

Order of the Congregation
to its Trustees.

The Church being in debt in the sum of \$800 and being unable to discharge said indebtedness and the Trustees deeming it advisable to sell the parsonage, a cottage situated adjacent to the church building in Morehead and originally constructed for the use of its pastor as a residence, but now being rented to a tenant, and the Trustees desiring to obtain the sense of the congregation as to whether said sale should be had, on the 23rd day of August, 1908., after notice had been given of the time, place and purpose of this vote for one month by the Pastor announcing it from the pulpit at the regular Sabbath morning service for four consecutive Sundays next preceding the Sunday on which said vote was taken, at the regular Sunday morning service held in the house of worship belonging to the Church, the Congregation resolved itself into a parliamentary body with the Pastor, W.F. Smith, as Chairman and J. C. Button, Secretary, for the purpose of transacting any business or considering any motions put before the body, whereupon J.W. Mitchell, a member of the Congregation, duly put a motion that said parsonage be sold and the amount realized from the sale be applied to the discharge of the indebtedness of the congregation, and that the Church's Board of Trustees, consisting of H.M. Logan, J.M. Carey, G.A. Nickell and Hiram Bradley, be instructed and empowered to conduct the sale and to sell and convey said property to the highest and best bidder and the motion being put to a vote the Members of the Congregation voted unanimously for its

passage.
