Dr. Harkey is a former employer and close personal friend of Brown.

"It is very appropriate that this nationally known journalist would help us honor the professor who started MSU's journalism program," Dr. Quisenberry said. Brown, who came to the University in 1966, retired earlier this year because of health problems.

Dr. Harkey received a Pulitzer Prize in 1963 for distinguished editorial writing for his work as editor-publisher of the Pascagoula, (Miss.), Chronicle where he was employed from 1948 until 1963. He was a reporter-feature writer for the Times-Picayune in New Orleans 1939-42 and 1946-48.

He is the 1992 recipient of the Civil Libertarian Award from Mississippi's Civil Liberties Union, and has received the Sigma Delta Chi national award for distinguished public service in newspaper journalism, Sidney Hillman Foundation Award and National Conference of Christians and Jews media award.

Sharing his experiences with journalism students, Dr. Harkey was a faculty member at Ohio State University, Carnegie visiting professor at the University of Alaska, professional lecturer at University of Montana and an Allen lecturer at the University of Oregon.

A lecturer at numerous newspaper and academic seminars, Dr. Harkey is the author of numerous magazine articles and several books including "The Smell of Burning Crosses," "The Story of Noel Wien," and "Alton Ochsner: Surgeon of the South."

He holds membership in various professional organizations including the American Political Science Association, American Association of University Professors, Authors Guild, Phi Beta Kappa, Delta Kappa Epsilon, Kappa Tau Alpha and Pi Sigma Alpha.

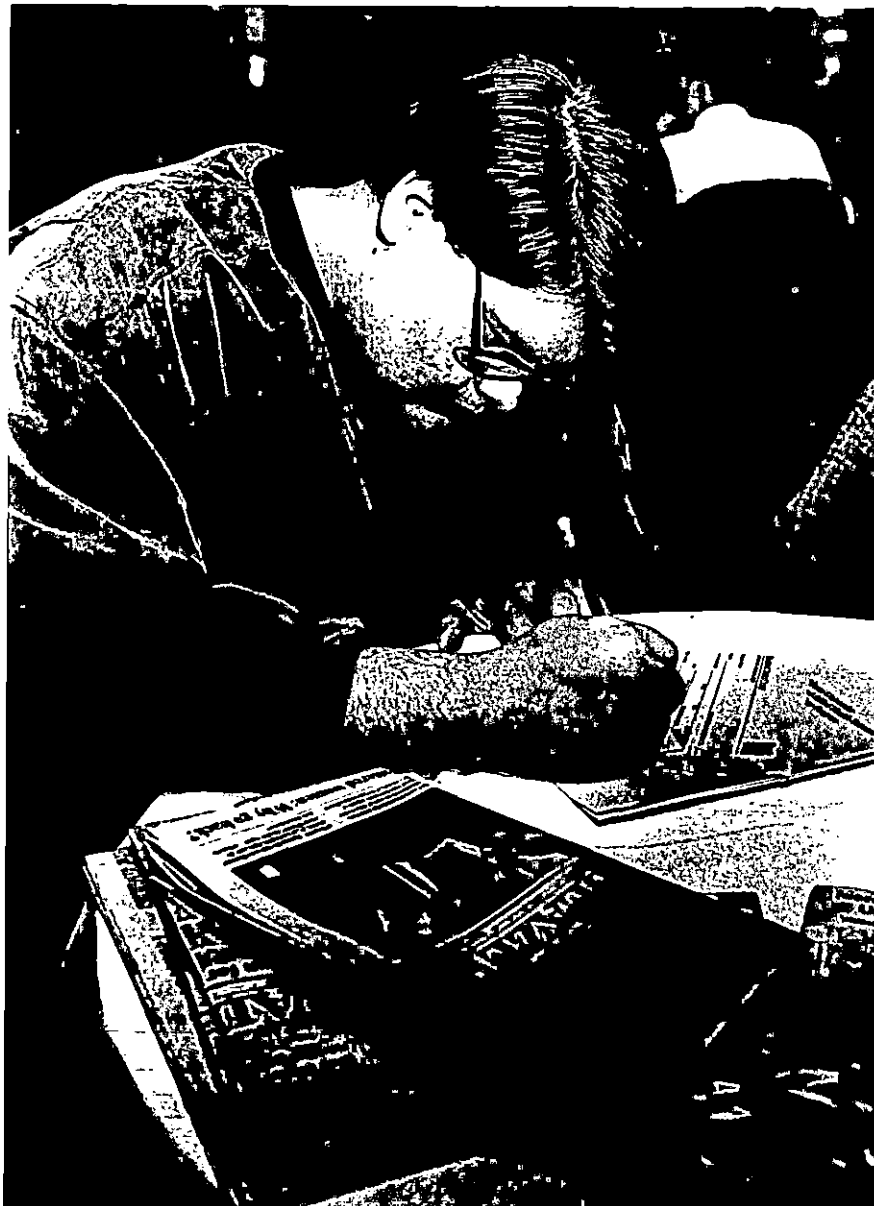

## **SPECIAL TO THE LOUISVILLE DEFENDER BLACKS IN EDUCATION SUPPLEMENT**

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University is not only interested in the recruitment of minority students, but also--perhaps even more importantly--in the retention of minority students with the ultimate goal of graduation.

As black student enrollment continues to increase, minority programming--academic, cultural and social--and the presence of appropriate professional role models remains a high priority for MSU officials.

This year MSU gained the talents of two new professionals with the addition of Dr. William J. Mosley as chair of the Department of Elementary, Reading and Special Education and Sarah D. Love as instructor of speech and assistant director of forensics.

Formerly the director of Western Illinois University's Center for the Preparation of Educators of Minority Children, Dr. Mosley has an extensive background in special education programs, including those for the disabled, as well as in minority education.

The administrator/educator also developed and directed WIU's Summer Tutoring Program for Minority Junior High Schools, which was recognized nationally by the Council for Advancement and Support of Education (CASE) in 1989.

While his higher education experience includes teaching at Louisiana State University, Indiana University, University of Texas and the University of Harford, Dr. Mosley also taught in the public schools of Indiana and Tennessee.

He earned his doctorate from the University of Connecticut, the master's degree from the University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh and the bachelor's degree from Fisk University.

He has served as a consultant for public school systems in the midwest, for state departments of education in five states and for the U.S. Department of Education as well as the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. Active in several professional organizations, Dr. Mosley has written numerous articles for publication and is a frequent presenter at professional meetings.

Teaching speech and working with MSU's I.E. team which is ranked fourth in the nation will be Love's primary responsibilities. She came to MSU from the University of Nevada-Los Vegas where she was assistant director of debate and forensics as well as a lecturer. A former adjunct faculty member in the Department of Communication Studies at Governors State University, she has taught both at the college level and in public schools.

She holds the M.A. degree in communication studies from Governors State, with an emphasis on rhetorical theory, and the B.S. degree from Illinois State University. While a student, she was a National Forensic Association finalist in prose reading and earned semi-finalist and quarter-finalist spots in other events.

Love is active in the Speech Communication Association and its Black Caucus as well as the American Forensic Association, the National Forensics Association and Women in Communication.

In an effort to provide an environment in which minority students can succeed, MSU staffs its Office of Minority Student Affairs with a full-time director and a minority student recruiter. A minority retention specialist position also is included among MSU's academic counselors.

On the academic side, MSU has implemented a program which may help minority students in the future: the Minority Teacher Education Program (MTEP) which encourages blacks to consider teaching as a career.

High school students identified by their teachers or counselors as potential participants in the program are brought to the campus throughout the year to hear about the teaching profession first hand from minority educators, to participate in motivational workshops and to spend a week at MSU during the summer.

Once enrolled at MSU, the students will receive the academic support needed to successfully complete the teacher education program, according to Ernestine Winfield, coordinator of MTEP. Now in its fifth year, MTEP, funded in part by the Kentucky Council on Higher Education, primarily targets schools in Jefferson and Fayette counties. The program's first graduate, Rodney Gill, is now teaching in the Jefferson County school system.

Through its Office of Minority Affairs, MSU offers a diversity of programs and activities designed to foster pride in the black cultural heritage, with speakers ranging from successful alumni to black feminists Dr. Patricia Hill Collins and noted sports sociologist Dr. Harry Edwards.

In addition to observing Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.'s birthday annually, MSU also celebrates Black Awareness Week and Black History Month. This year's candlelight march and memorial tributes to Dr. King were followed by a special workshop on cultural diversity and sensitivity conducted by Dr. Josepha Campinha-Bacote.

Launching Black History Month was a videoconference, "Beyond the Dream IV: Discovering the Past--Understanding the Future," which focused on the struggles and accomplishments of African-Americans.

Although students are encouraged to be involved in all aspects of campus life, including student government, there are activities offered specifically for the black student: two historically black Greek sororities, four fraternities, as well as The Brotherhood which is a co-ed social organization and LaDies, a women's group. There is also the Black Gospel Ensemble which is celebrating its 25th anniversary and the Black Student Coalition.

Additionally, the Office of Minority Student Affairs sponsors a Little Brother-Little Sister program, an academic and social peer counseling program giving upperclassmen the opportunity to help new students succeed.

New this fall was a special orientation workshop for new and returning minority students and their parents. Other activities so far have included workshops on "Academic Survival" and "Rights and Responsibilities as a Student" and attending the fourth annual Roots and Heritage Festival in Lexington.

Also, according to Jerry Gore, minority student affairs director, his office will utilize a minority mentoring program matching prospective students with alumni. Another push will be the recruitment of black graduate students.

Providing formal and informal opportunities for minority students to have access to him is a major priority for MSU's new president, Dr. Ronald G. Eaglin, who is committed to seeing that there are role models for these students among the University's faculty and staff.

"It's particularly important that we foster an awareness of the value of cultural diversity on this campus, because many of our students may not have had the opportunity to experience cultures different than their own," Dr. Eaglin said. "We can all learn from one another," he added.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--A Morehead State University faculty member has been awarded a 1992 Al Smith Fellowship in Poetry from the Kentucky Arts Council.

George Eklund, assistant professor of English, is one of 18 Kentuckians selected to receive the fellowship in the disciplines of choreography, composing, and writing, according to Marty Newell, council director. Only five awards were given in poetry.

The Al Smith Fellowship, named for a former chairman of the council, provides each recipient with a \$5,000 grant to help further his or her work, said Newell.

Newell said the works are judged by an out-of-state panel of individuals considered excellent in their respective fields. He explained that the judges evaluate the artists' work on the basis of how favorably it compares to the best work being done in the nation.

By receiving the award this year, Eklund has continued a tradition, Newell said.

"It's been a long time since someone from Morehead or Rowan County hasn't won," he added.

Eklund's poems have appeared or are forthcoming in such publications as Poetry Northwest, Negative Capability, New York Quarterly, Poet Lore, The Louisville Review, and Cincinnati Poetry Review, among others.

Eklund, who began teaching at MSU in 1991, received his Master of Fine Arts degree from the University of Iowa.

Established in 1983 and funded by the Kentucky General Assembly, the fellowships are awarded in alternating categories each year. Next year, visual artists, media artists, and interdisciplinary artists will be eligible.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Morehead State University physical science students have been reaching for the stars and now they have the funding to reach a little higher, according to Dr. Benjamin K. Malphrus, assistant professor of science education.

MSU's Department of Physical Sciences recently was awarded a \$26,526 matching funds grant by the National Science Foundation to support the "Morehead Radio Telescope." The university has matched the NSF grant for a total project value of \$53,053.

According to Dr. Malphrus, the project's director, the grant money will be used to construct Kentucky's first and only radio telescope. The telescope, which will be built on Henry Ward Place near WMKY radio station, will be designed to detect radio frequency radiation emitted from "highly energetic objects" in space--such as galaxies. After this radiation is concentrated and focused, it will be converted to electrical signals and sent to a computer, which will then display the data. Dr. Malphrus said the computer will also be capable of generating a visual picture.

The Morehead Radio Telescope will function as "a research instrument for investigations in astronomy and astrophysics", "an active laboratory in astronomy, physics, electrical engineering, and computer science", and "a research instrument and laboratory for science teacher education and inservice programs," according to the project proposal. Dr. Malphrus estimates that the project will affect hundreds of students over the next five years.

In addition, he said that science teachers and students throughout Kentucky may use the telescope for research and educational purposes.

Dr. Malphrus said the project will take about three years to reach the operational stage. In the meantime, students involved in physics, pre-engineering, computer science, and astronomy will begin designing and constructing the telescope under the direction of Dr. Malphrus and several other MSU faculty members--Dr. Russell M. Brengelman, Dr. David R. Cutts, and Dr. Charles J. Whidden, professors of physics.

Once completed, Dr. Malphrus said that the telescope will be used for student research projects in astronomy, electronics, engineering, computer programming and computer interfacing. He explained that the design of the telescope will allow components to be easily removed for use in laboratory settings and individual research and design projects.

So, while MSU students are still looking to the stars, if things go as planned in the next two or three years, they just might get a closer look.

The University received \$202,739 to fund Vocational Education Title II-C programs: Autotutorial and Microcomputer Laboratories, \$58,335; Department of Industrial Education and Technology, \$44,500; Department of Home Economics, \$15,000; Department of Nursing and Allied Health Sciences, \$35,000; Department of Agriculture and Natural Resources, \$35,000, and Department of Information Sciences, \$14,904.

\*The College of Applied Sciences and Technology received \$500 to administer and coordinate vocational education programs and \$16,000 to continue and upgrade Kentucky's Industrial Education Teachers through the activities of the field-base educators.

\*Dr. Joe Bendixen, professor of agriculture, received \$3,200 to provide enrichment activities for agricultural education programs.

\*Dr. Sue Luckey, professor in the Department of Information Sciences, received \$3,500 to update faculty members on new developments in the field of business and train additional business education teachers needed in the service region.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Preparing income tax forms can be "taxing" even for tax preparers, but this year Morehead State University business students will be learning and using the latest in computer software technology for filing taxes.

Drake Systems, Inc., a North Carolina software firm, has given MSU's College of Business its software package for preparing state and federal income taxes on the computer and for electronic filing.

John Osborne, MSU assistant professor of accounting, estimated the value of the software at \$2,700. Also the company will waive the individual re-transmittal fee of \$1 when the program is being used by the student volunteers for the University's Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) Program, which Osborne coordinates.

The latter, according to Osborne, could amount to a more than \$300 contribution. Drake will provide updated versions of the program annually to MSU.

"The acquisition of this particular software package gives MSU the only university VITA Program in the state with electronic filing capability at this time," said Osborne.

The program not only will give the students experience with new technological advances in tax preparation, but also will benefit people served by the VITA Program.

With the Drake Systems Federal Income Tax software, students will enter the necessary data into a computer and provide clients with a printout of the form for mailing. Or, they can send it electronically to the IRS making it possible for clients to have their refunds deposited directly into their bank within 10 to 17 days.

"It is a fantastic opportunity for our students," said Osborne, whose first-hand knowledge of the program promoted his inquiry into the possibility of obtaining the software as a contribution to MSU.

"And our VITA clients will receive a more professional tax preparation with a much faster refund," added Osborne, who already has incorporated teaching the software program into his classes this semester.

MSU will launch its VITA Program on the last Tuesday in January, with student volunteers staffing 209 Combs from 3 to 6 p.m. each Tuesday through April 13. Approximately 30 student volunteers from Osborne's tax preparation classes usually work with the program.

Students, the elderly, low income individuals and the disabled are eligible for VITA services, according to Osborne.

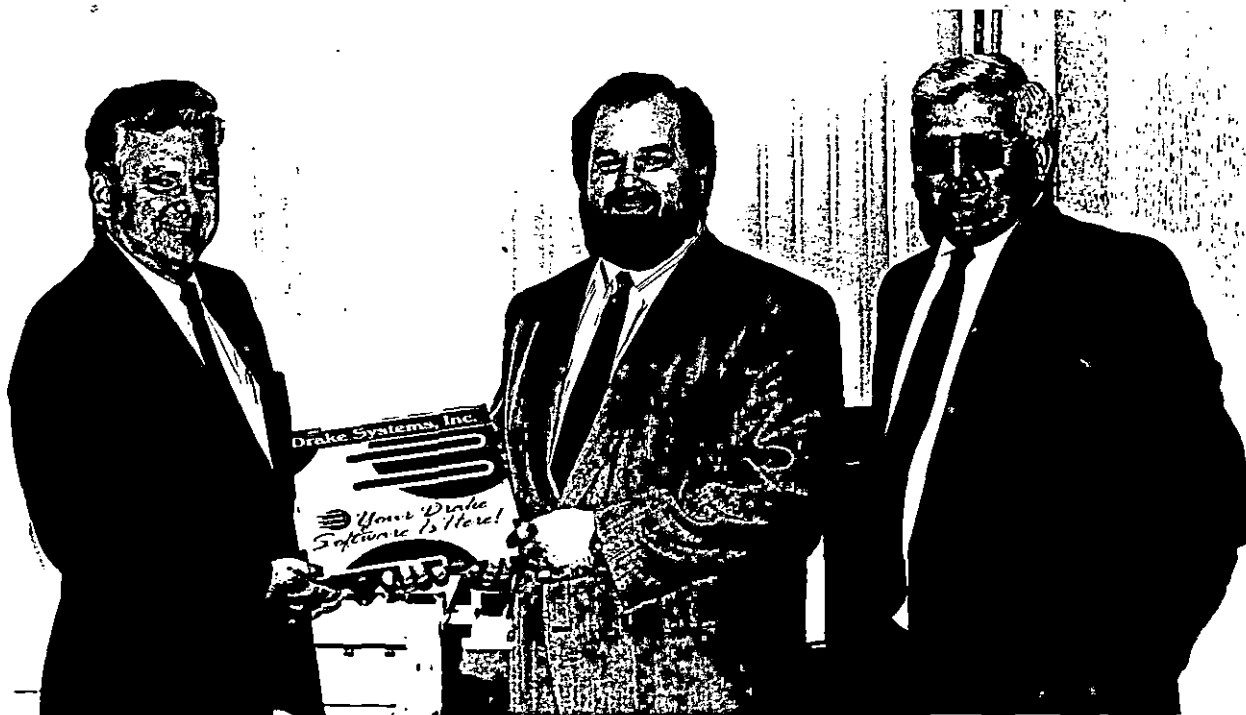

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Issues related to family life will be explored in a special symposium on "Families: A World Perspective" to be held at Morehead State University's Adron Doran University Center on Nov. 6-7.

Several pre-conference workshops also are scheduled for the evening of Nov. 5 and during the morning on Nov. 6.

Coordinated by MSU's ad hoc committee on women's studies, the 1992 Wilma E. Grote Symposium for the Advancement of Women has drawn presenters--male as well as female--from all over the United States, from North Dakota to Florida, New Mexico to Michigan and Illinois to Georgia.

"What we once thought of as 'family' has altered so drastically in recent decades and now even is a hot topic on the national political scene," said Dr. Judy Rogers, MSU dean of undergraduate programs and committee chair.

Coordinated by MSU's ad hoc committee on women's studies, "Families: A World Perspective" will explore issues confronting families today and how traditional family roles are changing.

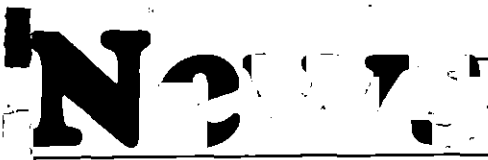

By now you should have received two releases on the upcoming Wilma E. Grote Symposium for the Advancement of Women to be held at Morehead State University on Nov. 6-7.



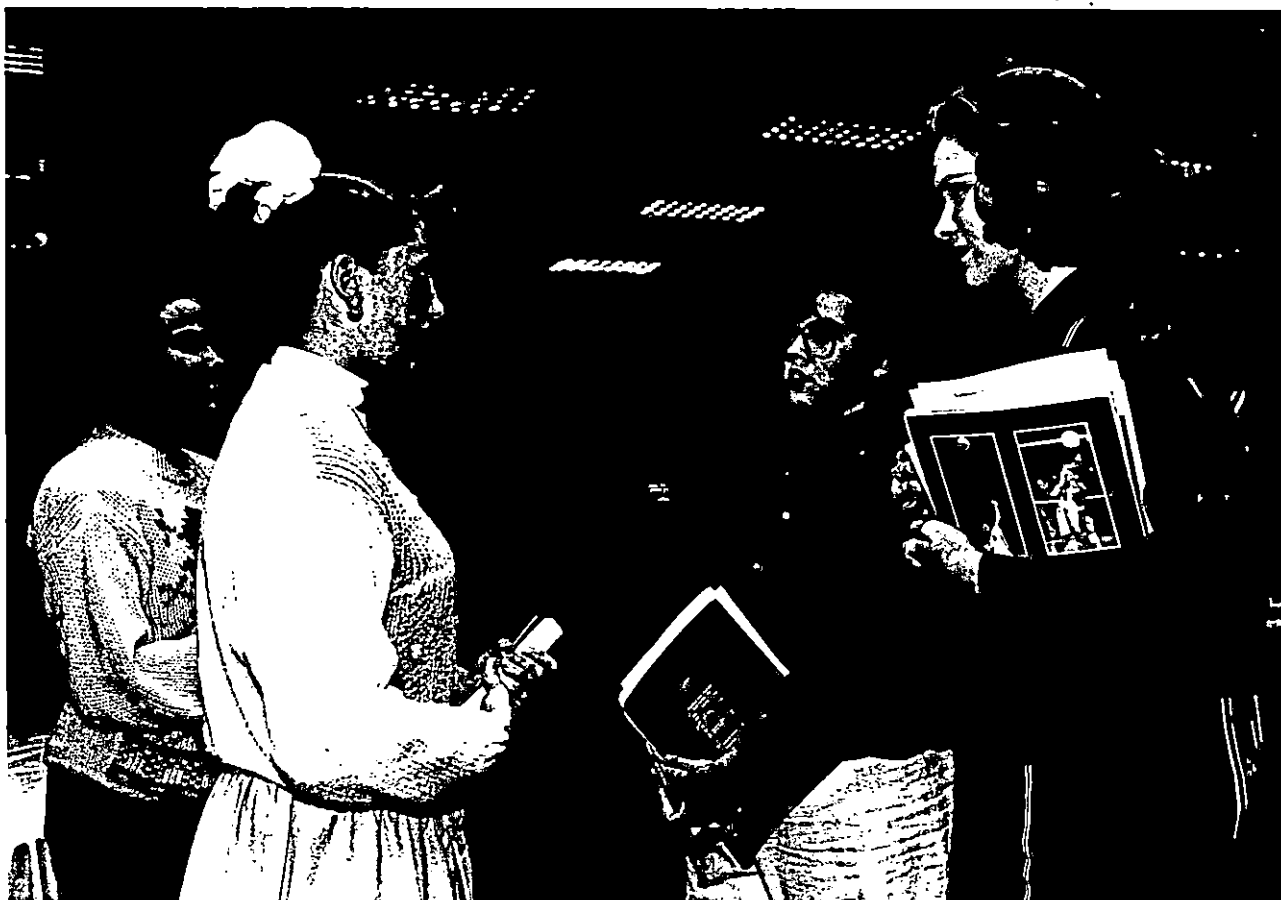

Jason Griffey, Olive Hill sophomore, and Lenore Womack, Grayson junior, made presentations at the 27th annual meeting of the National Collegiate Honors Council held in Los Angeles, Oct. 29-Nov. 1.

The opportunity to attend the national meeting came as a result of the students' participation in MSU's Honors Program. They were selected to be part of the program based on proposals submitted earlier this year.

Assisted by Angela Cottrill, a Northern Kentucky University senior and a student representative on the national committee, Griffey conducted a workshop on communication by way of the Bitnet computer system.

"We discussed the advantages of communicating ideas, where you can ask questions and get replies within a short amount of time, in a 10-minute time period, for instance," he said. "During the 55-minute workshop, we gave a basic outline of what Bitnet can do, including commands and capabilities, and provided a forum for discussion."

Griffey has set up a mailing list for the Kentucky Honors Roundtable which he currently owns and is responsible for maintaining. His goal is to link up all the Honors Programs nationwide that have computer capability.

Son of Jackie and James Griffey, he enjoys reading science fiction, participating in sports and caving. Griffey believes his employment as a cave guide at Carter Caves Resort Park last summer, was an advantage when he spoke before the group.

"I discussed how you can use the Divided Line to interpret other scholarly writings," Womack said. "There are certain characteristics attached to Plato's works which can be used to bring together systematic areas, as theories from different departments."

Womack, a philosophy major, was introduced to Plato last year when she read his Divided Line in a class. Earlier this year she reread the literary work as well as studying writings by six of his followers.

Being able to share with other students at the conference was a wonderful opportunity," she said, of her experience.

After working on this project, Womack, daughter of Carl and Betty Womack, believes she wants to continue in this field. Her future plans include several options such as a master's degree, law school or a Ph.D. in philosophy. She is currently a member of Gamma Beta Phi honor society, Student Alumni Ambassadors and Academic Honors Student Association.

In addition, both students joined Dr. George "Mac" Luckey, Jr., MSU professor of philosophy and Honors Program director, in a group presentation on "Problem Solving for the 21st Century." They included material covered at the 1991 Kentucky Honors Roundtable held last fall on MSU's campus and discussed how similar programs can be adapted to other campuses across the country.

Dr. Luckey presented "Works to Read on Critical Thinking" in which he highlighted five books by various authors that he believes are useful in the critical thinking process.

More than 1,000 students attended the weekend activity which provided an opportunity for honors programs participants from across the country to share ideas and beliefs.
