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Heman McGuire Trial Continued To May Term

Prosecution Given Time To Prepare Embezzlement Case

The embezzlement trial of former Carter County School Supt. Heman H. McGuire has been continued to the May term of Rowan Circuit Judge Major Gardner.

The continuation was ordered by the court to give the prosecution more time to prepare its case, it was said.

McGuire is under indictment on eight counts of embezzling and converting county funds to his and others' use while superintendent.

The case was transferred to Rowan County Aug. 3 by Carter Circuit Judge Major Gardner.

At a hearing held at that time Judge Gardner sustained a motion made by Commonwealth Atty. Ralph Walters for a change of venue on ground that McGuire would not receive a fair trial in Carter County.

Walters at that time said feeling for and against McGuire is still so strong here that "we feel it would be useless to attempt to get a jury of 12 citizens in Carter County which would be completely unbiased."

A school controversy in Carter County led to McGuire's ouster as superintendent in June 1952 and to the filing of both criminal and civil charges against him. He was convicted of income-tax evasion in U. S. District Court at Lexington in March 1953. He was fined \$3,000 and sentenced to a year and a day in prison, from which he was released last year.

The civil case was concluded last year when the Court of Appeals ruled that McGuire must return \$6,316 of a total of \$24,600 which a taxpayer's suit contended was spent illegally. The case was tried in Carter Circuit Court by a special judge.

The criminal case pending in Rowan Circuit Court is based on an eight-count indictment returned against McGuire March 23, 1955. It accuses him of embezzling or converting to his own or another's use:

• In three counts, a total of \$8,251.25 paid for school bus bodies that, the indictment said, were never delivered to the school board.

• In two counts, a total of \$5,747.03 for payments made to a plumbing and heating firm. The indictment contends this includes \$6,178.83 in overpayments and \$3,924.40 for which no goods or services were received by the school board.

• In three counts, an unspecified amount allegedly paid for school bus chassis that were not delivered. The indictment said the school board paid \$4,700 for 18 chassis, but received only nine and that no money was refunded on the board.

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First State Car Inspections Will Be Voluntary

The first two months of motor vehicle inspection in Kentucky, which will begin Jan. 1, will be entirely voluntary. Dunlap Elliott, director of motor vehicle inspection, disclosed the change in plans yesterday, saying they result from the basic system chosen for this state.

Kentucky's operation will be keyed to a numbering system in which the last numeral of the 1968 license plate will indicate the month required for inspection.

"Since 1967 license plates don't expire until March 1, 1968," Elliott said, "it would be impossible to begin a compulsory program on that basis."

The plan will work this way: If the last numeral of your license is 3, your vehicle must be inspected in March. If it is 4, in April.

That holds through zero, which applies to October. Then No. 1 means the vehicle must be checked in November and No. 2 in December.

Afterward the same month is applicable for each succeeding year. Thus if your license plate's last number is 2 in 1968, your car must be inspected in May 1968 and in every subsequent May.

There will be an exception, if for example, a motorist's inspection date according to the license tag is Jan. and he wants the car checked earlier, say in April, he may get it done.

However, the June renewal then becomes void and the next inspection date is April of each year.

"We have no objection to motorists getting inspected three times a year if they feel more secure," Elliott said, "but once a year is mandatory."

The 1966 legislature which approved compulsory inspection specified a fee of up to \$2.50.

"We feel \$2.50 will be going rate," Elliott said. "If the fee is set at \$2.00, that amount, 25 cents would be remitted to the state to supervise the program. The license dealer, independent garage or service station, will keep \$2.25."

Elliott estimated 2,000 to 2,500 inspection stations would be approved for vehicle inspection.

His agency, consisting of about 40 employees in the public safety department, would oversee everything and handle complaints.

Elliott, a former Lexington inspector, has visited Georgia, North Carolina and Pennsylvania to pick up inspection pointers, and will go to Virginia soon.

"We're trying to take the good and bad from other states and come up with an effective, impartial program that we hope will meet with public approval," he said.

Elliott said that after analyzing other states' operations, he believes standardization is the key to success.

The vehicle inspection setup should be simple and complete, he said, with a motorist knowing he will get exactly the same service and treatment at Valentineville as at Paducah.

Six Counties To Receive On-The-Job Trainees

The Northeast Kentucky Area Development Council will be developing 210 On-The-Job positions with local employers. It was announced by Joe Hancy, President of the Northeast Kentucky Area Development Council, and Jim Tompkins, its Executive Director. This is a program that has been awarded to the Northeast by the Bureau of Apprenticeship and Training, U. S. Labor Department. Tompkins said that each of the employers both small and large in the six counties of Carter, Elliott, Greenup, Lewis, Morgan, and Rowan will be contacted to explain the program to the trainees. He said that each employer who wants to go into this program will have the privilege of selecting the employee, but each employee must be from some phase of disadvantaged whether it be education, health, or age, and has been unemployed for a minimum of 15 weeks.

Breckinridge Pupils Learn Math From A Computer

Fifty-six youngsters in the University of Kentucky Breckinridge school this week are studying arithmetic by a new method that is an outgrowth of the space age. They are being part of a computerized instruction program in arithmetic which originated at Stanford University and is being carried out through computer terminals in the room by long distance telephone lines. The program is part of a demonstration project worked out by the Central Midwestern Regional Laboratory in St. Louis, Stanford University, and Morehead State University, of which University of Breckinridge School is a part. The project is initiated under Title IV of the Federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act which provides for education research and research training. Chief Congressional sponsor of this concept has been Kentucky's Representative Carl D. Perkins, Chairman of the House Education and Labor Committee.

The demonstration program at Morehead will continue through the end of the school year, but beginning in the fall, other Kentucky elementary school children are expected to take part in the program. Equipment will be installed in schools in other eastern Kentucky schools, including some one-room schools.

The classroom equipment is a teletype machine linked by telephone to a computer in the Stanford University campus in Palo Alto, Calif. As each student takes his turn at the teletype machine, he is directed to type his name and class number. From that point on, the pre-programmed machine gives him a series of practice drills in arithmetic. He works on one drill until he masters it, and then he moves up to another. An important aspect is that each pupil moves at his own speed through the lesson material and drills. At the end of the day, the machine types out the teacher's points on which the pupil needs extra attention.

While the primary computerized material comes from Stanford, it is also possible for the individual program to draw upon material programmed in computers at State-Moore's College and Hartwood Normal University, and the University of Florida. The benefits of individualized learning through computer terminals are as important for the slow child as they are for the able child. The gifted student does not hold back the slow child nor does the slow child hold back the gifted. Keep up and even the slowest child has his own strengths and weaknesses that can only be dealt with by individualizing instruction.

Tant To Serve As Consultant In Philippines

Dr. Norman Tant, Director of Instruction at Morehead State University, has been invited to serve as consultant to the Department of Education of the Republic of the Philippines in the area of educational television and radio. Dr. Tant, a survivor of the Bataan Death March and held in the Philippines as a prisoner of war from 1942 to 1945, participated in the commemoration of the fifth anniversary of the Fall of Bataan and the infamous "death march" which followed.

Secretary Carlos P. Romulo wrote Dr. Tant when he learned that he would be in the Philippines. He warmly welcomed the opportunity to have you with us even for a limited time because we are sure that with your experience in instructional media, especially in educational TV you will be of help to the Bureau of Public Instruction which is presently undertaking some educational broadcast projects, both in radio and television."

Dr. Tant first went to the Philippines as a soldier with the 4th Signal Company, Aviation, Nichols Field near Manila in July 1941. He had at that time a bachelor's degree and one year of high school teaching experience. He visited in schools in his free time before the war began December 7. In route back to the United States from a year as a prisoner of war coal miner in Japan, he spent three weeks in the Philippines.

Following nine months of hospitalization after liberation at the end of WWII, Dr. Tant returned to high school teaching to test the decision to stay in the field of education made while prisoner of the Japanese. At the end of a year he applied for admission to George Peck School of Education, Nashville, Tennessee, and started work on the M.A. degree in school administration in 1947. He completed work for the doctor's degree, including most of his dissertation in the summer of 1951. He had the Ph.D. degree conferred upon him in 1952, the year he joined the Morehead faculty.

The schedule of activities by the approximately 150 American veterans which will make the "Pilgrimage to the Philippines" in April, includes a visit to Corregidor, the site of the hero's stand at Bataan, a ceremonial one-mile march along the actual Death March route, a reception at President Marcos' presidential palace, ceremonies at the newly completed memorial to the "Hiding Americans" and visits to former prison camp sites.

President Marcos of the Republic of the Philippines is a survivor of the Bataan Death March.

Dr. Tant started the purposes of the trip, a "sentimental journey" for most of us. It took about 25 years for most of us to recover enough to want to go to the place where we fought and the horrors that followed.

We are going at our own expense, hoping in some small way to be ambassadors of goodwill in an effort to help rekindle the closeness that once existed to our country. Peace is very important to those of us who knew war and its results intimately for so long a time."

Wives, children and close friends will accompany the "pilgrimage" to the Bastards of Bataan. The total group will fill three jetliners from Los Angeles to 400. Mrs. Tant, Edith Charles, Mrs. Betty Lane, and Dr. and Mrs. Everett D. Blair, all of Morehead, are accompanying Dr. Tant on his "sentimental journey."

Salaries For Kentucky Teachers Are Up \$57.6

Small Businesses May Be A Rough Road

In the development of small businesses neglected in the state's efforts to attract big industry. Is the small business man being neglected in Kentucky? A recent study at the University of Kentucky indicates that they are not.

The answers—in part—are to be found in a new study to be released this month by the UK Bureau of Business Research.

In title is "Small Business Enterprise in Kentucky: A Sampling of Current Problems and Assistance Attitudes."

UK Researchers Herman A. Ellis and Robert C. Brown have come up with a set of statistics demonstrating that small set of businesses is still "BIG" in the Commonwealth, where 97 percent of all businesses qualify as small (having fewer than 50 employees).

"Small business in Kentucky has been and will continue to be of significant economic, social, and political importance in the life and well being of the state's citizens," say the two researchers.

Both topics include: Significance of Small Business; Survey of Business Units in Selected East Kentucky Communities; The Needs of Business People, and Appraisal of Assistance Now Available.

Included also are eight case studies of typical businesses: a sign manufacturer, two auto supply houses, a manufacturer of apparel, a furniture and hardware store, a one-man paint and wallpaper store, a retailer of office supplies and service, and a small auto dealership. Their experiences and problems are analyzed from the standpoint of the small business man.

The inquiry by Ellis and Brown, one of the first such studies to be made in Kentucky, was undertaken with financial support from the University of Kentucky Research Foundation. The authors said they are "hopeful it will stimulate interest in the problems of small business leadership in the state, and lead to the formation of educational and service programs of lasting benefit to small business management throughout the state."

Ranger's Column

With the appearance of spring like weather becoming more frequent with bright sunny days and brisk winds blowing, the danger of forest fires becomes prevalent. We realize that many people need to prepare tobacco beds for seeding and clear debris from land for spring plowing. These activities have been the starting place of a portion of our grass and woods fires in the past. However, the number from this source changes in some of the customary ways of sterilizing tobacco plant beds for seeding. Several methods of plant bed sterilization have been developed whereby gases are used instead of fire. This method is very effective and anyone desiring to use it may get additional information and advice from their extension agent or farm-supply stores who have the gases for sale.

Tires are to be used the beds should be located in open areas at least 200 feet from any woodland or grassland. The burning should be done after five in the afternoon after sufficient tools, help and water are on hand to keep the fire under control. Brush piles or other litter and debris should be burned only after five in the afternoon also. Brush should be placed in piles and burned from the uphill side of the land first. A good wide plowed or raked line should be provided around the brush piles before any burning is started and then only after plenty of help, tools, etc., are on hand to do the job.

In order to encourage people to use safe burning practices, Lookouts Archie Griggs from McCluskey Ridge Tower and Allie Hunt from Triangle Fire Tower have been in the field since February contacting farmers and other rural folks and discussing fire prevention with them. Fire Control Officer James Hogge is also making the rounds of all of the consolidated schools showing fire prevention and other conservation movies to the students.

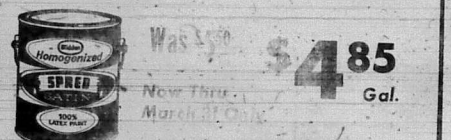

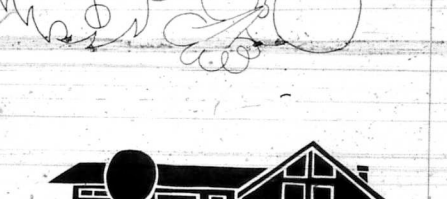
The death of Jack Ruby on Jan. 3rd propelled Capitol Records' "Foolery" into the album. The controversy, particularly attention to one small three minute and 35-second segment of that album in which Ruby was interviewed at Parkland Hospital just prior to his death.
The portion of the tape included in the album which was a 14-minute interview with part of it conducted with Ruby on Feb. 16th. At the time of his death, the entire undated tape could not be released because it had not been equalized for prelistening and it was in a safe deposit box in California and could not be played publicly without permission of the album's producer.

Lawrence Schiller, producer of the album, chose not to release the undated version because he felt it would be improper to make the tape public during the Ruby family's mourning period. At the end of that period, words were taken to prepare the quality of tape and transcription for a non-commercial public release.
In the interview, conducted by a Boston radio show, Epstein referred to interviews on the Capitol recording with two executives to the assassination, Mrs. Carolyn Walker and Charles Bremer. Neither one was ever called to testify before the Warren Commission or its staff. Controversy will produce a controversy of its own, but it's worth having in a record library.

Mock Trial Presented By Students

Five students in the University of Kentucky College of Law will stage a demonstration trial at Morehead State University on Monday, March 20.

The trial is being presented at the request of Morehead political science students.

UK senior law students participating in the demonstration are Charles Taylor and Ronald-Whed, both of Lexington; Elmer Cunningham, McKee; Charles Bowman, Townsboro, and Miss Anthonia Larnes, Morehead.

At the request of Morehead students, the trial will involve the prosecution of a conscientious objector to military service in alleged violation of the Selective Service Act. The case is an hypothetical situation, with facts and testimony of all witnesses being written by Prof. James R. Richardson of the College of Law.

In an attempt to make the case original, by Prof. Richardson said, the facts show that the defendant, an alleged conscientious objector and ordained lay minister, has exhausted all remedies available to him by unsuccessful appeal on his 1-A classification to the state board and the National Selective Service Board in Washington.

"In refusing to honor an order to report for a physical examination and possible induction into the armed forces. He is arrested—under a duly executed warrant—arrested before a United States Commissioner, and held to the federal grand jury under \$5,000 bond. An indictment is returned and the trial follows in the Eastern District of Kentucky Federal District Court, in University County."

Prof. Richardson added that Federal Rules of Criminal Procedure will be observed.

Mexican Gov't Is on Highway Building Spree

MEXICO CITY (UPI)—Mexico with more paved highway miles than any other Latin American country, is expanding its road network to the remotest areas of the country.

The country's 30,000-mile highway network is being stretched further by the current six-year program costing more than \$240 million.

Current expansion is taking place mostly in the Pacific northwest along with a nationwide system of feeder and trunk roads.

The present highway program is the result of more than 40 years of planning and construction since the National Highway Commission was created in 1923.

Mexico ranks 16th in paved roads among the 145 countries studied by the International Highway Federation of Washington, D.C. About 175,000 miles of roads are paved and the rest graded or gravelled.

Highway construction is at an all-time high and is projected under the present system. The only exceptions are a small stretch between Merida, Yucatan, and Guatemala, and the Quintana Roo territory and Yucatan routes to La Paz capital of the territory of Southern Baja California. The latter is now reached by ferry boat across the Gulf of California from Mazatlan.

Among the major projects under construction is a new, more direct route between Queretaro and Mexico City at a cost of nearly \$2 million. This multiple-lane route, part of which will be an expressway, is the Mexican City's oldest.

Queretaro, junction point for important highways to the United States border. The new highway will give Mexico City a spacious boulevard approach with landscaped "esplanades" dividing the traffic.

A border-to-border highway about 2,500 miles long that will link Tijuana on the U.S. border with Toluca, Chiapas on the Guatemalan border, also has top priority. Completion has been scheduled for 1970.

Work is progressing most rapidly in Guerrero and Oaxaca states and work has started here on coastal highways. Actually, only about 400 miles remain to be built, but it is mostly through difficult mountainous areas.

Scholar Doubts Godiva Legend

COVENTRY, England (UPI)—When a medieval manuscript of 800 years ago is found to describe a woman as taking baths and wearing a long, flowing dress, it is not surprising that some scholars doubt the legend of Godiva. The story has persisted for centuries, but a recent discovery of a manuscript from Coventry, England, in the 11th century, says that the woman was not Godiva, but a noblewoman named Godiva. The manuscript describes a woman who took baths and wore a long, flowing dress, but it does not mention her name. The legend of Godiva, who is said to have taken a bath in Coventry while her husband, Leofric, was away, is a popular story in England. However, the discovery of this manuscript suggests that the legend may be a later invention.

Crossing Of Grass Held Beneficial

Plant breeders at the University of Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Station have found that the hybrid grasses they've developed may be desirable for use as forage for livestock. The grasses, a cross of tall fescue and ryegrass, are being tested in several categories. Dr. Robert Buckner, USDA-ARS scientist working at the E.K. station, says analysis "shows many desirable characteristics of the cross." Certain chemical constituents of pasture grasses may be related to the nutritional value of the grass as a forage (hay or pasture), he says. These are generally considered crude protein, digestibility and palatability (good taste to stock), he says.

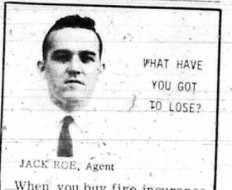

Walnut Seedlings To Be Planted In State

A concerted effort will be made in the next few weeks to get one million walnut seedlings planted in Kentucky this year. This ambitious program has been adopted by the Kentucky Farm Bureau Federation and the Department of Natural Resources. John W. FERTILIZING PLANT BEDS

Usually at this time of the season as we drive through Eastern Kentucky, we can see quite a few beds that have been sown by now. However, due to the rain and lateness of the season, these early beds start getting up in the next few days, we might think a little bit about fertilizing our plant beds. Let's keep in mind that we are dealing with a comparatively small area and for that reason we need to be particularly careful not to over-fertilize. Every year we usually get a little dry spell about this time. We can do when we have this condition is to apply water to get the fertilizer away from the roots. Going back to fertilization, lets put 35-40 pounds of a plant bed fertilizer on a bed 100"x9". The University and fertilizer companies have agreed on 4-16-4 for plant beds and practically all the companies make this one for this particular purpose. You can get it either plain or with soil insecticide for controlling insects. As we have said before since usually at sometime during the season we need to water our beds, let's consider putting them near a pond or creek this year to simplify this job.

REFRENDUM

It goes everyone has received news by now of the acreage-poundsage referendum so you can go ahead and buy your seed and select the variety you want to grow. Don't forget it is a good idea to soil test before you make plans to buy your fertilizer.

FARM MANURES

In order that your manure can be broken down it needs to be put under soon as possible so that you can turn it under. Keep in mind that on the average a cow or horse manure provides about 6 pounds of available nitrogen, 3 pounds phosphorus, and 11 pounds of potash. Let's not forget when figuring the amount of nitrogen for a crop to figure in that provided by the manure applied. Too much nitrogen will mean a rough, thick, late-maturing tobacco with a heavy mid-rib. Too little nitrogen may mean small leaves, slender stalks, and prematurely yellowing or browning of the leaves at the base of the stalk and low quality. These things need to be considered in planning a fertilizer program.

PROCESSED APPLE PRODUCTS

Have you noticed an increase in the number and volume of apple products as you shop in the grocery stores? Perhaps you have and the full impact has not really broken through to you—sometimes new products increase gradually until all at once we become aware of them. This is somewhat the way apple products have appeared. Processed apple products have increased and have taken more of the fresh crop each year. Back in 1955 about 25 percent of the apples marketed in this country were processed—that is canned, dried and a few frozen—but 1963 saw 38 percent of the crop going into processed products. This trend is expected to continue in the future as many products show increasing demands. Canned apples, applesauce and apple juice are among the products showing the largest gains. Of the total processed apples, more than half so-called "applesauce" some of this combined with products such as berries, cherries, pineapple and apricots. Some sauce has spices added and texture variations are smooth, chunky, fine and regular. Other processed forms of apples are slices for pies and pie filling, baked apples, apple juice, dried apples, frozen dumplings, turnovers, pies and cakes. It is the use of convenience foods becomes greater so does the use of new apple products continue upward. Recent study findings indicate that homemade applesauce, apple pies are on the decrease. Some of the new products to be seen in the future are apple flakes that reconstitute in cold water and gelled

Certificates Are Important To Wheat Farmers

Wheat farmers with small allotments should check the benefits of the 1967 wheat program if they are growing wheat this year. Fromas H. Hockensmith, Chairman of the State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee said today.

He said the program supports the portion of each participant's wheat grown for the domestic market at full parity and price-support loans for all wheat grown on the farm. The loans help increase farm income by permitting orderly marketing. Hockensmith said.

The marketing certificates which are used to support domestic production at parity are important for wheat producers. The Chairman said. As an example, take a farm with 10-acre allotment and a 30-bushels projected yield. The farmer can earn certificates on 35 percent of his projected production, 105 bushels. They are valued at the difference between the national average price on July 1, 1967. The 1966 certificate is the same this year, it means this farmer would earn 138.60 in certificates, an average almost \$14.00 per acre.

In addition, he earns what his wheat will sell for on the market -- or he can take out a price-support loan and hold the wheat in the market at too low a harvest time, Hockensmith said.

The Chairman explained that participation in the 1967 wheat program is not automatic but farmers should sign up with the county office. They want to participate. The sign-up period ends March 17, Hockensmith said.



Which House Is Your Castle?

Three centuries ago, an English judge proclaimed that "a man's house is his castle."
Almost two centuries ago, the Fourth Amendment to the Constitution forbade any "unreasonable search" of a private dwelling.
And today, the safety of a person's home from governmental intrusion still ranks as one of the most distinctive hallmarks of a free land.
But which "house" is the law talking about?
Obviously it means a house that you own and live in. And it includes a house or apartment that you occupy "as a tenant."
Sometimes, though, "house" trails the "Hotel" term. All these too, since they are places of dwelling, ordinarily share the constitutional guarantee of privacy.



The protection may also reach beyond the house itself. Courts have held it to include a householder's adjacent garage and a farmer's meadow, barn, etc., both cases the government that the constitutional shelter should cover all areas reasonably within the ambit of family life.

Does this mean that the home is a "privileged sanctuary" for crime? Not at all. Home may indeed be searched under proper circumstances - for a suspect, if the police first obtain a warrant. It is in the process of making a lawful search.

For then the search is "reasonable," not forbidden by the constitutional bar. As a United States Supreme Court justice said in explaining rights of privacy.

The framers of the Constitution only intended to restrain the abuse, not stretch the power.
But without such justifying circumstances, a house search against the tenets of individualism. An English statesman, Sir William Pitt, gave the doctrine its classical expression.

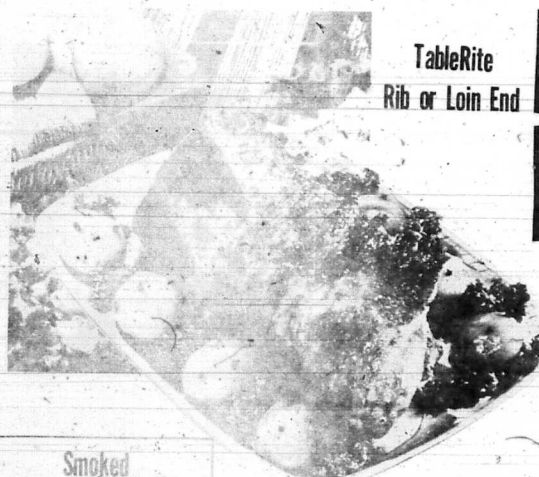
