MOREHEAD, Ky.—Morehead State University's ROTC Program and the state Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources will sponsor a free Kentucky Hunter Education course Monday through Wednesday, Aug. 9-11.

The 10-hour course will run from 6 to 9 p.m. each evening in 302 Button Building. Classroom instruction in hunter ethics, wildlife identification, outdoor survival, first aid, firearms, bow hunting, and ammunition will be offered. The last session will include actual range firing and an examination.

Upon successful completion of the course, participants will receive a graduate card which is valid in any state where certification is necessary. Attendance at all sessions is required.

This course meets the March 1, 1991, state requirement that all hunters born on or after Jan. 1, 1975, shall, while hunting carry a valid hunter education course graduate card in addition to the appropriate state hunting license. A bow hunter, without a firearm, may carry a "National Bowhunter Education Program" card in lieu of the hunter education card.

Youth, under 10 years of age, and persons exempt from purchasing a hunting license are not required to possess the card while hunting. Persons under 10 must be accompanied by an adult of at least 18 years of age while hunting.

Because of limited seating, reservations are a must and may be made by calling Capt. Hank Patton or Walt Rybka, MSU Department of Military Science at (606) 783-2050, or Rybka at 784-9451.

MOREHEAD, Ky.—Registration for Morehead State University's 1993 fall semester will be conducted Thursday and Friday, Aug. 19-20.

Students, who did not advance register, will develop class schedules in their major departments, before going to Laughlin Health Building to pay fees.

Students, who have not declared a major, will go to 233 Allie Young Hall to schedule classes. Undergraduate students, who have not previously been admitted or were not enrolled last spring, will need to stop first at the Admissions Office, 301 Howell-McDowell. For graduate students, that stop will be 701 Ginger Hall.

Registration will be from 8 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. both days and entry time into the payment area in Laughlin is based on an alphabetical system by last name. All fees should be paid at this time.

Part-time students taking classes on the main campus also will process their schedules in their major department and may pay fees in Laughlin between 5 and 6 p.m.

Registration at MSU's Ashland Area, Big Sandy and Licking Valley Extended Campus Centers and the Appalachian Graduate Consortium will be conducted from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. on Thursday, Aug. 19.

The registration period for regional classes at Jackson, Maysville and Whitesburg will be from 5 to 7 p.m. also on Aug. 19.

All MSU classes, including evening and off-campus, will begin meeting on Monday, Aug. 23.

Schedule adjustments will be processed Monday, Aug. 23, through Wednesday, Aug. 25, in the student's major department without a penalty fee. Effective Thursday, Aug. 26, drop-adds will be processed in the Office of the Registrar, 201 Ginger Hall, with a \$10 fee to be assessed at this time.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Don't give up your dream and welcome the opportunity for change was the message given by the student speaker at Morehead State University's 1993 Summer Commencement ceremonies on Saturday, Aug. 7.

Paula Lynn Stafford of Sandy Hook, a graduate student who completed a master's degree in elementary education, told her fellow classmates that change brings something positive.

"Sometimes change seems overwhelming and we would rather escape to simpler times," she said. "We may have to dig deep to find the good, but it is there."

This is true of the Kentucky Education Reform Act which was passed by the state legislature in 1990, Stafford noted. "KERA isn't perfect. Some days, I've had to look for the good change, but it is always there," she said. "Some found that the changes made them unhappy and chose to leave the field of education. Others welcomed the opportunity to make Kentucky's educational system one to be envied," said the eighth grade language arts teacher. She teaches at Elliott County Middle School where she is active in KERA efforts and serves as a KERA performance assessment fellow.

Stafford was one of about 430 graduate and undergraduate students who were candidates for degrees which were conferred by MSU President Ronald G. Eaglin in the University's Academic-Athletic Center.

We are most productive in our jobs and personal lives when we are doing what gives us pleasure, Stafford said. "Fear of failure is one reason we never achieve our dreams. You must persevere and be strong for your beliefs. Don't abandon your convictions in the face of opposition," she said. "If you believe in something, pursue it.

"Always take the initiative and avoid settling passively for the status quo," Stafford said. "An element of tenacity will serve you well because it is indeed the road less travelled which often holds the greatest opportunity."

MOREHEAD, Ky.---If you wonder about those who say they have seen Elvis, you should listen to those who recently talked with Ben Franklin.

More than a few heads turned when this balding gentleman with shoulder length white hair and spectacles made his way across the Morehead State University campus earlier this summer.

"Well, it looks just like Ben Franklin!" was whispered by all those who observed the campus visitor colorfully dressed in a velvet suit with knickers, white stockings, and black shoes with buckles on the toes. The only thing missing was his kite!

Ben Franklin, an Eighteenth Century American statesman and philosopher, is perhaps best known for his experiment with a kite that proved lightning is a form of electricity. His life and times were portrayed at a recent program for Elderhostel, a non-profit educational organization that serves older adults.

Is it really Ben Franklin? When talking with him, one is sure it can be no one else.

Tom Spencer, alias Ben Frankin, has been making appearances for nearly 10 years, at fairs, churches and educational institutions from Tallahassee, Fla., to Milwaukee, Wisc.

"The character of Ben Franklin turns people on," said Spencer. "Including (George) Washington and (Abraham) Lincoln, he has been written about more than any other American figure."

Historically speaking, Ben has been described as an old rogue, a scoundrel and by other unsavory names, reasons which spark an interest in his life, Spencer noted.

Accompanying himself on the guitar, Spencer tells of Ben's misfortune in songs he has written about events in "Ben's" day: the French custom of powdering one's hair, the notorious "air bath" before the nudist movement was established, and the swarm of flies that caused turmoil on Aug. 2, 1776, when he, Thomas Jefferson, John Hancock and others signed the Declaration of Independence.

"It's a real thrill when I put on this costume," Spencer said. "Nothing is as fulfilling as having people respond, to hear them laugh," he said, adding that these are things he considers important to a successful performance.

Looking for feedback is a trait he has retained from his days as a college professor. "In the classroom, it let me know the students understood and were willing to reach out." When at home in Muncie, Ind., Spencer fills the role of a retired professor who taught graduate courses in educational philosophy at Ball State University. At the age of 60, he left the classroom scene in 1982.

During his teaching days, Spencer moonlighted as the "Old Perfessor," entertaining at local establishments, using electronic rhythm units for backup. After retirement, he set out for-Nashville where he was first compared to the late statesman.

"I was getting a bald spot and my barber suggested I comb my hair a particular way," he said. "I went into a restaurant and the cashier, glanced at me casually, then again more closely," he added, recalling the conversation. "She said 'You look like Ben Franklin'." Thus Ben Franklin was born.

Spencer, after indepth research of Franklin, learned he did have a resemblance to Franklin. To further enhance his appearance, he let his hair grow longer and with the help of bleach it turned white. The final touch was a trip to Creative Costumes in Nashville where he ordered costumes that were stylish in Ben's time.

When he gives talks or conducts workshops, Spencer keeps a log of performances. "I keep revising according to what audience I'm addressing," he said. "I never repeat material to the same group."

Is he Ben or is he Spencer? According to Spencer, Ben has never made an appearance when he's having dinner with his wife Jo, an aerobics instructor. Nor does she believe that Ben has caused any problems in those 49 years of marriage.

"My wife would travel with me if she didn't work," he said, noting that there have been no complaints from his sons either: one a provost at State University in New York and the other an attorney in Fort Wayne, Ind.

But on at least one occasion, Spencer has reverted to the character of Ben. "I was getting a license for the car," he said. "When asked for my birthdate, it was Ben's that I gave."

Watching him talk with those of all ages, Spencer seems comfortable being Ben. "I used to be timid, used to be bashful," he said. "As Ben, this is where I belong."

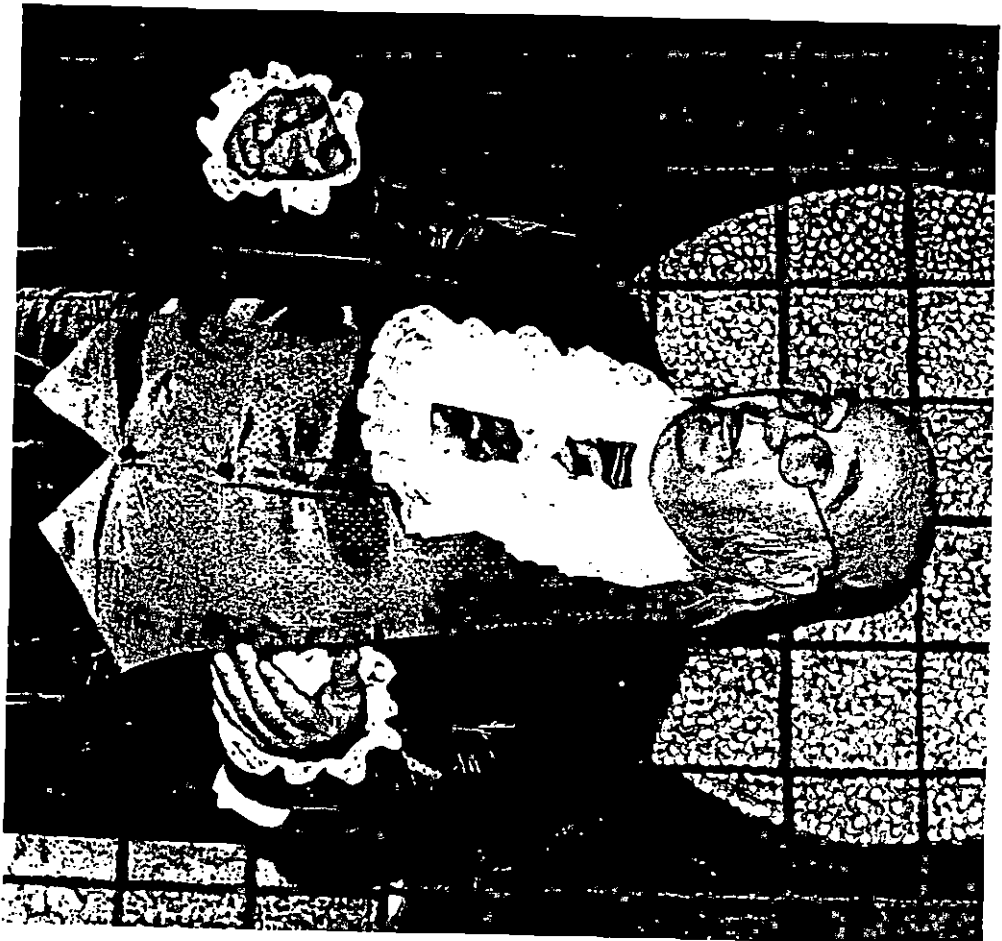

MOREHEAD, Ky.—Reflecting upon the past academic year, Morehead State University President Ronald G. Eaglin characterized it as a "good, but challenging, year."

He was speaking to MSU's faculty and staff Wednesday (Aug. 18) at the traditional opening of school convocation.

"When I accepted this position in March 1992, we had a budget of \$62.7 million; now in the fall of 1993, it looks as if we will have a budget of about \$59.9 million," Dr. Eaglin said.

In spite of the past fiscal setbacks, the president said that it had been a good year and that he was sure MSU would continue in the right direction. That belief was based on some events that are "good indicators of our worth, those of us who have chosen to spend our lives in the service of higher education," he said.

Calling the governor's decision to exempt higher education from further budget cuts "a present," Dr. Eaglin said that act had taken great political courage on the governor's part.

Although affected earlier by a 2 percent cut in the current budget, it had appeared as if higher education might be faced with cuts totalling as much as 8 percent.

"The governor decided that enough is enough for higher education; that we have done our share and that he is willing to hold us to only the first 2 percent for this fiscal year," Dr. Eaglin said.

He added that the governor's establishment of a commission to study higher education indicated that he still had some concerns about higher education; but that the group's composition was another positive sign.

The backdrop of the commission's study which includes structure, funding, program duplication and enrollment management parallels what MSU also will be doing, Dr. Eaglin said.

"The governor has made it clear that there will be no new money for higher education; as a matter of fact, he sees no new money in the whole state," the president said.

"What he is trying to do, in my opinion, is to see how we can reallocate dollars and reestablish our credibility in the eyes of the public by ensuring efficiency and effectiveness throughout the state's higher education system."

Other positive signs seen by the president were the many personal achievements of faculty and staff during the past year. "Your spirit and professionalism continue to be a driving force to the success of this state regional university," Dr. Eaglin said.

One achievement cited by the president was the \$6 million in grants and contracts brought in by faculty this past year, an increase of nearly \$900,000 from the previous year. He urged more faculty members to take the risk of being rejected and apply for grants.

In addition to increases in grants and contracts, Dr. Eaglin also mentioned a 20 percent growth in private giving over the past year.

"Difficult economic times and no relief in the immediate future emphasize the importance of us working together to assure the public that we are really true to our mission of serving the people Eastern Kentucky," Dr. Eaglin said.

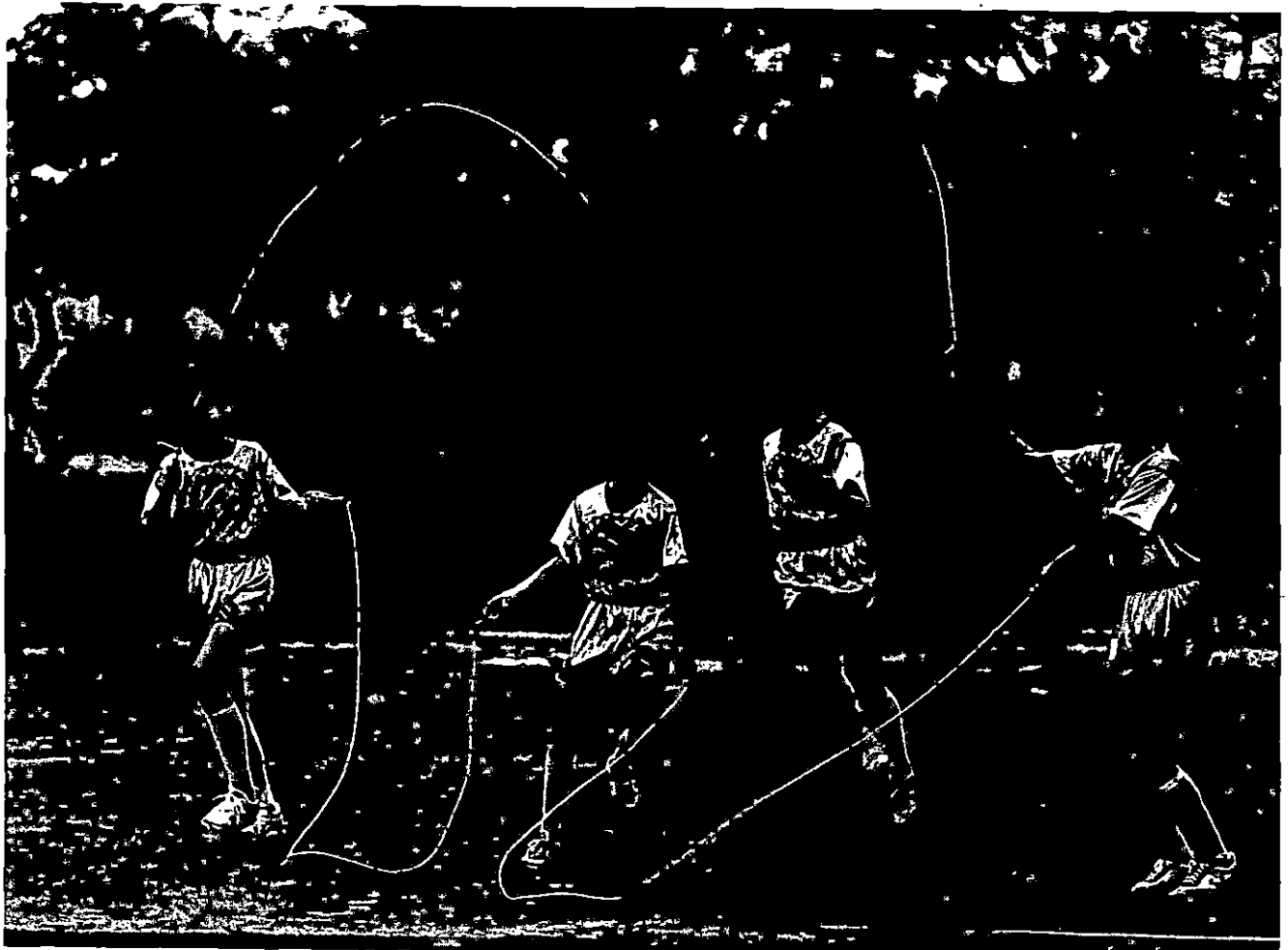

Kinoshita wanted to study in Japan so she could become more familiar with the language. "I speak very little Japanese," she said. This is a situation she hopes to rectify since her fall schedule includes courses in management, international trade and investment law, as well as five hours in learning the Japanese language.

The eldest daughter of George and Kumi Kinoshita of Gaithersburg, Md., Kinoshita, would like to work in trade negotiations, possibly in a translating job, when she graduates. "I thought that I would be able to learn the most about the culture in the shortest time by studying in Japan," she said.

Kinoshita did not grow up hearing Japanese spoken at home. Her father, an electrical engineer, was born in California and does not speak the language. Her mother, who came to the U.S. when she was eight years old, is bilingual and teaches her native customs to American and Japanese students at American University in Washington, D.C. Her younger sister, 13-year old Emi, doesn't speak Japanese either so English is the household language.

"My grandparents have been in the U.S. nearly 50 years and they don't speak any English," Kinoshita said, noting that learning to speak Japanese will make it easier to converse with them.

Growing up in the suburb of Washington, D.C, Kinoshita experienced some culture shock when she came to MSU in the fall of 1990. "I was used to a much faster pace," she said. "There was more to do, more traffic, and people were always in a hurry. In Kentucky, everyone's goals are different; they get married before they graduate."

She did get a welcome reception from the other students at MSU, she recalled. "They thought I was 'neat'," she said, noting that her Japanese looks and her English-speaking abilities have confused some. "I had to get used to people saying 'hello' just because I met them in the halls."

As a member of MSU's Bowling Team for two years, she was part of a "family." "We competed every weekend," she said. "I had the opportunity to travel and make lasting friendships."

How does she feel about studying in Japan. "I hope I can fit in," Kinoshita said. "Because I look Japanese, lots of people think I am--until I speak. I don't want them to think I'm trying to be something I'm not," she added.

After having learned how to be an outgoing college student, there is a change that Kinoshita must make while in Japan. "I was more shy and reserved," she said of her life before she came to MSU. "I didn't talk to anyone I didn't know and that's typical of the Japanese culture."

Kinoshita plans to graduate from MSU in May 1994 with a business management degree with an emphasis in international Japanese business.

Students interested in studying abroad may find some assistance in meeting that goal by talking to Dr. Jones. "Sometimes students have a particular country they want to go to while other times, they just want to experience another culture," he said. "Either way, the opportunities are marvelous."

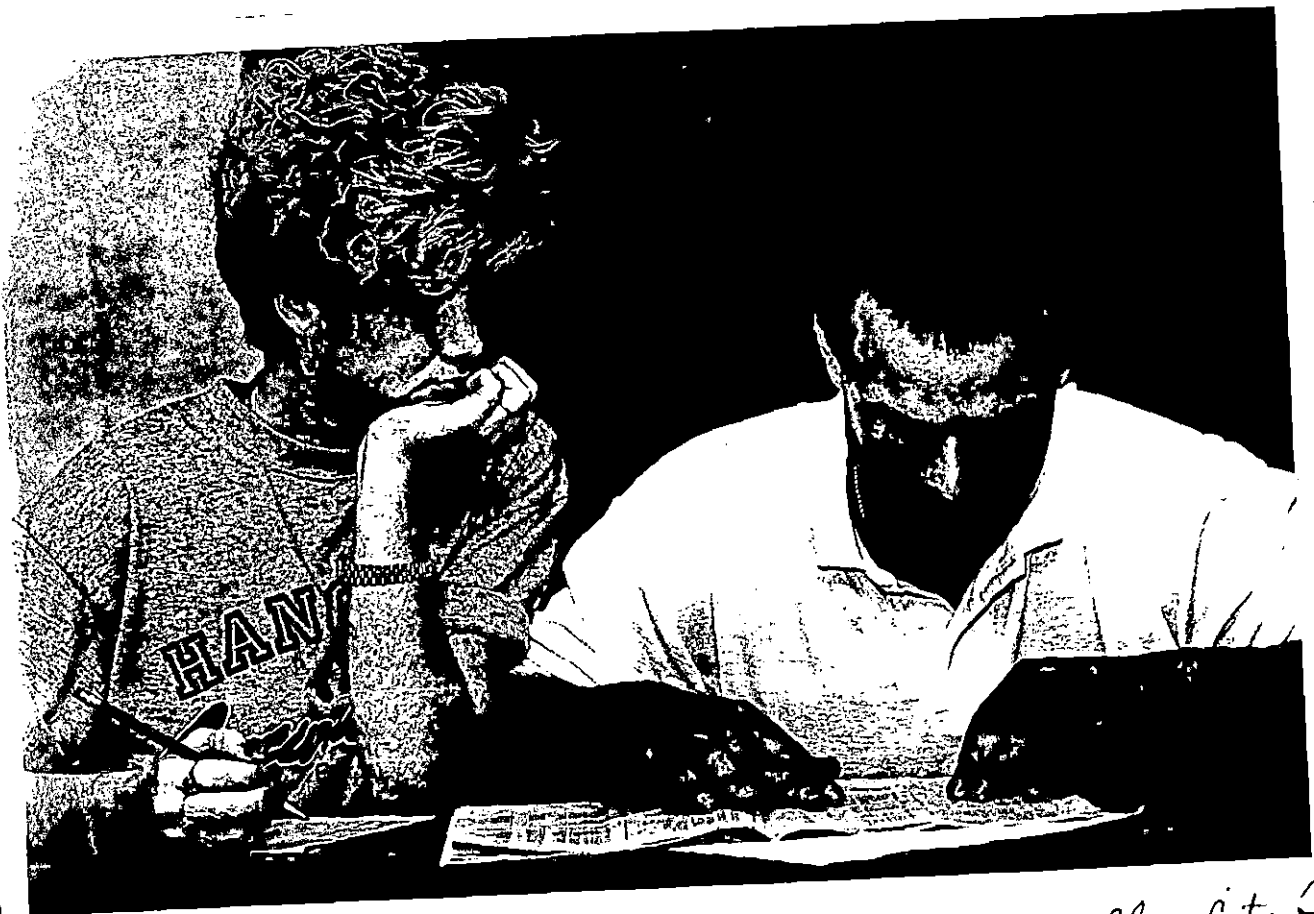

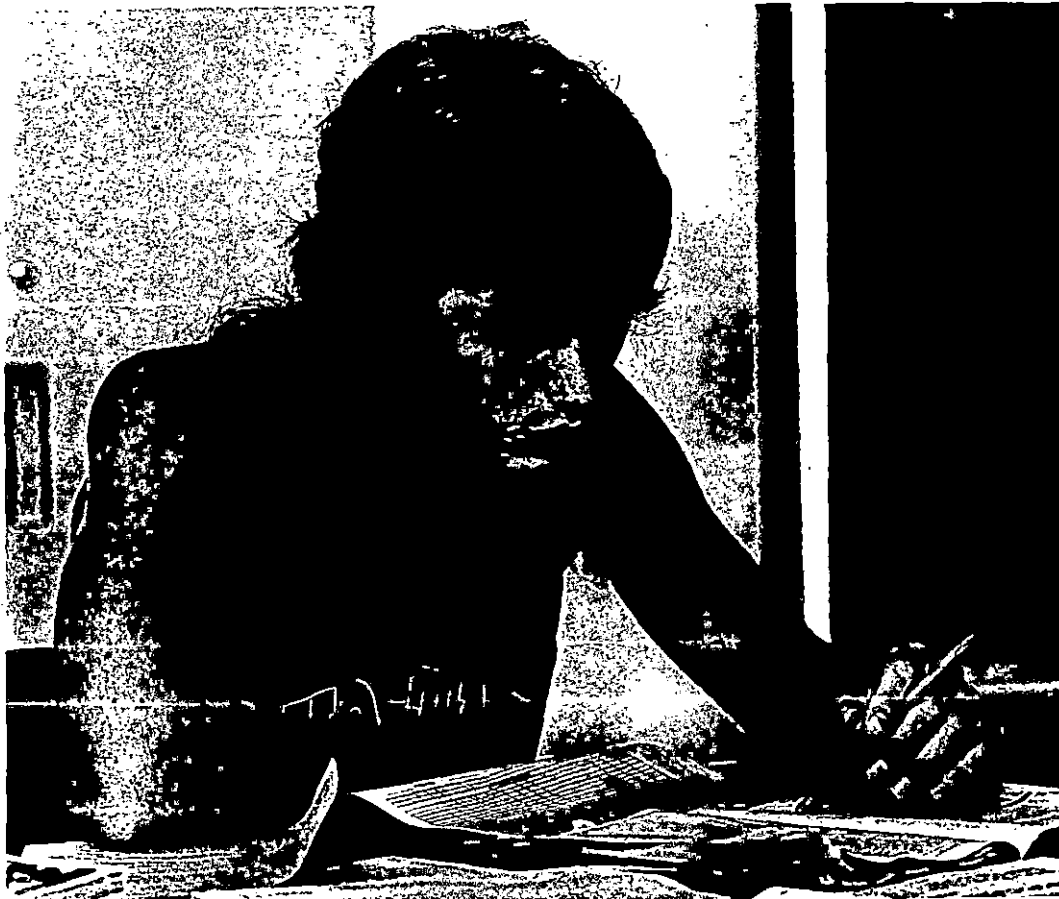

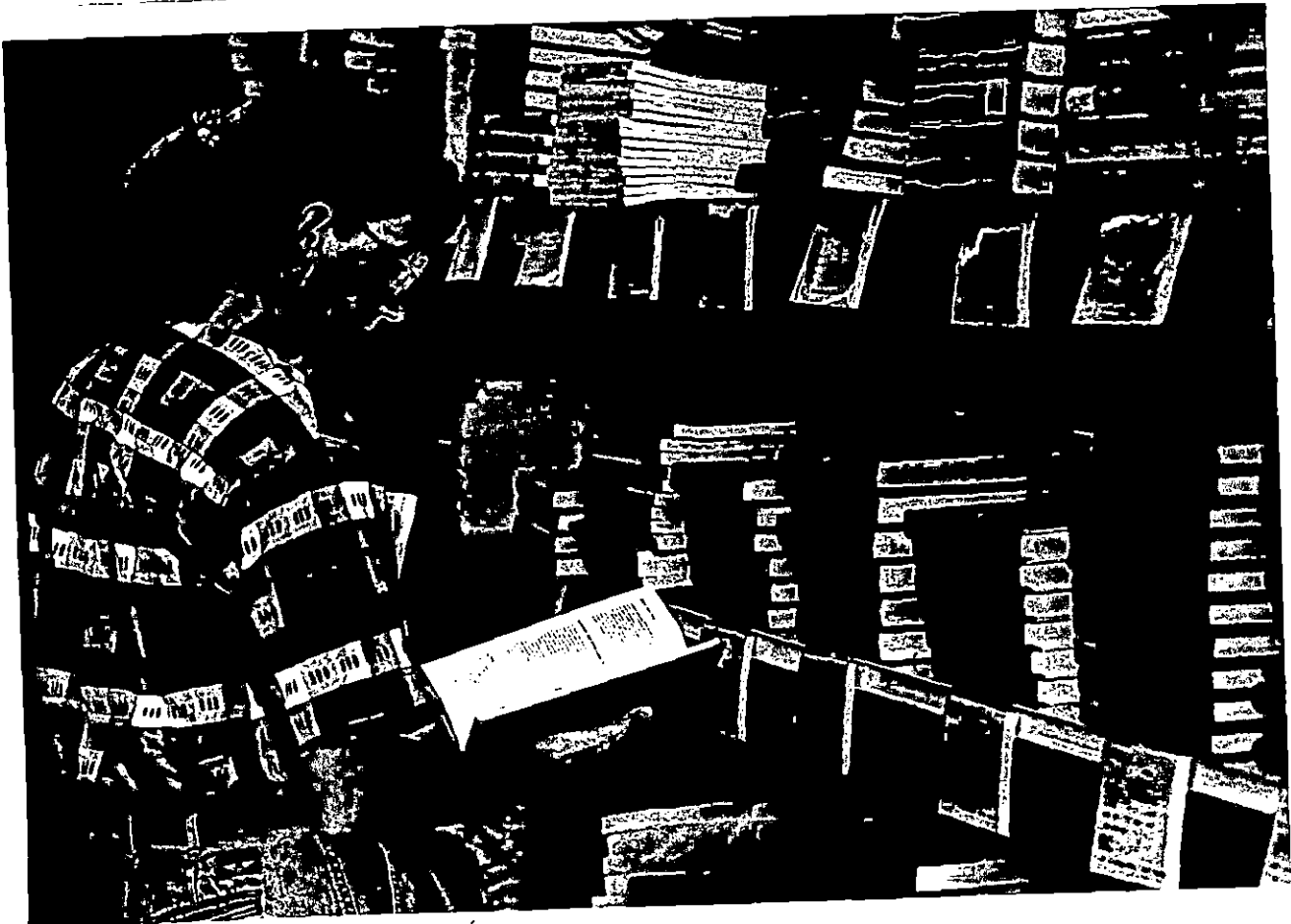
