MOREHEAD, Ky.---Arts in Morehead (AIM) will open its 1992-93 season on Tuesday, Sept. 8, with an 8 p.m. performance in Duncan Recital Hall by the acoustic blues trio, Saffire--The Uppity Blues Women.

Season tickets for the seven-event series as well as single event admissions will be available at the door prior to the performance. MSU students with valid I.D. cards will be admitted free to all AIM programs.

Tickets for the series are \$30 for an individual and \$50 for a family, no matter how large. General admission tickets for the concert are \$6 for adults and \$3 for non-MSU students.

Formed in 1984, Saffire has been the opening act for such artists as Ray Charles, Taj Mahal, B.B. King, the Fabulous Thunderbirds and John Hammond. The group's program typically features songs by such artists as Little Richard, Tina Turner, Sam Cooke, Fats Domino, Bette Midler and Marvin Gaye intermixed with some original works.

"Saffire is one of the hottest groups on the circuit right now and offer a refreshing blend of blues with a little country," said Thom Yancy, AIM program chair. "This promises to be a fun evening to launch the series," he added.

The trio has been described by some as being composed of three middle-aged, ethnically diverse independent women. The members are Gaye Adegbalola, an African-American school teacher who played flute in high school, lead vocals and guitar; Ann Rabson, a Jewish systems analyst who played piano for a country/western band, guitar, vocals and piano, and Earlene Lewis, a part-Cherokee real estate agent with a bluegrass background. The musicians now devote their efforts full-time to Saffire.

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AIM PRESENTS SAFFIRE--THE UPPITY BLUES WOMEN

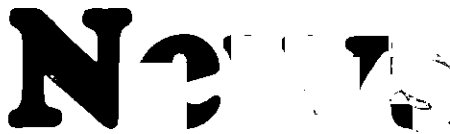

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Morehead State University's Continuing Education Program for nursing and allied health care professionals will sponsor a "Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV) Education" workshop on Tuesday, Sept. 22, on the MSU campus.

Marshia White, assistant professor in the baccalaureate nursing program at Morehead State, will serve as faculty for the program. The evening session will provide current information on methods of transmission, methods of prevention and the moral, legal and ethical issues surrounding the HIV infection.

Registration will begin at 4:30 p.m. with class to start at 5 p.m. The cost is \$24 which includes handout materials and refreshment breaks.

Nurses attending the workshop will receive contact hours as approved by the Kentucky Board of Nursing. The content of the presentation meets the Kentucky Cabinet for Human Resources mandatory HIV education requirement for health professionals.

Kevin and Cindy Spencer have given this phrase a new meaning with their magic and illusion and the Morehead State University community will have the opportunity to experience their production on Friday, Sept. 11.

The Spencers, one of the most requested touring groups on college and university campuses, will perform in Button Auditorium at 9 p.m. as part the University's Parents Weekend festivities. Donations will be accepted at the door to benefit the MSU Student Emergency Loan Fund.

The duo's ability to communicate and entertain and their genuine enthusiasm has earned them an international reputation. They have toured extensively throughout the United States, Mexico, New Zealand and Australia.

Their show is described as a combination of state-of-the-art illusions with comedy, audience participation, music and theatrical special effects to produce a high-tech extravaganza.

Considering it more than a magic act, the Spencers have put their craft to work in helping others. Since 1984, they have been using simple magic tricks as a therapeutic tool for the physically impaired. Their "Healing of Magic" is being used by some of the most prestigious rehabilitation centers in the U.S. and 13 countries.

The Spencers' magic therapy program has been featured in a number of publications, including Health Care, The Washington Post, The New York Times and the American Medical News Journal. They have written a book on the therapeutic use of magic in physical and psycho-social rehabilitation which is currently being used by health care professionals around the world.

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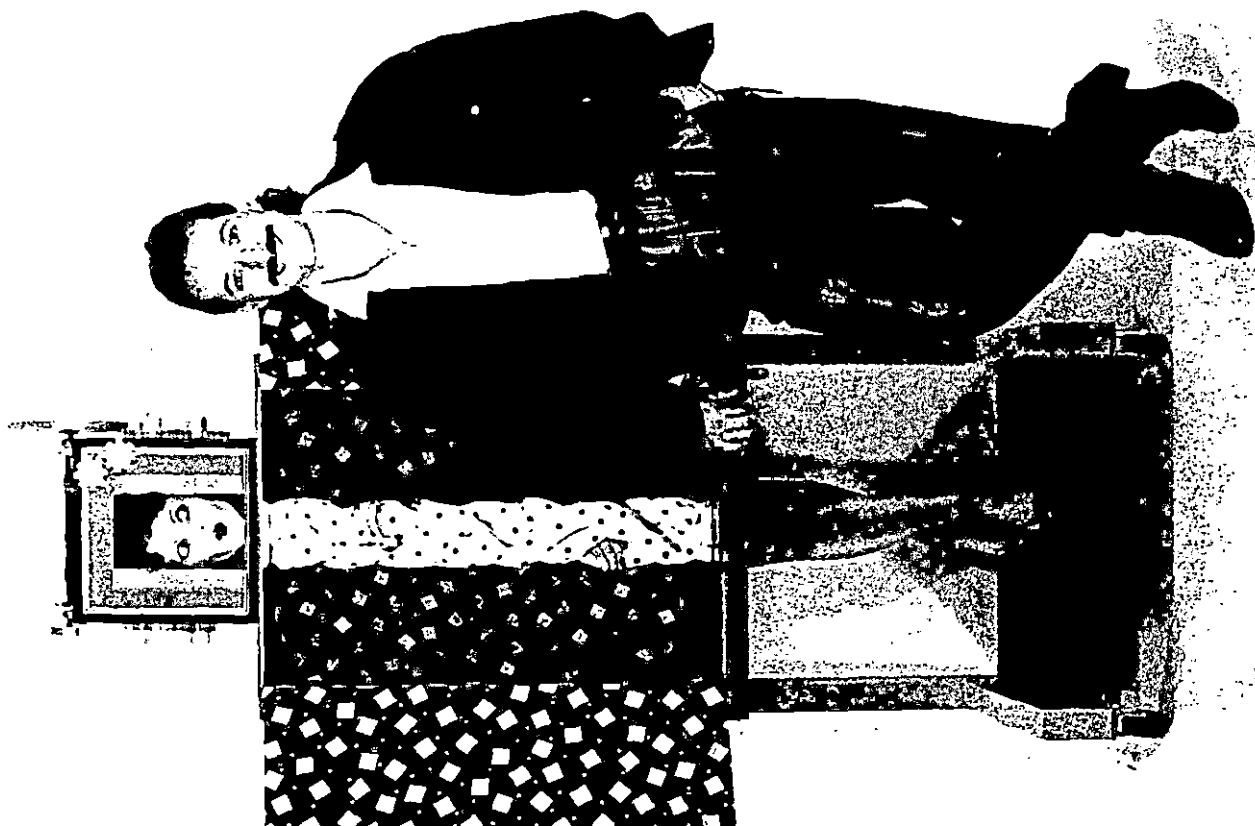

MOREHEAD, Ky.---A former faculty member in Morehead State University's Department of Nursing and Allied Health Sciences has returned to head that department.

Dr. Linda K. Salyer has assumed the post of department chair, succeeding Dr. Betty Porter who returned to teaching on a full-time basis, according to Dr. John C. Philley, MSU executive vice president for academic affairs.

"Dr. Salyer taught both full-time and part-time in our program from 1973 to 1981," said Dr. Philley. "We are very pleased to welcome her back to the campus.

"Under Dr. Porter's leadership, MSU's nursing and allied health sciences programs have gained the reputation of producing highly skilled and caring care givers," Dr. Philley said. "We are confident that Dr. Salyer will continue to build on those standards."

Dr. Salyer will be responsible for guiding the University's two-year and four-year nursing degree programs, the associate degree programs in radiologic technology and respiratory therapy and continuing education programs for professionals in health care-related fields.

In addition to her bachelor's and master's degrees in nursing, she also earned the Ph.D. degree in educational psychology at the University of Kentucky, where she was a member of the nursing faculty and a former research assistant in U.K.'s College of Medicine.

At U.K., she was the recipient of the College of Nursing's 1990 Innovative Teaching Award. Dr. Salyer also has taught at Eastern Kentucky University and at Midway College.

Dr. Salyer not only has clinical experience as a hospital staff nurse, but also as a member of the U.S. Naval Reserve Nurse Corps in which she holds rank as lieutenant commander.

From 1984 to 1990 as training officer for the corps' Lexington Detachment, she developed and coordinated its clinical and classroom instruction at the VA Hospital and field medicine/combat scenarios with the National Guard, Army and Marine Corps Reserve units.

A consultant for Psychosocial Nursing, a national journal, Dr. Salyer also has been a consultant for Lexington area hospitals, the Lexington Chapter, American Red Cross, and for continuing education programs statewide.

She is a member of several professional organizations including the National League for Nursing, Sigma Theta Tau International Nursing Honorary, the American Nurses' Association and its Kentucky affiliate and the American Educational Research Association.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Morehead State University's enrollment has reached new heights, but officials are more excited about the quality of the University's first-time freshman students.

Preliminary headcount figures for fall, released by MSU's Office of the Registrar, show 8,984 students enrolled, a 2 percent increase over last fall's student population of 8,812.

Enrollment increases at the school have been constant since 1986, but early indications are that this year's entering freshman class may be one of the best prepared in recent history.

"We are seeing a higher average Admissions Index score for new freshmen than in past years," MSU President Ronald G. Eaglin said. "Based on data collected earlier this month, the Admissions Index is up nearly 15 points over the 1991 average. This speaks well for the preparation for college these students received in their local school systems."

The Admissions Index, used to determine a student's eligibility for admission to MSU, is figured by multiplying the score from an appropriate standardized college admissions test by 10 and grade point average by 100 and then adding the results. MSU began using the Admissions Index to determine eligibility in 1986.

The 1992 first-time freshman class has an average Admissions Index of 487.96 as compared with 473.44 for the 1991 class.

Anticipating a possible enrollment decline, MSU used what officials termed a "conservative" enrollment project of 8,400 students in preparing its 1992-93 budget.

To speculate why enrollment went up would just be a "guessing game at this time," said Dr. John C. Philley, MSU's executive vice president for academic affairs. "However, we maintained all along that if there were to be growth it would be at our off-campus sites and early indications are showing that this may be the case."

Class enrollments at all of MSU's regional class sites are up nearly 16 percent, while headcount enrollment at the three extended campus centers and the Appalachian Graduate Consortium increased by more than 25 percent.

The following is a comparison of the 1992 and 1991 fall enrollment by class at this time; however, class breakdown figures will change as additional information is added to the data base.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Sharing of expertise and information is the primary objective of Morehead State University's Clearinghouse for School Services, a new arm of the College of Education and Behavioral Sciences.

The clearinghouse was established to keep up with and coordinate the outreach efforts of MSU faculty members, to help determine the needs of the region's public schools and to aid in meeting those needs.

The clearinghouse will do much to assist MSU in meeting the challenges of the Kentucky Education Reform Act, according to its director Dr. Marium Williams, a veteran public school administrator and teacher who joined MSU's faculty in 1990.

"It's really just in its developmental stages right now," said Dr. Williams, a former Nicholas County Elementary School assistant principal who assumed the directorship Aug. 1.

One major role for the clearinghouse and its director will be planning inservice workshops for public school teachers and for MSU faculty members with guest speakers who have expertise in special areas related to KERA.

"My hope is that the public school systems will see us as providers of inservice programs," said Dr. Williams, who has some definite ideas about inservice.

"Inservice should not be a single shot item. There must be more than a one-time presentation. We need to follow up and continue sharing information. We need to provide the public school personnel--teachers and administrators--with knowledge, encouragement and feedback," she said.

The need for quality inservice programs has more than doubled now with the legislature giving schools the opportunity to use up to five instructional days for additional inservice programs. Previously four days were set aside for inservice.

"Since most inservice programs for this year are already scheduled, we have the luxury of time to determine from the school systems what particular needs are out there and properly prepare to address those needs," Dr. Williams said.

One topic to be addressed, based on a survey of professional coordinators from 17 school districts, deals with implementation of the KERA initiative outcome-based education.

Sharing new information among the college's faculty members and with the various school systems is another critical element, according to Dr. Williams. She said that she expects the clearinghouse also to be a catalyst for keeping MSU faculty aware of programs on innovative teaching methods aired regularly over KET's Star Channel and especially those dealing with KERA initiatives.

Serving as a liaison between the University and the Kentucky Educational Development Corporation's staff development officer and the state Department of Education's Regional Service Center housed on MSU's campus is another responsibility for Dr. Williams. Those collaborative efforts also will extend to other state universities under a Council on Higher Education liaison group.

"By working cooperatively with other education agencies, we will be more effective in obtaining additional grant monies for special support conferences," she said.

For the most part, Dr. Williams sees MSU's Clearinghouse for School Services as a means of maintaining close contacts with school districts, their superintendents and professional coordinators in order to stay alert to their needs and to provide them the necessary expertise.

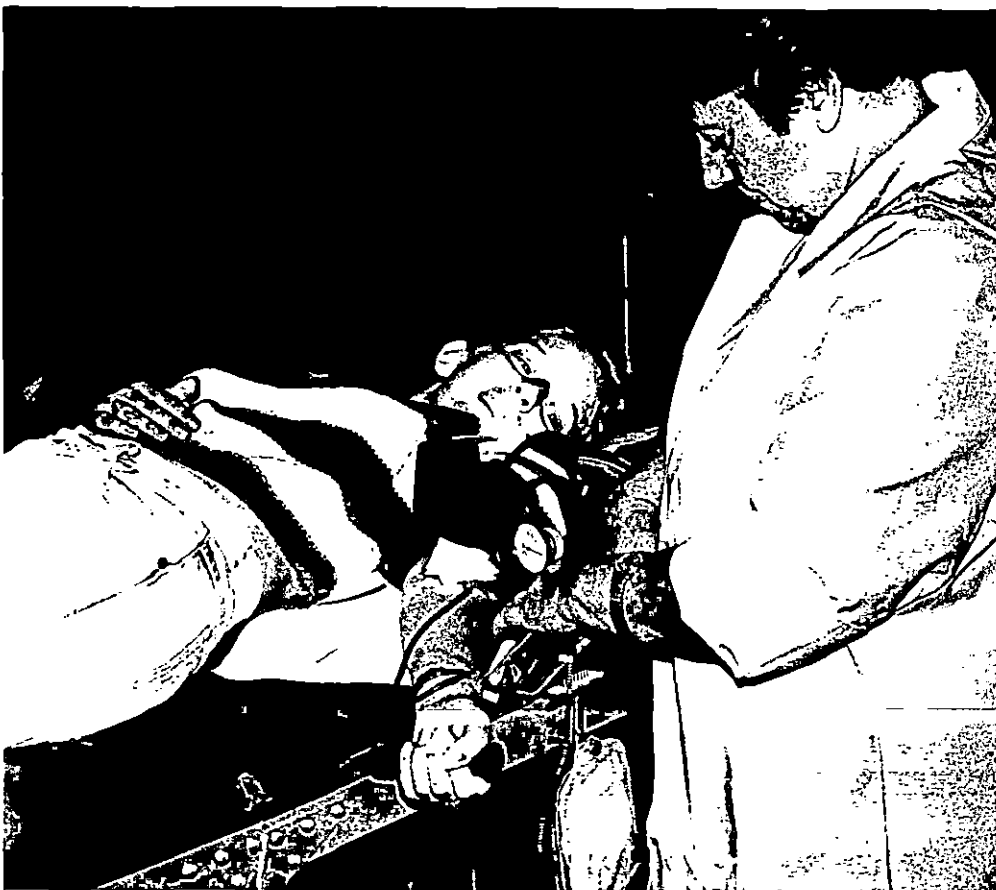

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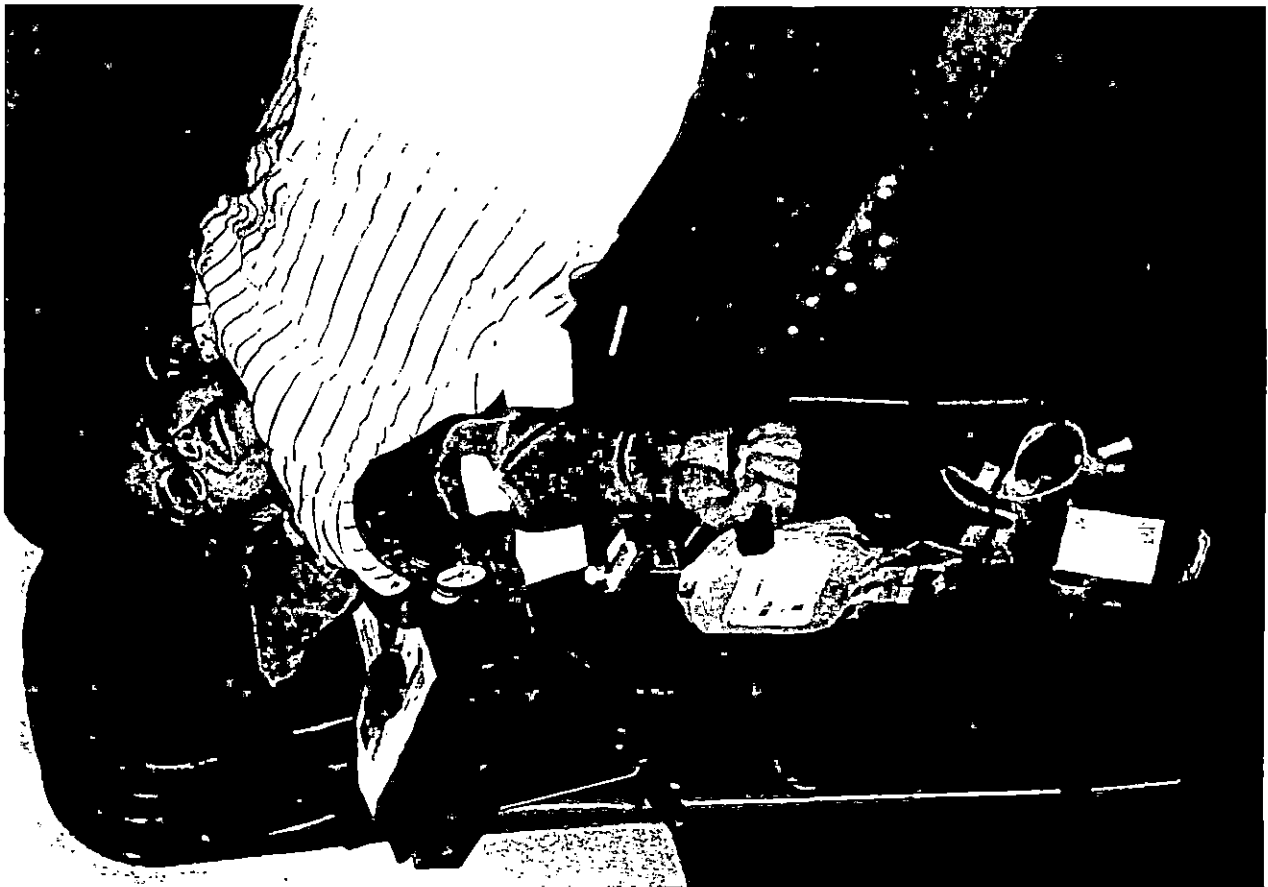

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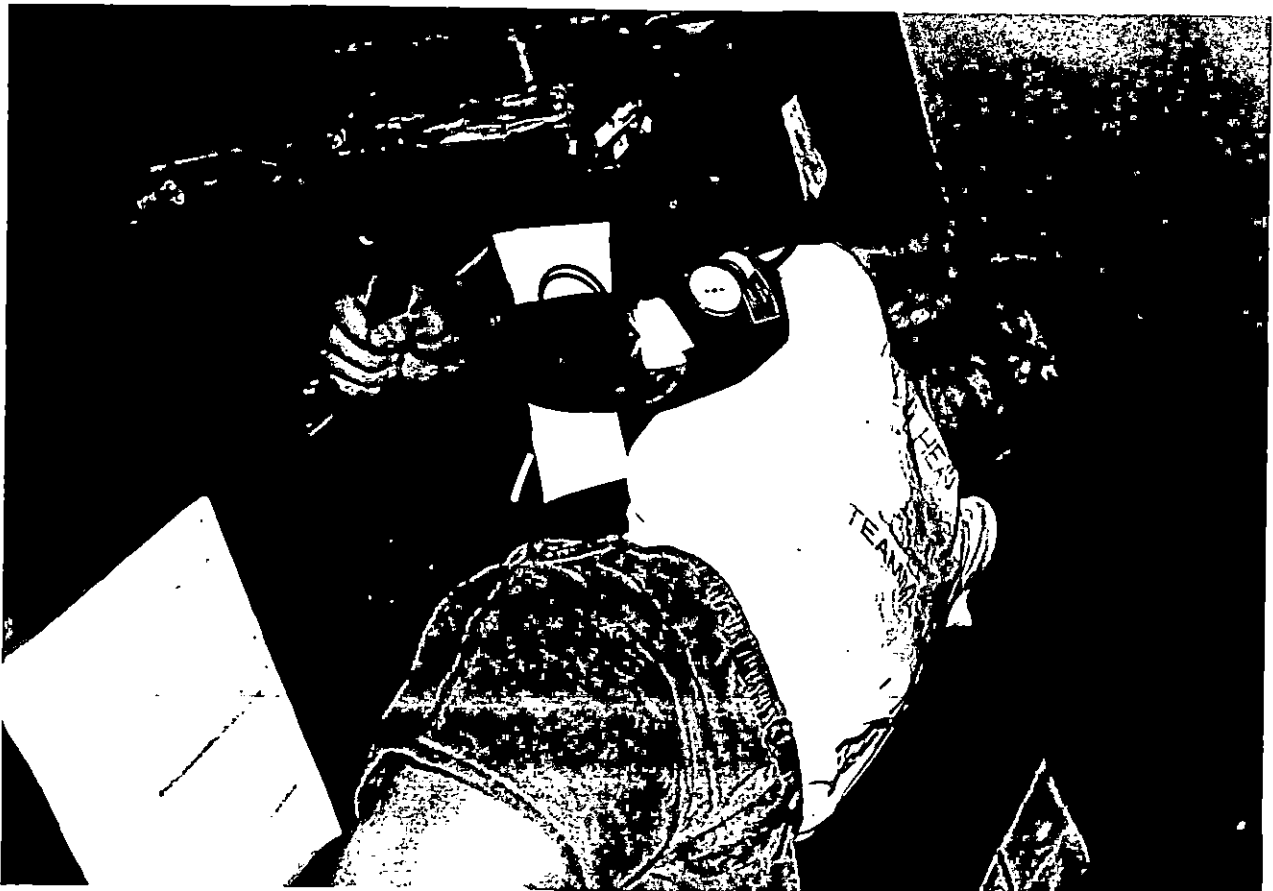

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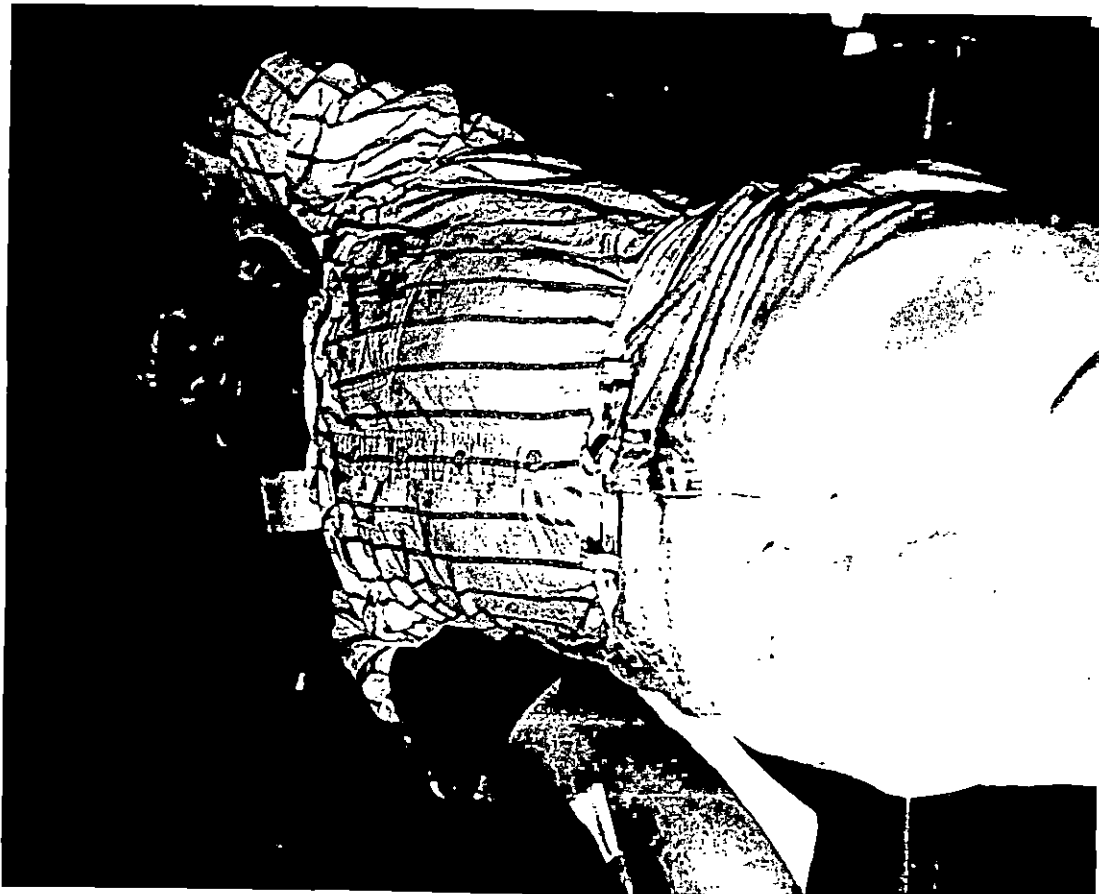

MOREHEAD, Ky.---With state funding for higher education declining, the Morehead State University Foundation has approved a capital campaign feasibility study, the MSU Board of Regents were told at its meeting on Sept. 18.

The decision by the Foundation's Board of Trustees follows earlier statements by MSU President Ronald G. Eaglin that the University needed to seek alternate funding sources rather than rely almost totally on state revenue sources.

According to Keith Kappes, MSU vice president for university advancement, there were four factors influencing the Foundation's decision: an obvious need for sustained financial support through endowment; 10 straight years of growth in annual giving; a donor base of almost 4,000 individuals and corporations, and Dr. Eaglin's enthusiastic support and fund raising track record.

Private giving to the University in fiscal 1991-92 was up 28 percent over the previous year with gifts totaling \$1,297,197 this year as compared with \$1,012,918 last year, Kappes reported to the regents.

Dr. Eaglin told the board that the feasibility study will tell MSU if it is ready for a capital campaign and, through an independent third party, would check the health of the University in terms of perceptions.

The president cautioned that for a successful capital campaign it would not be enough for people to like MSU, but they needed also to be willing to give money. The feasibility study is only a first step, he reminded the regents.

Earlier in the meeting, the board adopted a resolution commending former regents William E. Cofield of Frankfort, T.T. Colley of Pikeville, Wayne M. Martin of Winchester and Charles D. Wheeler of Ashland for the "time, energy and dedication" they gave while serving on the board.

While acting on a number of routine fiscal items, the board ratified the sale of revenue bonds for Phase I of the Lappin Hall project. Construction is under way on a nearly 35,000-square-foot addition to MSU's science building. Contractor for the more than \$5 million project is Woodford Builders, Inc., of Lexington. The addition will house laboratory functions, animal care facilities and chemical storage facilities. Completion of the addition is targeted for September 1993.

The board also heard reports on enrollment and student housing occupancy. Preliminary figures for fall 1992 show another record enrollment as student headcount reached 9,007. Residence halls have a 92 percent occupancy rate, while family housing units are at 93 percent capacity. Mike Mincey, MSU vice president for student life, told the board that the housing rate was within 2 percent of the budget projection.

MOREHEAD, Ky.—While their graduation is still eight months away, two Magoffin County High School seniors already have experienced life on a college campus.

Lowell Arnett and Abe Douglas (Doug) Wireman spent six weeks of their 1992 summer vacation attending the University of Tennessee's Upward Bound Math and Science Regional Center in Knoxville, Tenn.

The two, participants in Morehead State University's Educational Talent Search (ETS) Program, were among 50 students from the southeastern region of the United States selected to attend the program.

"We are glad that our program provided an opportunity for these students to participate in this learning experience," said Carolyn Horn, MSU's ETS Program coordinator.

The faculty and students at MCHS also are very proud of the students, said Paulette Prater, the school's guidance counselor. "It is definitely an honor to have been chosen and I am sure their observations will benefit their classmates."

From June 14 until July 25, the young men lived in residence halls, attended classes, went on field trips, and performed research for a specific project.

Arnett, who believes he spent millions of hours in the library, worked on a "Nutrients vs. History in Determining Algal Dominants" project. Studying water chemistry, he gathered and analyzed data on algae, spending six hours a week in the lab and more time in the library where he researched the process.

The "Effects of March Rainfall on the Quail Population" was Wireman's topic. He studied the life of the quail, including eating habits, breeding periods, and preference of coveys.

Each student was responsible for writing a research paper on his enterprise and submitting a poster for critique as a requirement of the program. Arnett took second place in biology for his poster.

When not in the lab or library, the duo followed a fairly regimented schedule. The average day was from 7 a.m. until 11 p.m. with classes in physics, chemistry, calculus, English, and ACT preparation thrown in among swimming, three meals and study hall.

"Even though the day's activities were planned, it was a good experience to prepare for college," Arnett said. "The academic programs were good and the experience put principles and ideas in your head."

Both Arnett and Wireman stated that the quality of the faculty was an added plus for the program. The instructors were high school and community college teachers as well as doctoral candidates and others who had terminal degrees in their fields. Arnett performed research with Terry Flum who was completing a Ph.D. degree while Wireman worked with Dr. William Sanders, a statistician.

"In some cases, I was utilizing 80 years of data," Wireman said. Another highlight for him was attending a meeting of superintendents and teachers on Tennessee's Education Reform Act with Dr. Sanders in downtown Knoxville.

"We had free time at 10:30 every night, so we could write letters or call home," Arnett added.

The students were given a \$15 a week allowance for laundry and miscellaneous items, Wireman said. "I've gotten pretty good at washing my own clothes," he added.

The six-week period has been described as "some good, some bad" by both students. They talk frankly about unpleasant times, like the a two-hour field trip to the waterfalls they never saw, but instead got a 10-mile hike.

They were in condition for the walk too. Two days a week, all students participated in an exercise program of walking, running or jogging. Providing the instruction for the workout was Ilrey Oliver, a member of the Jamaican National Team in the 1984 Olympics.

The Program provided some "firsts"--like the first time on an airplane--but the whole experience only reinforced their desire to attend college.

Arnett wants to teach biology one day. He is a member of his school's Academic Team and currently is seeking re-election as president of the Science Club. He is one of four children of Harry and Martha Arnett.

Wireman believes he will have a career in a math or science related field. He has taken a class in wildlife that he enjoyed and also likes forestry. He is president of Future Farmers of America at MGHS and is a member of the Beta and Science Clubs. He is the son of Lloyd Bruce Wireman of Royalton and Arletta Risner of Oakley Creek in Magoffin County. He has one sister and four brothers; one brother, Greg, is currently an MSU student majoring in art.

The young men plan to put their summer learning experience to the test at MGHS this year. Using their new knowledge, they hope to have more winning entries at the annual science fair. Last year, Arnett placed fourth at the high school and Wireman took second place in the 29th Northeast Kentucky Regional Science Fair.

Whatever happens, the young researchers know they will be "published" in the near future. The research papers from the summer program will be included in a bound volume that will be mailed to each participant.

Dr. Shirley Gish, associate professor of speech at MSU, was recognized by the Kentucky Advocates of Higher Education for her outstanding service and commitment to students. The Advocates group is a nonprofit organization dedicated to improving the quality of higher education in the state.

A member of MSU's faculty since 1989, Dr. Gish was one of 10 finalists for the Advocates' first Acorn Award, an off-shoot of the Oak Award which the group presents every two years to outstanding alumni of the state's colleges and universities.

"We are so very proud of all the professors in the state who have dedicated themselves to teaching and preparing students for the future," said Dan Lacy, Advocates chairman and vice president for corporate communications at Ashland Oil.

"This award is an expression of that pride and appreciation. All of the nominees were outstanding representatives of the hundreds of teachers in the public and private institutions throughout the state," Lacy added.

Dr. Gish's students are quick to point out that they already knew she was a winner.

"Dr. Gish makes it easy to learn," said Lori Godbey, a senior from Sandy Hook. "She's a very animated and lively instructor who strives to maintain her students' interest."

Another former student now a speech instructor at MSU, Sabrena Parton, called her one of the best teachers she ever had. "She not only challenges you to stretch yourself, but she also forces you to accept responsibility.

"She makes you work hard, but then you can see the results of what you did. She made me realize that learning is exciting," Parton said.

Professing limited knowledge of textbook methodology and educational psychology, Dr. Gish said what she did know was that "learning is a joy for life and I want to pass that on." The real rewards for teachers are the "small victories with students," she said.

"I know that if even one young person finds a better life, then what I do is worthwhile," added Dr. Gish.

Personalized teaching is part of Dr. Gish's style and she works hard at strategies to get students to participate in their own learning experience.

"I expect everyone to do and give their best and I expect nothing less," she said, emphasizing that she means an individual's best and not some norm or average.

Her classroom skills have not escaped the notice of her peers. Calling her most deserving of this recognition, Harlen Hamm, professor of speech, said her creativity was outstanding. "Dr. Gish is organized and exceedingly thorough. She sets high performance standards for her students, who respect her for what she is doing," Hamm said. "She also is known for her kindness to the students."

Expressing the University's pride in having one of its own recognized for outstanding teaching, MSU President Ron Eaglin said, "As a finalist, Dr. Gish not only has distinguished herself, but the University and its faculty as well. We are fortunate to have her talents among our faculty to inspire our students and her colleagues."

Dr. Gish's undergraduate work at the University of Minnesota was in art history, an area she continued to study along with library science at the University of Arizona where she earned her master's degree.

Combining the two areas, she spent several years as head of the Phoenix Art Museum's research library as well as a museum lecturer and served as a consultant and technical editor for Willdan Associates in Phoenix. She later began teaching in the Communication Department at the University of Arizona, where she earned her Ph.D. degree.

Dr. Gish's creativity is not limited to the classroom as she maintains an active schedule of oral interpretation and reader's theatre performances, scripting much of the material herself.

She has several original scripts to her credit and has written and produced several videos of her original scripts. She has received three residency grants for playwriting from the Helene Wurlitzer Foundation in Taos, N.M. If that weren't enough, she also is an artist, whose work has been exhibited here and in New Mexico. She also is active in the Morehead Theatre Guild.

Dr. Raymond Betts, a 21-year faculty member at the University of Kentucky, was the Acorn Award recipient. He and the other finalists were honored at a special ceremony at the Marriott Griffin Gate Resort in Lexington.

Other schools with finalists included Eastern Kentucky University, Kentucky Wesleyan College, Georgetown College, Northern Kentucky University and University of Louisville.

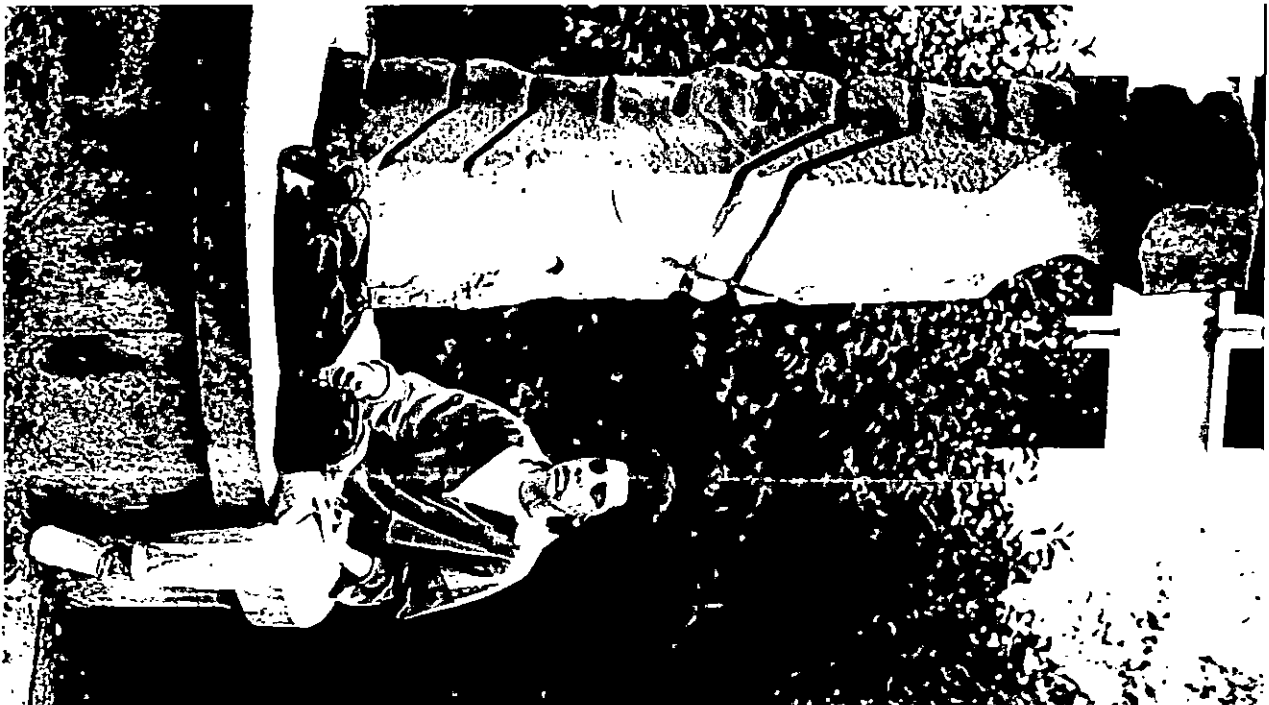

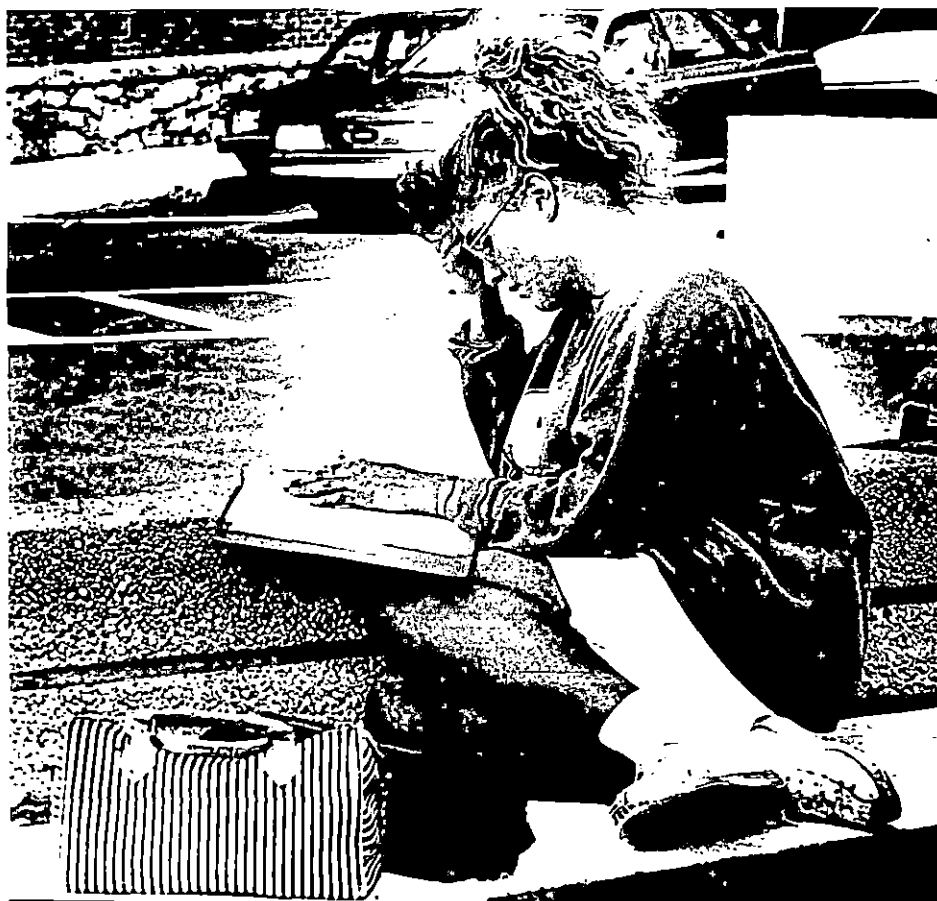

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University will be a host site for the U.S. National Committee for World Food Day's ninth annual teleconference slated for Friday, Oct. 16.

Sponsored locally by MSU's Office of Community Services, the World Food Day town meeting is free and open to the public as well as to MSU faculty, staff and students.

The teleconference, "Nutrition: The Bridge between Food and Health," will air from noon to 3 p.m. in the Riggle Room at the Adron Doran University Center.

Midway through the telecast, there will be an opportunity for local participants to discuss issues of their choosing and develop questions to be submitted to the television panel.

The teleconference is designed for health care providers, sociologists, religious organizations, nutritionists and others interested in the quality of life worldwide, according to Shirley Hamilton, director of community services.

The program will originate from Washington, D.C., and feature Deborah Potter, former CBS White House correspondent and now with CNN, as panel moderator. Panelists will be James P. Grant, UNICEF executive director; Fernando Monckeberg, head of the Caribbean Food and Nutrition Institute, the Chilean Infant Nutrition Foundation and Chile's Institute of Nutrition and Food Technology, and Per Pinstrup-Anderson, professor of food economics at Cornell University.

Among the issues to be covered during the teleconference are the support and protection of those at most nutritional risk; food safety, diet-related diseases, agricultural self-sufficiency and trade. Also explored will be solutions to child malnutrition.

Observed worldwide in over 150 countries, World Food Day was created by the member states of the U.N. Food and Agriculture Organizations.

The purpose is to create public awareness and support for private and governmental efforts to combat hunger, while building a world food security system through local, national and international program policies.
