presented his findings at a seminar at UK and at a Kentucky Academy of Science meeting, but also at one of the largest analytical chemistry conferences in the nation, the Pittsburgh Conference, which was held in New York.

Dunaway credits the project with giving him valuable career experience and with finalizing his career decision. "I was in the pre-med program, but at the time I was considering enrolling in a chemistry graduate program," Dunaway said. "After the project was completed, I decided that I'd rather go to medical school."

Described by others as a "hard worker with a sense of humor," Dunaway began zeroing in on a medical profession career while a junior at West Carter High School. "I really thought I wanted to study law, but after taking some science classes I knew what path I wanted to take," he said.

While the pre-medicine program doesn't leave him a great deal of spare time, Dunaway does find time to be active in Prae Medicorum, a club for pre-med students, and in Phi Kappa Phi interdisciplinary honor society.

But his activities include more than the academic side. Dunaway also coaches Rowan County Middle School's sixth grade basketball team and has coached fifth and sixth grade teams in the Morehead Youth League's basketball program, including an all-star team.

Dunaway, the son of Fred and Louise Dunaway, said that he does like sports, but that he gains a great deal of personal satisfaction from coaching and working with young people.

Dunaway doesn't seem to be too taken with his academic success. "I'm just a little bit above average, but I work a lot harder than some," he said.

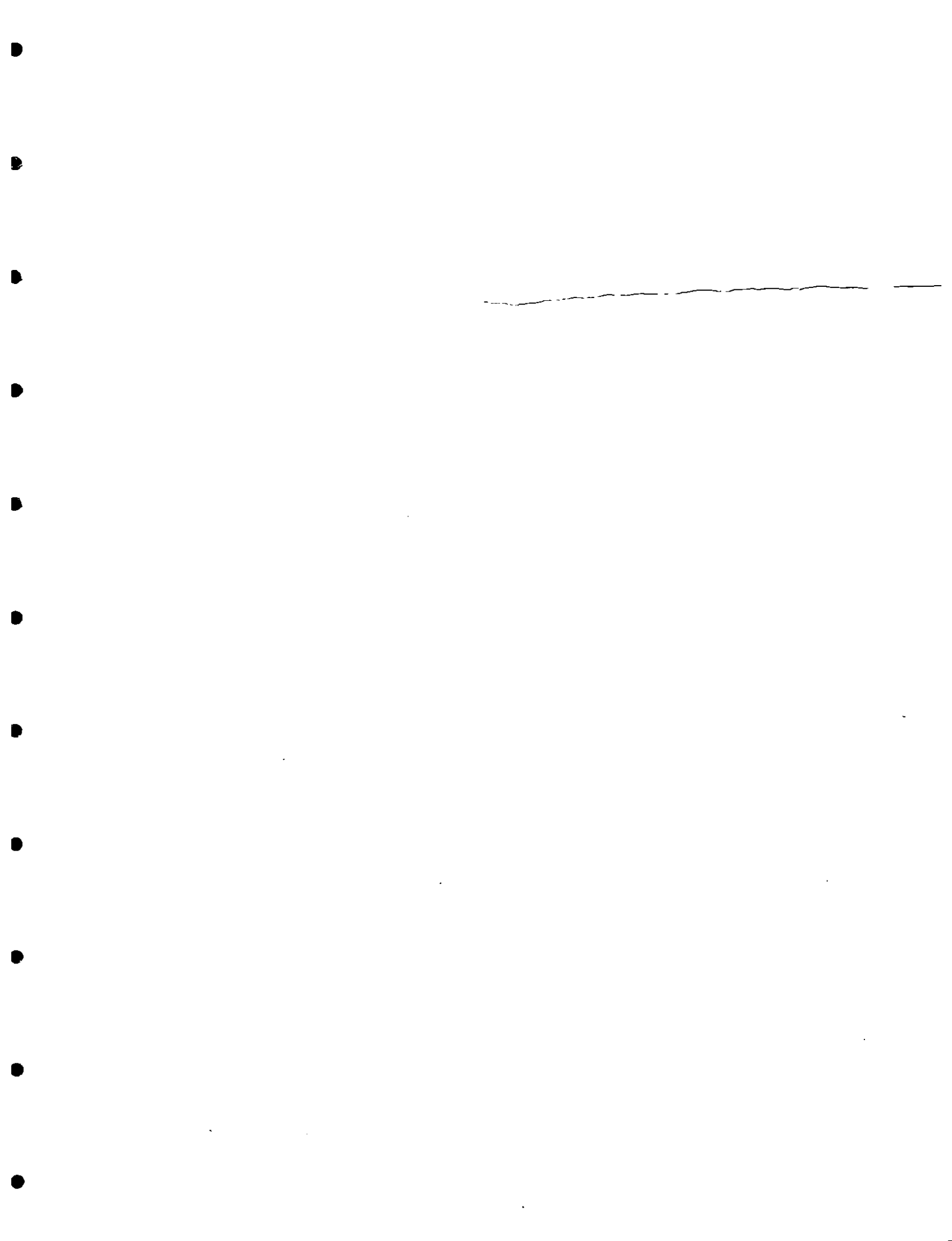

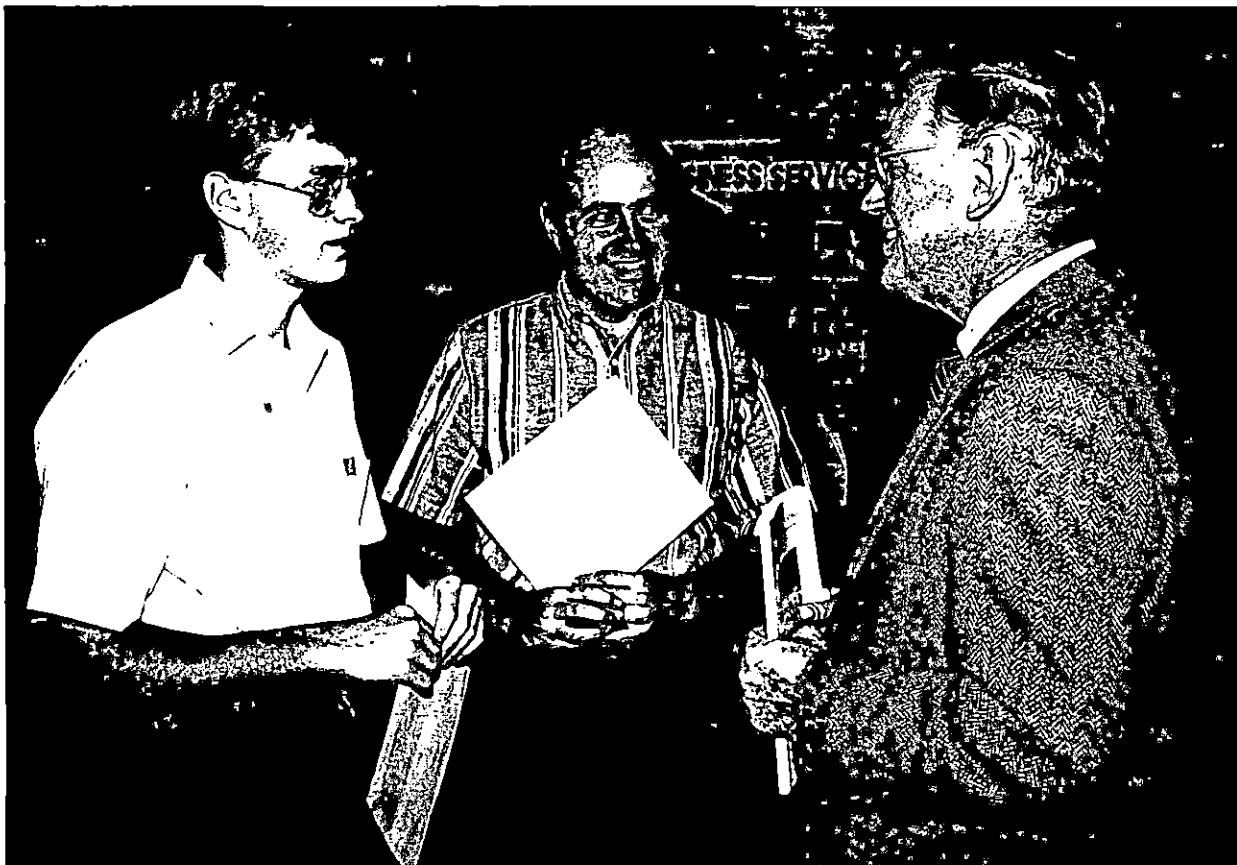

MOREHEAD, Ky.--A review session for the phlebotomy certification examination will be held Saturday, May 4, at 1 p.m. in East Room A of the Adron Doran University Center at Morehead State University.

The session will be conducted by the National Phlebotomy Science Certification Examiners from the registry board in Columbus, Ohio.

The phlebotomy certification examination also will be given in East Room A, ADUC, on Saturday, May 11, at 1 p.m.

The certification examination carries a \$75 testing fee. It is open to anyone interested in becoming certified as a phlebotomy technician.

Certification is a formalization of the educational training. It may make the technician a more valued employee and influence salary and promotion decisions, according to Sam Thompson, coordinator of MSU's Job Training Center.

While the three-hour review is not a requirement for taking the exam, it will be helpful to applicants preparing for certification, Thompson said.

Study review outlines will be provided for the test, which includes both written and practical sections.

Those taking the examination must have at least one year of experience in a phlebotomy science training program. Individual transcripts of test scores will be issued within three weeks after the examination.

Those passing the exam will receive a certificate, a wallet-sized certification card, and a lapel pin with the International Academy of Phlebotomy Sciences logo.

Fall 1990 and spring 1991 lab assistant students from MSU's Job Training Center will be among those taking the review and the examination.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Native American flutist R. Carlos Nakai will perform at 8 p.m. Wednesday, May 1, in Duncan Recital Hall as the final program of the Arts in Morehead (AIM) 1990-91 season.

Nakai, who is of Navajo-Ute heritage, will perform arrangements of traditional Native American music as well as his own original music.

Nakai's music, performed on a hand-crafted cedar wood flute, has been described by critics as "...so soothing, it unwrinkles the mind and soul." Nakai was born in 1946 in Flagstaff, Ariz. From early youth he involved himself in the culture of his people and lived and studied with other North American tribes. Following service in the U.S. Navy, he earned a degree in education from Northern Arizona University in Flagstaff.

Trained on the classical trumpet, Nakai began playing the Native American flute in 1973, learning the traditional flute melodies of the Plains and Woodlands tribes. He soon began adapting these to fit his own style. He is considered to be the country's premiere Native American flutist.

Nakai has brought the Native American flute, traditionally a solo instrument used for courting and healing, into the realm of ensemble performance, writing works for it and performing in concert at schools and colleges, as well as touring Germany and Austria with the German ensemble Anima Musica. He also has written for the renowned Martha Graham Dance Company.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University's Bachelor of Science in Nursing degree program has received accreditation from the National League for Nursing.

The five-year initial accreditation status will be retroactive, covering the program's first graduating class of May 1990, according to Dr. Charles Derrickson, dean of the College of Applied Sciences and Technology.

Launched in the fall of 1986, the program could not be considered for accreditation by the League until graduating its first four-year class. (That first class also distinguished itself with a 100 percent passage rate on the National Council of Licensure Examinations for Registered Nurses.)

"With this endorsement at the national level, nursing joins an ever-growing list of MSU programs that enjoy accreditation by the appropriate educational agency," said MSU President C. Nelson Grote. "This achievement is one that the nursing faculty, staff and students can take great pride in," he added.

"Those who have worked with this program since its inception should take great satisfaction in knowing that accreditation came with our first application to the League," said Dr. Derrickson, joining the president in praising the department's efforts.

The five-year accreditation is the maximum given to any new nursing program, according to Dr. Betty Porter, chair of the Department of Nursing and Allied Health Sciences.

"Our curriculum, our students' comprehension of nursing concepts and the institutional support and resources given to the program earned compliments from the site visitation team," said Dr. Porter.

MSU's B.S.N. degree program offers two options:

The generic track, a four-year program for students who plan a traditional pursuit of the degree.

The R.N. track, providing registered nurses who have an associate degree or diploma an opportunity to earn a bachelor degree in two years and allowing them to work full-time while completing their degree.

Currently there are 165 students enrolled in the B.S.N. degree program. The curriculum combines nursing theory classwork with clinical experiences and even includes a research focus. It also is designed to give student nurses a foundation for graduate level study.

Clinical experiences begin in the sophomore student's spring semester and continue throughout the program. Students work in a variety of health care settings. Among these are hospitals, homes, health departments, ambulatory care centers, schools and geriatric agencies.

The baccalaureate degree program contains seven areas from which seniors may take additional work: care of the adult, pediatric nursing, childbearing/family care, mental health nursing, community health nursing, gerontology and critical care nursing.

"The curriculum prepares our students for roles in practice, leadership, research, management and community health nursing," Dr. Porter said.

Besides the main campus course offerings, the full curriculum for the R.N. track is available at MSU's Big Sandy Extended Campus Center in Prestonsburg and will also be offered at MSU's Ashland Extended Campus Center, beginning this fall.

In addition to the baccalaureate nursing degree, MSU also has a two-year nursing degree program and provides an extensive continuing education component for nursing and allied health sciences personnel.

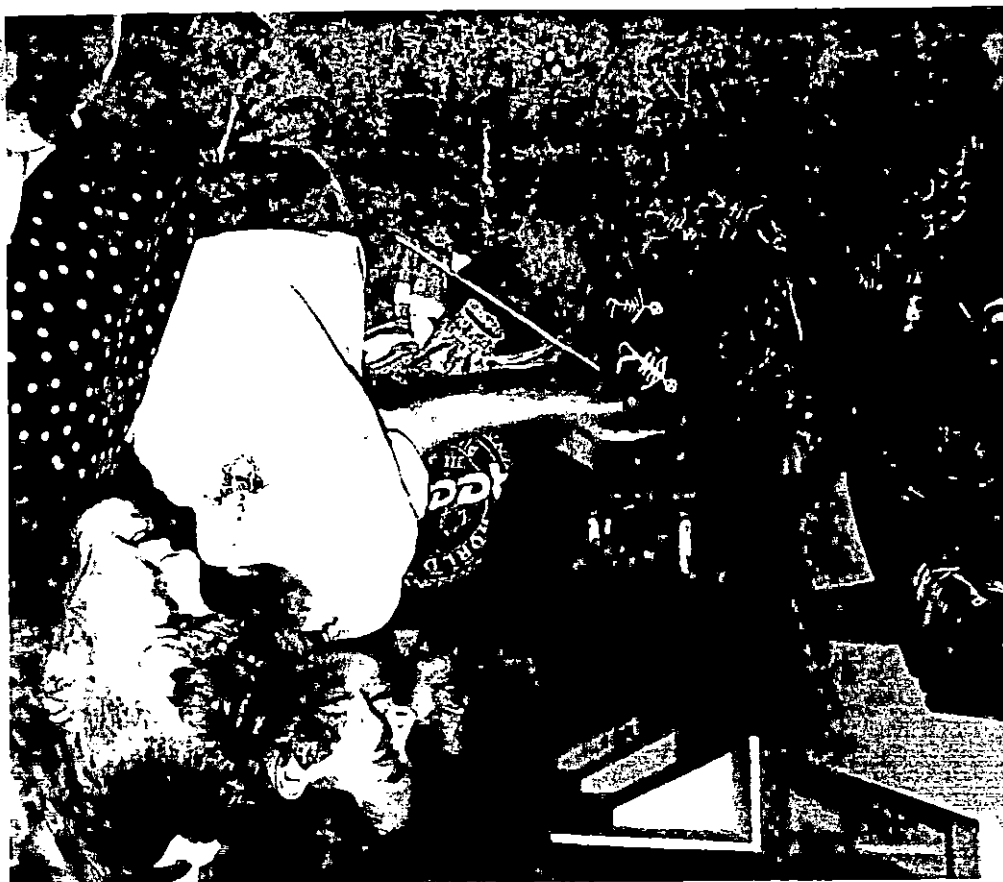

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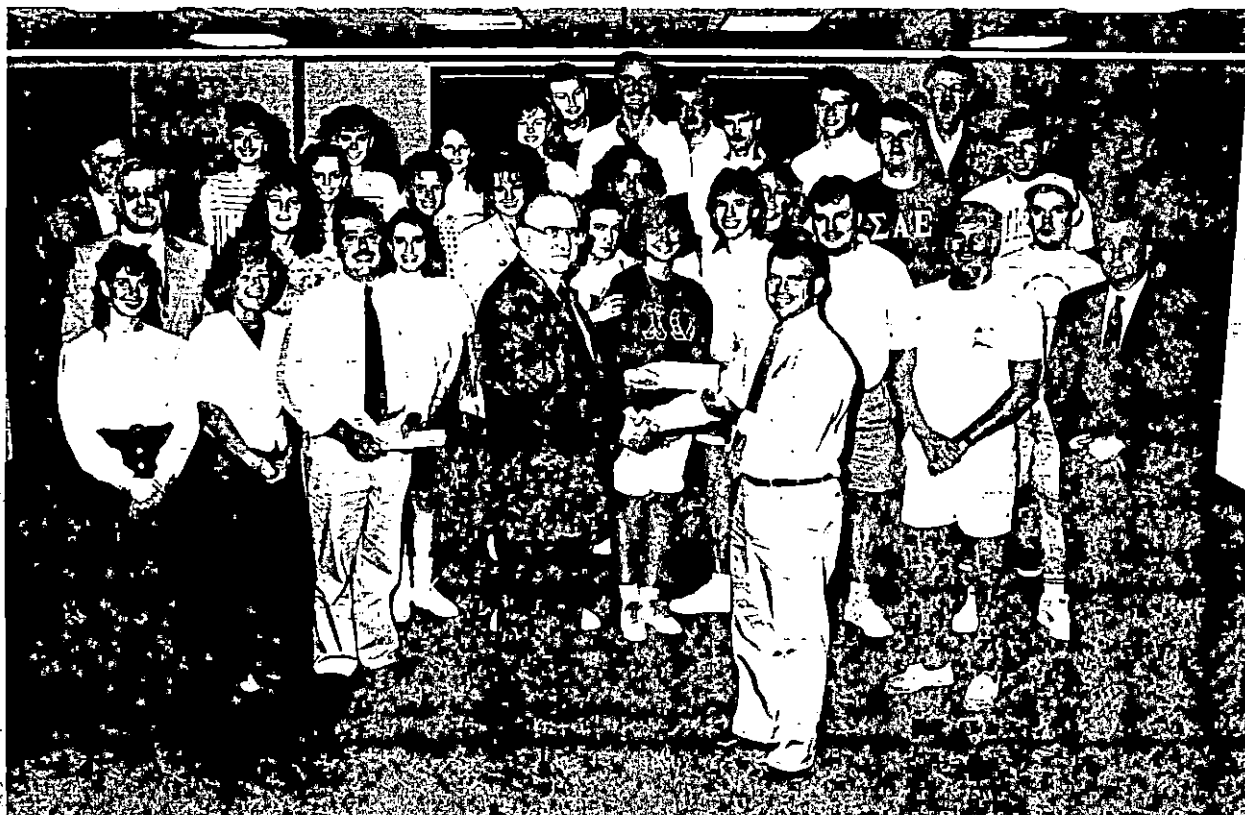
SGA ADDS TO ENDOWMENT

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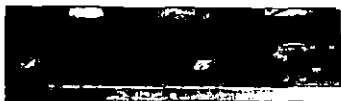

Sponsored by MSU's College of Education and Behavioral Sciences, the Nongraded Primary School Staff Development Planning Project and the Kentucky Department of Education, the sessions are free and features two experts on the nongraded primary school.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Morehead State University will sponsor a "Racial Awareness" workshop for students, faculty/staff and the community on Tuesday, May 7, from 7 to 9 p.m. at the Adron Doran University Center.

Coordinated by the University's Office of Minority Student Affairs and the minority affairs committee of the Student Government Association, the workshop will focus on racism and cultural diversity issues at the national, state and campus levels.

MSU President C. Nelson Grote will make opening remarks and introduce Dr. William Parker, former University of Kentucky vice president for minority affairs, who will present an overview of some of the issues.

Guest speakers, in addition to Dr. Parker, include William E.
