MOREHEAD, Ky.--Last year, Morehead State University's Folk Art collection received donations of art work valued at \$43,500.

Adrian Swain, MSU's folk art curator, said that he believes many of these gifts were the result of special legislation allowing potential donors to make contributions of valuable art works and receive a tax deduction for the donation.

Now the special window of opportunity, opened in 1991, has been extended until June 30 of this year, according to Swain. This allows collectors another six months to make out-right gifts to museums and public and private institutions that qualify as charitable tax deductions at 100 percent of the fair market value.

The window applies to valuable art, rare books, historical documents and photographs, and scientific collections.

In 1991, MSU received gifts or works of several folk artists, including six pieces by the late Edgar Tolson of Wolfe County, internationally known folk artist.

"We were so fortunate to acquire some major gifts which enhanced our collection," Swain said. "We are hopeful that, with the extension, the next six months will be equally as profitable."

MOREHEAD, Ky.---The August 1991 graduates from Morehead State University's associate degree program in Radiologic Technology has distinguished themselves by achieving two special milestones.

In taking the national registry examination, the 41-member class attained a 93 percent passage rate, the highest in the MSU program's history, and exceeded the national average score.

The MSU rad tech students also earned an average test score of 83, which was 1.12 points higher than the national average, according to Dr. Betty Porter, chair of MSU's Department of Nursing and Allied Health Sciences.

The American Registry of Radiologic Technologists Examination is required to be taken for national certification.

"The scores and passage rate confirms that our students are receiving the quality education that prepares them to succeed on this national test," Dr. Porter said. "The faculty should be proud of their students' success."

Also commending the rad tech faculty, MSU President C. Nelson Grote said, "It is obvious that they have worked diligently to maintain a quality program. MSU has an outstanding reputation in the nursing and allied health sciences which, in effect, is a bonus for the people of our region in the quality of health care available to them," Dr. Grote said.

Accredited by the Joint Review Committee on Education in Radiologic Technology, the 24-month long program began in 1973. Its curriculum offers students the opportunity to spend half of their time in the classroom and the remainder gaining hands on experience at various hospital affiliates.

MSU is affiliated with 12 such clinical centers. These include: Hazard Appalachian Regional Hospital, Highlands Regional Hospital, Humana Hospital-Lake Cumberland, Humana Hospital-Louisa, Meadowview Regional Hospital, Mary Chiles Hospital, Pikeville Methodist Hospital, Morgan County Appalachian Regional Hospital, Pattie A. Clay Hospital, St. Claire Medical Center, Lexington Good Samaritan Hospital and HCA King's Daughters Memorial Hospital.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Women have been part of the Army's collegiate ROTC Program since the late 1970s, but this year Stephanie M. Francis of Salyersville carved her own history-making niche in Morehead State University's program.

Francis, the daughter of Judy and Nelson Francis, has become the first woman to be selected as cadet battalion sergeant major for MSU's ROTC Battalion.

This post makes the psychology major the top ranking third year student in the ROTC Program. Her duties will include coordinating activities, scheduling, recording attendance, setting the example and counseling of new cadets.

An honor student, Francis was selected for this role by MSU's Department of Military Science faculty on the basis of her ability, involvement, attitude and leadership potential.

MSU's ROTC Program has recorded nearly 500 commissionees of whom approximately 10 percent are women, according to Department of Military Science officials.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--To some people, documenting history may seem a tiresome process, but for two Morehead State University researchers, the task is an exciting and rewarding experience.

Teaming up on a history of black Americans in Maysville and Eastern Kentucky are Jerry Gore, minority student affairs director and Maysville native, and Dr. Stuart Sprague, professor of history and a noted Kentucky historian whose works include pictorial books of Eastern Kentucky and Frankfort.

The goal is to produce a written history of the work of black people, what they have done to support the economy, education and industry, according to Gore.

"We want to reconstruct the history of blacks in Eastern Kentucky and leave a legacy that we can be proud of," Gore said. "We hope this project will inspire others. We don't want to denigrate anyone's history, and we want other people to join in this project by sharing their family photos, documents, and other information which would be helpful to this history."

From an early age, Gore decided it would be his responsibility to document his heritage. "The very first time my mother took me to the Rankin House (a house in Ripley, Ohio, which played a key part in the Underground Railroad that helped slaves escape to the north), I was aware of the rich heritage; it gave me a sense of identity of whom I was and also a sense of security," he said.

By the age of 13, he had already begun to seek out senior citizens and ask them about their early years in Maysville and Mason County. As time passed, Gore continued to document his history and currently has videotapes of at least 14 persons.

Gore credits his grandmother, the late Florence Wormley Anderson, and mother, Hattie Dunlap, for inspiring him to continue the quest for a written history. He considers himself fortunate to have interviewed the late Miss Lizzie Smith, who died last April at 94 years of age, because "she shared a wealth of information" and Remitha Cunningham, who is a direct descendant of Supreme Court Justice John Marshall.

"While I was taping, they told their life stories," Gore said. "In some cases, they described situations that happened to their parents or grandparents while they were slaves."

Deciding that he was not making enough progress, Gore enlisted the help of Dr. Sprague. "I had several projects going," Dr. Sprague said, "but this was something I was interested in, so I agreed to help."

From that first meeting more than a year ago, Dr. Sprague has constantly been providing Gore with tidbits of information about his home county. Becoming more involved with the findings, Dr. Sprague applied for and received a \$5,000 research grant from MSU to compile a history of African Americans in Mason County and Eastern Kentucky. The funds are to be used before June 30, 1992.

"Blacks in Appalachia are the 'invisible minority'," Dr. Sprague said. "On campus there are Maysville newspapers which cover 1817-1923, and the Mason County Museum has provided some interesting items," he added.

Earlier this year, he made a visit to the National Archives in Washington, D.C., where he spent a week reviewing the records of African Americans from the Mason County area who served in the Civil War.

"These records are outstanding," Dr. Sprague said, describing how former soldiers had to document whom they worked for before the war, if they were married and had children, where they lived after the war, etc. "Much of this was necessary for one to receive benefits or get a widow's pension," said Dr. Sprague, noting that the pension records also included slaves and their owner's names, along with affidavits from some of those owners and other pertinent documentation.

Comparing this project much like building a house, Dr. Sprague said: "If you want to build a brick house, you have to have bricks; we're recreating as we pick up these little pieces, much like the bricks one would use." He said he doesn't believe there has been a published work like this one, explaining that most research is an organizational history, like that of a church.

A 6,110 black database has been developed using census records, city directories and other sources, Dr. Sprague said. He also is using Sanborn insurance maps of early Mason County.

The findings also revealed that Lt. Col. Charles Young of Mays Lick, was the third black cadet to graduate from West Point Military Academy and Harriett Beecher Stowe got much of the material for "Uncle Tom's Cabin" from the Mason County area, Gore noted.

When the project is completed, a database of names will exist, a pictorial history will be published, and a series of videotapes will be available for viewing, Gore noted. "Before the 1930s very little African American history was written," he said. "If we don't start now and leave something for future generations to build on, we will lose even more of our heritage."

MOREHEAD, Ky.---For more than three years, the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet has made customized automobile license plates available to alumni and other friends of the Commonwealth's eight state-supported four-year universities.

As of Feb. 13, the number of plates issued to Morehead State University alumni ranks third on the list of schools with 250 sold, trailing only the University of Kentucky and the University of Louisville.

The plates, which cost \$30, are good for five years and the purchaser must still pay vehicle tax and registration yearly.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University's Department of Home Economics is now accepting applications for its Approved Preprofessional Practice Program (AP4), a fifth year program for dietetics majors.

To become a dietitian, students have two paths to follow, according to Dr. Marilyn Y. Sampley, department chair. They can participate in an approved internship program at a large medical center or complete the AP4 or fifth year program.

MSU has expanded its existing program to prepare students as entry level dietitians and fulfill a need that is evident in the region, Dr. Sampley said. "Currently, only the University of Kentucky has a similar program which accepts less than 10 students per year," she said.

"As there are not enough medical centers for the students who need them, it becomes the University's responsibility to come up with the facilities to provide the same kinds of experiences provided by the internship program," Dr. Sampley said.

Students may apply during March with selection to be made in April for the first six students to enroll in the new program in the fall semester. Thereafter, the number of students will be increased to 10.

Candidates must have completed a four-year dietetics program to enter the AP4. They will begin the coursework on campus with 32 classroom hours each semester before relocating to a clinical site for the 1,136 hours needed to complete the program.

At clinical sites, students usually will be on duty 40 hours per week where they will be supervised by faculty and dietetic educators and practitioners, Dr. Sampley said. Institutions where students will complete practicums are St. Claire Medical Center in Morehead, Bellefonte Hospital in Ashland, Humana Hospital in Lexington, Highlands Regional Hospital in Prestonsburg and St. Marys Hospital in Huntington, W.Va. Each student will have a week at Heart of Riverview in South Point, Ohio, a long-term health care facility, and a school lunch experience with Menifee County Schools.

When the program is completed, participants will be eligible to sit for the national registry exam.

Currently, most of our students have to go out of state to get the training, Dr. Sampley said. "Competition is keen for the internships and applying does not mean one will be accepted," she said.

According to Dr. Sampley, there is a great demand for qualified dietitians nationwide. MSU has received requests for program graduates from agencies in Pennsylvania, California, Indiana and Virginia as well as Eastern Kentucky.

The program has been approved for 10 years by the American Dietetic Association Council on Education Division of Education Accreditation/Approval, a specialized accrediting body recognized by the Council on Postsecondary Accreditation and the United States Department of Education.

Following a 90 minute executive session, the board unanimously voted to authorize the chair William R. Seaton to offer a four-year contract to the 51-year-old administrator with the terms to be negotiated. The vote came on a motion by regent T.T. Colley of Pikeville.

Dr. Eaglin will succeed MSU President C. Nelson Grote, who retires June 30 after serving as the University's CEO since July 1, 1987. The South Carolina administrator was one three finalists for the post. The national search which began last spring drew 177 nominations and applications with 133 of those being active candidates. Chairing the search was regent Wayne Martin.

A former vice chancellor for academic affairs at USC's Spartanburg campus, he began his work in higher education administration in the area of student life/housing and has taught both in public school and university settings. In the early 1970s, he served as regional director, Southeast Office of the American College Testing Program.

He holds a B.S. degree in biology and mathematics from Southeast Missouri State University, a M.Ed. degree in student personnel administration from Southern Illinois University and a Ph.D. degree in educational psychology from the University of Utah.

A graduate of Leadership South Carolina, he is active in the NCAA's President's Commission and the American Association of State Colleges and Universities. He frequently serves as a consultant throughout the Southeast and often presents workshops for colleges on student retention, leadership and academic advisement.

Another major factor in their decision may have been economics, as their parents had to pay for three college educations all at the same time. Their father, John, works at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, and their mother, Harriet, is an in-season tax consultant.
