Persons desiring to make applications for loans are requested to call at the office as soon as possible as the office is temporary and will not remain open indefinitely.

## 63 FAMILIES ARE REHABILITATED BY RED CROSS AGENCY

Seed Program Is Planned For Needy Families

Rehabilitating flood-distressed families in Rowan County got under way this week by the American National Red Cross.

Miss Helen J. Moses, area director, reported that 63 families have been rehabilitated so far. Approximately 550 Rowan County families have registered for aid from the Red Cross. Miss Moses said that all of them, however, will not be eligible for assistance because only those who are financially unable through cash or credit resources to take care of their own needs will be given assistance.

## Will Give Seed

The Red Cross is unable to assist owners of income property but will help the tenant who is unable to himself to secure household furnishings.

Because of the great loss of gardens, a garden seed program will be started. Seed will be distributed on an individual family basis. Enough seed will be given to provide sufficient food for the balance of the summer and for coming purposes in the fall to assure possibilities of food during the winter. These seeds, the said, are for planting purposes, not for immediate consumption.

Families to receive seed will be notified of the time of distribution.

The refuge and feeding centers are rapidly decreasing in population. It is hoped that by the end of the week all those who have been homeless will have been found places where they can establish themselves.

Families being given help are cooperating very well, Miss Moses said.

Mrs. Minnie Conn of near Elliottville died Wednesday afternoon about 3 p. m., after being hit by a truck driven by Roscoe Pennington of Bruin in front of O. A. James' store.

Mrs. Conn, who was 62 years of age, was understood to be crossing the road when the accident occurred. She was taken to a Morehead doctor who pronounced her dead upon arrival.

She is survived by four sons, William, Zell, Frank and Willis. Her husband, Lester, preceded her in death in 1932. Mrs. Conn was a native of Carter county, having been born near the Rowan county line between Elliottville and Jacob.

## A. F. L. Chapter At Clearfield Made Bargaining Agent

The Clearfield local chapter of the American Federation of Labor was made bargaining agent for workers in the Lee Clay Products Company by a 75 to 26 vote of the employees last Friday.

An election was called earlier in the month but was postponed on account of the flood.

One hundred and forty-five employees were eligible to vote. One voted not to hold an election, 56 for the C. I. O. and 76 for the A. F. of L., giving the latter the right to bargain for all the employees.

## Roosevelt Says He Is Neutral

Last week members of Congress from Kentucky went to see the President. They asked him how he felt about the Kentucky gubernatorial primary. Following the conference Congressman Edward Rousevelt issued the following statement:

"We asked the President whether or not he had expressed any candid opinion. The substance of his remarks was that he had not, and that he was purely a state matter, and that he hadn't heard anything about it very much. He was absolutely neutral and had no choice among the several candidates."

## \$894 Obtained By Wednesday

Rowan County is expected to go over the top in the Red Cross drive for \$1,000, the quota set by Washington headquarters, said Mrs. Ed Williams, county chairman, yesterday. The drive ends Saturday.

A total of \$239.21 has been handed her by Wednesday afternoon. Later in the day it was learned that the Church of God committee had completed its solicitations and was ready to turn over \$156.19, sending the fund over to \$395.40. The majority of the organization's headquarters outside of Morehead, and Morehead State Teachers College committees had not reported as we went to press.

The largest single donation in the county so far reported was given by the Union Grocery Company, \$200. Their damage by the flood was among the greatest individual losses in the county.

It looks as though Doctor Ellington is the champion fisherman in town. But he has told so many big stories in the past about his luck (that was when he couldn't catch any) that now when he does make a catch no one will believe him. After a good day's fishing in Pa's you can find him standing in front of Bishop's store waiting for a victim to drag upstairs first look at the fish he caught. He knows he has to have the goods to make it follow believe him. Sunday, he, Dr. Falls and Jim Brown caught 14 good bass.  
The day before the flood I fished Triplett below town with a fly pole. My only luck was to catch a few blue gills. These were part of the stock the Fish and Game Club had released here this spring. I believe blue gills to be one of the finest game fish and table fish in the country and gladly returned all I hooked so as to give them the best start possible here.  
A blue gill is very similar to our sun fish but gets much larger—nice ones weigh over half a pound—and can fight like a master bass. They are olive green and have an extension on their gills that is blue, thus the name.
