## OVER \$2,000,000 IN SECURITY FUND

Contributions to the State Unemployment Compensation Commission fund stood at \$2,051,720.45 on March 11th, V. E. Barnes, Executive Director of the Unemployment Compensation Division of the Department of Industrial Relations, announced today. This figure represents contributions paid by 2,797 employers on payrolls amounting to \$25,471,826.45 to 264,632 employees who are now covered by the act.

According to this figure each employee received an average weekly wage of 16.38 for the calendar year 1936. Total contributions reported, according to Mr. Barnes, do not include several companies who are holding up their contributions awaiting judicial decision on the law's constitutionality. Neither does it include contributions from companies so affected by the flood that it was impossible to file their report by the deadline date. The Commission gave special dispensation to these companies.

Mr. Barnes said that the office personnel will be in shape to handle collections on 1937 employer and employees' contributions which are due March 31st for the months of January and February of the present year, and which will be due monthly thereafter.

of the cost of the wholesale gas. The city will then receive a profit. The more users, the greater the profit, and the lower the taxes. Morehead is taking hold of the gas idea. The city will purchase all gas used by large consumers at 22 cents per thousand feet, if the user consumes more than 30,000.
