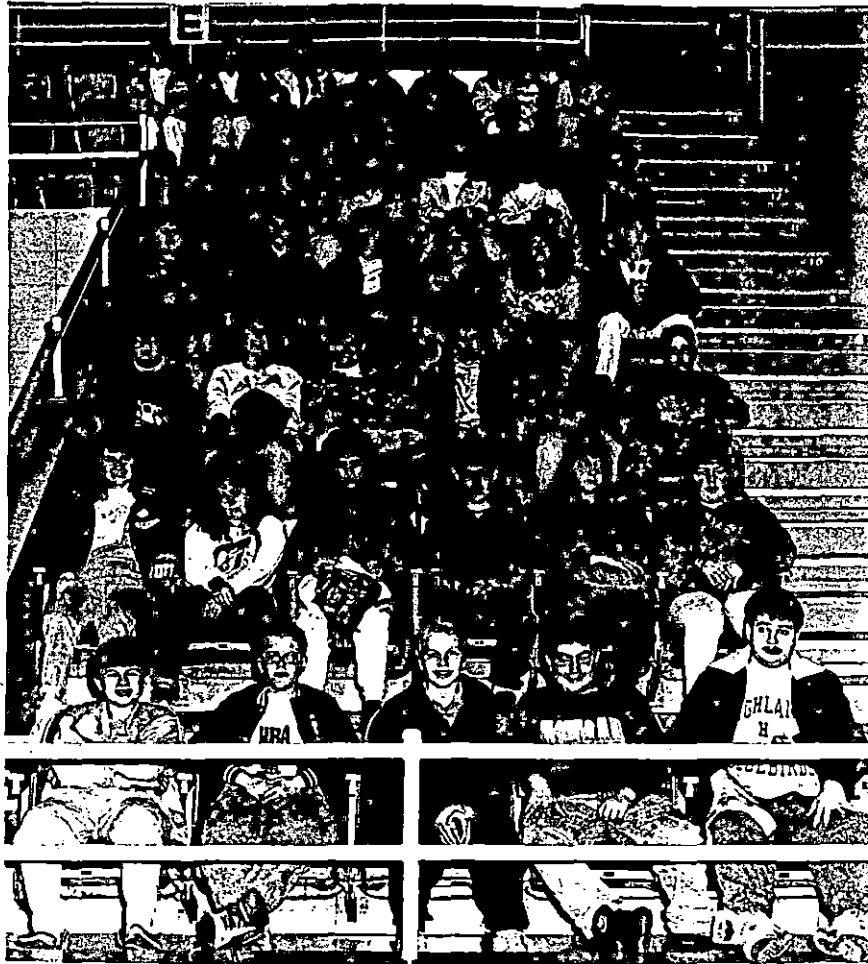

MOREHEAD, Ky.---His last work isn't off the presses yet, but Dr. John E. Kleber, Morehead State University professor of history, already has another commission.

Dr. Kleber, who edited the Kentucky Encyclopedia which is scheduled to be out June 1, has been asked to write the history of Kentucky's Clark County. The invitation came from the Clark County Bicentennial Committee and the Clark County Historical Society.

Working with him on this project will be the distinguished historian Dr. Thomas D. Clark, professor emeritus of history at the University of Kentucky. Dr. Kleber said he expects the compilation and publication of the county's history to be completed in three years.

Published by the University Press of Kentucky, the first copy of the Kentucky Encyclopedia will be presented to Gov. Brereton Jones on June 1. Dr. Kleber was selected to serve as editor-in-chief of the encyclopedia by the Kentucky Bicentennial Commission, which mandated publication of the annals as its major project.

Dr. Kleber, who joined MSU's faculty in 1968, gained recognition among the state's historical scholars for his earlier work in editing the papers of Gov. Lawrence W. Wetherby.

Returning to the classroom last fall after a three-year leave of absence, Dr. Kleber is teaching a special seminar this spring for history students--Practicing History.

The seminar is designed to give students the opportunity to learn just how historians discover and gather information. The students are learning how to use standard reference works, including primary source materials and professional journals, as well as computer software programs.

A native of Louisville, Dr. Kleber graduated summa cum laude from Bellarmine College, earned his master's and doctoral degrees from the University of Kentucky and has done additional graduate study at the University of California-Irvine.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---For the 16th consecutive year, Morehead State University's Individual Events (IE) team captured the top spot in the IE competition at the Kentucky Forensic Association's State Tournament last weekend (Feb. 27-29).

In addition the MSU squad also won the tournament's overall Grand Sweepstakes by more than 100 points, according to Jan Caldwell, assistant professor of speech and team coach.

(For the Grand Sweepstakes title, points earned in both debate and IE are calculated.)

"MSU's team placed in 33 of the possible 60 tournament slots, taking first place berths in 8 of 10 events," Caldwell said. "Those eight individuals taking first are considered the state champions in their category."

Leading the team with three first place wins was Larry Coy, **Shepherdsville** sophomore. Coy took first in prose interpretation, poetry interpretation and pentathlon, while also earning thirds in impromptu speaking and dramatic interpretation as well as both fourth place in dramatic duo teamed with Ashley Van Scoyoc, **Blacksburg, Va.**, freshman, and fifth in dramatic duo teamed with Brian Gardner, **Louisville** junior.

VanScoyoc also earned second in dramatic interpretation and fifth in poetry interpretation. He and Chad Ratliff, **Jeffersonville** freshman, added sweepstakes points by competing in six rounds of Cross Examination Debate Association (CEDA) debate.

Gardner placed first in informative speaking, third in both rhetorical criticism and pentathlon, fourth in extemporaneous speaking and sixth in persuasive speaking.

Rachel Craft, **Morehead** junior, teamed up with Ratliff for first place in dramatic duo. A third place winner in poetry interpretation, Craft earned fourth in prose interpretation, informative speaking and pentathlon.

Ratliff also earned third in after dinner speaking.

Jill Karwatka, **Morehead** freshman, finished in first place in persuasive speaking which qualifies her to represent the state in the Interstate Oratorical Society's tournament in May.

Lesia Bryant, **Blue Creek, Ohio**, junior, earned first in rhetorical criticism, second in informative speaking, third in persuasive speaking and fifth in extemporaneous speaking.

April Erdmann, **Eldorado, Ohio**, junior, won first place in after dinner speaking, fourth in impromptu speaking and fifth in both informative and persuasive speaking.

Adam King, **Shepherdsville** freshman, earned first place in extemporaneous speaking. Army Darnell, **Lebanon, Ohio**, freshman, placed second in impromptu speaking, extemporaneous speaking and pentathlon, as well as fourth in both rhetorical criticism and after dinner speaking.

Greg Adams, **Cynthiana** junior, earned fifth place in dramatic interpretation, while teammate Chip Smith, **Cynthiana** freshman, placed sixth in the same event.

Also competing in the tournament were Mary Whidden, **Morehead** sophomore; Donna Woodall, **Morehead** freshman; John Coriell, **Portsmouth, Ohio**, senior; Kelly Dedman, **Lawrenceburg** junior, and Keith Thomas, **Cynthiana** freshman.

Held at Georgetown College, the tournament drew student competitors from 10 colleges and universities.

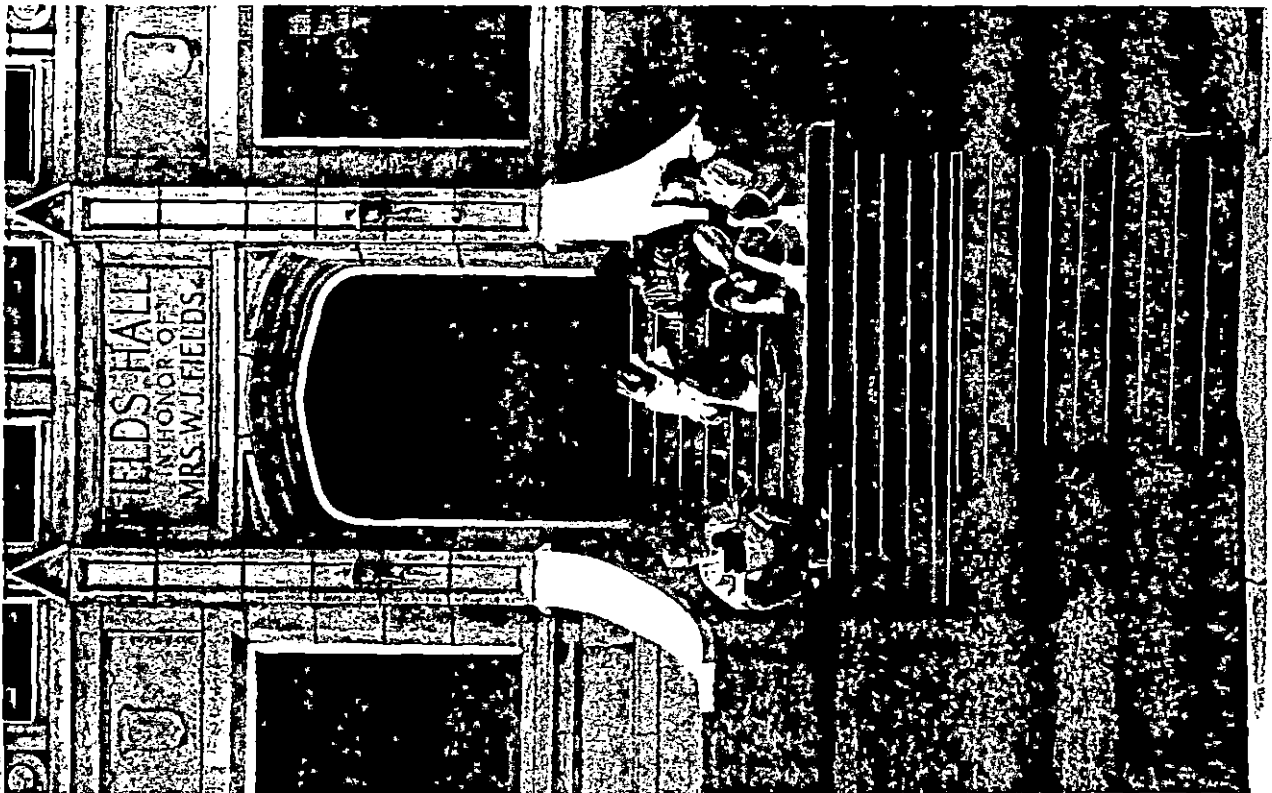

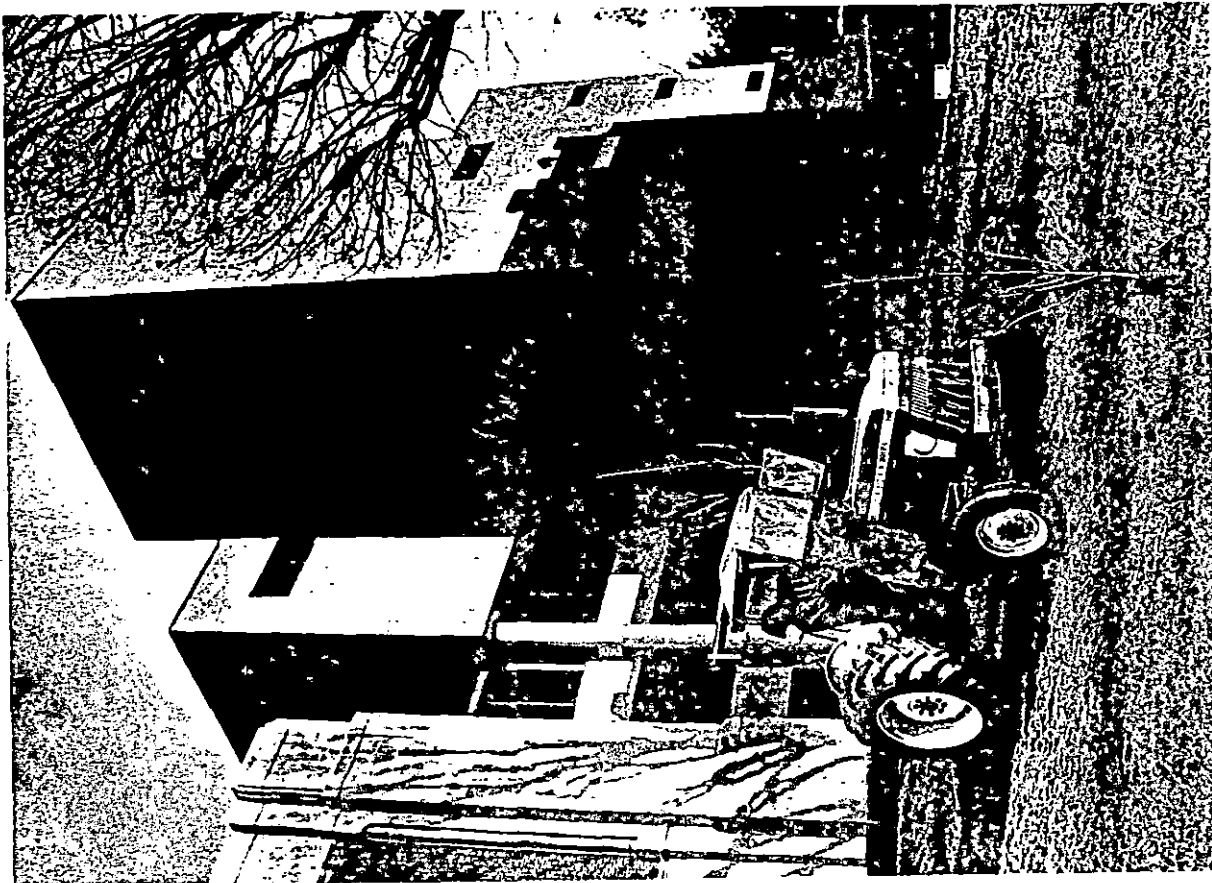

Approval for a five-year period came at the recent midyear meeting of the ABA House of Delegates in Dallas, Texas, and followed an on-site visit in October by the ABA Standing Committee on Legal Assistants, according to James P. Dahlberg, MSU assistant professor of government and program coordinator.

"ABA sanction for MSU's paralegal studies curriculum is tangible evidence of the program's quality," said MSU President C. Nelson Grote. "Professor Dahlberg and his colleagues are to be commended for their work in achieving this distinction. Paralegal studies joins an ever-growing list of MSU programs which have been approved or accredited by the appropriate educational body," he added.

Also commending the program's faculty, Dr. Charles Holt, interim chair of the Department of Geography, Government and History, said that Morehead State should be proud of this accomplishment. "There are more than 500 schools nationwide that offer paralegal training, but only approximately 118 are ABA approved," he said.

MSU's A.B. degree in paralegal studies provides training for legal assistants through a liberal arts education combined with professional and on-the-job training. The curriculum, developed under the ABA's guidelines, is designed exclusively for paralegals and not for lawyers.

After an overview of the study of law and an intensive course in legal research and writing, students take work in specific legal areas such as family law, wills and estates, property, contracts, personal injury and criminal law as well as in the fundamentals of litigation.

In addition, majors must complete a six-hour internship working in a law office for 20 hours per week for a semester or 40 hours a week during two summer terms. The internship is important as it provides the student an opportunity to apply what has been learned in the classroom, according to Dahlberg.

Currently there are 117 students majoring in the program on campus and Dahlberg estimated that another 30 are taking courses at MSU's extended campus centers in Ashland and Prestonsburg.

In an effort to ensure that the coursework provides the skills that attorneys are looking for in paralegals, MSU also has an advisory committee for paralegal studies. Headed by Morehead attorney Paul W. Blair, the committee includes: Steve Lewis, Cheryl Piper, Hugh Convery, Julie Lowe, Cindy Hammond, Dennis Stutsman, Lori Barker, Keith McCormick, Lynn Toy, all of Morehead, Tony Tipton of Mt. Sterling and Dahlberg.

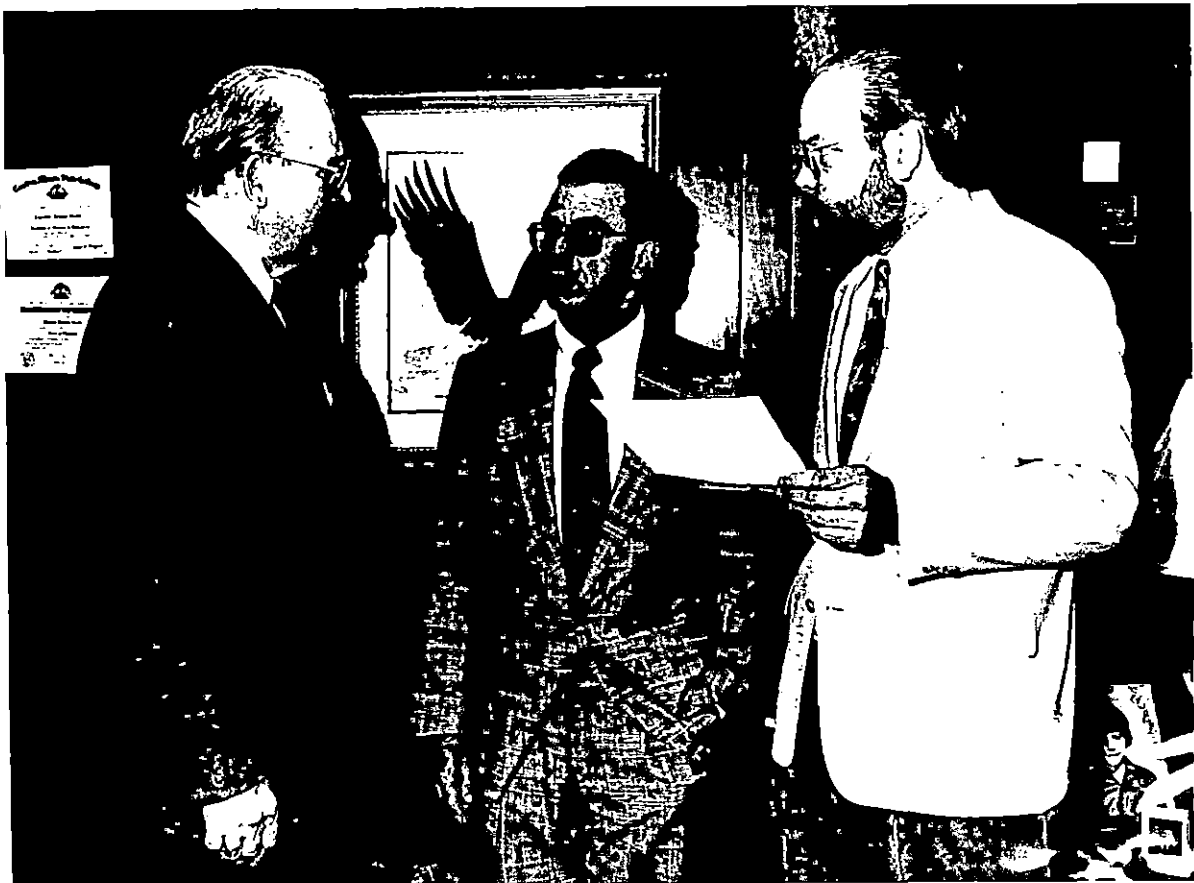

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Morehead State University has named Allie E. Secor as recycling coordinator for the campus, according to Porter Dailey, vice president for administration and fiscal services.

"Higher education needs to take a lead role in recycling efforts," Dailey said. "Recycling is a matter of educating ourselves to take better care of the world in which we live. With her work in the community to establish a recycling center, Ms. Secor already has proved herself to be an effective advocate for the environment," Dailey said.

Working 32 hours per week, Secor will be responsible for planning and implementing MSU's recycling program. She also will promote awareness of environmental concerns as well as develop educational and motivational programs, while seeing that MSU is in compliance with federal, state and local recyclable waste disposal laws.

"I'm really looking forward to working with the University as it increases its recycling efforts," said Secor, who spearheaded the establishment of the Community Recycling Center (CRC) of Morehead. "It is important for all of us to be aware of environmental issues.

"Recycling is one area where each of us can make a difference. If anyone has suggestions as to how the University can improve its recycling efforts, I encourage them to contact me at the Rice Maintenance Building by calling 783-2066," Secor added.

Secor, who joined the staff March 2, currently serves as the president of the CRC and is chairman of the Rowan County Solid Waste Board. She also serves as a consultant to the Rowan County Fiscal Court on solid waste management. A graduate of William Smith College in Geneva, N.Y., she and her family came to Morehead in 1988.

Currently the University is recycling paper products and aluminum. Also state law now mandates that all paper products purchased contain anywhere from 10 to 50 percent recycled material, depending on the product.

"From a modest pilot program two years ago, the University expanded its recycling efforts campuswide last year," Dailey said. "We found a great deal of support for the program. By December we had increased our collection of recyclable paper products by 250 percent, averaging nearly 500 pounds of paper per week," he added.

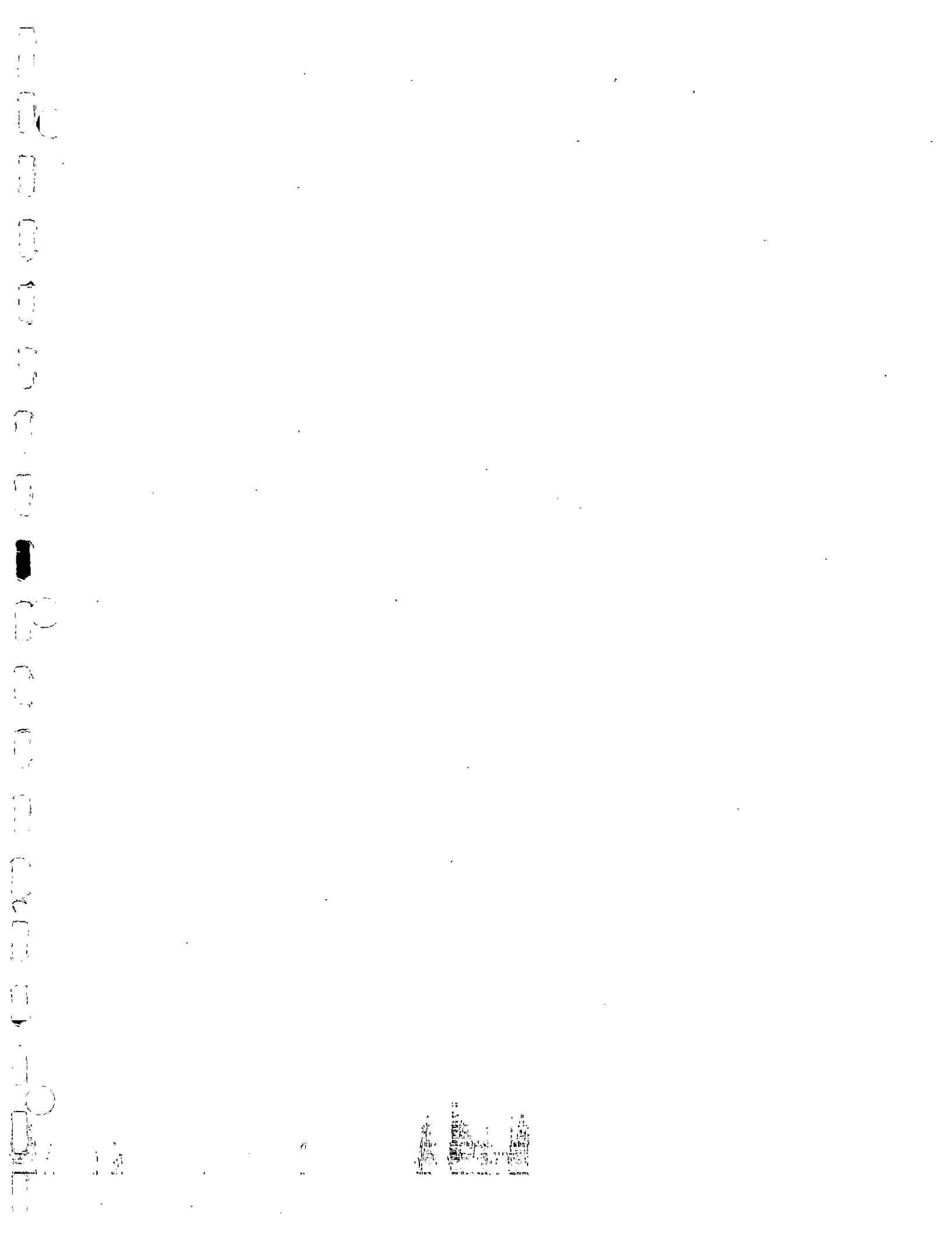

MOREHEAD, Ky.---The Morehead State University Foundation has received a \$100,000 bequest to establish an endowed scholarship fund in memory of a 1933 graduate who cherished his undergraduate years at MSU.

The late Lexington area auctioneer, George D. Scott Jr., always wanted to "do something" for Morehead State University, but he died before doing so.

Knowing how much her husband cared about his alma mater, Scott's wife, the former Alva Conrad of Cynthiana, made his intent a reality at her death by endowing a \$100,000 scholarship fund in his name.

Scott, a native of Carlisle, died after a long illness on Aug. 2, 1988. His wife followed him in death on Nov. 9, 1990.

"Morehead State is most appreciative that Mrs. Scott chose to honor the memory of her husband in this manner," said MSU President C. Nelson Grote. "She has made it possible for future generations of students to learn and enjoy the campus experience just as her husband did."

During his four years at MSU, Scott was active in many campus activities. He was a member of the football team and served as editor-in-chief of the Trail Blazer, the student newspaper.

Scott began his career as an auctioneer in the early 1940s, practicing his trade by selling livestock for the local stockyards. Obtaining his real estate license, he became a successful real estate broker and auctioneer, plying his craft in Paris, Richmond and Carlisle as well as throughout Central Kentucky. In a career that spanned more than 40 years, he was to become well known for a keen wit and sense of humor that could enliven the most boring auction.

The MSU Foundation will award the first scholarships from the George Scott Jr. Memorial Endowment Fund in 1993, according to Robert F. Howerton, executive vice president.

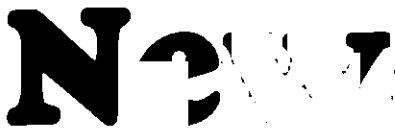

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Area residents will have an opportunity to go back in musical time with a special multi-media presentation of "60's Rock: When The Music Mattered" at 8 p.m. Thursday, April 2, in Button Auditorium on Morehead State University's campus.

Part of the Arts in Morehead (AIM) 1991-92 season programming, the show features rock lecturer Barry Drake, dubbed by critics as "a walking encyclopedia of music."

Admission will be by season ticket or by single event tickets which may be purchased at the door prior to the show at a cost of \$6 for adults and \$3 for non-MSU students. MSU students with valid I.D. cards will be admitted free.

AIM is a cooperative effort of MSU and the Morehead/Rowan County Arts Council.

The decade of the 60s is considered by many to be one of the most interesting periods in American history. Through all the good and bad times, it was music that brought us together and sometimes tore us apart, according to Drake.

The political turmoil, the social upheaval, the Hippie Movement, the Vietnam War and the generation gap were all reflected in the popular music of the day. The Beatles, Bob Dylan, Jimi Hendrix, The Supremes, The Beach Boys, Simon and Garfunkle, the Rolling Stones and even the Monkees were the sounds filling the airwaves during those years.

Using lecture, slides, recorded music and interviews, Drake will examine, clarify and put into perspective one of the most exciting decades of our music history.

Drake bought his first rock 'n' roll record in 1954. Growing up in the New York City area, he saw everyone from Buddy Holly and Chuck at the Brooklyn Paramount to Jimi Hendrix and Janis Joplin at The Fillmore. In 1967, Drake was in San Francisco hanging out on the streets with the Grateful Dead and the Jefferson Airplane.

In the mid-1960s, he became a performer and songwriter, signing with Capitol Records in 1970 and touring U.S. and Europe. A respected collector and dealer of rare records, Drake started his own record company, booking agency and management firm. He was nominated for the National Association of Campus Activities Lecturer of the Year for 1991.

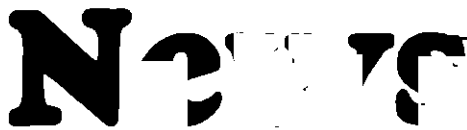

Dr. Mary Northcutt Powell, professor emeritus of education, will receive the award from William R. Seaton, chairman of MSU's Board of Regents, during the annual Founders Day Convocation and Awards Ceremony on Friday, April 3, at 10:30 a.m. in Button Auditorium.

Saluting Kentucky's Bicentennial as well as MSU's 70th anniversary as a public institution of higher education, the convocation will feature Dr. John Kleber, MSU professor of history and editor of the "Kentucky Encyclopedia," as speaker.

He will discuss the project which was commissioned by the Kentucky Bicentennial Commission and is to be published by the University Press of Kentucky in June.

"To say that Mary Northcutt Powell has contributed much to enhance the quality of elementary education is truly an understatement," said MSU President C. Nelson Grote.

"Her efforts in developing teacher education curricula in elementary and early childhood education as well as in helping schools attain accreditation have been extraordinary. We are recognizing Dr. Powell for service that goes beyond this University--for raising educational standards throughout southeastern United States," Dr. Grote said.

Dr. Powell, chair of MSU's Department of Elementary and Early Childhood Education from 1970 until her retirement in 1982, began her University service in 1955 as a supervising teacher at University Breckinridge School.

Her leadership resulted in Breckinridge becoming the first Kentucky elementary school to be accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS). A two-time graduate of MSU with a doctorate from George Peabody College, Dr. Powell was one of the developers of SACS' Commission on Elementary schools, working with colleges from 10 other states to develop the commission's standards and procedures.

In 1989, she was recognized by SACS as Kentucky's recipient of the Distinguished Educational Achievement Award. Although retired from full-time teaching, Dr. Powell has continued to teach when needed and remains active as a consultant to schools seeking accreditation. She also maintains an active volunteer role with several civic and church organizations.

Also during the convocation, Dr. Kleber and other MSU personnel who contributed to the Kentucky Encyclopedia project will be recognized, according to Alex Conyers, MSU associate professor of finance and chair of the Founders Day committee.

The encyclopedia is the first comprehensive reference work to pull together the facts about people, places, things and events that have made Kentucky both a seedbed of change and a place where tradition is still honored. The 2,000-plus entries reflect the whole commonwealth and chronicle its history from prehistoric times to today.

Founders Day will begin with a special breakfast for all retired faculty and staff members at which time President Grote will recognize those who retired during the past year or who intend to retire by June 30.

At a noon luncheon following the convocation, new MSU Fellows will be honored and volunteer fund raisers will be recognized by the Office of Development and MSU Foundation. Tickets for the \$6 per plate luncheon must be purchased and picked up in advance.

In addition, MSU will mark Founders Day with other special events, including several arranged by the University's Student Alumni Ambassadors.

Kicking off the student activities will be a street dance on Wednesday, April 1, on University Boulevard, beginning at 9 p.m. On Thursday, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., students will be encouraged to sign a giant birthday card which will be presented at the convocation. Signees will receive a piece of birthday cake. Also the ambassadors will distribute blue and gold ribbons on Thursday and prior to the convocation.

Also scheduled on Founders Day at 2 p.m. on the third floor of ADUC will be a ribbon cutting for the newly renovated Red Room, which has been renamed the Commonwealth Room. As part of MSU's commemoration of the state's 200th birthday, a series of 12 Kentucky Bicentennial limited edition prints have been purchased by the Student Government Association to be hung in the room.
