MOREHEAD, Ky.—Morehead State University will observe Traffic Safety Awareness Week during the period of March 7-13 as a means of increasing awareness.

The Office of Public Safety set aside the week to increase campus awareness of such traffic safety issues as speeding, driving under the influence and use of seat belts.

Throughout the week at selected times and locations, public safety personnel will conduct various TSA programs to make drivers aware of their speed or any poor driving habits and to reward those drivers who choose to buckle up.

"These programs will make drivers more aware of traffic safety issues on campus," said Richard Green, manager of Public Safety. "Also at the end of the week, students will be leaving for spring break and may be driving long distances. We hope the awareness tips will be fresh in the minds of drivers and will help them to travel more safely during spring break," he added.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University's ROTC Program and the state Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources will sponsor a free Kentucky Hunter Education course in mid-March.

The 10-hour course will run Monday through Wednesday, March 15-17, from 6 to 9 p.m. daily on the third floor of Button. The class will include instruction in hunter ethics, wildlife identification, outdoor survival, first aid, firearms, bow hunting and ammunition. The last session will include experience on the firing range and an examination.

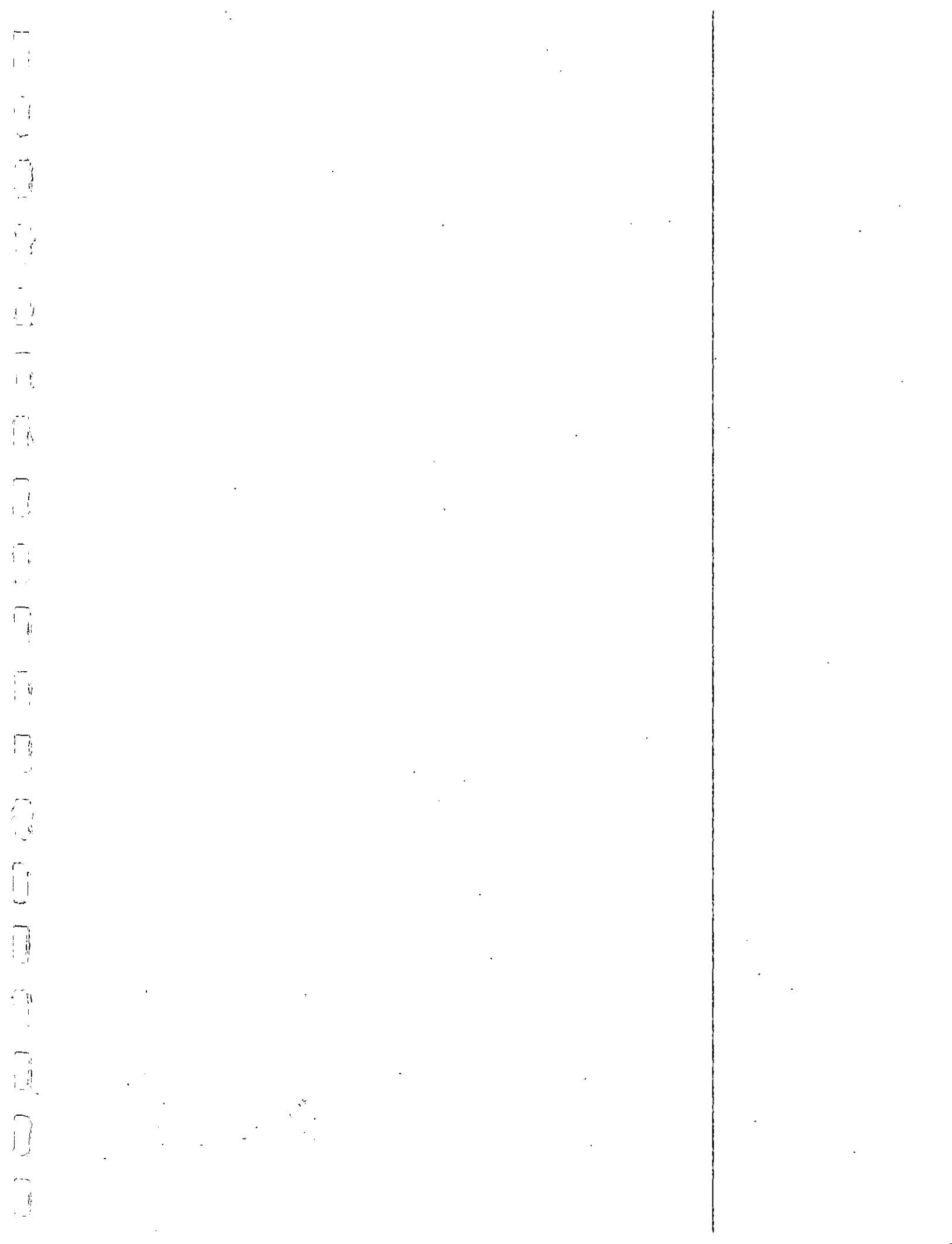
Upon successful completion of the course, participants will receive a graduate card which is valid in any state where certification is necessary. Attendance at all sessions is required.

This course meets the March 1, 1991, state requirement that all hunters born on or after Jan. 1, 1975, shall, while hunting, carry a valid hunter education course graduate card in addition to the appropriate state hunting license. A bow hunter, without a firearm, may carry a "National Bowhunter Education Program" card in lieu of the hunter education card.

Youth, under 10 years of age, and persons exempt from purchasing a hunting license are not required to possess the card while hunting. Persons under 10 must be accompanied by an adult of at least 18 years of age while hunting.

MOREHEAD, Ky.—Morehead State University's Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) Program currently is the only university-based one in the nation offering electronic filing, according to John Osborne, coordinator of MSU's program.

"Earlier we were certain that we were the only university in the state with this capability, but officials now tell me that we are the only one nationwide," said the MSU assistant professor of accounting.

The student volunteers staffing MSU's VITA program are using a software program which was the gift of Drake Systems, Inc., to prepare state and federal income taxes on the computer and then electronically file the federal form.

From 3 to 6 p.m. every Tuesday through April 13, the students may be found in 209 Combs preparing short form tax returns for eligible clients. There will not be a session on March 16 when the University is closed for spring break.

Using the Drake System Federal Income Tax software, students enter the data into the computer and either provide clients with a printout that they may mail or send it electronically to the IRS. According to Osborne, the IRS will deposit the federal refund directly into the client's bank account within 10 to 17 days.

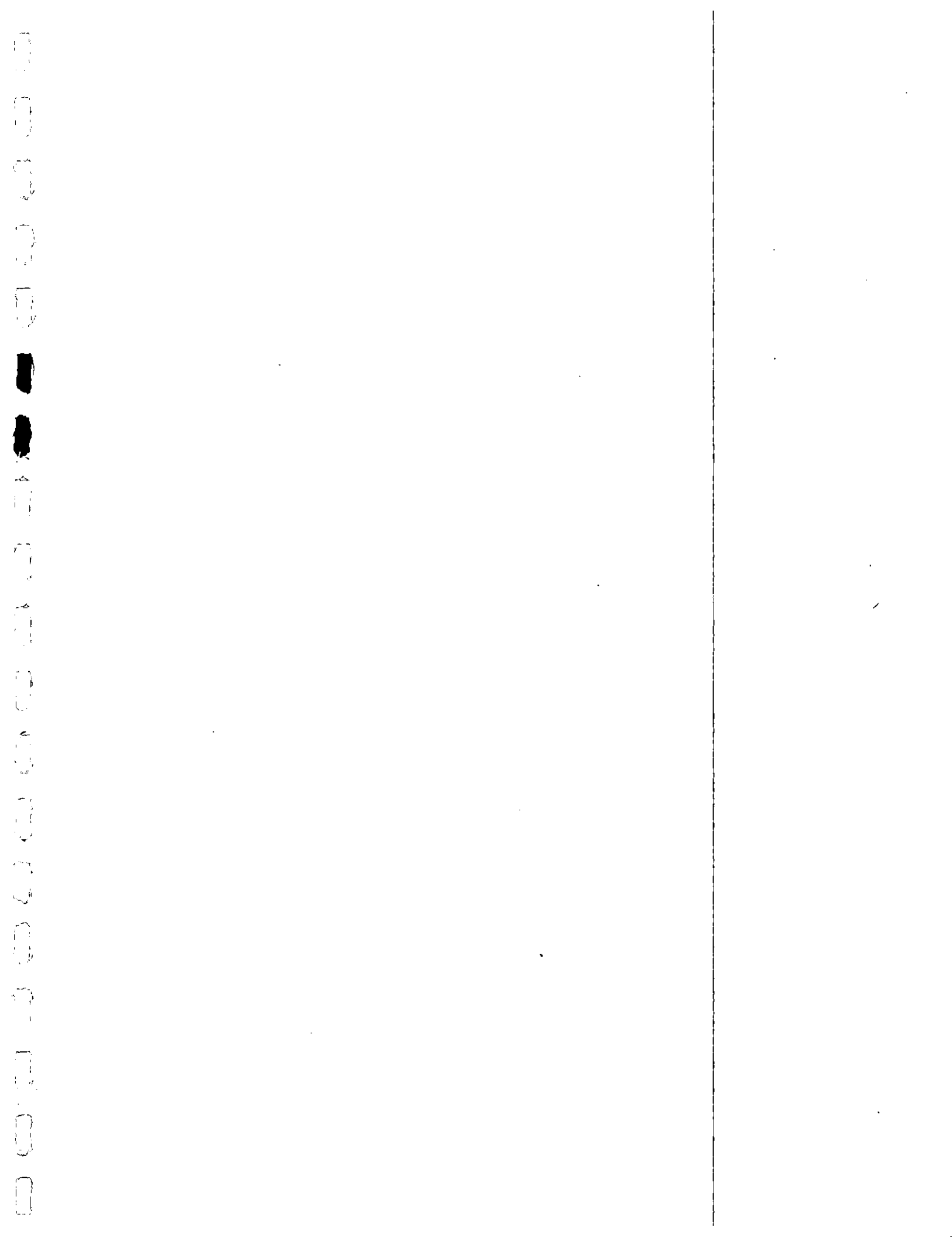
"At this time, Kentucky doesn't offer the electronic filing option for state taxes," Osborne said.

The student tax preparers either have had or are currently enrolled in Accounting 387 and are majoring in accounting or business.

The VITA program is free to students, those persons age 65 or older, those who are disabled or who have an annual income of less than \$18,000.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Planning is under way for Morehead State University's 1993 Founders Day which will be observed Friday, April 2.

Because of limited seating, registration is necessary and must be made by noon on Friday, March 12. There is no charge for attendance.

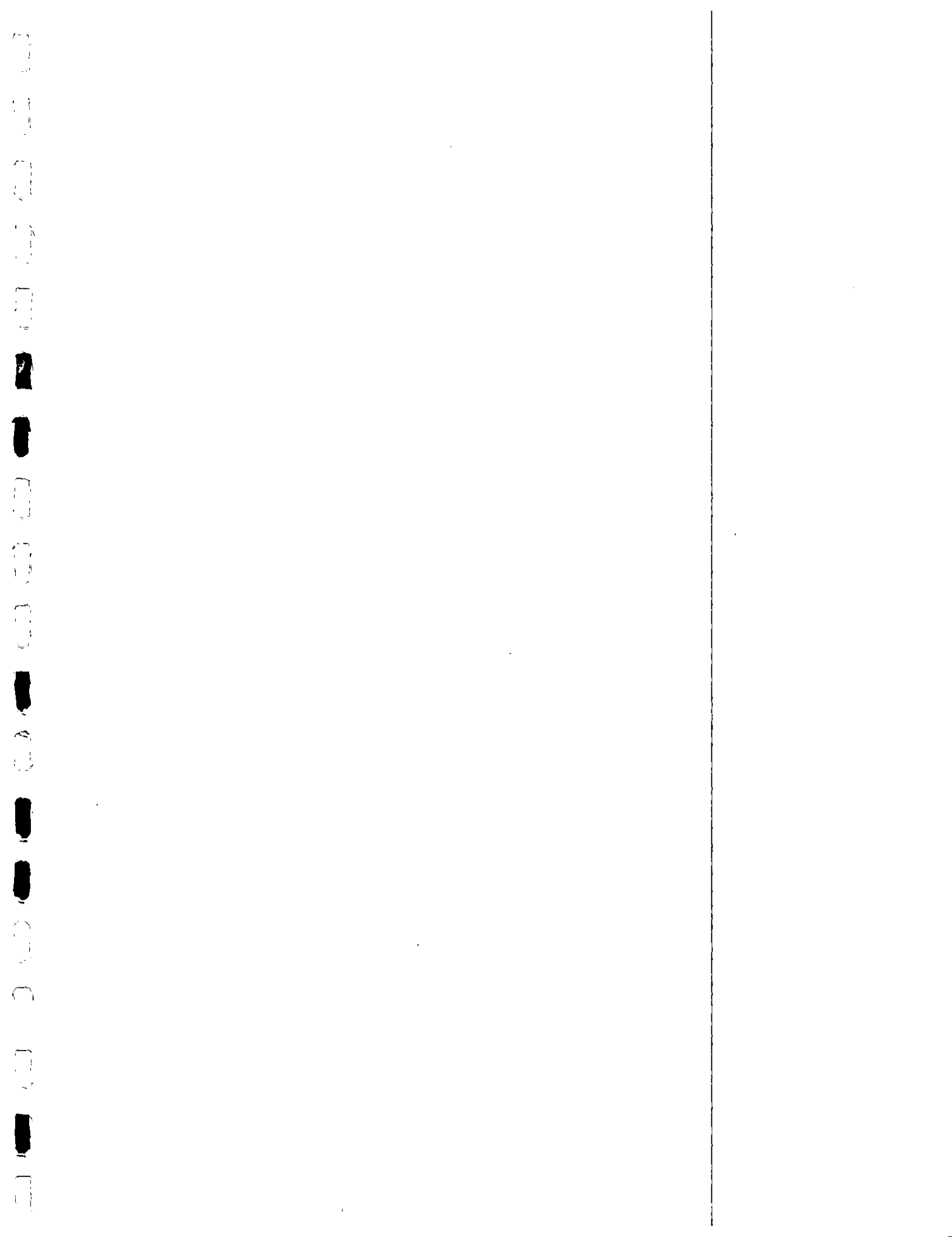

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Rosellen Brown, author of the best-selling novel "Before and After," will be on the campus of Morehead State University on Thursday, April 1, to read from her work at 8 p.m. in 111 Claypool-Young Art Building.

The program is free and open to the public, with a reception to follow in the MSU Alumni Center.

Brown's campus appearance is being coordinated by Dr. Michelle Boisseau, MSU associate professor of English.

"Before and After" is the story of a family of new residents of a small town in New Hampshire who learn that their 17-year-old son is the prime suspect in the brutal murder of a local girl.

"Rosellen Brown's plot can be counted on to grab a mother or father by the ventricles," said Time magazine reviewer John Skow. Newsweek called the book, "a gripping portrait of a family at the breaking point" and the New York Times described the novel as "an unabashed read-until-dawn page turner."

The novel also is under consideration for a movie with Meryl Streep. Brown also was interviewed last fall on public radio's "All Things Considered" and by Terry Gross on "Fresh Air."

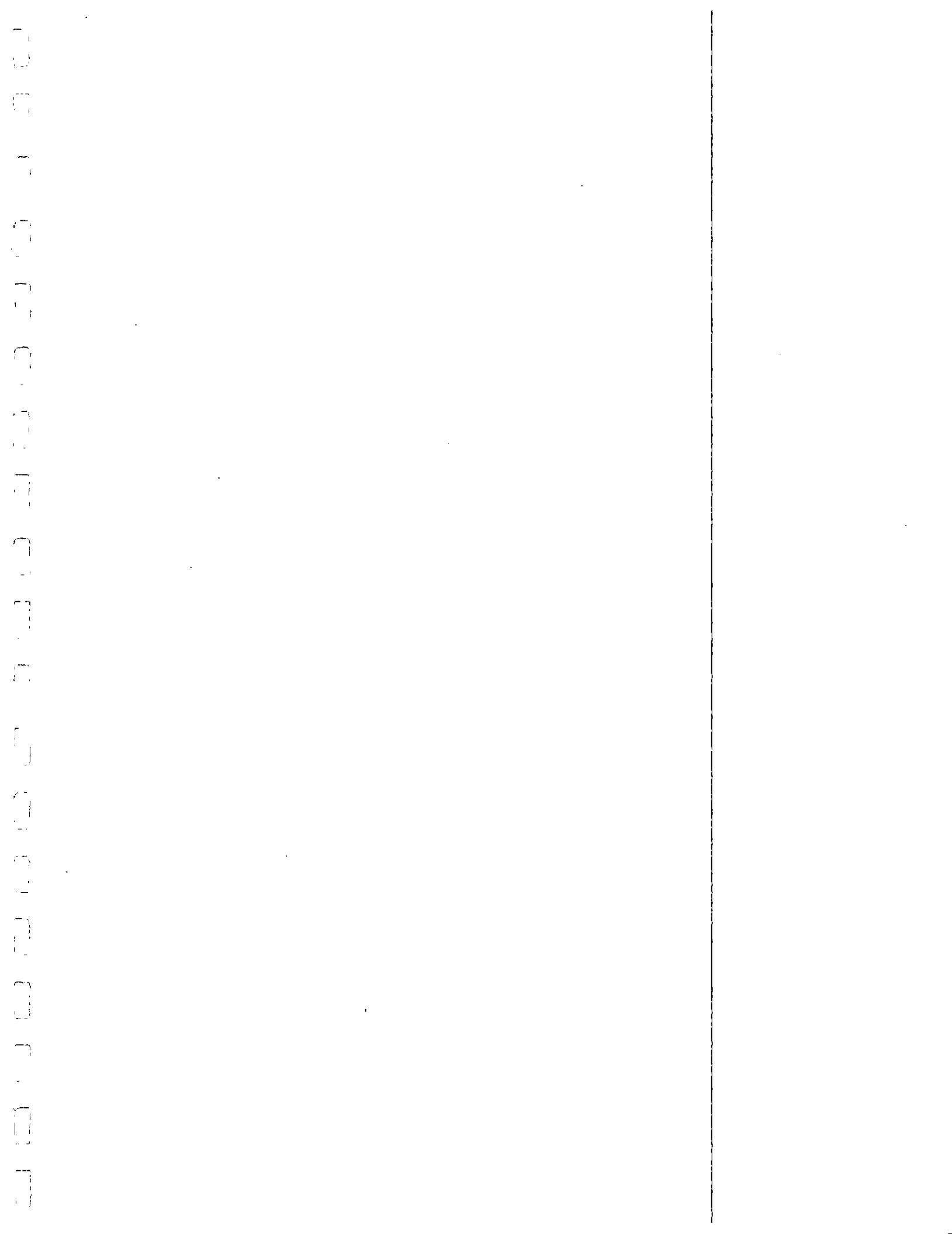

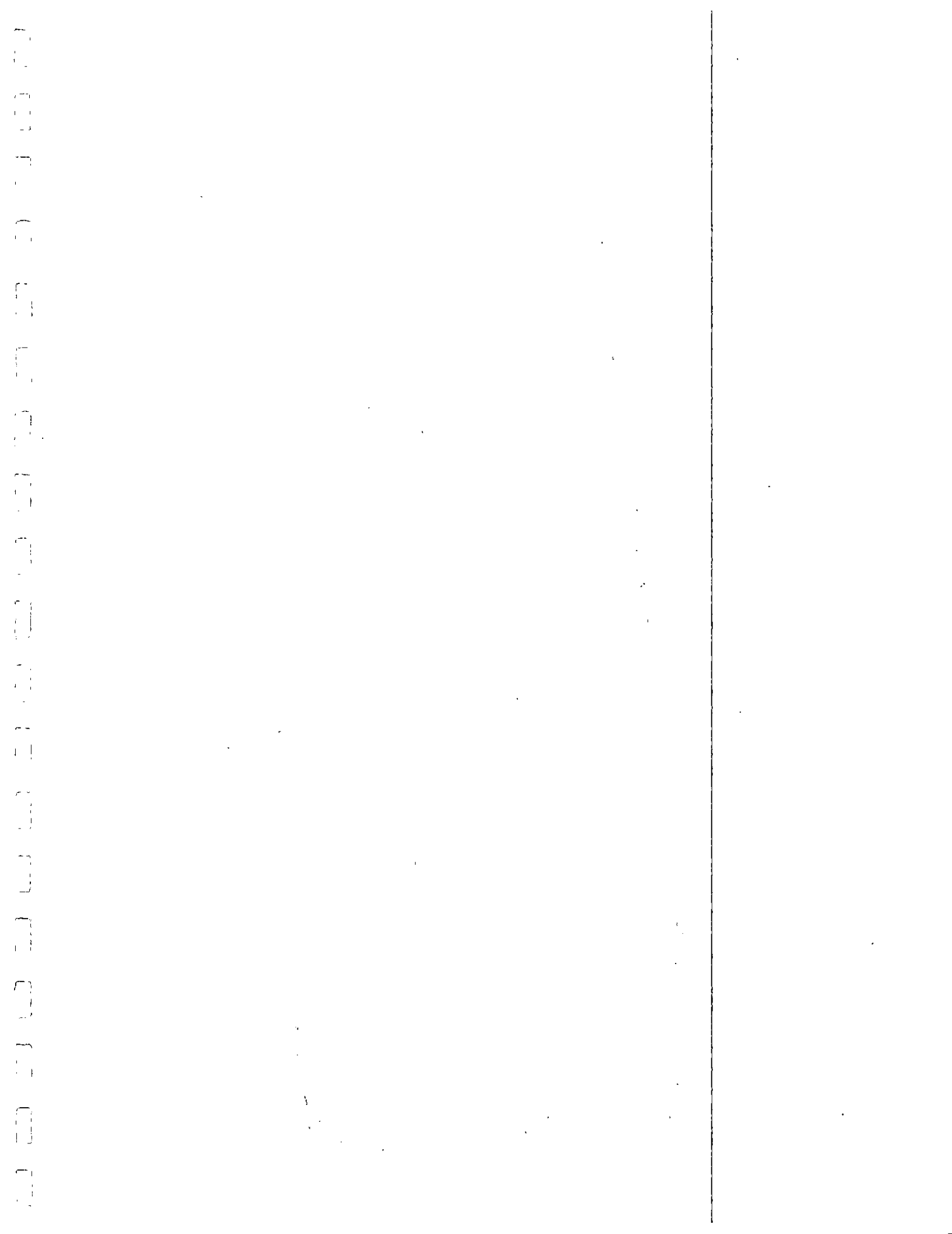
"Her bequest, which stemmed from those deep feelings, will provide assistance to future student athletes and the University is most grateful," Caudill said.

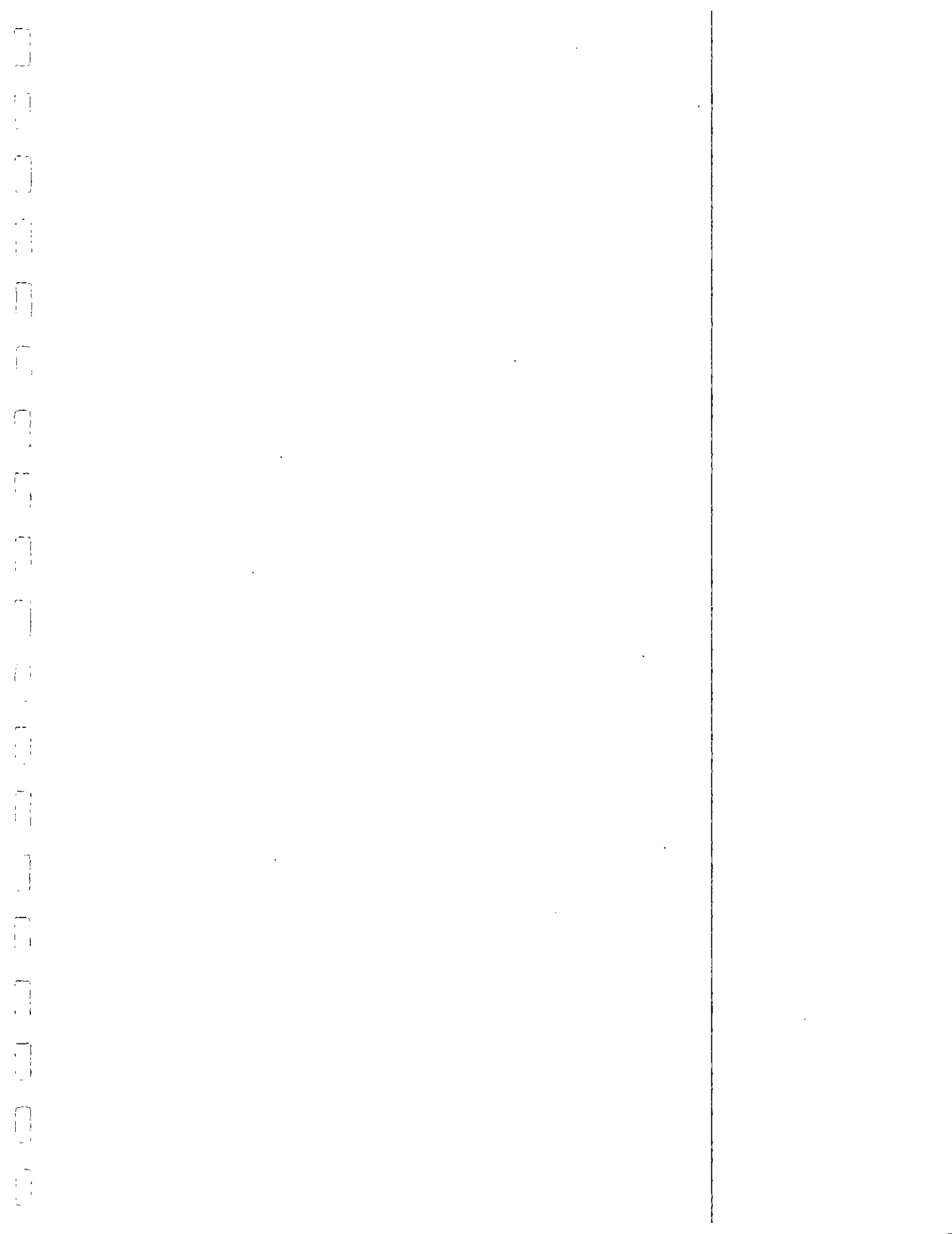

MOREHEAD, Ky.---A public broadcasting executive, a retired FBI agent and a pioneer in promoting equal athletic opportunities for women will be inducted into Morehead State University's Alumni Hall of Fame as part of the University's 1993 Founders Day celebration on April 2.

Virginia G. Fox, executive director of KET; Harry A. Walker, former head of one of the FBI's largest resident agencies, and Dr. Nan K. Ward, former teacher, coach and athletics administrator, will be recognized as distinguished graduates during the Alumni Awards Dinner at 7 p.m. in the Adron Doran University Center.

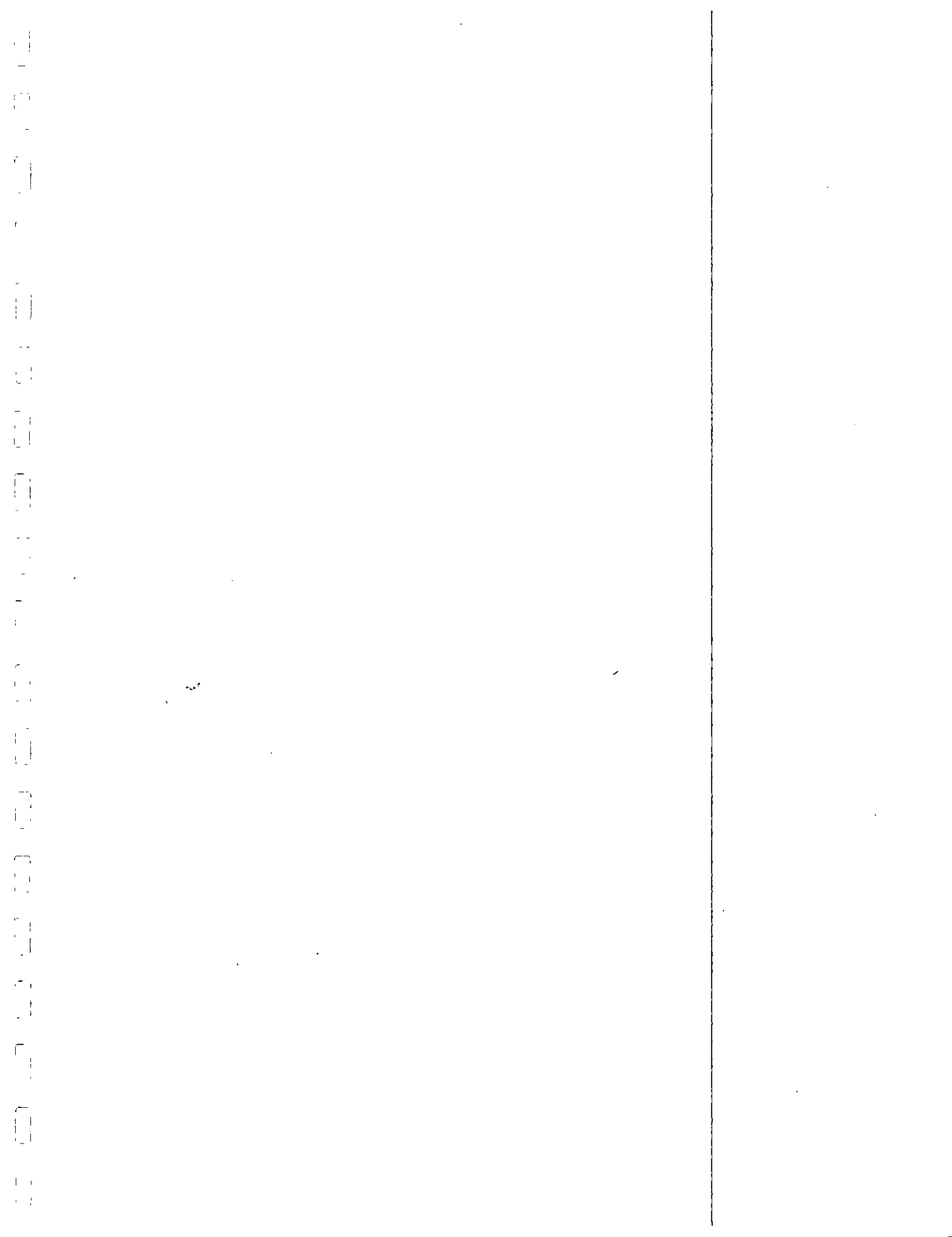
The dinner is the final event in a series of public activities marking the 106th year of higher education in Rowan County and MSU's 71st anniversary as a public institution. Other events include the Convocation and Awards Ceremony at 10:30 A.M. in Button Auditorium. Following the convocation will be a noon luncheon at which time major donors and other friends will be honored.

Fox, who earned her bachelor's degree from MSU in elementary education with distinction in 1961, began her career in public television with KET 25 years ago, after teaching for several years and earning a master's degree from the University of Kentucky. She moved up through KET's administrative ranks to deputy executive director in 1975, a post she held until 1980 when she was named president and chief executive officer of the Southern Educational Communications Association (SECA) in Columbia, S.C. The Campbellsville native returned to KET in 1989 as KET Foundation executive vice president and KET Endowment president and assumed her current role in 1991.

The recipient of numerous honors including the 21st Century Award from America's Public Television Stations for SECA Services in 1992, Fox has achieved several firsts during her career. While in South Carolina, she founded and served as director of the Satellite Educational Resources Consortium (SERC), the first public broadcaster/departement of education interstate consortium for distance learning.

The first and only female CEO of a national public broadcasting organization, she also was responsible for the creation of the first National ITV Satellite Schedule (NISS) which serves more than 23 million students annually. In 1991, Fox founded the Organization of State Broadcasting Executives.

As a coach, Dr. Ward never had a losing season. In her early years as an official, she was one of only two women certified in basketball in Region 1, the only woman certified in basketball in Region 16 and was chosen to officiate at the first high school girls' basketball state tournament. She officiated women's basketball at the university level, volleyball at both the high school and university level, and track and field for high school meets as well as for OVC championships.

A life member and past president of KHPERD and life member of the Kentucky Girls' Sports Association, Dr. Ward is president of Psi Chapter, Delta Kappa Gamma international society for women educators and teaches first aid and CPR for the Montgomery County Community School.

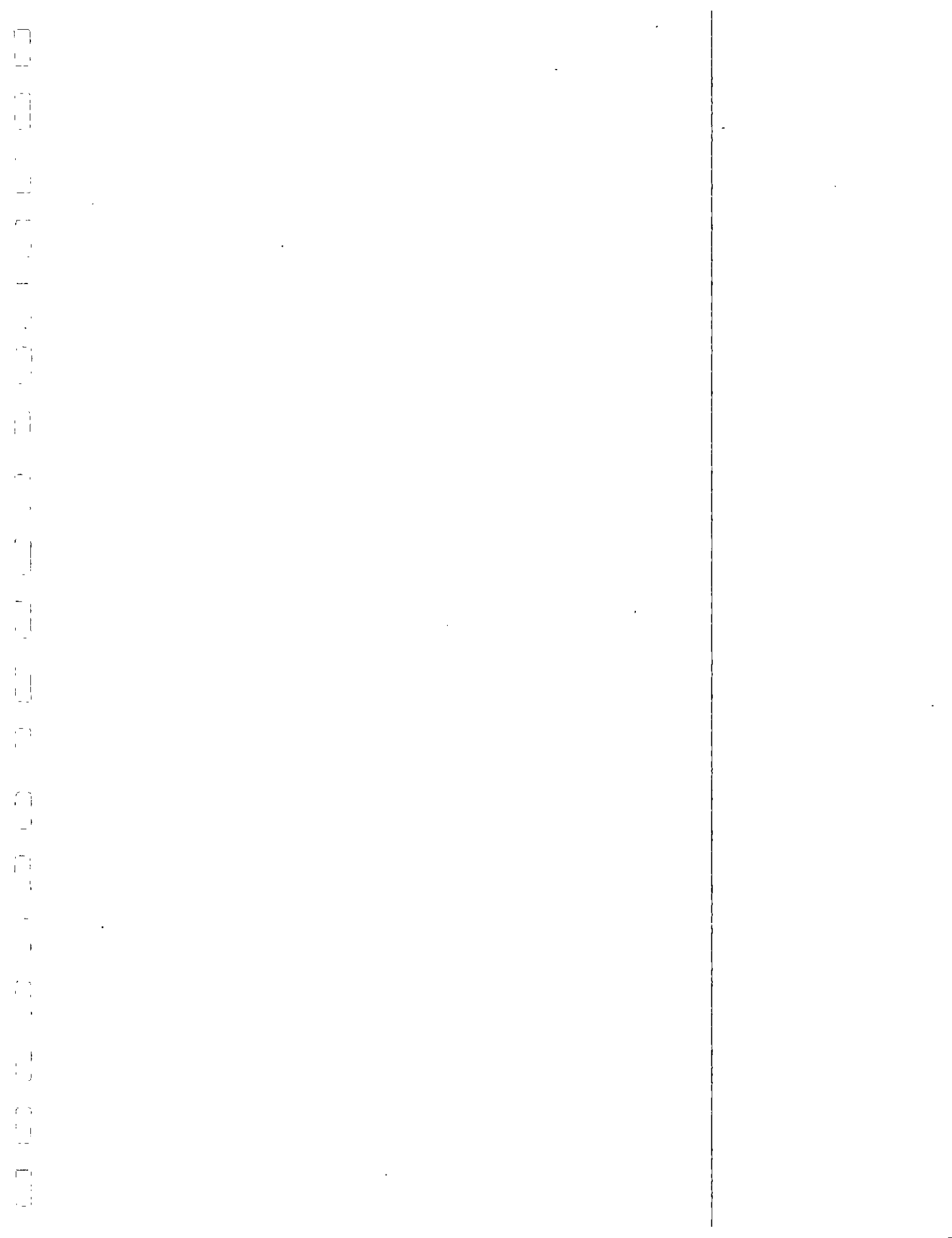

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A consultant to the National Endowment for the Arts and the National Science Foundation, Fox serves on numerous professional and civic boards of directors, including Leadership Kentucky and PBS.

Walker, a native of Newport, became an FBI special agent in 1946, having completed his bachelor's degree earlier that year. After training at the FBI Academy, he was assigned to El Paso, Texas, with subsequent postings at bureaus in New Mexico, Washington, Wisconsin, and Illinois.

In 1953, Walker was sent to Des Plaines, Ill., to open an office that was to be responsible for the investigations of approximately 200 federal violations under the jurisdiction of the FBI in the north, northwestern and western suburbs of Chicago as well as O'Hare International.

Walker served as senior agent in charge of the Des Plaines office for more than 24 years. At the time of his retirement, the office, composed of 16 agents and five secretaries, was one of the FBI's largest resident agencies in the U.S.

The Newport High School graduate originally came to MSU in 1937 to play football and basketball on a scholarship from Coach Ellis Johnson. While here, he joined the Campus Club. Interrupting his education, he enlisted in the U.S. Army Air Corps in 1941 and was commissioned as a second lieutenant. He served with the 8th Air Force in England which, after VE Day, was assigned occupational duties in Germany. At age 25 he was promoted to lieutenant colonel. Following his discharge, he returned to MSU to complete his degree and served as president of the Campus Club.

Walker, who lives in Georgia, was inducted into the Northern Kentucky Athletic Directors Hall of Fame in 1986 for his achievements in high school sports.

Dr. Ward, who retired in 1988 after 33 years of teaching and coaching at the secondary school and university level, was instrumental in the establishment of the Northern Kentucky Girls' Athletic Association and worked closely with the Kentucky High School Athletic Association (KHSAA) to promote girls' and women's sports in the state.

Chairman of KHPERD's Division for Girls' and Women's Sports when girls' track was sanctioned by KHSAA, Dr. Ward also testified at a U.S. Senate hearing on behalf of girls' basketball.

A two-time MSU graduate with an A.B. degree in 1957 and a master's degree in 1960, she taught and coached at Breckinridge School from 1960 to 1965. After completing a doctorate at UK in 1967, she served as MSU's director of women's physical education until 1970 when she became head volleyball coach and assistant women's basketball coach at Murray State University.

Presenting the award will be Lois A. Baker, vice chair of the Board of Regents.

Accepting the award for the former senator will be his wife, Jean May, with remarks also to be made by state Senate President John A. (Eck) Rose.

A lifelong resident of Morgan County, May served 19 years in the Kentucky General Assembly, including 11 years in the house and eight years in the senate. During those years, he represented Rowan and neighboring counties.

"Sen. May was always a gentle but persuasive voice in the General Assembly on Morehead State's behalf and, in many instances, was personally responsible for legislative approval and funding for various MSU projects," said Keith Kappes, MSU vice president for University Advancement. "He also championed the University's cause in its dealings with other state agencies," added Kappes, who serves as MSU's legislative and government liaison.

May's leadership as chairman of the Senate Transportation Committee was a key factor in the modernization of KY 519 and other area highways which dramatically improved access to the University from the Licking and Kentucky river valleys.

In addition, he was instrumental in securing initial funding for expansion of MSU's off-campus classes and played a major role in developing the University's educational and training missions at the Eastern Kentucky Correctional Complex.

May, who will mark his 64th birthday on April 3, and his wife continue to make their home at Woodsbend near West Liberty. Two of their children, John and Karen, are graduates of MSU.

"MSU is proud to recognize the efforts of former Sen. May by adding his name to the list of distinguished recipients of this award," said MSU President Ronald G. Eaglin.

"Respected throughout the state, Woody May has been a true friend of this University and of the region," Dr. Eaglin added.

The convocation speaker will be Gen. Billy G. Wellman, state secretary of justice. MSU's highest ranking alumnus in government services, Wellman also serves as commissioner of the Kentucky State Police.

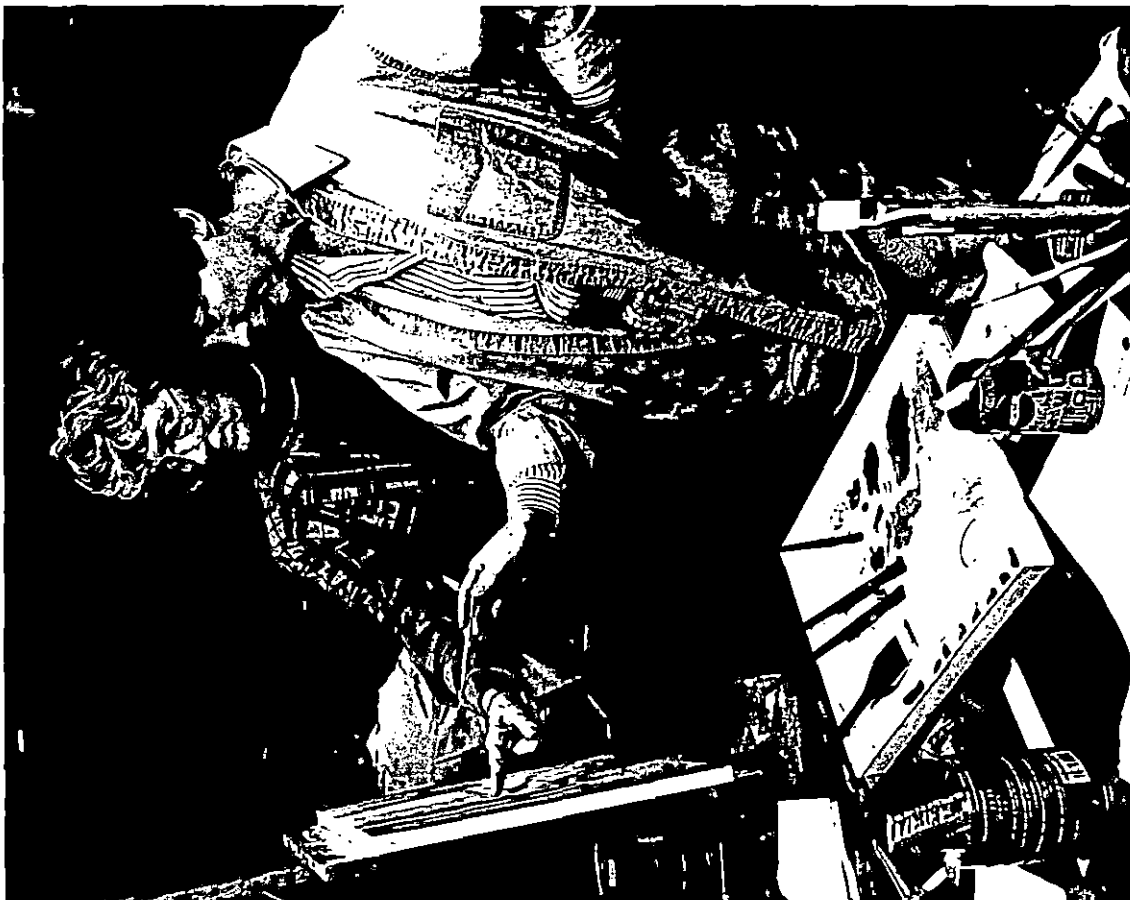

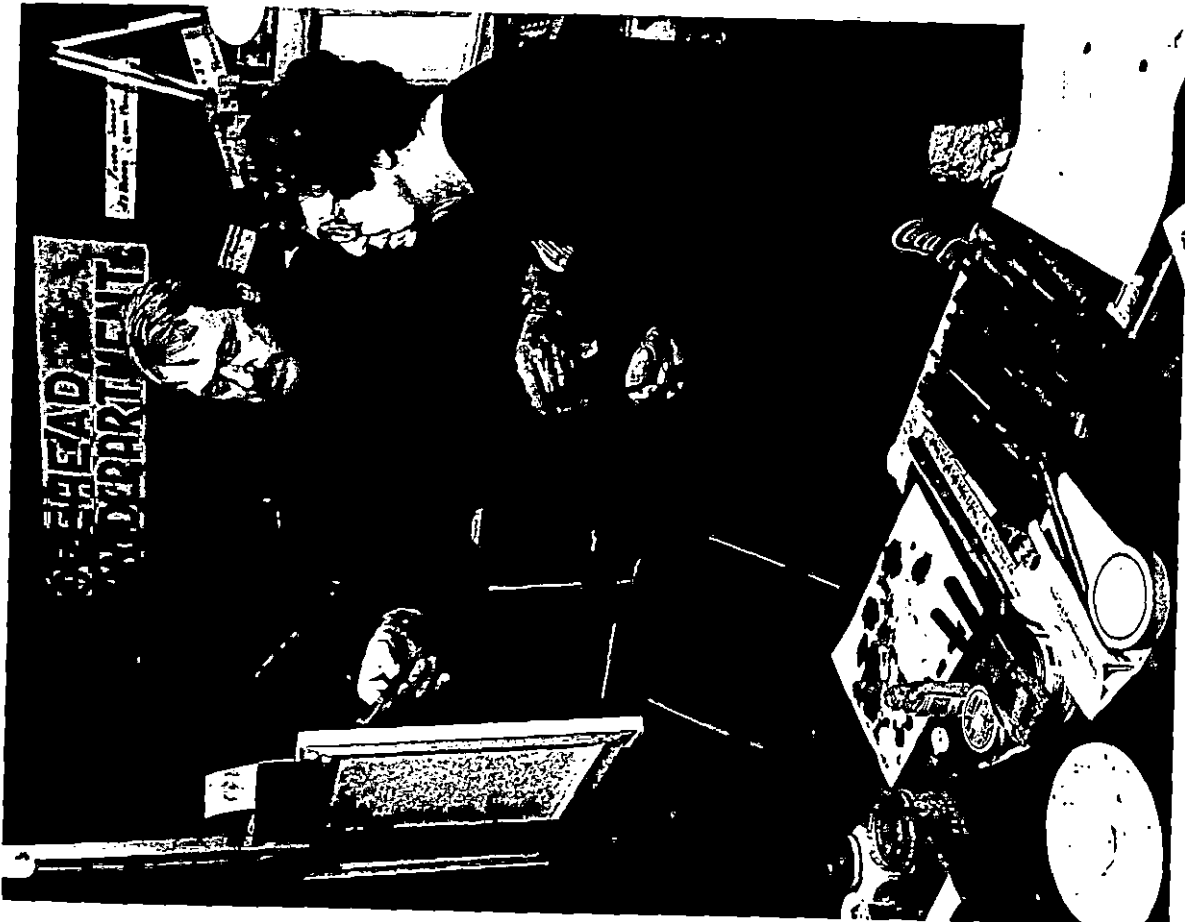

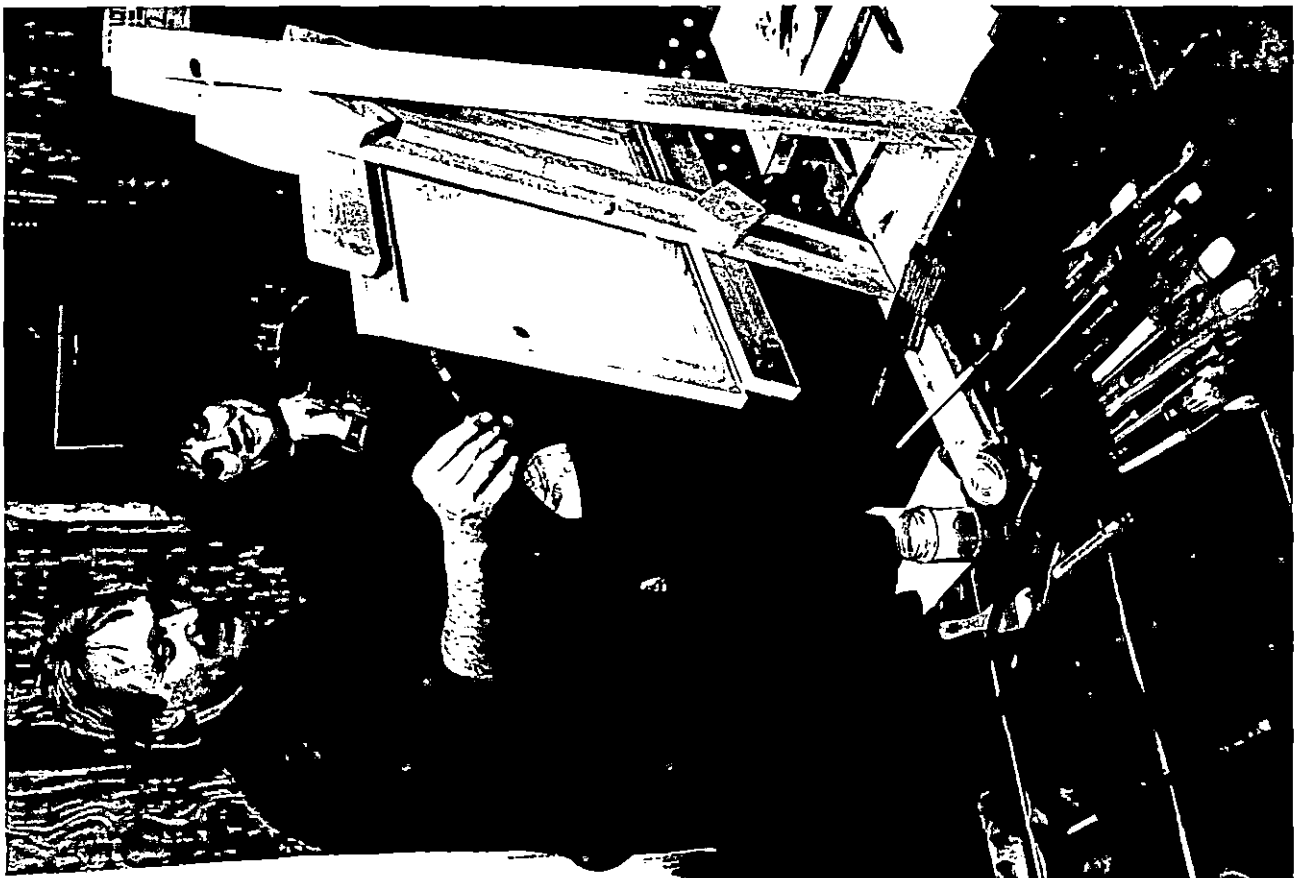
