MOREHEAD, Ky.--Amidst the cheers of family and friends, Morehead State University President Ronald G. Eaglin conferred degrees to more than 370 undergraduate and graduate students at the University's 1992 Summer Commencement in the Academic-Athletic Center on Saturday, Aug. 1.

Stating that he was "proud and pleased" to be presiding at his first MSU graduation exercises, Dr. Eaglin praised all those who were involved in making this day possible. "As a father of four, I know about the sacrifices," he said. "I am sure they (the graduates) are aware of the love that went into it and will show their appreciation."

Since assuming the presidency on July 1, Dr. Eaglin said he had not had the opportunity to get to know everyone, but he was very glad he had made the decision to come to this "unique university" in Eastern Kentucky. He discussed his recent travels to Cyprus and how that type of experience "reaffirms how fortunate we are" here in the United States.

Student speaker Francis L. "Frank" Olson of Elliott County, spoke on seeking truth and speaking truth. "Truth lurks wherever there is enough space that a mind can comprehend, whatever our cognitive capability can range," he said. Because truth lurks in every space where there is room for thought, Olson said "we must speak it in order to help forge new links of learning."

Speaking truth is something we do in our everyday lives, Olson noted. "Sometimes speaking truth brings conflict, and the resolution of that conflict is astonishing," continued the Elliott County High School social studies teacher who received a Master of Arts in Education degree.

Olson also holds a master's degree in elementary education and a Rank I from Morehead State. He is a graduate of Whittier College and Queen's College in Belfast, Northern Ireland. A native of California, he has been living in Eastern Kentucky for 18 years.

"We are all gifted, each in our own way," Olson said. "We must give this giftedness away in order that it will stay alive," he emphasized, reminding his classmates of their duty to be aware of seeking truth and speaking truth.

After degrees were conferred, the graduates were inducted into the MSU Alumni Association by the organization's president, Louis M. "Sonny" Jones of Frankfort. Saying they had achieved "satisfaction, honor and glory," he reminded the newest alumni that they had something that not everyone else had--"Eagle pride"--and it couldn't be taken away.

Following the ceremony, President Eaglin greeted the new graduates and their families at an Alumni Association-sponsored reception outside the AAC.

Earlier in the day, pinning ceremonies were held for graduates of MSU's Veterinary Technology Program and Radiologic Technology Program.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Registration for Morehead State University's 1992 fall semester will be conducted Thursday and Friday, Aug. 20-21.

Students who did not advance register will develop their class schedules in their major departments, before going to the Laughlin Health Building to pay fees.

Students who have not declared a major will go to 233 Allie Young Hall to schedule classes. Undergraduate students who have not previously been admitted or those who were not enrolled last spring will need to stop first at the Admissions Office, 301 Howell-McDowell. For graduate students, that admissions stop will be 701 Ginger Hall.

Registration hours will be from 8 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. both days and entry time into the payment area at Laughlin is based on an alphabetical system by last name. All fees should be paid at this time.

Part-time students taking classes on campus will be registered from 5 to 6 p.m. those same days. Registration at MSU's extended campus centers and the Appalachian Graduate Consortium in Pikeville will be conducted Thursday, Aug. 20, from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. at those locations.

All MSU classes, including evening and off-campus, will begin meeting on Monday, Aug. 24.

Schedule adjustments will be processed Monday through Wednesday, Aug. 24-26, in the student's major department without a penalty fee. Effective Thursday, Aug. 27, drop-adds will be processed in the Office of the Registrar, 201 Ginger Hall, and a \$10 fee will be applied at this time.

MOREHEAD, Ky.—Ernestine M. Winfield, who joined Morehead State University's faculty last fall, has been named coordinator of the University's Minority Teacher Education Program (MTEP).

Winfield will continue teaching welding in the Department of Industrial Education and Technology while serving as coordinator, according to Dr. Sylvester Kohut Jr., dean of the College of Education and Behavioral Sciences.

MTEP, funded in part by the Kentucky Council on Higher Education, is designed to encourage minority students to become teachers. Throughout the year, minority high school students have the opportunity to visit the campus, hear first hand about the teaching profession from minority educators, participate in motivational workshops and spend a week at MSU in the summer.

As coordinator, Winfield will act as a liaison with teachers, counselors and administrators at schools in Jefferson and Fayette counties. With their assistance, she will recruit students for MTEP, conduct workshops in the schools, develop and implement campus programs for the students and coordinate tutorial and counseling activities for MTEP students attending MSU.

Twenty years after graduating from Jeffersonville (Ind.) High School, Winfield enrolled at MSU where she earned an associate degree and then the B.S. degree in welding technology cum laude. She also holds the M.S. degree in vocational education from MSU.

A former student at Jefferson State Vocational School, Winfield credits a former instructor with encouraging her to develop her potential by going after her college degree. She also taught welding at the LaGrange Vocational Education Center, part of the Kentucky State Reformatory.

MOREHEAD, Ky.—Whether you travel to California or Maine, Alaska or Florida or any state in between, there's the chance you will run into a Morehead State University alumnus.

MSU has alumni living in every state of the union, according to Bill Redwine, MSU's director of alumni relations. Of MSU's more than 32,000 alumni, there are 28,116 who are living in one of the 50 states, the District of Columbia or U.S. territories, Redwine's computerized records show.

More than half of the alumni tracked by Redwine and his staff live in Kentucky (18,528) and the majority of those living out of state tend to make their home east of the Mississippi River.

Ohio is the next most populated state with MSU alumni with 4,170 calling it home, but 836 alums have chosen the warmer climes of Florida. After the Sunshine State, Indiana seems to be the preferred abode with 510 alumni, followed by Virginia with 361 and New York with 312.

Of the 50 states, Vermont is the least desired habitat with only one MSU alumnus there. Crossing the Mississippi, Texas and California are the leaders with 255 and 205 MSU alumni respectively.

Alaska lays claim to 13 former MSU students, while Hawaii boasts 17. Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands each have one alumnus.

Two-thirds of alumni calling Kentucky home are residents of the University's 22-county service area. Rowan County leads with 1,724 alumni, followed by Carter (1,065), Greenup (995) and Pike (858).

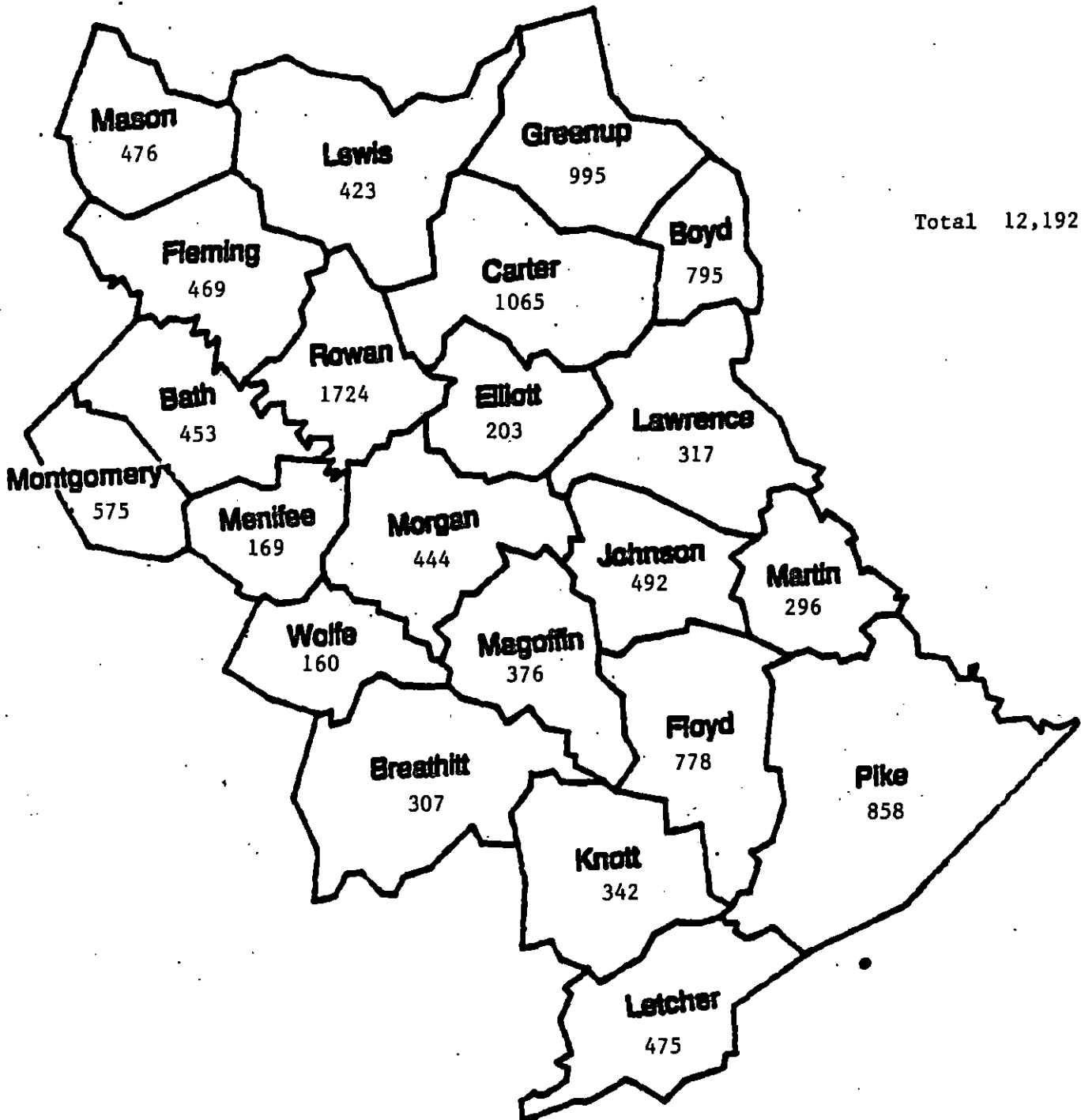

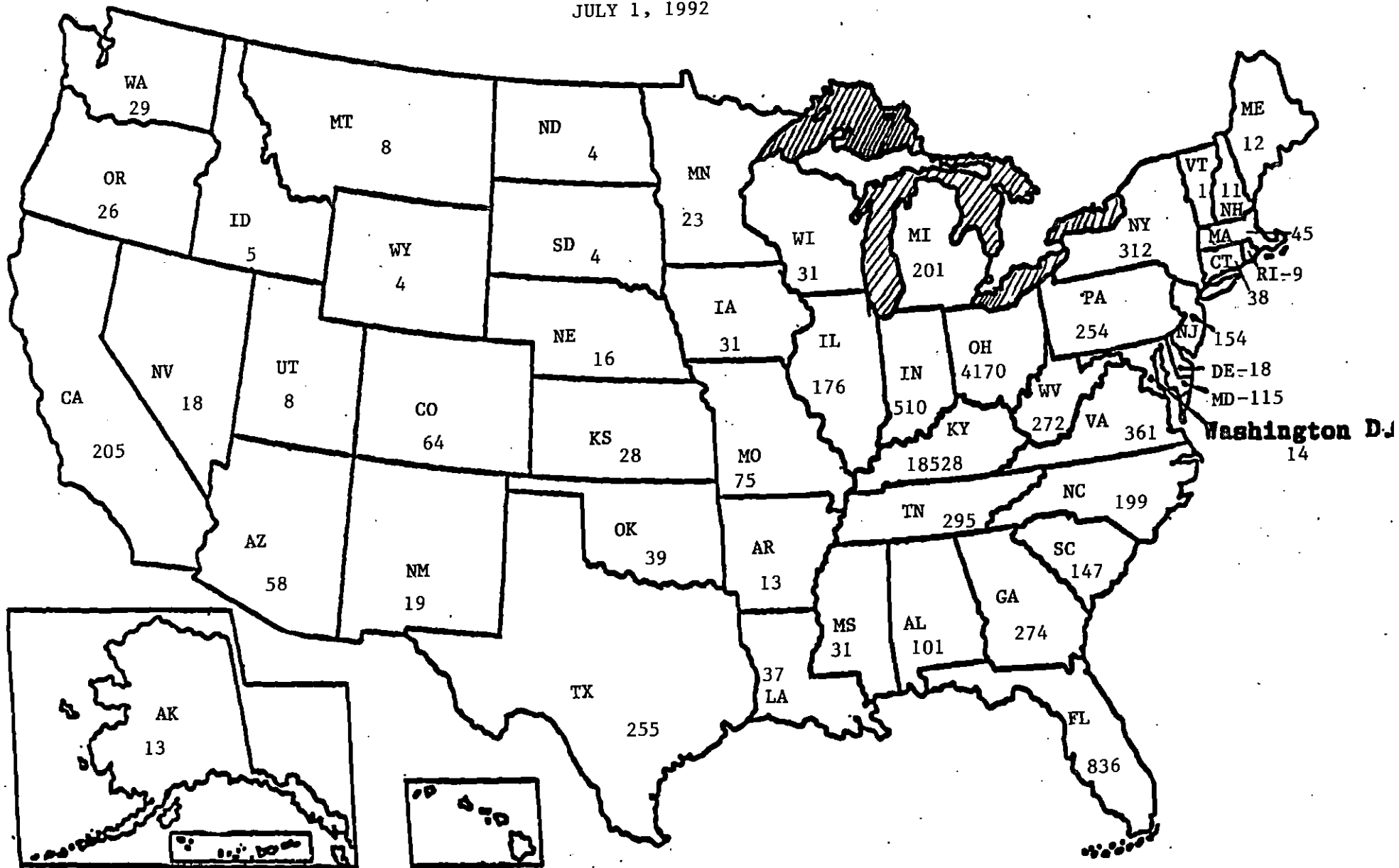

As a relative newcomer to the state, I too have appreciated his expertise in these matters," Dr. Kohut said.

"Dr. Niemeyer is an outstanding teacher and adviser who already has contributed greatly to MSU and I am confident that she will continue to maintain the excellent service for our students that Mr. Franklin has provided over the years," Dr. Kohut added.

Dr. Niemeyer came to MSU from Ball State University, where she was an assistant professor of education. During the 1985-86 school year, she served as interim dean of what was then MSU's College of Professional Studies.

A former public school special education teacher, Dr. Niemeyer served as director of special education for the Isaac School District in Phoenix, Ariz., and directed a number of special education projects at Arizona State University, where she earned her doctorate in educational administration. She earned her B.A. and M.A. degrees from Fort Hays State University.

She has headed several funded research projects and published articles in her area of expertise in professional journals. A member of the American Educational Research Association and the Association for the Severely Handicapped, Dr. Niemeyer also has held offices in Phi Delta Kappa and the Council for Exceptional Children.

MOREHEAD, Ky.—Challenging them to confront self-destructive student behavior, Morehead State University President Ronald G. Eaglin shared his expectations with faculty and staff members at the traditional opening of school convocation.

"We have a responsibility to say to students that this is right and this is wrong. Let's confront self-destructive behavior and not be ashamed of doing so," he said.

Suggesting there should be a new grade of NY (Not Yet), the president said that if there are Not Yets with us "the most caring thing we can do for them, after working with them and trying our best, is to say 'Go home and come back when you are ready.'"

According to Dr. Eaglin, the vast majority of MSU students want to be successful, are mature, do care and will be good. "We can't let 5 percent ruin things for the rest and themselves," he said.

In his first major address to MSU employees since assuming the presidency on July 1, Dr. Eaglin also challenged the faculty to bring all their professionalism into the classroom.

He told the faculty that he expected them to be prepared, on time and ready. "If you are not then, as far as I'm concerned, you are not a professional," Dr. Eaglin said.

The president pledged that he would constantly strive to provide the dollars, the opportunity and the wherewithal for faculty members to succeed in their profession.

"I want to make sure that this whole institution revolves around you wonderful people who take the responsibility for the young people who've come here wanting to succeed and wanting to learn. I want to make sure that we organize in such a way that we are reinforcing what happens in that classroom," he said.

Dr. Eaglin set the stage for his remarks by citing the accomplishments of the University's last five presidents and saying that these individuals had provided him with the opportunity to take the institution into the next millennium. Past presidents on hand for the convocation included Dr. Adron Doran (1954-77), Dr. Morris Norfleet (1977-84), and Dr. A. D. Albright (1986-87). Unable to attend were Dr. Herb. F. Reinhard (1984-86) and Dr. C. Nelson Grote (1987-1992).

After traveling the region and talking with civic leaders, politicians, educators and other friends of MSU, Dr. Eaglin said that he had found that the perception of MSU was "solid and sound. You are a healthy institution and you should be proud of what you have accomplished in this section of Kentucky and the role you have played."

Warning that the University couldn't rest on its laurels, Dr. Eaglin said that there were great expectations of MSU out in the region. "In many ways, this institution is a reflection of the mountain people. We are them and they want the quality of their life to change in a positive way. They want us to be part of that process," he said.

He told his listeners that the question was how he as president, with their help, could accomplish this change. "What we must live up to is a true understanding of what we are--a state regional university. That has a special meaning to me because it fits exactly with my philosophy as an educator," the president said.

The ingredients of a state regional university, according to Dr. Eaglin, are great teaching, informed scholarship and aggressive public service.

"My job and that of everyone here is for one primary purpose and that is to ensure the people of Kentucky that we will provide, once the door is closed in that classroom, the best we have to offer," Dr. Eaglin said. "Our primary mission is to help students learn, to develop a positive self-concept and know that they can compete with anyone in the world."

The job of those with non-teaching roles is to ensure that the faculty has what it needs to serve the primary mission--the teaching of students.

Calling scholarship important to that mission, Dr. Eaglin committed himself to seeing that the dollars and opportunity were available to faculty for renewal in their discipline.

He also told his audience that it was imperative that MSU share its expertise outside the classroom if Eastern Kentucky is to continue on its path of creating a middle class and better opportunities for its children.

Noting that there are tough economic times still ahead, Dr. Eaglin said that higher education was going to have to justify its existence and change the minds of decision-makers to get its rightful share of the dollars.

"I give you my word that I am doing everything in my power to see that higher education is on the agenda in this state, but it also should be on your agenda because it is what we have dedicated our lives to and it is what we believe in," President Eaglin said.

"What is happening in this state is just a metaphor for the whole country. This University is one of many that must wake up to the reality that things are not going to be the same," he said. "We have to be smarter; we have to be cooperative; we have to be collaborative, and we have to work together--not just those of us in this room, but all of higher education in this state."

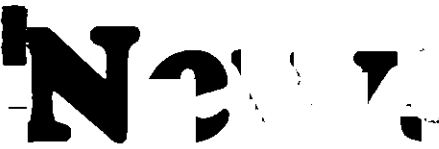
A GATHERING OF MSU PRESIDENTS--PAST AND PRESENT

MOREHEAD, Ky.—A social work educator and administrator from Addis Ababa University in Ethiopia will be sharing his expertise with Morehead State University students and faculty this year.

Dr. Andargatchew Tesfaye, an associate professor of social work and former dean of the College of Social Work at Addis Ababa, is MSU's visiting international scholar for the 1992-93 academic year.

Dr. Andargatchew, who earned his Ph.D. at the University of Michigan, will teach a social work honors seminar on "Contemporary Social Problems of Ethiopia and the Horn of Africa" and a course on "International Social Welfare" during the fall semester.

"The visiting international scholar program, which was launched four years ago, has offered our students an opportunity to gain new perspectives into different cultures and the global marketplace," said Dr. Judy Rogers, MSU dean of undergraduate programs.

"Dr. Andargatchew joins a distinguished list of international scholars who in previous years have contributed much to broaden our students' horizons," Dr. Rogers added.

Previous visiting international scholars have included Victoria Carrasco, professor of design and theory of color, Central University of Ecuador; Dr. Loreta Vishomirskite, professor of English, Vilnius Pedagogical Institute in Lithuania, and Zhang Ke Fu, professor of English from Zhengzhou University in the People's Republic of China.

Dr. Andargatchew, who most recently served as director of Addis Ababa U's Institute of Development Research, also held positions with Ethiopia's Ministry of Labour and Social Affairs.

Active in numerous professional organizations, Dr. Andargatchew is a past president of the Social Workers' Association of Ethiopia and has held offices on the executive board of the Family Guidance Association of Ethiopia (founding member); the Association for Social Work Education in Africa (a Pan-African association affiliated with the Organization of African Unity), and the executive committee for the Africa region, International Planned Parenthood Federation.

Earlier this summer, Dr. Andargatchew and Michael Seelig, MSU social work program coordinator, presented two papers they had collaborated on at the International Association of Schools of Social Work and the Inter-University Consortium for International Social Development in Washington, D.C.

While in Ethiopia during the spring 1990 semester on a Fulbright research grant, Seelig met Dr. Andargatchew, who assisted him with his research work on the Ethiopian child welfare system.

"With the attention that the media has given both Ethiopia and Somalia in recent years, I am pleased that our students, faculty and staff will have an opportunity to learn about this area from such a scholar as Dr. Andargatchew," said Seelig.

In addition to his specific classes, Dr. Andargatchew will be available for other campus presentations, including lecturing in other disciplines. "While he is with us, we truly want to share Dr. Andargatchew with the public schools and other organizations in our region as well," said Seelig, who will coordinate the visiting professor's schedule.
