MOREHEAD, Ky.---Lisa Dawn Hampton, a spring 1993 graduate of Lewis County High School, is the recipient of Morehead State University's seventh annual Constitutional Essay and Scholarship Competition.

Hampton, daughter of Arlene and Charles Hampton of Vanceburg, was the winner in the essay competition "Is Hate Speech Entitled to Protection by the First Amendment to the United States Constitution?"

As the scholarship winner, Hampton will receive a \$1,500 award for study at MSU as a full-time student for the 1993-94 academic year. The award, renewable for three academic years, has a total value of \$6,000.

At LCHS, Hampton was a member of Champions Against Drugs, Pulsar science club, Pride pep club, and the yearbook staff. For the last two years, she has worked part-time at Chiggers Restaurant in Vanceburg.

At the present time, Hampton has not determined the program of study she will pursue at MSU. Her future goals include a job in a field where she can help others.

Formal presentation of the award was made during her high school's honors ceremony. Also recognized was Karen Esham, LCHS teacher, who sponsored Hampton in the competition.

MSU's Constitutional Essay and Scholarship Competition is sponsored by the Department of Geography, Government and History, Office of Financial Aid and College of Humanities.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University has received \$211,495 in grant monies from the Kentucky Department of Education to continue vocational education programming.

"MSU has been fortunate to receive these monies over the years and we have continually implemented successful programs," said Dr. John C. Philley, executive vice president for academic affairs and dean of faculty. "These supplemental dollars will allow the departments to augment their programs and to purchase needed items to enhance their areas."

Areas receiving the grants were:

College of Science and Technology, Office of the Dean, \$61,087;

Department of Industrial Education and Technology, \$44,850;

Department of Human Sciences (formerly Home Economics), \$17,000;

Department of Nursing and Allied Health Sciences, \$36,083;

Department of Agricultural Sciences (formerly Agriculture and Natural Resources),  
\$36,000;

Department of Information Sciences, \$16,475.

The grant period runs July 1, 1993, through June 30, 1994.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University will host two SOAR (Summer Orientation, Advising and Registration) Programs in July to acquaint new students and their parents with the its campus and academic offerings.

The programs will be held on consecutive Fridays and Saturdays, July 9-10 and 16-17.

During the two-day activity, potential students may receive academic advising and complete the registration process, according to Lamona Edwards, admissions counselor.

"This is an informal activity which allows time for students to learn about campus life and programs of study," Edwards noted. "However, it is important that students register in advance."

The schedule for Friday's events includes registration for campus lodging at Mignon Tower, beginning at 4 p.m. An ice cream social, followed by a skit on "Surviving College Life," will conclude the day's agenda.

The program for Saturday begins with check-in at Button, beginning at 8 a.m. A welcome by MSU representatives and information sessions for both parents and students will follow.

After the lunch break, students will complete the registration process for the fall semester. Tours of the campus will conclude the day's activities.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Registration for Morehead State University's second summer term will be conducted from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Monday, July 12, in the Crager Room, Adron Doran University Center.

Classes will begin at 8 a.m. on Tuesday, July 13, and continue through Friday, Aug. 6.

Students planning to register will need to meet with their advisers to prepare a trial schedule before entering the registration area. Academic program advisers will be available in ADUC during registration.

Schedule adjustments for students who pre-registered for Summer II will be processed during this period as well.

Admission into the registration area will be by an alphabetical system based on last names. All fees should be paid at time of registration.

Also students taking classes at the extended campus centers in Ashland, West Liberty and Prestonsburg may register at those sites from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. the same day as main campus students.

Summer session tuition is \$63 per credit hour for undergraduates and \$92 for graduate students who are Kentucky residents. The tuition rate for out-of-state students is \$175 per undergraduate credit hour and \$257 per graduate credit hour.

Out-of-state students enrolled at off-campus sites pay in-state tuition.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Memories from 60 years ago flooded Breckinridge Auditorium at Morehead State University as the contents of a time capsule placed in the cornerstone of Breckinridge School in 1930 were revealed.

MSU Vice President for University Advancement Keith Kappes, who emceed the event, called the capsule opening "a fitting beginning" to the first school-wide reunion of the school which served as MSU's laboratory school for teacher training from 1924 to 1982. Kappes also taught at the former lab school.

As thunder rolled among the mountains of Eastern Kentucky, the ceremony moved from outside the building to the auditorium after the sealed copper box was removed from the cornerstone.

On hand to assist with the ceremony was James W. Wells, grandson of Dr. Warren C. Lappin who was the lab school's first director, and Ernestine Powers Drummond, daughter of J. Harlan Powers who conducted the Masonic ceremony for the original cornerstone laying on April 21, 1930.

Emerging in "remarkably good condition" after six decades of confinement were:

- \*The Kentucky Public School Directory for 1929-30.

- \*List of officers and members of Morehead Masonic Lodge 645 F&AM.

- \*Letter signed by the Masonic Grand Marshal of Kentucky authorizing Powers to conduct the Masonic ritual.

- \*Roster of the training school staff and pupils.

- \*Essay, "An Appreciation," written by Leora Hogge, a seventh grader.

- \*April 17, 1930, edition of "The Rowan County News," whose front page stories included the death of W. Legrande Jayne, an administrator at Morehead State Teachers College, as it was known then. Another article told of the upcoming cornerstone ceremony which was the first in Morehead State's history.

- \*April 15, 1930, issue of "The Trail Blazer," the campus student newspaper.

Approximately 1,100 people have made reservations for the reunion activities which continues through Sunday. That figure includes 675 alumni and 28 former faculty members who come from 36 states as well as from Australia and Saudi Arabia. Also on hand are several members of the class of 1932, the first graduating class.

Saturday's events include brunch, registration, souvenir sales, tours of Breckinridge Hall (now an MSU classroom/office building housing mainly the Department of Communications) and the campus, an ice cream social on the lawn of the president's home, banquet, special program and dance. Individual class get-togethers will take place on Sunday.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Forty-five Morehead State University students are recipients of scholarship awards through the Kentucky Higher Education Assistance Authority's Teacher Scholarship Program.

KHEAA's Teacher Scholarship Program awards are designed to attract and encourage academically talented students to become certified as teachers in Kentucky as well as to assist teachers already certified in becoming certified in an area where a shortage of teachers exists.

The total number of awards to MSU students includes 17 renewal and 28 new scholarship awards. Of the 368 awards made statewide, MSU students received 14 percent of the new scholarships and 10 percent of renewals.

Several of the MSU recipients are students at MSU's Big Sandy or Ashland Area Extended Campus centers.

First-time recipients include:

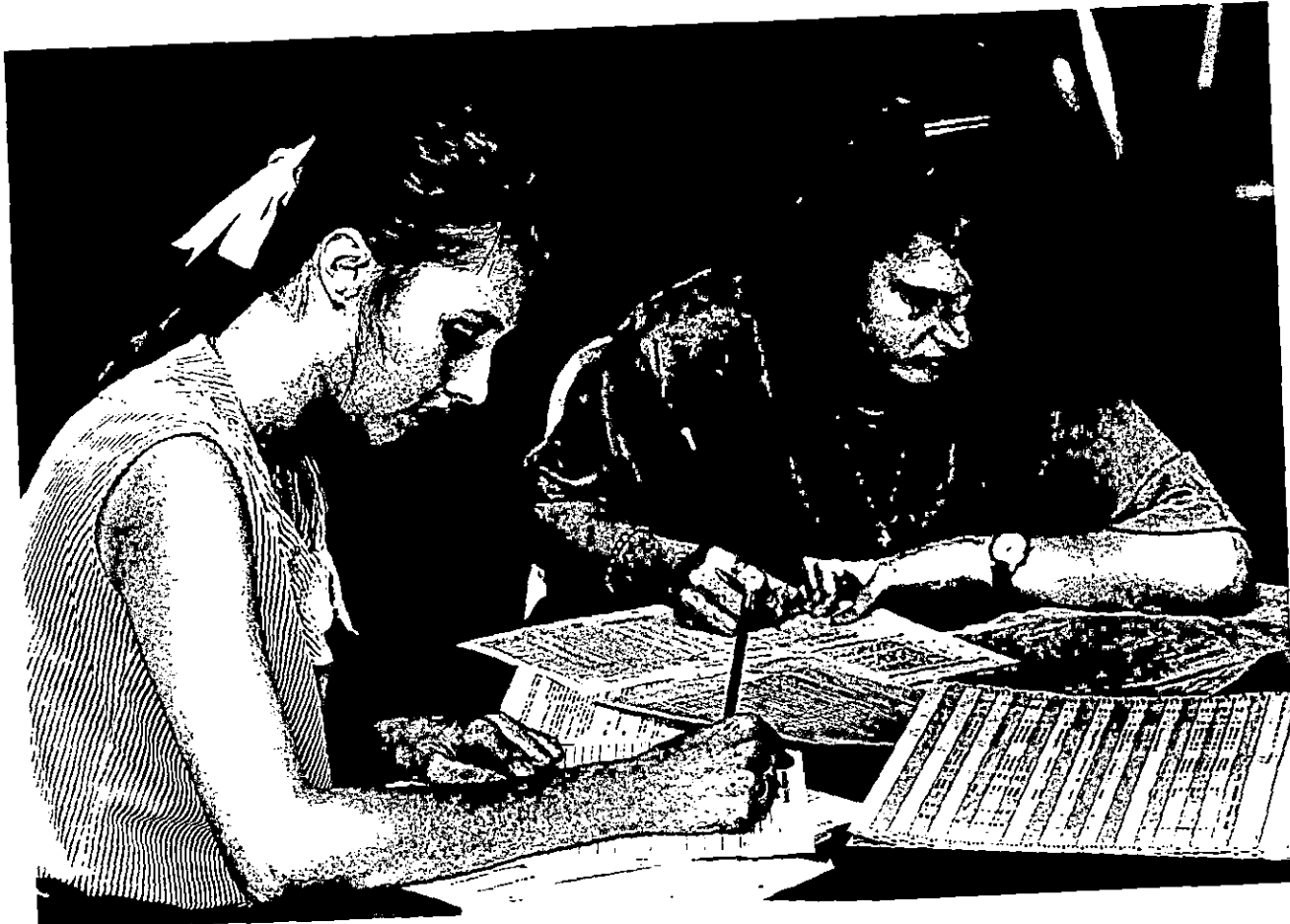

MOREHEAD, Ky.—Dr. Benjamin K. Malphrus, a Morehead State University assistant professor of science, has been selected as one of only 30 teachers nationwide to become an astronomy education resource agent by the Harvard-Smithsonian Center for Astrophysics (CfA).

Recognized as one of the pre-eminent astronomy research institutions in the world, the CfA recently launched an astronomy education program in which Dr. Malphrus will participate.

Known as Project SPICA (Support Program for Instructional Competency in Astronomy), the program is designed to develop a national teacher network devoted to improving the quality of science instruction in the United States.

Dr. Malphrus, who joined MSU's faculty in 1990, was selected for the program based on his "outstanding record as a teacher and overall professional activities related to astronomy education," according to Dr. Linda French, manager of the project which is funded by the National Science Foundation.

Dr. Malphrus and his counterparts will spend three weeks (July 26-Aug. 13) at Harvard University in an intensive workshop conducted by the CfA. The sessions are designed to create a network of master teachers who will conduct teacher workshops in their regions to introduce more hands-on science activities for students in grades 7-12.

"Harvard's goal is to identify the very best teachers in the U.S. and give them support and encouragement to attack some of the serious problems of science education," Dr. French said.

Dr. Malphrus earned his doctorate in physics and astronomy from West Virginia University and his master's and bachelor's degrees from the University of South Carolina, where he was a South Carolina scholar.

Active in the National Science Teachers Association and The Planetary Society, he is the author of "The National Radio Astronomy Observatory 40-Foot Telescope: Operator's Manual."

Dr. Malphrus and three of his MSU colleagues last fall received a NSF grant to construct the state's first and only radio telescope.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Dwindling enrollment combined with the bleak current budget picture has resulted in the closing of Morehead State University's Child Development Laboratory, effective this fall.

For more than two decades, CDL offered a pre-school program for Rowan County children between the ages of 3 and 5 years, while providing an observation site for several of the University's academic programs.

"There was a time when CDL had a waiting list of prospective students, but now there are other private programs in the community which are less costly for parents and run 12 months rather than nine months a year," said Dr. John C. Philley, MSU's executive vice president for academic affairs.

With 10 children enrolled last year, CDL ran at about 50 percent or less of its capacity. Hoping to boost enrollment this fall, CDL was offering the option of full-day sessions at \$875 a semester or half-day sessions at \$425 a semester.

Letters were sent to parents of pre-schoolers in the spring with a June 30 registration deadline. That effort, according to Dr. Marilyn Sampley, chair of MSU's Department of Human Sciences, resulted in four full-day and eight half-day enrollments.

Those parents who enrolled children are being notified and will receive their deposit back, Dr. Sampley said.

"At a time when the University is under considerable fiscal pressure, it has become necessary for us to re-evaluate auxiliary operations, such as CDL, as to their cost-effectiveness," Dr. Philley said. "These are not easy decisions to make," he added.

CDL's 1993-94 budget was about \$37,000 which includes the salaries and fringe benefits of two full-time early childhood specialists.

"We've already told those individuals that the University will assist them in finding other employment at MSU consistent with their qualifications, if and when such opportunities become available during the next 12 months," the vice president said.

"We expect the impact on MSU's instructional program to be negligible, as we will be able to utilize the University's three Head Start programs and/or private pre-school programs in the community as observation sites," Dr. Philley noted.

Dr. Kleber, a professor of history and member of MSU's faculty since 1968, directed the University's Academic Honors Program for 15 years. MSU's Distinguished Teacher in 1982 and Distinguished Researcher in 1993, the Louisville native served as editor-in-chief of the "Kentucky Encyclopedia," which has sold more than 35,000 copies. The publication resulted in numerous honors for Dr. Kleber, including the 1993 Governor's Outstanding Kentuckian Award.

Dr. Kleber, a summa cum laude graduate of Bellarmine College, earned his master's and doctoral degrees from the University of Kentucky with additional graduate study at the University of California-Irvine.

Dr. DeMoss, professor of biology and member of the faculty since 1968, had been acting dean of MSU's former College of Arts and Sciences since 1990. Chair of the Department of Biological and Environmental Sciences from 1986 to 1990, Dr. DeMoss also will serve in this capacity again.

An entomologist, Dr. DeMoss is an MSU alumnus and earned his doctorate from the University of Tennessee. Active in the Kentucky Academy of Science, he has authored or co-authored several papers for scientific journals and is a benthic biology consultant.

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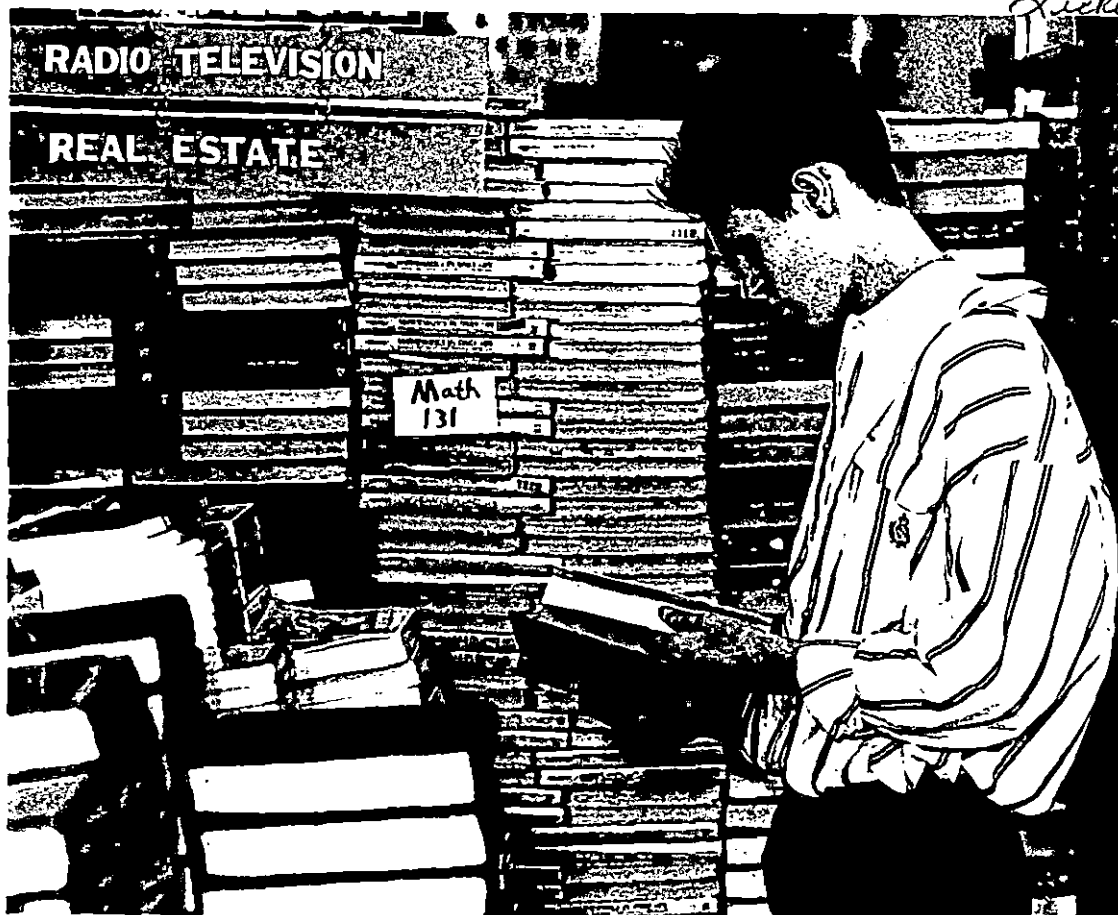

PRESTONSBURG, Ky.---The 1993-94 academic year for students at Morehead State University's Big Sandy Extended Campus Center begins with registration on Thursday, Aug. 19, from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. with classes beginning the following Monday, Aug. 23.

For those planning to enroll, there is a wide variety of offerings from which to choose as nearly 70 courses are on the schedule. Students may pick from classes in from the fields of business, education, science, English, history, geography, government and art to special courses designed for registered nurses pursuing a B.S.N. degree.

While the schedule includes a number of morning, afternoon and evening courses, there is also a new special weekend graduate course for teachers/administrators designed to provide insight into using computers for instructional and administrative purposes.

In addition, the Big Sandy ECC is one of two off-campus sites for a special graduate management class offered through distance learning by interactive computer and voice communication integrated with videotape. The instructor, Dr. Rodger D. Carlson, MSU professor of marketing, will rotate his teaching site from the main campus to the Big Sandy and the Ashland Area centers.

The fall semester also brings another resident faculty member to the center to teach in the elementary education program. Joining Dr. David Peterson, assistant professor of education, will be Dr. G. Michael Miller, also an assistant professor of education. Dr. Miller, who earned an Ed.D. degree in reading education from the University of Georgia, previously taught at the University of Rio Grande in Rio Grande, Ohio.

"Adding Dr. Miller, who becomes our second resident faculty member, is going to allow us to greatly enhance the elementary education program," said Dr. Margaret Lewis, director of the Big Sandy ECC.

"The growth at the Big Sandy ECC has been tremendous and as a result we've almost doubled our course offerings from last fall," Dr. Lewis added.

Students enrolling for the first time at the center are encouraged to ask about a special financial aid program, designed to assist students in taking that first step back into the classroom.

Known as "Regional Campus Awards," the program offers a one-time \$300 award which will cover tuition for a three-hour course at the undergraduate level, plus books and some miscellaneous expenses.

Students planning to transfer into the center from other schools will find the process streamlined with the addition of a computer program which not only determines what courses are transferable to MSU, but also will show what additional work is needed to complete a degree.

Working with the students in addition to Dr. Lewis and faculty members, is Debra Salyer, academic/student services coordinator. Salyer splits her time between the Big Sandy and the Ashland Area centers.

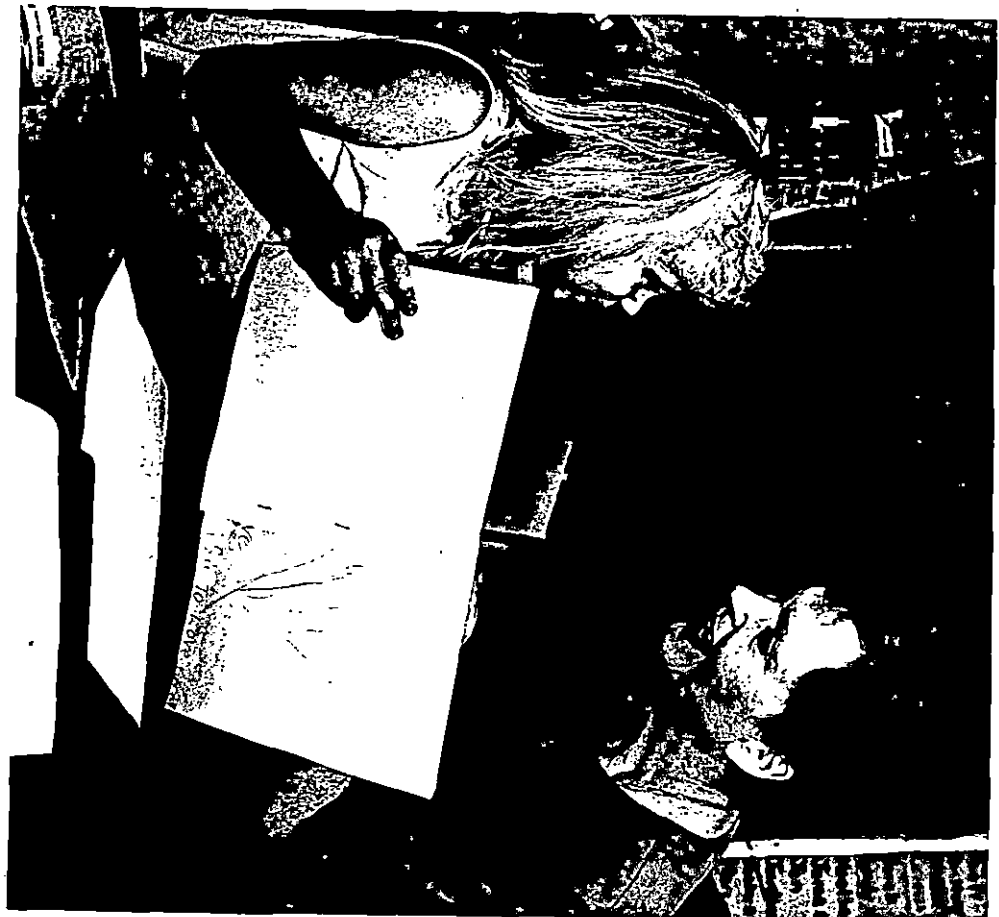

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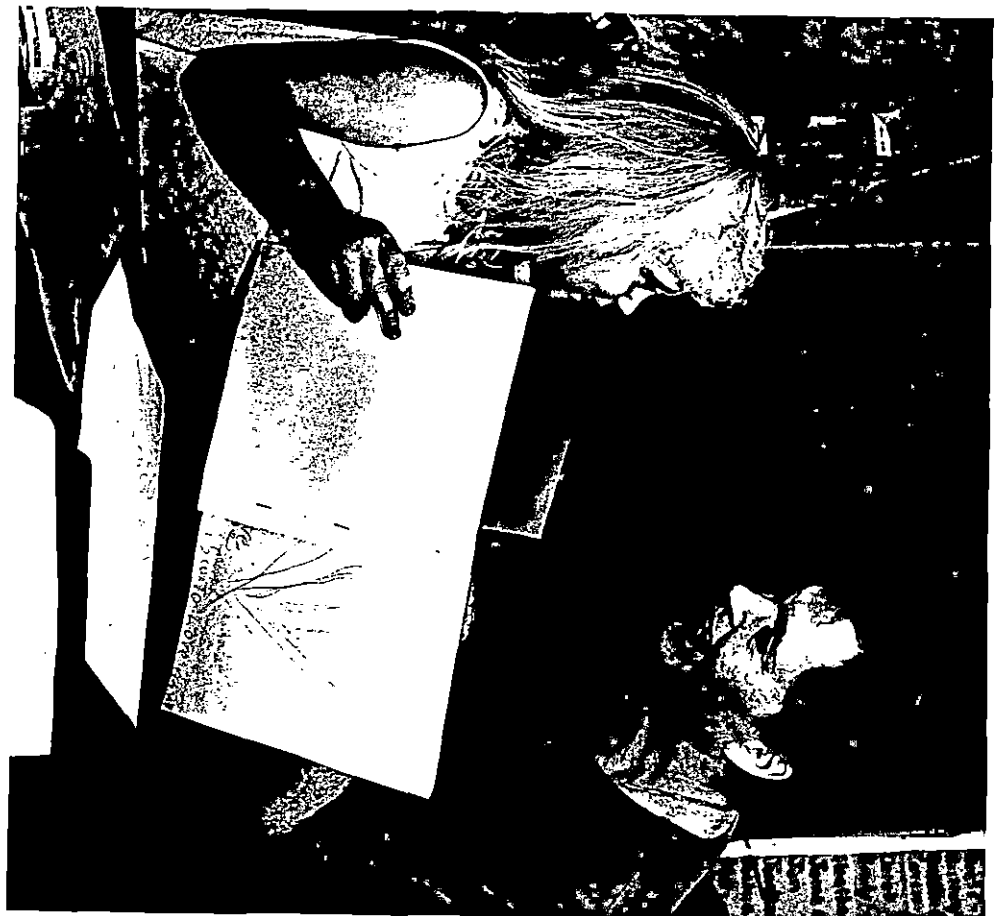
