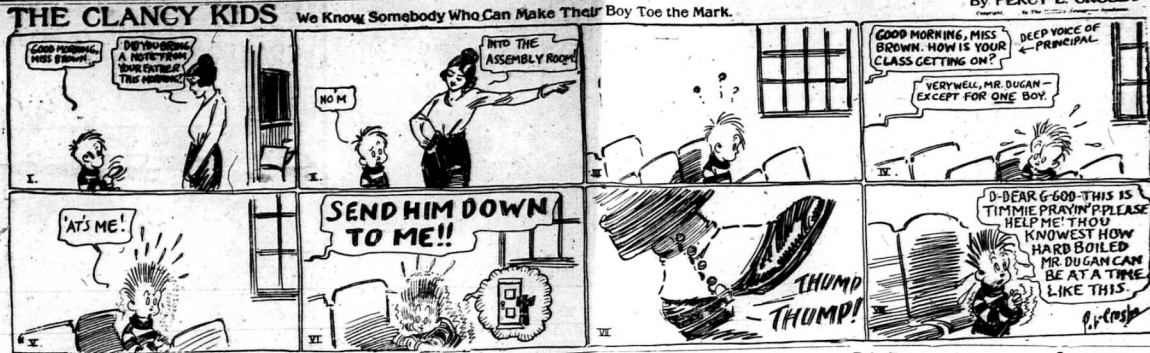

When the first sparkles shivered the flaming maple near the smokehouse, she cried, "Oh rain, leave the leaves alone! Give them one more day. But the rain did not hear the cry of one lonely girl deep in the Big Sandy hills. All night long she could hear the battering attack of each heavy bullet of rain tearing through the magic world of yesterday and she knew that on the morrow the sun would disclose their wet and melancholy nakedness. The summer was over.

The death of Julia and the press of work had kept Jesse on at Wolfpen, Cynthia was not sorry. The Morehead Vikings and Little Vikings took both ends of a double header from the visiting Grayson teams on Monday night of this week, at the Morehead High School gymnasium, which has seen many hectic encounters in the past under the leadership of Coach Roy E. Holbrook, none of them more so than the battle of Monday night. It is probable that the spectators have seen better basketball in the past, as well, but they have never seen a struggle that kept them in hot water and on their toes more than the game Monday night. The Little Kings had easy going, winning by the top-sided score of 25-11. They were never in danger and they held the visitors scoreless until they got tired.

The Kings, who have already defeated Grayson, were in trouble almost from the start. They took a four to nothing lead at the opening gun, but were unable to increase it, and Grayson gave battle every step. The score was tied at four all, and Grayson went into the lead. It sea-sawed back and forth with neither team able to tie up a commanding lead, and the score was tied up more than it was untied. At the half, each team had scored two field goals and made eight free throws to knot the

score at twelve all. Grayson came back strong in the opening stanza of the second half, raising their score with two field goals to 16 while the Vikings were not idle. But unable to count the Kings took heart and went into the lead 17-16 with two fielders and a free throw and Grayson came back with a field goal to lead by one point, 18-17. From that time on the Vikings began to function and while the game ended with the close score of 25-22, they were never headed.
