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



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

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



Erin Sudbrack, junior, second place in senior high microbiology, for "Leaching of Copper from Chalcopyrite by Thiobacillus Thioparus."


Susan Basch, junior, third place in senior high chemistry, for "Thermal Characteristics of a Binary Hydrate-Solute Syustem."



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



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

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











Daughter of Kermit and Barbara Gamble of Salyersville, Gamble said she hopes "the visit made a positive influence on our congressmen and the result will be continuation of the types of programs which assist students in reaching goals they might not reach otherwise."

After a week of informal activities--and a well planned schedule--Reynolds had only high praise for what he had experienced. "Not only was it educational, but we could tell those making the laws just what was important to students."

While he was not really pleased with some of the methods used to determine which programs would be funded, Reynolds, son of Bill and Mary Ann Reynolds of Sandy Hook, said he enjoyed "seeing how you lobby for your cause, and in our case, it was asking that education be given a higher priority."

The trip to the nation's capital reinforced the students' life goals: Gamble plans to attend college with the goal of becoming a pharmacist, while Reynolds wants to do research with a pharmaceutical company and will shoot for a degree in microbiology.

According to Carolyn Horn, MSU coordinator of Educational Talent Search who accompanied the students to Washington, the experience was two-fold: the students saw first-hand how the legislative system works and they gained valuable insight that will make them better citizens.

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



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

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Celebration was the key word Friday (April 3) as Morehead State University observed its 70th anniversary as a public institution of higher education.

Founders Day 1992 was a festive time as the University recognized friends, reflected on its past and looked to the future.

Convocation and Awards Ceremony speaker, Dr. John Kleber told his audience that 1992 was an "auspicious time for celebration" and noted that the year marked the quintcentenary anniversary of the discovery of the Americas, the bicentennial of the creation of Kentucky statehood and the founding of MSU.

Dr. Kleber, MSU professor of history and editor-in-chief of The Kentucky Encyclopedia, said:

"The year 1992 should be a celebration of more than the founding of places. It is a celebration of people as well, for the two are intrinsically connected."

In his opening remarks, Dr. Kleber noted that "from time to time, uncommon people come along to accomplish great feats, and after they have passed nothing is ever quite the same."

Columbus was one such person and, according to Dr. Kleber, Frank and Phoebe Button, who founded MSU's predecessor institution nearly 105 years ago, also were "unique individuals who herald change."

Recounting his 36-month odyssey as editor of the first comprehensive reference work on the state, Dr. Kleber talked about his research into people and places that figure in Kentucky's history. "Like Columbus and the Buttons, I have made certain discoveries, and the greatest of these is that our strength lies in our wonderful and diverse people," he said.

Commissioned by the Kentucky Bicentennial Commission, The Kentucky Encyclopedia will go on sale on June 1, Statehood Day for Kentucky. The work is being published by the University Press of Kentucky. The historian also recognized 15 contributors to the work who have MSU connections.

"On June 1, you are all invited to the biggest birthday party the state has ever seen," Dr. Kleber told his listeners. "I hope that many of you will go to Frankfort on that day, enjoy the parade and fireworks. But, most of all, go to celebrate yourself. As I discovered, you are, indeed, the uncommonwealth of Kentucky."

Also during the Convocation, the 1992 Founders Day for University Service Award was presented to Dr. Mary Northcutt Powell, a pioneer in elementary school accreditation and professor emeritus of education.

In accepting the award presented by Dr. Alban Wheeler, faculty representative to the MSU Board of Regents, Dr. Powell said that she "symbolically shared" the honor with all those who had supported her efforts.

She told the nearly 500 faculty, staff, students, alumni and other friends of MSU present in Button Auditorium that she was grateful for the sense of friendliness and nurturing she found at MSU. "I have always felt a sense of pride that I can say, 'Yes, I represent Morehead State University'."

At the noon luncheon following the convocation, the celebration continued as the MSU Foundation recognized its new MSU Fellows and presented "Outstanding Faculty/Staff Fund Raiser" awards to Dr. John R. Duncan, professor of education, and Adrian Swain, curator of MSU's Folk Art Collection.

Dan Lacy, MSU alumnus and vice president for corporate communications at Ashland Oil, Inc., presented MSU President C. Nelson Grote with a check for \$75,000 on behalf of the Ashland Oil Foundation. The check represented the second payment of unrestricted funds of a five-year commitment made last year by the AOF, totaling \$750,000 and representing the single largest gift in MSU's history.

The good news continued with announcements by Robert F. Howerton, MSU's director of development, of a new \$50,000 endowed scholarship given anonymously and by MSU Foundation President Larry Fannin of the launching of a Dr. C. Nelson and Wilma Grote Endowed Scholarship Fund.

Noting that the Grotes' "warm and gentle ways have endeared them" to the people of the region, Fannin said that the MSU Foundation had committed \$5,000 to the fund and that money had been matched by another anonymous donor.

Closing the Founders Day activities was the Alumni Awards Dinner, sponsored by the MSU Alumni Association. Recognized for their accomplishments by induction into the Alumni Hall of Fame were:

Vic Carter, Atlanta television news reporter and a 1978 graduate of MSU; Liz Everman, Louisville television evening news anchor and 1977 graduate, and Glenn D. Leveridge, president and chief executive officer of Liberty National Bank of Lexington and a 1970 graduate, along with MSU's newest alumnus President Grote. The president, who retires June 30, and his wife were recognized moments earlier as honorary alumni.

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



MOREHEAD, Ky.---A key player in the Watergate affair and now a Presbyterian minister, Jeb Stuart Magruder will discuss "The Nixon Presidency" at Morehead State University in an open convocation Thursday, April 23.

The convocation is scheduled for 10:20 a.m. in Button Auditorium.

While on the campus, he will speak informally to students and faculty in an afternoon session. Coordinated by Dr. Donald Flatt, MSU professor of history, Magruder's visit is an outgrowth of one of Dr. Flatt's classes: "The Use and Misuse of Presidential Powers."

Students and social studies teachers from schools in MSU's 22-county service region have been invited to attend the convocation.

"With Mr. Magruder's campus appearance, we have a superb opportunity to make our nation's history, especially the Watergate era, become more real to our students," said Dr. Charles Holt, interim chair of the Department of Geography, Government and History.

In 1972, Magruder, as deputy campaign director for the committee for the re-election of the president, figured prominently in the Watergate scandal which resulted in President Richard Nixon's resignation. Magruder pleaded guilty to a conspiracy to obstruct justice and to wiretapping the Democratic National Committee headquarters. Sentenced to a prison term of ten months to four years, he was released after serving seven months.

Now serving as senior minister at Lexington's First Presbyterian Church, Magruder leads a 900-plus congregation. Ordained in 1981 after receiving a master's of divinity degree from Princeton Theological Seminary, he has served as associate pastor at the First Presbyterian Church in Burlingame, Calif., and as executive minister of the First Community Church, Columbus, Ohio.

He is the author of "An American Life: One Man's Road to Watergate" and "From Power to Peace." Currently he is working on a third book dealing with ethics and values in America today.

Magruder also holds a Bachelor of Arts degree from Williams College and an M.B.A. degree from the University of Chicago.

Magruder's visit to MSU is jointly sponsored by the Department of Geography, Government and History, College of Arts and Sciences, Academy of Arts and the Division of Student Life.

It serves 20 Eastern Kentucky counties with centers located at MSU, at the MSU-Big Sandy Extended Campus Center in Prestonsburg, at the MSU-Ashland Area Extended Campus Center and at MSU-Licking Valley Extended Campus Center in West Liberty.

Each center has a full-time counselor who serves multiple counties, providing interested residents with information on educational programs and financial aid programs available, Howard said.

"We want to help adults obtain post-secondary educational goals, whether these be a community college degree, vocational-technical training or a university degree," Howard added. "Participants must either have graduated from high school or have attained a GED.

"MSU is not alone in this endeavor," Howard said. "This is a cooperative effort in that we are working with community colleges, vocational-technical schools, human services agencies and other governmental agencies," he added.

In addition to directing the project, Howard also serves in Carter County as a counselor. He spends Thursdays from 2 to 5 p.m. at the Learning Center in Olive Hill.

A native of Elliott County, Howard has an extensive background as a social services administrator in Northeast Kentucky, having worked with Pathways, Inc., with the Elliott County Fiscal Court, Northeast Kentucky Legal Services, FIVCO Area Development District, Eastern Kentucky Concentrated Employment Program and Kentucky's Manpower Services.

Howard earned a B.S. degree from Morehead State and his Master of Education degree with emphasis on community and vocational counseling from the University of Louisville.

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

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

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

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Meeting in a special session on April 17, Morehead State University's Board of Regents raised admissions standards, approved the 1992-93 fee schedule and heard plans for reducing the 1992-93 operating budget by \$5.8 million.

The proposed budget cuts which affect both personnel and programs are being made across all divisions of the University, ranging from athletics and the administration to academic affairs. "Every facet of the University has been examined and re-examined," MSU President C. Nelson Grote said.

Using what officials termed a "conservative" enrollment projection of 8,400 students, the University has developed a preliminary operating budget of \$56.9 million which includes funding to continue MSU's dental and health insurance benefits to employees.

MSU's personnel budget will be reduced by \$2.8 million, operating expenses by \$1.7 million and capital projects by \$563,000. According to the proposal, 65.75 positions will be eliminated. While 11.5 faculty positions are included, Dr. John C. Philley, vice president for academic affairs, told the regents that number translated into nearly 25 temporary faculty members employed on a year-to-year basis.

MSU's institutional scholarship program will be reduced from the current \$2.2 million to \$1.9 million. "This will still allow us to meet our renewal commitment to returning students and provide \$500,000 for new students and \$48,000 for transfer students," Mike Mincey, vice president for student life, said.

The university advancement budget, which includes athletics, will be cut by \$423,000 by eliminating eight jobs, reducing the number of scholarships in football and men's basketball and eliminating men's soccer, a non-conference sport.

The fee schedule approved by the regents does not include increases in residence hall rentals, the student health fee, or meal plans. The board was told that if the Council on Higher Education should further increase the 1992-93 tuition rates, MSU will re-evaluate its \$30 per semester increase in the student activity and services fee. The parking fee was set at \$35 per year for faculty/staff and students.

The newly-approved admissions standards call for an admissions index of 400 for unconditional admission to MSU, up from 380 this past year. To be admitted conditionally, students must have a minimum admissions index of 350 with an ACT composite of 14. The admissions index is calculated by combining grade point averages and ACT scores.

In other business, the board ratified a contract agreement with Dr. Ronald G. Eaglin, who assumes the MSU presidency July 1, which set his salary at \$115,000 for the year. The president-elect was present at the board meeting and said he was there as an "observer."

The regents also adopted a resolution commending former board member Walter Carr of Morehead for "his time, energy and dedication" given the board since his appointment in 1984.

Carr was succeeded on the board by Louis "Sonny" Jones of Frankfort, who was appointed earlier this month by Gov. Brereton Jones. Jones and William Cofield, who was reappointed at the same time, were sworn in at the meeting. They will serve until June 30 when all university boards will be reconstituted under a new law. Gov. Jones, who is not related to Louis Jones, is required to reappoint at least one half of the board membership.



MOREHEAD, Ky.---Kentucky's beautiful flowering dogwoods, like their counterparts in the eastern and southeastern United States, are under attack by a devastating fungus.

Signs of the fungus, **discula destructiva**, have already shown up in Kentucky, according to Dr. David M. Brumagen, professor of biological and environmental sciences at Morehead State University.

The disease has done extensive damage in many southeastern states and is expected to rise dramatically in Kentucky in the near future, said Dr. Brumagen, who just returned from a workshop on the fungus which is wiping out flowering dogwoods across more than a dozen states.

Dr. Brumagen is studying the prevalence of the disease in Eastern Kentucky and is looking for sightings of diseased plants.

Symptoms include:

* Lower limb die-back where upper limbs are leafing and blooming, but bottom limbs are without foliage or blossom.

*Leaves will have tan spots ringed in purple. The flowers also will show brown spots, especially during excessively wet periods.

*Larger, well-established trees with the disease will begin to have dense new branches at the base.

"These branchings would resemble the basal sucker growth of wind damaged tobacco plants," Dr. Brumagen explained.

Anyone noticing any of these symptoms on the dogwoods should contact Dr. Brumagen at (606) 783-2959.

"I am particularly interested in hearing from individuals in Eastern Kentucky counties who suspect there might be something wrong with their dogwoods, whether in a residential or forest setting," the scientist said.
