MOREHEAD, Ky.--The U.S. Department of Education has awarded Morehead State University's Division of Student Life \$109,680 for a peer program aimed at preventing substance abuse.

The grant from the department's Fund for Improvement of Post Secondary Education covers a 28-month period, from Sept. 1, 1992 through Dec. 31, 1994, according to Mike Mincey, MSU vice president for student life.

Describing the announcement as "great news," Mincey said, "the grant offers us a tremendous opportunity to help our students cope with many of the negative social pressures facing them in today's society."

The vice president also said that this was the first time MSU has received a grant through the FIPSE program.

According to Judy Krug, MSU's substance abuse educator and project coordinator, the peer education program will be aimed at MSU students, but it could have implications for other community youth groups.

"In today's complex society, college students are faced with a lot of pressures. Through this wellness peer education program we hope to help them successfully deal with those pressures," Krug said.

"We will use student volunteers who will be trained to work with other students to help them develop self-enhancement skills in such areas as assertiveness, interpersonal relationships and communication. By working on these skills, we believe that we can decrease the need for alcohol or other substances and thereby the use," Krug said.

The student volunteers, after undergoing intensive training, will be prepared to present programs--on request--to student organizations, classes and any other student group.

"The idea behind the project is that students listen to students. Studies prove that peer communication is more effective than many other means," Krug said.

The FIPSE start-up grant will be used for developing a manual, training and project promotional materials, other resource materials and miscellaneous personnel costs, including a graduate assistant.

At the JSF annual awards dinner held recently at Morehead State University, Judy B. Thomas, JSF chairperson, said:

"Thanks to the support of these people, the Jesse Stuart Foundation has grown into a strong national organization that is supplementing the educational system at all levels with books that preserve our history and heritage while teaching solid values."

A special surprise tribute to Dr. C. Nelson Grote, president emeritus of MSU and a former board member, was announced. The Foundation's new edition of Stuart's "To Teach, To Love" was dedicated to the educator/administrator, who retired from the presidency on June 30. MOREHEAD, Ky.---Dr. Ronald L. Mitchelson, previously a professor of geography at the University of Georgia, has been named chair of Morehead State University's Department of Geography, Government and History.

The appointment, effective earlier this month, was announced by Dr. Gerald DeMoss, acting dean of MSU's College of Arts and Sciences. The new chair also will hold faculty rank as professor of geography.

"Dr. Mitchelson has experience in teaching and has done extensive research work," Dr. DeMoss said. "During his 13 years at UG he served and chaired numerous committees on both the departmental and college level. His broad-based background will be an asset as he leads our multidisciplinary department," Dr. DeMoss added.

The new department chair, who considers himself a social scientist, earned his doctorate and master's degree from Ohio State University and a bachelor's degree magna cum laude from State University of New York at Buffalo.

A member of Phi Beta Kappa, he is active in the Association of American Geographers and its special interest groups on transportation, energy and behavioral methods as well as the National Council for Geographic Education.

Dr. Mitchelson has received numerous research grants, including more than \$63,000 from the U.S. Department of State for a project tracing the "Georges Bank Historic Fisheries: 1871-1920" and several from the U.S. Department of Commerce to investigate trends in long distance commuting from basically rural to urban areas and the development consequences for rural areas.

He has authored or co-authored more than 30 articles for various publications and 28 abstracts as well as other published materials. He also serves as a referee for several professional journals and as a textbook reviewer for various major publishing firms.

A frequent presenter at professional meetings, Dr. Mitchelson also has been a consultant to the Central Ohio Transit Authority, the Department of State, S.E. Wildlife Services, Inc. and the U.S. Central Intelligence Agency.

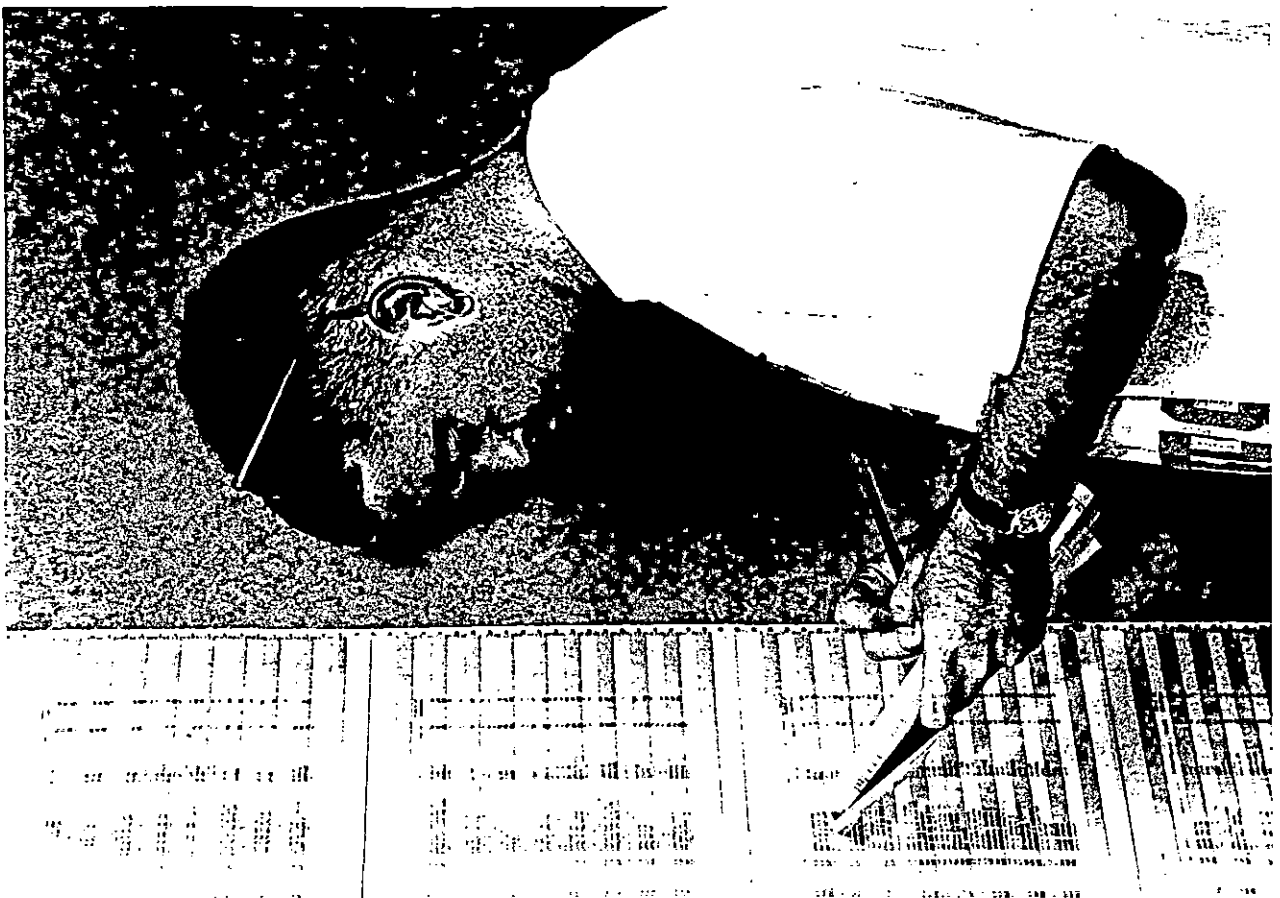

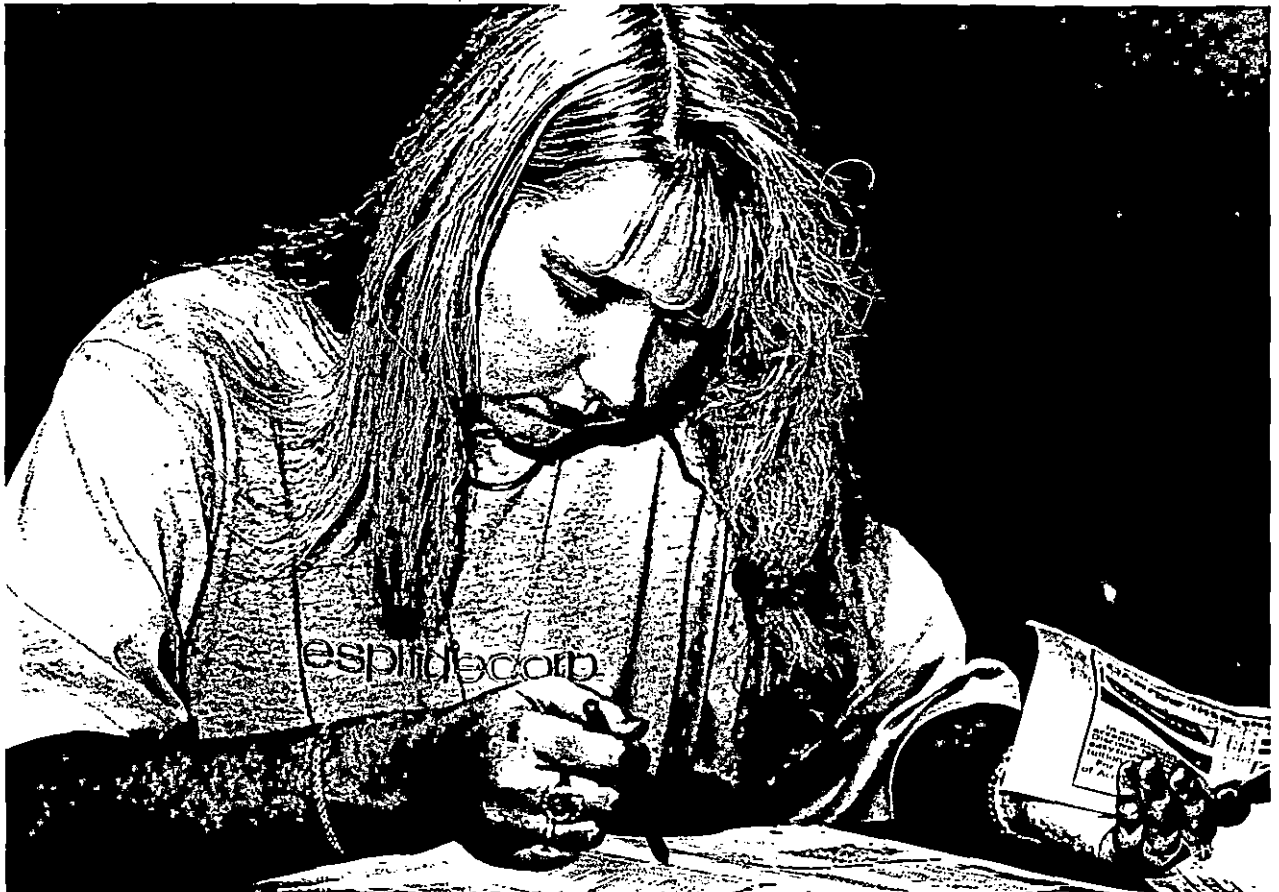

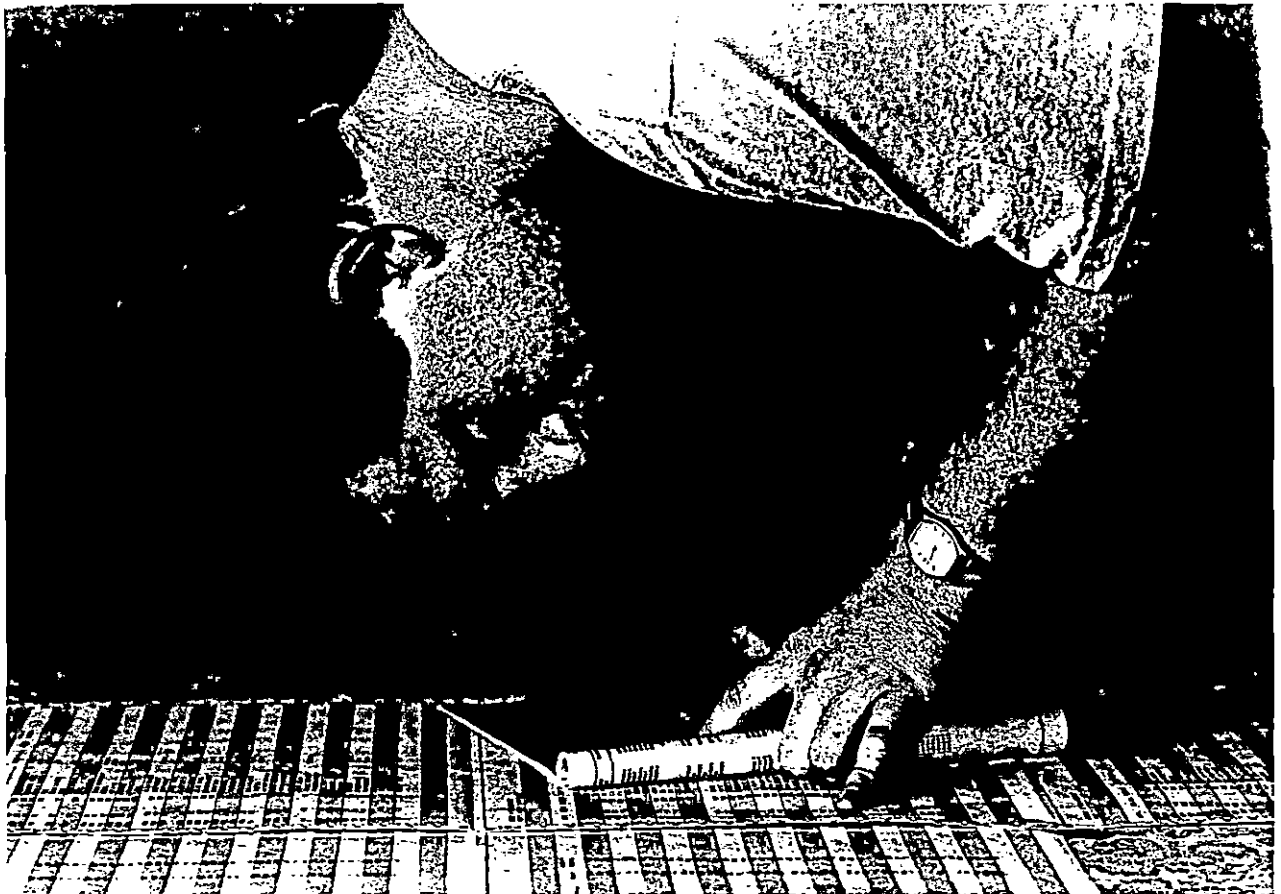

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Two Eastern Kentucky high school seniors were among 90 students from 45 states and U.S. territories participating in the third annual National Student Leadership Congress, held earlier this summer in Washington, D.C.

Representing Morehead State University's Upward Bound Program were Machell Owens, daughter of Arley and Linda Owens of West Liberty, and Jennifer Reynolds, daughter of Ronnie and Rhonda Reynolds of Sandy Hook.

Sponsored by the National Council of Educational Opportunity Associations from June 6 through June 11, the congress brought students from all over the U.S. to the nation's capitol where they learned about the legislative process for higher education and were taught leadership skills.

"The program is designed to get young people involved in the higher education legislative process; it's an intensive learning experience," said Jennifer Cady, coordinator of Upward Bound at MSU. "We're rather proud that two of Kentucky's four delegates to the congress were from Morehead State's program."

During the weeklong congress, Owens and Reynolds took part in workshops dealing with leadership and negotiation skills, had opportunities to talk with congressional leaders and visit historic sites.

Also on the schedule was a performance of "Conrack" at Ford's Theater--an event which turned out to be an unforgettable experience for Reynolds, who met President Bush.

Greeting the theatre-goers and shaking hands with them as he made his way to his seat, Bush noticed the group of teenagers with nametags and stopped to speak. "I shook hands with him and he asked me what I was doing in Washington," Reynolds said. "Remembering what we learned during class sessions, I told him all I could about the leadership congress and its goals," she added.

"They will play a major role in MSU's efforts to help public schools in its service region meet the mandates of the Kentucky Education Reform Act. We believe they are well qualified to lead their faculties in this endeavor," the dean said.

Currently the director of WIU's Center for the Preparation of Educators of Minority Children, Dr. Mosley has an extensive background in special education programs, including the handicapped, as well as in minority education. In the MSU post, he succeeds Dr. Paul McGhee, who announced last year his intention to return full-time to the classroom.

Dr. Mosley also developed and has directed WIU's Summer Tutoring Program for Minority Junior High Schools, which was recognized by the Council for Advancement and Support of Education (CASE) in 1989.

A former chair of WIU's Department of Special Education, Dr. Mosley was a Board of Governors Administrative Fellow in 1989-90, assigned to the Office of Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs at Eastern Illinois University. He has served on several college faculties, including Louisiana State University, Indiana University, University of Texas and the University of Hartford.

A former teacher in the public schools of Indiana and Tennessee, Dr. Mosley earned his doctorate in special education from the University of Connecticut, a master's degree from the University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh, and the bachelor's degree from Fisk University.

Active in several professional organizations, he has written numerous articles for publication and is a frequent presenter at professional meetings. He has served as a consultant for various public school systems in the midwest; for state departments of education in five states, and for the U.S. Department of Education and U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

Dr. Weikel, recognized nationwide as a leading authority on clinical mental health counseling, succeeds Dr. Richard Daniel, professor of education, who served as interim chair during the past year.

A charter member of the American Mental Health Counselors Association (AMHCA) and the founding editor of its journal, Dr. Weikel also is past president of the association and served on the Governing Council of the 57,000-member American Association for Counseling and Development. He has held national and state offices in numerous other professional organizations.

A prolific researcher, Dr. Weikel has written or co-authored more than 30 articles for scientific journals and co-edited a definitive text on the growth of the mental health counseling field. He has served on the editorial boards of seven professional periodicals; made presentations at more than 70 national, regional and state meetings, and received several grants in support of his research. He has been consistently honored for service by the AMHCA.

Dr. Weikel earned his B.A. degree from Temple University, an M.A. degree from University of Scranton and his doctorate from the University of Florida.

In announcing the new chairs, Dr. Kohut also said that he appreciated the efforts of Dr. Daniel and Dr. McGhee. "I want to publicly thank Dr. Daniel for his diligence and cooperation during his two years as interim chair and Dr. McGhee for his nine years of dedication and leadership given during a period of tremendous growth and change," he said.

Once degrees are conferred, the new graduates will be welcomed into the MSU Alumni Association by Louis M. "Sonny" Jones of Frankfort, the association president.

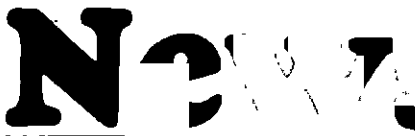

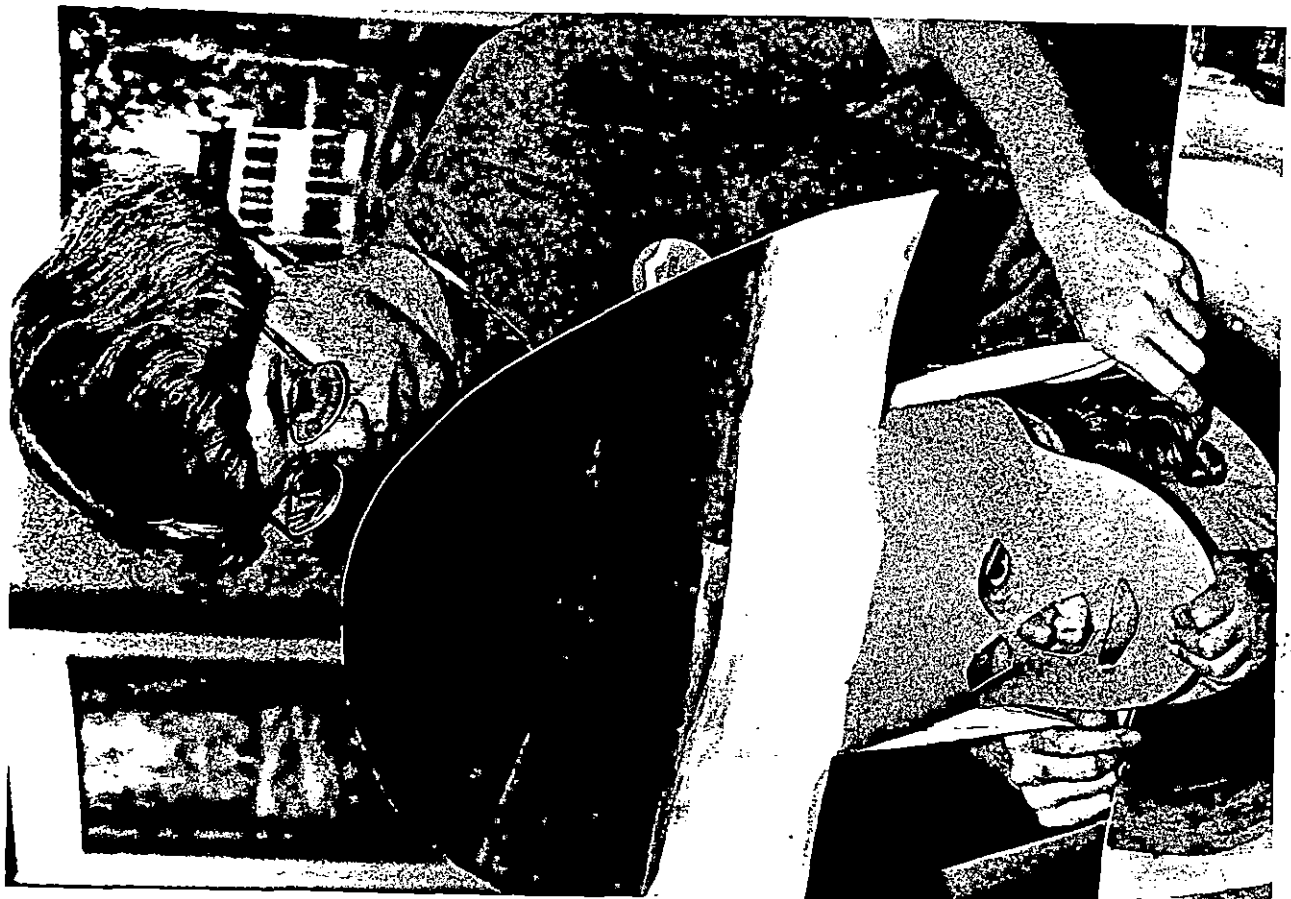

MOREHEAD, Ky.--In mid-August, Morehead State University students will begin the new semester with a new president, new facilities, and new programs and services.

Registration for the fall term is set for Thursday and Friday, Aug. 20-21, from 8 a.m. until 6 p.m. on the main campus. Students who have not registered may complete the process and pre-registered students may pay their fees during this time.

On Thursday, Aug. 21, students planning to take classes at the extended campus centers in Ashland, Prestonsburg and West Liberty as well as the Appalachian Graduate Consortium in Pikeville may register at those locations from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m.

All MSU classes, including evening and off-campus, begin on Monday, Aug. 24.

While he assumed the leadership role on July 1, President Ronald G. Eaglin will address the University's faculty and staff population collectively for the first time on Wednesday, Aug. 19. The convocation is scheduled for 2:30 p.m. in Button Auditorium.

When students officially begin to arrive on campus on Tuesday, Aug. 18, at 8 a.m., Morehead State, for the third time in as many years, will open a newly renovated residence hall. Formerly Mays Hall, the facility has been renamed Mays Hall Apartments to emphasize its apartment style living quarters.

Featuring one, two and three room units, the apartments are designed for students who need 10- or 12-month accommodations. It is open to those 23 years or older who are considered nontraditional, seniors, graduate students or married couples with no children. The monthly rent includes utilities, telephone and cable television.

A formal dedication and ribbon cutting ceremony for Mays Hall Apartments will be held Oct. 17, at 10 a.m., during the Homecoming weekend.

Effective Aug. 1, students in some areas will see new leadership in their department chairs. The College of Education and Behavioral Sciences has moved Dr. William J. Weikel, a member of the education faculty, to Department of Leadership and Secondary Education Chair. Dr. William J. Mosley, formerly the director of Western Illinois University's Center for the Preparation of Educators of Minority Children, is the new chair of the Department of Elementary, Reading and Special Education.

Also new to the MSU campus is Dr. Ronald L. Mitchelson, previously a professor of geography at the University of Georgia, who has been named chair of the Department of Geography, Government and History.

The Department of Home Economics will implement its four-year degree program--Early Childhood Development--in the fall. The program was designed to meet the personnel needs of the region's school districts as they comply with provisions of the 1990 Kentucky Education Reform Act. Students will have two options of study from which to choose: teacher certification once that becomes available from the state Department of Education and one designed for those working in a privately-franchised early childhood center.

To develop knowledge and understanding of women's roles and contributions, MSU has initiated a minor in Women's Studies Program. Experimentation courses were previously introduced in the Department of Sociology, Social Work and Corrections. The new offering, which requires 21 hours of credit, includes selected courses from various departments with the addition of one new course. It will be administered by the Dean of Undergraduate Programs.

The Division of Student Life has begun a peer program aimed at preventing substance abuse thanks to a grant from the U.S. Department of Education. The emphasis will be toward MSU students but youths in the area may benefit as well. The plan is to use student volunteers to work with other students to help them develop self-enhancement skills in such areas as assertiveness, interpersonal relationships and communication. The goal is to decrease the student's need for alcohol and other substances.

Educating and informing will be the emphasis of the Student Government Association (SGA) when it begins an Events Hotline for the first time this fall. A free service, the Hotline will not only publicize entertainment but will include test dates and academic information that are of importance to the student body. Events occurring within a 10-day period are available by calling (606) 783-2567.

SGA will offer several programs during the coming year that will be of interest to students. Among these are the second Sexual Awareness Week program scheduled for mid-January.

Students currently enrolled at MSU will see the results of the efforts to make the campus a safer community. More lighting has been added to those areas that were formerly dimly lit. In addition, exterior telephones have been placed at strategic locations around the campus with 26 of those being dedicated lines to the 911 emergency number.

A variety of ways for student involvement is scheduled for the opening week of school under the "Tying it all Together" theme. A special orientation program to help new students adapt to college life will run from 8:30 a.m. until 2:30 p.m. in Button Auditorium on Wednesday, Aug. 19. Programs for special interest groups are: minority students, Aug. 18, 1-6 p.m., in the Cramer Room, Adron Doran University Center; Aug. 21, non-traditional students, Fields Hall, 9 a.m.-2 p.m., and Aug. 28, international students, Fields Hall seminar room, 6 p.m.

Culminating the opening week's activities is an ice cream fest and street dance on Sunday, Aug. 23. Festivities begin at 8 p.m. on University Boulevard in front of the president's home.

For those interested in joining a Greek organization, prospective sorority members will return to campus a week early, on Saturday, Aug. 15, to participate in rush activities. Fraternity members may pick up rush cards during registration for rush on Aug. 31. Additional information is available from the Greek adviser at (606) 783-2071.

Throughout the 1992-93 academic year, students will have numerous opportunities for cultural experiences. Theatre students will present several shows including "Look Homeward Angel," "Anything Goes," and "Cinderella." The Arts in Morehead Series, a cooperative effort of MSU and the Morehead/Rowan County Arts Council, will present "Saffire, The Uppity Blues Women," "Aequalis," the North Carolina Shakespeare Festival "Two Gentlemen of Verona" and other productions. These performances are free to MSU students with valid I.D. cards.

MSU will host its annual Parents Weekend, Sept. 11-13. This is a special time to introduce mom and pop to the campus and participate in a number of events planned for the entire family. 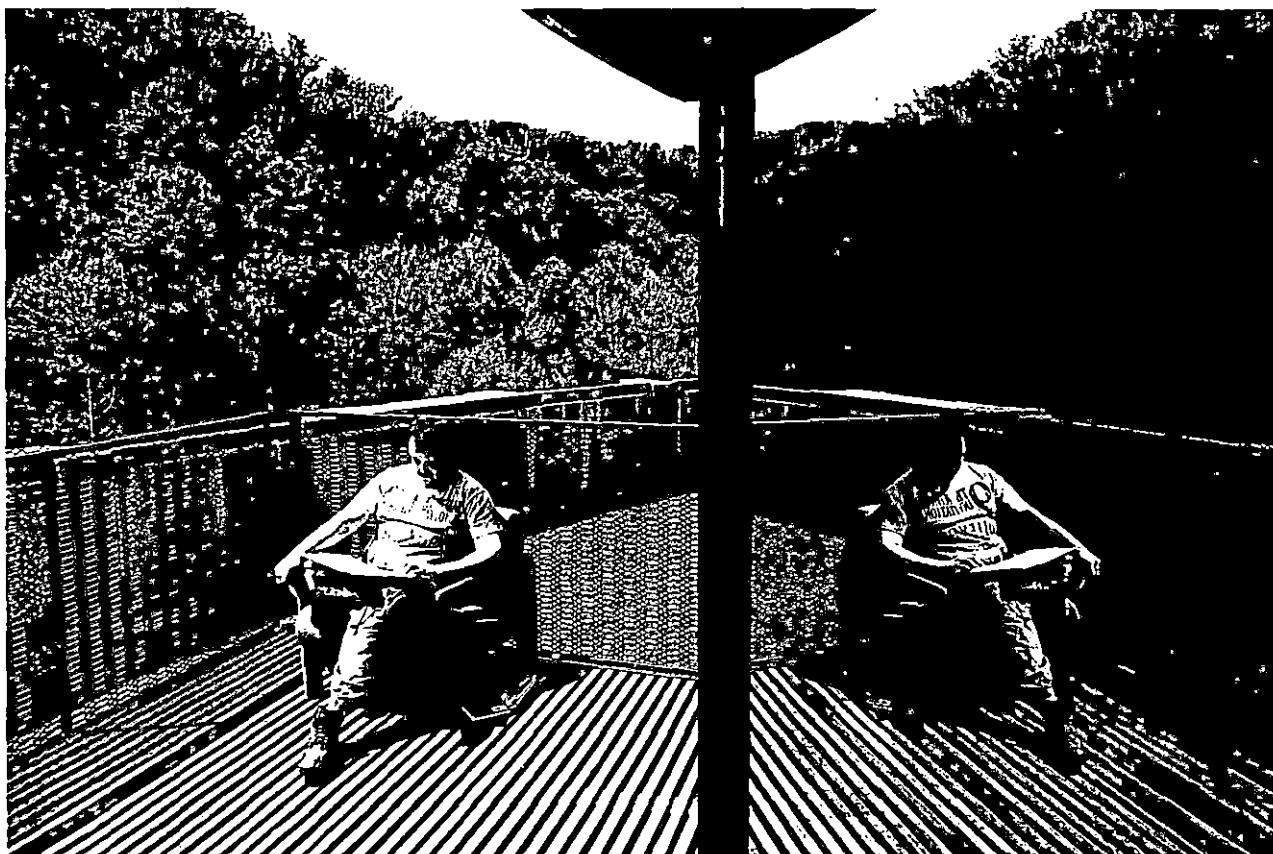
ALONE AT THE TOP

Attending college and making it a success sooner or later will require a bit of studying. For Morehead State University sophomore Don Burke of Weeksbury, this meant finding a quiet spot, as this one atop his residence hall. 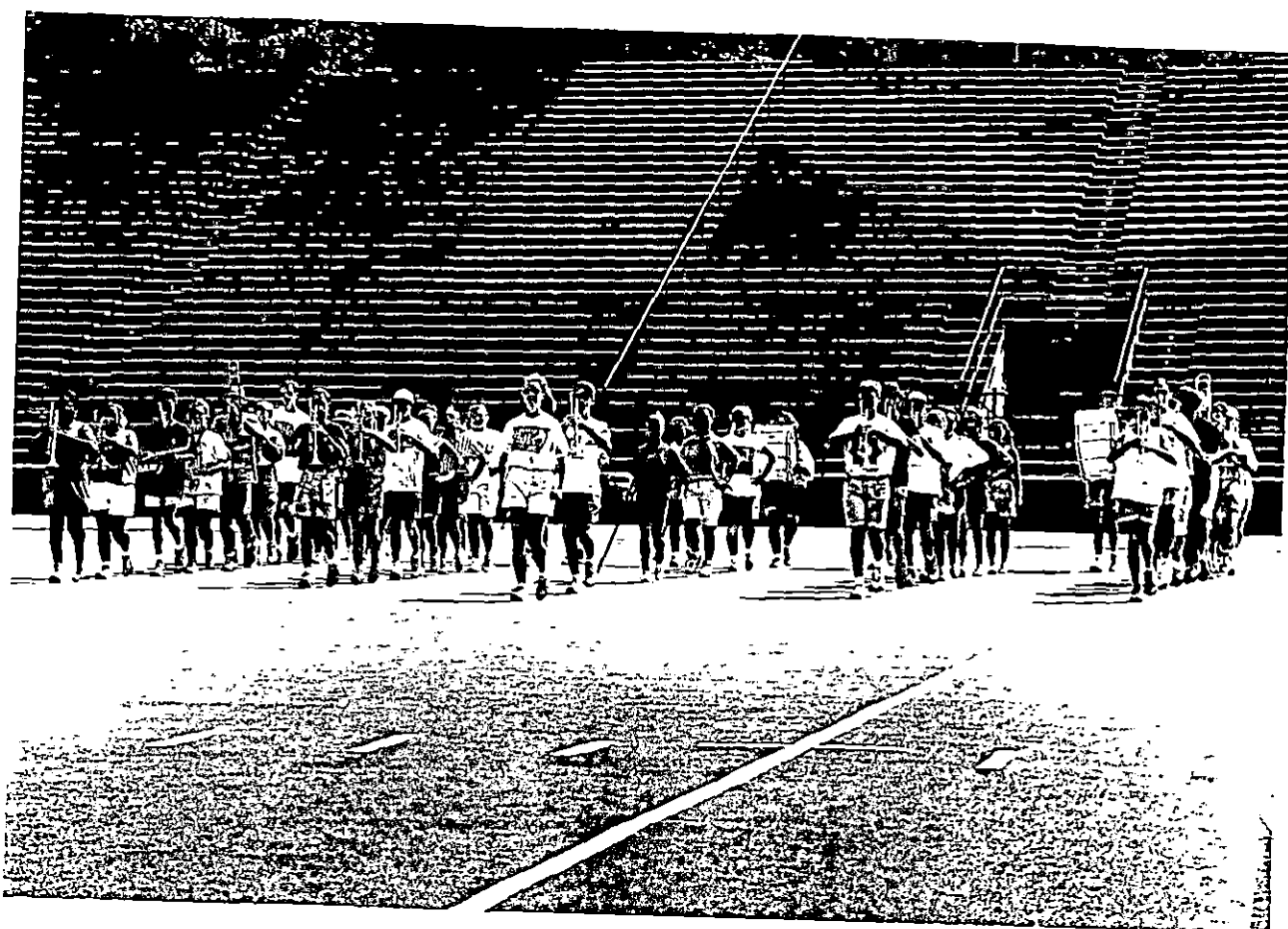

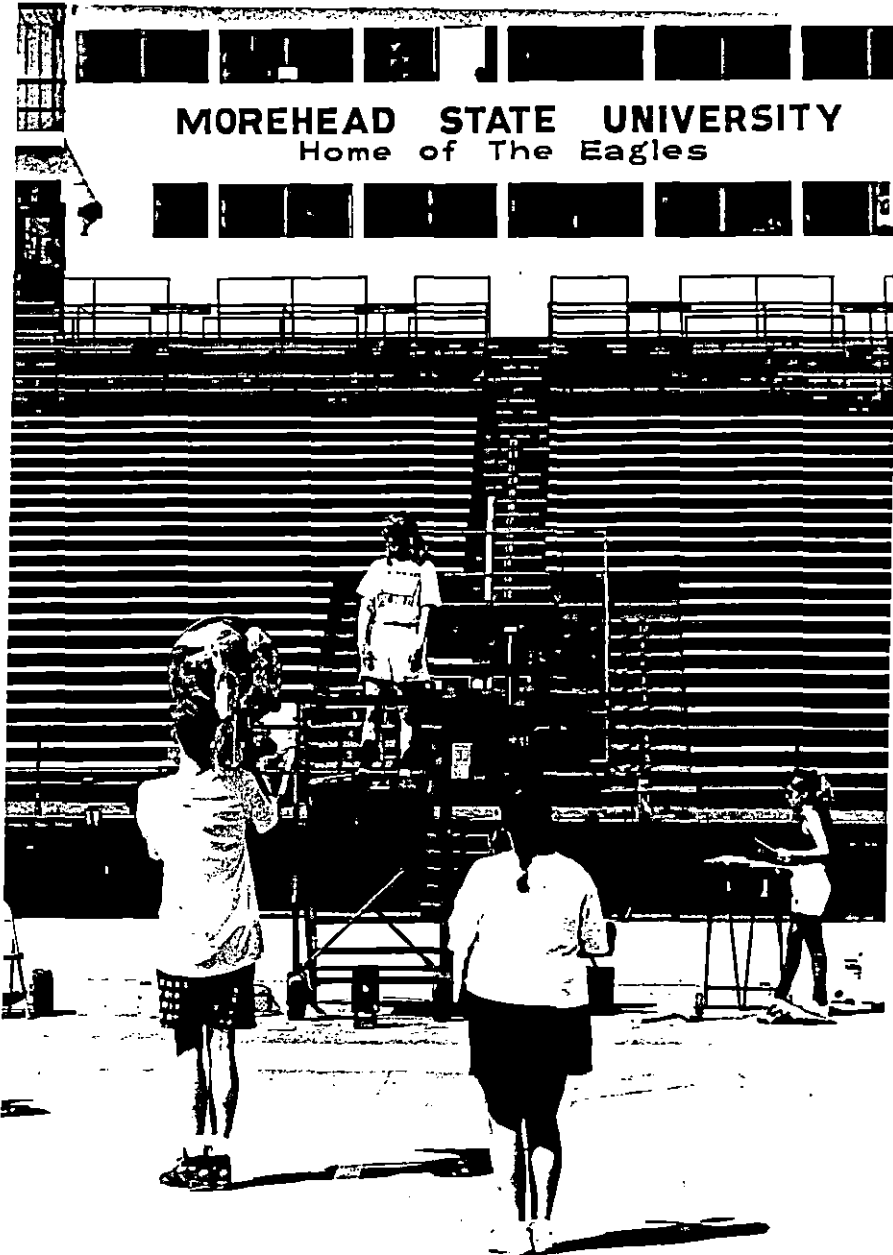

- 5---In this case, side stepping the issue is the right thing to do as trumpeters Garrett Petry, left, and Jason Noel practice maneuver.

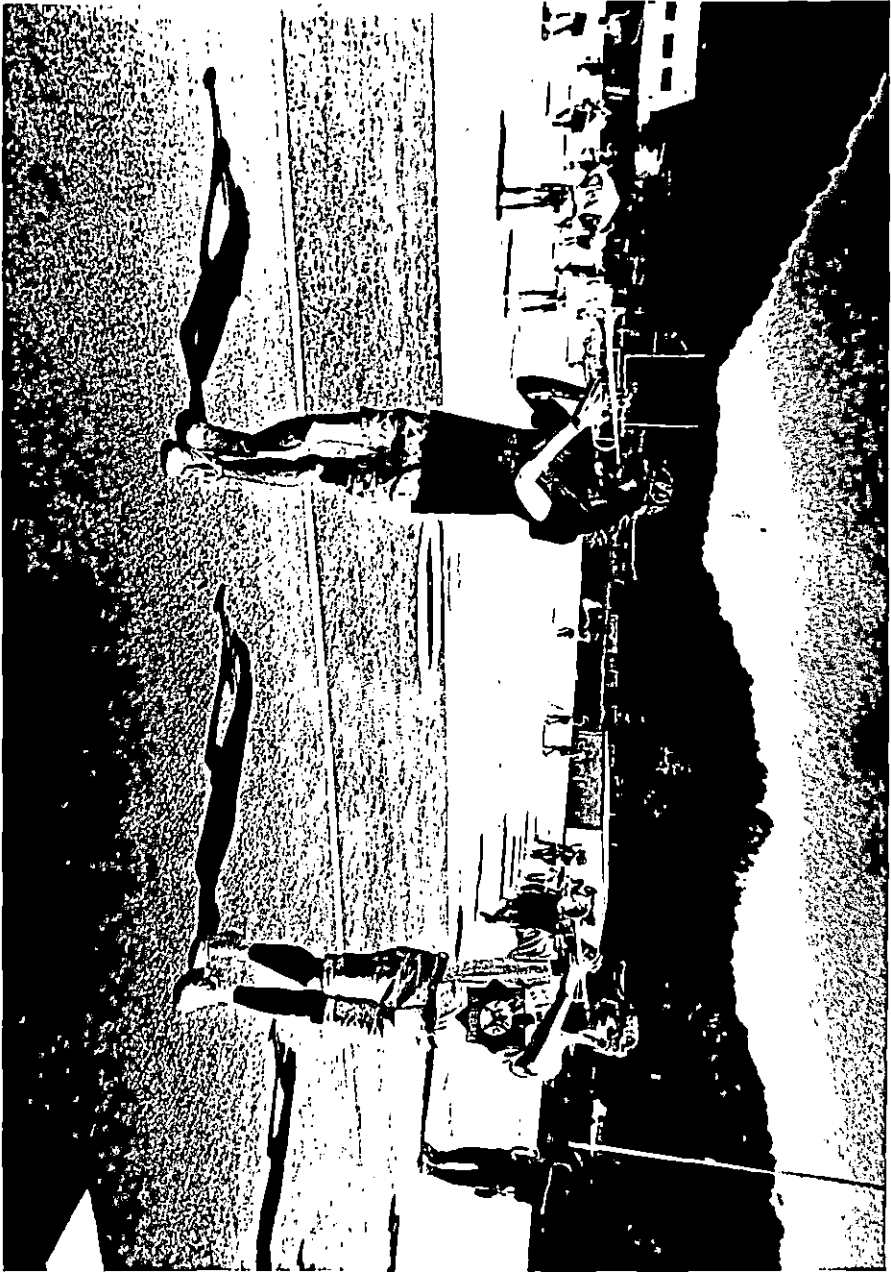

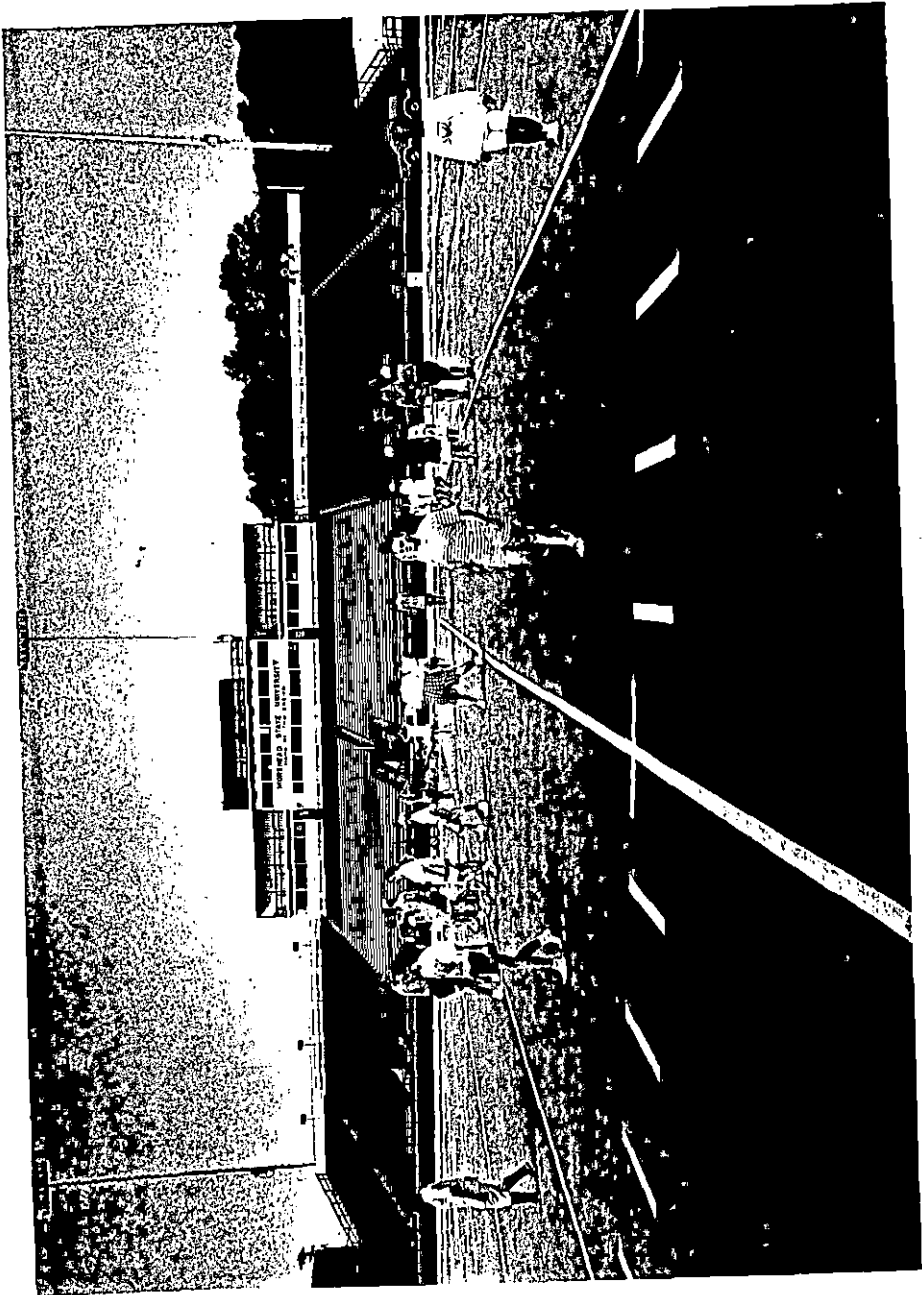

- 4---It's break time and a shoeless April Compton amuses herself by flipping the chip used to mark her spot for formation drill work.

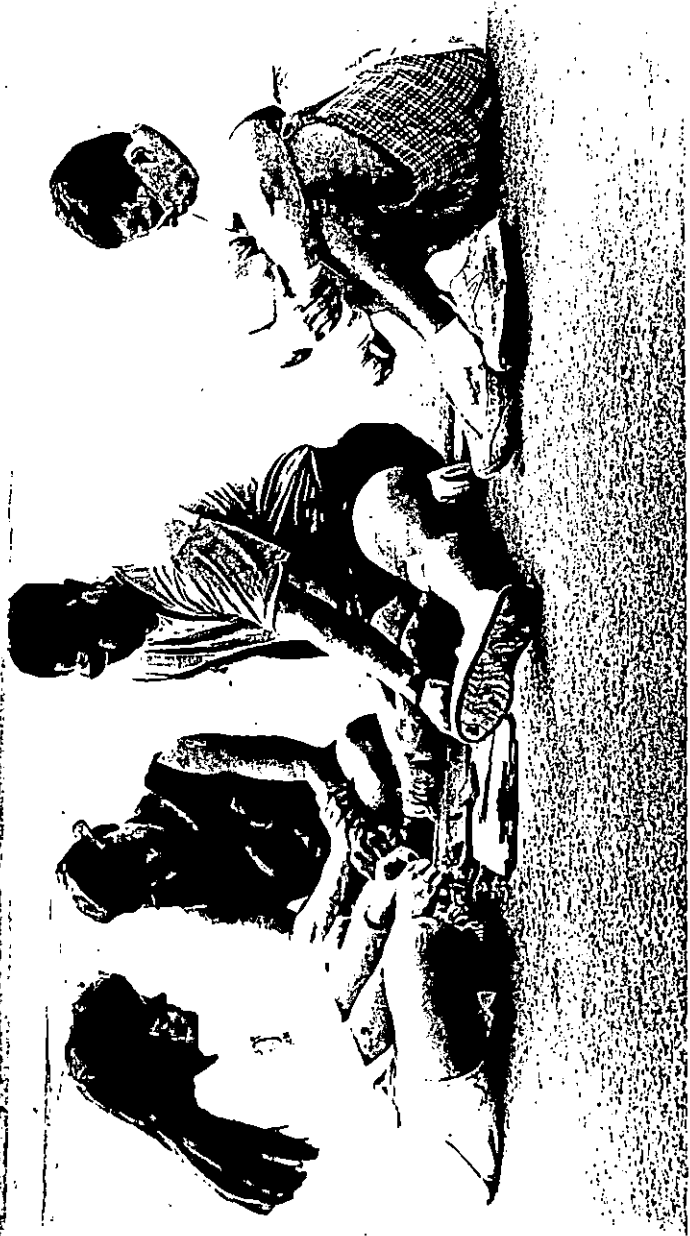
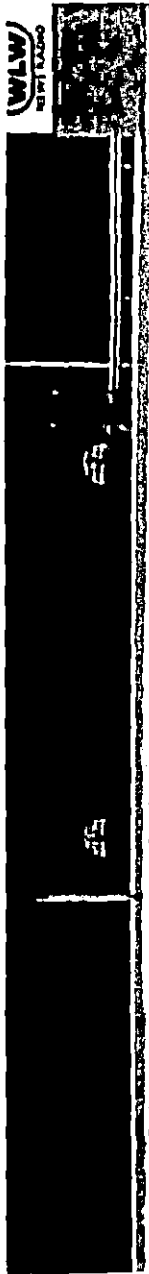

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Students and faculty at Morehead State University both stand to gain from a new federal grant totaling more than \$284,000 over a two-year period.

MSU has received notification that its project "Improvement of Academic Programs and Faculty Development" has been funded by the U.S. Department of Education under a Title III-Strengthening Institutions Grant.

The project not only will help "underprepared" incoming students improve their basic writing, thinking and math skills, but also will serve as a faculty development program as it aids them in their classroom preparation, according to Dr. Judy Rogers, MSU dean of undergraduate programs and project director. In preparing the successful grant proposal, Dr. Rogers was assisted by Dr. Virginia E. Wheelless, MSU director of planning.

The program has four distinct parts: initiating writing across the curriculum; establishing a Writing Center; implementing reasoning across the curriculum, and supplemental instruction in problem solving math.

The project will focus on students with enhanced ACT scores in the 14 to 18 range who have not declared a major. "Our studies show that this group of underprepared students is the most at risk of not being able to succeed in college," Dr. Rogers said. "By strengthening their basic skills, we will be providing them with the tools to succeed."

The project will be a campuswide effort with MSU's Academic Services Center helping with advising, counseling and tracking the students.

Calling the grant project "timely," the dean said that it comes at the same time that MSU's General Education Core is undergoing review. The primary goals coming out of that review deal with basic skills. "This will support those goals," she said.

The grant offers MSU the opportunity to incorporate writing skills across the curriculum with faculty development activities which include not only training but follow-up.

"It means that we will help faculty by showing them how to put writing assignments into their syllabuses," Dr. Rogers said.

MSU also will be able to purchase computer hardware and software necessary to set up a Writing Center where students will receive individual tutoring. Funding also is included for staffing the center with a part-time coordinator, two graduate assistants and peer tutors.

"We are going to be able to train faculty and assist them in employing critical thinking skills in their classroom assignments as well," Dr. Rogers said.

A supplemental instruction program for Math 131, a problem solving math course, will be added to improve basic math skills. "We will train math majors to be tutors in this area. They will sit in on the actual class with the professor and then schedule supplemental class sessions to assist the students," Dr. Rogers said.

"One of the best things about this grant project is that it is self-perpetuating," the dean said. "As our faculty learn strategies to focus on basic skills in their own individual disciplines, this emphasis will become an integral part of their classroom teaching," she added.

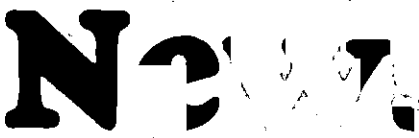

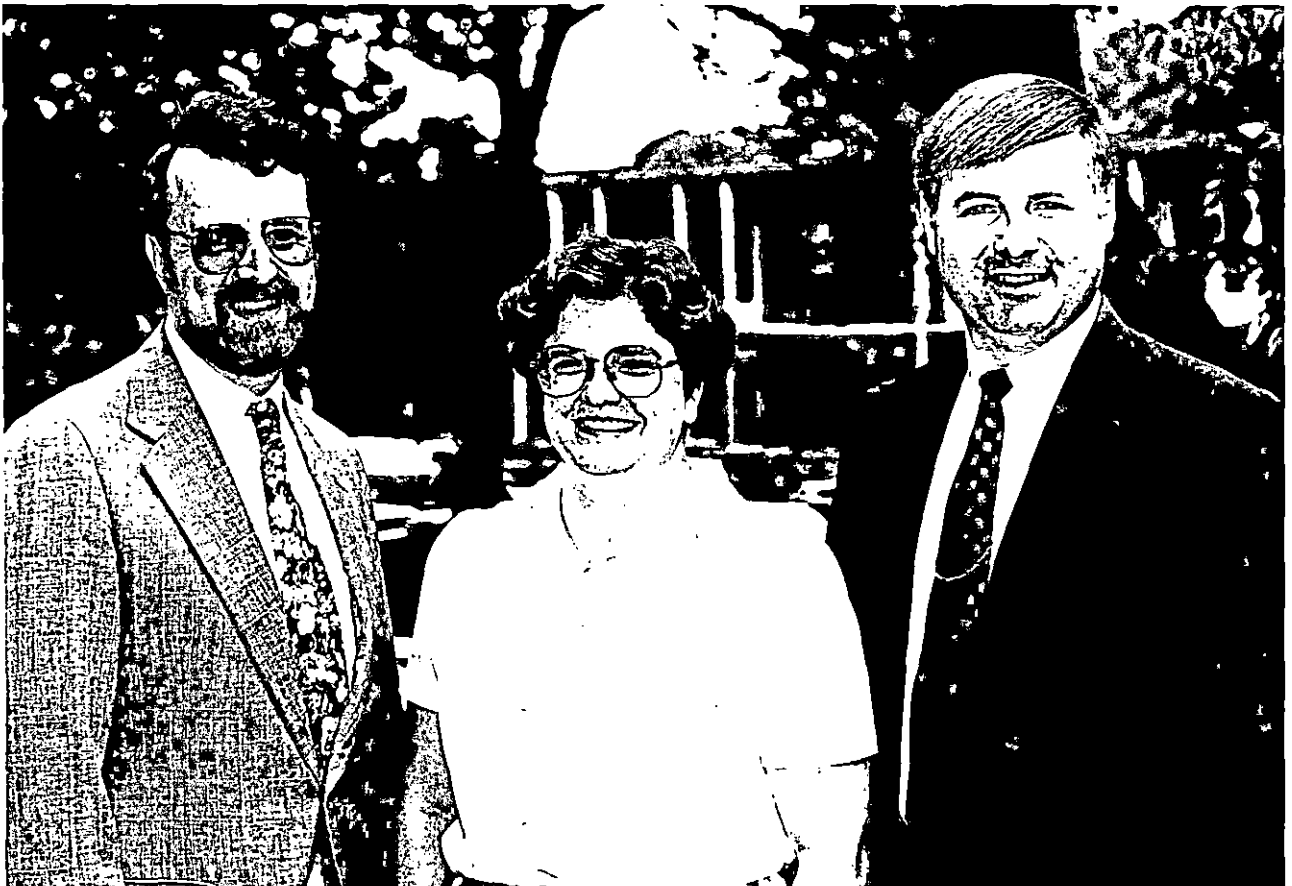
