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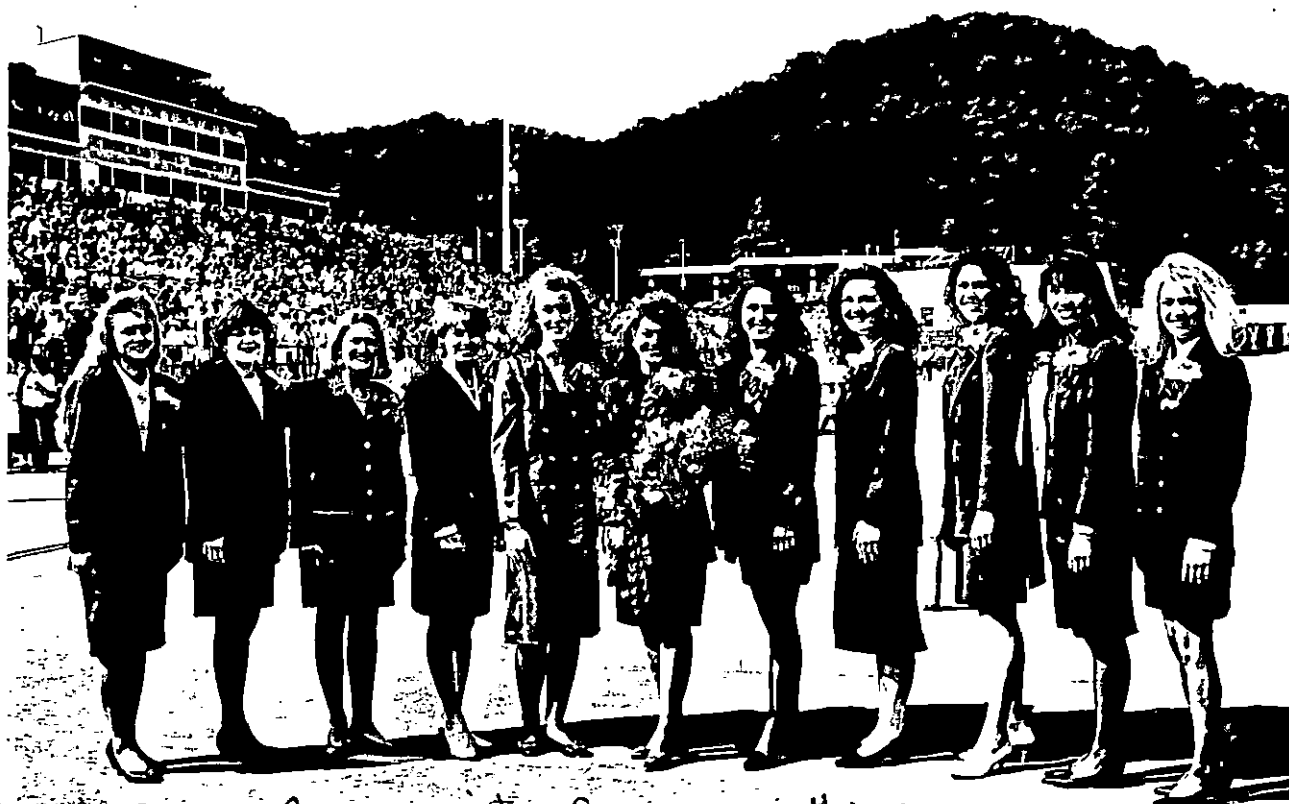

MOREHEAD, Ky.—Gov. Brereton C. Jones will be the guest on a special "Focus on the Region" which airs at 7:30 p.m. on Tuesday, Oct. 11, over WMKY 90.3 F.M., public radio from Morehead State University's campus.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Morehead State University will offer a new class during the second nine weeks of the fall semester.

The course, "MSU 400: The World of Work," is designed to give upcoming graduates a successful transition from college to the beginning of a career, according to Dr. Michael Hopper, director of Career Planning and Placement.

Dr. Hopper, who will teach the course, plans to instruct students on how to best find the job they want.

"I'm going to teach a procedure for getting a job. Whether it's today or 20 years from now, the method works," said Dr. Hopper.

The course, restricted to juniors and seniors, will cover three main areas:

- 1) Self Assessment: assessing career goals, individual skills, and career targets.
- 2) Market Analysis: researching companies, potential employers.
- 3) Job Search and Process: resumes, cover letters, interviewing.

Dr. Hopper will prepare students to locate the best cities and companies that offer the most promising job possibilities.

"We will show students how to target a specific city and that city's job climate," he said. "Upcoming graduates also need to think about life after college and prepare themselves for a highly competitive job market," he added.

"The class will offer a unique opportunity for students to get a head start," he said. "Many students don't know what they want to do, and the uncertainty can cause problems. The class will help students assess personal skills and learn how to decide what they want to do and where they want to do it."

Students taking the class will be required to start a file with Career Planning and Placement.

Dr. Hopper has been putting up posters around campus to promote the class. Second semester classes begin Oct. 17.

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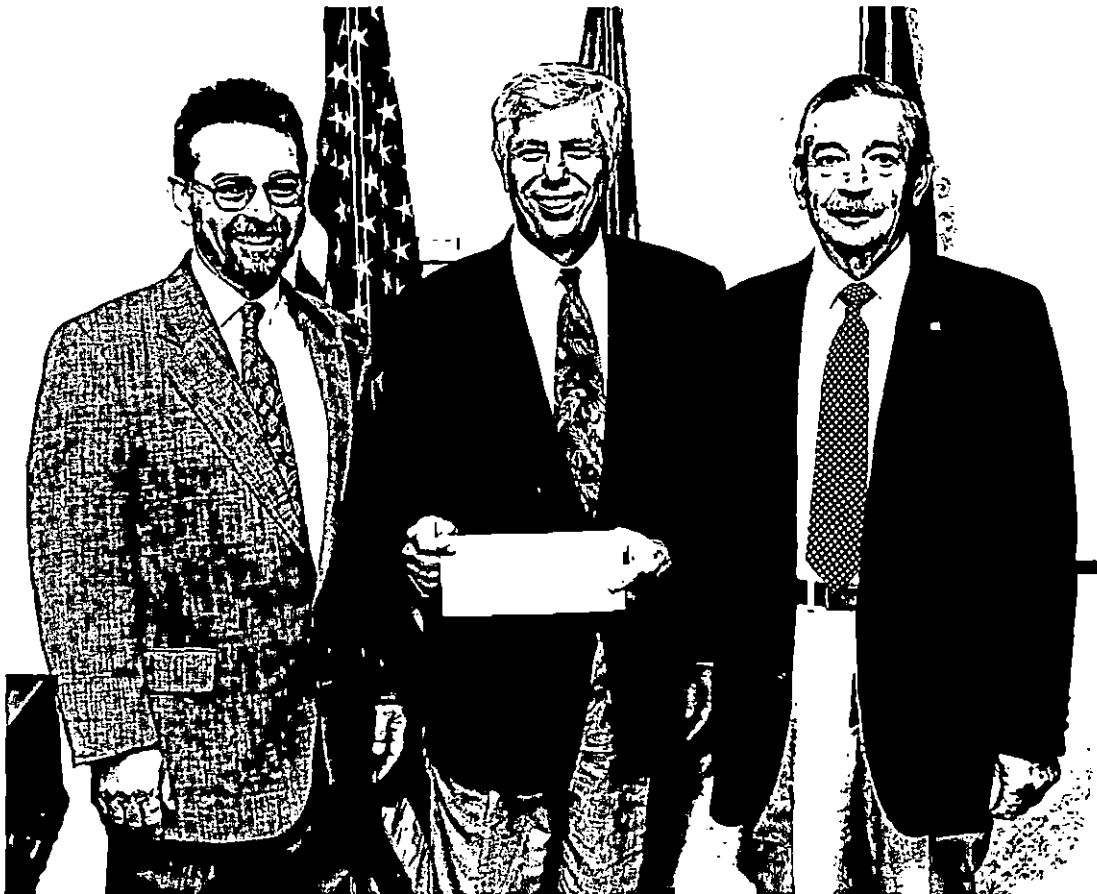

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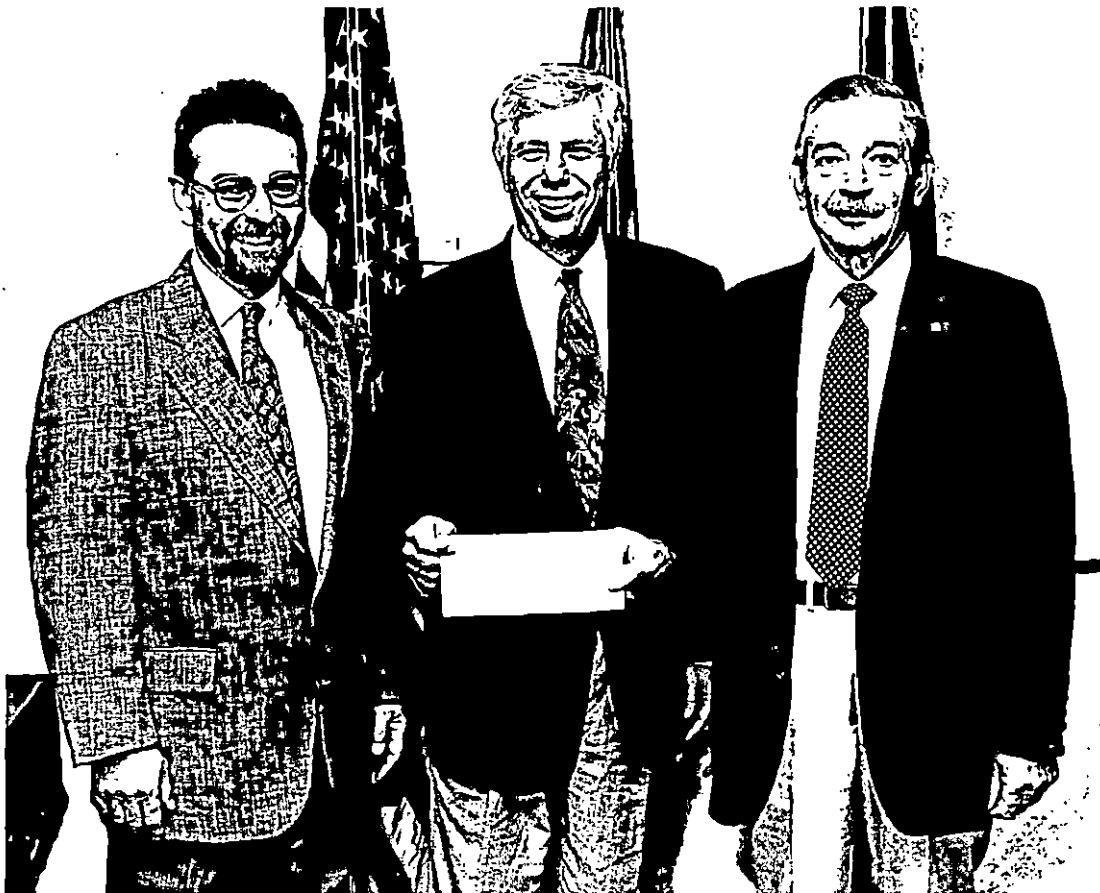

PIKEVILLE, Ky.---Morehead State University, through the Appalachian Graduate Consortium here, has launched an Executive M.B.A. Program for area business personnel seeking to further their education with a graduate degree in business administration.

The program was created by MSU's College of Business faculty after talks with community leaders who believed there was a need for local access to the master's degree program in business administration.

MSU President Ronald G. Eaglin told the civic leaders that if they would raise \$50,000 a year for the program's first three years, that MSU will fund instructional and other costs of about twice that amount each year.

The local funding will be used to help hire an on-site faculty member for the program, who also would be available to assist with economic development efforts in the Pikeville area.

"This program truly is a partnership between the University and the region it serves," Dr. Eaglin said. "It is a good example of a community recognizing a need and working to make it happen."

Custom-designed Executive M.B.A. programs are becoming more commonplace, according to Beverly McCormick, interim dean of MSU's College of Business. "However, we think our approach is rather unique," the dean said.

Enrolled in a special "Precept Seminar" this fall are 39 individuals, whose ranks include mining executives, banking personnel, medical administrators, store managers, CPAs and small business owners. Many of the students' employers are paying full or partial tuition through educational assistance programs.

In addition to the traditional undergraduate degree requirement, students enrolling in the Executive M.B.A. Program must have a minimum of two years of managerial or supervisory experience.

Based on the cohort concept, this group of degree-seekers will stay together for a three-year period to complete the program and then a new cohort class will be started when sufficient enrollment becomes available.

Executive M.B.A. Programs differ from the customary M.B.A. degree in that they are based on actual experience in the business world, according to John Alcorn, MSU associate professor of accounting and coordinator of the M.B.A. programs.

The Precept Seminar, which meets twice a week for two and a half hours this semester, was carefully tailored to cover a common body of knowledge required for the graduate degree.

"Actually, the seminar transcends traditional business-related courses and will include such areas as writing skills and presentations," McCormick said.

Successful completion of the seminar for six graduate credit hours is a requirement to progress in the program. Students will be evaluated on the basis of a portfolio created from assignments evolving out of the seminar.

The full program not only includes specific required courses, but also there will be electives offered structured to meet the needs of the cohort, Alcorn said.

Nina Reynolds, a medical technologist at Pikeville Methodist Hospital who holds a bachelor's degree in biology from Morehead State University, has long wanted to see graduate education opportunities in the area for those who are not teachers.

MOREHEAD, Ky.—Jack Owens of Elliottville, who teaches signing classes for Morehead State University's Office of Continuing Education, has a personal stake in his work.

Both of his parents are hearing impaired. His mother, Barbara Owens, was born without hearing and his father, Jack Owens, lost his in an accident at age six.

Having taught for MSU's Office of Education for more than two years, Owens received state certification to teach the "Signing Naturally" curriculum this summer. The certification was a result of his own life experience with signing combined with study and completion of an intensive workshop at Eastern Kentucky University.

According to Owens, American Sign Language (ASL) is the most accepted form of sign language instruction now. "People have the concept that all those with hearing loss can read lips," he said.

"That is not true. I know a lot of deaf people who cannot read lips. It is not easy because people move their mouths differently. So reading lips is not the way to go; sign language is," he added.

Owens also works with the Rowan County school system as an interpreter, relaying information back and forth between the student and teacher.

He has always been frustrated in teaching sign language because he's seen the frustration that the hearing impaired go through, said Owens. "I've always seen that gap between those who can hear and those who can't and have tried to bridge it."

Utilizing 12 weeks of instruction, Owens not only teaches signing but also incorporates information about the hearing impaired to help people understand their needs.

In his teaching of signing, he has the class go into the "silent mode" and what is offered is taught "in context" to make it relevant. Owens said that the students are able to read it, able to understand words and communicate through demonstrations and various types of games and activities. He also uses videos and handouts.

Additionally, he teaches his students to look closely at people because when you are expressing something, facial expressions and body language are important factors in communicating.

According to the signing instructor, there are 300,000 hearing impaired people in Kentucky, many of whom face discrimination because businesses are reluctant to hire the hearing impaired.

Saying that Eastern Kentucky is behind in meeting the guidelines of the American Disabilities Act, he called for more use of interpreters at meetings and other functions as well as other methods to facilitate the participation of the hearing impaired in all programs and events.

"The only problem the deaf person has is that he or she can't hear. They can drive cars, they can read and they can write. They can do anything anyone else can," Owens said. He believes that the communications barrier can be overcome.

There is still a debate in education circles over "full inclusion" of hearing impaired students in regular classes versus providing special classes.

Full inclusion seems to be the aim, but appropriate special services must be available for the hearing impaired, including a variety of qualified specialists and other resources as well as hearing impaired role models, according to Owens.

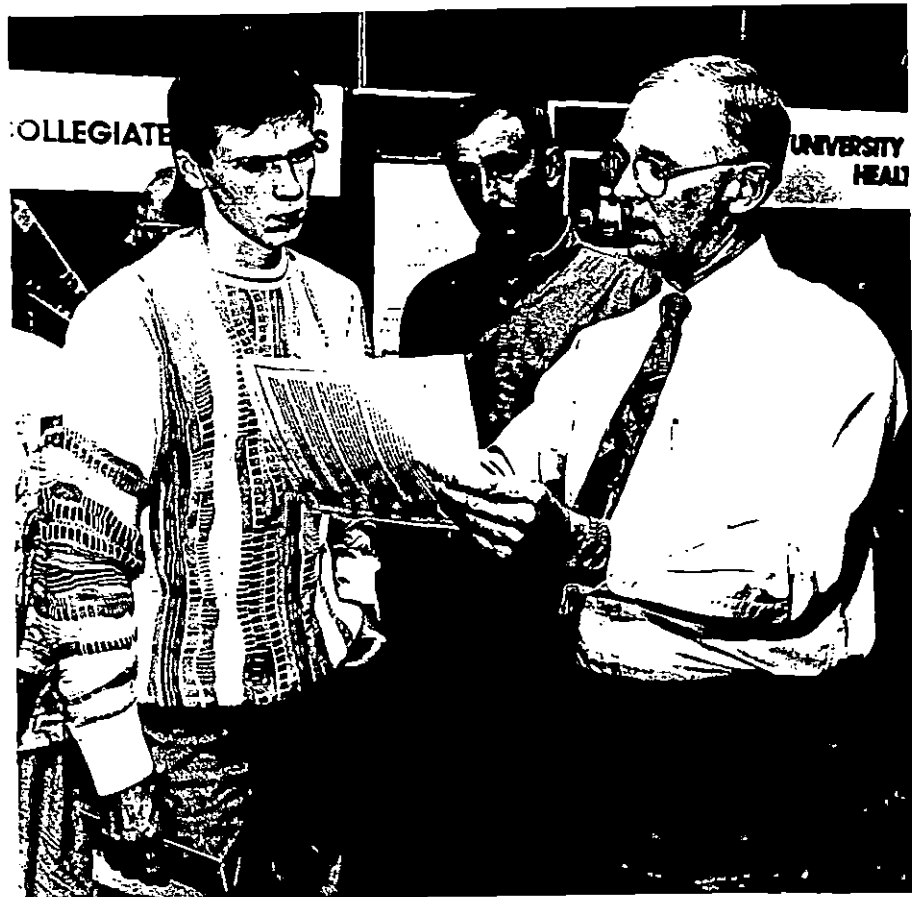

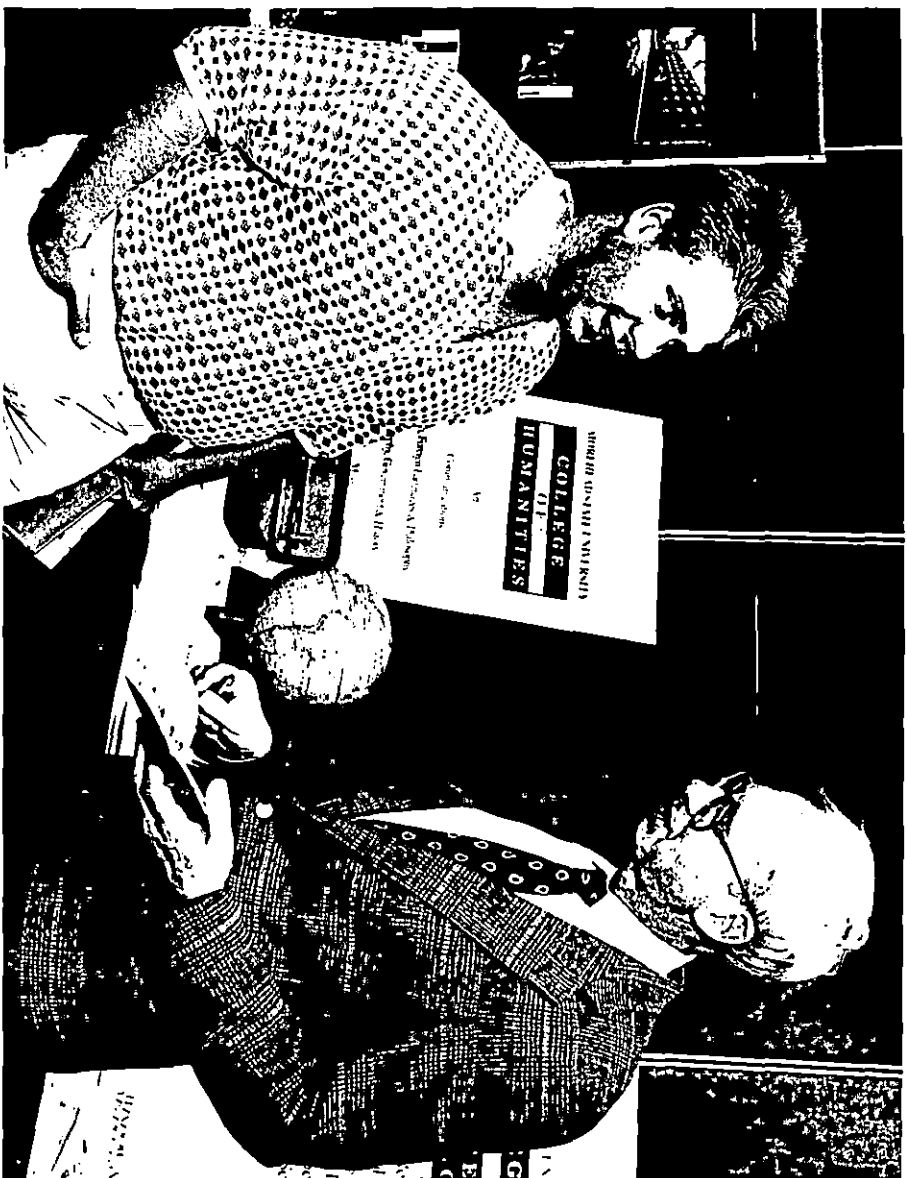

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Keep in mind the uniqueness not only of Morehead State University's mission and its service region, but also the special differences of each university and college.

That was the primary message delivered repeatedly to the Council on Higher Education Tuesday in a forum designed to provide public input on its strategic plan for 1996-2000 and performance funding. The CHE forum at MSU was one of 10 scheduled throughout the state on these topics.

More than 80 area residents were on hand either to listen or share their thoughts on how higher education's future should be shaped.

MSU President Ronald G. Eaglin, emphasizing the demographics of the University's region, told the CHE that he agreed that future planning and financing of higher education should center on the various missions of each institution.

Noting that MSU has one of the most challenging missions in the state, Dr. Eaglin said that the University was totally dedicated to the needs of the eastern-most counties of Kentucky.

"Your job, as ours, is to match these needs with what we specifically as a regional university must be and do to truly serve the region and the state," he said. Citing MSU's efforts with KERA, economic development and leadership development, he asked that in the funding model that such initiatives be rewarded and be recognized as important in the new strategic plan.

Dr. Ron Mitchelson, chair of MSU's Department of Geography, Government and History, used slides to show historically how the 22-county region served by MSU had been neglected. He pointed to the outmigration of the region's "brightest and best" youth because of the lack of employment opportunity, but who, given the opportunity, preferred to stay.

He urged the CHE to remember that "the University's needs are tied proportionately to the need for educational and economic opportunities in the neediest service region in Kentucky's system of higher education."

Rowan County Judge-Executive Clyde Thomas also spoke to the importance of recognizing universities' efforts in community and economic development of their region in developing the new plan and funding model. Thomas also is chairman of the Morehead-Rowan County Economic Development Council.

"This may be hard to believe," he said, "but I have more money in my pocket here tonight than MSU received from the state this year to provide assistance in economic development to its 22-county service region in Eastern Kentucky."

He told the CHE that the cycle of poverty in the region could not be broken without more and better jobs. "Our universities have the brainpower to help us, but they don't have enough state funding to meet all of their missions," Thomas said.

Noting that teaching students is a university's first priority, he said he didn't expect Dr. Eaglin to shortchange students or faculty to help in economic development.

"Local agencies don't have the resources to pay for these services and we are frustrated by the fact that Kentucky is lagging behind other states in giving its universities the funding to make a difference in economic development," Thomas said.

Morehead businessman Larry Fannin told the CHE that while he might not understand funding formulas, as a businessman, he did know it costs more to serve more and that MSU is hard pressed financially because state dollars haven't kept pace with enrollment.

"If our universities are not fairly and adequately funded--put on that proverbial level playing field we hear so much about--then the ultimate bottom line will be that some students will be denied access," Fannin said. "I like the notion of performance funding and I encourage the council to continue that course; but only after the base appropriations for each university have been equalized," he added.

Adding his voice to others who shared concerns about the increasing numbers of nontraditional students (those over 25 years old) on campuses, W. Stu Taylor, plant manager of Kentucky Electric Steel, told the council that the current funding model ignores their needs.

In considering performance funding criteria, he suggests CHE ask itself if it makes sense to judge institutions on retention rates for those older students whose job and family obligations force them frequently to stop in and stop out. "The 'graying' of America has already started on our campuses. The strategic plan and future funding plans should recognize that fact," Taylor said.

Statements were received from 18 people including higher education representatives, students, businessmen and other area residents.

Maysville Community College President James Shires spoke to the issues of access and equity, while Ashland Community College Charles Dassance, urged consideration of institutional differences in developing performance funding criteria.

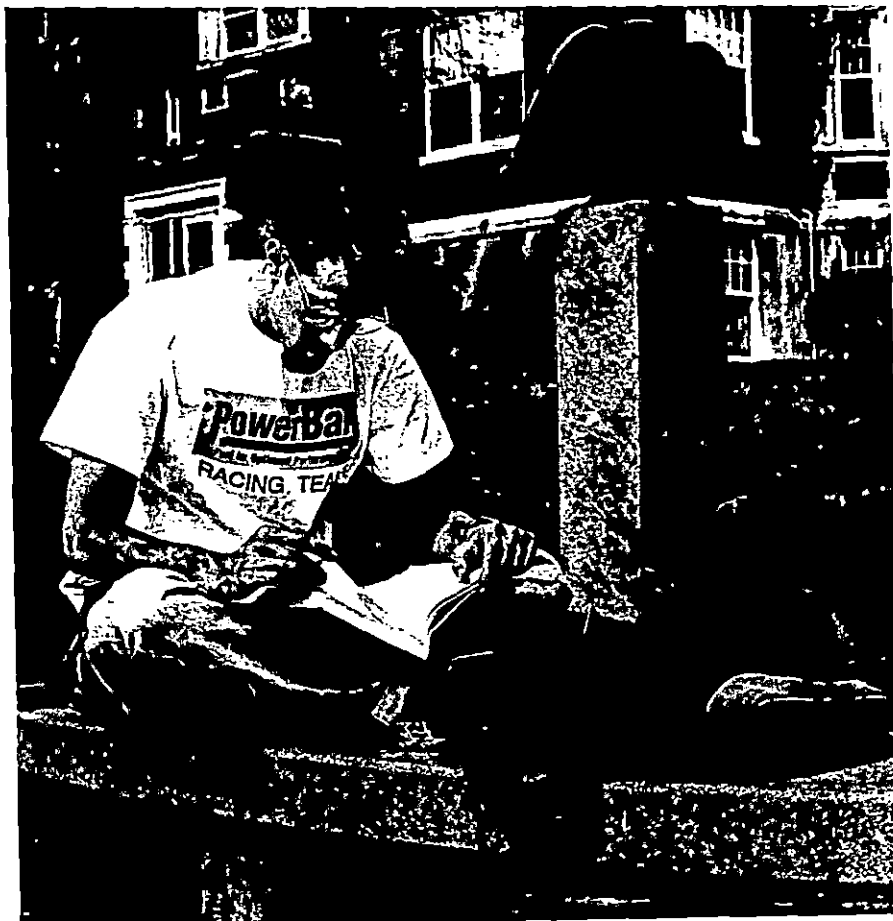

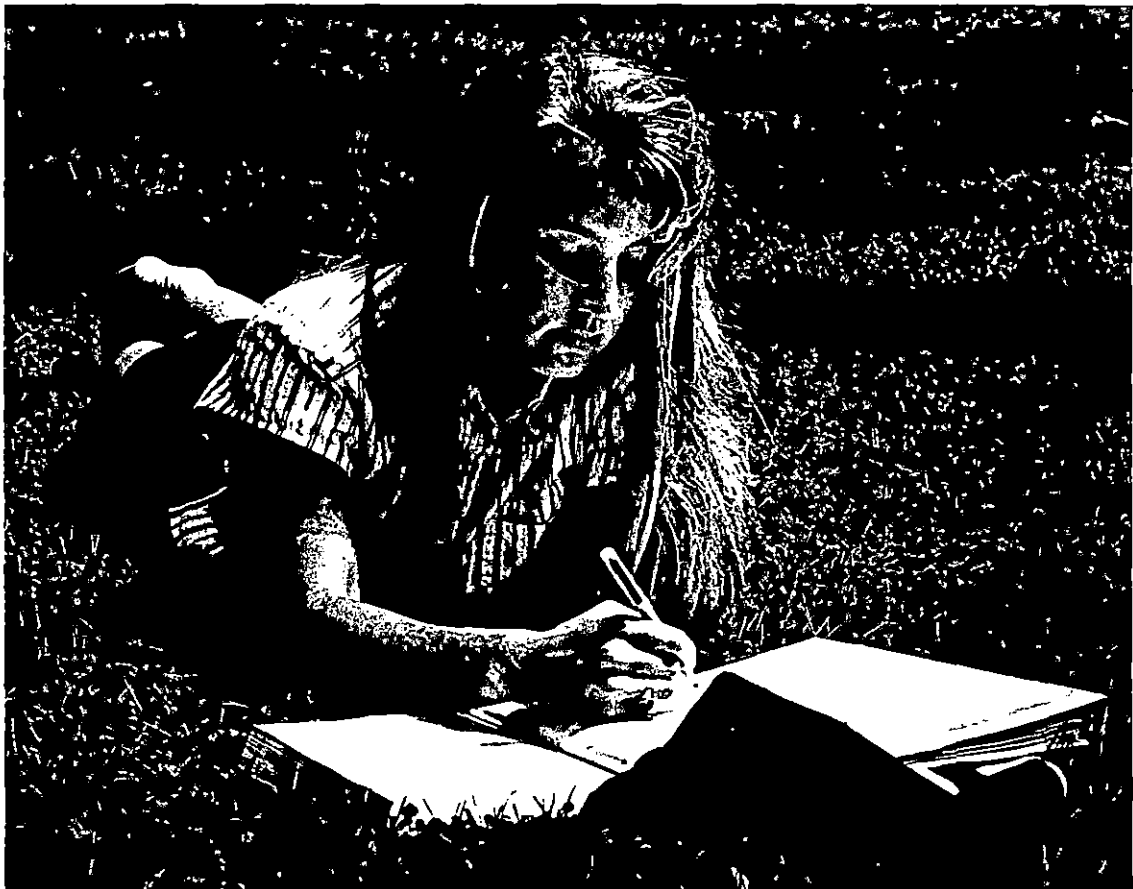

MOREHEAD, Ky.—A psychologist/author, a quilt artist and a prize-winning writer will be the featured speakers for the 1994 Wilma E. Grote Symposium for the Advancement of Women at Morehead State University.

This year's symposium, the fourth, is scheduled Thursday through Saturday, Nov. 10-12, in the Adron Doran University Center. Its theme is "Women's Ways of Knowing, Learning and Communicating."

Principal speakers include Dr. Mary Field Belenky, a psychologist and associate research professor at the University of Vermont, who is one of the four authors of the award-winning book, "Women's Ways of Knowing: The Development of Self, Voice and Mind."

Also featured will be the prize-winning author George Ella Lyon of Lexington and contemporary quilt artist Lorie Kleiner Eckert of Loveland, Ohio.

Dr. Belenky will be the speaker for the symposium banquet at 6:30 p.m. on Friday, Nov. 11. Her remarks will be drawn from a forthcoming new book of which she is a co-author, "From Silence to Voice: The Development of Women, Families and Communities."

Dr. Belenky also was co-principle investigator and project director of Listening Partnership, a program serving isolated mothers living in rural poverty. She earned her Ed.D. degree in developmental psychology from Harvard University.

Her earlier book, "Women's Ways," earned the Distinguished Publication Award from the Association of Women in Psychology and the Critics Choice Award from the American Education Studies Association.

At the general workshop session at 9 a.m. on Friday, Nov. 11, Eckert will use quilts in her presentation, "One Woman's Journey Toward Self-Acceptance and Love." Rich in symbolism, her original quilt patterns will illustrate the points she makes on such topics as self-respect, the power of positive thinking and reaching one's potential.

Eckert began making and designing quilts in 1983. In 1989, she designed a "Signature Tile Wall," to raise funds for a new public school in her community. The wall is a medallion quilt made of tile rather than fabric.

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Lyon, a novelist, poet, playwright and children's author, will be the speaker for the noon luncheon on Saturday, Nov. 12, which ends the three-day event. Her topic will be "The Weave of Womanthought."

A native of Harlan County, Lyon has received numerous awards for her work. Her latest volume of poetry, "Catalpa," earned the Best Book of the Year Award from the Appalachian Writers' Association in 1993. The recipient of several ABA Pick of the List awards, she also earned the Jesse Stuart Award from the Kentucky State Media Association in 1992.

A former faculty member at the University of Kentucky, Centre College and Transylvania, she currently is working with literacy groups, public schools and emerging writers. She holds the Ph.D. degree in English and creative writing from Indiana University.

The symposium will open with workshop sessions at 2 p.m. on Thursday, Nov. 10, with registration commencing at noon. Coordinated by a campuswide steering committee, the symposium has drawn presenters from all over the United States as well as one from New Zealand.

Among the topics to be explored during the three-days are creativity, learning, women in the media, women in politics, self-caring, parenting, friendships and communication styles.

For symposium-goers registering by Nov. 4, the fee, including meal functions, will be \$70 for all three days or \$40 for a single day. The cost of on-site registration or for those registering after Nov. 4 will be \$90 for all sessions or \$55 per day.

Students may attend all sessions except for meal functions at no charge, but must register in advance. Those wishing to attend meal functions will be charged \$10 per day.
