MOREHEAD, Ky.--Morehead State University's Department of Music will host the 33rd Annual Choral Festival for High School Singers, Nov. 16-17, in Duncan Recital Hall.

On Monday, Nov. 16, the University's Concert Choir and Chamber Singers, both directed by James Ross Beane, associate professor of music and festival director, will share the stage. The Concert Choir will perform music by Handel, Casals, Vaughan Williams and Mack Wilberg. The Chamber Singers' performance will include selections by Gastoldi, Lassus, Byrd, Rossini and Goldman. The concert will begin at 8 p.m.

On Tuesday, Nov. 17, beginning at 7 p.m., a 300-voice chorus composed of high school students from Kentucky and Ohio will perform music by such composers as Mozart, Ricketts, Tilley and Stephen Foster. The chorus will be conducted by guest conductor Rod Walker, director of choral studies at Kansas State University. Jay Flippin, associate professor of music at MSU, will be the accompanist.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Three Morehead State University students are participating in an educational consortium with the University of Sunderland in England, according to Shirley Blair, director of student teaching.

Brian Rau, Winchester, Ohio, senior, Sheila Huff, Jeffersonville graduate student, and Michele Waring, Ashland senior, left Sept. 18 for Great Britain where they are now teaching in primary and secondary schools. Blair said this 12-week practicum will fulfill the requirements necessary for the students to obtain their Kentucky teaching certificates.

According to Blair, the students were selected from a pool of applicants through interviews and academic evaluations.

She pointed out that this opportunity could come at no better time for Kentucky education students.

"This educational consortium is especially timely in view of our state's educational reform act," she said, adding that Kentucky used the British school system as a model for its educational reforms. So, Blair said, the schools in which the students are teaching already have in place some of the ideas which are still in Kentucky's future.

Blair offered as examples the non-graded primary, which groups elementary children into a unit known as the primary unit, which may be divided into several different levels; the integrated curriculum, which combines subject areas so students can see their

relatedness; and performance-based assessment, in which children are grouped into levels of proficiency rather than simply given a grade.

Having the opportunity to experience these ideas first-hand "will give the students a jump-start when they return to Kentucky," said Blair.

This marks the fourth semester MSU has participated in this exchange program with the University of Sunderland.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Some students attend college with the hopes of getting a job with a major corporation.

Five Morehead State University students are experiencing that reality while still in college thanks to a special grant to Morehead State University from Lexmark International, Inc., of Lexington.

The students are seeing what it's like to work in a corporate environment, according to Dr. Jennings Mace, associate professor of English and director of the MSU-Lexmark Writing Project. "The students are gaining expertise we could not possibly duplicate in the classroom."

The work officially began during the summer when Tim Hunt of Lick Creek, and Theresa Perkins of Morehead, both graduate students, worked 40 hours per week at the Lexington location gaining insight into the company's operation. They have now been joined by three other students--John P. Collins, Greenup junior; Donna Cummins, Morehead junior, and Holly Rowlett, Madison, Ind., sophomore--and now are serving in a leadership capacity to coordinate the work.

The students, who work 10-20 hours per week, have been converting documents from one desktop publishing system to a newer, industrial system. Hunt and Perkins also have been writing specifications and user manuals for the company's new products and make frequent trips to the Lexington base.

The \$44,309 grant will be used for salaries, supplies, travel and other expenses for MSU students to provide technical writing services for Lexmark. To assist in the project, the firm supplied the students with \$17,000 of computer equipment to set up a lab in MSU's Breckinridge Hall.

MOREHEAD, Ky.—Arthur Smith, author of "Elegy on Independence Day," will present a reading of his poems at Morehead State University on Thursday, Nov. 19, at 8 p.m. in 111 Claypool-Young Building.

While on campus, he also will conduct a poetry writing workshop for MSU students. The time and location for the workshop is yet to be determined, but it and the reading are free and open to the public.

"Elegy on Independence Day," a collection of poems which explores love, loss and memory, won both the Starrett Poetry Prize from the University of Pittsburgh Press and the 1985 Norma Farber Award from the Poetry Society of America as the best first book of poetry.

Smith's appearance is part of an ongoing effort by MSU's Department of English, Foreign Languages and Philosophy to bring nationally prominent writers to the campus, according to Dr. Michelle Boisseau, MSU associate professor of English.

Smith, an associate professor of English at the University of Tennessee, is a native of California who studied at San Francisco State University and the University of Houston. In addition to the Starrett and Farber awards, he has received two Pushcart Prizes and a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts. His work has appeared in some of the nation's leading magazines, including The New Yorker and The Nation.

During MSU's spring semester, best-selling novelist Rosellen Brown will be on campus for readings from her work. Brown most recently discussed her latest book, "Before and After" on National Public Radio's "Fresh Air" and "All Things Considered." Her MSU appearance is scheduled for April 1.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---As the world continues to experience the meshing of different cultures, Morehead State University's Student Government Association has taken an active part in the education process by sponsoring the second annual Diversity Week.

MSU faculty, staff and students will share their different cultures with one another through some special programs from Monday through Thursday, Nov. 9-12, according to Anthony Gaines, SGA congressman and chair of the Multicultural Awareness Committee that is sponsoring Diversity Week.

"We are going to operate on the 'Each One-Teach One' theme," Gaines said. "We believe that if there is a knowledge of other cultures and lifestyles, racism can be eliminated," he added.

Most racism stems from ignorance, according to the Cincinnati, Ohio, senior. "Across the nation, there is a push for cultural diversity and we believe MSU should be a part of this educational thrust."

MSU is currently home to 88 international students from 35 different countries.

On Monday, Nov. 9, and repeated on Tuesday, Nov. 10, several international students will hold a name writing session from 9 a.m. until noon in the Adron Doran University Center (ADUC). During the three-hour period each day, students will translate American names into their native language.

Later in the day on Monday, faculty, staff and students will participate in a "Poetry Reading." Representatives from several cultures will be on hand for the program that begins at 7:30 p.m. in the Commonwealth Room, ADUC.

The evening program for Tuesday, Nov. 10, is a concert by the Black Gospel Ensemble. The 30-member choir will be directed by Lloyd Spence, Louisville freshman. Gaines is the group's president. The performance begins at 7 p.m. in the Crager Room, ADUC.

The programming for Wednesday, Nov. 11, will be coordinated by the Panhellenic and Interfraternity Councils. The time and location will be announced at a later date.

A fashion show, dancing, poetry readings and food tasting are on tap for Thursday's offering of African Night, which begins at 7 p.m. in the Eagle Dining Room, ADUC. The program is being coordinated by the newly formed African Committee.

PRESTONSBURG, Ky.---Dr. Margaret Lewis, director of Morehead State University's Big Sandy Extended Campus Center, has been selected to participate in a special four-day seminar at Harvard University.

Part of the Harvard Graduate School of Education's Programs in Professional Education, the seminar, "Teaching by the Case Method," is scheduled for Jan. 12-16 and will feature former Harvard President Derek Bok as a guest speaker.

Case teaching, which uses situations--real or hypothetical--for a problem-solving approach, is becoming one of education's most successful learning tools, according to Harvard officials.

"Teaching by case is an excellent way to improve interaction between teachers and students while developing the critical thinking skills of students," said Dr. Lewis. "I'm looking forward to this opportunity to update my skills in this teaching method," she added.

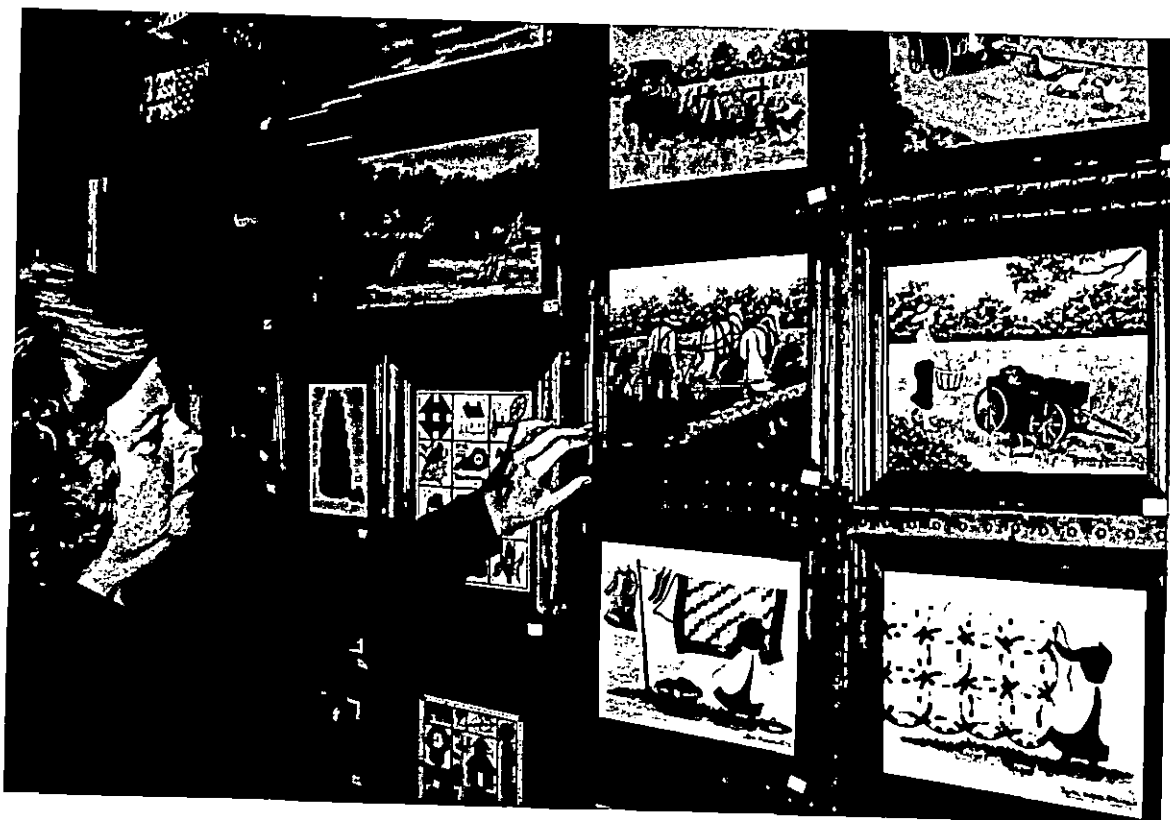

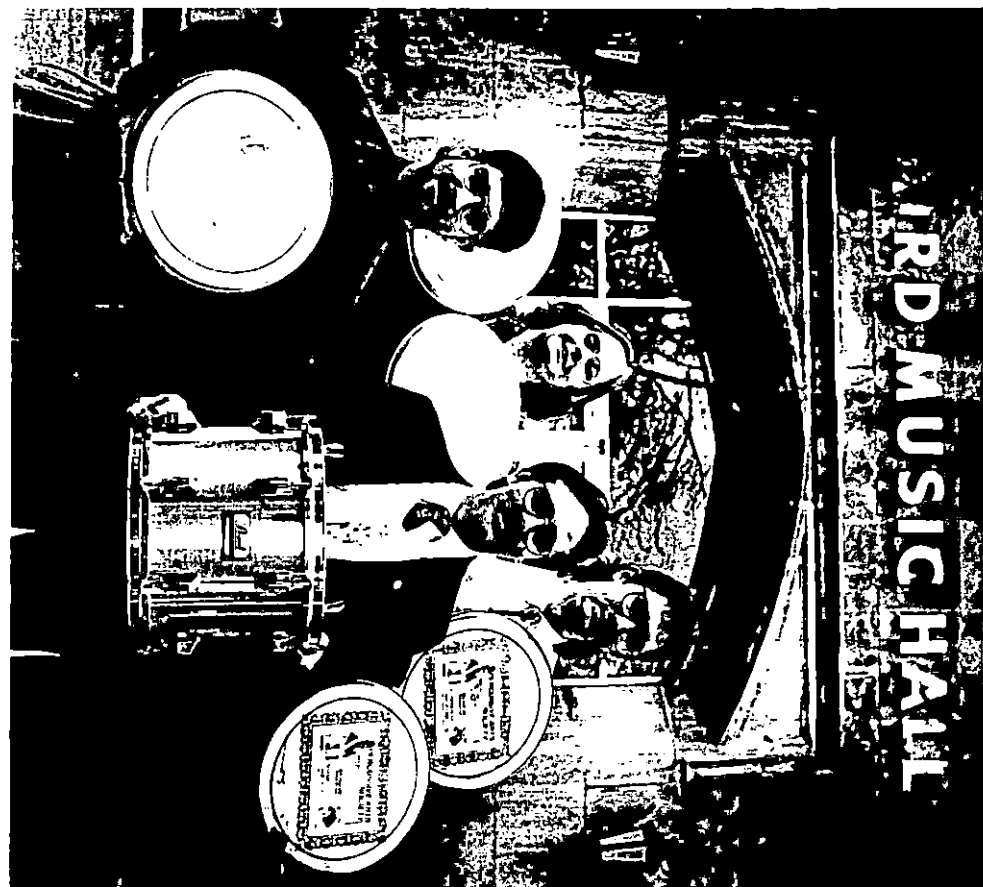

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University President Ronald G. Eaglin will take part in a national student retention project conducted by the American Association of State Colleges and Universities (AASCU) under a \$375,000 grant from the Student Loan Marketing Association (Sallie Mae).

"Student retention is a problem that must be addressed if our young people are to be successful in the next millenium," said Dr. Eaglin. "MSU already has begun addressing the issue which is a concern for all of us in higher education today. We look forward to sharing what we are doing with other institutions and learning from them as well."

Dr. Eaglin is one 36 college and university presidents nationwide invited by AASCU to participate in the project which was the subject of a focus session, "Cost of Attrition: Responsibilities for Retention," at AASCU's annual meeting.

Sallie Mae has a strong interest in encouraging educational opportunities for under represented students, according to Lawrence Hough, Sallie Mae's president and chief executive officer, who addressed the presidents.

"Because Sallie Mae works closely with schools and others involved in higher education, we know how important it is that all students be supported in their efforts to stay in school and graduate," Hough said.

Selected for their commitment to and involvement in student retention programming and measurement, these 36 presidents will work with national leaders to promote student retention and graduation on their own campuses and also serve as resources to other colleges in their states and regions.

Providing regional leadership for the three-year retention project will be three AASCU member presidents: Herman James of Rowan College of New Jersey, Diana Natalicio of the University of Texas-El Paso and Wendell Rayburn of Lincoln University in Missouri.

The national retention project will bring together campus teams to identify and disseminate information on successful retention practices, develop mechanisms to assess institutional change and progress in meeting student retention and graduation goals, and establish networks to promote student retention and graduation.

In addition to the ongoing sharing of information, the project calls for each region to conduct a conference on the issue this spring bringing together vice presidents for academic and student affairs, enrollment management or institutional research officers, equity officers and key faculty members.

A fall 1993 national meeting of all Retention Project presidents will allow them to develop strategies to assist other institutions in promoting student retention and graduation. Also project participants will be resources for others in their state and region who request help with retention efforts.

According to AASCU national headquarters, a preliminary assessment of student retention and graduation at member institutions shows that AASCU members already are significantly involved in efforts to promote and evaluate student retention and degree achievement.

A survey of state college and university presidents notes that nearly two-thirds of the respondents have set retention and graduation goals, while more than three-fourths routinely measure student retention.

Two-thirds cited increased retention rates and increased student use of academic support services as outcomes of retention intervention. These programs and others that will be developed by project participants will provide the foundation for retention project models.

In working to improve student success, AASCU will encourage and highlight the critical role played by campus presidents. Institutions that already have successful student retention programs will be used as models.

In addition to the 36 first-year participants in the three-year national retention project, 36 additional participants will be selected for each subsequent year.

Dr. Eaglin and MSU will be working with presidents from these schools in AASCU's Central Region:

Livingston University, Chicago State University, Eastern Illinois University, Ball State University, Nicholls State University, Western Michigan University, Mississippi University for Women, Northeast Missouri State University, Memphis State University, West Liberty State University and University of Wisconsin-Stout.
