MOREHEAD, Ky.---Dr. Ernest Boyer, head of the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching and former U.S. Commissioner of Education, will speak at Morehead State University at 11 30 a.m. Monday, Oct. 7, in the Crager Room, Adron Doran University Center.

His visit, part of the University's faculty/staff professional development program, will set the stage for MSU's observance of National Higher Education Week scheduled Oct. 13-19.

Dr. Boyer will discuss higher education issues in general, but also is expected to make reference to general education curriculum reform.

Some of Dr. Boyer's remarks also may touch on Kentucky's efforts in educational reform and critical thinking across the curriculum, two areas of special interest to MSU faculty, according to Dr. Mac Luckey, professor of philosophy and faculty professional development coordinator.

Dr. Boyer has been associated with the Carnegie Foundation since 1979 and has written several of the Carnegie Reports, including those on urban education, the core curriculum, and campus life. He also is the author of "High School" and "College: The Undergraduate Experience."

During his tenure as U.S. Commissioner of Education, federal support for education increased by 40 percent. From 1970 to 1977 he served as chancellor of the largest university in the United States, the State University of New York (SUNY).

The 1983 leading educator in the nation and 1987's man of the year in higher education, Dr. Boyer was listed by U.S. News and World Report as Educator of the Year for 1990.

He has been appointed to special national commissions dealing with education issues by presidents Richard Nixon, Gerald Ford and Jimmy Carter.

While academic dean at Upland College in California during the mid-1950s, Dr. Boyer introduced an experimental mid-year term--the nation's first 4-1-4 calendar--which was subsequently adopted by many other colleges. Among his innovations at SUNY was the first undergraduate exchange program with the Soviet Union.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University will be a host site for the eighth annual World Food Day Teleconference on Wednesday, Oct. 16, from noon to 3 p.m. in the Eagle Dining Room, Adron Doran University Center.

"The Hunger Puzzle: Adding the International and Macroeconomic Pieces" will be broadcast live from George Washington University's studios in Washington, D.C., to sites in the United States, Canada and 150 other countries around the world.

Produced under the auspices of the National Committee for World Food Day and sponsored locally by MSU's Regional Development Services, the teleconference will explore how national and international politics and agreements impact on farmers, food production and hunger.

Panelists will be Antonio Cabrera Mano Filho, minister of agriculture of Brazil; Hazel Henderson, author, futurist and consultant; Norman Hicks, World Bank economic adviser for Latin America and the Caribbean, and Atherton Martin, noted for his studies on U.S.-Caribbean economic policy. Moderator for World Food Day will be Georgie Ann Geyer, columnist, author and television commentator.

Participants will receive a study/action packet the day of the conference. The study/action packet will include general introductions to issues with an overview of the problems facing governments and peoples after the "lost decade" of development in the 1980s.

Continuing education credits (CEU's) are available for participants. CEU's will be awarded by the American Dietetic Association, the American Home Economics Association and the Catholic University of America for clergy and other social service professionals.

The teleconference is open to all students, faculty/staff, church and community members. Faculty members may bring their classes as schedules permit (classes are welcome to walk in).

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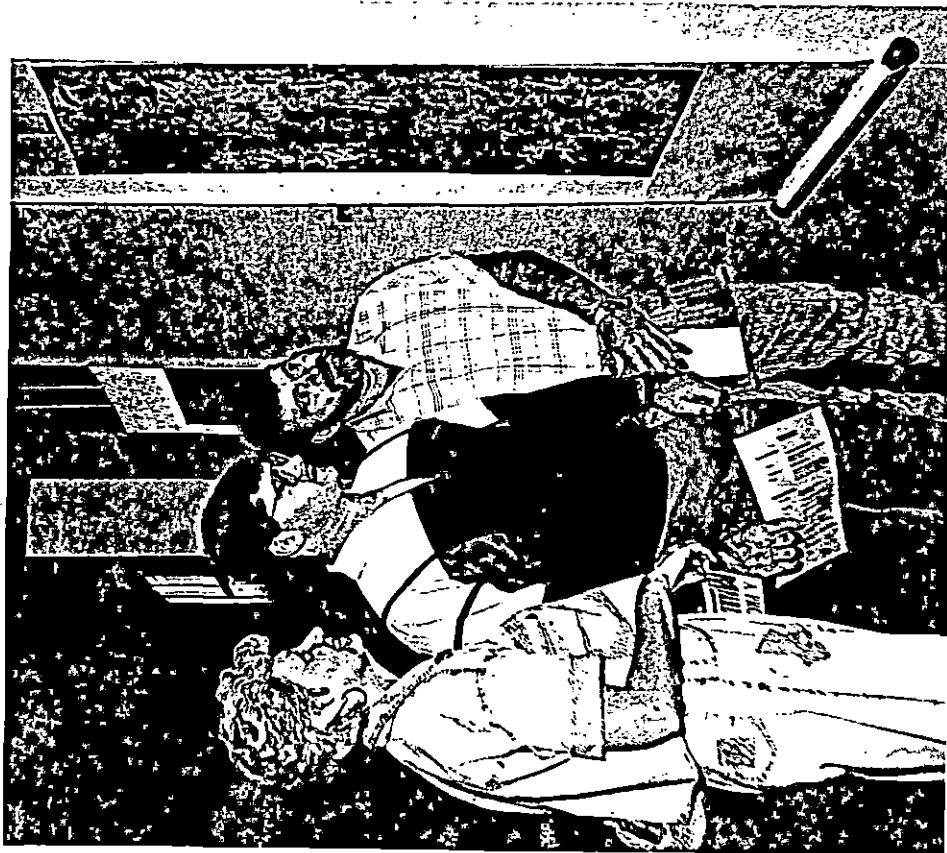
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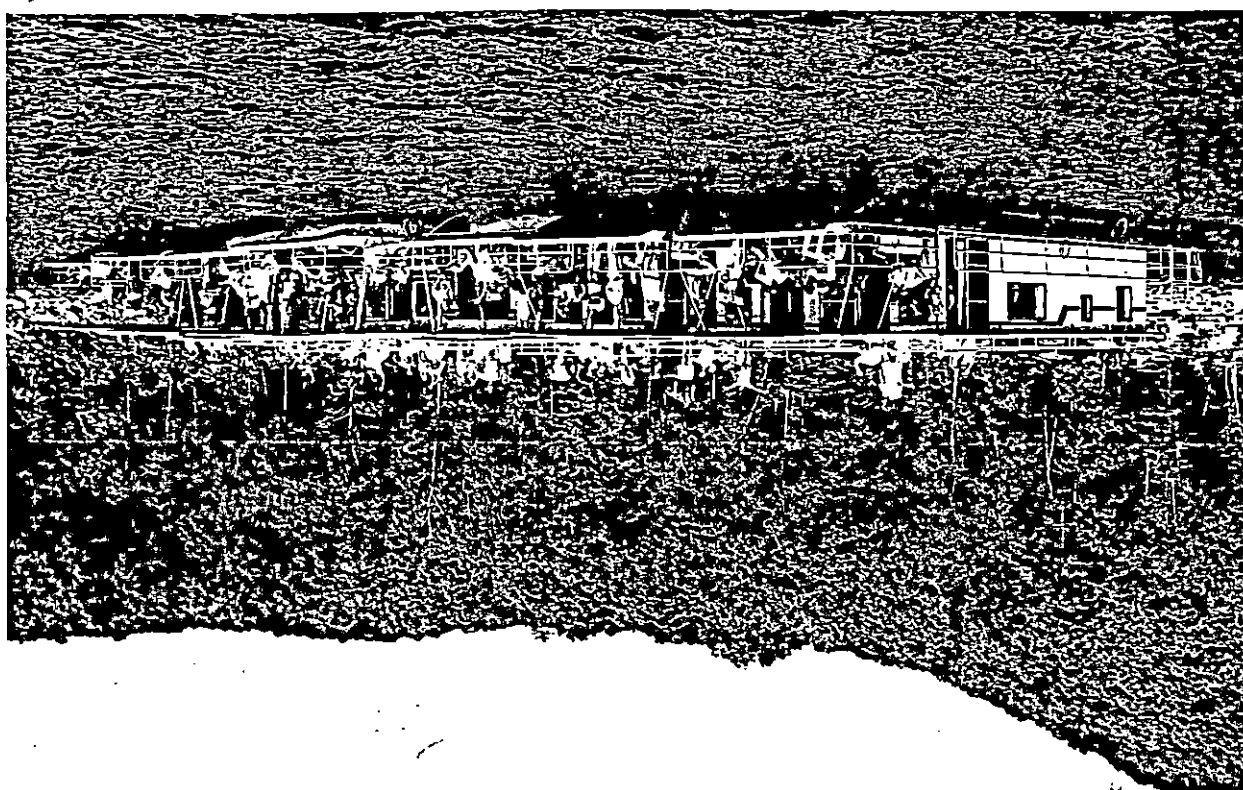

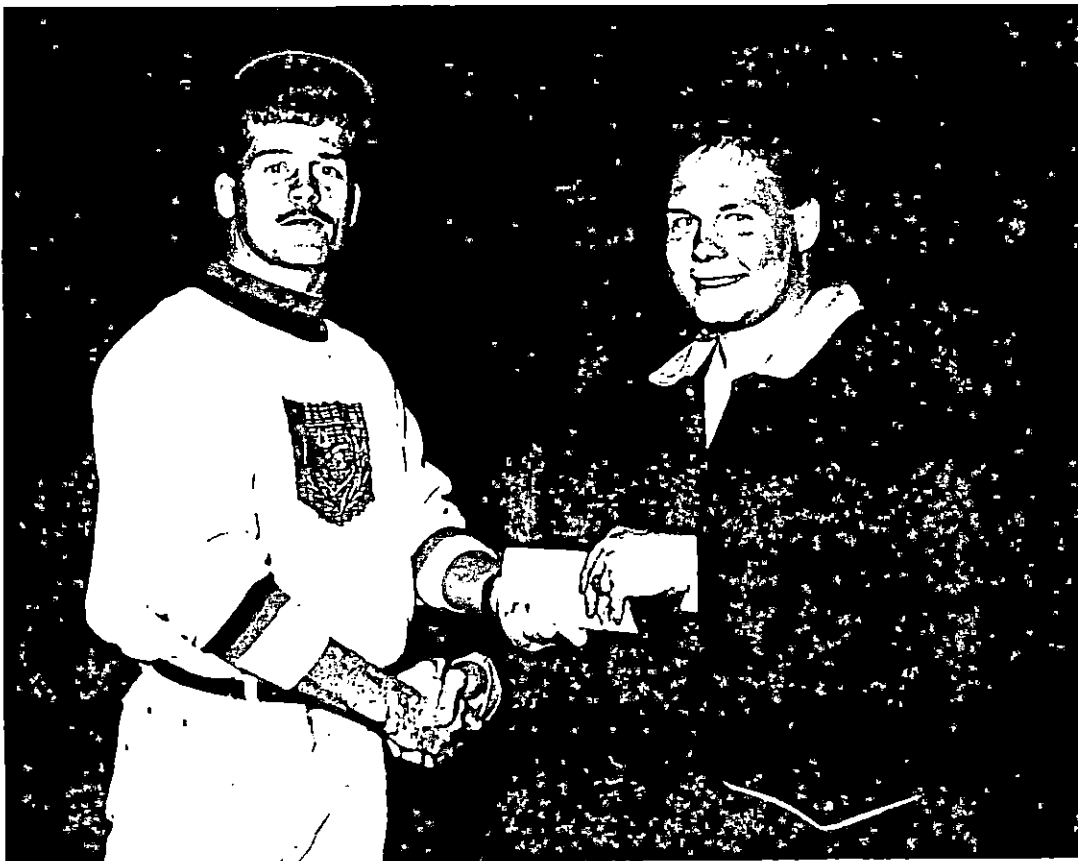

SPECIAL TO THE LOUISVILLE DEFENDER BLACKS IN EDUCATION SUPPLEMENT

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Part of Morehead State University's ongoing quest to offer a quality educational experience for all of its students includes a deep commitment to recruiting minority faculty and staff members to enhance the multi-cultural climate of the campus.

The University has seen the number of black faculty and staff members increase this fall over this same period last year. Preliminary data shows seven faculty members as compared with six at the opening of fall 1990. Staff figures for all employment categories reflect 16 blacks on board as compared with 10 last year.

Among the newest faculty to join the MSU family are Kurt J. Coleman in the Department of Art and Ernestine Winfield in the Department of Industrial Education and Technology.

Coleman, a Louisville native, came to MSU from Raleigh, N.C., where he was assistant to the visual arts director of the North Carolina Arts Council.

He was a student at the School of Architecture, Pennsylvania State University, where he participated in the Black Scholars Program, and earned the M.F.A. degree in painting from Cranbrook Academy of Art and the B.F.A. degree magna cum laude from the Art Academy of Cincinnati.

During 1990, Coleman received several awards for his contributions to the arts, including a grant from the Pollock-Kasner Foundation and the Kentucky Arts Vision award. His work has appeared in several solo and group exhibitions in Cincinnati, Ohio; Detroit, Mich., and New York City as well as in Lexington and Louisville galleries.

Winfield, who is teaching welding is a two-time graduate of Morehead State University with a B.S. degree in industrial technology and a master's degree in industrial education.

A former student at Jefferson State Vocational School, she credits a former instructor, Joe Craft, with encouraging her to develop her potential by going after her college degrees.

A native of Jeffersonville, Ind., Winfield previously was a welding instructor at the LaGrange Vocational Education Center, part of the Kentucky State Reformatory.

Among those joining MSU's professional staff since fall 1990 are: Jamie D. Atkins, assistant basketball coach; Dianne Butler, academic-athletic counselor; Maurice Garrard, microcomputer consultant I; and Lisa M. Kelly, director of the Minority Teacher Education Program.

Kelly earned her B.A. degree from Bellarmine College in history and has taken post-baccalaureate work in education at the University of Louisville. She is currently working on a secondary teaching certificate at MSU in history and French. She has been a substitute teacher for Louisville area schools and also taught at the Watterson Career Center in Louisville.

Garrard earned his A.A. degree in computer science from Fugazzi College in Lexington and, prior to coming to MSU, had been a microcomputer analyst for Advanced CADD Solutions in Lexington since 1988. His microcomputer/computer experience includes work with the Scott County Government and the Marriott Corp.

Butler, who is completing doctoral requirements at Temple University, held a similar position at Tennessee State University, where she earned a bachelor's degree in criminal justice. She received her master's degree in sports medicine from Grambling State University, where she also worked as an academic counselor.

Atkins, a native of Brooklyn, N.Y., previously served as an assistant coach at University of New Orleans. A graduate of Pace University in New York with a B.B.A. degree in finance, he was co-founder and managing director of Rashard, Atkins & Company, a New York investment company, and was an associate financial analyst for Allstate Insurance.

With a black student enrollment approaching nearly 300, minority programming--academic, cultural and social--is also a concern of MSU officials.

The University's Minority Teacher Education Program (MTEP) is now in its fourth year. Through MTEP, MSU provides opportunities for minority students to pursue career interests in teaching in a unique partnership between the University and public schools--primarily those in Jefferson and Fayette counties. Currently 25 students are participating in the program which has financial support from the Council on Higher Education.

MSU through its Office of Minority Student Affairs offers a rich variety of programming to foster pride in the black cultural heritage, with speakers ranging from successful alumni to the award-winning poet Yusef Komunyakaa and folk artist Marquitta Curry.

In addition to commemorating Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.'s birthday with memorial tributes each year, Black Awareness Week and Black History Month are celebrated. Last year's Black Awareness Week focused on "Kujichagulia," stressing the self determination of a people.

Black History Month events ranged from Joseph Mydell's one-man show on Paul Laurence Dunbar, late 19th century American poet and writer, to participation in a national video conference, "Rise in Campus Racism: Causes and Solutions," which dealt with problems facing college administrators nationwide.

As an effort to raise the awareness level of students, faculty/staff and area residents, MSU also conducted its own "Racial Awareness" workshop last spring with Dr. William Parker, former University of Kentucky vice chancellor for minority affairs; William E. Cofield, president of the Kentucky Conference of the NAACP and MSU regent, and Dr. Roy Peterson, assistant executive director for educational attainment with the Kentucky Council on Higher Education, serving as facilitators.

"The event drew an excellent cross section of people," said Jerry Gore, MSU minority student affairs director. "We hope to see similar sessions initiated on campus throughout the year to continue the building of a bridge of understanding among all cultures," he added.

Although students are encouraged to be involved in all aspects of campus life, including student government, there are activities offered specifically for the black student: two historically black Greek sororities, four fraternities, as well as The Brotherhood which is a co-ed social organization, and LaDies, a women's group. There is also the Black Gospel Ensemble now entering its 24th year, and the Black Student Coalition.

Additionally, Minority Student Affairs sponsors a special Big Brother-Big Sister program, giving upperclassmen the opportunity to nurture underclassmen, who need a little help in making the transition to college life, by providing academic and social support during the year.

"A diverse student body requires an equally diverse academic and social climate," said MSU President C. Nelson Grote. "At Morehead State, we intend to provide that multi-cultural atmosphere which will ultimately enrich all of our lives. I believe we've been successful in the past and we will continue our efforts in the future," Dr. Grote added.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---The executive recruiter working with Morehead State University's Presidential Search Committee told the University's Board of Regents Friday (Oct. 4) that he was pleased with the quantity and quality of the applications.

Updating the board on the search for a successor to current President C. Nelson Grote, who retires June 30, 1992, Bill Funk said the search was progressing very well.

Funk, an executive recruiter with Heidrick and Struggles, Inc., attributed the success in attracting such an attractive pool of candidates to the "orderly transition" and the fact that the University was in "good shape."

Prospective candidates know that the president is leaving of his own will, "making the position far more attractive," Funk said. "Certainly, financially the institution is in good shape and enrollment is up," Funk said, adding that these are some of the things potential candidates are concerned about.

According to Wayne Martin, search committee chair, 164 nominations and applications had been received by the priority deadline of Oct. 4. He added that the committee had received and initially reviewed 118 applications.

On Friday evening after a search committee meeting, Martin issued the following statement:

"A focus group of candidates has been identified by the search committee. The committee will now begin to seek additional information, while continuing its review of all candidates' applications."

The next meeting of the search committee will be a working luncheon at noon Wednesday, Nov. 13, at the Adron Doran University Center.

At the morning board meeting, the regents approved a 1992-94 state operating budget request calling for State General Fund appropriations of \$45.9 million in 1992-93 and \$52.9 million in 1993-94. Those figures include funding requests outside the formula of \$5.9 million each year plus an additional \$1.6 million in 1993-94.

Once increases in fixed costs are recovered, the University's highest priorities include faculty/staff salaries, initiatives to assist in implementation of KERA, and library acquisitions.

Outside the formula, MSU has requested additional funds to establish special centers as part of the University's KERA initiatives, to expand allied health and nursing education opportunities into Eastern Kentucky, to establish an Eastern Kentucky Regional Development Intervention Center and to fund other priorities.

Also approved was the University's 1992-94 Capital Construction and Equipment Budget Request of \$59.4 million. Among the top priorities listed were phase two of the Lappin Hall renovation project (\$4.1 million), a variety of fire/life safety projects (\$1.1 million), projects to protect the investment in academic and administrative buildings (\$3.2 million) and renovations to Breckinridge Hall (\$9 million).

Four new regents attending their first meeting were sworn in: citizen regents T.T. Colley, Pikeville businessman; Helen Pennington of West Liberty, Morgan County Middle School principal, and Lois Baker of Whitesburg, executive director of Mountain Comprehensive Health Corporation, and student regent Tim Francis of Bardstown. .

Also the board elected Lexington television executive Wayne Martin as vice chairman to replace Jerry F. Howell Sr. of Jackson, whose term on the board expired.

In other business, the regents approved the sale of nearly \$6.7 million in housing and dining system revenue bonds for renovations to two residence halls, Mays and Butler, and other student housing projects.

The board also adopted a resolution commending former regents Jerry F. Howell Sr. of Jackson, J. Calvin Aker of Beattyville and G. Duane Hart of Bardstown for their "leadership and sound judgment" in governing the University and the time, energy and dedication that they gave during their term as regents.

MOREHEAD, Ky.----A fine arts professor from Central University of Ecuador has become Morehead State University's third visiting international scholar in as many years and is the University's first Fulbright Scholar-In-Residence.

Victoria Carrasco of Quito, Ecuador, professor of design and theory of color, will spend the 1991-92 academic year at MSU teaching and sharing part of her culture with students and the region.

"Gaining a Fulbright Scholar-In-Residence is a real coup for the University and it certainly enhances our own institutional visiting international scholar program," said Dr. Judy Rogers, dean of undergraduate programs.

"How fortunate for our students to be able to gain insights into different cultures and different worlds in this manner. One of President (C. Nelson) Grote's goals has been the internationalization of our curriculum and his support of this effort has enabled us to open our students' minds to the world," Dr. Rogers said. "The visiting international scholar is one of such programs," she added.

Previous visiting international scholars have included Zhang Ke Fu from Zhengzhou University in the People's Republic of China, and Dr. Loreta Vishomirskite from Vilnius Pedagogical Institute in Lithuania.

Carrasco is no stranger to Kentucky, for in fall 1989 she spent a month in the state as an artist-in-residence under the Partners in America program in which Kentucky is paired with Quito.

Specializing in weaving and enamel work, Carrasco plans to incorporate some of Eastern Kentucky into her work while here and include some of those pieces in her spring exhibit.

Also during MSU's spring semester, she will teach classes in weaving and Ecuadorean folk art. There are many similarities between the folk art of Ecuador and Eastern Kentucky, according to Carrasco.

Both utilize materials at hand, but while Eastern Kentuckians carve wood, the Ecuadorean folk artists employ ceramics, metal and gold. While quilting is a regional folk art here, weaving articles of clothing is a major part of the Ecuadorean folk art.

"Different areas of Ecuador use different colors and themes, so often you can tell in an instant where people are from," Carrasco said.

Much of Ecuador's folk art is functional. There is a great emphasis on clothing and jewelry, she explained. During the colonial period, the country's art had a religious aspect, reflecting the Catholic religion, but today's contemporary folk art tends to focus on Indian themes, Carrasco said.

"I want to talk with many people and share my country's culture while at Morehead State," said Carrasco, who is a descendant of the Incas. She also plans an exhibit of some of her work this spring.

Sharing Carrasco and her culture with the region is something that MSU wants to do. The Ecuadorean artist brought videotapes to show more of her native land's culture, arts, history and geography to her new friends in Kentucky.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---A group of Morehead State University ROTC students will travel to Fort Knox for a special weekend of competition on Oct. 25-27.

"Our students will compete against a group of America's most physically and mentally fit students in one of the most grueling endurance tests on the collegiate level," said Lt. Col. Gary D. Seibert, MSU professor of military science and department chair.

The 36-hour, nonstop Ranger Challenge is designed to stretch the physical and mental limits of the U.S. Army Reserve Officers' Training Corps cadets. As the cadets, representing their colleges, compete in teams, the contest also is a test of leadership and teamwork.

Representing MSU will be Denver Chaffin, **Louisa** sophomore; Kenneth Charles, **Freeburn** junior; Daniel Doll, **Cincinnati** junior; Ellie O. Johnson, **Cincinnati** senior; Timothy Lofton, **Ashland** senior; Johnathan Perry, **Denton** senior;

James Shelton, **Grayson** junior; Kenneth Smith, **West Union, Ohio**, junior; John Wiseman, **Ashland** junior; Randy Wilson, **Greenville** senior, and Shannon Ziegler, **Batavia, Ohio**, senior.

Johnson and Ziegler will serve as team captain and alternate team captain, respectively.

"These students have trained for months for this event," added Seibert, who is the battalion commander for MSU's Army ROTC program.

There will be 23 teams competing from the 3rd Brigade of the Second ROTC Region, representing universities from Kentucky, Tennessee and West Virginia.

Initiated in 1986, the Ranger Challenge took shape under the leadership of retired Maj. Gen. Robert W. Wagner, then commander of the Fourth ROTC Region at Fort Lewis, Wash.

Initially the plan was for ROTC cadets to challenge the Army Rangers in activities they both knew, such as physical fitness and marksmanship; but, it has evolved into a competition matching cadet teams against each other.

Now in its sixth year, the Ranger Challenge has grown from a one-region event involving just a few students to a nationwide, varsity competition. The teams compete in eight timed events--four individual events and four team efforts.

The challenge typically begins with a physical fitness test involving push-ups, sit-ups and a two-mile run. From there, the cadets advance to firing an M16 rifle, navigating a grenade assault course, and a timed assembly of an M16 and an M60 machine gun.

In orienteering, cadets work in groups of two to identify and locate designated points in a four-square-kilometer area within a demanding time limit. They then work together to construct a one-rope bridge and cross a 40-foot water obstacle.

The two remaining events are patrolling, in which teams are tested in planning and executing a small-unit operation, and a 10-kilometer forced march that typically begins 34 hours after the competition starts. Cadets carrying 30 pounds of equipment, including rucksacks and weapons, must complete the march within 90 minutes.

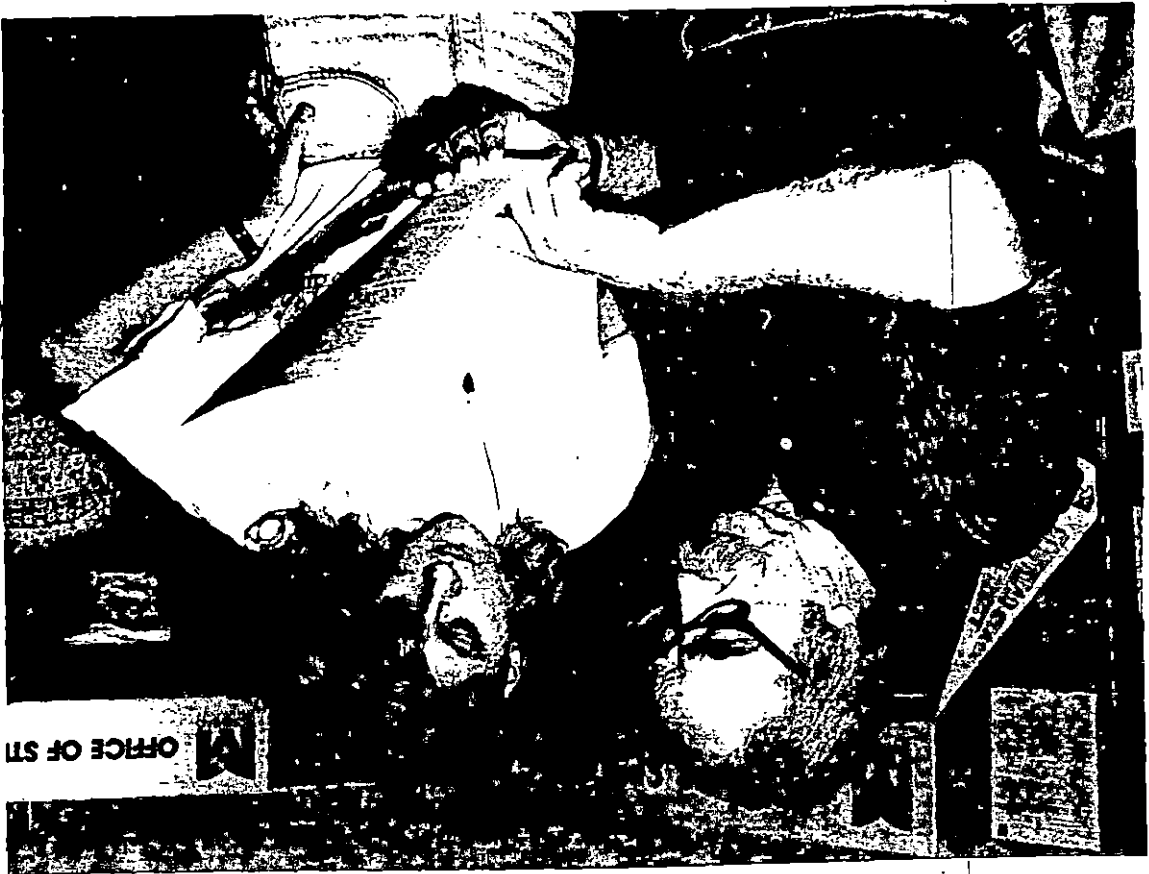
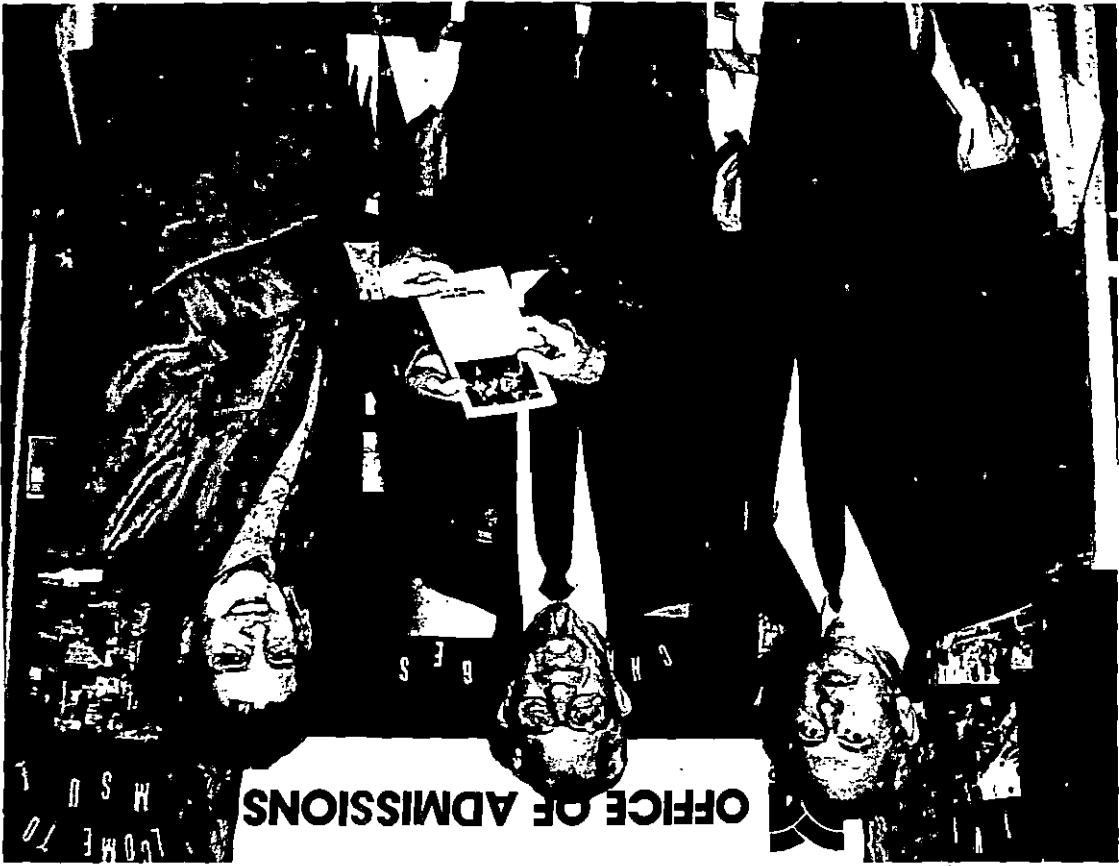

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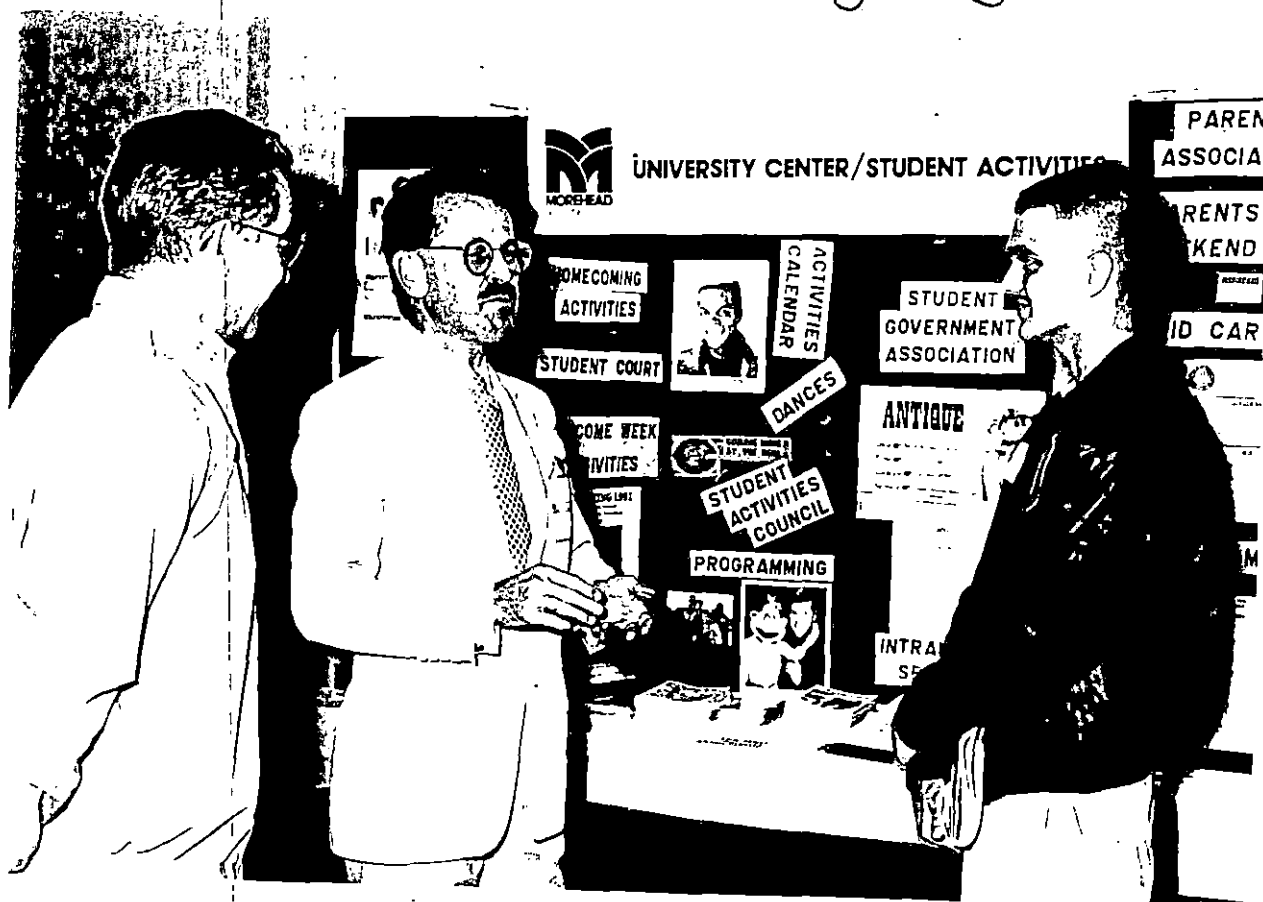

MOREHEAD, Ky.---The social and ethical issues of technology as they relate to women will be the focus of a special symposium at Morehead State University next month.

Scheduled for Friday and Saturday, Nov. 1-2, at the Adron Doran University Center, the symposium, "Women, Technology and Ethics: Defining the Issues of the 21st Century," is open to the public.

Coordinated by MSU's ad hoc committee on women's studies, the symposium has drawn presenters from all over the United States, from California State University-Northridge to the State University of New York-Stony Brook as well as from colleges and universities in Kansas, Michigan, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Kentucky, West Virginia, North Carolina, Tennessee and Alabama.

"There are many social and ethical issues of technology that have special relevance to us as women and we need to deal with these now," said Dr. Judy Rogers, MSU dean of undergraduate programs and chair of the committee.

Among the themes to be explored are "Impact of Technology in the 21st Century," "Technology and Reproduction," "Women Portraying Reality or Fantasy," "Educating and Providing New Career Opportunities for Women," and "Women and Workforce."

The keynote speakers will be Dr. Ruth Hubbard, professor emerita of biology, Harvard University, and Dr. Karen J. Warren, assistant professor of philosophy, Macalester College.

Dr. Hubbard will be the featured speaker at a 6 p.m. dinner on Nov. 1. Her topic will be "Of Genii and Bottles: Technology, Values and Choices."

A researchist/teacher at Harvard from 1953 to 1990, Dr. Hubbard earned her Ph.D. from Radcliffe College. She has been a U.S. Public Health Service Fellow at University College Hospital Medical School in London and a Guggenheim Fellow at the Carlsberg Laboratory in Copenhagen.

Recognized for her contributions in biochemistry and photochemistry of vision, she has also worked, written and lectured on the politics of health care and on various health issues, especially as they relate to women.

She has published more than 150 articles in books, professional journals and popular magazines; has edited four books; been a co-author of one and author of "The Politics of Women's Biology."

Dr. Warren, as guest speaker for the noon luncheon on Nov. 2, will present "An Ecofeminist Perspective" on the symposium's main theme.

Known for her work in ecological and environmental feminism, Dr. Warren earned her Ph.D. degree from the University of Massachusetts. A member of Macalester College's faculty since 1985, she also taught at St. Olaf College and Mount Holyoke College.

The recipient of several grants, Dr. Warren has had numerous articles accepted for publication and is co-creator of an environmental ethics simulation game which fosters critical thinking.

Active in several professional organizations, she also serves as a consultant in the areas of critical thinking and philosophy curricula.

Both speakers will be on hand Thursday, Oct. 31, for a reception and book signing at 8 p.m. in the Red Room, ADUC. Available for purchase at that time will be copies of "The Politics of Women's Biology," by Dr. Hubbard and "The Shape of Red: Insider/Outsider Reflections," which she co-authored with Margaret Randall.

Dr. Warren will sign copies of a special issue of the journal of feminist philosophy, "Hypatia," which she edited. The issue focused on ecological feminism.

Registration for the two-day symposium will begin at noon on Friday, Nov. 1, with the first session getting under way at 1 p.m. On Saturday, Nov. 2, registration will start at 8 a.m. and sessions--including one specifically for students--will begin at 8:30 a.m.

Pre-registration prior to Oct. 25 is encouraged as registrations made after that deadline may not include meals.

The registration fee for those who register in advance is \$50, which includes meals. The on-site registration fee will be \$55. 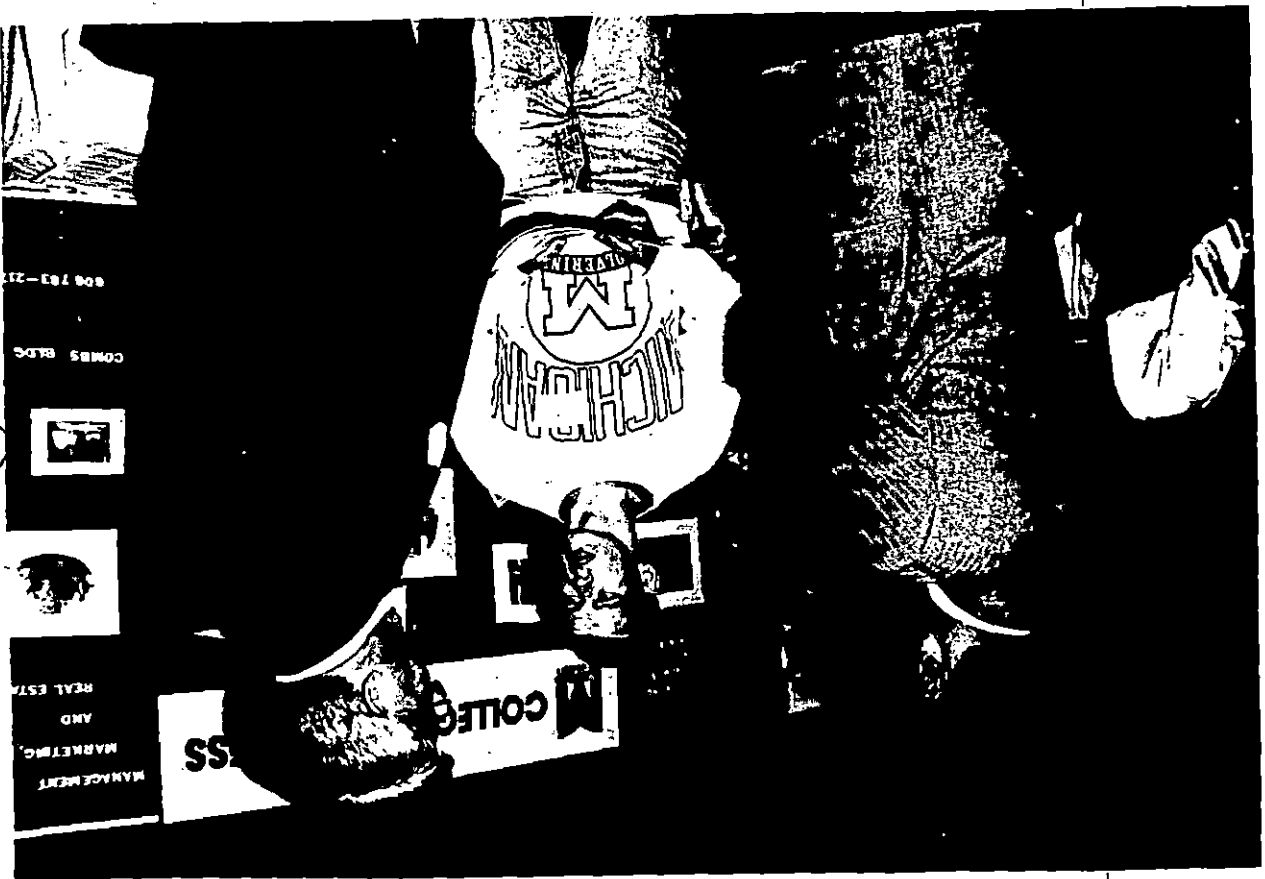

The scholarship, valued at \$2,000 per year, is renewable for three academic years if a 3.00 g.p.a. is maintained during each of the first two semesters and a minimum 3.25 for each semester thereafter. Transfer students must maintain a cumulative 3.25 g.p.a.

To be eligible for an Alumni Award, at least one the applicant's parents must be an MSU alumnus and an active member of the MSU Alumni Association. The student must be admitted as an entering freshman or transfer student; have an Admissions Index of at least 500; transfer students must have 3.00 grade point average (on a 4.00 scale) for the equivalent of at least one full term, and submit a completed scholarship application to MSU.

The award, valued at \$600 per year, is renewable for three academic years if a 2.75 g.p.a. is maintained during each of the first two semesters and a minimum cumulative 3.00 g.p.a. for each semester thereafter.

*Dr. Betty Porter, Department of Nursing and Allied Health Sciences chair, received \$21,596 to improve the existing radiological technology program.

*Dr. Robert Newton, Department of Industrial Education and Technology chair, received \$29,234 to provide laboratory assistance and equipment for the department's two-year programs and \$16,000 to upgrade industrial education teachers through field base education.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Enrollment at Morehead State University's regional locations has grown by 53 percent since 1988, according to figures released by the University.

This fall's off-campus enrollment of 2,110 also reflects a 10.4 percent increase over the 1990 fall figure of 1,911.

The number of class offerings since 1988 have more than tripled, increasing from 80 courses in 1988 to the current 128 offered this fall, according to Dr. Marc Glasser, MSU dean of graduate and extended campus programs.

"With designation of three of our regional sites as extended campus centers by the Council on Higher Education, we are now offering more courses in specific degree programs," Dr. Glasser said.

"The growth in the number of students taking classes at our off-campus locations, I believe, is an indication that we are striving to meet the needs of our service region," he added.

Enrollment at MSU's Big Sandy Extended Campus Center has more than doubled since 1988, growing from 296 then to 644 students this fall. At the Licking Valley Extended Campus Center in West Liberty, the number of students enrolled has more than tripled, increasing from 156 in 1988 to 517 this fall.

Since the mid-1980s, MSU officials have been working closely with community colleges in Ashland, Maysville and Prestonsburg and with Lees College in Jackson to identify student needs.

Currently MSU offers upper division coursework leading to undergraduate degrees in elementary education, accounting and management along with graduate programs in education and business at its Ashland Area Extended Campus Center.

At the Big Sandy Extended Campus Center in Prestonsburg, two plus two programs have been approved by the CHE in elementary education, accounting, management and nursing, as well as six graduate programs in education.

MSU's Licking Valley Extended Campus Center, just designated this fall as an ECC by the CHE, originally opened as a regional site in 1987 to serve residents of the area and both employees and inmates of the Eastern Kentucky Correctional Complex. In addition to its various undergraduate courses, Licking Valley also has been approved to offer the associate degree in university studies.

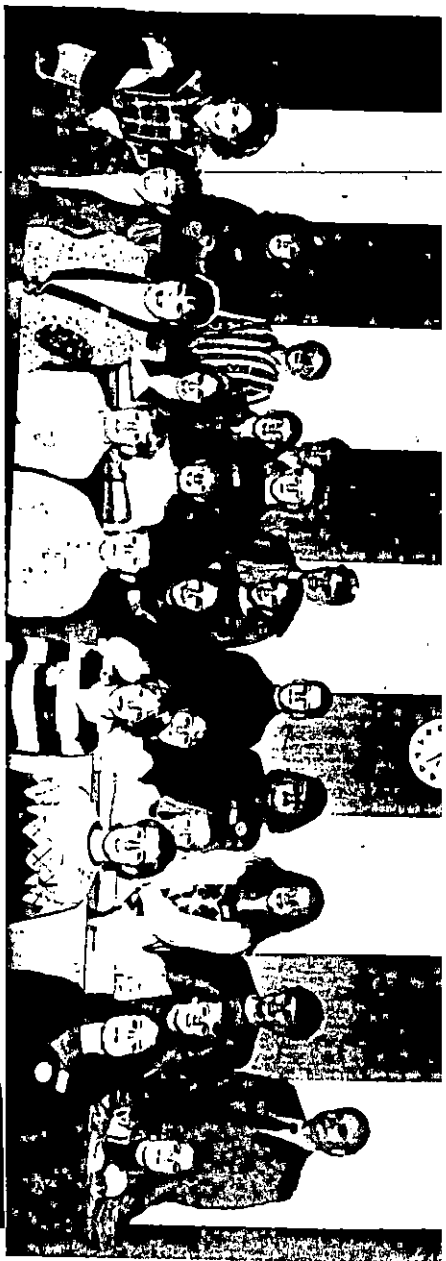

MOREHEAD, Ky.----Morehead State University, in conjunction with the University of Tennessee, will sponsor a three-week study tour of the architectural and interior design styles of Belgium, France, England and Scotland this spring.

Offered through the Department of Home Economics as a special topics course, the study tour is designed primarily for students in interior design or architecture programs, but is open to others, according to Norma Jean Maguire, MSU associate professor of interior design.

Leaving from Knoxville, Tenn., May 18, the group will stop in Brussels which is known for its art nouveau and art deco architecture. A visit to the Fontainebleau in Blois, where rulers from Louis VII to Napoleon held court, will take the group into the Loire Valley and other chateaux of the royalty.

In Paris, participants will visit such national monuments as the Eiffel Tower, Notre Dame and the Arc de Triomphe, before heading to Versailles, the site of the palace built by Louis XIV.

In Amiens, the group will visit one of the largest gothic cathedrals in France, the Cathedrale de Notre Dame. Crossing the English Channel from Calais to Dover, the students will visit Dover Castle and then Canterbury, the ecclesiastical center of England since 597 A.D.

One highlight of the four-day stay in London will be a visit to historic Hampton Court. Motoring north to Glasgow, Scotland, there will be visits to several country houses, some of which are still inhabited by descendants of the early builders. In Glasgow, the focus will be on the works of Charles Rennie Mackintosh. On the return to London, prior to the June 8 departure, the group will visit Shrewsbury, where residents have blended contemporary use with preservations of older structures.

The tentative cost of the tour is \$3,238 which includes air fare from Knoxville, accommodations based on triple occupancy at three star tourist class hotels with private bath, two meals each day, ground transportation, admission fees to sites and special city tours of major cities. There is a \$79 supplement for double occupancy accommodations. The cost is subject to fluctuations of the currency.

A \$500 deposit is needed by Nov. 15, according to Maguire. "That deposit is refundable until March 2, which is the deadline for full payment," she said.

MSU students wishing to take the study tour for academic credit will need to enroll in Home Economics 490 during Summer I. Tuition and related University fees are not included in the tour cost.

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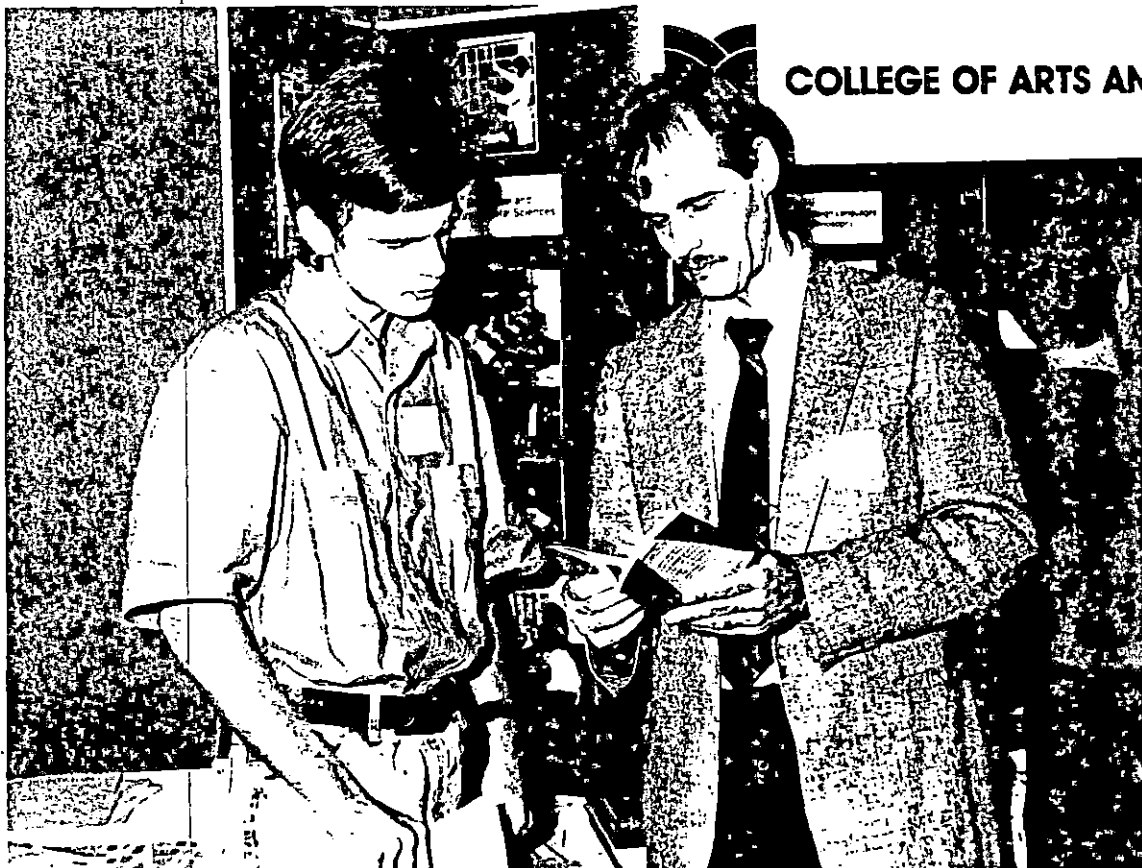

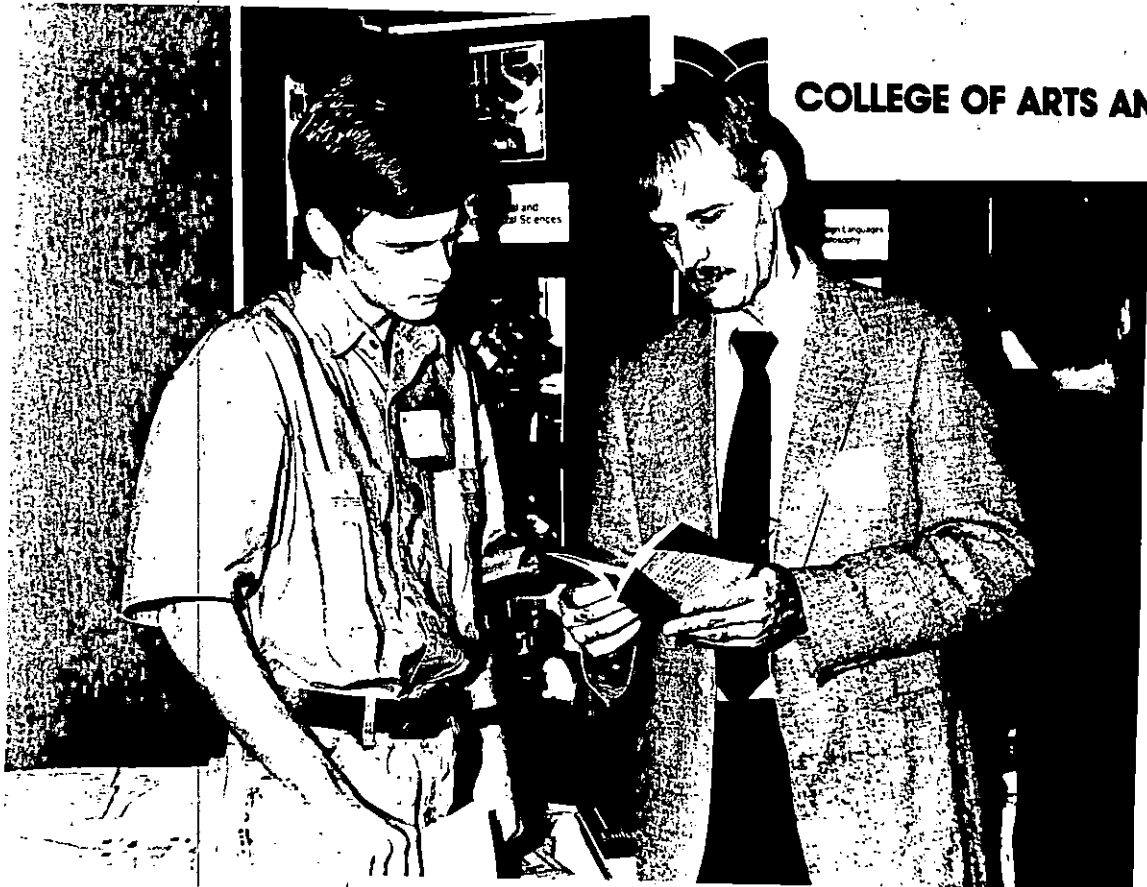
