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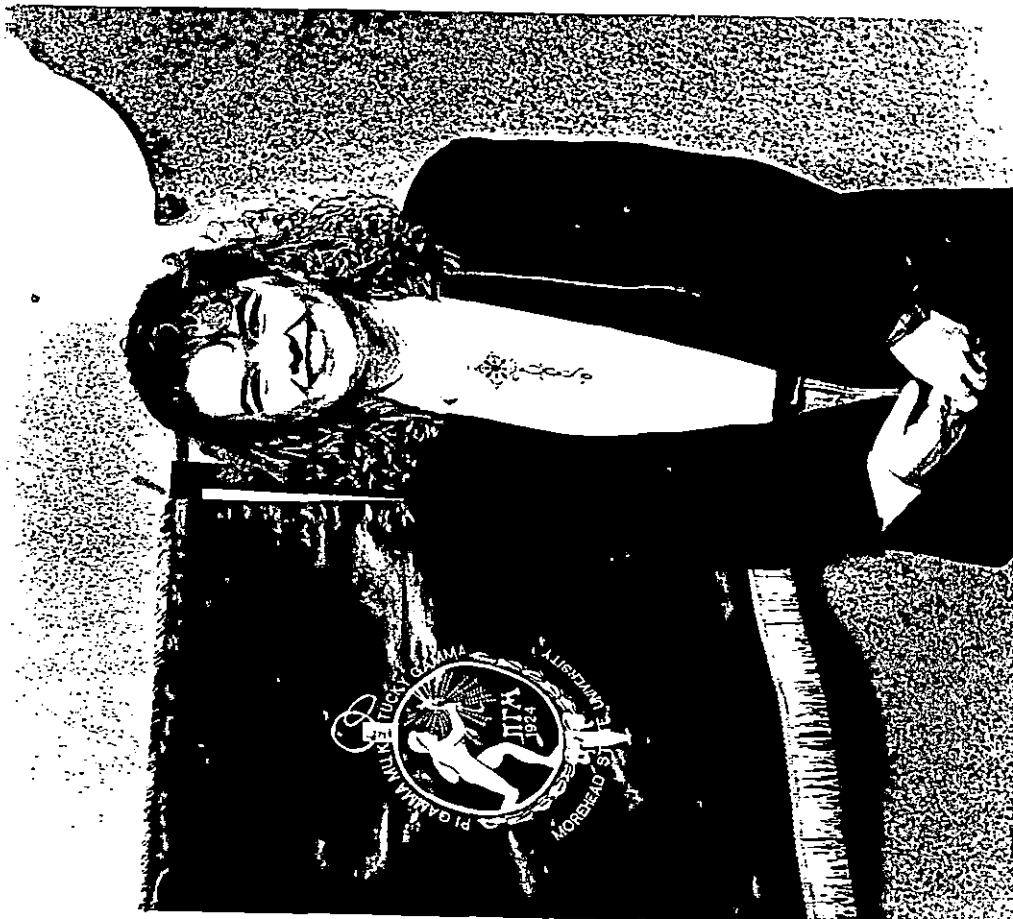

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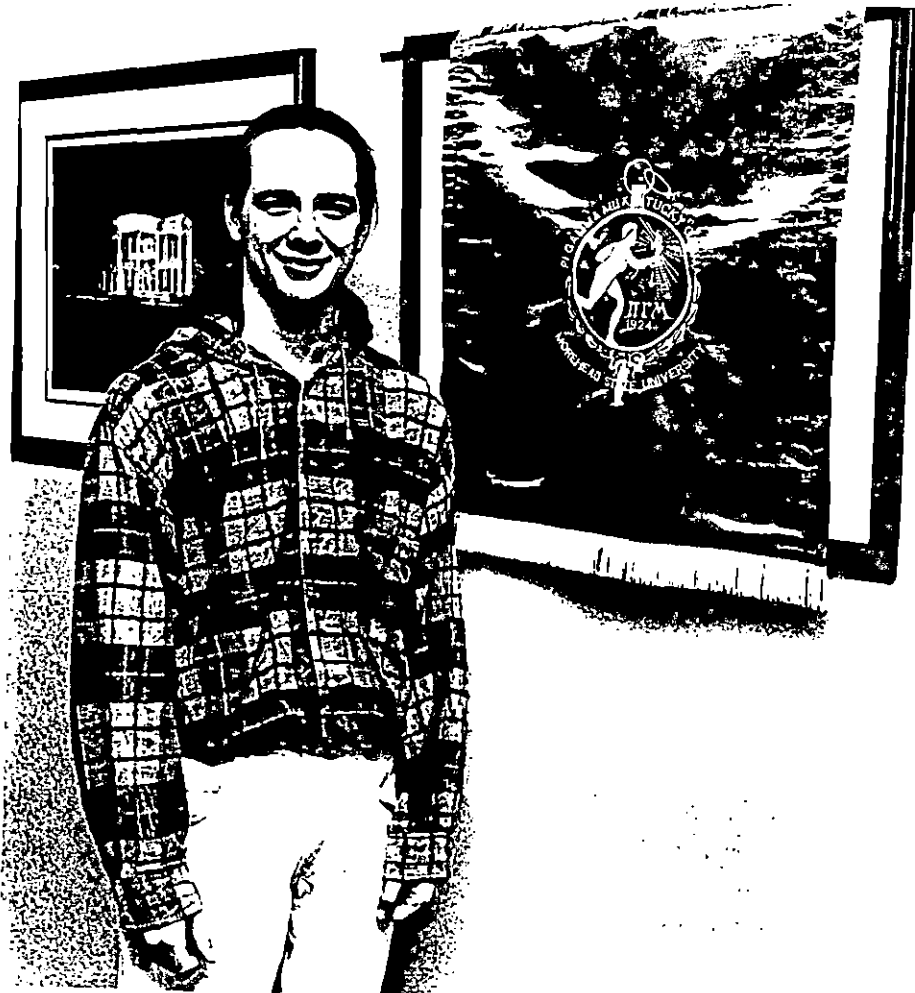

MOREHEAD, Ky.—This fall Morehead State University has been experimenting with a teaching method that lets students at various campus locations take a class at the same time by watching a video lecture on a television set at each site.

A form of "distance learning," this method of teaching brings the instructor to students at various campus locations through the use of a pre-recorded video cassette lecture. Students watch the lecture on television and discuss class assignments with other students and the instructor by telephone conference call during and after each class.

Dr. Rodger Carlson, MSU professor of management in the College of Business, is teaching a graduate management course in Quantitative Analysis through distance learning. The course is taught at three campus locations at the same time on Thursday evenings.

With the help of John Higginbotham, Jr., MSU coordinator of Television Productions, Dr. Carlson records lectures for each class on video cassette. He then travels to one of the three locations each week to speak with students; spending one-third of his time with each class during the semester. The course includes the identical material and methods that have always been covered in the course.

Until now, this class and many others frequently have not been taught every semester, according to Dr. Marc Glasser, dean of Graduate and Extended Campus Programs. Students who previously wanted to take the course would either have to travel to the location where it was being taught or wait until it was offered at the main campus.

Distance learning allows MSU to combine the number of extended campus and main campus students who sign up for the course, making it easier to obtain the appropriate number of students to offer a class that might otherwise be canceled.

Dr. Glasser said the advantage of distance learning is that more students can benefit by getting the courses they need without having to wait or skip a semester and instructors can benefit by reducing travel time.

Usually identified with monumental sculptures, he produced a much smaller work that may be seen by more than 150,000 visitors.

When contacted by Ann Stock, the White House social secretary, Sternal decided he wanted to carve an American grizzly bear, perhaps balancing on a ball like at a circus with the earth as a motif.

After learning that President and Mrs. Clinton wanted an angelic look, Sternal revised his design a bit. The finished product was a an angel bear, approximately 12 inches in height, made from a Kentucky coffee tree.

Pleased with the final design, the artist said, "He's a good natured bear who looks happy." The globe of the world is finely detailed to show the continents and the artist's signature can be found in Antarctica.

ASHLAND, Ky.---Four state entities have formally linked hands to further opportunities for Ashland area students through a consortium designed to link education to jobs.

Officials from FIVCO Area Development District, Morehead State University, Ashland Community College and Kentucky Tech-Northeast Region joined forces to ensure quality job accessibility for the region's residents.

Announcement of the consortium was made Wednesday, Dec. 8, at a news conference held at MSU's Ashland Area Extended Campus Center.

While FIVCO concentrates its efforts on economic development opportunities for the region, the educational institutions will provide the necessary academic and vocational programming in support, according to G.B. Johnson Jr. of Ashland, president of FIVCO's board.

Noting that many of the issues facing society today are linked to education, Johnson said that the educational system must be a major player in the pursuit of solutions.

"What the consortium agreement does is to formalize what we have been doing for several years now," said MSU President Ronald G. Eaglin. "It will ensure a more efficient and effective coordination of our efforts."

"We will focus our attention on preparing a quality workforce consistent with the area's economic needs," Dr. Eaglin said. "While we have offered a wide variety of classes in the past, we now are working to develop academic programs for cohort groups leading to specific baccalaureate degrees."

Since 1986, MSU has offered upper division undergraduate courses in Ashland to complement Ashland Community College's programs.

The Council on Higher Education designated the regional site as an extended campus center of the University and in spring 1992 MSU-Ashland Area Extended Campus Center began leasing space in FIVCO's G.B. Johnson Education and Economic Center, 1401 Winchester Avenue.

More than 400 Ashland area residents are taking undergraduate or graduate work this fall through the extended campus center. The demand for classes has resulted in a need for MSU to lease an additional floor for use by the Ashland Area Extended Campus Center.

The FIVCO building also houses the Ashland Business Center, Inc., a business incubator for the area, and ACC offers several classes there as well.

"The consortium will further our cooperative academic efforts with MSU and Kentucky Tech," said Dr. Charles Dassance, president of ACC. "Also ACC sees a need to increase the services it has offered in economic development and this will enhance those efforts," he added. "Additionally, it will assist ACC's business and industry liaison in working with the region's businesses."

According to Howard W. Moore, executive director of Kentucky Tech Northeast Region, formally linking academic programs of MSU's Ashland Area ECC and ACC with Kentucky Tech schools will be a big plus for the students.

"Today, industries want employees not only to have the basic job skills, but to be better prepared academically as well," Moore said. He added that Kentucky Tech would strengthen its efforts in working with the public schools to develop technical programs benefitting all entities.

The consortium also will study the possibility of establishing a graduate component in addition to the current academic offerings by MSU and the University of Kentucky; of creating co-op and intern programs with businesses in the FIVCO area for students, and of creating new programs complimentary to the missions of the participating educational institutions.

In addition to the consortium's primary participants, resource partners involved in this effort to link education to jobs include area public school superintendents; the county judge-executives of Boyd, Carter, Elliott, Greenup and Lawrence counties; the Ashland City mayor; legislators serving the FIVCO areas; representatives of Chamber of Commerce and Economic Development Corporation of Boyd and Greenup counties, and a member of the Foundation for the Tri-State Community.

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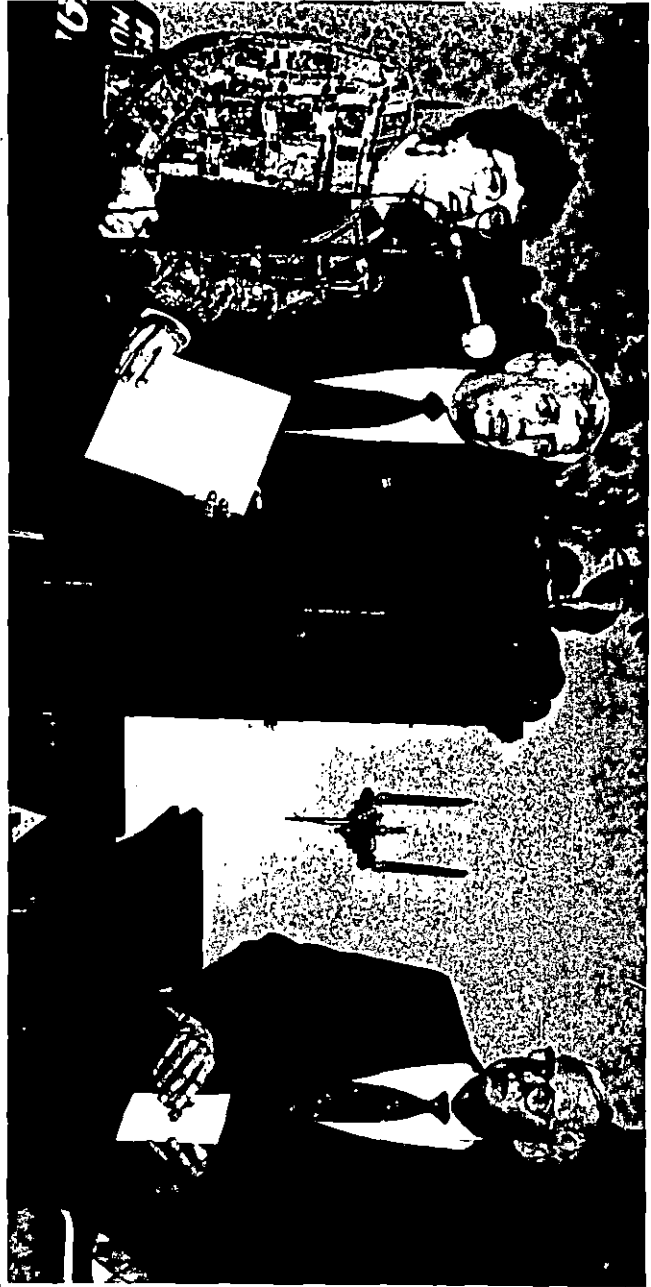

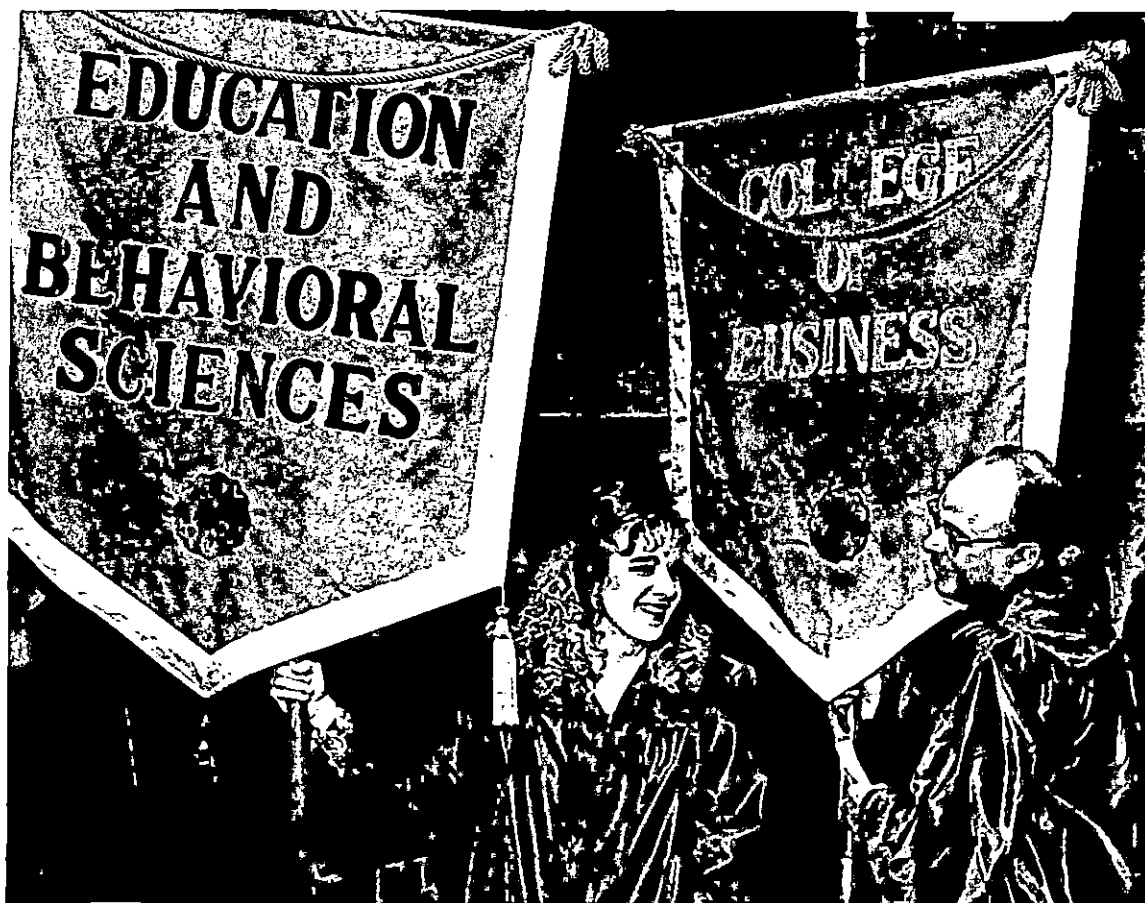

WEST LIBERTY, Ky.---When Jennifer Joseph graduated Montgomery County High School in 1980, she thought she wouldn't need a college education to succeed in the job market.

"I thought I could make it on my own without an education, but you just can't do it too easily," Joseph said.

A few years ago when she realized that she would need a college degree to gain better employment, she thought she had missed her chance to go to school. Lack of finances held her back as well as the thought of going to school at the age of 31. She also had married in 1983 and had a son in 1987.

"I had wanted to go to school for quite some time; but I thought that if I tried I would fail because I had been out of school so long," she said.

However, Joseph found the hope and financial assistance she needed with the help of a Regional Campus Award from Morehead State University. The \$300 award covered tuition and expenses for one three-hour undergraduate course at the Licking Valley Extended Campus Center in West Liberty.

The special financial aid program provides financial help and entrance incentive to area students returning to the classroom, according to Tim Rhodes, MSU director of Financial Aid.

Joseph said the award not only helped her pay for a general literature class last spring; it also helped boost her confidence to continue taking classes. After receiving more financial aid in the fall, she enrolled part-time at the center to pursue a degree in Interdisciplinary Childhood Development for primary education.

"If I hadn't gotten the award, it would have been financially impossible for me to take classes," Joseph said. "I thought what have I got to lose -- it only costs time."

The one-time Regional Campus Awards were established for non-traditional undergraduate students taking classes part-time at any one of MSU's Extended Campus Centers, but exceptions may be made for graduate students seeking a career change or to upgrade their skills to be more competitive in the job market, Rhodes said. Other financial aid programs also are available for currently enrolled students and financial aid counseling is available for them at the center.

"I would probably have still been trying to get work in a factory if I hadn't found out about the award. I encourage everyone to get a college degree, because it is one of the most important things you can do," Joseph said. "People should go to college right after high school because it does get harder to go back, to get into the routine."

Joseph said Jonell Tobin, director of the Licking Valley ECC, helped her realize that getting into school wasn't so difficult after all. Joseph works with Tobin at the center now helping teach literacy classes through a work-study program.

"All too often, the decision whether or not to continue one's education is influenced by economic conditions," Rhodes said. "We want this award to be a financial stepping-stone to ease the path back into the classroom. Approximately 70 percent of the student population at MSU receives some form of financial aid, and many students couldn't go to school without it."

During the fall 1993 semester, there were 44 students who received the award, Rhodes said. There are 1,317 students currently enrolled at the three centers, located in Ashland, West Liberty and Prestonsburg, according to Dixie Blankenbeckler, regional campus coordinator for Graduate and Extended Campus Programs.

Applications for Regional Campus Awards are available by calling Ms. Tobin, locally at 743-1500 or toll-free at 1-800-648-5371, or stop by at the center, located on KY 7.

"My advice to anyone coming out of high school is do it (get a college degree) while you're young. It makes you more marketable and, let's face it, it takes a college degree anymore to get a good job," Joseph said.

Since there are a limited number of awards available, students are encouraged to apply at once, according to Rhodes.

ASHLAND, Ky.---John Curtiss was unemployed and depressed. At age 53, he realized that, even though he had worked at various jobs, what he really wanted was a college degree and a new career direction. Financial hardship held him back from returning to school; from taking that first step toward a better life for him and his family through education.

Three years ago, when Curtiss and his family moved back to his hometown of Ashland to live with relatives, he used his 30 years of broadcasting experience to gain temporary work with private firms in the area. But Curtiss wanted a new career in social work and knew he would have to get a college degree to work in that field. With economic conditions the way they were, he thought there was no hope for him to return to school.

"I was depressed, I felt backed into a corner and didn't have any money to go to school," Curtiss said.

Then last fall, he learned about Regional Campus Awards, a special financial aid program at Morehead State University for people like himself. These awards provide financial help and entrance incentive to area students returning to the classroom, according to Tim Rhodes, MSU director of Financial Aid.

Curtiss received the \$300 award which covers tuition, books and related expenses for one three-hour undergraduate course at the Ashland Area Extended Campus Center. After taking a sociology class last spring at the center, he applied for more financial aid and enrolled full-time at Ashland Community College. Curtiss is currently a sophomore, pursuing a social work degree and maintaining a "B" average in his classes. He plans to return to MSU to complete his degree.

"All too often, the decision whether or not to continue one's education is influenced by current economic conditions," Rhodes said. "We want this award to be a financial stepping-stone to ease the path back into the classroom."

Curtiss said his attitude has become more positive since he got back into school. He now has the chance to change his career and increase his chances to make a better living.

"I wouldn't have been able to go back to school if it hadn't been for the money. I would still be floundering around in the job market," Curtiss said.

He credits Debbie Salyer, academic student services coordinator, for telling him about the award as well as Dr. Roland Burns, director of the Ashland Area ECC, for his academic guidance.

"For me, going to college has been the opportunity of a lifetime. It's like walking to the top of a hill and seeing a panoramic view," Curtiss said. "I realized that, even at my age, I was not coming to the end of my road. Now I know there are more opportunities than what I thought. It has really opened my eyes."

According to Rhodes, 44 students at the centers received Regional Campus Awards for the fall 1993 semester. There are 1,317 students currently enrolled at the three centers, located in Ashland, West Liberty and Prestonsburg, according to Dixie Blankenbeckler, regional campus coordinator for Graduate and Extended Campus Programs.

Approximately 70 percent of the student population at MSU receives some form of financial aid, according to Rhodes. "Many students couldn't go to school at all without financial aid," he said.

The one-time Regional Campus Awards were established for non-traditional undergraduate students taking classes part-time at the center, but exceptions may be made for graduate students seeking a career change or to upgrade their skills to be more competitive in the job market, Rhodes said. Other financial aid programs are also available for currently enrolled students and financial aid counseling is available for them at the center.

Since there are a limited number of awards available, students are encouraged to apply at once, according to Rhodes.

PRESTONSBURG, Ky.—Eulene Ratliff wanted to get a college degree, but lack of finances and numerous family responsibilities held her back. Raising her five children, working for a local Headstart and caring for her home in Martin was about all she could handle.

Now at age 54, her husband having semi-retired, she decided it was her turn to pursue one of her most cherished personal goals -- obtaining a college degree so she could teach primary school.

"I decided it was my turn to do what I wanted to do, but getting money to go to college was my biggest problem," Ratliff said.

Then Ratliff heard about Regional Campus Awards, a special financial aid program at Morehead State University for people like herself. These awards provide financial help and entrance incentive to area students returning to the classroom, according to Tim Rhodes, MSU director of Financial Aid.

Ratliff took an education foundations class this fall at MSU's Big Sandy Extended Campus Center in Prestonsburg with the help of the award. The one-time \$300 financial aid covers tuition and expenses for a three-hour undergraduate class.

"I was real thrilled about getting the class. Dr. Margaret Lewis told me about the award and I was glad because I hadn't heard of such a thing," Ratliff said. "Let's face it, I couldn't have gone without the \$300 award."

The award not only helped Ratliff get into a university course, but helped her self-esteem, too. Now, she says she can achieve an education without feeling inferior.

"Getting back into school made me feel important. It gave me a positive outlook and enthusiasm to apply for more financial aid and more classes. I thought the people at the center were willing to help me, and it made me feel good to be a part of it all," Ratliff said.

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"All too often, the decision whether or not to continue one's education is influenced by current economic conditions," Rhodes said. "We want this award to be a financial stepping-stone to ease the path back into the classroom.
